#### **Legend Surrounds Highest** Navigable Lake in World

Lake Titicaca in Peru is the highest navigable lake in the world. Four average-size steamers course over the 9,000 square miles of this inland sea which is situated between Bolivia and Peru in a natural cradle formed by the lofty Andes mountains. Balsa boats made from the totora reeds that grow on the embankments float along side the steamers in bizarre contrast. And traces of ancient civilizations are seen on the shores and on the islands in the lake.

At the bottom of the lake, according to legend, is an immense gold chain which the Indians were taking to the Spaniards as ransom for the Inca, and caused it to disappear in the lake when they heard treachery had befallen their chieftain.


Many attempts have been made to recover the lost treasure, but perhaps to unravel the mystery, we will have to wait hundreds of years until the waters which are gradually receding reach the bottom. It is said that despite the altitude, the amber colored lake never freezes, and that its water will never rust steel.

#### Horses' Eyes

In approaching a horse from the front, why does it look you straight in the eye until you are three or four feet from it, and then turn its head and look at you with one eye? Because horse eyes are not suited for close binocular vision, says the Better Vision institute. The lens in the eye of a horse is relatively large, and the ciliary muscle is weak, unable to bring about accommodation of the lens for near and far vision. Also, the eye muscles are unable to converge the two eyes for close focusing. Accordingly, the horse sees objects at a distance binocularly (with two eyes), but must use one eye for focusing objects close by. To overcome the lack of flexibility of the lens, the retina of a horses's eye slants from the visual axis, like a tilted egg. The principle of this arrangement is similar to that seen in slanting a camera in photographing a tall building so as to get near and far points into focus on the plate.

#### **Plant Food**

To assure adequate supply of food in the soil, house plants should be fed with complete plant food. For your convenience, it's available in tablet form, thus avoiding all mixing and muss. These complete plant food tablets supply house plants with all the elements they need for best growth. Plants should be fed at the rate of 2 tablets for a 6-inch pot, For plants in 10-inch pots use.4 tablets. Vary the number of tablets proportionately for plants in larger or smaller pots. Always place the tablets along the edge of the pot, about an inch away from the rim. Space them about 6 inches apart. Make holes about 1 inch deep and drop the tablets in these holes, then cover with soil and water thoroughly. Application should be made approximately every 4 weeks during the growing period.
