



Refueling of B-29's In Flight Is Only **Matter of Minutes**

WASHINGTON. - Using a new high-speed method developed by the air force, B-29's on their way to long distance targets now can refuel in the air in a few minutes.

This range-stretching technique for the big war planes was hinted at by Air Secretary W. Stuart Symington before the senate armed services committee. He said B-29's utilizing the "most modern development" of the old airborne refueling system could, for example, bomb any part of Russia from bases in Alaska or Labrador. He made no further explanation, but said bombing units of the air force would have the new equipment by the first of

Other authorities indicated that tests already have been made with ompletely satisfactory results.

While declining to disclose the exact speed with which transfer of gasoline from a tanker plane to

Hugoton, Kansas on U. S. 54 near a bomber is made under the USAF method, one expert said:

"British fliers have developed a method of pumping gasoline from one plane to another at a rate of about 100 gallons a minute. USAF technique and equipment is designed to accomplish several times such speed."

This indicated that a B-29 could take on virtually a full load of gasoline in perhaps 15 minutes.

Speed is of paramount importance under wartime conditions. During fuel transfer, a bomber would be highly vulnerable to attack by enemy fighter planes. The faster the fuel is loaded, the less the time of

With a five-ton bomb load and using only the normal built-in tanks a B-29 fuels with about 5,500 gallons for an ordinary 12 hours of flying to a target, dropping bombs and reaching a friendly base. With extra tanks mounted in an unused bombbay, the fuel load can be increased to about 6,700 gallons.





Birth of Quintuplets in U.S. Is Possible Statistics Show

NEW YORK. - Despite the odds, some American mother most any day may have quintuplets who survive and grow.

By amazing coincidence, there have been at least three cases of quintuplets in the United States in the last 12 years. Two occurred only 20 months apart.

In each case, the quints were born prematurely and none lived more than half an hour. The chance that all five will survive is extreme-

What makes the births such a remarkable coincidence is that, by the rule that seems to apply to plural births, quintuplets would be expected once in about 50 million births! With the United States' birth rate around three and one-half million annually, quints would be expected mathematically only once in 15

The three cases of quints so close together, doesn't mean that this rule is wrong, or that it won't happen again soon. American quints could be born tomorrow, or not for

For the coincidence that brought so many quints in so short a time does not mean the rules were out of order. They are not expected to be applied to any one given year er even a few years. But taken over decades they are valid. Then the rates do not seem to vary much.

Animal Foundation Blames Enteritis for Slim Hogs

DES MOINES.-Finger of suspicion was pointed at the hog who eats his head off and still fails to put on the profitable pounds.

The American Foundation for animal Health warned that such boarders not only waste feed, but also may be victims and carriers of one of the dangerous types of swine enteritis.

"Even though they eat heartily, hogs with certain types of enteritis become thinner and thinner. Scouring may be severe. If they recover after several weeks, they suffer considerable loss of weight," the

'One of the worst dangers is that ailing hogs may spread the disease through the herd before they show marked illness. This makes it extremely important that a diagnosis be obtained at the first sign that anything is wrong.

"Sanitation and good manageuntil they are proved free of disease. Clean pastures, movable houses and scrubbed concrete floors will reduce the chances of infec-

Veterinarians find that medical treatment for enteritis is more satisfactory when the farmer has practiced preventive sanitation and segregation, the American Foundation said.

Antarctic Whaling Industry Helps Meet World Food Needs

PALO ALTO, CALIF. - The world's Antarctic whaling and a healthy postwar revival through increased use of whale oil for human consumption in oleomargarine.

That statement with facts assembled from governments throughout the wolrd, is set forth in a pamphlet by Dr. Karl Brandt, Stanford university professor of agriculture economics

Brandt wrote that in 1938 the governments of Europe felt tensions of the coming war and began to stockpile whale oil. It became a top priority item of basic war essentials, along with wheat and sugar.

He pointed out that its remarkable adaptability to storage made it even more sought after. One cargo of Antarctic whale oil was stored in the United States in 1941 and used in England in 1947. The oil was enough to supply the British population with their daily margarine ration for five weeks.

In the 1938-39 season the world's fleet of whaling vessels reached its nage of oil produced, Brandt wrote, At that time there were 36 factories afloat, 14 land stations in operation and 353 catcher boats being used. They caught 45,679 whales, which were converted into 3,007,409 barrels of oil





NewType of Wheat Resists Attacks Of Deadly Sawfly

BOULDER, COLO. - After years of research, a new development in wheat farming promises more food

This is Rescue Wheat, Rescue is the first wheat ever developed to withstand the attack of the destructive wheat stem sawfly which sporadically since 1900 has laid waste to untold millions of acres of precious grain in the Northwest and in Can-

The success of Rescue may turn out to be a milestone in farming. Last year it proved its resistance to the sawfly in extensive field This year there will be Rescue seed to plant one million acres in Montana and millions more in North Dakota and Canada. This means more bread, sorely needed at a critical time in world affairs.

Research Started Montana state college entomologists, agronomists and the natural scientists of the United States de partment of agriculture worked hard on the sawfly problem. When Rescue came along in October, 1944, they dropped everything to concentrate on the new find.

The following May, Montana got back 35 bushels which were planted on 27 acres. The yield in 1945 was That board with the rusty nail 877 bushels. Again Montana shipped Rescue to Arizona-100 bushels this time for further increase. The rest was planted at home. An unseasonable frost and a rail strike delayed Arizona's return shipment of 3,870 bushels until the first of June. It was dry and late but the wheat was sown. Within 24 hours rain fell, the first since the regular seeding time.

Wheat Crops Increase In 24 months a single bushel on land previously attacked by the sawfly had grown to 60,000 and Montana and North Dakota farmers were offering as high as \$25 a bushel for it. Last year Montana planted 78,000 acres in 19 counties, harvested 1,250,000 bushels, and North Dakota is fast developing its own seed sources. Rescue seed still is selling as high as \$6.50 per bushel.

The sawfly, given a few more years, might have wiped out huge sections of the nation's breadbasket. It damaged more than one million acres severely last year in Montana, spread over 30 counties. In two counties, practically every field was damaged severely. Forty to 100 per cent of the stems were cut off on essentially all of the acreage of the common bread wheats.

Army Will Blast Underground **Caverns to Check Strength**

WASHINGTON. - The army will undertake a series of tests in underground explosions, to determine the best construction to resist attack by guided missiles and modern heavy bombs, it was announced. The explosions will be set off in four types of soil and four types of rock,

Results are expected to guide Notice Of County army engineers in designing blastproof command posts and other vital military installations. It is hoped the data obtained will assist industrial engineers in determining the best type of construction for underground factories.

Trials will be conducted at the Dugway proving ground near Salt Lake City; near Castle Dale, Utah, and near Grand Junction, Colo. They will start with explosive charges of 320 pounds of TNT against a small structure. Installations and charges will mount progressively until a final explosion of 320,000 pounds of TNT is set off. Lieut. Gen. R. A. Wheeler, chief engineer, said, "The tests will provide technical knowledge based on actual experiments of the type of underground facilities to withstand modern bombs and guided mis-

General Wheeler emphasized that no atomic bombs would be used.

Congressman Submits Bill for **Funds to Purify Ocean Water**

WASHINGTON. - Scientific research to make fresh water from sea water is proposed by a bill before Congress introduced by Rep. Fletcher (Rep., Calif.) which would place the study in the hands of the

The measure would authorize the navy to operate one or more demonstration plants to produce potable water from sea water.

Desalting sea water has long been carried out by the ordinary distallation process on shipboard and other places. This requires considerable fixed equipment.

In the war several methods were developed for use on lifeboats. These required only such equipment as could be easily stored with other

supplies in the boats. The principle employed in these methods is what is known as ion exchangers. These cause an interchange of ions between the material in solution and the solid introduced. The process is used in water soft-

TAYLOR, TEXAS.—Elmore Torn, executive vice - president of the Texas Chemurgic council, is looking toward a square meal after more than a month on a grass diet.

Torn went on the diet of dehydrated cereal grasses as a means of expressing his individual support of the European aid plan.

He vowed to remain on the diet until the plan became a law. But even though the aid bill has been passed, Torn is still "tapering off" his grass diet.

He says whole milk will be supplemented and lean steaks added gradually until his daily calorie intake is stepped up from about 200 to

Torn said his loss of weight during the entire experiment was only about 18 pounds from his original

After a month of eating very little but dehydrated grass pills, Torn said chlorophyll from now on "will have a prominent place in my ration for cutting away the fat and hardening the muscles."

QUESTION: Several of our chairs have loose legs and rungs. Please advise how to repair.

ANSWER: Take the chairs apart and scrape off all the dried glue from the ends of the rungs and other parts, as well as from the holes into which the rungs fit. For each end of a rung or other loose part, cut a piece of an old "silk" stocking that will go over it and that can be forced into the hole. Use plenty of glue on the ends and drive the parts together tightly. The glue will soak through the "silk," which will form a tight packing. After drying, trim off the edges of the "silk" with a razor blade. In place of the "silk" you may be able to buy thin steel slips intended for tightening a chair.

QUESTION: We have single flooring, of four-inch, soft-wood planks, very badly worn in spots. We intend only to paint the floors. Later, would it be practical to lay plywood and cover that with inlaid linoleum blocks or carpeting? We do not wish a hardwood floor, for the children are so hard on

ANSWER: The linoleum laid over plywood should be very satisfactory. If the children are very young, I suggest that you lay a warm rug or carpeting on the floor, which would be warmer for the children to sit on. My own preference would be for a hardwood floor, however, as it will take a great deal of punishment if prop-

U. S.-Russia Events Reach Climax; Moscow Parley Continues Uneasily; Soviets Sever Consular Relations

THE AX WAS THERE **RUSSIANS:**

Virtually every avenue of public thought in the U.S. was teeming with Russians, shadows of Russians and a few Red convertibles.

There was a feeling, however, that the international commotion had reached its climax and was ready to start subsiding, partly because public interest, flagellated into a state of high excitement, couldn't stand the stress and strain of it all much longer.

Nevertheless, events having to do with Russia remained for the time being, at least, reasonably climactic: The Moscow talks were ready either to pay off or break down; Russia had broken off consular relations with the U.S.; Mrs. Oksana Kasenkina, the window - jumping Russian schoolteacher, had told the story of how she had been strong-

Moscow

In the Kremlin, where the three western ambassadors were trying to pound out some kind of tentative basis for negotiations with the Soviet Union, the Russians were playing their familiar game of hit-and-

U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith, British Representative Frank Roberts and French Ambassador Yves Chataigneau had been drudging through a series of meetings Soviet foreign minister.

Molotov, as usual, was hard, tough, adamant in his adherence to current Soviet policy on the Berlin and Germany problems. No progress was made; the three western representatives were dispirited, although they kept to their chore. The word was whispered about that this conference might break up in total

Then came a break, or so it appeared. Premier Stalin would meet again with the three envoys. In the ensuing discussions with Stalin hopes again were raised that the western powers might succeed in at least partially lifting the Berlin blockade and perhaps effect an area of agreement that could be used for a subsequent top-level meeting to iron out some of the major East-West differences.

But there were some who still could see the ax on the peace table. Somehow, there was a familiar pattern behind these negotiations that went something like this:

After Molotov had subjected his fellow conferees to hour after hour of his case-hardened refusals to come to terms, attempting by those tactics to wear his diplomatic opponents down, the scene was set for Stalin's return.

Stalin came on with his air of geniality and good will, apparently not only willing but eager to reach common ground. His attitude was so manifestly different from Molotov's that hopes again soared.

There was the danger. Lulled into optimism, the western envoys might be trapped into making concessions that should not be made. This same kind of Molotov-to-Stalin play had worked before.







Drug Aids Fight On Tuberculosis Rise For New

Streptomycin Is Hailed as 'First Real Relief' for Victims of Disease.

PHILADELPHIA. - The wonder drug, streptomycin, has become "the first real relief the medical profession ever has had for the treatment of tuberculosis." but the drug does not cure the disease, Dr. John B. Barnwell of the U. S. Veterans' administration stated before a meeting of specialists.

Dr. Barnwell, head of the tuberculosis branch of the Veterans' administration, said that streptomycin, an antibiotic drug, has greatly benefited the sufferers of tuberculosis in government hospitals, because it arrests annoying symptoms of the disease, and definitely suppresses the tuberculosis germ.

The doctor was one of several hundred specialists attending the meeting of the Eastern Section of American Trudeau society.

Used in 1,750 Cases. He said streptomycin's effectiveness was discovered in the treatment of 1,750 cases of tuberculosis in veterans' hospitals, and that of this highly selected group, 90 per cent showed marked improvement through use of the drug.

The improvement in this group was manifested by a lowering of temperature, gain in weight, increased appetite and decreased cough. These gains, however, ceased when the drug was stopped, Dr. Barnwell pointed out.

Dr. Arthur M. Walker, also of Veterans' administration, told the meeting of the year-long intensive study the administration has been making in use of streptomycin in tuberculosis.

Warning Given.
Dr. H. C. Hinshaw of the Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minn., warned the doctors against indiscriminate use of streptomycin. He said there was definite evidence that the drug was the best adjunct medicine has against tuberculosis, but that it should be administered only by a specialist in the disease.

"Indiscriminate use of penicillin -another antibiotic agent—has become almost a tradition," Dr. Hinshaw said, "and it has set a bad precedent for streptomycin. Many of us doctors are alarmed at the way some general practitioners are using the drug in treatment of this

"I have heard where patients are being treated in their home for the disease by doctors who are not experienced in tuberculosis. They are oing so under the false premise that streptomycin simplifies treatment of the disease. This is exactly the opposite, as use of the drug complicates treatment, and it is even more important that tuberculosis be treated by a specialist."


