Leader Who Failed

Lesson for May 2, 1954

T' IS said that at the time of the French Revolution there was one day a tremendous uproar in the streets, of Paris, and an eldergentleman who had not kept up with the news, inquired what it was: "It sounds like a revolt," said he. "Not a revolt, Sire," was the reply, "-a revolution." A rewolft is a revolution that doesn't "click": a revolution is a revolt that succeeds. Yet

the success of a revolution is not to be measured by what it accommlishes there and them. Only as the years go on can any man assess a mew movement

political or any other sort. What Dr. Foreman happened to Jeroboam's revoluthon, the one the prophet Ahijah approved and authorized?

Success in the First Chapter

If Jeroboam had had any ghost writers and if they had written the story of his political coup, they could have made it sound tremendous success. Jeroboarn himself was young, able, and with immense political sagacity. He was a good organizer, and he was a popular man. As a labor leader under King Solomon he knew how to deal with people and as a political exile in Egypt for many years what he had not Marned about the ins and outs of international politics was probably not worth learning. He had succeeded in drawing out of the original united Kingdom of Solomon ten out of the twelve tribes that composed it. Population, wealth, opportunity - everything was in his favor, plus the basic fact that a prophet of God was behind the movement to begin with With God and the people on his side, how could Jeroboam lose?

Failure in the Last Chapter When Jeroboam was some years older; a son of his lay very sick,

and the king thought again of the prophet Ahijah who had once been his: friend. Ahijah could surely tell him whether the child would Miven But Jeroboam's queen, at Ahijah's door, met with no welcome. Quite the contrary: the old prophet cursed King Jeroboam and all his house. The revolution which had begun with the blessing of God upon it, ended by inourring the anger of God. The king who had begun with such overwhelming success ended as a failure. If the secession of the ten. tribes had proved to be a failure. it was not that there was anything sinful in the idea itself, but that the revolution had been in Jeroboam's hands not a means of helping the people but of doing them

. Who Made Israel to Sin." More than one writer in later times used the same standard formula for this Jeroboam. He is called "Jeroboam the son of Nebat, who made Israel to sin." That is a terrible tag to hang on a man; that he is the cause of a nation's sin. But it was true of this man. What in particular had Jeroboam done, as King of Israel, to "make Israel to sin"? His great sins were two, but they were part of the same policy. It will be remembered that this was shortly after the time of Solomon, and the great temple which Solomon built was still the center of the religious life of all the twelve tribes. When Jeroboam engineered his revolution, he felt it to be a dangerous thing for the temple to be in the hands of the Kingdom of Judah up there in Jerusalem. So he organized two other religious centers, at convenient locations, Bethel in the south, Dan in the north; and in these newly appointed "shrine cities" he set up gold-plated calves and other animals as the gods of his people. In two ways among others, this was ruinous to right religion, and led to the decay of the nation.

God Is Not Mocked

First this involved the sin of making religion a department of the government. As King, Jeroboam attempted to dictate (and only too successfully) where and how his people should worship. The priests in his shrine cities were political appointees. Religion was subsidized by the state. But worse than that: Jeroboam tied the people down to a crude and cheap kind of religion. For the great invisible God of heaven and earth (see Solomon's prayer in I Kings 3) Jeroboam substituted gold-plated statues of bulls and he-goats. Debasing religion, he debased his people. Cheap and bad religion will ruin a nation faster than fire



Casualty Insurance Claims Are Heavy

People in Texas were paid \$20, 537,994 by casualty insurance companies, for personal injuries arising out of automobile accidents on highways during 1952, R. T. Mansfield, President of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service of Dallas, reported today.

"During the same year," Mansfield said, "Property damage losses were paid to the public in the amount of \$14,732,818; and automobile fire, theft and collission payments to insurance companies paid \$9,195,632, making a total of \$81,436,403 paid to the people of Texas."

This attitude of apathy and indidderence toward the careless and reckless driver has resulted in a constant upward trend of insurance costs," Mansfield declar-

> Streams of visitors are now pouring into Washington. Crowds of eager-faced school children pile out of big travel busses to have a look at the pictured white city of marble

They are a part of the three million Americans, including a halfmillion school children, who are expected to visit Washington by the end of June. Yet throughout the year visitors flock here from all parts of the Country and the world. Increasingly strange garbs are seen on the street and strange accents are heard.

I sometimes wonder what this Nation's Captital means to all these strangers. They must feel differently in this city, which all Americans own, than they do about any other place.

However, regardless of where one is, people must feel about cities much as they do about human beings. Their likes and dislikes probably originate chiefly from general impressions. Most of us have pleasant or unpleasant memories about places we visit. and mostly we form our opinions by whether our experiences were good or bad. Justified or not, it is usually true. Clean, Up, Fix Up And Paint Up!

Clean up, fix up, and paint up is a popular springtime slogan and rightly so, says W. S. Allen, extension engineer.

Take painting for example, he says. Right now is the time to get a first class paint job. The weather is relatively dry and temperatures mod-

The best paint in the world can't stand up if applied in wet or damp weather. In addition, sudden changes in temperature may cause new paint to wrinkle.

Conditions during April and May are optimum, Allen says.

Avoid painting when insects are numerous or when dust is blowing. Paint, at least as much as possible, in the shade. It's easier on the worker and direct sun light does not fall upon the newly applied coat.

Possibly the main consideration is the selection of outside paints suited to the climate. In humid, warm areas, hard type paints stand up better and softer paints are best suited in dry areas. Paint dealers can recommend the best type.

The next rules are simple, but important. he says. Get the surface clean, dry, and free from old, loose materials. Three or four light coats are much better than a single thick application.

Finally, each coat should be allowed to dry thoroughly before the next is applied.
