



# Editorials New Strike Law

Guest Editorial

Those who have hoped for legislation barring strikes which threaten national security and disrupt the economy or the masses of citizens were encouraged by the recent revelation that a special panel had been set up by President Lyndon Johnson to study this question,

It is not known whetere the panel's recommendations will be acted upon or even what they are. However, organized labor is fearful new legislation will be proposed by the President, legislation designed to cope with strikes periling the nation's welfare. And a growing number of Senators and Congressmen feel a bill might be given serious consideration in the next Congress.

Should the White House propose legislation in this field to the 90th Congress, or if the President does not oppose a private bill in this field, it's possible the Taft-Hartley and the Railway Labor acts would be amended.

President Johnson promised to introduce anti-strike legislation a year ago, during the airline strike and other transportation industry strikes and there has been wide-spread agitation for such a law. The President, however, has not acted.

The right to strike is a right which must be preserved. On the other hand, present labor-management laws governing the U.S. scene do not adequately protect the majority or the national welfare and certain strikes, at certain times, are intolerable if the nation's security and the welfare of its people are to be given paramount consideration. Concerning these, the nation's interests require orderly settlement by arbitration.

## The Grandparenting Job

Our modern industrial culture has practically put grandparents out of business. That is, so far as their traditional function with respect to their grandchildren is concerned.

Industrialization and urbanization have also brought a high degree of mobility. As a result, fewer and fewer grandparents live in the same area as their married children, much less close by. And rarely, indeed, do grandparents live in the same house with their children and grandchildren as was often the case in the past.

Consequently, the majority of children grow up without the gentle influence of the of the senior citizen in their lives. And many older people miss out on the pleasure of association with the young and the satisfaction of telling them stories, reading to them or doing the countless little things that grandparents customarily love to do to delight the younger ones.

Of course, in many instances, it's just as well for the grandparents that this situation exists. Some products of modern permissive parenthood would spoil the retirement leisure of even the most loving and patient grandparents.

Still it can be suspected, overall, the loss of contact between these two generations has resulted in the loss of something of great value to grandchildren, grandparents and society as

God gives us treasure. Christians have a special way of


