Father And Son Funeral Service Held Tuesday

Funeral services for Louie Green, 58, and his son, Howard Norvell Green, 26 at the time of his passing while with the armed forces in the Philippine Islands, were conducted at the First Christian Church in Stratford Tuesday afternoon by Rev. John W. Reaves assisted by Rev. H. A. Nichols.

Louie Green was admitted to St. Anthony Hospital August 25 after being ill at his home for a few days. At intervals he seemed to be recovering his health only to sink into another relapse. Recently he had shown improvement. Tuesday of last week he underwent an operation but did not show signs of responding to treatment although his condition was not considered critical. A turn for the worse came Sunday and he passed away early Monday morning.

Mr. Green was born in Hunt County, Texas April 15, 1890, and moved with his parents to Sherman County in 1901. In young manhood he developed an interest in mechanical engineering. Associated with a car dealer in Dumas, he is credited with demonstrating the first cars sold in Sherman County.

He operated one of the first steam powered threshing machines operated in this section, and later changed over to power farming with the development of modern tractors and power farm machinery.

During the year he had been gradually failing in health. He recovered from an attack of pneumonia in time to supervise work on his farm during wheat harvest. Hardly had this work been completed when he was taken ill with a condition from which he was never to recover.

Howard Norvell Green, stationed at Clark Field in the Philippine Islands at the outbreak of hostilities in the recent war, served with the armed forces on Bataan, and was listed as Sherman County's first casualty. The local American Legion Post bears his name as a tribute to the sacrifice he made.

T/5 Howard Norvell Green was born and reared in Stratford. He graduated from the local schools and for a few years was engaged with his father in wheat farming. His love for mechanical aviation led to his enlistment with the Army Air Force. He was serving the last of this three year enlistment at the time World War II started.

Masonic honors for the father and military honors for the son were conducted at the Stratford cemetery where burial was made under the direction of Wilson Funeral Directors.

Survivors are Mrs. N. J. Green, Mrs. Louie Green and son, Fred Lee, Burk Green, Meritt Green, Mrs. Frank Smith and Mrs. J. W. Parsons.

THE FIGHTING PRESIDENT

U. S. Elects Truman, Democratic Congress

"Now maybe you would like to know why I have made this fight for the people. I will try to tell you. It is a matter of the things I believe in."

President Harry S. Truman spoke those words to the nation's voters on the night before election. And he believed hard enough to get himself re-elected to another term in the White House.

Perhaps he made a wish on a star, too; but in the end it was his own dogged, courageous fight that won him what amounted to a mandate to serve.

His 371 speeches and 31,500 miles of campaign travel, his will to win, his unflinching conviction that he would win and finally the justification by the people of his confidence made Mr. Truman's re-election a truly amazing political phenomenon.

He is President today despite the political experts, despite the public opinion polls, despite the lethargy and lack of support within his own Democratic party and despite all the logic that was advanced to show that a Republican administration was needed for the good of the nation.

Upset the Dope.

What happened? How did Harry Truman manage to upset the dope? Following the initial shock of sheer nationwide disbelief that he could have made it, it became apparent that there was not one but a combination of several factors operating unobtrusively in the President's favor.

The surprisingly heavy vote was a vital point. It has been axiomatic for a long time in the U. S. that as the number of voters increases so do the chances of the Democratic party.

High prices, high rents, the housing shortage—all of which Mr. Truman emphasized strongly in connection with his assaults on the "second worst" 80th congress—aided in turning the people away from a Republican administration.

Organized labor concentrated on getting its members out to vote against members of congress who had supported the Taft-Hartley law, and that circumstance rebounded to the President's benefit.

The fact that virtually no one realized—with the possible exception of Mr. Truman and a few of his loyal subordinates—was that the tide of the campaign had turned in the last two weeks before the election.

Last Lap Drive.

Mr. Truman's slugging, earthy drive during the last three weeks before November 2, and conversely, Dewey's insistence upon maintaining the bland, high-level tone to his campaign brought the President a lot of votes.

Finally, the farm states did not come in nearly as strongly Republican as they had been expected to. Mr. Truman had succeeded in planting a fear, in his Midwest campaigning, that the GOP would do away with farm support prices.

Thus, at 11:30 a. m. (EST) on November 3, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey conceded the election to President Truman, shortly after the pivotal states of Ohio, Illinois and California had definitely gone Democratic.

What can the nation expect from the next four years of Democratic government under President Truman?

Foreign Policy Stays.

U. S. foreign policy will remain basically unchanged, keeping as its mainpring the European Recovery Program. As a matter of fact, it would have retained its status quo under a Republican administration, too. But in any event it is reasonable to assume that most American voters cast their ballots not so much on the basis of foreign policy as on domestic issues.

Whether or not much, if anything, will be done about the Taft-Hartley act is more of a question than it seems.

In the first place, although the Democrats have a nominal major-

The Splinter Parties

Neither Henry Wallace's Progressives nor J. Strom Thurmond's Dixiecrats turned up with a decisive effect on the election. The total impact on the national electorate of Wallace's "love everybody, including Russia" philosophy was extremely small. He polled only slightly more than a million votes, made no great inroads in any state.

Thurmond and the southern state rights party carried four states, Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina, proving that the Democrats can win an election without a completely solid South.

ity in both houses of congress, it remains to be seen if they will have a dominating workable majority with enough strength, for instance, to repeal or amend the law.

Also, some Democratic congressmen are not convinced that the Taft-Hartley law is as black a thing as it has been painted.

One of the first demands that President Truman and the Democratic 81st congress will get from the people will be to do something about high prices and inflation. Action along this line probably will take the form of price controls—perhaps wage controls as well. Mr. Truman is likely to try again to get congress to pass the 10-point anti-inflation legislation he first elucidated a year ago.

Truman Receives 304 Electoral Votes to Win

During the dramatic early hours of the election returns, electoral votes seceded back and forth between Governor Dewey and President Truman, changing as the tide of popular votes from each of the states was tabulated.

In the final compilation, President Truman garnered a total of 304 electoral votes, 38 more than the 268 which were necessary for him to be elected.

Governor Dewey collected 189 electoral votes and J. Strom Thurmond drew the Dixiecrats votes of Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina which totaled 38. Wallace failed to get a single vote.

Truth Set to Music

Lesson for November 21, 1948

"THE opposite of poetry is not prose; it is science." There were poets in the world long before there were scientists, but that does not prove that poets are out of date.

Many people in our modern world think we could not get along without science but could well burn all the books of poetry. If we did, it would be a dreadful mistake. Poet and scientist each has his truth to see and to speak. We need them both. Certainly if we tried to burn all the poems we should have to destroy some of the best-loved parts of the Bible.

Not All Poets Have Long Hair
Some "practical" people sniff at poets for being peculiar. "Long-hairs" is a slang name for them as for other people who know something besides arithmetic.

As a matter of fact, many poets are very practical people themselves; engineers, farmers and soldiers all have written poetry. The poets of the Bible are of many sorts. If you will look into an edition of the Bible in which the poetic sections are printed as poetry is printed in other books, you will be impressed by the very large proportion of poetry, especially in the Old Testament. The new Study Bible or the American Revised Version or Moffatt's translation will show this at a glance.

These Bible poems are of various kinds. Some are war-songs (Judges 5), some are proverbs (the book of Proverbs), drama (Job), love-songs (the Song of Songs), odes (Isaiah 40), prayers (Psalm 16), hymns for public worship (the Psalms).

The writers were never professional poets, so far as we know. Of the poems which are this week's lesson Scripture, two were written by housewives, one by a sheep-herder, one or more by a soldier-king, one by a preacher (Habakkuk), and only one (Lamentations) possibly by a professional poet. The original Hebrew book of Lamentations does not claim Jeremiah for its author; but if he was the writer, then it was written by the most practical man of his time.

World's Greatest Hymn Book

"LET me write a nation's songs, and I care not who writes their laws," said a famous man. The same thing can be said about religion. "Let me write a church's hymnbook, and I care not who writes their theologies."

The hymns our mothers loved, the hymns we heard before we heard any other kind of poetry, the hymns that we have learned by heart and that become a part of our minds—these mean far more to most people than all the printed creeds.

Now the Christian religion is a singing religion. Our very first hymnbook was the Book of Psalms, and all the hymnals since, down to the present day, grew out of this one book in the Bible. It is the greatest hymnbook in the world; not the longest nor the oldest, but the greatest in its influence for good upon mankind.

Poetry Was in Jesus Blood

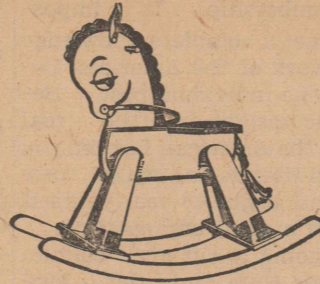
OF OUR Lord Jesus himself, it truly can be said, poetry was in his veins. He came of a poetic family. His most famous ancestor, David, was a poet; another royal ancestor, Hezekiah, wrote poetry. The book he knew best, the Old Testament, was full of poetry. His own mother Mary, before he was born, sang a song of her own making, so beautiful that it is still sung in Christian churches and loved the world around.

When Jesus died on the cross, two of the last seven sentences that came from his lips were quotations from the Psalms. The poetry of his people was in his blood, for in his last agony the words that came from his breaking heart were words first spoken by the poets of the Bible long ago.

So it is always. "Truth in song will tarry long." Today and always, the parts of the Bible which are most cherished, the parts most often learned by heart, the parts which we carry with us to the valley of the shadow of death, are the truths set to music, long centuries ago, by inspired men who knew how to clothe truth with garments of shining and immortal loveliness.

With Christmas just a few short weeks away we are all beginning to make out card lists and gift lists and to look around for the gift that is exactly right for each person on our lists. In the Veteran's Hospital in Amarillo there are men who are also thinking of the gifts they would like to send to their loved ones. Some of these men have been hospitalized for many months or years and have families trying to live on their pitiful inadequate pensions, if they even receive a pension. Any outside income for many of these men has long since stopped. They also have a problem of how they could buy these gifts even if their money were plentiful as many of them are confined to wheel chairs or beds.

The American Legion Auxilliary feels that we owe these men a solution to their problem and has worked out a plan which has apparently been very satisfactory for several years. The Amarillo Auxilliary conducts a gift shop right in the hospital during the early part of December. The ambulatory patients go right to the gift shop and make their selections and for the bed ridden patients the gifts are taken right to the bedside on carts. The women who work in the gift shop itself describe the reactions of our veterans when they come in to make their selections in such a manner that it brings a lump to one's throat. These gifts are furnished by the Auxilliary units throughout the district.

At the last meeting of the Stratford Auxilliary, plans were laid for the gifts to be sent from here. We decided that there were many of you who do not belong to the Legion or Auxilliary who would be happy to have the opportunity to do something for these men who have done so much for us. Any of you who would like to help may do so by furnishing a gift or gifts of your own selection or by donating money with which the Auxilliary will purchase a gift for you.

The ladies in charge of the gift shop in Amarillo have compiled a list of suggested items and if you are interested in helping

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with this program you may see this list and get further information at the Bond Studio or McIntosh Dry Goods.

All of you who belong to the Auxilliary or are eligible for membership are cordially invited to attend our next meeting. We really feel that the gift shop project described above is worth while and immediately following its completion we have another project we want to be a big success. We're going to try to have an interesting program for the coming year and with a little effort on the part of each member we can achieve some interesting and beneficial goals. ballot and that used in Texas is that a small perforated strip across the top of the ballot is numbered. After the secret ballot is voted and registered, the numbered strip is torn away and the ballot placed in the ballot box.

The secret ballot makes it impossible for any one at any time to trace the manner in which a vote is cast.

Action of the legislature to pass a law providing for such a ballot in the next session is expected if the present drive continues.

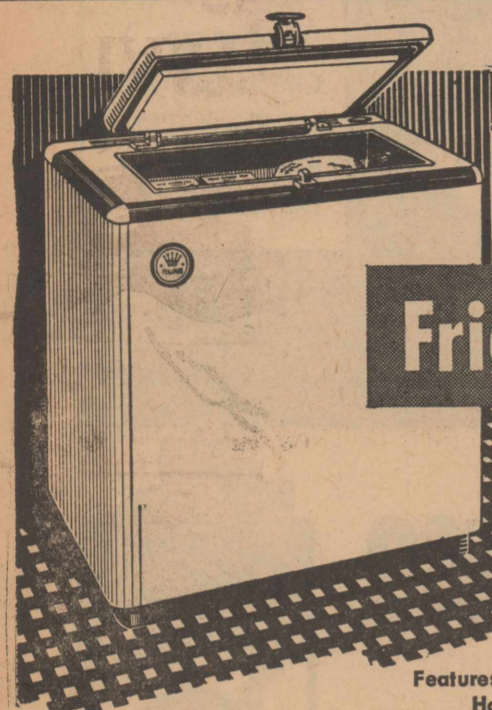
