Bolivian president resigns; general takes power

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) - President Hugo Banzer resigned Friday night and air force Gen. Juan Pereda Asbun took power three hours later after mounting a rebellion that threatened Bolivia with civil war.

Banzer, an army general who came to power in a bloody coup seven years ago, turned the government over to a three-man junta, composed of the senior commanders off the three branches of the armed forces.

The junta was in symbolic charge of

the country while Pereda flew to this mountain capital from Santa Cruz, seat of the revolt, 620 miles south of La Paz.

The rightist air force general arrived at the presidential palace dressed in civilian clothes and surrounded by hundleds of soldiers. Many in the crowd at the palace plaza applauded as Pereda entered and was received by the military chiefs.

Pereda was Banzer's handpicked candidate in the July 9 presidential election, called to put Bolivia back on the road to democracy after 12 years

of military rule. He held a substantial lead in the vote count as of last weekend when the government halted the official tally amid charges of widespread vote fraud.

Bolivia's election court annulled the results Wednesday, after Pereda formally requested a new election. It was not known what prompted the

"This is not the moment to look for new justifications for my fight,' Pereda said in a radio address to the nation after assuming the presidency. "It is the moment to honor the popu

Group opposes move to lift trade sanctions against Rhodesia

KHARTOUM, Sudan (AP) - The Organization of African Unity told Washington Friday that lifting trade sanctions against Rhodesia would be an "unfriendly act" toward the African continent.

Leaders at the 15th OAU summit conference rushed through a hastily prepared resolution after receiving word from America that some senators would try again to void U.S.

compliance with the U.N.-backed trade embargo against Rhodesia.

The Senate, by a vote of 46-42, defeated a measure about three weeks ago that would have lifted the sanctions. Chief sponsor of the move is Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., who plans to bring it up again next week, possibly Monday.

In another development here, Angolan President Agostinho Neto said his Marxist regime in southwestern Africa hopes to establish diplomatic

relations with the United States. But he told a news conference he would not accept U.S. preconditions that he reduce the number of Cuban

troops in Angola. An estimated 20,000 Cuban soldiers are in Angola. They helped Neto's forces defeat two Western-backed liberation movements after Angola, a former Portuguese colony, became independent in November 1975.

The Rhodesian trade sanctions were the major issue Friday at the OAU summit as the chiefs of state met late into the night to finish the

OAU press spokesman Peter Onu called the warning to Congress "an appropriate response," and said the African leaders also reaffirmed their support of Patriotic Front guerrillas fighting Rhodesia's new bi-racial gov-

United Nations while Rhodesia was still ruled by the white-minority government of Prime Minister Ian Smith. In March, Smith and three moderate black leaders reached an internal agreement establishing a bi-racial government and promised to hold elections by the end of the year that would give the country black majori-

If the Justice Department thinks it has enough evidence to bring a case to court, it would ask the grand jury to reconvene and recommend that indictments be drawn up. Twelve jurrors are needed for a grand jury to return a true bill.

A jurror told The Reporter Telegram Friday afternoon that "we still got a ways to go yet," indicating that there may be a possibility of more evidence being presented to the grand

Meanwhile, Ector County District Attorney John Green was preparing his case for a state grand jury investigation which gets under way 9 a.m. Monday. Green has reopened his office's investigation in response to what he has called eroneous news reports. He has also accused Attorney General John Hill of withholding evidence from the April coroner's in-

A corps of newsmen, mostly reg senting the Midland-Odessa area and some reporters from Dallas, Lubbock and San Antonio, waited through another day of anticipation Friday as medical and Ector County Sheriff Department authorities gave testi-

Tight security was still invoked. Newsmen were forbidden from the second floor where witnesses were waiting outside the press room. Boyd told reporters nothing more than what he said in his brief press state-

Conflicting predictions of what might happen were voiced. Some were expecting the proceedings to last through the weekend and possibly into next week. But when Boyd and his assistants exited Midland Federal Courthouse Building shortly before 5 a.m., newsmen knew little more than what had been reported on the secret proceedings throughout the week.

Some of the key witnesses who reportedly testified Friday included Ector County Sheriff Elton Faught, who initially said that Lozano had Washington, D.C., told The Reporter- committed suicide as a result of ramming his head against the plexi-glass window of his jail cell door; and Houston medical examiner Dr. Joseph A. Jachimczyk, who said at the April coroner's inquest in Odessa that he believed death was caused by a neck injury received while lawmen

tried to restrain Lozano. An all-day peaceful vigil was staged outside the courthouse by about 20 persons representing Concerned Citizens for Justice, a local Mexican-American activist group which organized in protest of Lozano's death.

Ben H. Bitolas, a spokesman for the group, said Friday that the group wanted its presence known to jurors "to let them know we are interested that justice is done."

Bitolas remarked that a special Ector County grand jury session called by Green next week "is probably too late since it should have been done a long time ago.

"We're going to see that someone pays for what was done (Lozano's death). That would be our only satisfaction. I just hope the (federal) grand jury will do the right thing and turn out some indictments. I h whole thing comes right out in the open," Bitolas said.

'But our primary purpose for being here is to put a stop to police brutality in Ector County. We would like to see whites and blacks unite with browns so that we can be treated by our lawmen with a little more respect and dignity. It is about time that we put a stop to this harassment from police

officers. The Lozano case was investigated by the state attorney general's office after receiving requests from several Mexican-American activist groups who alleged that Lozano had been beaten to death. An April coroner's inquest ruled that the Odessa newcomer died an accidental death, possibly from injuries he might have received in a scuffle with Ector law-

In-house investigation unit formed by DPS

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Misconduct and allegations of impropriety within the Texas Department of Public Safety will be investigated by a special, in-house unit created Friday by the public safety commission.

Every major police organization that I know of has some unit of this sort," Commissioner William B. Blakemore said. "We're at the point, size-wise and complexity-wise, where we need this.

The three-member commission approved the unit on DPS Director Wilson Speir's recommendation.

'In the past we've had people from other divisions to do internal investigations," Speir said.

A commander, a few investigators and clerical help initially will make up the unit, which will be expanded as the workload increases, Speir said.

District judge orders proceedings against area newsman dropped

ODESSA - Area newsman Paul Pryor, who was subpoenaed July 18 to reveal his sources for a newscast, apparently has won one battle against **Ector County District Attorney John** Green. Pryor will not have to appear before the Ector County Grand Jury on Monday after a district judge Friday ruled the subpoena be quashed and all proceedings be thrown out of

But Green, who had ordered the subpoena, said late Friday that he knew nothing about the hearing concerning the motion filed by Pryor's lawyers and that Pryor "is going to be there (before the Ector County Grand Jury) Monday with whatever we'll

KMID-TV News Director Pryor has been covering this week's federal grand jury investigation into the Jan. 22 death of Larry Lozano, a Mexican-American who died in the Ector County Jail while a prisoner there. At issue behind the subpoena of Pryor was a 6 p.m. newscast on July 17 in which Pryor said: "Sources close to the Attorney General's office..and the current grand jury .. tell Big Two News that several indictments have already been prepared in the Lozano case...and the sources add.. Ector County government officials are among those named."

Green had the subpoena issued on Tuesday for Pryor to appear before Judge H.L. McKim of the 161st District Court. When Pryor appeared, he turned over the tape of the broadcast in question, but said he refused to divulge any sources.

At that time, Pryor was ordered to appear before the Ector County Grand Jury which meets at 9 a.m.

Pryor's lawyers, Elton Gilliland and Lucius D. Bunton, filed the motion Friday. Judge McKim heard the motion, and then signed the court order which said in part: the "T.V. tape surrendered into Court by Paul Pryor on July 18, 1978, be...returned to Paul Pryor.

The ruling also ordered that "all proceedings held in this Court on July 18, 1978, in connection with Paul Pryor are quashed and held for naught....He is hereby fully released from any orders of this Court, and any verbal subpoena is set aside, so that Paul Pryor is not under any orders of this Court as of the entry of this

Pryor said the order was issued about 3 p.m. Friday and that he did not now have to appear before the Ector County grand jury on Monday.

"It (the first hearing) was all illegal. I knew it was all along," Pryor said. "I'm pleased and glad that McKim had an open mind about the case even though he did preside at the original hearing with Green."

At the same time, Green said he knew nothing about the hearing Friday afternoon and if there was one, "any order of those hearings is completely illegal. I never appeared at a hearing. No one in my office appeared at a hearing. There was no testi-mony," Green said.

The district attorney said he did give the tape of the broadcast to a woman who had been sent for it from Pryor's lawyer's office. "I voluntarily, without any court order, gave up the tape," he added.

Pryor remarked that while the hearing had been held late in the afternoon, he thought "it's incredible that he doesn't know about it." Green insisted that the 28-year-old

newsman "will be there (before the Ector County Grand Jury) Monday with whatever we'll need. He'll bring all his tapes. Pryor explained that the ruling Fri-

day precludes him from being called before the grand jury again. "We expect that to be the end of our subpoena problems," Pry added.


The motion stated that the sub-

peona issued Pryor was for a "Non-Resident of Ector County" and Pryor is an Ector County resident, and that Pryor was not represented by counsel during the July 18 hearing. It also said that the "Court was without jurisdiction to conduct any hearing whatsoever. No civil proceeding was pending in the District Court of Ector County, Texas that would have justified such hearing."

The motion continued, "Taking the video tapes from the Petitioner was an illegal seizure of property. The proceeding held in this court on July 18 was a denial of due process and unauthorized by law, and in violation of the constitution and statutes and laws of the United States and State of

Gun permits triple after mass murder

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - As police appealed to "a mystery witness" who was traveling with two gunmen when they killed six restaurant workers, officials said Friday that permits for handguns have nearly tripled following the worst mass murder in the city's history

An open letter from Police Chief Tom Heggy, printed on the front page of both Oklahoma City daily newspapers, described the witness as "the key solution" to the case and urged him to come forward - both for \$57,000 reward money and for his own

"If you know them and what they did, you will almost certainly be their next victim, if only to insure your

silence," Heggy wrote. Police have said that at least three men were involved in the grisly events Sunday night at the Sirloin Stockade restaurant. Six employees - four of them teen-agers - were herded into a meat locker and shot in the head, and the gunmen escaped with an estimated \$1,500.

From reports by persons near the establishment and shreds of physical evidence, police have theorized that only two of the men did the actual

Shortly after the crime, authorities issued an all-points bulletin for a green stationwagon seen leaving the restaurant parking lot with its headlights out. The restaurant is near an

interstate highway. Heggy said Friday that some "sig-nificant" new leads which he refused to identify have brought the investigation to the point where "something can break on this within the next few

The letter told the third man that, "If you ... did not pull the trigger, you are not a killer ... you have nothing to fear from us." Oklahoma County District Attorney Andrew Coats said that does not "commit us to giving any-body immunity," but added, "I would give serious consideration to immunity if testimony helped us get the

Civiletti nixes Dallas probe

WASHINGTON (AP) - A group of somber and grim-faced Mexican-American leaders said Friday they cannot be responsible for "social unrest" in the Southwest and political backlash possibly aimed at Jimmy Carter in the 1980 presidential elections following a lengthy meeting with high-level Justice Department officials concerning the Santos Rodriquez case.

Deputy Assistant Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti met behind closed doors for almost four hours before announcing the Justice Department would stand by its decision not to seek a civil rights prosecution against the Dallas policeman convicted in state court of murdering the 12-year-old

The Dallas youth was fatally shot in the head by Cain on July 24, 1973, while sitting handcuffed in a patrol car being questioned concerning an \$8 service station robbery. Cain was convicted in state court of murder with malice and sentenced to five years imprisonment.

Mexican-American leaders have insisted the sentence was not sufficient and that Cain's partner, Ray Arnold, should have also been prosecuted.

The statue of limitations in the case expires on Monday Vilma Martinez, the president and

general counsel for the Mexican-American Legal Defense Fund (MALDEF), emerged from the threehour, 45-minute meeting and read a terse, handwritten statement.

"I consider the decison not to prosecute an unconscionable and unnecessary failure of America's system of justice," she began. "I am struck by, and I intend to remember in 1980, the inconsistency of Carter's concern for human rights in Russia and disregard for human rights of Mexican-Americans in Dallas.

"I told Mr. Civiletti and others that we are not and will not be responsible for the social unrest that may ensue as a consequence of re-affirmation of their decision."

On Thursday, Carter had telephoned state representative Ben Reyes, D-Houston, and apologized for the Justice Department's decison, said Reyes, who was one of four state legislators attending Friday's meeting. Others attending were Matt Garcia, D-San Antonio, Arnold Gonzalez, D-Corpus Christi and Sam Hudson, D-Dallas

"I can say the president has a deep feeling and commitment to citizens and human rights all over the world," Civiletti told reporters after Friday's meeting. "As a human and a non-lawyer, I feel he was struck by the dramatic and compelling facts in this case. You would have to be awfully calloused not to be.

Asked if he felt rebuked by the president's reported apology, Civiletti replied: "No. I think the public recognizes that prosecutable decisions have to be arrived at by law-

The law, he added, "is not an exact science...there can be legal differences of opinion and if that is true for prosecutors, it is indeed true for persons once or twice removed from the

During the meeting Civiletti telephoned the head of the department's civil rights division, Drew Days, who was in Detroit and Ken Mighell, the

The only indication of actual fighting was one radio report saying an army officer had been killed in a tin-mining area.

Banzer's right-wing military government had ordered a nationwide state of siege. Loyal troops, with tanks and armored cars, were deployed around the hilltop presidential palace and other strategic locations in this 12,000-foot-high city.

Before his resignation, Banzer, 52, went on nationwide television and radio and said his government "is taking all measures necessary" to end the rebellion and "guarantee and assure the maintenance of order and tranquility for all Bolivians.'

The Banzer government reportedly sent a representative by plane to Santa Cruz to try to persuade Pereda to end the rebellion before it flared into full-scale civil war.

The envoy, Interior Minister Gen. Guillermo Jimenez, told reporters, 'The fatherland confronts a difficult situation but we hope to control it by means of persuasion.

selves as anti-Communists, demanded that power be turned over to Pereda despite the Bolivian Supreme Court's decision Wednesday throwing out the results of the presidential election because of alleged vote fraud from opposition leaders and invited foreign observers. On Wednesday, Pereda asked the

National Election Court to scrap the election results and schedule another vote "to avoid sorrow and tears for the nation." There was no immediate indication what was behind the rebellion. One apparent hint came in a broad-



The opening lead, the most important single play in the game, often depends on how the opponents bid rather than on what cards the leader

West won the first diamond and led his other trump, whereupon East took the ace of hearts and led a third heart. Now South was unable to ruff a diamond in dummy and had to play for luck in spades or clubs. South eventually went down two.

NORMAL LEAD

South makes the hand easily if West opens the king of diamonds. West switches to trumps, but it is too late. East must take the ace of trumps and return a trump at once.

Declarer takes the top spades, ruffs a spade, ruffs a diamond in dummy and ruffs another spade. Now South draws the last trump and gets to dummy with the king of clubs to cash the last spade. The ace of clubs is his

Solomon's ruling applied in death

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP) — A court order that a 13-year-old boy's remains be cremated and divided between his divorced parents was canceled when the father agreed to let the boy be buried in

Kent County Circuit Judge George Cook's unusual ruling came Wednesday in a case in which James Dunn of Grand Rapids and Anne Simmons of Orlando, Fla., were battling over the right to bury Greg Dunn, who died last Saturday of cystic fibroyis.

"We are asked to play God, a role we are neither trained nor prepared for," Cook said.

An Old Testament story tells of Solomon, the King of Israel noted for wisdom, who suggested that a live

baby be cut in half when two women claimed the boy. When only one woman objected to Solomon's decision and agreed to let the other woman keep the child, the king determined she loved the child most and was the real mother, and so he awarded the baby Cook said it was obvious that both parents loved

their son deeply and he ordered the body cremated "so that what they could not share in life, they may now share in death."

But the mother, on hearing the judge's decision, ran from the courtroom crying: "I can't do that to Mrs. Simmons, who had legal custody of the boy, had filed suit to have him buried at a family plot in

Portsmouth, Va. The boy had lived with his father in Grand Rapids for the past seven years, and Dunn wanted him buried here.

Mrs. Simmons' lawyer told Dunn's attorney on Thursday that she would allow her son to be buried at Grand Rapids.

Rise in religious mood

NEW YORK (AP) — The new chief executive of the oldest, continuously shepherded Protestant body in the United States senses a rising religious mood in the country.

'There's more awareness than there has been for some time of the religious dimension of reality," says the Rev. Dr. Arie R. Brouwer, general secretary of the Reformed Church in America, now marking its 350th anni-

"Without that vision, society is in real trouble and more and more people are realizing it," he says. "I think there's more religion around that there has been for quite a while."

But so far, much of the rekindled impulse remains diffuse, he says, manifested in novel movements, cults, charismatic groups and specialized meditative practices outside the communal worship and organized work of the churches.

"In some ways, it's a secular response to the mysterious," he said in an interview. "It's all pretty religious,, but it doesn't care for organized religion. The churches generally have not found the way to channel and nurture it '

That is a prime need, he added, to develop the modes of worship, the imagery and "intuitive sense" to serve the intensified spiritual yearning and bring the accumulated insights of historic faith to a groping culture to "redeem it and offer it to

Brouwer, 42, a tall, easy-mannered church historian and one-time Congregational pastor, became the new administrative head of the Dutchborn Reformed Church late last year, a permanent position he's destined to fill until retirement 23 or more years

It gives him an influential voice in transdenominational Christian affairs, including posts on the governing bodies of the National Council of Churches and World Council of

"One of the things I intend to work very hard at is closing the communications gap between church officialdom and the general membership," he said, outlining various new methods planned for interchange of information, views and guidance.

Although the 350,000-member Reformed Church is not imposing in size. it's rich in history, with a tradition of theological excellence and of pioneering ecumenism in missions.

It also has a stable of prominent contemporary preachers, such as the Rev. Drs. Norman Vincent Peale of New York and Robert Schuller of the spectacular Garden Grove Community Church in California.

when its first clergy came to New Amsterdam (New York) colony, with an unbroken line of ministers since, longer than that of other early American churches.

Although some of them arrived sooner, such as the Anglicans (Episcopalians) in Jamestown in 1607 and the Puritans (Congregationalists, now the United Church of Christ) in Massachusetts in 1620, they had recurrent intervals without ministers.

Brouwer became head of the Re formed Church on the retirement of the Rev. Dr. Marion de Velder, now of Holland, Mich., who had held the position for 16 years, and promptly landed in a storm over ordination of

"It's at its peak," he said, noting that some regional units have decided to act unilaterally and ordain women, even though a measure authorizing it has six times failed to gain ratification. An ecclesiastical legal battle now is forcing the issue toward a possibly divisive resolution.

But despite internal conflicts, Brouwer said that the effort for unity among Christians is taking a new tack of "conciliarity." That doesn't mean mere cooperative councils, he said, but close, interworking ties between denominations, including reciprocal exchange of members and mutual recognition of ministries.

"That's where the ecumenical movement is headed," he said.

Brouwer, born in Inwood, Iowa, and reared in Minnesota, led congregations in Corinth, Mich., and Passaic, N.J., and was for nine years director of the denomination's program agency before being named to his present

A slim, 6-foot-7, who usually towers over his colleagues, he and his wife, Harriat, have four children and reside in Glen Rock, N.J., where he gets his relaxation working in their gar-

"Whenever I get a chance," he said, "I like to get out and sit by a camp fire and climb mountains."

Paisano Encampment to start Monday

MARFA - The 58th consecutive session of the historic Paisano Baptist Encampment will begin Monday, to continue through July 30.

Approximately 2,000 people from a wide area of West Texas are expected to be on hand for this year's gathering at the camp grounds located between Marfa and Alpine at mile-high Paisano Pass. Bible teaching, music, preaching and Christian fellowship will be offered in the daily program of activities.

Paisano Encampment had its beginning in 1916 when a group of cowboys met for prayer meetings under the large oak trees in the area that now makes up the 1,000-acre encampment grounds. Dr. George W. Truett, legendary Baptist preacher and longtime pastor of First Baptist Church at Dallas, served as one of the camp pastors for many years. With the exception of a few years missed during World War I, the camp has continued with consecutive sessions since

Featured preachers for this year's gathering include Dr. James Flamming, pastor of First Baptist Church at Abilene, and Dr. Daniel Vestal, pastor of Midland's First Baptist Church. Encampment music will be directed by Dr. Euell Porter, music professor at Baylor University in Waco. Youth music activities will be directed by Jerry Williams, minister of music at Gatesville's First Baptist Church.

Fate of health adviser's office remains uncertain

WASHINGTON (AP) - The future of Dr. Peter Bourne's office in the White House remained uncertain Friday after the presidential drug abuse adviser's abrupt resignation.
At the daily White House news

briefing Friday, presidential spokes-man Jody Powell said "I'm not in a position to give you guidance" on whether the health adviser's office would be dismantled.

Bourne, a 38-year-old psychiatrist and close friend of President Carter, resigned his \$51,000-a-year post as White House health adviser on Thursday, about four hours before the president was to hold a nationally broadcast news conference.

For nearly 24 hours before his resignation, Bourne had been embroiled in controversy over his admission that he wrote a prescription for the much-abused sedative Qualude to a fictitious name.

The prescription actually was for Bourne's administrative aide, Ellen Metsky, and Bourne said he used a



PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Jack Nickiaus, pro golf's biggest attraction, admits that he's phasing out his superb career.

'I've cut back my schedule a little bit this year, and my intention is to cut it back even further next year." said Nicklaus Friday after he finished a 7-under-par 64, and took 3-stroke lead with 130 after 36 holes of the \$250,000 Philadelphia Golf Classic. "How far I cut it back I'm not

"I told him (Dean) I intended to cut back further." Nicklaus revealed.

"Pretty soon this becomes a continuous thing and you never get to play anywhere else," Nicklaus said. Nicklaus was including among these "locked" in items several golf tournaments he felt compelled to participate.

NBC cameras ready for Games

With two years to go before the Olympic Torch is lit to start the Summer Games in Moscow, things are going swimmingly over at NBC.

Don Ohlmeyer, executive producer of NBC Sports entrusted with leading the network out of the wilderness, is getting NBC geared up for what it hopes will be among the greatest shows in television history.

"I have every confidence the Olympics from Moscow will be the biggest thing on network sports ever," says Ohlmeyer, "and I have every confidence NBC Sports is going to cover the Games as well or better than they have ever been covered before.'

Murphy's Law states that if anything can go wrong, it will. And the variety of things that can go wrong between now and 1980 is virtually infinite. Relations between the United States and Russia have not been the best of late, what with American newsmen being harrasssed by Soviet officials and assorted dissidents being carted off to prison.

But all of that is beyond NBC's

control, so the network is concentrating on matters it can deal with. Ohlmeyer says the camera positions for the Games are set. NBC knows which lenses will be used for which cameras and exactly where the mobile units will be located. It is in the process of shipping miles of cable to Moscow for installation this summer.

NBC will send about 650 workers to Moscow and the production people are already being lined up. Those that will handle track and field, for examnd the next two years covering track and field events in preparation for the Olympics.

The on-air talent is being assembled. O.J. Simpson was the first announcer named to the team and Bruce Jenner was second. Now the lineup is taking shape.

Ohlmeyer says that Dick Enberg, Curt Gowdy, Jim Simpson, Charlie Jones and Mike Adamle have been assured of spots on the NBC team. So have specialists Al McGuire and Billy Packer, basketball; Nancy Theis, gymnastics; John Naber and Donna de Varona, swimming, and Micki King, diving. And Merlin Olsen and John Brodie will both be there.

Exact roles have not been determined but Simpson and Jenner will probably act as hosts for the after-

MONTREAL (AP) - Montreal General Manager Charlie Fox refused comment on a clubhouse scuffle with Expos pitching ace Steve Rogers before Montreal's 7-3 victory Thursday night over Atlanta Braves, The Canadian Press said Friday.

"Anything that happens in our clubhouse stays there," said Fox, who refused to confirm or deny the incident, according to the CP.

Sources said Fox punched Rogers, the Expos' player representative, after he intervened when Fox loudly criticized shortstop Chris Speier for a batting slump.

Rogers told Fox "That's just the kind of thing we don't need in this clubhouse" and told him to leave. The two argued noseto-nose and, after being challenged several times, Rogers shoved Fox, who then hit Rogers in the jaw with a left.

Fox said Rogers and his agent kept an appointment Friday afternoon to discuss a new contract but declined to say whether the clubhouse episode had been mentioned. Rogers' current contract expires after next season.

Speier reacted to the criticism by hitting for the cycle and driving in six runs against the Braves. Fox was especially critical of Speier for taking a called third strike with two men on base in the fifth inning of a 3-1 loss to Atlanta in the second game of a doubleheader Wednesday night.

Fox, 56, was manager of San Francisco Giants when Speier broke in with them in 1971 until he was replaced as manager June 28, 1974. Fox made the trade by which the Expos acquired Speier from the Giants for shortstop Tim Foli on April 26, 1977.

The pre-game scuffle occurred in front of "seven or eight" players, said an Expos' spokesman. "It was probably the starting lineup. The others were on the field, I guess." He said: "These kinds of things happen with every club, ours and the

Royals rip Boston, 9-0

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - Rookie Clint Hurdle drove in six runs to tie a club record and Paul Splittorff scattered six hits, leading Kansas City to a 9-0 rout of Boston Friday night that saddled the Red Sox their first shutout in 108 games.

Hurdle, a 20-year-old right fielder-first baseman, smashed a Dennis Eckersley pitch 410 feet over the right field wall to give the Royals a 3-0 lead in the second inning. He added a sacrifice fly in the fourth and RBI singles in the sixth and seventh as the Royals recorded their seventh consecutive victory.



The first section contains the story of how Copperstown, Ohio, became the birthplace of baseball and the permanent home of the Hall of Fame.

Each replica plaque contains a short history of the 163 players enshrined in the Hall.

By far the most popular plaque in the exhibit is that of the Sultan of Swat, Babe Ruth. The Bambino's records are prodigious, but the legends about him, most of which are probably true, make him one of the favorites of all times.

Stan Musial's plaque is another popular stop. Stan the Man is one of 13 players to have over 3,000 career hits and ranks at or near the top in almost every batting department. Eighteen times he hit for better than a .300 average and won seven National League batting titles.

Other popular plaques include Honus Wagner, Tris Speaker and Christy Mathewson.

Caldwell loses décimal point

We're all familiar with the story of e "Dunkshot Dolans," basketball phenoms from the University of Slamdunk who sign \$14 million contracts which guarantee them and their heirs clear down to the third generation not only freedom from ever having to sleep nine to a bed anymore but provide them with a new yacht every year, a paid vacation at Monaco and three apartment houses of their choice on Park Avenue. Plus a lifetime contract with the network commenting on the Middle East situa-

Then, there's Joe Caldwell. The flip side of Paradise.

"Jumping Joe" Caldwell could go straight to the top of the backboard from a standing start in his basketball heyday. He went 6-5 1-2 in his stocking feet, he had eye like a fish, he could rebound a ball in the rafters and slam

dunk the Empire State Building. He went to the 1964 Olympics as a basketball player, but he could have gone as a high jumper. He signed with the Detroit Pistons for \$11,000 a year in 1964. Basketball was not yet a media hype, only a few of us ink-stained wretches even bothered to write about it then. Joe was born 10 years too soon.

Still, it was better than being 20 years too soon because, within five years, the basketball wars had come along and Joe was lured from the NBA Atlanta Hawks to the ABA Carolina Cougars with a promise of \$220, 000 a year, \$150,000 now and \$70,000 deferred to the end of a five-year contract. There was also a promise of a \$600-a-month pension for every year Joe played pro basketball. The deal was set with the owner, Tedd Munchak, a Georgia textile mag-

The Carolina Cougars played wherever they would take a check in that state - they didn't begin to make the nut - and every bus leaving town had a league-jumping player on it.

But Joe Caldwell dug in. With his salary and deferred payments as collateral, he tried a fast break into the business world. Joe dabbled in the carpet business, the food-processing business, gold mines in Canada, Philippine cenient, a vineyard in California, and, finally, a record business in Greensboro, N.C., Jump off Enter-prises. Joe was a conglomerate. He was doing a lot better than the

Everything was swell till the Cougars signed a young man out of Providence named Marvin Barnes, not to be confused with "Bad News" Barnes of another era, but not, by any means, "Good News" Barnes.

Barnes was a somewhat-troubled rookie. He had a tire-iron assault rap hanging over his head and, even though he was 6-9 and 235 pounds, he felt the need of a sidearm on some of his trips.

He and Joe Caldwell, the senior citizen on the Cougars, became friendly. So much so that, when Marvin Barnes disappered one day, man-agement blamed Joe Caldwell.

It was smarter than blaming Marvin Barnes. Barnes, you see, was 22, grabbed 1,300 rebounds a year, and averaged 24 to 25 points. Caldwell was 31, picked up around 395 rebounds and averaged only 16 points. Besides, his deferred payments were coming up.

The Couagrs, by the way, were now the Spirits of St. Louis, and Munchak was out - or, rather, Munchak was now the league commisioner.

St. Louis proved rather meanspirited, and it suspended Caldwell after 23 games in 197 for allegedy encouraging Marvin Barnes to split (they found Marvin later in a pool hall in Ohio). They refused to pay Caldwell for the 23 games.

Next, the defunct management of the Carolina Cougars, i.e., Tedd Munchak, found out that the pension clause had a typo in it. They had meant to say \$60 a month," not \$600," they told Caldwell. They had, Joe said they told him, gotten the decimal point in the wrong place. It was a \$77,000 error.

When Joe protested, they told him to take it up with the league commissioner. The league commissioner was Tedd Munchak, and it was no typographical error, and for Joe, the decimal point was still in the wrong place. Alice in Wonderland would know all about a trial like that. Joe figured

Litigation flew. Joe sued the team. The team sued Joe. The bank, which held Joe's notes, got very nervous. They foreclosed, and Joe was thrown into involuntary bankruptcy. He was ruined. They converted his assets to pay his creditors. Joe protested he was shortly (January, 1975) to begin getting his \$70,000-a-year deferred payments. Fine, they said, just ship it along. "I think I'm the only guy in the history of bankruptcy to pay off 100 cents on the dollar," groans Joe. "They took my house, my car." Everything, in short, but the decimal

Joe Louis Caldwell is in Los Angeles now to play in the Southern California Pro Basketball League, probably for Kaz of California. It is basketball's version of baseball's winter league, a showcase for free agents, aging veterans, and promising rookies who need experience. Games are played at Cal State L.A.

Joe has not been able to play any basketball for four years. Now 36, he would like to get one more year in the NBA so that he can leave basketball with something besides a pair of sneakers. The TV show 60 Minutes dramatized his strange story last spring, but the courts have been more

reluctant to play it. A North Carolina appeals court on Tuesday up held a jury verdict that Caldwell was enti-tled to a \$600 monthly pension, but litigation on several other matters remains undecided.

During the opening session of practice for the Indianapolis car portion of Sunday's twin 150mile races here, U.S. Auto Club officials it ecorded Ongais' faste st lap at 27.03 seconds around the high-banked speedway, which is either 1½-miles or 1.522 miles around.

When the Grand National stock cars, which usually run here, use the track, they measure the track as 1.522 milles, from a line 10 feet 'tielow

the outside wall. But USAC calculates the length of their tracks from a line six feet, above the inside line. That way, AIR is 11/2 miles & round.

By the regular method of measuring here, Ongais ran 200.27 mph. According to the USAC timers, however, it's going into the trooks as 199.78 mph.

The "officiali" track record of 169,014 mph was set in 1966 by Mario Andretti, who is not competing here this weekend. The official record can't be broken until qualifications, which are scheduled Saturday.

Either way Ongais' time is figured, he was the fastest of the day. It wasn't much of a surprise since the Costa Mesa, Calif., driver and his team spent several days testing here earlier this month.

And Ongais has been the fastest at most of the USAC events he's entered this season.

Second quickest was Bobby Unser at 198.89 mph, followed closely by Rick Mears at 198.82

Unser's engine let go just as the practice session was ending.

STEPHENVILLE, Texas (AP) -The effect of girls playing on boys' athletic teams in Texas high schools 'will never be significant," the athletic director of the University Interscholastic League said Friday.

"There have been some incidents in Texas lately of the courts forcing the boys' teams let girls play with them," said Bill Farney. "But the records show that their participation has been, for the most part, very negligi-

"The UIL is against letting girls play in boys' programs, because we look ahead and see the eventual destruction of girls' athletics. Most of the schools are behind us on this, but there are some larger districts who would love to see girls' programs cut so the boys could get more money."

Farney made the comments at a meeting of the Texas Small School Coaches Association Clinic at Tarleton State University here. About 70 Class B high school football and basketball coaches are attending.

Farney also discussed other prob-lems confronting the UIL, the governing body for Texas high school athlet-

"Our rules are becoming more complicated all the time," he said. 'The courts have the power to change them almost at will, and that means the affluent parents can file suit on practically any matter and stand a good chance of winning.

'We don't have the money or the lawyers to fight every case that we're threatened with. We're in a losing battle," Farney said.

Payton said comparisons to Simpson "go in one ear and out the other" but he admitted, "Nobody wants to work hard and then settle for second.

Payton said he accepts an injury risk and the low pay in playing out the option. "Life is a risk," he said. "I could get injured whether I sign or not. Yes, I'm at peace. Money is not the only factor. Pride is important."







Senate OKs aid to medical plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate approved continuing federal aid to prepaid medical plans on Friday after serving notice that it wants the

program purged of fraud and abuse.
The measure, which cleared on a 71-1 vote, authorizes \$170 million in grants and loans over the next three years to Health Maintenance Organizations, known as HMOs.

An HMO is an alternative to the traditional fee-for-service health care systems whereby doctors are reim-bursed by health insurance carriers for services provided. The HMOs provide health care to members based on prepaid, fixed payments.

Government figures show there are about 165 HMOs in the country serving 6.3 million people. About one-third of the organizations are certified by the government as qualified for feder-

Sen. Carl Curtis, R-Neb., cast the lone dissenting vote on Friday. The senator said later that he voted against the bill because he felt efficient health maintenance organizations "don't need federal subsidies." Curtis also claimed there are "too many instances of fraud and waste among subsidized HMOs and HMOs are not practical in agricultural

Besides providing additional fund-ing for approximately 50 HMOs, the the Senate bill imposes stiff penalties against persons who fail to meet financial disclosure requirements re-lating to HMOs. It also takes steps to control door-to-door enrollment of HMO members.

Similar legislation is pending in the House of Representatives.

Hale Champion, undersecretary of Health, Education and Welfare, expressed delight at passage of the bill. 'It's got the money we need to keep the momentum for the HMO program going," said Champion, who helped set up an HMO at Harvard University several years ago.

The Senate-passed measure origi-nally had called for additional federal

funding amounting to \$400 million over a six-year period. But several senators, led by Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., argued that smaller subsidies are needed.

The \$170 million that was approved will permit federal aid to continue at existing levels. It includes \$35 million for fiscal 1979 beginning Oct. 1, and \$65 million and \$70 million in the two

following years.
"I believe we must have (the department of) Health, Education and Welfare prove it can manage pro-

grams efficiently and properly before expanding the program," Nunn said.
The Georgia Democrat likened the giant HEW to a small boy receiving an allowance. He said the allowance shouldn't be increased if the boy had shown he was unable to manage his small allowance properly.

The General Accounting Office re-

cently released a study criticizing several Health Maintenance Organizations. In addition, the Senate permanent investigations subcommittee, of which Nunn is a member, has looked into alleged fraud and abuse in HMO programs.

The anti-fraud provisions, which had the backing of HEW Secretary Joseph A. Califano, call for a maximum jail term of five years and a maximum fine of \$25,000 for anyone violating the financial disclosure requirements

In addition, HMOs must assure HEW that they will not sign up new

members at the member's home. The criticism of HEW came at a time when the Carter administration is looking increasingly to Health Maintenance Organizations as a way to hold down health care costs.

HEW figures show the government has spent about \$62 million supporting HMOs since 1974. The government already has plans to spend \$32 million in fiscal 1979 alone. Earlier in the week, Califano said,

Remarkarble pair asked to address GOP leaders

DETROIT — The Republican Party Friday called on an unlikely pair for advice on how to save the party: a Democratic intellectual and an out-

It is doubtful that the party will adopt much of the soft-sell advice it received from ethnic expert Michael Novak or the hard sell, evangelistic message it got from NAACP president Benjamin Hooks.

But the mere fact they were invited to give key speeches to the semiannu-al meeting of the Republican National Committee here was remarkable in

Hooks, head of the nation's oldest and most prestigious civil rights group, told the gathering: "You cannot win black votes unless you are prepared to take black people and their interests seriously.... The Republican Party will have to change its rhetoric and then match its enlightened speech with concrete perfor-

He recommended the GOP adopt a black agenda that included passage of the Democratic initiated Humphrey-Hawkins bill, endorsement of the Equal Rights Amendment, freedom for the Wilmington 10, revision of the tax structure to help poor people and endorsement of affirmative action programs.

"It is your responsiveness to these issues that will determine whether the Republican Party is serious about black equality, and serious about winning support from black voters," he added.

It was the second time in a year that the party has broken with tradition and called on a major civil rights leader to offer a key address to its leadership. Last January, the Rev. Jesse Jackson, the spellbinding disci-ple of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and president of Operation Push, also spoke to the group.

Hooks' recommendations ran directly against the conservative drift of the party membership, and the opportunity many party leaders see too make inroads among middle-class voters as a result of the "taxpayers revolt" spurred by the adoption of Proposition 13 in California.

We feel there must be a better way of 'roasting the pig' than burning down the barn," Hooks said of Proposition 13. "We invite Republican participation in stemming the national trend to reduce taxes for one class of citizens under the canopy of forcing cuts in welfare, and depriving an-other class of citizens of basic neces-

Blacks, he said, support a foreign policy committed to human rights. National Committee Chairman Bill Brock said he had invited the civil rights leader because "the NAACP is saying some important things on jobs, youth employment and urban problems that fits in with what we're trying to do."

Earlier, Novak, a professor at Syracuse University and a registered Democrat, praised Brock for his ef-

forts to open up the party. He recommended that the GOP redouble its efforts to attract voters from ethnic groups by espousing tra-ditional Republican themes of indi-vidualism, but acknowledging that such traditionally Democratic backed institutions like labor unions, and the Democratic programs like those under the New Deal have benefitted these groups.
It is, however, debatable how much

real change is occurring in the party. Several party leaders interviewed mistake for Republicans to adopt the NAACP leader's recommendations or "try to out-Democrat the Demo-

"It's helpful for some of these peo ple to hear this sort of thing but minority involvement in the party is only going to come when candidates start coming to us from minority areas," one influential state chair-

Oregon voters get tax question

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Secretary of State Norma Paulus on Friday ap-proved a California-style property tax limit measure for Oregon's Novem-

Mrs. Paulus said about 130,000 signatures, or 65 percent of those collected, were verified. The proposed constitutional amendment needed 61,646 valid signatures of registered voters. Nearly all the signatures were coilected in June, the same month that Proposition 13 was approved by

voters in California. The Oregon measure would limit property taxes to 1½ percent of market value. It would reduce taxes by an estimated 42 percent and cut revenue to schools and local governments by

\$375 million next year.

Voters rejected a similar property tax limit in 1968.

Philadelphia's municipal workers voted Friday to accept a settlement in their 8-day-old walkout and garbage collection resumed in New Orleans following the end of a wildcat strike there.

A transit strike in Washington continued for the second day with no end

Philadelphia officials said garbage collections would resume Monday in the strike by more than 19,000 non-uniformed workers that curtailed many municipal services. The walkout had left the streets of the nation's fourth largest city strewn with piles of trash that grew and rotted under 90-degree temperatures.

The air in Washington was also a problem as an estimated half-million public transit users turned to their automobiles. Heavy traffic worsened the air quality and a pollution alert was extended through Saturday.

"It's virtually a total shutdown," Metro spokesman Cody Pfanstiehl said of the strike.

To cope with the transit shutdown, Washington city agencies changed their working hours and some parking and traffic regulations were eased. Car pools helped commuter traffic flow smoothly in and out of the

nation's capital. Washington bus and subway mechanics and drivers held out against a court order and the leaders of their own union as they refused to end the wildcat strike.

The walkout was triggered by Metro mechanics dissatisfied over delays in arbitration proceedings on what they claim should have been an

automatic cost-of-living wage boost July 1. Their picket lines were honored by 4,500 bus drivers and subway motormen, all belonging to the same

In Philadelphia, the leaders of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees union had urged the membership to approve the tentative accord reached in the Philadelphia strike.

The walkout involved health care, recreation and clerical workers in addition to the sanitation workers.

The settlement, reached Thursday, called for a 7 percent wage increase the first year, an increase equal to the cost of living in the second year and a 1½ percent increase in fringe benefits beginning in January. The pact also would permit the city

to lay off 600 employees by Aug. 1 with possible additional layoffs by

The contract covers workers in District Councils 33 and 47 of the **AFSCME**. District Council 33 includes some 17,000 cierical and blue collar workers who earn an average of \$11,-686 a year. The 2,000 technical and professional workers in District Council 47 average \$17,400 a year.

Things got better for New Orleans residents as the full fleet of garbage trucks rolled for the first time in four days. A wildcat strike by the garbage workers ended after Mayor Ernest Morial promised Thursday there would be enough trucks in good condition. He also promised the wildcatters would not be punished for the job action protesting truck maintain-

The trucks were an issue because the garbage workers get paid only if they complete their route.

Wife of dissident says she will face trial Wednesday

MOSCOW (AP) - The wife of prominent Jewish activist Vladimir Slepak said Friday she will go on trial next Wednesday for "malicious hooliganism," the same charge that sent her husband into exile for five years. The charges against Maria Slepak

and her husband were filed after the couple displayed a protest banner from the balcony of their apartment overlooking central Moscow's Gorky Street. The banner denounced the repeated refusal by Soviet authorities to let the Slepaks emigrate to Israel. Slepak, 50, was tried and convicted June 21 and sentenced to exile in a

remote region of the Soviet Union. Mrs. Slepak did not go on trial at the same time because she was in a hospital for treatment of an ulcer. Mrs. Slepak told Western reporters

she was informed of the trial date when she went to a courthouse Friday to request permission to visit her husband, now in prison pending his transfer into exile. A Jewish woman activist, Ida

Nudel, 47, was sentenced to four years' exile the same day as Slepak on the same charge. She, too, had flown a banner from her apartment window to protest refusal of her right to emigrate to Israel.

The State Department issued a statement in Washington at the time

denouncing the sentences as "unduly harsh." The Slepak-Nudel convictions were followed three weeks later by the convictions of two other Moscow dissident leaders, Alexander Ginzburg and Anatoly Shcharansky, trials that were denounced by the Carter administration and strained U.S.-Soviet relations.

Action by terrorists labeled attempt to provoke takeover

MADRID (AP) - Terrorists believed to be left-wing extremists stepped out of a stolen taxi and gunned down an army general and his aide Friday in what Premier Adolfo Suarez called a clear attempt to provoke an army takeover in Spain.

Police said they arrested six persons in connection with the slayings of Brig. Gen. Juan Sanchez Ramos, a 64-year-old artillery officer, and his aide, Lt. Col. Juan Perez Rodriguez, 59. But police said none of the suspects appeared to be the assassins.

In a tense session of Parliament three hours after the killings, Suarez called the shooting an attempt "to provoke the armed forces and the police."

He vowed that democratic reforms instituted since the death of dictator Francisco Franco, including a new constitution awaiting parliamentary approval, would not be dismantled

Scalper sells only the best in tickets

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - A Dallas man who says he makes his living scalping tickets for rock concerts and sporting events got the jump on Rolling Stones' fans by buying more than 200 tickets before they were adver-

Earlier this week, Chuck Southerland said, he called the advertising department at Tucson Newspapers Inc., "and asked a girl if there were ads for Stones tickets and she read me off the phone numbers."

Thus, many tickets advertised in the next day's newspapers were already sold by the time the papers hit

the streets. The ads were placed by those fortunate enough to get tickets at the box office and who were seeking to make a profit of their own. Buyers were limited to six tickets and the 11,000 passes sold out in 45 minutes as police struggled to maintain control.

"The government is not going to tolerate extremist reactions of any kind," he said, a warning to rightwingers demanding the army seize power to quell violence.

An anonymous caller told the Marid news magazine Cambio 16 that the Proletarian Armed Group was re-

sponsible for the shootings. 'We have executed two military fascists this morning and we will

continue doing so," the caller said. Police sources said the group could have links to a splinter group of the Italian Red Brigades, which also uses

the same name. Police said the six suspects arrested included two members of the Maoist organization called GRAPO that kidnapped one of King Juan Carlos' advisors in late 1976 and an army general in 1977, both of whom were freed unharmed in police raids.

GRAPO is an acronym that stands for "Revolutionary anti-fascist group of the first of October," a date the group's commandos killed a number of policemen in Madrid three years

Sanchez Ramos, in charge of military supplies and a man with virtually no political record, was the highest ranking Spaniard assassinated since Premier Luis Carrero Blanco was

killed in a bomb blast in 1973. Witnesses said a young man wth a mustache and a young woman in a green dress got out of the taxi and approached the general's car as his aide was unfurling a one-star flag

denoting his rank. Police said the two pumped nearly a dozen bullets from their pistols through the windows of the car, and that two bullets hit the general in the head.

The killers fled in the taxi but a police sergeant opened fire at the fleeing car. Blood stains found in the abandoned taxi indicated one of the terrorists may have been wounded.

Police said the taxi was left at Madrid's Chamartin rail station where the couple forced a motorist at gunpoint to drive toward a superhighway on the capital's fringe. The motorist was left on a road unharmed. ATTENTION SELLERS:






