Harvest time is upon us again.

Combines, trucks, loaders, and trailer houses are beginning to stack up on the vacant lots along the highways, and the town is

full of strange faces, and old familiar faces not seen since last harvest time. This is the occasion that everyone has been looking forward to since last harvest, and the occasion is unequalled even by Christmas for its romantic appeal. No, I am not referring to lovers romance, but to the romance that means sweat, hard work, sleeping in the barn or under the stars, and the great hustle and bustle that gives harvest time a carnival atmosphere. In many respects it does resemble a giant carnival. There is the anticipation for months in advance of this important event, then the last minute rush to get everything in readiness, anxious eyes watch every little cloud that rears its head above the horizon, farm mothers coach the children in their various chores, and huge stocks of groceries are laid in for the feeding of the crews. Tin cans are carefully preserved and washed to use in place of glasses, and a few new pots and pans are bought to lighten the burden of cooking. Tractors and combines are checked and double checked, nut by nut, because no breakdowns must occur once the machines start rolling. Every day the grain is carefully checked, though the farmer knows from the previous day's checking exactly what his field looks like. He thoughtfully pulls a head here and there, examining it minutely, checking the number of grains per head, the size of the head and weighs it delicately in his calloused hand as a miner would caress a nugget of gold. When this is done he carefully selects a grain and chews it, thoughtfully gazing out over the broad acres of yellowing grain before him. Then comes the great day when the giant combines begin lumbering into the field. The farmer will invariably be found riding the first combine with his hand under the spout to catch

the first grains that pour into the bin. He rolls it in his hand, checking for moisture, and estimating what it will weigh out. Anxiously he counts the trucks as they roll out of the field toward the elevator and granary, trying to get an estimate on the yield. The migratory harvest crews also have their moments of anxiety. They never know what the conditions will be when they move on to another town. Wheat there may not be ready to cut, or it may have rained, and there will be a day or two of loafing. Chances are that there will be no place to stay. Some will sleep in their trucks or under them, others will be stacked like cord wood in a sweltering house trailer, and eating will present another problem. Clean clothes are always a problem, and chances are that laundry will take a week or more, and they may have moved on before it has a chance to get back. Mail is another uncertainty and long distance lines are busy at night and rainy days. For the farmer the rush period is short, but for these crews it will be a summer long affair as they follow the harvest on into Canada. The wages are good but they are ever looking forward to returning home and normal life. They will be brown as Mexicans and hard as nails when they return to their normal activities of truck driving, farming, school teaching, or back to college. These crews represent every walk of life, many of whom are doing it for the romance and adventure of it more than anything else. Once the roundup held the same spotlight in the lives of the people of the High Plains, but with the coming of barbed wire it has been replaced by the harvest scene which contains all the adventure, sweat, cussing, and rough living that the roundup once had, and everyone, whether he be actively a part of it or not looks forward to the coming of

In 1923, Judge Northcutt opened his own office and continued the private practice of law in Amarillo until he was elected County Judge of Potter County in 1940.
