2,4-D Spray Controlling Bindweeds

Three hundred and forty acres of bindweeds were sprayed with 2,4-D on 22 Gray county farms during May with one county owned sprayer, reports County Agent Ralph R. Thomas.

The 150 gallon sprayer was mounted on a pickup truck and equipped with low volume nozzles. With 30 pounds pressure and a speed of four and a half miles per hour, the solution was applied at the rate of 10 gallons

Last year, Thomas pointed out, the two county sprayers, one 150 gallon tank and one 200 gallon tank, only sprayed 220 acres during the summer. And about half of this had two sprayings. Three nundred gallons of 2,4-D to the

Seek Big Noise To Scare Fish

The United States fish and wildlife service wants to find a noise which will scare young salmon away from the huge spillways and turbines that have been built in the Columbia river.

For years salmon have used the river as they come from the seas to seek fresh water for egg-laying. The old-timers among salmon have sense enough to use the fish ladders and elevators. But young fish, born above the dam, try to come down the hard way, through spillways and turbines. Thousands are killed. If a noise can be discovered which will scare the young salmon in the right direction, a lot of fish lives will be saved.

QUESTION: What can I use to wash my furniture?

ANSWER: Clear turpentine is often used to clean the woodwork of furniture followed by polishing with a coat of paste wax applied declared that the sellers' market thinly and well rubbed, when dry.

QUESTION: We have to put a new floor down in our basement. Which is better, plank or concrete? ANSWER: Do not use boards because they will rot in time. Have a good waterproof, concrete floor laid by a mason contractor.

ANSWER: Soften the old paint with paint remover, then take it off with a hand scraper and steel wool. Carefully avoid scratching or gouging the wood. Follow by cleaning off every trace of remover with benzine or turpentine. If the color of the wood is what you wish, you can refinish with quick-drying varnish or in some other way.

QUESTION: What can I do in the way of refinishing a brass bed?

ANSWER: If you wish to paint the bed, go all over the metal with sandpaper to roughen it slightly, wipe it with turpentine and then apply one or two coats of enamel undercoater. Finish with a coat

Speakers at a national convention of salesmanship executives is over and that salesmanship, now at its lowest ebb, must devise new techniques. Lowest ebb is an understatement. Salesmanship, in the eyes of the customer, has become not only dead but mummified. In the period of shortages and wide customer demand the average salesman has ceased to function, except in the manner of a deepfreeze unit.

It has become an exploit similar to a polar dash to approach the fellow who was supposed to be interested in selling something.

The customer's greatest need in contacting a salesman has been proper defrosting equipment.

It has been years since we saw a clerk or salesman in many fields smile, register interest or show half of 1 per cent politeness toward the buyer. We have frequently had our lower extremities frozen on the trip from the store or agency entrance to the salesman's desk.

The old-fashioned American saleswhen a customer appeared, extend the glad hand, show a keen desire to be of service and cultivate good will or bust has largely disap-

We can remember away back when, even if the staff had no stock on hand, it never greeted a customer with that "less than the dust beneath my chariot wheels" manner, and when every salesman or clerk realized that there was no percentage in making a customer feel that a visit to a salesroom or store was like a trip through the

Too many salesmen today don't even bother to show routine civility. They have developed complete indifference to a high art. They give you the old "This is all so unnecessary and annoying" look if you ask more than two questions of 10 words each. Things Are Rough in Peru While the U. S. price index rose 8.9 per cent last year, living costs in Peru soared as high as the Andes—increasing 46.1 per cent. Between August, 1939, and December, 1947, living costs rose 69 per cent in the U.S. compared to 207 per cent in Peru, according to the Municipal Finance officers association. Among 11 nations for which comparable statistics are available, Canadian living costs have increased the least since before the war. Though the Canadian price index rose 14.9 per cent in 1947, it is only 45 per cent above the 1939 level of that country.





Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read

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
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
