The door was opened by Ann Tillotson. Mrs. D. L. Swint registered guests. Others in the house-party were Meses. J. C. Parks, D. J. Smith, J. V. Hellums, Flora Blount, Annie Tillotson, T. O. Levens, Miss Pat Blount, Mrs. H. B. Campbell and Mrs. Joe Kiker.

Mrs. Tillotson is Mrs. Whitfield's sister, and H. B. Campbell is her brother. She has another sister, Mrs. C. A. Peters of Dallas, and another brother, A. B. Campbell of Colorado.

Mr. Whitfield has one sister, Mrs. Glen Rector of Chow Chilla, Calif., and one brother, Marvin

Whitfield of Santa Cruz.

Guests came from Seymour, San Angelo, Fort Worth, Dallas, Clairemont, Lubbock, Jayton, Sweetwater, Roby, Hamlin, Snyder, Abilene, Bronte, Aspermont, Stamford, Eastland, and Post.

Reception table was laid with lace and centered with gold mums and yellow jonquils. Anniversary cake highlighted the table. Flowers in gold and yellow were in the living room and bedrooms of the home. Gifts were on display.

The Whitfields arrived before the town did and they've been around ever since, except for 15 years they were in the grocery business in Clairemont. And they were in Rotan every week during that time.

The Whitfields sold their grocery business at Clairemont to return to Rotan in 1952.

Mr. Whitfield was born in Cleburne County, Ala., Jan. 15, 1873, son of Mrs. and Mrs. J. N. Whitfield. He came by rail in an immigrant car, filled with Alabamans, to Jones County, in 1891. He stayed there less than a year and moved on with a bunch from his native state to do farm work at Anson.

He moved to Dublin, in Erath County, in 1892 and farmed there until 1896. He was married the first time to Miss Nona Thomas at Stephenville, May 15, 1895. They

came to Fisher County in 1896 to farm three miles west of the present town of Rotan. Later they farmed the old Langham place, southeast of the present town, moving to the Dowell community to go into the grocery business in 1902.

Double tragedy struck Whitfield that year. His wife died April 2, 1902, and his store burned.

Starting out again, he worked for the J. W. Ezell and J. D. Smith General Mercantile Store at Dowell. He bought the store in 1906. His business partner was W. W. Jeffers. When the new railroad town of Rotan was established in 1907 they moved the business into Rotan. They added another building to the one they moved from Dowell.

Fire struck again that same year. "We were too close to a paint shop," Whitfield says. The paint shop burned and so did his business. "There was no water, no fire department — we just had to watch it burn," he says.

They opened up again on the corner where Ragsdale Drug now stands. He soon sold out and went to work for J. V. Hellums Grocery, and then for W. T. Patterson's Dry Goods. Later he was in grocery business for himself before moving to Clairemont in 1936.

He was married to Miss Lillie Leona Campbell at Roby on Jan. 29, 1905. Her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Campbell, owned farm land west of Roby.

Mrs. Whitfield was born near Staples, in Guadalupe County, and came with her parents to Roby in 1890.

Mr. Whitfield was present when the First Baptist Church of Rotan was organized in the old J. T. Smart building in 1907. He served as deacon in the church for 29 years, and church clerk and treasurer for 25 years.

During the 25 years he held church office he was absent only one Sunday and that was the day his father was buried. He served 13 years on the school board and was secretary of the board for part of that time.

A heart condition keeps him pretty close to home these days but Mrs. Whitfield is still active. She is a member of the Baptist Church. Two hundred and twelve guests registered.

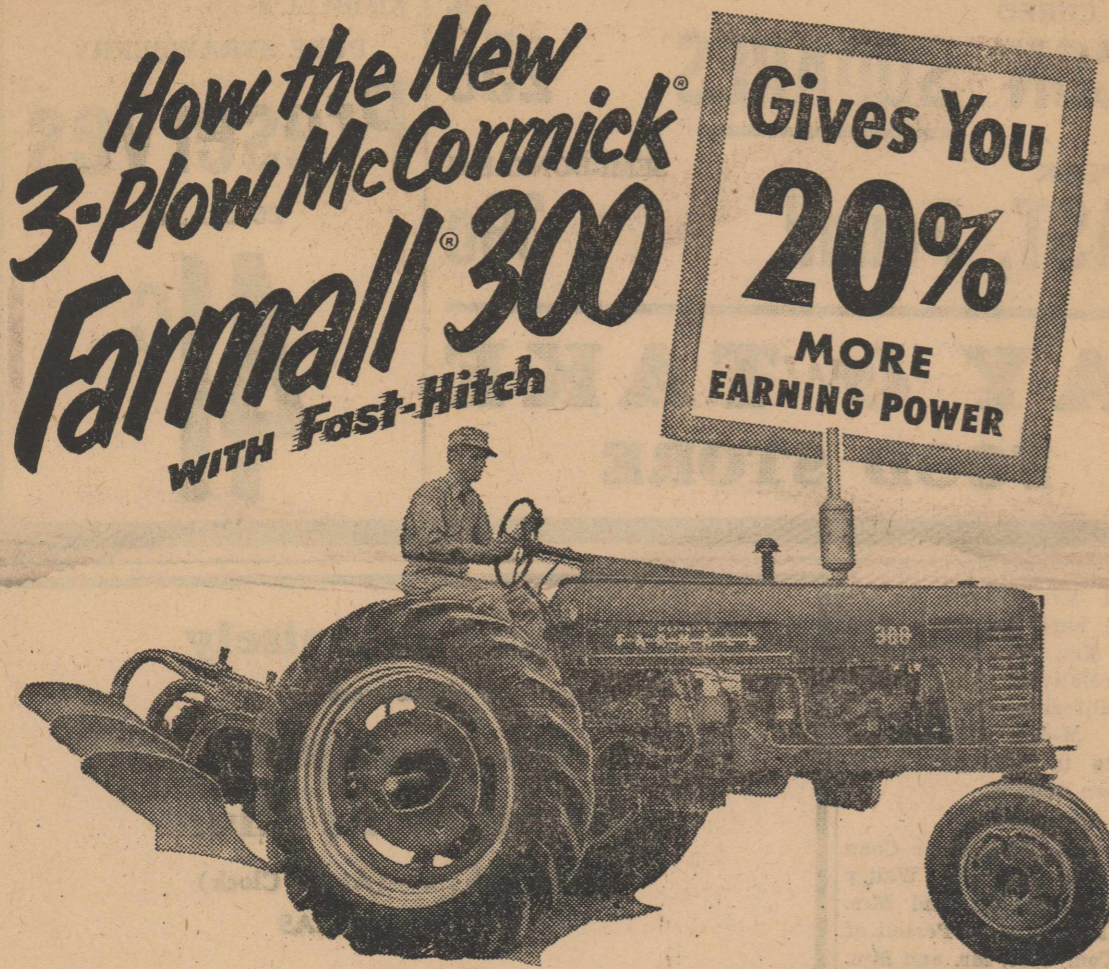

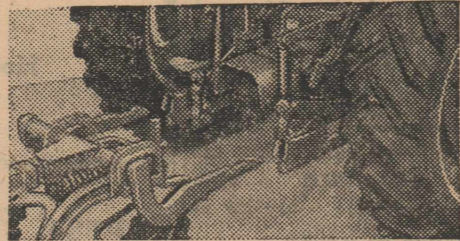
