

Phillips To Build Ten Million Dollar Gasoline Plant In County

The Phillips Petroleum Company will build a 10 million dollar gasoline plant in Sherman County, K. S. Adams, president of the company, announced from his New York office Thursday.

An additional expenditure of four million dollars will be used to connect the companies 260 wells with the plant.

The company plans to drill 550 new wells at an estimated cost of thirty million during the year.

Lynn Allen suffers only a few scar tissues on his chest as a result of his experience in attempting to drink 100 percent sulphuric acid from a coke bottle Wednesday afternoon of last week.

His father was repairing a battery in the rear of the Frozen Food Locker building when young Lynn waddled back to watch him. A coke bottle filled with sulphuric acid was nearby. Lynn had the bottle and had tasted its contents before his screams attracted his father's attention.

Upon medical examination it was found the acid had only penetrated his throat to his tonsils and the soda had neutralized the acid. Although he was unable to swallow solid foods for about three days Lynn seems none the worse except for small tissue scars on his chest.

Ptomaine Poisoning Causes Hysteria

Mrs. H. W. Raymond recovered from a severe attack of ptomaine poisoning Friday to find her friends frantic with anxiety over her condition.

She became deathly sick Thursday evening after eating deer meat which had been off refrigeration for several hours.

Her husband entered the home to find his wife suffering, and upon learning what she had eaten immediately rushed out to seek medical assistance.

John Kimbrel arrived at the radio service shop at this time, and excitedly Raymond informed his friend that his wife was poisoned, asking him to get a doctor.

In the excitement, Kimbrel isn't sure just what he may have said while locating Dr. Pearson, who gave her immediate relief. As the story of the incident spread, Mrs. Raymond feeling none to happy over the whole affair, was confronted by her friends Friday who tongue lashed her for an attempted suicide.

Announce 4 Locations; Test One Well

Sherman County received four of the twenty-one new drilling locations made in the Texas Panhandle this week.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Bivins "G" is located 2,548 feet from the east line and 2,533 feet from the south line of section 34, Block 1-C.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Smith is located 2,310 feet from the north and east lines of section 18, Block 2-B.

Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation No. 6 Flores is located 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of section 59, Block 3-T.

Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation No. 7 Flores, 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of section 61, Block 3-T.

The Magnolia Petroleum Co. No. 1 O'Quin Unit in section 262, Block 1-T, was drilled to a depth of 3,148 feet and plugged back to 3,124. The well produced pay from 2,730 to 2,995 feet. After treatment with 20,000 gallons of acid, the well was completed for a daily production of 15 million cubic feet of gas with 416.3 pounds of rock pressure.

Annual charity service in the five existing hospitals was more than \$325,000 for 15,723 free and part pay patients last year. The hospitals are Hendrick Memorial, Abilene; Baylor University Hospital, Dallas; Valley Baptist Hospital, Harlingen; Memorial Hospital, Houston; Hillcrest Memorial, Waco; and Southeast Texas Baptist Hospital, Beaumont. The hospital at Beaumont is under construction but plans to be in operation soon.

Home Demonstration work is being carried on in 3,107 counties in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, and Porto Rica. There are 2,301 counties which employ one or more home demonstration agents. County and Federal governments contribute to this work. Additional funds have been made available by Congress and 622 additional agents have been added during the last two years.

Sherman County has four adult home demonstration clubs and there is a possibility that others may be organized during the year.

Heavy Majority Supports School Bond Issue

Voters of the Stratford Rural High School District adopted the proposed \$250,000 school building bond issue in the election Saturday by an overwhelming 7 to 1 majority.

207 voters supported the raising of the school tax from \$1.25 to \$1.50 while only 29 voted against it.

205 voters authorized the issuance of \$250,000 in bonds for the purpose of building a new 10 room grammar school building with an auditorium with ample seating capacity and a large school cafeteria while 31 voted against the measure.

Although trustees of the district seem pleased with the confidence placed in them by the voters they feel that the burden of their responsibilities had just begun.

Italian Politics Favor Democracy

The defeat of the Communist-inspired People's Front in Italy was anticipated. What was not anticipated was the extent of Premier De Gasperi's victory. The proportion of Communist votes was substantially less than in the preceding election two years ago. It was sufficiently small to preclude the necessity of giving any Communist leader a post of importance in the government. And, unless revolution or civil war changes the picture, Italy has become definitely allied with the West, and control of the Mediterranean is at least temporarily out of the grasp of the Soviet Union and her satellites.

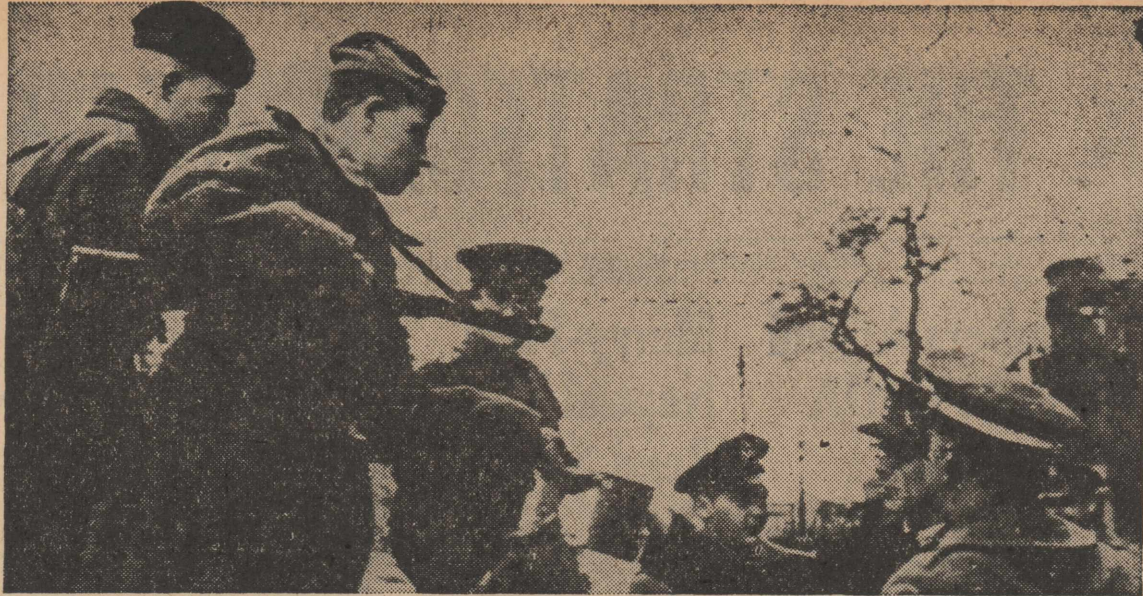
The Italian election was also a

remarkable example of the incredible changes that have taken place in the world. Superficially, of course, it was a domestic affair. Actually everyone knows that much of the money and direction behind the People's Front campaign came from the Kremlin. The United States used to the limit the persuasive power of the ERP, and frankly said time and time again that if the Communists won, Italy would be cut off from material aid. The British put their oar in, too. And finally, the Vatican came out strongly against Communism. Italy is a Roman Catholic country, and the Pope's forthright stand may well have been one of the most decisive factors.

The present situation in Italy is also illustrative of the powder keg the world is sitting on. The People's Front, despite its loss, is the second largest party in Italy by a wide margin. De Gasperi's control of the government is made possible only by a coalition of many other parties, some of them with extremely weird ideas ranging from classical monarchism to a facism indistinguishable from Mussolini's. The only thing that binds these groups together is a common fear of Communism,

coupled, of course, with their desire for American assistance. On practically all other issues they are at loggerheads. The Communists, whether or not they go in for big-scale violence, are in a position to cause continual unrest through strikes, heckling, and possibly, industrial sabotage. It is fortunate that De Gasperi has shown a high degree of competence and courage in handling delicate and explosive situations. In the United States, the opinion is widely held that the Italian election was a major setback for the Soviet Union's effort to extend its influence over all Europe. That is true, but it does not lead to too great a degree of optimism. The Russians do not accept defeat passively. If their time-table suffers a delay in one direction, they always try to speed it up elsewhere. Until and unless the two great powers reach an agreement on their spheres of influence, we must expect flare-ups at periodic intervals in both hemispheres.

On the broad subject of U. S.-Soviet differences, Dorothy Thompson recently made a striking observation. She said that, under normal conditions, the present course of the world would lead inevitably to war. But she went on, there are two unusual barriers to war now. One is the temper of peoples, of the almost universal desire for peace among those who would have to do the fighting and the suffering. The other is that neither high command has been able to figure out a plan that it feels will insure success in case of war. No

nation will start a war unless it is ninety per cent certain that the advantage is on its side. From the Russian point of view, engagement in a war might lead to chaos in the countries she is controlling through puppet governments, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia. She might have a terrific occupation job to handle behind her own iron curtain. From our point of view, how could we reach Russian soil with great land armies and support them?

Certainly, the Russians know, as we do, that a long drawn out war could mean the destruction of modern concepts of civilization. Miss Thompson, for instance, thinks more people might be killed by pillage, robbery and marauding bands than in actual conflict between armies. In short, the world might descend into the abyss of an utter anarchy from which it could not recover for many years. The only effective law, then, would be that of tooth and claw, the law of the jungle.

A viewpoint which is finding more and more adherents was expressed in these words in a Saturday Evening Post editorial: "Of course, we have to remain at the ready, but foreign policy should be built on the assumption that some sort of relations can be carried on, even with nations whose regimes we do not like very much, once our determination to halt the Communist conspiracy has been demonstrated." That means we must make it clear to Russia that we shall oppose to the limit of our ability her efforts to become dictator of the world, and, when that is done, work out our basic problems on a realistic basis.

Curiously enough, that may mean a return to the balance of power policy, on both sides of the ideological fence, which once we hoped was dead forever. Some of the best authorities on international affairs seem to have come to the conclusion that, in greatly revised form, it is the only workable program. As a mat-

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ter of record, the longest period of peace in modern times occurred when Great Britain was able to maintain a balance of power in Europe.

Look who gets squeezed!

Union leaders representing less than one-tenth of railroad employees reject recommendations of President's Emergency board—refuse to negotiate except on their own terms—threaten to paralyze nation by strike!

In contrast, this small group of railroad union leaders are attempting to flout the intent and spirit of the Railway Labor Act, and dictate their own terms. They have dictated a paralyzing railroad strike. You will be the victim!

How long will the American public stand for the undemocratic, arbitrary, and abusive use of the right to strike and the disregard of the obligation to provide transportation? How long can the American people permit a few dictatorial union leaders to defy the processes provided for peaceful settlement of disputes?

Force seldom produces settlements that are either fair or lasting. Moreover, a point is often reached when personal interests must be held subordinate to the greater public welfare. That is why the railroads have accepted the Emergency Board recommendations. That is also why the leaders of these three unions should reconsider their decision to call a paralyzing strike.

after hearing evidence for 33 days, made recommendations based on all the facts in the case. The railroads have accepted these recommendations.

Who's to blame?

Although they deplored so large an extra cost burden, the railroads accepted the report of the Board because they felt it was in the public interest to uphold the spirit and intent of the Railway Labor Act.

THE LEADERS of three railroad unions, representing less than one-tenth of all railroad employees, have called a railroad strike that would paralyze the nation.

These leaders refuse to accept a 15 1/2 cents an hour wage increase retroactive to November 1, 1947. This increase was recommended by an impartial Emergency Board appointed by President Truman.

This increase of 15 1/2 cents already has been accepted by the 19 other railroad unions. But the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Switchmen's Union of North America won't accept what more than 90% of all railroad employees have accepted. They have called a strike to get more!

Unions refuse rules discussion

Certain rules changes demanded by these union leaders—which would increase wages still further—were recommended by the Board. But the union leaders want more—they demand that the railroads put into effect ALL the changes they asked for, including those the Board felt should be denied.

On top of this, they insist that certain rules changes proposed by the railroads be withdrawn—in spite of the fact that the Board recommended them! These union leaders have refused to negotiate except upon these arbitrary terms.

Greater wage increase not justified

Engineers and firemen are among the highest paid of all employees in America, as figures in the box show. This strike threat doesn't justify giving a greater increase than other railroad workers received.

Emergency Boards are a means provided by the Railway Labor Act in the public interest to avoid strikes. The President's Board,

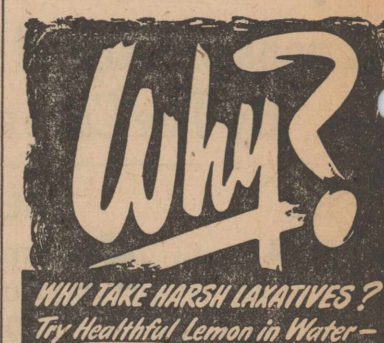
FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

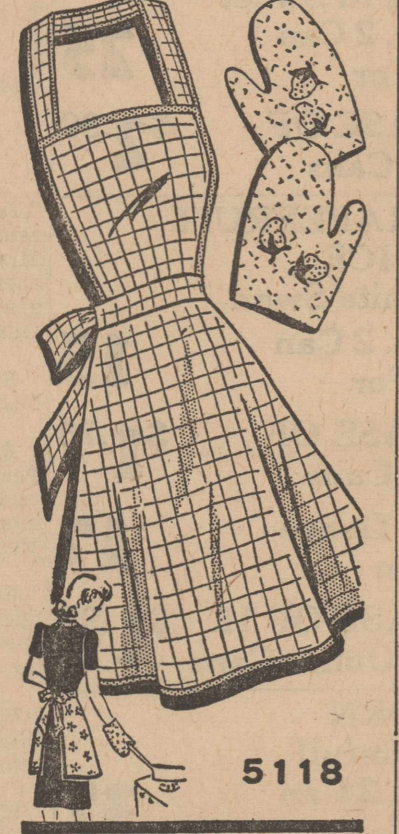
QUESTION: I have bought an old house that has wooden gutters with metal linings. The linings have rusted through from lack of paint. Could I paint over the metal with some of the new-type waterproof paint? ANSWER: If the metal has rusted through, I believe it would serve no purpose to retain it. If you can remove it without too much trouble, you could paint the wood gutters on the inside with liquid asphalt paint, and the outside with a good house paint. If there are spaces at the joints, cover them with roofing cement and roofing felt, then paint over the felt, with asphalt paint.

QUESTION: Kindly advise me what I can do to smooth a concrete basement floor? It is rough, scaly and pitted. ANSWER: For a fine job, you could have a terrazzo flooring contractor grind the floor down smooth, with his terrazzo grinding machine. If the floor were very thin and cracking, I would suggest having it broken up and a new floor poured on top. If the floor is not leaking or cracked, I believe you could simply apply a floor leveling compound, smoothing it on with a trowel.

QUESTION: We just bought a new house and all the woodwork is painted white. I'd like very much to varnish it without taking the paint off. Could this be done? ANSWER: Varnish cannot be applied over paint in the way that you ask about. The paint must first be removed either with paint remover or else by scraping or sandpapering.

Italians Claim Depth Record For New Midget Submarine

MILAN, ITALY.—A midget submarine designed by Pietro Vassena reached a depth of 1,329 feet in Lake Como, a son of the inventor said. It was believed no crew was aboard.

The inventor said the previous record depth for a submarine was 453 feet. The son said his father had given no details of the test. The submarine is called the Vassena.

The sub with Vassena and another man aboard reached a depth of 771 feet. The submarine is 25 feet in length. It was designed to go to a depth of 2,625 feet.

Engineers "Shoot" Chickens At Airplane Windshields

WASHINGTON.—Jet-propelled chickens are being used by the Civil Aeronautics administration in experiments to develop airplanes which can collide with a bird without suffering serious damage, CAA officials revealed.

CAA engineers have developed an air gun which "shoots" chickens at aircraft windshields, landing lights, and other vital exposed parts.

The tests seek to develop windshields and landing light lenses which will not break when a duck or a gull strikes a plane in flight.

The CAA has completed a survey which shows that the scheduled airliners on a year-around average can be expected to collide in flight with about eight birds a week.

"However, several unexplained fatal crashes involving commercial aircraft have occurred in which this cause was suspected. Numerous records of fatalities and aircraft crashes resulting from bird collisions exist in military aircraft operations."

The tests with the jet-propelled chickens are being financed by the aircraft manufacturers, according to the CAA. The chickens are "electrocuted," put in a flimsy bag, loaded in the air gun, and "fired" at the airplane at flying velocities.

First Family in This Town Is Actually Safety First

CHECOTAH, OKLA.—When local residents talk about the town's "first" family, they aren't referring to the mayor, police chief or any other political big shot.

Chances are that they'll be talking about Dr. Safety First, Sr., or his son, Dr. Safety First, Jr. The Christian names of the two doctors are not nicknames. They were christened that way and have been the butt of numerous jokes ever since. To minimize the confusion, the slogan-like Firsts have adopted one method of shrouding their identity.

In the telephone book, they are listed as the S. R. Firsts.

A layer of "limestone" encasing his heart was removed by surgeons at Ohio State university, it was reported. They took off the coating "like peeling an orange." The three-hour operation was performed at university hospital by the "Kinsman Hall group" of surgeons. They are staff members of the university's department of research surgery.

Texans Try to Change False Impressions Of Their "Republic"

Cattlemen's Association Launches Campaign Among Offsprings of Texas-Trained Veterans

MADISONVILLE, TEX.—A group of Texans here have embarked on a venture to correct the false notions about Texas which have been spread by ex-G.I.'s who were stationed in the state during the war.

"Recognizing that out-of-state men who trained in army and navy camps in Texas during the war went away denouncing the state, fluently and bitterly, the association is launching what it calls a national corrective campaign." So says H. B. Fox, who sees all, knows all and tells all about Southeastern Texas.

And here's the pearl in the campaign oyster:

To the offspring of a Texas-trained, out-of-state veteran who writes the best letter on "Why My Daddy Is Wrong About Texas," the Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's association will give a free trip to Madisonville and a week's visit on a near-by ranch, climaxed by the designation of honor guest at the association's annual barbecue.

"Just sit down and write us a letter explaining why you know your daddy is wrong about Texas," the association says. "Get the letter to us. The writer of the best letter will receive a round-trip plane ticket and the cattlemen will do the rest. "No strings are attached. You don't have to send us any bottle tops, old horseshoes, belt buckles, saddle blankets or your father's service patch—and we certainly wouldn't want any facsimiles." Fox said officials of the sidewalk cattlemen feel that "the opinion of out-of-state veterans is a war-born neurosis that would have developed equally against Rhode Island, West Virginia or New York, had a soldier trained there. The contention that Texas is a dull, flat, wind-swept, sand-corroded, sun-blistered, insect-ridden place is an unfortunate aftermath of world conflict."

"Thunder, there ain't nothing wrong with Texas—then veterans is confusin' us with second lieutenants," a member of the association added.

Blind Section Hand Uses Wife's Eyes To 'See' His Work

Young Woman Began Working On The Railroad During The War Period

KANSAS CITY, MO.—Mary Alonge, who stands over five feet tall in men's work shoes, admits that her job as a section hand with her blind husband is the best work she's ever had.

A broad grin lights up Mary's round, smudged face as she tells about her work of cleaning out box-cars at the Rock Island dump yards here. Shoveling dirt, unloading whatever debris has accumulated in the cars, wielding a pick in cold weather to loosen frozen ground, all are part of an eight hour daily shift for Mary, who's been employed here for five years.

Working constantly beside the young woman is her husband, Joe, tall, slender and dark, who needs her with him because of falling eyesight. Physicians who have examined Joe have given no hope that his sight will ever be improved.

"If he could see better, he would be doing something else. Well, we both work," commented Mary. Since a railroad yard isn't exactly the place for frills, this stocky woman wears men's overalls, a leather jacket and an old wool scarf tied around her head.

Mary began her job during the war, when all the railroads, desperate for help, first began hiring women as laborers. Her husband, who had been rejected by the army because of his almost sightless eyes, was employed at the yard doing piecework. One day Joe's boss came around and asked him if his wife wanted to work.

Mary went down the next day and "never quit." There were about 40 women in the yards then, cleaning tracks and doing other labor formerly done by men. Most would quit or lay off when cold weather came along. Today, only one other feminine worker, a switch oiler, is still there.

Mary and Joe each earn 94 cents an hour, which brings their weekly income to \$90.24. And they are saving as much as they are able—what with doctor's bills and increased prices—so they can buy a little house. They have long dreamed of it.

Money Grows On Bushes, Not Trees, This Woman Discovers

BICKNELL, IND.—Mrs. Oscar Finke often heard the sarcastic phrase, "Do you think money grows on trees?" but she never thought she'd see the day when she could truthfully answer, "No, it grows on bushes."

Walking home from the grocery she spotted a \$20 bill on a bush. Amazed, she started picking and soon had \$95. But Mrs. Finke didn't keep the money.

It was part of a cached nest egg which a neighbor buried under a flower pot for a vacation trip. The wind blew the bills away and they caught on the bush.

Ezra Leads A Revival

GLANCING for a moment at our history, we see that in 536 B. C., 50,000 Jews were returned to Jerusalem from Babylon, and the temple was rebuilt; and 78 years later, Ezra returns with about 7,000 Jews to inaugurate needed reforms. Then came Nehemiah, 444 B. C., to rebuild the walls, and with Ezra to lead in a needed religious revival.

"FOR Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the law of the Lord, and to do it, and to teach in Israel statutes and judgments."

There was great need for a revival of religion, and Ezra knew that there can be no real revival until the people come back to God. He therefore read to them the statutes and judgments. Ezra read from the law of Moses from morning until midday, "and the ears of all the people were attentive unto the book of the law."

HEARING AND DOING GOD'S WORD

"Lord, send a revival, and let it begin in my heart." Revivals are prayed down, not talked up. We have fallen into the fallacy of speaking of revivals when some overnight spell-binder comes along and kicks up a big sensation. Before he leaves town, Pharisaism is more rampant than ever. It is not until the Spirit of God moves upon the hearts of his people and rekindles in them a sense of sin, bringing them to true repentance, that we can have a real religious revival.

When men are convicted of their sins, they will say with Zacchaeus, "Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor, and if I have taken from any man by false accusation, I restore him fourfold." When men begin to feel and talk and act like that, you have a real religious revival. And I repeat, such revivals are prayed down, not talked up. Now you are ready to read Psalms 119:9-16.

Indian Skull Deformation
A strange skull deformation practiced by Indians of Mexico and parts of the southwestern United States a few centuries before arrival of the first white men is being studied at Smithsonian institution. It consisted of a marked flattening of the top of the back of the head, presumably by deliberate pressure applied to the heads of infants. In extreme cases it produced what might be described as "three-horned men" with pressure-produced protuberances on two sides and the front of the skull. This was the situation in the first case ever reported, that of a skull found by a French anthropologist about 100 years ago on the Island of Sacrifices just outside Vera Cruz. No other specimens have quite reached the three-horned stage, but some of the individuals must have presented a weird appearance. In some cases the front of the skull also was flattened, producing a high, peaked head.

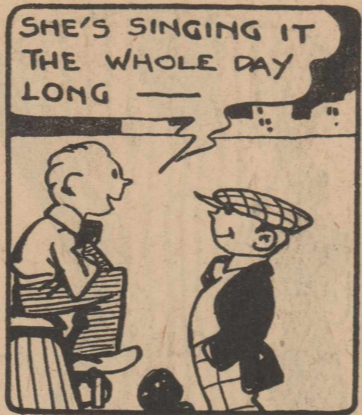

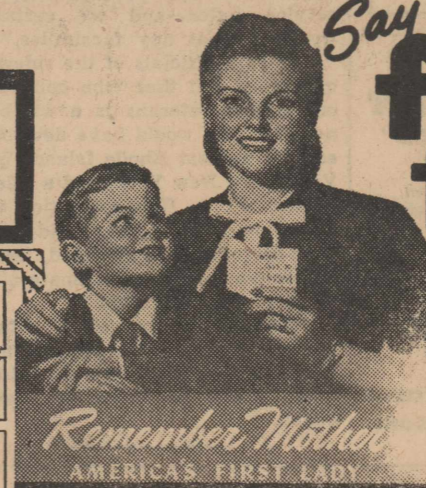
