## Mayor And 3 Aldermen Elected Tuesday

Van B. Boston was elected mayor of Stratford and Cone Donelson, Joe Doby and Eugene Hudson were elected City Aldermen in an election held at the City Hall Tuesday in which 106 votes were cast. Interest taken in the election represented an increase of 75 to 80 votes over those cast in city elections in recent years.

Boston received 59 votes, Kendrick 43, and G. R. Garrison, retiring mayor, received a complimentary vote of 3.

Candidates for the office of Aldermen received the following votes: Cone Donelson, 70; Joe Doby, 56; Eugene Hudson, 60; H. L. McMahan, 43. C. W. Cowdrey, 38; and W. L. Williams 42.

Retiring Aldermen Leo Smith received 2 votes, Leslie Parker 3 votes, and J. R. Pendleton 1 vote.

## Weed Spraying Demonstration Next Tuesday

A weed spraying demonstration of 2,4-D which will be of interest to farmers will be held at the courthouse in Stratford Tuesday afternoon of next week at 3:00 o'clock.

Mounted low pressure equipment will be used which is said to greatly reduce the cost of spraying weeds with high-pressure equipment is that it reduces both the amount of the chemical and the amount of the water used.

Following the low pressure demonstration a plane will be used on a field just east of town to show farmers how 2,4-D for weed control purposes may be sprayed from the air.

If plans are carried out, following the two demonstrations, the crowd will be taken to the grade school auditorium where pictures which will be shown to show the action of 2,4-D as a weed control measure.

Mrs. Russell Kelp was rushed to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo Wednesday afternoon for an emergency appendicitis operation.

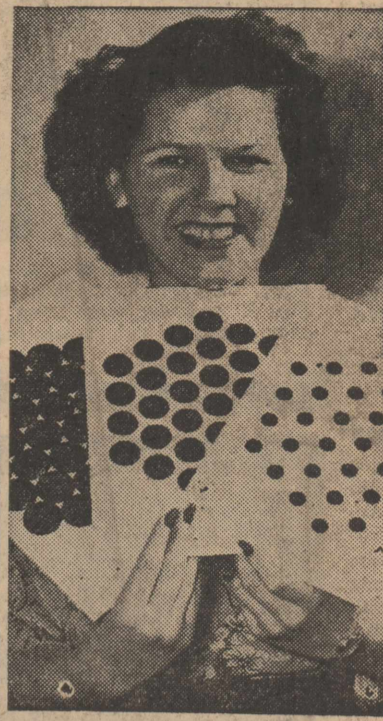
Mrs. Kelp was accompanied on the trip by her husband, her sister, Mrs. Charles Cameron, and Dr. Pearson.

The exhibition is a large and comprehensive panorama of Mr. Leigh's work. In addition to characteristic cowboy and Indian paintings, there will be seventy oils done in Africa by Mr. Leigh when he accompanied Carl Akeley to paint studies for the habitat groups of the Akeley African Hall at the Museum of Natural History and on the Carlisle-Clark Expedition. Also fifty-two black and white drawings, never before exhibited in New York, of African animals and landscapes used in Mr. Leigh's book, "Frontiers of Enchantment," published by Simon & Schuster in 1940.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Bivins "C", is located 2,594 feet from the north line and 2,643 feet from the east line of section 10, Block 2.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1 Bison is located 2,534 feet from the north and east lines of section 26, Block 1-C.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1 Craig "C", is located 2,533 feet from the south line and 2,589 feet from the west line of section 114, Block 1-C.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1 Fowlston is located 2,533 feet from the north line and 2,549 feet from the west line of section 56, Block 1-C.

Test One Well

Railroad Commission tests of the Bayou Oil Company No. 1 Wickline in section 19, Block 2-T, drilled to a depth of 3,450 feet, show it produced pay from 3,063 to total depth. It was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid and produced 11.7 million cubic feet of gas with a rock pressure of 427 pounds.

## 1,294 License Tags Sold In Sherman County

Motor vehicles registered in Sherman County have climbed to 1,294 according to an audit of the records of Sheriff John Kidwell's office this week.

Of the tags issued previous to the deadline April 1, 702 were passenger car tags, 114 were commercial tags, and 478 were farm license.

As new cars are registered during the entire year it is impossible to determine the 1948 revenue for the county from this source.

Fees from license tags issued during the 1947 year from April 1, 1947 to March 31, 1948 totaled \$27,193.33.

The anteater is a pet of farmers because it devours destructive white ants and does no harm.

Both of these odd varieties of natural history are occurring in agricultural areas of the United Provinces, according to newspaper reports from there.

Wild elephants, the slaughter of which has been banned for several years, have multiplied greatly.

They are doing so much damage to crops and fences and even attacking villages that the United Provinces government has issued special arms licenses for killing elephants and is planning to hire expert hunters.

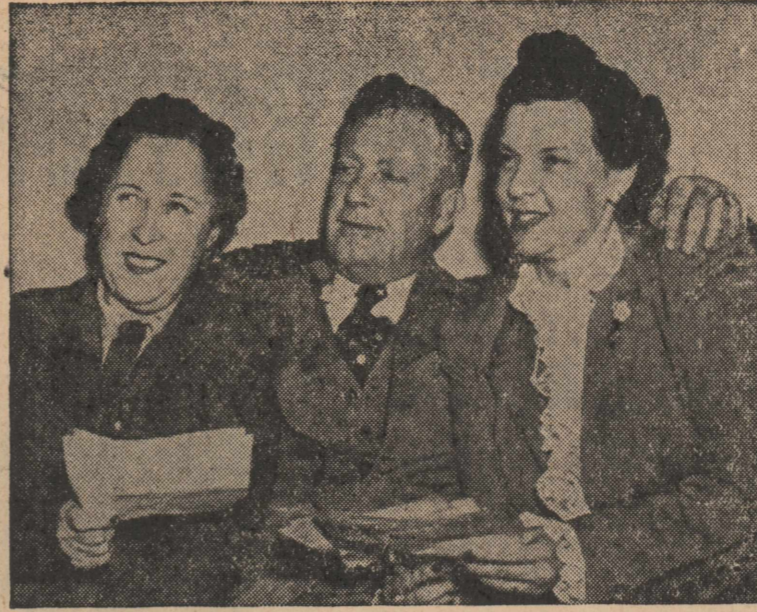
### Retired Minister Reads Complete Bible 50 Times

### 14 Escape Death In Train Slide

None Injured Seriously in Freak Accident.

ALAMOSA, COLO.—In one of the most spectacular railroad accidents in history, three railroad cars were hurled like tiny toys down a mountainside by a roaring snowslide, yet all 14 passengers emerged alive.

None of the dozen passengers and trainmen was injured seriously. One who escaped injury entirely was a 15-month-old boy who fell asleep on his grandfather's shoulder as he was carried to safety.

A 19-year-old nurse suffered frost-bitten feet as she scrambled, minus stockings and shoes, up the frozen slope in the yellow light of trainmen's lanterns.

The train, on the narrow gauge Denver and Rio Grande Western line between Alamosa and Durango, was climbing toward Cumbres pass when the slide struck.

The torrent of snow, 100 feet wide, smashed into the last three cars. They were swept down the slope for distances of 30 to 500 feet. Cushioned by the packed snow, they did not overturn.

The nurse, Mary Martinez, of Park View, N. M., said, "We hit a large tree and the car splintered. Our car was at a steep angle and I am sure we would have gone on down the slope if that tree hadn't stopped us."

The wreck occurred at a 9,000-foot altitude 50 miles southwest of Alamosa in sub-zero weather.

Trainmen lighted flares and lanterns beside the tracks and tossed a rope down to the passengers scrambling in the snow.

Miss Martinez, a nurse at the Denver Children's hospital, did what she could for the injured, but had no first aid equipment.

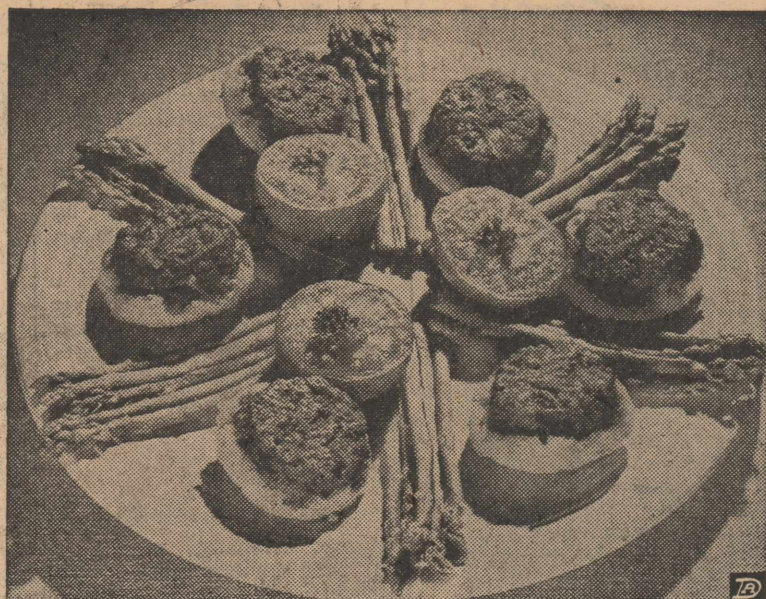

Economy in meal planning means attention to small details—like using leftovers, purchasing of seasonal foods, getting the most for your money whenever a food item is added to the market basket. This menu has been planned to help you make a good start on the spring budget—and still please the family with food that looks and tastes good.

Two-In-One biscuits make excellent use of a cup or so of left-over meat or of fresh ground meat, always less expensive because it does not need to be tender. Enriched flour in the biscuits gives more for your money because it contains added B-vitamins and iron at no additional cost.

Tomatoes and asparagus are foods that spring makes inexpensive, yet they provide just the right color touch.

A saving in time is accomplished by using the oven for the entire menu. Yes, asparagus and tomatoes can be baked, and you'll find that color is retained when a moderately hot oven is used. Place the asparagus in a flat, shallow pan with just enough water to cover the bottom of the pan. Season to taste and bake uncovered until tender, turning the spears just once. The tomatoes are cut in half, brushed with melted butter or margarine and heated until they bubble.

**Two-In-One Biscuits**

- 1 cup sifted enriched flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 to 2 tablespoons shortening
- 2/3 cup milk
- 1 1/2 cups ground meat (may be either cooked or uncooked)
- Salt and pepper to taste.

Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Cut or rub in shortening. Add milk to make a very soft batter. Fill greased muffin pans one-third full with seasoned meat. Pour batter on top of meat, filling pan two-

thirds full. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes. Remove from pans. Turn upside down and serve with grilled tomatoes.

Yield: Six three-inch biscuits.

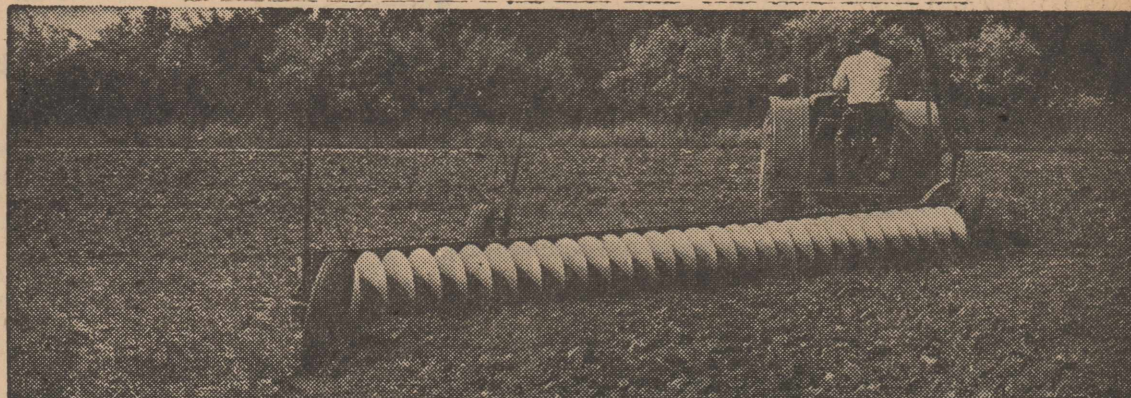

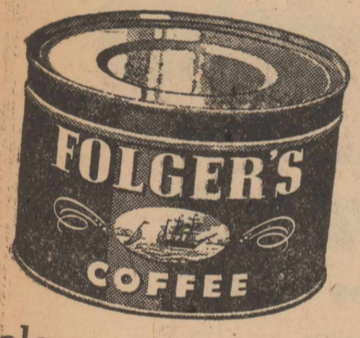

Irons said the girl declared in an oral statement: "A long dispute over the dance culminated in blows between the girl and the mother in the basement of their home."

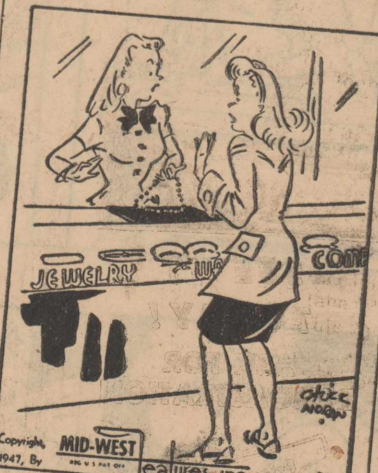
During the bloody duel, the mother struck the girl with a lead pipe. The girl wielded a beer bottle in defense.

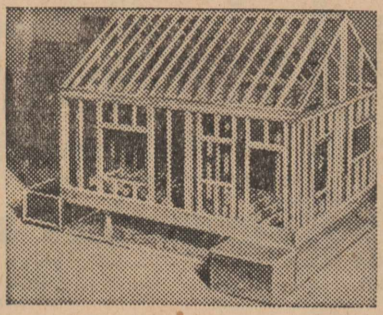


### New Device Controls 'Cancer' of Buildings Pipes Enable Chemical To Reach Termites

Termites, the "cancer" of buildings, now can be controlled. Through all the ages the tiny insect that feasts on wood in homes, farm buildings and other structures has been a constant destroyer. Annual property losses run far into the millions.

Ordinary control measures could not get at the intricate tunnels hidden away in difficult and impossible to reach places.

A new device, hailed as an effective means of combating the destructive pest, was demonstrated at the annual convention of the National Association of Home Builders in Chicago by W. B. Hill of Memphis, Tenn., nationally known as a termite expert.



In this novel display, a colony of termites is feasting on the framework in a model home structure. It provides dramatic proof of the destructive ability of the tiny insects.

Hill, who has spent 20 years figuring ways of waging war on the termite, also has devised a display showing live termites at work. Enclosed in glass, his small scale model home has an army of hungry termites actually at work constructing their intricate network of mud tunnels or shelter tubes. It shows the worker, the soldier on guard and the immature, young potential queen who swarms in the spring.

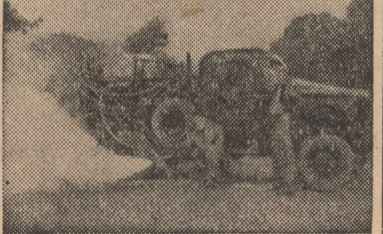
### Beware the 'New Look,' Crop Specialist Advises

Beware the "new look," especially in crop varieties. That is the advice of Joe Robinson, Iowa State college agronomist.

"New varieties seem to hold some sort of magic charm over many farmers," stated Robinson. "I am happy to see the farmer change to new varieties whenever they can increase his yield but just because a variety carries a new name is no indication of its value."

Robinson pointed out that performance records are more important than newness.

Selection of suitable hybrid corn varieties creates another problem. Unlike other crops, some hybrid corn varieties are produced by only one concern. Eligibility of both the private hybrid lines and the experimental station lines for certification depends on the performance records in a corn yield test.



Mosquito Control  
Use of DDT, 2,4-D and other newly-developed weed killers is aiding efforts for mosquito control. Cost of some of the new insecticides, however, makes their use prohibitive on large mosquito breeding areas. Ditching and other more permanent methods still must be resorted to in those areas.

Sale of poultry and eggs has been accounting for 9 to 12 per cent of the cash farm income in Nebraska, according to figures compiled by J. H. Claybaugh, extension poultryman.

Yearly egg sales have been more than 50 million dollars and as high as 57 million for the past five years. Sales of poultry have averaged more than 20 million, reaching a peak of 27 million.

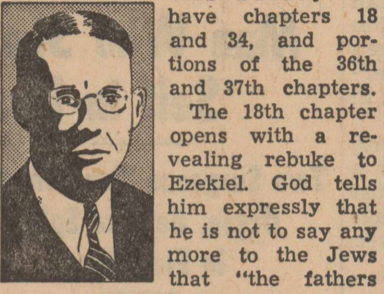

### His Message to Exiles

Lesson for April 11, 1948

CONTINUING the theme of last Sunday's lesson, we go further into the ministry of Ezekiel as God's messenger to a people in exile. For this Sunday we have chapters 18 and 34, and portions of the 36th and 37th chapters.



The 18th chapter opens with a revealing rebuke to Ezekiel. God tells him expressly that he is not to say any more to the Jews that "the fathers have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge. As I live, saith the Lord God, ye shall not have occasion any more to use this proverb in Israel. Behold, all souls are mine." And then God adds, "The soul that sinneth, it shall die."

ALL through these chapters in Sunday's lesson, two solemn truths appear—God's love for his people, manifest in unwearied care; and the responsibility of each soul for the sin which such commits against God.

This truth, or these truths, I should say, are equally applicable for us today. As Ezekiel was sent to remind the people of God's love and care, so must we, early in our youth, accept the responsibility of accepting his love or rejecting his love.

We cannot claim his care if we despise his will. That is the message of Ezekiel for us.

WHAT GOD IS LIKE  
NOWHERE in the Old Testament is the love of God more manifest and compelling than in Ezekiel 34:11-27. I hope that you will open your Bible to this passage. Here the Bible speaks in words that burn with the compassionate love of God for sinful souls.

"I will both search my sheep, and seek them out. As a shepherd seeketh out his flock in the day that he is among his sheep that are scattered; so will I seek out my sheep, and I will deliver them out of all places where they have been scattered in the cloudy and dark day. . . . And I will bring them to their own land, and feed them upon the mountains of Israel by the rivers."

One is reminded here of Jesus, when he said, "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost."

A NEW HEART  
"A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you," Ezekiel 36:26.

Here we have, perhaps, the sublimest sentence in the prophecy of Ezekiel. God is speaking, Ezekiel is merely the messenger—the voice, as John the Baptist delighted to describe himself.

Ezekiel has faithfully declared that each individual is responsible unto God, and just as faithfully he has proclaimed God's love and care, and now he adds the third great truth, namely, that God waits to bestow the new heart and the new spirit to every repentant soul.

A new heart and a new spirit. That is what the Jews needed. That is what the world needs today—a new heart and a new spirit. Only God could give a new heart then, and only God can make such gift today.

EZEKIEL'S MESSAGE FOR US  
WOULD we listen to Ezekiel today? He has the message we need above all other words that may be spoken. He called the Jews to repentance of sin. That is what America needs today. Boys and girls need it. Men and women need it. And just as God waited patiently to bestow the new heart and spirit to Israel in the long ago, so does he wait to grant us today a new heart and a new spirit.

"Our God, our help, in ages past,  
Our Hope for years to come;  
Our shelter from the stormy blast,  
And our eternal home."

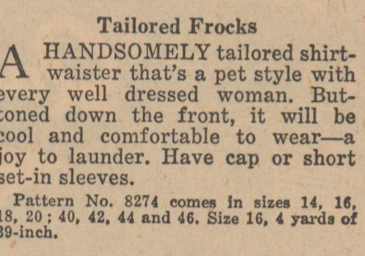

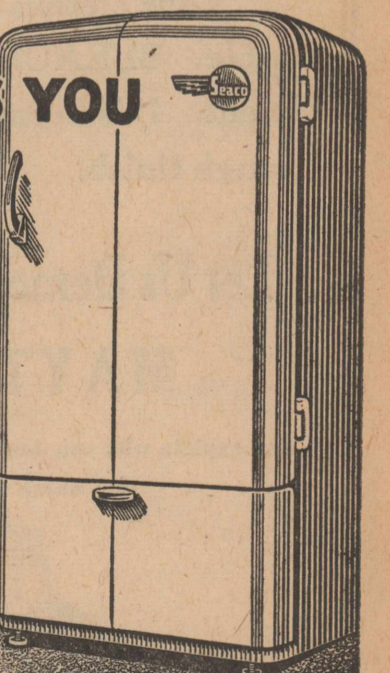

### Doctors Save Man Who Shot Self in Heart

#### Two Surgeons Mend Smashed Organ, Remove Spleen In Five Hours

PHILADELPHIA.—Assisted by a family physician, two young surgeons saved the life of a 24-year-old man who had shot himself through the heart.

The victim, Walter Wood, of Royersford, Pa., held a .32 caliber revolver at a downward angle above his head as he sat on a bed and pulled the trigger.

The bullet smashed through the left ventricle of the heart itself, the pericardium (the sac containing the heart), then obliquely down and through the upper and lower lobes of the left lung, the abdominal wall, the stomach and the spleen. The slug lodged itself in a back muscle.

Wood was removed a short time later, unconscious and suffering from a loss of blood, to Phoenixville hospital by his family physician, Dr. Carl Jameson.

Dr. Jameson immediately got in touch with Dr. Robert E. Brant, of Phoenixville, an associate chief surgeon at the hospital, and the latter summoned Dr. Ralph R. Chershire, another surgeon on the hospital staff.

Because of Wood's condition and necessary preparations, including several blood transfusions, the actual operation could not be started until later.

**Praises Staff.**  
Dr. Brant, who performed the major part of the surgery, spent the next five hours in mending Wood's wounds. He said that Wood was saved "only through the utmost cooperation on the part of the entire hospital staff," as well as Dr. Chershire and Dr. Jameson, who personally assisted him.

While reluctant to take credit for what he had done, Dr. Brant remarked that he had "never seen anything like" the extensive wound that Wood had suffered.

Dr. Brant served 42 months in the navy medical corps during World War II, specializing in thoracic (chest) surgery, and performed surgery on many badly wounded cases while serving in the Pacific area.

Dr. Chershire and Dr. Jameson also saw war service with the army medical corps abroad.

**Bullet Cut Furrow.**  
In discussing the Wood operation, Dr. Brant said the bullet had "cut a deep furrow" in the victim's heart ventricle, and the slug also had opened up "several perforations in the interior of the heart itself."

He said that he had to remove two ribs before suturing of the wounds could be started, and that "sewing up of the heart ventricle was a tricky business, since the heart muscle was jumping about at the rate of 120 pulsations a minute."

After closing the heart wound, he sewed up a hole in the pericardium, two holes in the lung, two holes in the stomach, and then removed the spleen, which had been too badly damaged to be saved.

It was learned that Wood, when brought to the hospital, was in a state of severe shock, and "practically pulseless." It was this poor condition, and the need of blood plasma, that required a delay of several hours before the operation could be started.

One hospital attendant, who had seen a number of severe bullet-wound cases, remarked later that "people with a wound like Wood's ordinarily die within a few minutes."

### 'True Love' Wins Once Again; Clears Up Mistaken Identity

EVANSTON, ILL. — "True love" can accomplish miracles, and it saved Ley McFarland, a waiter, from a case of mistaken identity. Two enterprising Evanston detectives, Robert Labbe and Elmer Dorband, heard on the radio that a man with "true love" tattooed on his fingers was wanted in Kentucky. They stopped for lunch and, when McFarland came up to serve them, they noticed "true love" tattooed on his fingers. The detectives questioned McFarland and arrested him when he told them he came from Woodbine, Ky.

Later, fingerprint records cleared the waiter, and the detectives learned, to their chagrin, they had listened to a radio mystery thriller.
