1 New Drilling Location; 2 Wells Tested

The Kerr-McGee No. 1 Huff Hudson is located 2,310 feet from the north and east lines of section 48, Block 2-B, according to an announcement made by the company.

Tests on two wells have been disclosed by the Texas Railroad Commission.

Bayou Oil Co. No. 1 Ohland, located in section 342, Block 1-T, drilled to 3,352 feet and plugged back to 3,180 feet, produced pay from 3,020 to 3,175 feet. After treatment with 13,000 gallons of acid, the well produced 15 million cubic feet of gas with 411 pounds of rock pressure.

United Production Co. No. 1 Spurlock, located in section 26, Block 2-B, drilled to 3,316 feet, produced pay from 3,041 feet to total depth. The well tested 2,35 million cubic feet of gas with 415 pounds of rock pressure.

Will Enforce City Building Permit Ordinance

The City's Building Permit Ordinance will be enforced, it was decided at a meeting of the City Council Thursday night of last week.

The ordinance requires citizens to submit a blue print or drawing of their proposed building or the finished building they will "move in" for approval of the Council before a building permit is issued.

Those failing to secure building permits before moving in buildings or constructing new buildings may be faced with difficulties in securing utility and sewer service.

Enforcement of the old ordinance is being put into effect to prevent the moving in of old dilapidated houses into modern residential districts for tenant houses.

The council admits the ordinance has little power over buildings which may be secured for the homes of its citizens. But it has the power to refuse the erection of unsightly housing facilities which may be placed in the city limits for rental purposes for either housing facilities, or business buildings.







Instructions For Cleaning Ladies Gloves

If you have been wondering how to care for your gloves follow these easy directions.

Gloves of suede, capeskin, pigskin and doeskin often are finished so they can be washed at home. Be sure they are labeled "washable," however, before trying to launder them, states Miss Dorothy Dixon, home demonstration agent. Kid and some other kinds of leather should be dry cleaned. Here are the steps:

Sudsing: Use a mild soap or a synthetic detergent and lukewarm water. Put gloves on and wash them as you would your hand. Lather gloves well but don't scrub. Use a soft brush on fingertips or badly soiled places.

Rinsing: Take off wet gloves, being careful not to tear or stretch them. Run lukewarm water through them. (This helps push gloves into shape.) For pigskin add a couple of drops of glycerin to rinse water to soften leather. Fold in Turkish towel and press out the water, but do not wring.

Drying: Lay gloves flat on a dry towel or hang over a towel on line. Do not hang by clothespins; they will leave marks. Dry slowly at room temperature, too much heat may harm the leather. When gloves are nearly dry, work them gently to make leather soft and pliable.

For washing fabric gloves follow the same procedure. Omit the last step in drying. Careful washing, rinsing, and drying will make your gloves look almost like new.

Scientists Hunt Methods To Control Huge Rockets

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Army scientists report that they are at work on various electronic devices including radar, to perfect control of huge rockets.

They are developing new and more powerful rocket motors for guided missiles but controlling the missiles is still their biggest problem.

The Germans found during the last war that their V-2 rocket was a destructive weapon, but control best was haphazard.

Atoms Will Be Harnessed To Aid in Allergy Probe

NEW YORK—Radioactive isotopes from atomic ovens are being used as "tracer bullets" for research in allergy—the kind of reaction that causes hayfever, asthma and other distressing ailments.

Dr. W. A. Selle of the University of Texas medical school said he hopes to learn the exact role of histamine, a poisonous substance resulting from injury to cells, in producing allergies.

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

by Roger C. Whitman

QUESTION: I have a dark soft wood floor that I don't know what to do with. It is single flooring. If I were to lay linoleum squares, would the floor have to be smoothed before cementing them down?

ANSWER: Linoleum must be laid on a smooth surface. If your floor is rough and uneven, it should be sanded smooth. The alternative would be to cover the flooring with plywood, which gives a good surface for covering with linoleum.

QUESTION: What about painting a house with the spraying method?

ANSWER: If well done by a professional the job should be entirely satisfactory provided, of course, he uses top quality paint, the surfaces are warm and dry, and the weather is warm and dry.


International Uniform Sunday School Lesson

The Temple in the Nation's Life

Lesson for May 23, 1948

OUR golden text is "O come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord our maker," Psalms 95:6.

The Jewish temple was a national sanctuary, whether we think in terms of the altars of Abel, Noah or Abraham, the tabernacle at Sinai, or the great temples at Mount Moriah, of Solomon, of Zerubbabel, or any of the other appointed places of meeting with God. The welfare of mankind, in every age, requires the faithful and frequent worship of God.

From the days when they sang the hymns of David, the Jews were prosperous to the degree that they were true to God in their worship and in their reverence for all things holy. This lesson traces the story, leaving no doubt in any pupil's mind about the solemn truth of the golden text.

A HOUSE OF WORSHIP

IN Ezra 3:10-13, we see the picture of priests leading the people to sing unto the Lord, "Because he is good, for his mercy endureth forever toward Israel."

Wherever you live, whether in the city or in some quiet rural community, remember this, the sanctuary measures the attitude of the people of such community toward God to a degree that no other gauge of public opinion can offer. We have our various polls of public opinion, but none of them are so prophetic of a people's ultimate hope as their attitude toward God's house.

Boys and girls who regularly attend Sunday school and public worship will be watched by the men who are looking for trustworthy leaders tomorrow.

HONORING GOD'S HOUSE

"SERVE the Lord with gladness, come before his presence with singing," Psalms 100:2.

We read how the people in the long ago brought their best gifts to make God's house beautiful. What are we doing with our best gifts? I think of boys and girls today who are helping with their small gifts to erect and equip beautiful houses of worship. Tomorrow they will point with gratitude and thanksgiving to the part they had in making God's house the best house in the community. Thus do we honor God as we honor his house.

WHY WE GO TO CHURCH

MERCHANT prince, was once asked why he went so regularly to church. He replied: "I go to church for two main reasons. First, because God commands it; second, because it enriches life."

The Jews teach us, in the long record of their faithfulness or unfaithfulness, that the people who go regularly to church are the most dependable people in any community. And we can bring it right down to our day and generation, and get the same answer.

A business man told me recently that he had a check made of the several hundred young people in his employ, and he found that more than ninety per cent of the regular church-goers were advancing in their work with his company. He further discovered that almost without exception, the people who were giving trouble were the people who never entered a church.

OUR NEED OF PUBLIC WORSHIP

OUR bodies require regular nourishment. And our souls are just as dependent upon regular nourishment. I would not say that it is absolutely necessary for one to attend public worship to grow spiritually, but the odds are entirely against those who claim that they can grow spiritually without attending public worship.

There is a place of worship within the reach of well-nigh every person in the United States. We are responsible before God if we neglect to claim the advantages and blessing of public worship.

The place of the temple in the life of Israel is a symbol which teaches us today that we dare not forsake the assembling of ourselves on the Lord's Day in his house. The fellowship of worship is the sweetest fellowship on earth. It is our surest road to peace here and hereafter.
