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

Said a prominent official, yesterday: "During the next four years, the cause of the disaster of last Tuesday will be stated as a thousand and one different things. I believe it was caused by the position taken on the tariff question during the last two months of the campaign by the stump speakers of the party under orders from the National Committee. During the long discussion of the Mills' bill in the House, its friends constantly denounced the protective tariff as legalized robbery, and yet those same men were compelled to go on the stump and state that the Mills' bill was a protective measure, because somebody had become panic-stricken at the cry of free trade. This action undoubtedly disgusted thousands of voters who are believers in free and unrestricted trade with the world at large, and, at the same time, it did not attract any of the high protection voters. I am firmly of the opinion that, had the democratic speakers and newspaper accepted the challenge of the republicans and proclaimed themselves in favor of free trade as soon as it could be brought about without detriment to the required income of the Government, Mr. Cleveland would have been triumphantly re-elected. Many thousand men throughout the country who are pronounced free traders voted the republican ticket. Why? Birds of Ill Omen.
An old Scotch saying has it that "Whistun maidens an' crawling hens are nae lucky about ony man's town."

Thus the ordinary barn yard fowl may be a feathered fore-runner of evil. Birds, from perhaps antediluvian periods, have been looked upon as feathered fortune tellers. The swartly Italians, who, with their cages of trained birds, stand at the street corners in our large cities and ask passers by to allow the little feathered ones to read their fortune, are the struggling remnants of a whole army of superstitious souls. In some parts of England even in our day the note of the swallow means the reception of some evil tidings; but to kill that bird is a certain way of bringing down unlimited evil on the destroyer. The white owl in France is universally held as a foreteller of death, and its "screech" is not much liked by English peasants. But in ancient times among the negroes, the brown owl, if uttering its hoarse note on the right, foretells good luck, but the opposite if on the left. In France and Belgium the cry of the white owl is supposed to foretell all sorts of misfortunes. However, the counteracting one, is not far to seek—it simply consists in throwing a pinch of salt into the fire when the sound is heard.

Two crows, in some parts of Scotland, are considered very ominous of ill. The cuckoo's note is everywhere held as a sign of duplex meaning, the explanation whereof lies, not with the bird's note but with the auditor's pocket. If the cuckoo be heard when the pockets are empty a very unpropitious year and (especially) the need of borrowing from friends (or trying so to do) is implied. But if, on the other hand, the cuckoo's note be heard for the first time when the pocket contains cash, a prosperous and moneyed year is foretold. Another sign of good fortune is found in the robin perching on the roof and singing. Curiously enough the smallest of popular birds, the golden-crowned wren, was, till the end of the last century, and in some parts during the first quarter of the present one, despite the nursery rhyme associating it with the robin, held as a foe, and cruelly stoned on certain days, much after the fashion in which the shrike-like rock was tortured to death.—House Journal.

Insurance Gains to Force.
What science and invention is doing for the human race was tersely and plainly presented. Note the following illustration:

Compare a galley, a vessel propelled by oars, with the modern Atlantic liner, and first let us assume that prime movers are non-existent and that the vessel is to be propelled galley fashion. Take her length as some 600 feet, and assume that place be found for no more than 400 oars on each side, each oar worked by three men, or 2,400 men; and allow that six men under these conditions could develop work equal to one horse power; we should have 400 horse power. Double the number of men and we should have 800 horse power, with 4,800 men at work, and at least the same number in reserve. If the journey is to be carried on continuously, contrast the puny result thus obtained with the 15,000 horse power given forth by a large prime mover of the present day, such a power requiring, on the above mode of calculation, 117,000 men at work and 117,000 men in reserve; and these to be carried in a vessel less than 600 feet in length. Even if it were possible to carry this number of men in such a vessel, by no conceivable means could their power be utilized so as to impart to it a speed of twenty knots an hour, weighing as it would some 10,500 tons gross.

Prime movers can do what human muscle can never accomplish. Take a railway locomotive—400 horse power developed in a wagon which does not occupy fifty square yards of space, and that fires at the rate of six miles an hour with its heavy train. How weak and puny human muscle toward attaining such results.—Sir Fred Bramball to the British Association.

The Methodist Aster Family.
Phinness and solidity mark whatever belongs to the family. The houses, at the corners of Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets and Fifth avenue, in which John Jacob and William Aster have lived for years, are simple to the last degree, but they are simple to the last degree, and indeed ugly without, though very comfortable internally. But nowhere is there any sign of ornament for the sake of ornament. Richness is blended with something of severity. The contemporaneous passion for the metric and decorative is not visible.

The Astors give elaborate entertainments, mainly dinner parties, but give them sparingly, and always see that they are fully and correctly advertised in the social columns of the newspapers. Even festivity is a business with the family, who are methodical and considerate of cost in everything. They are trained to be so from their infancy. Hence, simplicity, sensibility, romance, sympathy, whatever belongs to the emotional ideal, is, if it appear, sedulously repressed. Mrs. John Jacob Aster, who recently died, was devoted to the poor, attending to their wants personally; but she died in charity. It is only the common law of marriage, however, that is worthy and tenderly maintained by the lowest and meanest of the Astors, as was a constant help.—House Journal.

Waste of Brain Power.
What a waste of brain power there is in overworking. The swapper has all the forces of law and order arrayed against him. He is sure to be tripped up by a law. The cost of a trial is a thing to be shuddered at. The ingenuity he expends in his endeavor, if applied in a lawful direction is sure to net him a larger return in cash than it does when put to a crooked use. The swapper is generally deservedly punished. He usually expects to take advantage of somebody, and he gets taken in himself. Cupidity is at the bottom of both sides of a swindle.—Detroit Free Press.

All visitors to Boston have greatest interest in the old buildings of the city. It is rather a disappointment to them that the city does not present its former Puritan aspect, and the people from the newest western cities are the most arrogant in their demands for antiquities.—Boston Journal.

Wild Horse of the Plains.
So much has been written of the horse of the plains, which, foaled upon the dew kissed grass of the prairie, has never known a halter or the touch of a man's hand, that descriptive references to their fleetness, wariness and oftentimes graceful beauty, particularly among the stallions, would at this day lack interest. But one curious fact is known to but few aside from those who have followed them for hundreds of miles and studied their habits closely. If there are enough in a band these animals group by thirties. With every stallion there are two or three mares. What becomes of the weaker mares when the stronger fight away—whether they hide their time to get the quota of females or, in the dependency of equine bachelorhood, go off alone and starve themselves—is not known. The matrimonial regulations of the wild horse, however, this may be allowed to each male twelve mares, and the remarkable feature is, no more. They draw the line at an even dozen. Even when the bands that roamed these great plains, then tenanted except by other wild creatures, numbered in the hundreds and more than a thousand, this peculiar division into families was plainly noticeable. They kept a little apart and never voluntarily mingled.—Colorado Cor. Chicago Tribune.


