

ton farmers, and in reducing Government expenditures.

Production of upland cotton this year is now estimated at 10.2 million bales, as compared to 14.8 million bales in 1965. Officials point out that the sharp reduction in production in 1966 is greater than was anticipated or even desired in any one year. Factors other than the operation of theprogram contributed to the lower than expected production. Abnormal weather conditions and increased insect infestation hit hard at the 1966 crop. With the kind of program outlined herein for 1967 it is expected that under normal production conditions the 1967 crop may well be as much as 2 million bales larger than 1966 production.

As is past years, the program must be approved in a national referendum by cotton gorwers before it can be placed in operation. The referendum will be by mail during the period Dec. 5 through 9. In this referendum at least twothirds of the cotton farmers voting must approve cotton marketing quotas before the essential features of the program can go into effect. If more than one-third of the growers vote "no", the only cotton program will be price support at 50 percent of parity for growers who do not exceed their acreage allotments.

The cotton program is voluntary. The farmer who wants to take part in the program and thus becomes a "cooperator" agrees to divert at least 12.5 percent of his effective cotton allotment into soil conserving uses. For this, he will be eligible to receive price support loans and payments and acreage diversion payments.

Price-support loans will be available to "Cooperators" in the cotton acreage diversion program. The loan rates for individual qualities will be based on a national average loan rate of 20.25 cents per pound for Middling 1-inch cotton at average location.



about one more day of ginning in all and Paymaster said only about 20 more bales are expected to be brought to their yards. Other gins have cleared their yards.

Joe Harbin, Bailey County Electric spokesman said there would be some additional cotton brought in to the 16 rural gins. but number was expected to be few.

The harvest is far ahead of last year in timeing. On January 9, cotton farmers and ginners estimated approximately 90 percent of the harvest complete, with 86,000 bales.

Bailey county produced 93. 816 bales during the 1965-66 harvest season, the U.S. Bureau of Census reported, a gain of over 10,000 bales over the previous year's total of 83. 733 bales.

The August estimate for the 1966 cotton crop was a bale per acre. Last year, the county had 103,000 acres in cotton while this year's acreage was set at 63,000 acres. This estimate was issued by the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

"So comparison-wise, in spite of the early freeze, the cotton crop is as good this year as average for previous years." What a wonderful cotton crop acreage allotment. Unless we would have had if freeze had farmers divert the acreage they delayed to early November, grower experts add. Farmers are about 30 days

ahead of schedule on preparing for 1967 crops.







GOURMET COOK

Tips FROM THE OFFICE OF Robin Daufer

Research shows that the roots of trees and shrubs can grow whenever the temperature is about 45 degrees and upward. Since transplanting is always damaging to the root system, this gives plants the winter season for roots to regrow and get ready for spring. If this repairing of roots has to take place at the same time leaves are growing, then the plant has more trouble surviving.

Another reason for fall planting is that there are several months for the soil to become firmly settled. Nurserymen know the soil must be firm around the roots and they can still do this even in the spring. Still, it is easier in the fall with nature doing the firming with rainfall and time. It is also best for the amateur gardener.

Severe pruning of the top growth is essential if plants are to survive. This is especially true of late spring plantings. At least 1/3 to 1/2 of the top growth should be removed to compensate for loss of roots.



Eleven Months Records Show 62 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Bailey County during the month of November, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two deaths, six persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$26,605.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1966 shows a total of 62 accidents resulting in five persons killed, 50 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$81,700.00. The 1966 December traffic cloud hangs very low and dark over the Texas streets and highways horizon. What does the traffic picture look like for this year-end holiday season? If it is anything like the repeat of the past it is going to be a very sad one for Texas History. Since 1960, traffic deaths in Texas have risen from 2,254 to 3,028 in 1965. At the beginning of this present month, the traffic fatality count in Texas was 2,921. Motorists are now driving during the most deadly month of the year. December, 1965 was the most deadly month in the history of this state with

363 traffic fatalities. What kind of picture could this year end with? The 2,921 traffic deaths already recorded plus 363 deaths similar to last December would give a total of 3,284 traffic deaths. The Sergeant stated it is estimated that this year's traffic death count will be about 15 per cent over




