'Hammers Win Game With Post 26-12 Friday

Last Friday night football fans witnessed a thrill-packed game between the Rotan Yellowhammers and the Post Antelopes. Yellowhammers topped the Antelopes by a score of 26 to 12.

Post won the toss and elected to receive, and Ernest Taggart's opening kick-off was returned to the Post 39. From that point the Antelopes drove to the Rotan 20 and D. Norman carried the ball on an end around to score 6 points. Norman's try for extra point failed.

Rotan bounced back as Jimmy Waddell received the kick-off and handed off to Wesley Minton for the most perfectly executed play of the game. Waddell's tricky deception allowed Minton a clear field as he raced 80 yards for the first Rotan tally. Jim Ashley's conversion attempt failed, making the score 6-6.

In the 2nd quarter Post's J. Smith intercepted a pass by Minton, intended for Neal Funk, and ran 30 yards for a touchdown. Murry's try for point was no good.

Rotan retaliated with line drives and passes. A 36-yard pass from Funk to George Bridges set up Rotan's second touchdown. Funk and Minton alternated on drives to the Post 1, where Minton carried over for the score. Ashley's try for extra point was good. The first half ended with the score 13-12.

In the third quarter both teams were stalemated for a period with Post stacking up yardage only to lose the ball on downs. Rotan, in possession of the ball, could make little gain against the Antelopes' defense. It was 4th down coming up, with 3 yards to go from the Post 39 as the Yellowhammers took a terrific gamble and ran the ball from regular formation through the Post lines for the yardage necessary for 1st down. Again, after three tries, Rotan faced another 4th down and a yard to go, as they lined up in punt formation. However, another risk proved good when Minton took the ball on a direct snap from center and went through the Post line for 52 yards and Yellowhammer touchdown. Try for point by Ashley was wide.

Post began the 4th quarter by long drives down to Rotan's 11, only to lose the ball on a fumble. The Yellowhammers moved down the field for 89 yards. Main gainers in this drive were a 43-yd. scamper by Minton and a beautiful 20-yard pass from Funk complete to Jerry Black, who then raced over for the final tally of the game. Ashley's conversion was good.

Post shaded Rotan in yards rushing and in first down statistics. Post netted 211 yards rushing to 192 for Rotan, and the Antelopes racked up 13 first downs to 10 for Rotan.

In the passing department, Rotan completed 5 of 11 tries for 65 yards and Post failed to complete any of 6. Rotan drew 5 penalties for 25 yards, and Post was penalized 4 times for 20.

Rotan punted 3 times for a 33 yard average, and Post punted one time for 48 yards. Both teams lost possession of the ball one time on fumbles. Some excellent ball handling and running was done by Murry, Norman and Morris for Post. The Yellowhammer offensive line play was outstanding throughout the game.

This Friday the Yellowhammers have an open date and expect to take advantage of the next two weeks to work on blocking and tackling in preparation for their game with the Stamford Bulldogs Thursday night, Oct. 21 at Stamford.

J. C. Stribling Dies Of Heart Attack

J. C. Stribling, prominent rancher of the county died last Wednesday at 9:15 p. m. in Callan Hospital of heart attack.

He became ill at his ranch north of town, early Wednesday night. A grandson, Clay Fowler, who lives nearby brought him to the hospital.

Funeral was held in Llano last Friday at 2 p. m. with burial also at Llano.

Survivors are two sons, John Stribling of Alamosa, Col.; and J. C. Stribling Jr., of Milburn, Okla.; nine grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

Among the grandchildren is Ruth Fowler of Rotan, who ranches with her brother, Clay Fowler, here and at Llano. She also teaches in the local high school.

Mr. Stribling's wife died Aug. 11 1950.

Mr. Stribling was born in Fayette county. He managed a ranch for his father in Llano county at the age of 16 and went into business for himself at 18 by herding cattle and dealing in cattle, horses and mules.

He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Clayton Stribling. He was born Oct. 14, 1884, near Winchester, Fayette County. He would have been 90 on Oct. 14 this year.

From 1876 to 1886 Mr. Stribling dealt in the sale and trade of horses and mules traveling over the entire state.

W. W. Cave Dies After Extended Illness

Walter W. Cave, an early day settler of Fisher County, rancher and pioneer cowboy, died at 4 a. m. Tuesday morning in the local hospital. He had been seriously ill for three weeks.

Funeral services were conducted from the Hobbs Baptist Church at 3:00 p. m. Wednesday by the pastor, Rev. O. C. Byrd. Interment was in the Hobbs cemetery.

Mr. Cave was born in 1872 and came to this county with his parents in 1877. He began his schooling in 1882 when he was 10, but school was broken up for two years by an epidemic of disease and by that time he was old enough to go to work. He worked on ranches in this area for years and was well known to all the old timers.

An outstanding and unusual feature of Mr. Cave's early life was that he never drank or smoked. It has been told by his companions when they were on the trail with cattle to the northern railheads that when they camped near a town all the cowboys who could be spared from the herd always went into town for a binge, but Mr. Cave would get a sack of candy and stay in camp, perfectly contented.

On May 5, 1897 he was married to Anna Simmons of Roby. They moved to land he had purchased in the Hobbs area. He started with four sections and finally enlarged his holdings to eight sections.

Mrs. Cave died in 1904 and on December 9, 1906 he was married to Miss Lavonia Shanks of the Hobbs community, who survives. The caves lived in that area until moving to another home west of Rotan in 1946.

Survivors include, in addition to his widow, five sons: Winfred of Jayton, M. L. of Rotan, J. S., and J. C. and Dale of Hobbs, one daughter Mrs. Earl Boyer of Rotan, Mark of brothers, Emmett of Rotan, Mark of Stonewall county, and Jim of Roby; one sister, Mrs. W. W. Barron of San Angelo; 17 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Near Five Thousand Bales Ginned

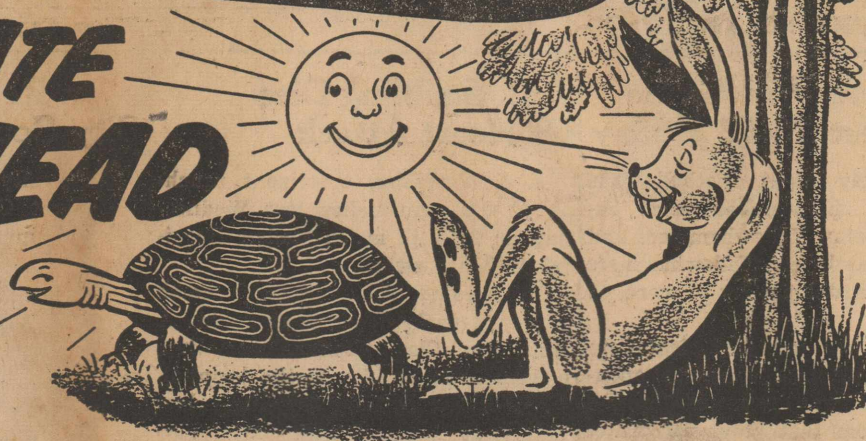
The four gins of Rotan have been very busy since the rain last week. A total of 4,837 bales had been reached Wednesday afternoon.

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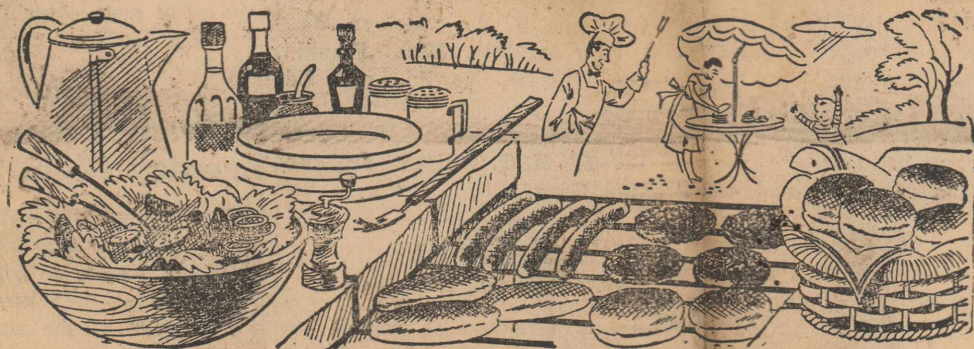

Baptist Student Union To Meet in Abilene

More than 2,000 students from 60 college and professional school campuses in Texas are expected to attend the annual state Baptist Student Union Convention October 15-17 in Abilene.

Two of the six sessions during the convention will be devoted to mission, which has been emphasized in all phases of Texas BSU activities this year, according to W. F. Howard of Dallas, state BSU director.

Two foreign mission appointees of the Southern Baptist Convention, Rev. and Mrs. Bill Dyal, have been delayed enroute to their mission field in Guatemala in order to speak to students during the Saturday evening session. Bob Harris, Southern Baptist missionary to Peru, will also speak; and Dr. Elmer S. West, Jr., secretary for missionary personnel, SBC Foreign Mission Board, Richmond, Va., will present a mission challenge in his message on "World Discipleship."

Testimonies from student summer missionaries, "Vocationers," youth evangelists, home missionaries, "Invincibles," and church volunteers will be given during the Saturday afternoon session.

Other speakers during the three-day meeting include Dr. J. P. Allen, Charlottesville, Va.; Dr. G. Kearnie Keegan, Nashville, Tenn., and Dr. Carl E. Bates, Amarillo.

Dr. Forrest C. Feezor, Dallas, executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, and the state BSU choir composed of students from various campuses and directed by Wayne Philpott of Baylor, will be in charge of a 20-minute worship period at the beginning of each session.

For the first time the state BSU president will bring the closing message of the convention. This year's president, Lonnie Kliever of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, will speak on "The Cost of Discipleship" during the Sunday morning worship service.

Theme of the convention will be "Toward Twentieth Century Discipleship." Session will be held at the First Baptist Church in Abilene with Dr. Elwin L. Skiles as host pastor.

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**C. C. Roach New
FHA Committeeman**

Mr. C. C. Roach of Rotan, Texas is the newly appointed member of the Fisher County Farmers Home Administration committee, Robert E. Deaton, Jr., the agency's county supervisor announced this week. The appointment became effective October 6, 1954.

Mr. Roach operates a general farm located west of Rotan, Texas. He is a former manager of the Rotan Gin Company. Previous to this, he served as president of the bank at Bardwell, Texas.

The other two members of the three-member committee are Geogre Pyburn of Longworth, Texas, and David Williams, of Hobbs, Texas. Both have operated a farm in the county a number of years. Mr. Pyburn has served on the committee the past two years, and Mr. Williams serving on the past year.

Each member is named for a three year term, and one appointment expires each year. No member completing a three-year term can succeed himself.

Every agricultural county in the country has such a committee to help the Farmers Home Administration county supervisor adapt the agency's loan policies to local conditions including farm credit needs.

During the past year, the county committee for Fisher County has approved 232 loans out of a total of 234 applications received, Mr. Deaton reported.

The Farmers Home Administration makes loans to family-type farm operators to buy, improve, or operate efficient farms, or to construct or repair farm water facilities need-

ed for profitable operation. Special livestock loans are made where temporary credit is needed to enable the operator to remain in operation. The agency also makes emergency loans in counties or States that have been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture as areas where emergency credit is needed. However the agency does not make loans of any type to any applicant whose needs can be handled by other credit sources.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency, an applicant must have the approval of the county committee. In the case of a farm ownership loan, the farm to be purchased, enlarged, or improved must

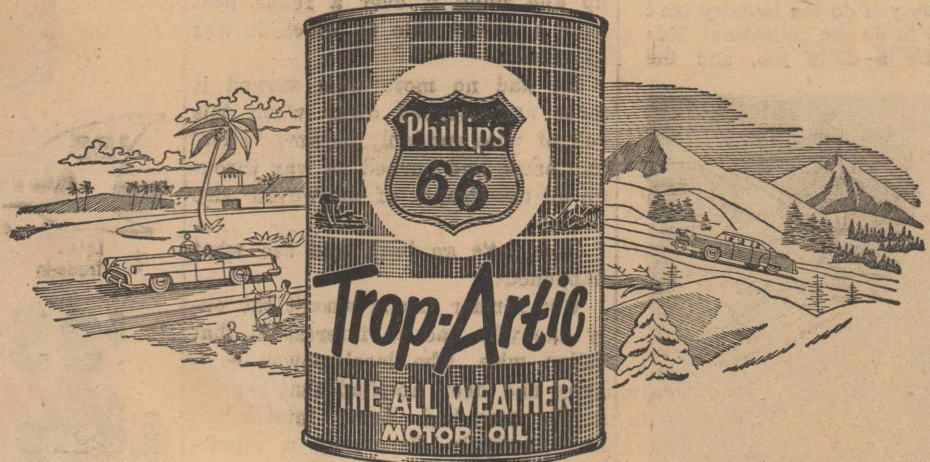

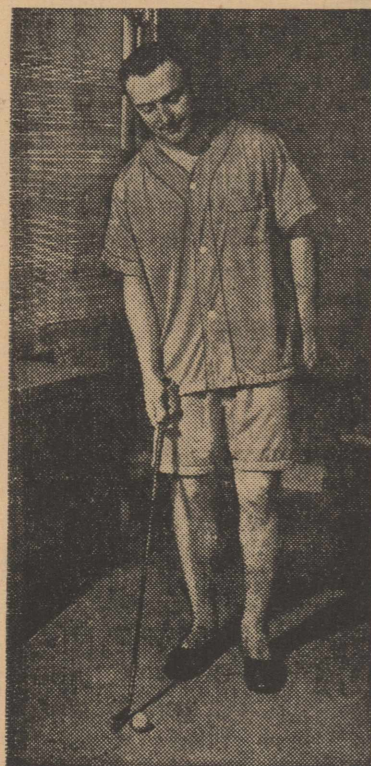

WOMAN'S WORLD

Save Much Energy Plus Valuable Time In Sorting Laundry

LAUNDERING isn't the problem it used to be, but there are still many time and energy-saving steps which might be used by homemakers who really want to be efficient about the job. Rigid rules aren't popular, for each woman has her personal problems with laundry and likes to work out her own solutions. However, for those who do want to think about ways to save themselves, here are some procedures which have worked successfully for many others.

Collecting and Sorting
The day you do the laundry isn't the time to do the collecting! This should be a daily job, and the

best receptacle is a ventilated hamper placed conveniently to bathroom or bedrooms or both.

Don't wear yourself out sorting the clothes. Start by being comfortable and see to it there's no stooping and bending which sap your energies.

Sorting can be done on a table, counter, rack or even cardboard boxes which are high enough so they can be reached at a no-bend level. The floor is a poor place for sorting because you stoop and bend too much.

Washing Tips
Infant and sickroom clothing should be washed separately from the regular laundry. Do these first or last.

If there is any doubt about whether some new apparel will wash, then test for color-fastness by this method: Place in a small jar with water and soap or detergent a small sample cut from pocket, placket or underneath belt. Let stand a few minutes, then shake jar.

Meat Loaves Are Economical Dishes

Meat loaves are one of the most economical, and, at the same time, versatile meat dishes which the homemaker can make. Their seasonings may be changed to give variety; they can be served hot or cold.

You'll like them, too, because they're at home in your dining room, back porch supper or at a picnic.

Here are two different kinds of meat loaves, both well seasoned and tasty:

- Horseradish Meat Loaf**
(Serves 12)
2 pounds ground beef
1 pound ground pork
¼ cup grated onion
¼ cup horseradish
1 teaspoon mustard
2 eggs
1 cup cracker crumbs
1 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
¼ cup tomato catsup

Mix all ingredients except catsup. Pack into well greased loaf pan. Cover top with catsup. Bake in a moderate (350°) oven for one hour.

- Savory Meat Loaf**
(Serves 6)
½ pound ground beef
½ pound ground pork
½ pound ground veal
6 slices bread
1 cup milk
1 cup buttermilk
¼ cup grated onion
¼ cup grated raw potato
2 teaspoons sugar
2 teaspoons salt
½ teaspoon pepper

Have meat ground 3 times. Remove crusts from bread and soak in milk for one hour. Thoroughly mix all ingredients. Pack into loaf pan. Bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 1½ hours.

Electricity Never Forgets—Do You—

It's too bad that a fallen wire doesn't have a little sign that pops out with, "Do Not Touch" on it.

A wire on a rural line broke and fell near one end of a corn field recently. A device protecting this portion of the line automatically shut off the circuit. The property owner was cultivating corn, working his way slowly toward the fallen wire.

Not wishing to drive over it and perhaps damage it, he dismounted from his cultivator, picked up the end of the wire, carefully rolled it up and hung it over a fence post near a power pole to which it was attached.

He had no more than turned it loose and stepped away when this coil of wire suddenly became "alive" and arced and burned its way through all the strands of the woven wire fence.

Now let's go back and see what happened:

Our farmer friend wasn't the only one who had an interest in that fallen wire. The local power company had been notified that service in the area had been interrupted and promptly dispatched a repairman to investigate.

Unaware of the actions of each other:

The farmer stopped his tractor at almost the same time the repair truck drew up some distance away.

The farmer started to roll up the wire.

A repairman started to climb the pole to check the switch.

As the farmer finished rolling up the wire, the repairman decided to test the line.

The farmer hung the loop of wire on the fence post and turned away. The repairman closed the switch.

And the farmer had missed death by seconds!

Electricity is a relatively new mir-

acle to many rural areas in the country. When handled properly it is, beyond any doubt, one of the wonders of the world. But it can become a deadly weapon when it isn't handled correctly, as the farmer al-

most found out. In order to protect yourself and your families there are a few simple procedures that should be followed at all times:

1. Consider every fallen wire as dangerous.
2. Keep a safe distance from any

fallen wire.

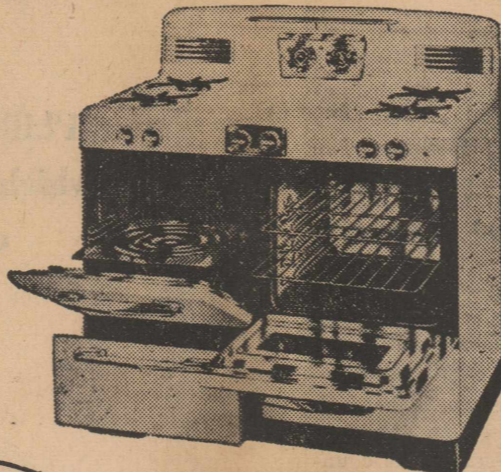
3. Telephone wires and electric wires look the same — don't try to tell them apart.

4. Notify the proper authorities as soon as you spot a fallen wire.

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5. If necessary, post a guard by the wire to keep others from coming into contact with it.

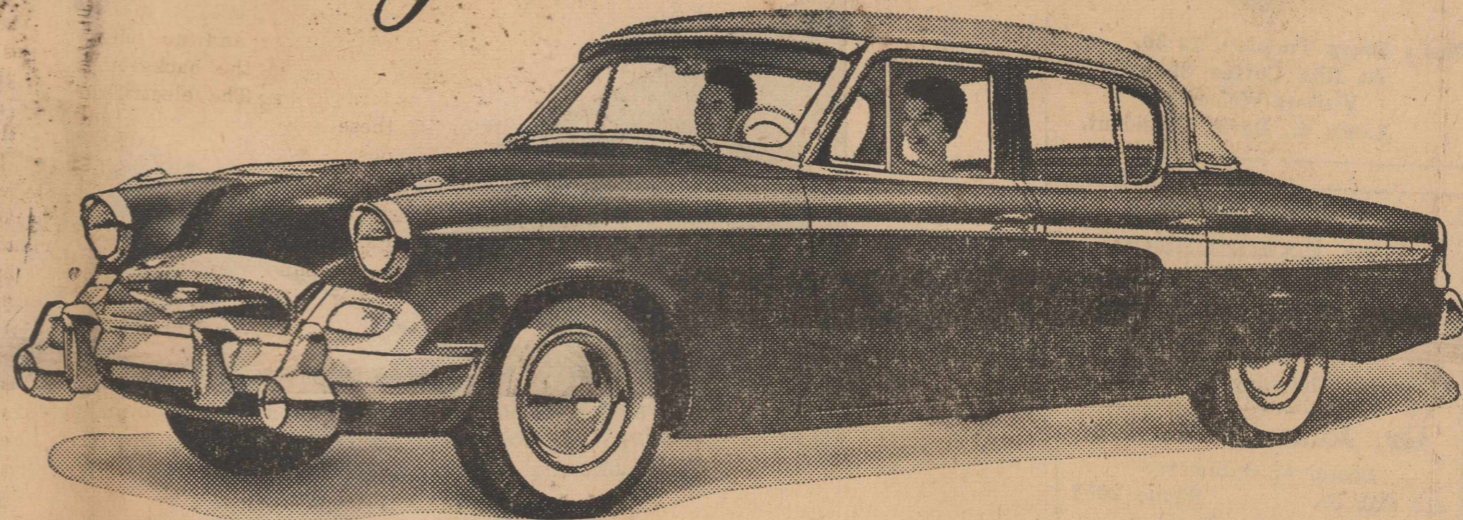
