

Increased Traffic On Highway 54

Greatly increased highway traffic this summer is foreseen by Harold Long, El Dorado, Kans., President, National U. S. 54 Highway association.

Predicting unprecedented travel in the three month period just ahead, Long called attention to last year's marks, as recorded by the American Automobile Association.

"Tourist travel in the summer of 1947 was the biggest in the United States since 1941," he said.

Since U. S. 54 is one of the greatest transfer routes in the nation, Long predicted that a great percentage of the summer motorists would travel at least part of the way on 54.

"U. S. Highway 54 is the only completely diagonal route which is crossed by every transcontinental highway," the association president pointed out.

"The motorist journeying from New York City to Southern California can save at least 300 miles and more than a day's driving time by using 54 as a transfer route."

Long explained that 54 starts on Michigan Blvd. in Chicago and moves in virtually a straight line to El Paso, Texas, just north of the Mexican border.

"The time-saving and safety advantages are perhaps the most important advantages of this improved, direct route," Long said.

"U. S. 54 is a time-saver for various reasons. In the first place it is virtually a direct route, almost completely diagonal, with no lost mileage occasioned by long north and south stretches.

"Secondly, 54 bypasses the large cities. In the entire distance from Chicago to Santa Rosa, this highway passes through only one large city. That city is Wichita, Kansas, population 170,000, where 54 is being widened through the city to speed traffic.

"One of the most important safety aspects of this family highway is the railroad crossing feature. U. S. 54 has extremely few railroad crossings. West of Wichita it runs along the Rock Island tracks most of the way to Santa Rosa.

"U. S. 54 is well served by motor courts, restaurants, filling stations, garages and hotels and is considered one of the most convenient highways now in existence."

Long is predicting that the coming summer will see an all-time record for value of traffic on U. S. 54.

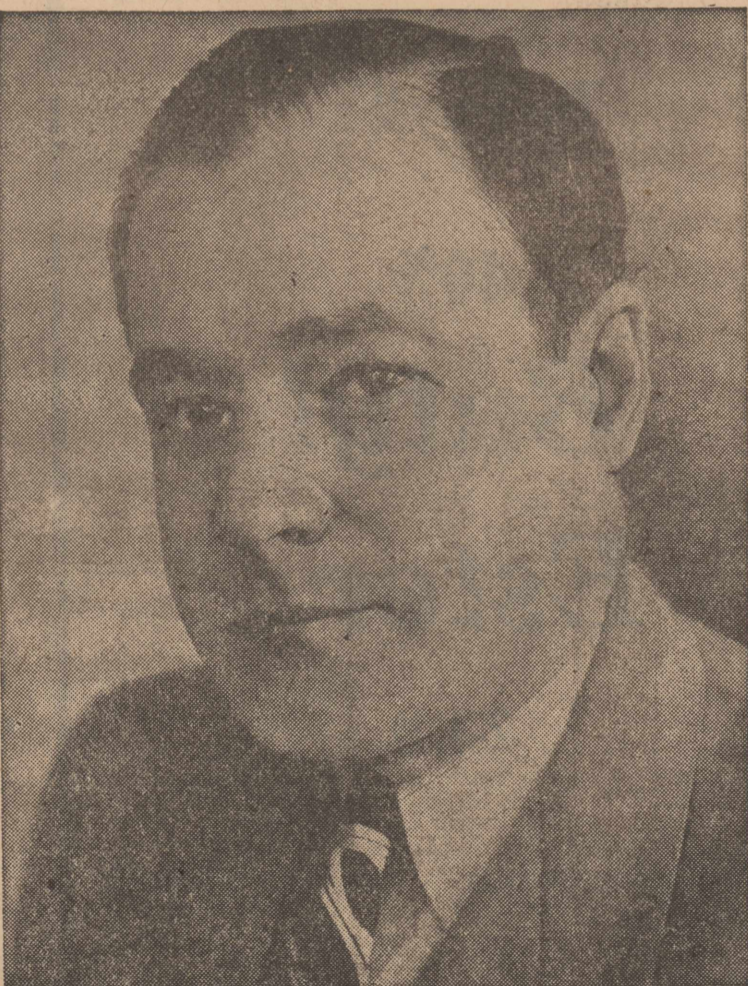

Avoid Closet Catastrophe

Clothes moths feed upon animal hair, fur, feathers and articles made from these materials, according to Mary Routh, extension clothing specialist of Texas A. & M. College. Woolen lint and hair, which has accumulated in floor cracks, under the quarter-round and baseboard, and other hard-to-reach places are often fertile breeding grounds. The batch of dog and cat hairs may yield a supply of moths.

After cleaning the clothes closets apply a DDT spray to the walls, woodwork, baseboards and shelves as a protection against clothes moths for the warm weather season, Miss Routh advises. Approximately one-half pint DDT spray is necessary for an average size closet. An oil spray is preferred because it does not leave a white deposit as a water spray does.

The best DDT spray for this purpose is a residual spray, rather than one of the "aerosol bomb" or space spray type, if it is to be effective over a period of months in killing insects which come in contact with the closet surfaces. The aerosol spray is fine for killing flying insects, or those which happen to be exposed at the time, but it does not have the lasting effect because it doesn't leave a residue.

DDT solutions may also be sprayed lightly on wool clothes without injuring the fabric. Too much of the solution, however, may show up in whitish traces on dark clothes, but these can be removed by brushing or dry cleaning.

DDT spraying is useful for protecting clothes hanging in closets, while the more familiar moth flakes or crystals are advised for clothes stored in tight bags, trunks or other containers where a fumigating effect is desired. Added protection may be given stored clothes by spraying them and their container with DDT.

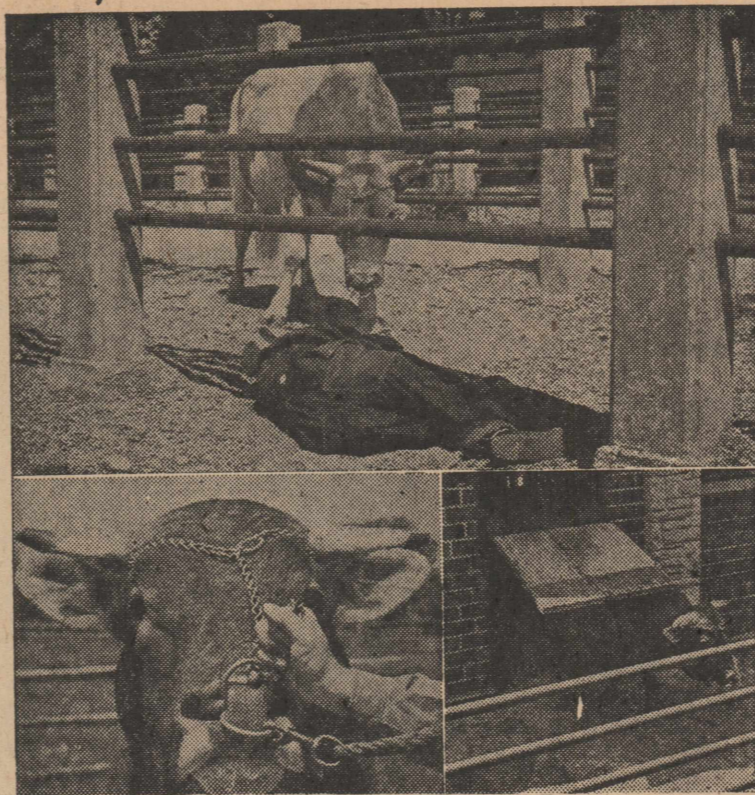
All woolen clothing, of course, should be treated before storing in either treated closets or tight containers, says Miss Routh.

Safety Measures Eliminate Bull Hazards



When it comes to handling bulls, every week is National Farm Safety Week at the Curtiss Candy Company farms in northern Illinois.

While all good safety practices are encouraged during National Farm Safety Week from July 25 to 31, special emphasis is placed upon the careful handling of bulls which still represent one of the greatest hazards in farm operations. For years therefore, the Curtiss farms have worked to develop standard practices which have now completely eliminated the danger of casualties often experienced from those animals.

All outdoor bull pens on the Curtiss farms are constructed to allow a 2-foot open space between the fencing or railing and the ground. As shown in the top picture, this feature enables a man to roll out of the pen almost instantaneously should he be attacked. Too many farms still build solid fences which prevent escape from an enraged animal. The bull in the background behind the rolling man is Curtiss Candy Levity Heir, undefeated two-year-old Guernsey bull at 1946 shows.

The left bottom picture shows a special chain attachment hooked onto the ring in the bull's nose, passing up his face and thrown around his horns. Even though an individual is knocked down and the bull's head lowered for a charge, a man can readily grab the chain and gain immediate control of the animal from a prone position on the ground. The bull wearing the chain is Curtiss Candy Signal Ned, grand champion Brown Swiss bull wherever shown in 1947.

Another important safety feature is the self-opening door on the bull barn shown in the lower right picture, with Signal Ned making his exit. By means of this door, which is pivoted above the center and protected below with metal sheathing, the bull can enter and leave his quarters without the necessity of having his keeper operate the door for him. Besides this obvious safety feature of eliminating the possibility of contact between the animal and a person, it also saves the farmer the necessity of letting the bull in or out of his barn when the time might be entirely inconvenient for him owing to other duties elsewhere.

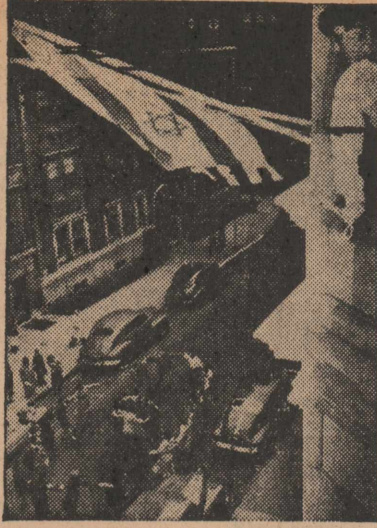
Economic Highlights

William Henry Chamberlain, who is one of the best informed and most dispassionate of American writers upon foreign affairs, recently discussed the very vital problem of continuity and consistency in our foreign policy, in a column appearing in the Wall Street Journal. As he writes, "An America that wobbles and vacillates will not carry the weight in world affairs that is appropriate to its political, economic and military power."

This is not, however, as simple a matter as it may appear on first glance. For, as Mr. Chamberlain also says, "There can be no continuity in inconsistency." And the glaring inconsistencies that appeared in our foreign policy both during and immediately after the war have undoubtedly weakened our prestige, and aroused suspicions as to our motives and our wisdom in quarters whose whole-hearted cooperation is necessary if the Western powers are to present to the world a strong and unified front.

Mr. Chamberlain discusses Yalta where, in his opinion "a high point of hypocrisy was reached." At Yalta, Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin again affirmed their faith in the broad principles of the Atlantic Charter. The most important single provision of the Charter is that all peoples shall have the right "to choose the form of government under which they will live." Another, of almost equal amount, is that all the nations, including victor and vanquished, shall have access on equal terms "to the trade and raw materials of the world." These great principles presumably were the rock-bound basis on which the war aims of the great powers rested.

Yet, at Yalta a deal was made whereby Russia was allowed to take over close to half of Poland's pre-war territory, and Poland was not even represented at the conference. Following that, it became increasingly clear that the peace settlement, to quote Mr. Chamberlain again, was "calculated to turn Germany into an economic wasteland and Europe

manently destroying Germany as a major economic power has been abandoned. And there has been a very real effort, bipartisan in character, to reaffirm through positive action the principle of the self-determination of peoples, a principle, curiously enough, which hasn't changed in significance since World War I, when Woodrow Wilson made his courageous but doomed fight for his 14 points.

It is certainly clear that the Soviet Union has not, and has never had, any desire for self-determination. Her policy lies in encouraging, and giving material support to, revolutions inside nations where small but beautifully organized minorities take over all the reigns of power and later justify them with the phony kind of elections. This technique has been the means of giving Russia all of her tremendous gains since V-E day. Yet, from the Kremlin's point of view, it may not all be rosy. There is every evidence that millions of Poles, Czechs, Yugoslavs and others hold the bitterest hatred for Russia. The Communists can liquidate the leaders of the opposition, but they can't clean out all the dissidents among the rank and file. In the event of war, or any internal emergency, the Soviet Union certainly could not depend on her satellite countries for enthusiastic assistance.

There are some who believe that these countries might prove to be an intolerable drain on Russia, by forcing her to police them with armies of trained men.

In any event, there is more and more talk of the need for an absolutely clear cut American foreign policy which will say, in effect, that we will help the cooperating nations recover, and will support them in selecting governments of their own choosing, through free and secret elections. The emphasis would be on constructive action, rather than being based on more or less unrelated programs designed to help contain Russia. We have made progress in that direction, and the hope is that the next year will see a real job done.

ually without a physical examination. He need only fill out a simple application form, in which he certifies that his health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months.

The privilege of reinstating on this basis will be available after July 31 only to veterans whose policies have been lapsed for less than three months. Where the period of lapse is three months or longer, the veteran will be required to take a physical examination and qualify as an insurable risk, the VA Regional Manager said.

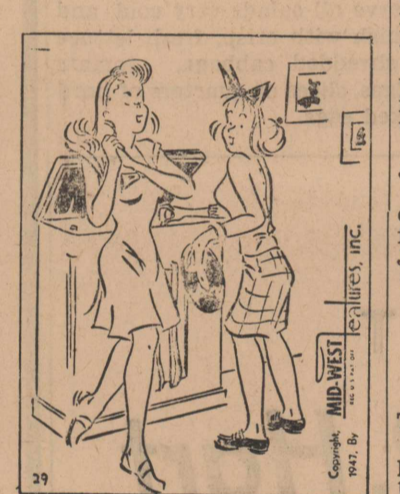
Employers Must Deduct Security Tax

Employers are required to deduct social security taxes on only the first \$3,000 of wages per year, J. R. Sanderson, manager of the social security office in Amarillo, states. "Even at this late date," he said, "the Social Security Administration is still getting inquiries from employers and employees about these excess taxes."

The employer's quarterly tax returns should show the name, social security number, and amount of wages paid each employee. Sanderson points out, however, that after an employee has been paid \$3,000 in the course of a calendar year, the employer should no longer include his name on his reports.

Request for refund of excess taxes paid on wages of more than \$3,000 should be made with the Collector of Internal Revenue and not to the social security field office, and must be made within a period of 2 calendar

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7,

1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amend-

ment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Sherman County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF SHERMAN COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 31st day of July, 1948, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon: "Shall the Commissioners Court of Sherman County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows: Not exceeding 40 Cents (40c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding 15 cents (15c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding 4 Cents (4c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding 21 Cents (21c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvement."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

I have spoken to one or two of the dogs about it with little effect, so I am now appealing to the grocers to make some arrangements to keep this produce out of the reach of the dogs.

home, he stated, and parents largely can eliminate dangers and make their homes fire-safe for their children.

Of the 109 Texas fire deaths reported for the first five months this year, including only the first part of May, 38 of the deaths have been children under 15 years old.

Stating that gasoline has been responsible for the greatest number of child deaths by a large margin, Hall urged that parents never allow gasoline on their premises. Of the 38 fire deaths, 11 have been caused by gasoline.

Five fire deaths were caused by kerosene, 3 from electricity and 3 from stoves. The Commissioner suggested that these things, as well as others, be watched closely so that they will not become fire hazards.

Hall recommended that kerosene be kept well out of the reach of children and that they never be allowed to handle it. He said the same holds true of matches, hot liquids and lighted candles, etc. He also urged that kerosene never be used to start a fire and that fires for marshmallow toasting and popcorn roasts be held in fireplaces only and always under adult supervision.

As for gas stoves, Hall said, "the greatest danger for children is getting too close to heaters and catching their clothes on fire, a not so prevalent hazard this time of year."

With the electrical hazard, the main thing for parents to remember is to keep appliances in good repair.

In two tragic cases children were burned to death when adults carelessly disposed of cigarettes around their beds.

Two more children were burned to death in automobile accidents and one died from burns after falling in a tub of boiling water. Two children met their deaths when hot grease and a wood stove set fire to their respective houses.

The last child died of burns after his clothing ignited while he was playing with matches.

Hall also cautioned parents never to leave their children at home alone, and to be sure that

sitters are mature and responsible enough to take care of young children, especially in case of fire. Check to see that they

know how to call the fire department, he advised.

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SCRIPTURE: Ruth DEVOTIONAL READING: Psalms 28:6-9

Naomi, Woman Of Faith

Lesson for July 18, 1948

IF we are to understand Ruth, cherished heroine of the book bearing her name, we must know Naomi, her mother-in-law—woman of faith in God and surpassing patience and sacrifice in service to her day and generation.

It is the Book of Ruth which we have for Sunday's lessons, with Psalms 28:6-9 as the devotional reading. The golden text, "Thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God," Ruth 1:16.

IN SEARCH OF BREAD FAMINE in Judah, where Elimelech and his wife, Naomi, and their sons, Mahlon and Chilion, dwelt, drove them to Moab, in search of bread. Elimelech died, and the sons married young women of Moab, Ruth and Orpah. And then the sons died. Naomi, feeling that she must no longer remain in Moab, announced her intention to return to her native land, and bade Ruth and Orpah farewell. In one brief decade Naomi had lost husband and sons, and now she longed for home.

'TREAT ME NOT TO LEAVE THEE' ORPASH accepted Naomi's suggestion, and turned away to her own people; but not so with Ruth. She loved Naomi. She could not give her up. Naomi had done something for Ruth in those years of sorrow and loss.

"Treat me not to leave thee, or to return from following after thee; for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge. Thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God. Where thou diest, I will die, and there will I be buried. The Lord do so to me, and more also, if ought but death part thee and me."

WHEN FAITH CONQUERS HERE we witness conquering faith—conquering faith in the hearts of Naomi and Ruth. And they come to Bethlehem. It was the harvest season, and Naomi directed Ruth to glean in the field of Boaz, a wealthy and generous-hearted citizen of Bethlehem. Faith in action! And the world loves the story of Ruth becoming the wife of Boaz, and thus the mother of Obed, the grandfather of David the king in the ancestral line of Jesus Christ, the King of kings.

WHEN FAITH CONQUERS LIFE is always ennobled when faith conquers. It is easy to imagine how history might have missed this beautiful love story, had not Naomi been a woman of conquering faith. She might have given up and over to her great sorrow, and pined away in grief and defeat.

But Naomi followed the gleam. And her trust in God shed its gentle glow into the lonely heart of the Moabite widow, Ruth. Ruth clung to Naomi. She could not do otherwise. "Truth is stranger than fiction." And all history was enriched. It is ever so when faith conquers. Thus the poet states the case: "God moves in mysterious ways, His wonders to perform, He plants his footsteps on the sea, And rides upon the storm."
