Cotton insect inspection of fields

In one field of early planted cotton just west of the Celo-Tex plant near (Hamlin leaf worm infestation showed to be about 20% and is considered at this time to be very damaging.

All fields of 4-6 leaf stage cotton near the early planted cotton are showing a medium amount of infestation with thrips and flea hoppers. Two fields were heavily infested.

All fields of 4-6 leaf stage cotton n county show light to medium thrip and flea hopper infestation.

Leaf worms have completely destroyed a 5-6 acre field of young cotton near Royston.



Grasshoppers continue to be problem. Where cotton is large use Toxaphene 1 to 2 qts. per acre; Chloradane 2 qts. per acre; or Aldrin 1 pint per acre. Apply at spots where hoppers are working. Fence rows and on rows bordering pastures are likely to be most heavily infested. Bait mixtures can be used and formula obtained from druggist or feed dealers.

Careless worms are bad where any careless weeds made growth. DDT at the rate of 1 to 2 percent per acre depending upon the size of the cotton is very effective for killing them. Careless worms usually last about 7 days; however we can have as many as three generations in a year that will damage crops. On the late cotton it is important

to watch for thrip and fleahopper damage as they usually get first crop and time doesn't allow us to miss first crop this year. Toxaphene, DDT, Aldrin on a mixture of Toxaphene and DDT will give effective

State Health Officer Warns of Danger From Rheumatic Fever

Austin, July 5-The outlook in the fight against rheumatic fever has improved, but this disease, which begins most often between the ages of five and fifteen, still results in serious heart damage in many cases, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

Rheumatic fever usually strikes after a notice and throat infection caused by germs of the streptococcus family. An average of three out of one hundred of the commonly called "strep" infections are followed by rheumatic fever.

Sulfonamide and penicillin usually can overcome the infection. But if rheumatic fever develops, strict bed rest is the first resort to ease the load on the heart and to help the patient avoid added infec-

Sometimes sulpha or penicllin may be given to the convalescing patient to help avoid a recurrence of the disease. Repeated attacks of rheumatic fever are more likely to lead to heart damage.

The rheumatic heart condition can involve damage to one or more of the four valves of the heart or to the heart muscle itself. Rheumatic fever inflames the valves and muscles and when the inflamation subsides, it usually leaves a scar.


In about two out of three cases this fever leaves no heart damage, or causes so little injury that the victim lan regain active, everyday living. In oher cases, modern surgery may help.





John's attorney interposed the defense of the statute of limitations, the groceryman was denied judgmen. Yet there was no question but that John owed the money. One may ask why the laws permit such a defense as the statute of limitations, or outlaws an otherwise valid

The groceryman slept on his rights. He should have acted sooner. The courts cannot be used for processing stale claims. Proof of such claims is more difficult. One litigant might wait for the only adverse witness to die, and then sue. Memories grow dim and sometimes are nodified to fit one's desired veiws. So the law says it is no injustice to force a litigant to act within a reasonable ime, whereas if he doesn't injustice is more likely to happen.

Practically all actions have time limitations. With some it is very short, as some claims against a municipality require that notice to the municipality must be given within en days afer the accident. On the


