Combines, trucks, loaders, and full of strange faces, and old fasion that everyone has been looking forward to since last harvest, and the occasion is unequaled even by Christmas for its romantic appeal. No, I am not referring to lovers romance, but to the romance that means sweat, hard work, sleeping in the barn or under the stars, and the great hustle and bustle that gives harvest time a carnival atmosphere. In many respects it does resemble a giant carnival. There is the anticipation for months in advance of this important event, then the last minute rush to get everything in readiness, anxious eyes watch every little cloud that rears its head above the horizon, farm mothers coach the children in their various chores, and huge stocks of groceries are laid in for the feeding of the crews. Tin cans are carefully preserved and washed to use in place of glasses, and a few new pots and pans are

bought to lighten the burden of cooking. Tractors and combines are checked and double checked, nut by nut, because no breakdowns must occur once the machines start rolling. Every day the grain is carefully checked, though the farmer knows from the previous day's checking exactly what his field looks like. He thoughtfully pulls a head here and there, examining it minutely, checking the number of grains per head, the size of the head and weighs it delicately in his calloused hand as a miner would caress a nugget of gold. When this is done he carefully selects a grain and chews it, thoughtfully gazing out over the broad acres of vellowing grain before him

to get an estimate on the yield. The migratory harvest crews also have their moments of anxiety. They never know what the conditions will be when they move on to another town. Wheat there may not be ready to cut, or it may have rained, and there will be a day or two of loafing. Chances are that there will be no place to stay. Some will sleep in their trucks or under them, others will be stacked like cord wood in a sweltering house trailer, and eating will present another problem. Clean clothes are always a problem, and chances are that laundry will take a week or more, and they may have moved on before it has a chance to get back. Mail is another uncertainty and long distance lines are busy at night and rainy days. For the farmer the rush period is Betty. short, but for these crews it will be a summer long affair as they follow the harvest on into Canada. 





Fluoroscopic Examination To make a fluoroscopic examin ation, the physician places the pa tient between the x-ray tube and a fluorescent screen. He then flicks a switch, sending the required amount of radiation through the patient's body. Some x-rays pass right on through and strike the fluorescent screen, creating light rays. Other x-rays are absorbed by the thicker, more opaque parts of the body and do not reach the screen. So what the physician sees is a shadowgraph of the internal

### AILING HOUSE by Roger C. Whitman

QUESTION: My house was painted five years ago with fairly

good paint. The paint is now all cracking and peeling down to the wood. Should I scrape off the old paint and apply a coat of aluminum paint, then a coat of good house paint?

ANSWER: That would be a good way to handle the problem. But first examine the walls for leakage. It is quite possible that since the house was painted five years ago, small cracks may have opened up around the window and door frames that admit water during driving rains. This rain water leaks down inside the walls and on warm, dry days is drawn through the walls, taking off paint from the surfaces.

QUESTION: Is it necessary to flush a hot water system every year

ANSWER: At the beginning of the heating season it is advisable to draw off several pailfuls of water to flush off some of the accumulation in the boiler, but it is not necessary to drain off the entire heating system. Use a boiler cleaning compound every two or three years.

QUESTION: How can I get grease spots off cement steps?

ANSWER: Cover the spot with a thick layer of dry portland cement, leaving it on for several days. After the powder is saturated with the oil, scrape it off and repeat several times until no more is absorbed. Later, scrub the place with a strong solution of washing soda.

QUESTION: I would like to know if coal ashes do any harm to a garden?

ANSWER: When correctly used, coal ash can be of benefit to a garden and lawn.

#### **New Synthetic Ingredient** Keeps Bread Fresh Longer

Bread, so often called the staff of life, forms part of nearly every meal and is relished by everyone. It has, however, one serious drawback—its tendency to become stale quickly.

This tendency towards quick staling now has been reduced by about one-third, scientists claim, by introduction of a new ingredient. Use of this ingredient, whether in the bakery or the housewife's kitchen, will save many dollars for each American family that throws the stale end of the loaf into the garbage bucket. Incidentally, this discovery also may go a long way towards the grain-saving needed to feed the starving peoples of Europe.

All you do-or all the baker does is to add a small part of a new, edible fatty substance made of synthetic ethylene oxide, to the regular







One thing in particular that should accompany the use of DDT is the destruction or removal of fly breeding places, such as manure piles, weed piles, old stack bottoms and wet spots in barnyards. One or more such spots may be able to turn out flies faster than DDT can kill them, for DDT is not noted for fast action. A fly may survive for hours after alighting on a surface coated with DDT.

> Use of protein supplements in rations for shotes always has been profitable. Some farmers have failed to use these supplements, though, because of their cost. 
#### **Reviving Grindstone**


