Lenin, believed this in Lenin, believed this in all sincerity. But, as history so often proves,
theories are one thing, while practheories are one thing, while prac-
tice can be enormously different tice can be enormously different. So

Under the long reign of Stalin the socia and economic the masses of people and the rela-
tively small number at the upper and steadifly widened. Autherity uper ter authority has described this trend in innumerable books and arless society, Communism resulted in
class distinctions to a far greater Class distinctions to a far greater
degree than is known in most of the non-Communist world.
Now, with Stalin dead and Malenkow and his associates in power,
it looks as if the gap between the many and the few is to be widened
many and even more.
This may seem surprising to those
