#### CRAIG MAKES STATEMENT

When questioned about certain hand bills being distributed and speeches made by an opponent implying that natural gas paid no state taxes and therefore the state ad valorem tax had been raised, Bill Craig stated that he was no spokesman for the oil and gas industry, but that as a member of the Legislature he was for the requiring of oil and gas along with all other industries to bear their just share of the taxes necessary for good schools, good roads and other necessary gov-

ernmental purposes. However, in fairness to all, he stated that the oil and gas industry, under laws passed by the Legislature, is currently paying production taxes of almost double the amount paid in 1946. Consequently, there is now a surplus in the State Treasury of over 65 million dollars largely accumulated by the greater taxes paid by the oil and gas industry and that surplus will be available for increased old age assistance, public education, schools, farm to market roads and other state

Bill Craig said 'this surplus has eliminated any state ad valorem tax for the next year, except that required by the State Constitution.'

Craig also stated that there was a move on foot to do away with the farmers' gasoline tax refund instigated by certain down state good road groups, but that he had fought and helped to defeat the same proposal before and would continue to oppose such unfair and discriminating legislation largely aimed against the people of the Panhandle.

QUESTION: What size mesh should be used for gutters, and what kind would be impervious to cor-

ANSWER: A quarter-inch mesh, which would keep most of the leaves out of the gutter in case there are trees close to the house. Copper is impervious to corrosion.

QUESTION: When the former tenants moved from here they scored the floors with their furniture. Is there any way I can re-

move the score marks?

ANSWER: Scraping with an electric floor sanding machine should take out most of the marks. If any slight hollow place remains after sanding, you may be able to make them less noticeable by building them up with several thin coats of a quick-drying varnish.


QUESTION: Can you tell me what causes the hot water faucet to vibrate with a disturbing noise when

ANSWER: Since the noise occurs only when the faucet is on, the trouble may be from a worn-out washer or some loose part in the faucet. Also, there is a possibility that you are overheating the water.

QUESTION: How can I remove varnish from my linoleum rug?
ANSWER: Sponge with a lukewarm solution of trisodium phosphate using about 3 pounds to the gallon of water. Let the solution stay on long enough to soften the varnish, then take up with fine steel wool. Rinse thoroughly.

QUESTION: My indirect heater is connected to the boiler, but my hot water is only luke-warm. What is the matter?


ANSWER: If you were getting hot water and the condition has developed recently, it is possible the heater jacket is clogged with sediment and may have to be taken apart and cleaned.

New Type Heat Resistant Assures Better Sun Lamps

Better sun lamps and laboratory glassware can now be made from a new type of heat-resisting mater-

The new glass, called vycor, can be heated to 1,800 degrees F. and rapidly cooled without breaking, and sun lamps made from vycor do not darken and lose their potency as rapidly as lamps containing other kinds of glass, Dr. Richard B. Ellis of the University of Miami told a meeting of the American Chemical society.

A novel process is employed to prepare the glass, which consists almost entirely of silica, or quartz. Fused silica has long been used because it is heat-resistant and does not impede the passage of ultraviolet light, he pointed out, but vycor may take the place of quartz glass, since it is cheaper to manufacture and easier to shape.

Vycor is made from a soft, alkaline glass, which has been molded or blown by conventional methods. The soft glass is then immersed in hot acid and the alkali is dissolved and washed out.

First Illinois Prison

#### Flooded Wells Are Unsafe

-Wells that become flooded by melted snow or heavy rains are unsafe sources of drinking water. Flooding is likely to carry into the water supply impurities that have been collecting for a long time. If a well that has been flooded must be put back into operation, it should be thoroughly disinfected first. Disinfection can be carried out easily and inexpensively by pouring a half-pound of chlorinated lime into the well, states the Minnesota department of health. ### Arabs and Jews Go Back to War As U.N. Truce Fails in Palestine Truman OKs Farm Price Support

FAILURE:

U.N. Truce

There was not peace, but once more a sword in Palestine. The United Nations truce had failed. As the four-week interruption of hostilities between Arabs and Jews dragged somberly through its final hours, combatants on both sides were making preparations to re-

sume warfare. They had failed to come to terms, and that failure arose out of the fact that there had existed no political or social basis upon which a peace agreement could be rested. nor were either the Jews or Arabs particularly eager to create one. Their attitude throughout the truce negotiations had been that the contest over whether the state of Israel should be allowed to exist must necessarily be a flat, win-orlose battle with no middle ground solution possible.

Count Folke Bernadotte, U.N. mediator in Palestine, had tried hard, but he had had to carry out his negotiations in what might be termed a spiritual vacuum between the Jews and Arabs. There simply was no meeting of minds upon which he might have capitalized.

Before the truce expired Bernadotte had endeavored to get it extended and continue the negotiations. Israel had agreed to such an extension but the Arab league opposed it. Previously, during the last days

of the truce, the Arabs had rejected a plan submitted by Bernadotte which included an extensive revision of the now defunct U.N. partition scheme. Bernadotte's proposal would have

restored the area of Palestine to

what it was before Trans-Jordan was separated from it, and that total area then would have been partitioned into independent Arab and Jewish states. The plan, as presented, had a ring of desperation in it. It must have been obvious, even to Ber-

since they had violently opposed the original U.N. partition idea. Trans-Jordan was especially antagonistic to the plan, insisting that it would put the nation under at least partial jurisdiction of the United Nations, thus making it no

better than a dependent state. As Bernadotte and his staff left Palestine guns already were firing and the Holy Land had relapsed into a condition of war.

FARM BILL:

Price Support

to law a farm bill that extends present price support policies for 15 months and establishes a long-range, flexible support program to begin January 1, 1950.

Signing the bill, the President said: "I wish to make it plain once again that legislation for price supports is only part of the action this congress should have taken to meet the problems of American agricul-

ture.' Thus, he was not criticizing the farm price support bill in itself but rather giving another re-run to the familiar theme whereby he has been castigating congress for doing a little when a lot more was reeded.

Congress, he said, failed to enct legislation to strengthen the oil conservation program; it did not provide the necessary funds for marketing research; it did not act on the international wheat agreement. It failed, he specified, to meet "the serious problems of housing, health and educarural tion.'

"In the field of agriculture, as in so many others, most of the business of the 80th congress was left unfinished," Mr. Truman observed. Under the extension bill farm rices generally will be supported their present levels. However, the support price for cotton will drop from 921/2 to 90 per cent of

parity. The idea behind parity farm prices is to insure the farmer the same buying power, compared with the rest of the community, that he had during a favorable crop period. Usually the standard interval upon which parity prices are based are

the five years from 1909 to 1914. Five other basic crops will continue to be supported at 90 per cent of parity. They are wheat, corn, rice, peanuts and tobacco.

Spending Money

As the economic cooperation administration closed its Marshall plan books on the first three months of its operation it reported that recovery shipments worth \$762,747,140 were approved for Europe and China during that period.

That total is about 58 per cent of the goal originally set for the quarter, but ECA Administrator Paul Hoffman said the unspent balance would be used eventually.
