

Heroic Efforts To Preserve Human Life Unfurled As Blizzard Ceased

The struggle of the plainsman and his ceaseless efforts for the preservation of human life against wild defiance of the elements has been revealed as the blizzard to sweep across the plains for many years gave way to clearing skies Thursday. Many a chapter in this struggle has been told. Impassable roads and slow communications leave others as missing pages to be added to a colorful book written in life's struggle of heroes and heroines striving for the safety of their fellowman.

An unsung heroine is Mrs. Wilbur Wilson, who with only a sick and hidden husband to assist her, opened the doors of her home to lifeless Robert Wayne Reynolds and to work ceaselessly and untiringly in a valiant struggle to wrest Robert O. Reynolds, Kenneth Reynolds, Juanita Reynolds, and Mrs. Jessie Toon from the grasp of the icy fingers of death. She was successful in her efforts with two of her patients.

Words will never express the admiration of the plains people of the manner in which this good woman toiled amid the shock and confusion of the dead and dying but were not the pen of Longfellow silenced, upon the plains of Sherman County on that wintry night no doubt her deeds would have hovered beside those of Florence Nightingale for the inspiration of another poem similar to Santa Filomena.

In her life she will never experience such a feeling of content as she had when the eyes of those two surviving patients burned with an inspired glow of appreciation as the agonizing pains of exposure ceased.

W. S. Frizzell, his sons, Bill Frizzell and Jack Frizzell, basketball fans who attended the game here Tuesday night, remained in their car until Thursday morning when Bill walked to Stratford to summon aid. Bill was driving the car on the trip to their country home, struck a snow drift, veered and stuck in the ditch at 9:30 P. M. The car heater lasted for about two hours. After remaining in the car Tuesday night they decided to pit their strength against the raging storm Wednesday morning and walk to the C. E. Willmon home, 1-2 to 3-4 of a mile away. They knew the distance could be judged by passing 13 telephone poles. In single file with the father leading, Bill next, and Jack following, they started their walk in the wintry gale. They had traveled a distance of three telephone poles when Jack, exhausted, fell in the snow, and cried out for help. His father was first to reach him and picked him up. Neither had on gloves and they attribute the blistering of their hands to this exposure. The elder Frizzell returned to the car with his sons and then began thinking about what was possible for him to do in an attempt to save his life and that of his sons. He had a case of canned lubricating oil in the rear of the car and after considerable difficulty they finally started an oil fire in the car to prevent freezing, a practice which they continued until Thursday morning when Bill walked to Stratford. He had not gone far until he viewed the cars of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd M. Keener and Arlyn Haile stalled only a short distance away. Keener and Haile walked with Frizzell to Stratford.

Mrs. Frizzell, having faith in her husband's knowledge of the plains storms as an old timer, rested peacefully at home, thinking Frizzell and her sons had remained in Stratford. She was informed of the harrowing experience members of her family had endured when her son, Jerry, borrowed a horse and rode to the family home 3 1-2 miles southeast to ease the anxiety of her husband and son who feared she might leave home in an attempt to try to locate them. W. S. and Jack Frizzell went to Amarillo Friday for the care of a specialist.

Viola Adkins, Neta Aduddell, and Frank White, were caught in a stalled car in the storm about 200 or 300 yards from the W. S. Frizzell home. They braved the storm immediately after the car stalled and remained with Mrs. Frizzell until it had passed.

Arlyn Haile, with 2 fractured ribs sustained in a fall from a road grader Monday, was in Stratford Tuesday night, and attempted to return to his parents

home. Not being sufficiently clothed to stand the zero weather in his car, he wrapped himself in the seat covers and started walking to Stratford. He had traveled the distance between two highline poles when he fell against the car of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Keener.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Keener, basketball fans here for the game Tuesday night, received Arlyn in their car where has was to take up their methods of keeping warm through vigorous exercise. Haile and Keener suffered only minor frostbite while Mrs. Keener suffered temporary shock.

C. E. Willmon, traveling the same road stalled his car Tuesday night, and immediately got out and walked through the blizzard to his home without being able to see the stalled cars nearby.

Carl Craig, returning home from Texhoma, ran out of gasoline Tuesday night near the Roy Schafer home. He was warmly dressed, remained in his car during the night, and walked to the Schafer home Wednesday morning suffering few ill effects from the experience.

Mr. and Mrs. Sam Lasley, Jr., and baby, were rescued from their partially buried car Thursday morning by Edgar Hurtt, Jr., who drove to the scene of the stalled car on a tractor. The extent of their sufferings from the exposure is not known.

Mr. and Mrs. Meritt Green, in anxiety over the safety of their children, dressed warmly, filled their car with quilts and blankets, and left their country home to drive to Stratford Tuesday night during the blizzard. Their attempt to reach Stratford was discouraged when they spent some time in a mud hole. They finally backed their car out of this place and turned around to return home when their car stalled. They kept warm by whittling up a fence post and burning it in a scoop they had in the car.

Pruett Adkins and son, Billy Bob Adkins, anxious over the safety of Viola Adkins, drove southeast into the blizzard Tuesday night. They had gone but a short distance when their car was stalled and they walked back to Stratford.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Bullington and Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Hunt, hearing the radio wailing of an approaching storm, left their country home in a hurried trip to Sunray Tuesday evening to secure a supply of groceries for the expected winter siege. They left Sunray at 6:00 P. M. and met the storm while driving on the pavement 5 miles north of Sunray. As they neared the canyon the blinding snow storm rolled in. They continued their hazardous journey on the highway until they were almost to the country road which would take them to their home only 2 miles away. They saw lights only a short distance ahead. It was the stalled car of Bill Gist, Texhoma, who was preparing to leave his car to walk to the Jim Gorman home 1-2 miles north. He changed his mind and cast his luck with the Bullingtons and the Hunts. The Bullington car had gone about 100 feet when they struck a high drift, backed out and changed their course across a field, when the engine stalled. They had no heavy clothing and only one thin blanket and 3 yards of 36 inch canvas. The men's shoes were full of snow and Hunt and Gist did not have coats. The snow kept sifting in, filling the front of the Ford sedan. Tuesday night they exercised and sang songs to keep awake, at times praying. Wednesday at noon Bullington and Hunt left the car to walk into the blizzard to the Bullington home for a tractor to pull the car and its occupants to safety. They had gone but a short distance when Hunt became fatigued, and Bullington returned with him to the car, with faces frozen and Hunt's feet in bad condition. Hunt's feet were wrapped in paper towels and a roll of wax paper was burned for warmth. Wednesday and Wednesday night their vigil with the gale was continued. It was noon Thursday before they were able to force open the frozen doors of the car and walk two miles for a tractor. Pans of cold kerosene were used to soak frozen feet. Only sore and discolored flesh remained as evidence of

Mattie Lou Newman and Tommie Baskin spent Tuesday night stalled in a pick-up about 100 yards from the Roscoe Dyess home. They attended the ball game in Stratford Tuesday night and Tommie was taking Miss Newman home but lacked a distance of 1 mile west and 4 miles south of making the trip. The heater in the vehicle worked all night however, as the engine was started periodically and run for 20 minute intervals. At 9:00 A. M. Wednesday they left the pick-up and ventured out in the storm to walk to a house on the Pronger ranch for shelter, leaving a note on the steering wheel that they had walked south.

Dyess noticed the pick-up for the first time Thursday morning and drove to the scene on a tractor. Worried, he opened a door of the vehicle and found the note left by the young people. Before he left the scene P. J. Pronger, Jr., drove Baskin to the pick-up. Bud Coffman spent 7 hours of Tuesday night in the blizzard when his car stalled. He was taking home a supply of freshly cleaned clothes and put on four sets of clothing to keep warm. Paul Auddell picked him up in his car. Bud excitedly left his car with the motor running and the lights burning.

Robert O. Reynolds, received treatment in an Amarillo hospital and is now with his family in the home of his father-in-law, Booker Toon, in Wheeler where he will be confined for several weeks before he returns to work on the Pronger Bros. ranch.

Mr. and Mrs. Pearl M. Dixon and son, Perry, 14, spent 36 hours in their stalled car during the blizzard.

The Dixons live 12 miles northwest of Morse. They had attended a parent-teacher association meeting and were 8 miles from Morse when their car stalled in a snowdrift. They ran the motor to keep warm until the foot-feed froze and the motor died.

Mr. Dixon had several boxes of matches in the car and several papers and magazines were burned at intervals to keep them warm. They managed to get home Friday.

Livestock loss reported has been small in consideration of the scope of the storm. According to available reports Harry Sears lost 19 pigs from a brood of 24, thought to have smothered in a small shed covered with snow. Dick Diehl lost 16 head of cattle and Bill Lasley lost 3 calves. Coy Holt is reported to have lost 150 head of cattle and Stavlo Bros. 59 head, Ernest Baskin aid today.

Change Of Venue Granted In Assault Case

Dust Storm Dangers Fade For This Season

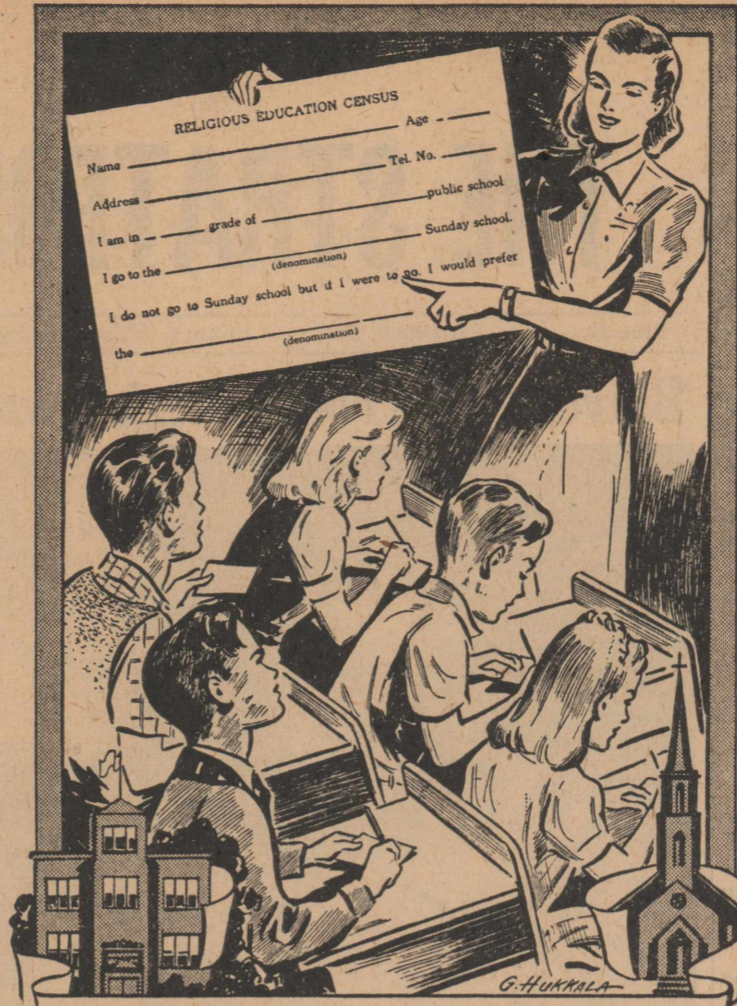
Peck believes conditions this year, with more than 20 inches of snowfall during the past 30 days, are much more favorable than was the case during February of 1947. Although most of the wheat got off to a late start due to dry conditions last fall, resulting in little or no wheat pasture Peck is optimistic about the current crop. The snow will provide not only the needed moisture but also a blanket to prevent damage through freezing.

Motorists See Yellow Lines On Highways

AUSTIN.—Officials of the Texas Highway Department tell the story about the bright yellow lines now being seen by motorists every day throughout the vast 27,000 mile system of paved highways.

"The new yellow no-passing line being put down on our highways is a double indemnity device," State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer declared.

"It gives a flashy and obvious warning of danger to the motor-

ist who wants to protect his own life and the lives of others," he explained, "and it gives the police something definite on which to jail or punish the driver who apparently cares little for his life and thereby endangers the lives of innocent motorists in the other lane."

Last year President Truman's Highway Safety Conference urged the States to concentrate on improvement of highway center strip in a major attempt to reduce the ghastly toll of accidents due to head-on collisions and sideswiping.

In all States the color was changed to yellow, which tests have shown is more visible in all kinds of weather than any other type of marking. This yellow color is used also to impress the motorist that where yellow is seen on the road it must not be crossed.

65,000 gallons of yellow paint are being used by the Texas Department's painting crews to mark these no-passing zones. The painting operations have been under way since November and are now moving rapidly toward completion.

Highway Department officials pointed out the state wide yellow striping program for no-passing zones is considered the best method from the engineering point of view for temporarily combating the traffic accident menace on the highway system.

The officials are hopeful the traveling public will soon become "yellow line conscious," since crossing the yellow line is not only an invitation for loss of life and limb, but is a violation of Texas law under the new uniform traffic code making violators liable for a maximum fine of \$200.

"Do not cross the yellow line," is the new password to safer driving.

Cold Weather Brings Carbon Monoxide Danger

To minimize the danger of carbon monoxide poisoning during winter weather, motorists and commercial drivers are urged by Dr. George W. Cox, to check up now on the exhaust systems of their automobiles for defective connections and leaks.

He said that "warming up" a car in a close garage is the greatest cause of carbon monox-

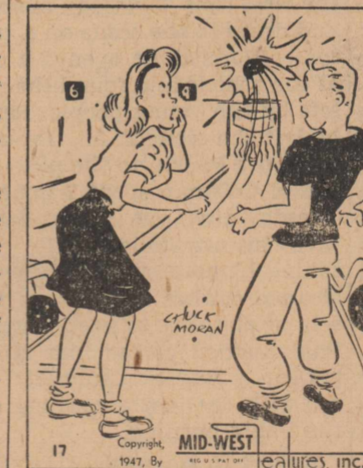
ide deaths. Leaks from manifold connections, cracked manifolds, defective mufflers, leaks from loose muffler connections and leaks from hot air heater connections are potential sources for release of carbon monoxide and should be checked.

"Pay particular attention to those items and remember that proper carburetor adjustment causes minimum production of carbon monoxide and that the highest proportion of this gas is produced by an idling motor.

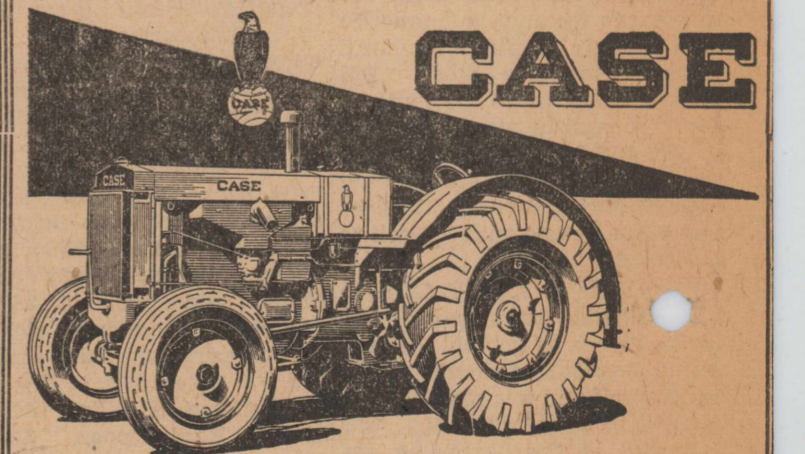

Texas A. & M. Scholarships Available

Any boy graduating from Stratford or Gruver high schools this year with a good scholastic record and need of financial assistance, will have a chance to win his own college education in a competition being conducted by Texas A. & M. College. Notice of the 1948 competition, with entry blanks for Stratford and Gruver boys who want to compete, were mailed to the principals of those high schools by R. G. Perryman, secretary of the Texas A. & M. College scholarships committee.

Filling the need of giving every outstanding Texas boy a chance to earn his own college education, in spite of possible financial handicaps, the "Texas A. & M. Opportunity Awards" program is now in its third year. It offers boys graduating from Texas high schools each year a chance to compete for four-year college scholarships paying \$200 to \$300 per year, plus an assurance of student jobs sufficient to earn other necessary expenses.

Sixteen Texas boys who would not have been able to enter any college were given their chance in 1946, thirty more in 1947. Their records in college have been excellent. This year's announcement folder lists twenty-eight separate scholarships, with the probability of more being made available before the close of the contest.

Scholarship, character, evidence of leadership and need of assistance are the points on which final winners are selected by a college committee. Application blanks, now in the hands of local high school principals, must be filled out by the boys and returned to the college by March 15. From these applications, finalists will be selected to enter a competitive examination to be held at the college May 1 and 2. Winners will be named on the basis of this examination.

Provided by gifts of thousands of former students of A & M, with additional individual scholarships donated by leading Texas citizens and institutions, the Opportunity Awards give outstanding boys the chance in life which the sponsors believe they deserve. With the cash scholarship, an outstanding boy can earn enough money to complete his college expenses, and still be able to do

excellent college work. The winner is required to maintain a personal and scholastic record satisfactory to the scholarships committee in order to hold his scholarship from year to year.

Ten of the awards each year are financed by gifts of former students of the college, seven by gifts of Mr. and Mrs. Jesses H. Jones of Houston, two by gifts of Clint W. Murchison of Dallas and two by the Will Rogers Memorial fund. Single awards are from gifts of Wofford Cain of Dallas, the James Robert Austin Memorial fund, the Albert Banta bequest, the Ruby Korth Memorial fund, the Julia Ball Lee Memorial fund, the Cornelia Cooke Smith bequest, and Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Burns of Brownsville.

Farm-to-Market Road Program Is Threatened

"Federal aid for our highways will come to an end this year unless congressional action is tak-

en," R. J. Potts, president of the Texas Good Roads Association, said this week.

Specifically, the association president requested backing for House Resolution 4867, which he said would project Federal Aid indefinitely into the future.

The resolution was introduced in the House of Representatives by Paul Cunningham of Iowa, chairman of the subcommittee on Roads of the Public Works Committee.

The resolution proposes \$500,000,000 per year for Federal Highway aid. The formula and allocations are the same as those in the Act of 1944 which provided road building funds for the ensuing three years.

Under the existing formula, there has been available in Texas for the current three year period, \$60,000,000 in State and federal funds for secondary or farm-to-market roads.

"The Texas Highway Department was so forehanded as to build up a substantial backlog of savings during the war years which was used to match these federal funds," Potts said. He added, "In 1947 contracts award-

ed passed the \$70,000,000 mark bringing the grand total for the postwar period of \$143,098,395 for building or improving 7,621 miles of state highways. At the end of the year 1947 the department was maintaining 3,751 miles of farm-to-market roads and an additional 1,360 miles were under construction with funds earmarked to bring the state system up to 7,500 miles of farm-to-market roads during 1948.

"This bill again will insure an orderly long term planning program. It will bring farm homes generally nearer to all-weather roads.

The story of how the old-time 101 outfit of No Man's Land pioneered one of the most significant economic movements in the Southwestern range business.

It is an almost forgotten fact that the real range significance of the 101 Brand had nothing whatever to do with the 101 Ranch Show. The 101 Brand that the Plains nurtured and knew was a genuine open range outfit. And in its life span on the Cimarron, in No Man's Land, it encompassed an epoch in Western history and pioneered one of the most significant economic movements in the Southwestern range business.

The story of its land reaches back to the days when it was bisected by the Cimarron Cut-Off of the Santa Fe Trail, to when it was nothing but an outlaws' holdout in No Man's Land, to when it first felt the gentle intrusion of Mexican sheepmen in the middle 1870's and to when its brand was adopted by Texans a little later.

To begin with, English financial interests rooted in London—then the money market of the world—formed the Western Land and Cattle Company, bought a ranch of 32,000 acres in the Flint Hills of Kansas, and converted it, in the

casual manner of cultivated folks, into a sort of Western retreat for English gentlemen. In 1881 the Company bought the 101 Brand—"range rights and book count," lock, stock and barrel. But continued enjoyment of leisurely life is dependent on profitable return from capital investment and when the 101 showed up far short on its book count, ranching turned into a serious business for the Western Land and Cattle Company.

Still with strong reserves its owners hoped to prosper. Their 101 herd of some 40,000 cattle grazed its ample range from the western end of the Oklahoma Pan-

handle down through the Cimarron sand hills for nearly fifty miles. The succulent significance of the summer range in Kansas had been known for years, since the days of the Texas Trail. The Flint Hills put a quick finish on cattle grown to virtual maturity in the cow country. And so with an eye for money, the 101 annually gathered its steers in No Man's Land, trailed them to Las Animas, shipped them to its ranch on Diamond Creek twelve miles north of Strong City and sold them as fat beef on the Kansas City Yards before grass withered in the fall.

But the long drought and deflation of the 1880's followed and the Western sold the 101 Brand in 1889. The new owners continued the old practice and began taking in thousands of Texas cattle shipped to Kansas for summer pasturage besides. And the movement from the Southwestern breeding grounds for fattening on the Flint Hills grass definitely got underway. Then the Rock Island Railway built through No Man's Land, farming settlers followed, and fragmentation of the 101 holdings came with men who gambled a living upon the probings of a plow. The 101 Ranch moved from its

original location four miles southwest of Kenton, Oklahoma, to leased land four miles down the Rito Blanco from Dalhart and in 1897 became the 101 Cattle Company of Texas. It was dissolved in 1904 and in less than thirty years its course was run.

Towns have grown up over its spacious range and it is all but forgotten. The seasonal movement of beef to the Flint Hills of Kansas is now a tremendous economic venture, though never associated with the 101 Brand.

The most important feature of its entire history was its part in pointing the way to systematic and profitable use of the summer ranges of Kansas, and a great seasonal movement now made by fleets of trucks and trains of stock cars—a genuine range economy pioneered in part by the ingenious handling of the 101 Brand.

The story of a clash of cultures, of conquest of grass lands, of loss of earned and saved money, called venture capital, of inflation in values and deflation to failure, of unfortunate conversion to agriculture as a prelude to dust—the whole story is wrapped up in the hide of the 101 outfit.

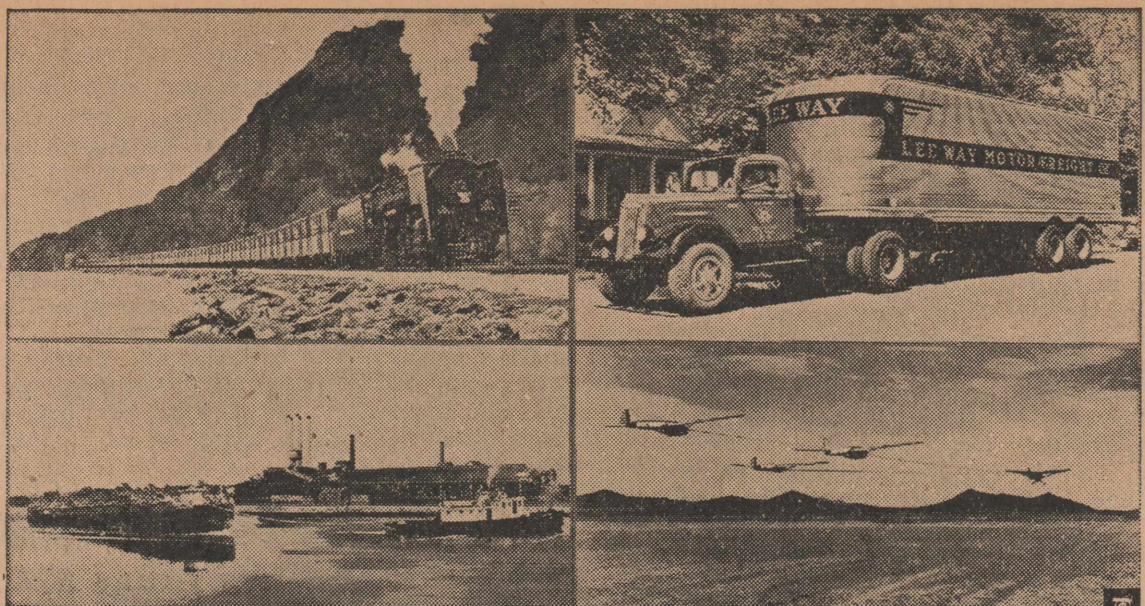

orable situation for the development of stem rust on late wheat if the spores develop sufficiently on the early planted wheat.

Nothing can be done about the weather, of course, but the situation can be greatly aggravated by the planting of stem rust susceptible varieties of spring wheat and barley, the specialists say, as such varieties would make prolific sources of stem rust spores, which in turn might affect wheat farther north, as none of the hard red winter wheat varieties are immune to stem rust.

Agronomists recommend the planting of oats in place of spring wheat or barley. They say the yields of spring planted oats are much more certain in Texas than either spring wheat or barley and stem rust of oats does not affect wheat. Varieties of oats such as Fultex, Kanota, New Nortex, or Ferguson 922 are good selections.

Blueprints For New Homes Are Available

"An attractive home of sound construction need not be a luxury for farm and ranch families. No matter how small and unpretentious the home will be, plans for it can include good taste and sound construction. It will pay off in satisfaction for years to come."

That's a statement recently made by William S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer, buildings for Texas A. & M.

He went on to list five items that go to make up good construction. First, he said, plan an adequate foundation, protected against frost or freezing, of a lasting material, and make it termite resistant.

Wheat Rust Threatens '48 Crop

The stage is all set for a severe epidemic of stem rust, or black rust, in the wheat country next spring.

That's the warning from the agronomists and plant pathologists of Texas A. & M. College and USDA's Bureau of Plant Industry.

It all depends on the principal actors, the rust spores and the right weather. The combination of wheat germinating so late on the High Plains, together with the large acreage of earlier wheat in the rolling plains areas east of the Caprock, makes a favorable

CARNEGIE HERO-FUND MEDALS

These gifts of Mr. Carnegie are for the financial support of those incapacitated for work, either temporarily or permanently, in heroic attempts to save human life, and for the aid of widows and orphans of heroes. Medals of three classes are given. The original fund of \$5,000,000 set aside in 1904 for the United States, Canada, and Newfoundland has been supplemented by similar gifts for Great Britain and Ireland, France, Germany, Switzerland, Belgium, Netherlands, Sweden, Norway, Italy, and Denmark. Military bravery is not recognized.

The Carnegie medal bears the likeness of Andrew Carnegie on one side and a panel designed for the inscription of the name of the person honored is on the

other.

Carnegie History

Andrew Carnegie, (1835-1919), a famous and very practical philanthropist, an American of Scotch birth. His gifts to the public have exceeded in amount those of any other man in the history of the world. From Dunfermline, where he was born on November 25, 1835, he emigrated to the United States at the age of thirteen. In his first position, that of weaver's assistant in a cotton factory at Allegheny, Pa., he earned about a dollar a week, but twenty years later his industry and ability had made him a wealthy man. As a messenger boy in a Pittsburgh telegraph office he had learned telegraphy, and after becoming an operator advanced rapidly to the rank of division superintendent for the Pennsylvania Railroad. 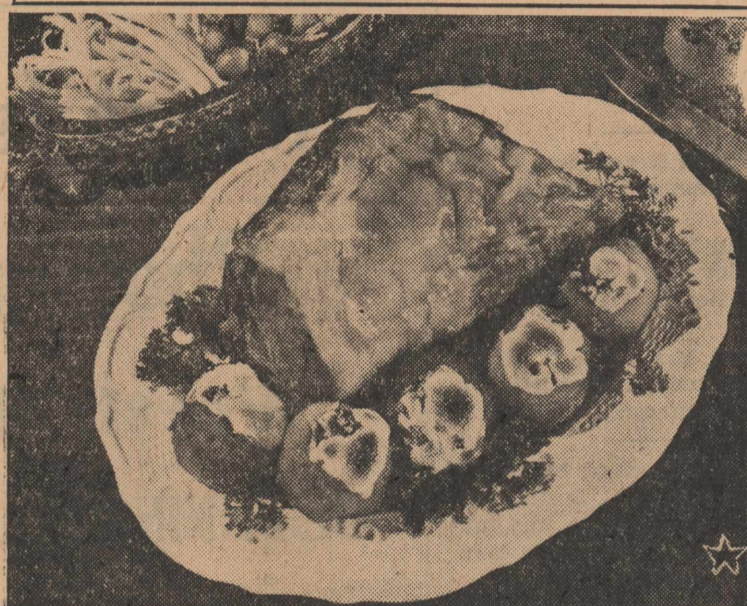

friendship with the inventor he had entered the organization of the Woodruff Sleeping Car Company, the most successful fore-runner of the Pullman Company, and had made a moderate fortune. By cautious investment in Pennsylvania oil lands he increased his wealth enormously. After the War of Secession he entered the iron business, and soon became one of the industrial leaders of America.

In 1868 he introduced the Bessemer process into the American steel industry. The great steel works which he established at Homestead, Pa., and elsewhere, grew rapidly, and in 1899 he consolidated all his interests in the Carnegie Steel Company, one of the greatest industrial institutions of America. When in 1901 it was merged with the United States Steel Corporation he retired from business with a fortune estimated at a half-billion dollars. He then gave himself largely to philanthropy.

In 1912 Mr. Carnegie announced that with the gift of \$125,000,000 to a corporation which will carry out those of his philanthropic schemes which he had not already endowed, his personal fortune was reduced to \$25,000,000. He wished to die a poor man, but at death was worth \$22,152,011, as officially reported by the New York inheritance tax office.

The scope of his public spirit has been world-wide. Besides the fine institutions which receive special attention below, his gifts include \$11,000,000 to the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh; \$10,000,000 to Scotch universities, including Saint Andrews and Aberdeen for both of which he has been lord rector; \$5,000,000 as a benefit fund for employees of the Carnegie Steel Company; a \$2,500,000 trust for Dunfermline, his native town; \$2,000,000 to the Carnegie Church Peace town; \$2,000,000 to the Carnegie Church Peace Union, which aims to enlist all churches on behalf of permanent peace; \$1,750,000 for the Peace Palace at The Hague; and \$850,000 for the grounds and buildings of the Pan-American Union at Washington.

As a writer he has expressed himself vigorously in denunciation of war, and his works, The Gospel of Wealth, The Empire of Business and Problems of to-day, have had international reading. He was made a Commander of the Legion of Honor of France in 1907, and in 1911 received the peace medal of the Fourth International Congress of American States.

Diver Loses Life Setting Record for Depth Reached

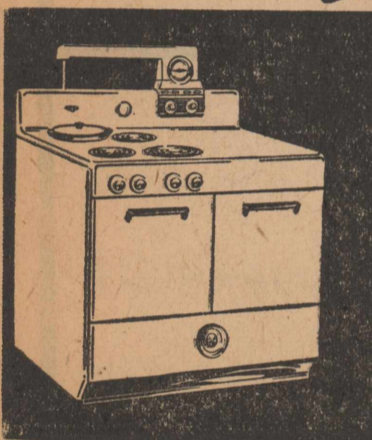

Colleagues pulled Fargeus out unconscious after he had succeeded in breaking the previous mark of 295.2 feet attained by seven divers here last June.

Fargeus went over the side dressed only in bathing trunks and wearing a face mask connected with an oxygen bottle on his back. His position was indicated by pre-arranged tug signals.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Solid South Threatens Party Split; Government Eyes Self Ration Plan; Congress Sets Tentative Budget Cut

(EDITOR'S NOTE: When opinions are expressed in these columns, they are those of Western Newspaper Union's news analysts and not necessarily of this newspaper.)

CIVIL RIGHTS: 10 Points

President Truman, who seems to run to 10-point programs, tossed another one to congress—concerning the preservation and protection of civil rights—and then stood aside to await the explosion.

It came quickly. Southern Democrats, hopping mad over at least four of the 10 controversial points, began to talk seriously of calling a Dixie convention to split away from Mr. Truman on the civil rights issue.

Focus of the current disunity was a bill, up for approval by the senate labor committee, to create a national commission against job discrimination on grounds of race, creed or color.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender (Dem., La.) predicted that if the bill were approved in its present form the party would erupt into open warfare. Both foes and backers of the measure agreed that it would be a state poll taxes.

The four proposals that most inflamed the southerners were the ones calling for (1) a federal anti-lynching law, (2) a permanent fair employment practice commission, (3) an end to Jim Crow rules in transportation and (4) outlawing of state poll taxes.

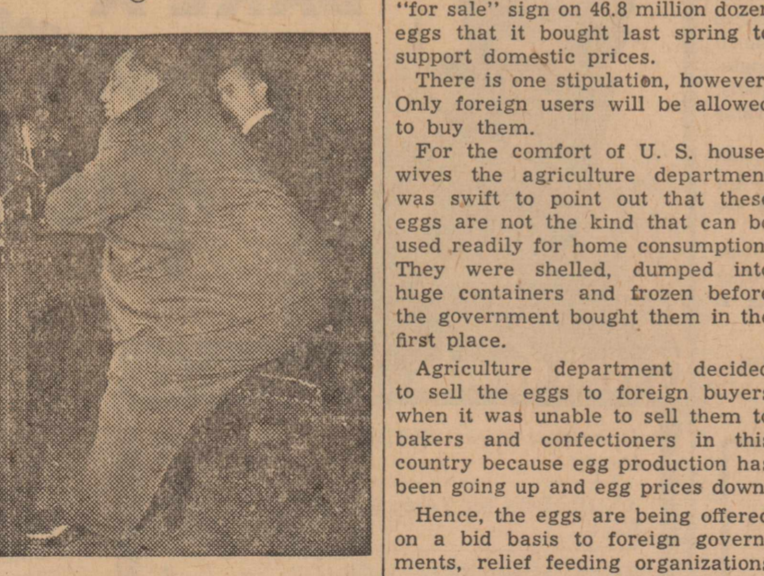
Remainder of the points advocated by the President were: A permanent commission on civil rights, a joint congressional committee on civil rights, a civil rights division in the justice department; tightening of civil rights statutes; home rule for the District of Columbia; statehood for Alaska and Hawaii; equalization of naturalization opportunities, and settlement of evacuation claims of Japanese-Americans.

Because 1948 is an election year, and a presidential election year at that, the program, which otherwise might be ignored, was certain to get hot partisan debate.

In answer to Mr. Truman's firm statement that "something must be done" about the civil rights issue, southern Democrats replied that they were thinking of calling an all-southern convention to pick its own presidential candidate.

Some thought that too drastic a step, but at Jackson, Miss., Walter Sillers, speaker of the Mississippi house of representatives, said he flatly favored such a course in order to withhold at least part of the South's electoral votes from Mr. Truman.

Big Dealer



One of the biggest men to come before a congressional investigating committee was Isadore Ginsberg, New York lumber dealer, who referred to rep. Joseph R. McCarthy (Rep., Wis.) of a joint congressional housing committee the names of 98 retailers from whom he purchased gypsum lath. McCarthy angrily called him a "gray marketer" and cited him for contempt of congress.

SELF RATIONING: Second Best

Manifestly stymied in its efforts to get congress to pass rationing and price control legislation, the administration tried a new approach in the form of an appeal for nationwide self-rationing.

Greater public support of an intensified drive for voluntary food conservation would have to be developed if living costs are to be curbed, the administration decided.

As an initial step representatives of 18 consumer, producer and distributor groups met with Clinton Anderson, secretary of agriculture,

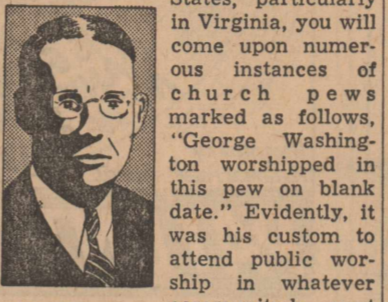

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
By LOUIE D. NEWTON, D. D.

SCRIPTURE: Acts 2:37-47; Ephesians 4:1-6.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Ephesians 4:1-6, 11-13.

Christian Fellowship
Lesson for February 22, 1948

GEORGE WASHINGTON was a splendid example of Christian fellowship. If you will travel through the older portion of the United States, particularly in Virginia, you will come upon numerous instances of church pews marked as follows, "George Washington worshipped in this pew on blank date." Evidently, it was his custom to attend public worship in whatever community he spent the Lord's day.



Thus he entered into Christian fellowship, gaining a blessing and rendering a blessing.

The lesson passage for Sunday is found in Acts 2:37-47 and Ephesians 4:1-6, with several other passages which will be quoted before we finish the column for this week.

A HAPPY TIME IN CHURCH

READ Acts 2:41-47, and you will find a picture of a group of very happy people. Think of it, three thousand people professing faith in Jesus and receiving baptism in one day! But read on—they were not only happy at church, but they were happy because they were in the church. They continued steadfastly in the apostles' teachings and fellowship and breaking of bread and prayer.

They praised God and had favor with all the people. By their daily living they were convincing the world that fellowship in Christ is not only good on Sunday while we are at the meeting house, but good every day.

The happy homes are the homes where Christian fellowship abounds, and it is equally true in every area of life.

AT CHURCH WITH FRIENDS

"I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go unto the house of the Lord," Psalm 122:1.

That is poetry, you will agree, but it is also actual testimony not only of the Psalmist, but of countless junior boys and girls throughout our land who eagerly await the sound of the church bells. Boys and girls delight to go to Sunday school and worship when the life of the church is pervaded with Christian fellowship. There they meet the finest boys and girls in the community.

BELONGING TO THE CHURCH

THE passage in Acts 2:37-47 tells us how certain people, after hearing the great sermon by Peter, asked how they might be saved. He told them:

"Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

When we invite intermediate friends to attend Sunday school and worship services with us, and they come to know of the love of God, they, too, will want to be saved. It is then the high privilege of Christian boys and girls to lead their friends to accept Jesus Christ as Saviour, and come into the church.

ALL ONE IN CHRIST

THE above passage from Ephesians teaches clearly that there is a brotherhood of man, real and abiding, when we accept the Fatherhood of God, through Jesus Christ. This is the meaning of the church. The one adequate solvent for the crying needs of this frightened world is the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ. Just as thousands were saved on Pentecost and again on the Lord's Day when Peter preached in Solomon's porch, so today many may be saved where the Gospel is proclaimed in its simplicity and power.

We are one in Christ, of every race and every tongue. The fellowship of Christian faith transcends every barrier—racial, economic, geographic, political, religious. We have but to proclaim the universality of this good news—proclaim it in our words and proclaim it in our daily lives.

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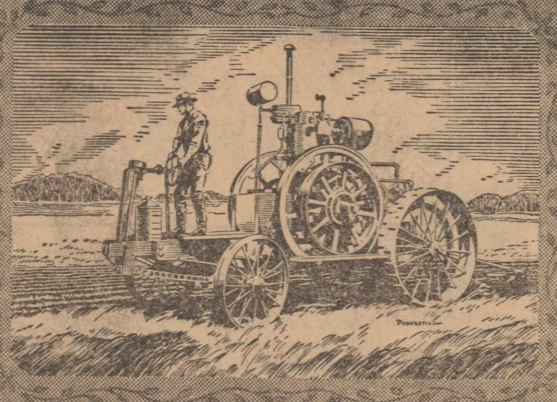

**Veteran 'Bails Out'
Under Flood of Oil**

**Gusher Threatens to Break, Not
Enrich Owner.**

NEWPORT BEACH, CALIF.—Bucket in hand, William Tallman bailed furiously to keep 350 barrels of oil a day from flooding his house. That's all he can do about the oil well which gushed up in his backyard. Instead of bringing him riches, it threatens to bankrupt him. He can't pump, drill, collect or store the oil. A Newport Beach city ordinance says so. He can't cap the well, as the city suggests; he doesn't have the \$2,000 to pay for the job.

He can't let it flow down the street; the city gets mad. He can't divert it into his neighbors' back yards; the neighbors get mad. His own yard is saturated. "Every time I step out of the door I sink up to my knees in a couple of thousand dollars' worth of oil," he said.

The World War II veteran brought his blonde bride to the bayside cottage last summer. Everybody had forgotten about the old well there, capped 15 years ago when oil was only 25 cents a barrel.

One night they heard a burping noise in the back yard. Tallman ran out and waded into thick black oil. The next day oil experts told him he had a well that was producing 350 barrels a day, all readily salable. At \$1.40 a barrel, that's \$490 a day.

"And all the mineral rights, darn it, are mine," Tallman said. He hardly had time to estimate his fortune before he was battling with the city council over whether he'd make the fortune or lose it. "Something has to be done," he said. "That black gold is running all over, and I haven't the money to cap it. The city ought to let me drill or else let me cap off this hole so I can stop bailing out."

**Acetylene Torch Frees Man
Trapped in Machine Gadget**

PHILADELPHIA.—A workman caught in the machinery operating a heavy iron door at a waterfront pier was cut loose by acetylene torches in the hands of railroad workmen.

The accident happened while Aaron Gillespie, 42, was repairing the machinery of the door, which is one of the type which rises to the ceiling. While he was on an extension ladder the door began to drop, and the drop operated machinery at its side which clamped upon the left leg of the man. He was torn from the ladder and left hanging head downward.

Stevardores at work on the pier heard his screams and summoned police, who in turn called a fire rescue squad. Lacking tools to release the man, the firemen eased his discomfort by bringing his head above his feet, while Patrolman Leonard Weyed ran two blocks to a place where railroad workmen were repairing a track.

The workmen used their torches to cut away portions of the door machinery and release the man's mangled leg.

Police took him to Pennsylvania hospital where he was treated for a compound fracture of the leg, and placed under observation.

**Retired Octogenarian Vies
With Paul Bunyan Legend**

GEORGETOWN, ILL.—Frank Williams, retired Georgetown coal miner, completed a prodigious task for a man 80 years old.

Five men and a horse last September 30 felled a 60-foot triple-stump elm tree which was a Georgetown landmark. The octogenarian, single-handed and using only hand tools, cut and split the tree into 10 ricks of stove cordwood.

With a pushcart he transported the wood six blocks to his home for winter fuel. He even salvaged the bark.

At the tree base one stump was 36 inches in diameter and the other was a double stump measuring 41 inches through.

**Torch Duel Between Wife
And Husband Ends in Death**

POINT MARION, PA.—Mrs. Harold King, 32, died and her husband, 36, was in critical condition following a quarrel in which they threw kerosene on each other, Coroner Lee R. Herrington reported.

Herrington quoted King, a coal miner, as saying he tried to rescue his wife after she set her fuel-saturated clothing afire.

With King carrying her, they emerged from their home like two blazing torches, but the miner collapsed on the back steps. Burned from head to foot, Mrs. King was found dead on the steps.

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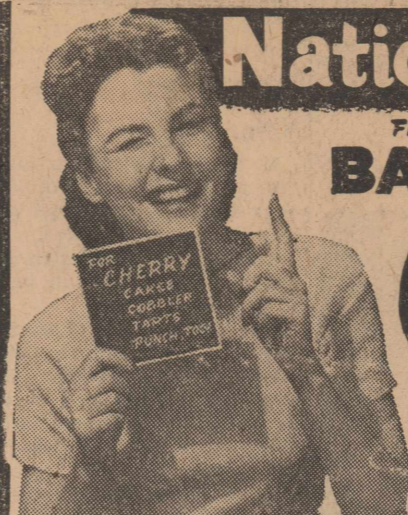
