# Ex-son-in-law charged; blood, car only clues

WINNIE, Texas (AP) - A former son-in-law of a couple allegedly abducted from their blood-spattered home here was arraigned Friday on five counts of aggravated kidnapping. officials said.

A search by mounted law enforcment officers for five members of the Bishop Phillips family - missing since Saturday night — was called off Friday night because of darkness.

Justice of the Peace Mary Dugat set bonds of \$100,000 on each count for Ovid Joseph Dugas, Jr., 32, in connection with the family's disappearance in Winnie, about 25 miles southeast of Beaumont

Chambers County Sheriff Doil Pound said he "anticipates foul play" and he is "looking for bodies.

About 150 persons gathered outside the Chambers County sheriff's office in Winnie Friday night where authorities were questioning Dugas.

When taken before Judge Dugat, Dugas denied any knowledge of the disappearance of his former rela-

lawn in the Port Acres area of Port Arthur when he was arrested.

He told reporters following his ar rest that he had been in the area over

Judge Dugat said a statement to police by someone "well known to Dugas" allegedly linked Dugas to the disappearance.

Members of the family reported missing are Phillips, 64; his wife Ester, 66; a son, Elmer, 31, his wife Martha and their four-year-old son, Jason. The younger couple was visiting from Woodward, Okla., for the July 4th weekend, according to another son, George.

Authorities have intensified a search for Dugas' estranged wife, Mary. Herman Franzen, a local rice farmer and community leader for whom Bishop had worked for 30 years, told The Associated Press Mary had not kept in contact with her parents for about two years.

Mounted deputies searched near the Phillips' small frame house and belonging to the younger Phillips was found for clues to the whereabouts of the missing family.

The car was found near a bridge over a bayou located about 12 miles southeast of the house.

There was splattered blood throughout the small frame house when George returned home from a weekend trip to Houston, which is about 50 miles west, late Saturday. A coffee pot had bubbled dry. Chicken was burning in a skillet, the television was blaring and nothing appeared to

The family was last seen Saturday

about 8: 25 p.m. It was not until Monday that Sheriff Pounds began a search for the missing family. Family members have questioned why law enforcement officials did not act sooner

Another son, Clifton Phillips of Houston, told The Associated Press that deputy sheriff Robert Ogden 'largely ignored' the initial report.

"George said Ogden told him to call back when he heard something," Clif-

## Russians will try jailed Jewish activist on charges of treason

MOSCOW (AP) — The Kremlin disclosed Friday it will try jailed Jewish activist Anatoly Shcharansky on Monday for high treason. Washington issued a blunt warning that the fate of the 30-year-old computer programmer will have an important impact on U.S.-Soviet relations.

Shcharansky, accused in the Soviet press of spying for the CIA, will go on trial in Moscow the same day that another Jewish dissident leader. Alexander Ginzburg, stands trial in the city of Kaluga, 100 miles from here, on charges of "anti-Soviet agitation and propaganda.

The scheduling of Shcharansky's trial date had been anticipated. A report by the Soviet news agency Tass setting the date for Monday included the first Kremlin confirmation that Shcharansky is charged with treason by espionage, which carries a maximum penalty of death.

The short, balding Shcharansky, a leader of the Soviet Jewish emigration movement, was arrested April 15. 1977, after an article in the government newspaper Izvestia accused him of participating in a Moscow spy ring operated by the Central Intelligence Agency through American diplomats and journalists here.

The U.S. Embassy later denounced the article as "a classic piece of misinformation." President Carter said he was completely convinced that Shcharansky never had any relationship with the CIA, and Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance urged Moscow to call off the trial.

After Friday's announcement, a State Department spokesman, in a statement he said was cleared with President Carter, told reporters: "In our view, the fate of Mr. Shcharansky and Mr. Ginzburg will be an important indicator of the attitude of the Soviet government, both with regard to observing its commitments under the Helsinki Final Act and to promoting a healthy atmosphere for the constructive development of U.S.-Soviet

Western diplomatic sources in Moscow said the timing of the trials just before next week's resumption of strategic arms limitation talks was a "ham-handed" move by the Soviets that could dampen U.S.-Soviet detente at a critical point in the negotia-

# Food prices swing up sharply, unemployment at 5.7 percent

WASHINGTON (AP) - The cost of food rose sharply last month to lead another increase in wholesale prices. but the nation's unemployment rate dipped to 5.7 percent, the government said Friday

The Carter administration said the two Labor Department reports illustrate the need to fight inflation while showing "striking progress" in the battle against unemployment, which dropped from 6.1 percent of the work force to 5.7 percent.

Wholesale prices rose 0.7 percent in June, the same as in May, but wholesale food prices began accelerating

The prices grocers pay for food went up 1.1 percent in June, more than double the 0.5 percent gain the month before. These increases usually show up within a few months at retail stores. Prices turned up sharply for poul-

try, pork, beef, veal, vegetables, fruit and rice. Prices declined for eggs, vegetable oils and sugar. Prices of automobiles went up more

slowly than in May while prices of furniture went up faster. Gasoline prices were lower.

Although food prices were rising at the latter stages of processing, food price increases at earlier stages - at the farm and warehouse — appeared

Charles Schultze, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, said that inflation, as reflected in Friday's report, "is clearly too high. The numbers emphasize once again the need to pursue the administration's anti-inflation program vigorously.

Teenagers accounted for about half of the 400,000 decline in unemployment for June, as their jobless rate dropped from 16.5 to 14.2 percent.

However, the gain in teen-age employment was concentrated among whites, who accounted for roughly 95 percent of the June job gains among teen-agers, the department said. Job lessness among white teen-agers fell from 13.8 percent to 11.6 percent, which department analysts called a very large drop.

The House Ways and Means and Constitutional Amendments committees held public hearings Wednesday and Thursday, expecting at any time to hear from Briscoe. Thursday night they quit and went home.

The July 10 session time is almost to the day a year from Briscoe's last special session, an 11-day meeting that began July 11 to consider school finance problems passed over by the 1977 regular session.

That special session ended with passage of a \$954 million school finance bill, which included reduction of the local share of school cost by \$341 million. Briscoe and others hoped the \$341 million would be passed on to local taxpayers. Very few school districts took the trouble

The 1977 special session also included an aborted House-Senate hearing of perjury charges against associate justice Don Yarbrough of the Texas Supreme Court. The hearing was halted when Yarbrough resigned, and

when he asked legislators for a mandatory 55 miles-per-hour speed limit in Texas to match the federal law. It passed in a few days.

In his June 30 announcement, Briscoe named only one subject he particularly wanted to lay before legislators - a proposed constitution change that any new taxes must be approved by two-thirds of the legislature.

This drew opposition from Hobby, Clayton and Attorney General John Hill, the Democratic gubernatorial nominee. They said tax bills in Texas usually pass by a scant majority

Later, Briscoe reportedly offered Hobby and Clayton in closed session a plan to dedicate one cent of the state's four-cent sales tax to school districts that would reduce their property taxes by at least 30 percent. The legislative leaders, and Hill, immediately saw this would use up almost all of the expected \$3 billion "surplus" in anticipated future revenue and leave little for the 1979 Legislature to appro-

Briscoe said June 30 that his formal session call essentially would include items he supported in his unsuccessful campaign against Hill, such as:

- Repeal the 4 percent sales tax on utility bills. - Increase the inheritance tax ex-

emption from \$25,000 to \$200,000. - Reduce property taxes in school districts, probably with a mandatory \$5,000 homestead exemption from local school taxes for the elderly.



## Flood watch continues as residents return home

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP) - A flash flood watch was cancelled Friday as most of the 5,000 persons eva-cuated by heavy flooding in Rochester returned to their homes, but flooding 140 miles to the northwest killed three more persons.

The National Weather Service is-

sued a flash flood watch for southeastern Minnesota, including Rochester, for the second straight day as more thunderstorms moved into the state. However, Friday night the service

said the storms failed to develop and cancelled the watch.

The death toll in the Rochester area stood at five after torrential rains caused the Zumbro River to surge more than 10 feet over its banks Wednesday night and Thursday. On Wednesday night, the weather service said nine inches of rain fell.

The Zumbro dropped back within its banks Friday and power was restored to 90 percent of Rochester, a city of 58,000 persons about 90 miles south of Minneapolis. A 100-man state National Guard unit that watched four flooded shopping centers overnight was sent home

Heavy rains of up to four inches drenched the western and northern Minneapolis suburbs early Friday, and for several hours blocked U.S. 12 the main western artery out of Minneapolis.

Power was knocked out in a wide area of the western suburbs when a substation was flooded. Two large manufacturing plants closed for the day because of the flood.

An explosion and fire ripped apart a one-story concrete business building adjacent to a shopping center about 4 a.m. Friday. Officials said the blast was believed to have been caused by a buildup of leaking natural gas in the flooded basement.

In Austin, a city of about 27,000 persons about 40 miles southwest of here, the flood situation also was easing. There, the Red Cedar River surged over its banks Thursday and forced about 50 families from their homes. About 10 businesses were

## Common Market to push for U.S. energy plan

BREMEN, West Germany (AP) -The Common Market nations closed a two-day summit meeting Friday with a vague pledge to stimulate their economies but clearly determined to press President Carter for a U.S. energy program in return.

The nine European leaders drew up their give-and-take plan as a strategy for hard bargaining at the July 16-17 economic conference in Bonn with Carter and the leaders of Japan and

The leaders pledged to reduce their dependence on imported energy from about 60 percent of their current needs to 50 percent by 1985.

West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt left no doubt that at the Bonn summit the European partners will push the United States for a reduction in its own dependence on foreign oil -43 percent of its consumption.

The Europeans also are expected to press Japan to reduce its heavy trade surplus with Western Europe - the imbalance between its huge export volume to the Common Market and

smaller import volume from Eu-

rope's richest nation and host of the two-day meeting, also announced virtual agreement on a "a most major By HARRY F. ROSENTHAL and imaginative scheme" for reworking Europe's currency system.

The plan, pushed by Schmidt and French President Valery Giscard d'Estaing, calls for each participating nation to contribute 20 percent of its monetary reserves to a central fund to support the value of European currencies. Backers said that speculation against the U.S. dollar or any European currency on world money markets could be countered with some \$30 billion in reserve funds if necessary.

But British Prime Minister James Callaghan said his nation is concerned that the system could hurt the dollar, and that British voters could oppose the arrangement

The other summit participants were Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands, Denmark, Ireland and Luxembourg.

## DOT testing approves Schmidt, government chief of Euope's richest nation and host of the questioned Chrysler cars

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Transportation Department said Friday it found no problems with the stability and control of Chrysler Corp.'s Dodge Omni and Plymouth Horizon cars and said dangers described by Consumer's Union have no significance "in real world use."

But the consumer testing organization, which rated the two cars "unacceptable" last month, called the report "extremely premature" and said it has learned of accidents attributed to the steering and handling problems it described

Chrysler Corp. praised the government findings. Company spokesman Marty Whitmeyer said the cars "have now been put through some of the most extensive tests ever conducted by both the U.S. and Canadian government safety agencies. And these

Craddick agreed with Snelson about two of the items to be considered: the inheritance tax exemption and repeal of the utility tax.

MIAMI (AP) — On Independence Day, I watched a mugging. Three youths savagely beat the co-operator of the new Portside Cafe in Bicentennial Park.

There were 50 people in the crowd. At first we all watched and did nothing. It looked like a one-man robbery attempt, so I backed away and waited for the police, hoping they would arrive before things got worse. It was to be a long wait.

Only when I saw the man lying on the tile floor in a puddle of blood did I decide to get involved. For the rest of that night, and even as I write this. I had strong feelings of shame and guilt because I didn't do more.

As I walked out of the park after the incident was over, these feelings became stronger and I fought back

I had been interviewing the co-operator, Harvey Green, at the counter of the cafe when a teen-age boy with the fright of a wild animal in his eyes came from the back of the cafe clutching a handful of bills.

Green's partner, Alan Porter, screamed "Get him!" and pinned the youth to the counter directly in front

Porter and another employee held the youth and screamed for someone to call the police.

Another youth started screaming at Green to let his brother go. He cursed Green and threatened to come back and shoot him. Green stood calmly in front of the cafe blocking the youth's view of his "brother."

After walking around, cursing and screaming like a mad dog ready to strike, the second youth ripped a three-foot long two-by-four from a nearby potted plant and brandished it

I walked closer, to within 15 feet of

Green and the youth. I felt twinges of

Would I join in and try to save Green if he were attacked? Would I fight and risk my life for a man I hardly knew?

I couldn't answer these questions, but I edged a little closer as the youth threatened Green with the stick for more than two minutes.

Like a flash, the youth charged Green and swung the stick at him, hitting him in the shoulder. Green came at the youth, got hit again, but took the stick from him and tossed it aside.

As the pair wrestled on the ground, I thought the danger was over. More than 10 minutes had passed. I felt the police would be there any moment.

From nowhere, another youth joined the attack against Green. When the fourth youth started toward them and got within five feet of them, I looked directly at him and said: Stay away.

He backed off. I looked back at Green. He was getting the worst of the fight but did not appear seriously

Should I help now? No, not yet. I didn't know how many of the

youths' friends were in the crowd or if they were armed. For the first time, I began to fear for my life. Where the hell were the police?

Would they ever come? In less than five seconds, the attack turned from brutal to vicious. One youth kicked Green in the face, then the bigger youth I had told to stop ran in and gave Green a crunching kick to

Green collapsed on the patio in a puddle of blood. I was struck with shock, fear, hate — then compassion for Green.

I made up my mind the instant I saw the blood. It was instinct that moved me forward. No one would touch Green again.

I walked calmly toward Green, who had stopped moving and was uncon-Two of the youths ran off. The third

backed away, then started coming forward like a place kicker ready to kick a field goal.

I thought he wanted to get one final crushing blow at Green's face - a kick that I felt could have killed the

I looked at the attacker. I didn't say anything. I just looked at him. He looked up at me, stopped, then ran

into the crowd. Green was bleeding from the mouth and from two huge cuts on his face.

I was angry at the crowd, still gawking from 20 feet away, but not

helping. I screamed at them.
"You stood and watched while this man nearly got killed. Why didn't anyone heip? Why the hell didn't anyone help? Where the hell are the police? Where are the guards?"

# Barriers bridged by Bible series

NEW YORK (AP) - Gradually, one by one, the volumes roll out, 30 of them so far, with 30 more to go, in one of the longest, most comprehensive publishing ventures on the Bible ever

The library-sized volume, called "The Anchor Bible," blazed an ecumenical trail at its outset 22 years ago that since has become a common pattern.

It enlisted Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish experts in their shared craft and objective: to bring out just what the old, Biblical books sought to say when first recorded in

their original settings.
"That commonality of Biblical scholarship preceded the ecumenical movement," observes the Rev. Dr. David Noel Freedman, professor of Biblical Studies at the University of Michigan and general editor for the

"It bridges all denominational barriers, crosses all the lines." When the project first originated in 1956, under the former general editor-

"But he saw it work with his own eyes," says Freedman, an associate of Albright, who died in 1971 with Freedman taking over the editorship. "It was revolutionary when it began. But now it's true of all Biblical scholarship. It's become a common enter-

Marking 750,000 in sales of the series so far, the publisher, Sam Vaughan of Doubleday & Co. gave a luncheon for Freedman last week, with the final lap of the long endeavor beginning to come in sight, expected by the late 1980s, three decades after its inception.

In count of volumes, "we are now just passing the halfway mark," said editor Eve F. Roshevsky, who has the task of nudging along the output from the international, interfaith team of authors.

Each, in the project's approach, takes on a Biblical book of his particular interest, translates it freshly from the original language and, in a volume or more devoted to it, offers

accompanying commentary and notes putting it in context of its historical situation, its culture, linguistic nuances, authorship and purposes.

Unlike most of the modern surge of Bible translations produced by groups of scholars, the Anchor specialists individually render their translations of the books. "The results are uneven like the Bible itself," Freedman said. "The books originally were produced by different writ-

In regard to the supplementary in-formation and detailed exegesis, the work is somewhat akin to the 12-volume Interpreter's Bible published by Abingdon. However, the Anchor series is more voluminous.

The material draws on recent archeological finds such as the Dead Sea Scrolls, and lately on the newly turned up Ugaritic tablets of ancient Ebla, predating the Bible, but mentioning matters cited in it.

The tablets are "the most important find ever made" in relation to the Bible, Freedman said. "They provide hard information that we've never had before in a way that cannot be challenged."

Freedman cited the tablets' mention of Biblical cities whose existence often has been questioned because no previous reference to them ever had

been found outside the Bible. "Now we have absolute incontrovertible evidence they existed," he said. "Behind those Biblical stories of eras before the first books of the Bible ever were written down are solid historical facts."

He said past assessments of the Bible have been "far too critical and skeptical. We've been chastened." He said he detected a conservative shift in scholarly analysis of the Bible supporting its reliability "in terms of its historical roots."

As a sign of that shift, Alex Leipa, Doubleday's general editor of religious books, said the Anchor series recently has sold more heavily through conservative evangelical outlets than in liberal circles.

As to why, Vaughan suggested it may simply reflect a "healthy, zestful engagement with religion."

## Tales of 'snail wars

LOS ANGELES - You've probably heard of Star Wars, but what about the snail wars?

Late last year the California Department of Transportation began turning loose thousands of cannibalistic snails in its latest effort to eradicate the large brown snail that gobbles up vegetation along roads and freeways.

The cannibals, Rumina decollata, a small, spiralshaped gastropod, were pitted against Helix aspersa, bane of gardens everywhere. The smaller snails hav little interest in dining off the shrubbery. just off other snails, said Dr. Ted Fisher, a University of California at Riverside biologist, who raised the snails and will monitor their progress under a \$90,000 three-year grant from Caltrans.

The smaller snails occur naturally in California in small numbers, Fisher said, but this is the first time an intentioned effort has been made to sic them on their larger brethren. The snails have been loosed in study areas throughout Southern California to find out if they can be used as a nonpoisonous means of snail control.

"We've got a way to go before we can really tell what will happen," Fisher said. "We need a better measure of what decollata will do."

Fisher said both species of snail were introduced into this country from their original habitat in the Mediterranean, but, while it is known that Helix was brought in by snail-loving gourmets, no one is quite surehow Rumina decollata got here.

Aside from just eating away, Fisher hopes the small snails will increase in number, forming little pockets of hungry hunters.

More than \$6 million in construction work had been done when Sadat ordered it halted May 28 and the total figure could easily run to more than \$15 million when all expenses are tallied, Munk claimed.

"Egypt's reputation is at stake here." said David Gilmour, chairman of the Hong Kong-based hotel subsidiary. "If investors are seen to be fairly treated, then a policy of further investment is viable."

Despite private assurances from top Egyptian officials that there is no ill will toward South Pacific Properties, a parliamentary committee re-cently recommended seizure of the joint-venture company's assets and records. It claimed there was a "grave violation of economic, legal and administrative practices by the company and its representatives.'

The amount of compensation will be determined in negotiations now under way, but Egypt's planning minister, Abdel Razak Abdel Meguid, said in an interview, "Everybody gets his money back. That has been decid-

Meguid claimed the resort was "not an investment" and was not typical of other open-door projects.

The planning minister contended many initial investors merely tested the waters with "quick-buck" consumer projects or land speculation schemes. Now, he added, Egypt was attracting more productive, though less glamorous, investment such as poultry production and agribusiness projects.

Egypt's investment authority says that since the open-door project began, \$1.37 billion in foreign capital has been committed to 744 projects. About a quarter of them are already producing.

"When the Egyptian government shows concern about its sacred heritage, immediately the accusation is made about our seriousness to the open door," Meguid said. "I think this is where the unfairness comes in."

A groundswell of public opinion arose against the project after environmentalists claimed it would despoil the pyramids area. Opposition politicians fanned the flames with accusations of corruption and brib-

"To prove to them that none of this was true, the president took this step," a senior Egyptian official said. "It will scare off foreign investors for a while; we knew it, but they will see that we will accommodate the compa-

Ismail Osman, an executive of the contracting firm that had a \$5 million contract to install utilities and roads for the resort, said, "It is 100 percent true that how this is settled will affect investment."

But even those without direct involvement in the project feel the sudden cancellation of a signed-and-sealed contract that had the government's blessings will have an adverse effect on potential investors.

WASHINGTON (AP) Supreme Court Justice William J. Brennan Jr. on Friday denied a request by Chicago parks officials to block a Nazi demonstration scheduled for Sunday.

Brennan issued a brief order refusing to grant a stay, but did not explain his reasons. The stay had been sought by the Chicago Park District to temporarily bar a rally planned by a Nazi group for Marquette Park in southwest Chicago, an area of racial tension.

The park district had asked for the stay until a lower court could rule on the merits of its appeal of a ruling by U.S. District Judge George N. Leighton permitting the demon-


On Wednesday, Leighton held that the park district's requirement that the National Socialist Party of America obtain \$50,000 in insurance violated the group's right of freedom of

# Borg, Connors expect knockdown net brawl

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Sweden's Bjorn Borg bids for his third straight Wimbledon men's tennis title today against aggressive Jimmy Connors, and he expects the match to be a knockdown brawl.

"Every match we play goes down to the final point," the 22-year-old Swede said. "We play the same kind of game. Both of us hit the ball very hard. Jimmy is playing well. I will have to be on top of my game to beat him.'

He should know. It took him five long, gruelling sets to get by

the American in the final last year. And, although Connors was hospitalized briefly earlier this year with mononucleus, he isn't showing the slightest ill

effect. Borg, who won Italian and French crowns on clay this year, has been dazzling the tennis world since he was 16, destroying opposition with a hard topspin forehand and a two-fisted backhand, the ball coming his racket like a bullet.

A stolid Scandinavian, he shows little emotion on the Perry, the gray-haired British star of another era, the last man to attain three Wimbledon crowns in a row (1934-35-36). "He is almost inhuman."

Connors, also a boy wonder at 18 and a firebrand given to court explosions, has mellowed into a man of 25 with a checkered tennis career.

Hailed as the world's best in 1974 after sweeping both the Wimbledon and U.S. Open titles with straight-set victories over veteran Ken Rosewall, Connors has suffered from a runner-up

complex in recent years. He lost to Arthur Ashe in the

1975 final here. Connors beat Borg for the U.S. crown two years ago but lost in the finals in 1975 to Manuel Orantes and to Guillermo Vilas in 1977.

Borg was a slight favorite with London's legalized bookies, but the final match dropped to even money after Connors crushed the well-liked Vitas Gerulaitis in the semifinals. The top-seeded Borg beat unseeded Tom Okker 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 in the semis.

Connors holds an 8-5 career

edge over his Swedish opponent but Borg has won four of their last five meetings

'My form is real good," Conners said. "I am bigger, stronger and have more experience. Win, lose or draw, I've done my job getting ready for

"I'm hoping for the best and am prepared for the worst." Connors makes no attempt to excuse the boisterous court behavior of his younger days but boasts that he has matured.

The two-for-four night raised Hernandez' batting average to .342 and after the loss of Buckner, you can bet no one is more grateful than Saul.



"We're going to be a good football team," Switzer declared. "Injuries are, of course, the key. If we stay healthy, we'll be good. We're experienced and have a great nucleus of senior athletes."

And a good number of those senior athletes are not Oklahoma born-andbred. Much of the Sooners' hopes will rest on the shoulders of an outstanding crop of former Texas schoolboy

"Four years ago we signed 13 of the top 30 Texas bluechip athletes," Switzer said. "Now bluechippers don't always live up to expectations once they're in college, but every one of these guys have started at one time or another at OU and many of them have been three-and four-year start-

Included in that crop of Texas prepsters who form the core of the Sooner squad are Odessa Permian's Daryl Hunt, an all-star linebacker, tight end Victor Hicks from Lubbock, and super kicker Uwe von Schamann from Ft. Worth.

In fact, the Sooners will take the field in the fall with a 100 percent Texan offensive backfield. Quarterback Thomas Lott hails from San Antonio. Fullback Kenny King spent his high school days in Claren The two Sooner halfbacks, Hooks Billy Sims and David Overstreet of Big Sandy, rank second and third, respectively, on the all-time Texas high school rushing charts.

"I really enjoy West Texas, Switzer laughed, "especially during recruiting season. We've gotten some fine football players out of West

"I think some folks get a little nervous when we come south of the Red River."

He admits the yearly talk of national championships builds some additional pressure and makes his job a little tougher, "but I think it's a healthy situation. It's just part of the game at Oklahoma. You just have to keep the proper perspective, recruit well and coach well.

"I try not to think about national championships. We are one of the few places that have the opportunity to compete for it each year, but those things only come along about once every 20 years. It's about a 1000-to-

"Alumni expect a title all the time. We just have to educate them to a realistic approach," he smiled. "I

# NBA stamps team switch

CHICAGO (AP) - The National Basketball Association's Board of Governors overwhelmingly approved Friday the exchange of ownership of the Boston Celtics and the Buffalo Braves and the transfer of the Braves' franchise to San Diego.

A major trade between the teams was announced after the two-hour session, with the Celtics receiving guard Nate Archibald and forwards Billy Knight and Marvin Barnes.

They sent forward Kermit Washington, center Kevin Kunnert and guard Freeman Williams, a first round draft choice this year, to San

Boston forward Sidney Wicks also is expected to move to San Diego but final discussion on that is not expected for at last two weeks.

Irving Levin, a Los Angeles film magnate who gained control of the Celtics in 1975, is the new owner of the relocated Braves.

John Y. Brown, who owned the Braves for one season, will take charge of the Celtics with Harry Mangurian, who also was co-owner in Buffalo.

One vote was taken on both the ownership swap and transfer of the Braves to San Diego. It was 21-1, said NBA Commissioner Larry O'Brien.

The Board of Governors also approved overwhelmingly realignment of the league. San Diego will play in a six-team Pacific Divison. Then NBA Champion Washington Bullets will

move from the Central to the Atlantic Division and the Detroit Pistons will go from the Midwest to the Central Division.

O'Brien refused to say who voted against the ownership exchange and franchise shift.

The complex maneuvering left unsettled the future of Red Auerbach, the Celtics' general manager and former coach. Brown said he had made an "attractive offer" to Auerbach and hoped to have a response within two

Before the board's actions Friday, Auerbach had expressed reservations about staying with an owner who had not consulted him on a trade. But Brown said it would have been

improper to have discussed the trade with Auerbach before he gained control of the club. "It would have been unethical of me to talk to Red because I didn't hold the

franchise," Brown said. "I would have liked to have talked to Red." Auerbach, whose contract with the Celtics expires Aug.1, said he has other offers in basketball. Levin said he was considering con-

ducting a contest in the San Diego area to find a new nickname for the Braves. He also said he had not decided on a coach to replace Cotton Fitzsimmons, who became head coach of the Kansas City Kings after the 1977-78 season.

"I have some thoughts which I would rather not make public at the present time," Levin said. He said he might make a decision within a few days.

San Diego is getting its second NBA franchise this decade. The Rockets played there until their move to Houston in 1971, the year after the Braves joined the NBA.

"San Diego in the last two or three years has just grown tremendously. Not only that, but the type of people who moved there are from big cities back East" and are potential fans of the San Diego team, Levin said.

He also said San Diego area residents have "committed to purchase" more than 5,000 season tickets to the team's games in the San Diego Sports Arena.

"This is such a complicated transaction it would take almost an hour to discuss all aspects of it," said Brown. He added that neither he nor Levin would have agreed to the ownership swap if they had not agreed on the player trade.
"The Sidney Wicks situation is ta-bled for another two to four weeks.

Irv has certain rights to acquire him and the Celtics have certain rights to deliver him," said Brown. Asked if Wicks might remain with

the Celtics next season, Brown said, "There is that possibility, but I'd say at this point it's unlikely." He added that Wicks' contract was not a stumbling block to the deal.

# Martina fulfills highest ambition

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) -Stateless Martina Navratilova, who left her Communist homeland to play tennis in the west, fulfilled her highest ambition Friday by defeating Chris Evert 2-6, 6-4, 7-5 for the singles championship at Wimbledon.
The Czech left-hander — "I shall

always be Czech, no matter what," she said - came from behind in the final set to win one of the closest Wimbledon women's finals since World War II.

THE TENNIS was not the greatest ever seen on center court, and in the end, the match was decided by errors. But the duel swung back and forth and kept the 14,000 fans in doubt until the last shot. They could be in store for another

see-saw battle Saturday when defending champion Bjorn Borg takes on Jimmy Connors in the men's final. The Swede crushed the American last year but only after fighting through five gruelling sets.

Navratilova, 21, won a first prize of \$30,780 and vindicated her decision, made three years ago, to quit her country to further her career. She still must wait another two years before she can become a U.S. citizen.

"She has been through a lotfriend hurt and loneliness," said Evert, the girl who befriended her when she first settled in America. "But she is tougher than I am at this point, this

NAVRATILOVA'S powerful serveand-volley game made her an obvious candidate for success on Wimbledon's grass, although this was her first appearance in the final. But when Evert — twice a Wimbledon champion — went from 0-2 to 4-2 in the final set, it seemed that her coolness and experience would prevail.

Navratilova's volleys brought her back into the match, and at 5-5 the incredible happened. Evert, the ice-cool slugger who keeps going forever from her baseline, suddenly lapsed and hit four straightforward shots three forehands and a backhand out of court and dropped her service.

THAT LEFT Navratilova needing only to hold service for the title, and she did it without dropping a point. In fact Evert scored only 1 point in the last three games.

"If I was going to lose I didn't want to be tentative," Evert said after-ward. "I kept attacking and going for my shots.

From the start, Evert's task was to keep her opponent, a formidable volleyer, away from the net.PBut it was at the net that Navratilova won her most valuable points. The Czech grew more confident at

the net after a shaky start. In the first

But it came to life in spasms. Some of Navratilova's volleying brought to mind Billie Jean King in past years. Evert aimed some beautiful passing shots down the line.

There were two wonderful long rallies in the final set, with both players lobbing and retrieving and exchanging volleys. But even these thrilling exchanges ended in errors - by Navratilova in one instance and Evert in the other.

THE FIRST set belonged clearly to Evert. After losing the first game, she dropped only 3 points in three service

From the start of the second set Navratilova went forward with more panache and the match swung in her favor. After levelling at one set-all she took a 2-0 lead in the third, and Evert's cause seemed already lost.

Evert then won the next four games. She looked her usual cool and professional self. But Navratilova played a cunning drop shot to break back at 3-4, and stormed back into contention.

Navratilova began the sprint to the finish by holding her service to love at 5-5. Then came Evert's sudden string of errors.

"The desire to win is still there, but it's not the same as in the past," Evert said. She won Wimbledon in 1974 and 1976.

Another title almost went to East Europe when Virginia Ruzici of Romania and Mima Jausovec of Yugoslavia had 2 match points in the women's doubles final. But the Australians Wendy Turnbull and Kerry Reid fought back to win 4-6, 9-8, 6-3. Their names are new to the Wimbledon's honor roll.

THE UNSEEDED American pair of John McEnroe and Peter Fleming surprisingly made it to the final of the men's doubles

Billie Jean King and Ray Ruffels will meet Frew McMillan of South Africa and Betty Stove of the Netherlands in mixed doubles final Saturday. With a victory, King could get her 20th Wimbledon title.



Hockey Association Houston Aeros. the city's winningest pro franchise, were sold to the Winnipeg Jets Friday, ending a lengthy odyssey by Aeros owner Kenneth Schnitzer to get into the National Hockey League.

Schnitzer said the 13 existing Aeros layer contracts and the Aeros franhise would be transferred to the Jets. "All we kept was the Aeros name and the office furniture," Schnitzer said. "I wanted to make sure we cut all

The Aeros played six seasons here ompiling a 285-170-19 record and ever missing the playoffs and winning WHA championships in the 1973-

The Aeros owner said the WHA wanted to Aeros to play next season but he had declined the offer, citing nomics as the reasons.

Schnitzer said the Aeros lost in excess of \$1.5 million playing in the WHA last season.

"We see no significantly improved prospects for the coming season," Schnitzer said. "That kind of ongoing oss does not make economic sense.

The sale to the Jets does not include the contracts of Aeros Coach Bill Dinen, named WHA Coach of the Year, or assistant coach Jack Stanfield, Schnitzer said.

Schnitzer had pursued several angles to bring an NHL franchise to Houston. Although a season ticket campaign fell short of expectations, Schnitzer negotiated with several NHL franchises and applied for entry into the NHL as an expansion team. All that is behind him now, Schnitzer said.


"I'm giving up for the forseeable future (trying to enter the NHL)," Schnitzer said. "I think the NHL will come to Houston but I think it may be two or three years away. There is a solid base that will allow hockey to

Schnitzer said even if the Aeros joined merger talks next year with the NHL, that would make five teams trying to get into the older league.

"The NHL would need an even number of team. . .so we would be in no better condition than we are today, and we would have the added burden of another season's operating losses," Schnitzer said.

Schnitzer said if Houston eventually gets an NHL franchise, it will be through expansion instead of merg-

"I don't want to get involved with merger," he said, "those things are

# Intensity lacking for Chrissy Evert

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) -'She's tougher than I am."

Chris Evert refused to equivocate. She didn't bat an eyelash or reach for an alibi Friday in assessing Martina Navratilova's 2-6, 6-4, 7-5 victory for the Wimbledon women's tennis championship.

"She played her best when she got behind. She never got flustered. In the past, I've been the consistent one when the going got tough. Today it was Martina.

Is Chris' crown as recognized queen of the courts tottering? Is this big, strong 21-year-old defector from Czechoslovakia ready to usurp Evert's five-year reign as No. 1 in the

I have to want it a little more, the 23-year-old Evert said after losing to the Czech girl for the second time in two weeks.

"The desire is there, but the intensity is not the same. I have always been able tp psych myself up for an important match. The longer you play, I find, it's harder to psych yourself up."

Is the icicle melting? What the world had come to think of as tremendous calm - an inflexible, inhuman steeliness - turned out to be an absence of fire and spirit on Wimbledon's center court, maybe the same lack of drive that permitted Virginia Wade to beat her in the

semifinals last year. Chrissy recognized and acknow-

ledged it. "Is Martina a threat to become No. 1?" Evert asked repeating a question at her post-match interview. "She has the game for it. She is a tremendous athlete and now she has strong concentration. Whether she becomes the best is up to her. It's up to me and up to Evonne

The reference was to Evonne Goolagong, the graceful court artist from Australia's outback who has returned to competition after becoming a mother and injected herself into the scramble for world honors. Chris, twice champion and four times a finalist here since 1973 and winner of the last three U.S. Open titles, indicated that winning tennis championships was no longer the top priority of her life.

"I took a three-month break last winter because I thought I needed it," she said. "I play better tennis the more active I am but I also have to think of myself. If it gets boring, I must take off. I probably will do so again.

Chrissy hinted that she felt Martina handled herself better under pressure - an unusual concession for the player thought to be most immune to it. "She played better when she was behind," Chris said. "When I was

ahead, I couldn't finish her off. When had her down 4-2 in the last set I thought the match was in my reach.

"But I couldn't handle her service. I never sensed a bit of nervousness in her. She never got flustered. Two years ago, in the same situation, she might have gotten discouraged and given up.'

There were some interesting bits of by-play during the match, showing the mutual respect between the two finalists.

In the sixth game of the second set, Chris inadvertently struck Martina on the ear with a volley. She rushed over to apologize and rubbed her hand through Martina's hair.

In the second set, with Navratilova struggling to get back in the match, a shot by Evert to the back line was called out, giving Martina a 40-15 lead in the game.

Chris didn't protest. But Martina stomped on the line where she said the ball hit and insisted it was Chris' point. The ball was played as a let and Chris purposely hit out of court.

"She's still a brat," Chris said jokingly afterward. "We all got emotionally involved with her when she defected. We appreciated her hurt and loneliness.

"She and I have been very close in the past. Now she's closer to Billie Jean (King). But if she ever needs me, I'll be there as a friend."

# British Open is major pilgrimage

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) -For many in the elite corps of tough, tour-tested Americans, the 107th British Open Championship is more than a golf tournament, more than one of the game's Big Four events.

"It's almost like a pilgrimage," said history-minded Ben Crenshaw. "This is where it all started."

The site of what the Scots call merely "The Open," a conscious ex-clusion of all other, Johnny-come-lately, upstart champi-onships, is the Old Course at St. An-

It is, indeed, where it all started. It is golf's cradle and shrine, abounding in history and lore and tradition.

MARY QUEEN of Scots played these links on the Eastern coast of Scotland, north of Edinburgh. There is documentary evidence golf was played here as early as 1552, and very good reason for suspicion that a form of the game may have been played in

It was here that old Tom Morris fashioned his early clubs. And it was here, through an accident compounded of design and real estate, that the

game took the form it knows today. The original course was 11 holes, linked one after another, going straight away from the clubhouse. Later, four of those holes were combined into two, making it a nine-hole course - still going straight away from the clubhouse. After completion of play, there was nothing to do but walk back in.

Someone had the idea of playing

Some new tees were set in the ground, most of the same greens were used for both the out-going and incoming holes and nine new holes were created almost instantly. And it is for that reason that golf is an 18-hole game.

THE COURSE, playing to a par 72 - there are only two par-5 holes, two par-3s - and 6,951 yards long, is unique. Seven greens service 14 holes with two cups cut on each. There's rarely any conflict, but if there is, incoming players have the right of way. The same rule applies on two fairways that cross each other. The course is only two fairways wide, the outgoing nine paralleling its untire length by the incoming nine. The fairways blend together. The bunkers are few and water comes into play infre-

The last time it was used as the Open site, however, Jack Nicklaus and Doug Sanders tied at 283, only 5 under par. Nicklaus eventually won that 1970 title in an 18-hole playoff the first time the course had been exposed to Sunday golf.

Although the most famous and revered of all the world's golf courses, it's a public course. More than 30,000 rounds are played here annually. But never on Sunday. On that day the course Bobby Jones called "the Grand Old Lady" is given a day of rest. The British Open is played Wednesday through Saturday, with a playoff Sunday if necessary.

NICKLAUS HASN'T won the British since that triumph eight years ago, and has had more difficulty winning this event than any other major title. He's won five Masters, four PGA's, three U.S. Opens, only two British. But his record in this one, strangely enough, may be the best. He's been second an astounding six times and on one other occasion missed a title playoff by a single

"I'm getting awfully tired of finishing second. I'd kind of like to get around to winning again," said Nicklaus, who hasn't won a Big Four title in more than two years.

The closest he came was in last year's British Open at Turnberry, Scotland, where he played the last 18 holes head to head with Tom Watson in what many experts believe was the greatest golf tournament of them all. Nicklaus played the last 36 holes 65-66. Watson played them 65-65 and won by a shot. Hubert Green was third, 10 shots back. The United States' domination was complete, with American pros taking 11 of the first 12 spots.

Something similiar could happen again. Althougo neither Nicklaus nor Watson could win the Masters or U.S. Opens this year, both made challenges. Watson was second in defense of his Masters title and made one move at the American national title. Nicklaus got started too late in the Masters and needed to play the last 14 holes of the U.S. Open in par to win. He didn't make it.

BUT BOTH are primed for this one. Nicklaus, still the man to beat, has won twice, been second twice and could have won a half-dozen times. The dynamic Watson, heir apparent to Jack's long-time role as the world's finest performer, has won three times and collected more than \$200,000 in winnings.

"I just hate to get beat," Nicklaus said. "It's a matter of pride. I don't like to lose.

"Winning. That's what it's all about," said Watson.

Topping the supporting cast is a new face, that of big Andy Bean golf-ball biter, alligator wrestler, and winner of three American titles in a five-week span. The 6-foot-4, 210 pounder dubbed "Li'l Abner," by his fellow pros, very well could be a definite factor.

Among the other American threats are such familiar names as Lee Trevino, a two-time British Open champ who has played extremely well this season; former titleholder Tom Weiskopf; Green; PGA champ Lanny Wadkins; Hale Irwin; Ray Floyd; Crenshaw; Jerry Pate; Canadian Open winner Bruce Lietzke, the game's most noted cross-handed putter; and Arnold Palmer, the 1960-61 British Open champ who has played some of his best golf in five years in

the last few months. Others include Johnny Miller, John Schroeder, Ed Sneed, Tom Kite, Bill Kratzert and George Burns.

U.S. Open champ Andy North is skipping it.

"I'd made some commitments to people before I won the U.S. Open. I don't think it would be right to back out on those commitments now, North said.

South African Gary Player, winner of the Masters and two other American titles this year, heads the non-American contingent

Other top contenders include Australian Graham Marsh, England's Tony Jacklin and Peter Oosterhuis and Spain's spectacular 21-year-old Severiano Ballesteros, Europe's

The final round Saturday will be telecast to the United States on a delayed basis by ABC-TV.

## Commission fails on race makeup

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) - The New Jersey Racing Commission refused permission Friday for makeup racing days at the Meadowlands, setting off a burst of protest from sports officials who charged in the decision was not in the state's best interests.

Snow forced cancellation of the Jan. 20, Feb. 6, Feb. 7 and March 3 racing cards at the 2-year-old track. The New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority unsuccesfully petitioned the commission Thursday to extend the current standardbred meet, which ends Aug. 5.

"I am personally outraged by the commission's decision," said William Hyland, chairman of the authority. "They are throwing away \$900,000 in revenue to the state

Charles Bradley, a spokesman for the commission, explained the request was rejected on behalf of Monmouth Park.

"The commission feels that any additional racing during August at the Meadowlands would be detrimental to Monmouth Park," said Bradley. "August is the peak#time for Monmouth. The commission feels that the legislature provides to act in the best interest of private thoroughbred

Monmouth Park's thoroughbred meet began May 11.

His resignation is effective July 21, but he said he hoped to be in Lubock within the next two weeks to begin his

at \$50,000 a year. It was announced Monday night that he had the LSU job, but today's press conference was his first public apearance in Baton Rouge since he left the school after the 1961 season. The former LSU football coach, who

If West hadn't bid you would lay down the ace and king of trumps, hop-

ing for a 2-2 break or for the singleton queen. You have slightly better than an even chance to drop the queen of the first or second high trump.

Since West had bid four spades, you know that he has at least seven spades. There is little room for hearts in the West hand, but all the room in the world in East hand

THROUGH LENGTH You should therefore finesse through East's assumed length in hearts. Begin the trumps by leading dummy's jack of hearts.

As the cards lie, East covers with the queen, and your king captures West's nine. You get back to dummy by ruffing a spade and lead another heart, finessing through East's ten.

# Tax revolt alarming legislators

DENVER — A month to the day after California voters approved Proposition 13, state legislators from across the country were warned that a growing nationwide tax rebellion could bring far-reaching changes in traditional patterns of government spending.

The flurry of spending limitation and tax-cutting proposals spurred by the overwhelming passage of the Jarvis-Gann Amendment poses "a very serious threat to the fabric of government," said Minnesota House Speaker Martin O. Sabo in a comment that seemed to set the tone for the annual meeting of the National Conference of State Legislatures.

California Assembly Speaker Leo McCarthy told a standing-room only audience at one convention session that it would be a "serious blunder" to underestimate the momentum of the tax revolt.

And in private conversations with dozens of convention delegates, McCarthy urged legislative leaders in other states to consider voluntary spending limitations and homeowner property tax relief as ways to head off Jarvis-type initiatives.

The California vote, and the Legislature's response to it, dominated the convention which con-

"If I've heard Jarvis-Gann mentioned once, I've heard it a million times," said the conference president, Colorado Senate President Fred Anderson. He said the convention was unlikely to take a formal position on the issue, but that another meeting in December would review developments.

That will be after voters in several states perhaps as many as 10 - decide in November general elections the fate of a myriad of tax-cut and spending-limitation proposals.

The measures take different forms. In Oregon, initiative petitions bearing 180,000 signatures have been filed calling for a vote on a proposal identical to the Jarvis-Gann Amendment except that it sets property taxes at 1.5 percent rather than 1 percent as specified by the successful California initiative. In neighboring Idaho, a proposal limiting property taxes to 1 percent has qualified for the November ballot, and polls there show that it is favored by voters 3 to 1.

In Colorado on Thursday, supporters of an initiative petition drive claimed success in collecting enough signatures to place on the November ballot a plan to limit state and local spending by forbidding increases that exceed rises in the cost of living.

In Michigan, an initiative limiting state and local spending already has been cleared for the generalelection ballot and another proposal aimed at property taxes is still being circulated.

And in Arizona last weekend the Legislature decided to place before the voters in November a measure limiting state spending to 7 percent of total personal income in the state.

Constitutional conventions have been convened or are planned in Hawaii and Massachusetts to address


Lewis K. Uhler, a Sacramento, Calif., attorney and businessman who is president of the National Tax Limitation Committee, cited these states as examples of the momentum being gathered by his and similar organizations.

"Things are bubbling up all over the country as people are finding mechanisms to express the same concerns shouted at us on June 6 by the voters of California," said Uhler.

Uhler, whose committee claims 45,000 members nationwide and has a \$250,000 annual budget, said a long-range goal is to limit federal deficit spending, perhaps through an amendment to the U.S. Constitu-

Liberal economist Walter Heller, who joined Uhler in a panel discussion, said it would be "fiscal insanity" to impose rigid limits on federal spending. He also decried the Jarvis-Gann amenment as a 'blunderbuss approach," but he cautioned legislators that they would be making a serious mistake if they don't promptly set up a response to the tax re-
