Emergency Wind Erosion Control Practice

A payment of \$2.00 per acre will be made in Fisher County for seeding Oats, Barley, or Rye in the Fall of 1955 to establish a cover for the control of wind erosion. Seeding rates must be from 30 to 40 pounds per acre and seeding must be done prior to December 1, 1955.

Grazing consistent with good management will be permitted, but a crop will not qualify if harvested for any purpose. The crop must be left on the land until the land is plowed in preparation for seeding a crop in the Spring or Summer of 1956.

Application must be made before the crop is seeded; and after the crop is established the performance report is to be delivered or mailed to the Fisher County ASC Office, Box 683, Roby, Texas by not later than December 31, 1955. Sales receipts for seed planted and growth should be obtained in sufficient time to protect the area in the Fall and Winter of 1955.

Winter Legumes in the fall of 1955

Austrian Winter Peas, Dixie Wonder Peas and Hairy Vetch seeded alone in rows or drilled alone, or seeded with a nurse crop of small grain (except wheat) will qualify in Fisher County.

Fifty percent of cost of seed including small grain, not to exceed maximum set by the County Committee, will be made.

A good stand and growth must be obtained in sufficient time to protect the area in the Fall and Winter of 1955. Pasturing consistent with good management will be permitted but none of the growth may be harvested for hay or seed.

Seeding must be done by December 15, 1955 and must remain on the land until April 15, 1956. Legume seed should be inoculated with fresh inoculant.

Application must be made before the crop is seeded and performance must be reported after the crop is established and mailed to the Fisher County ASC Office, Box 683, Roby, Texas by not later than December 31, 1955. Sales receipts for seed planted must be submitted when reporting performance. NO fertilizer is required.

In addition to reviewing the operations of the association, the members will elect 2 directors to serve for the ensuing year. An excellent program is being arranged to supplement the business session, said Conley.

"The stockholders are showing considerable interest in this meeting," Conley stated, "because, as land owners they are interested in maintaining a strong home - owned association for long term credit service, with lowest interest rates and the most reasonable repayment plan."

"The Roby Association was organized in 1916 under Woodrow Wilson's administration, and during its 38 years of service over 700 farmers and stockmen of Fisher County have paid out their homes through the benefits of low cost money and an - restricted repayment plan," Conley added, "and many others are now buying and paying for homes and building long needed houses and other improvements under its plan and terms."

Conley also pointed out that members of the association who attended would receive their annual dividend of 10% on capital stock of \$73,000.00 all owned by members of the association, that the association has a total of \$1,200,000.00 in loans outstanding in Fisher County, and has a surplus and reserve of \$135,000.00.

Directors of the Association are: J. A. Burk, president; W. S. Etheredge, vice president; J. Q. Head; R. Lee Williams and C. C. Roach.

Details of the program being planned will be announced later.

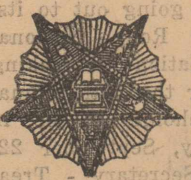

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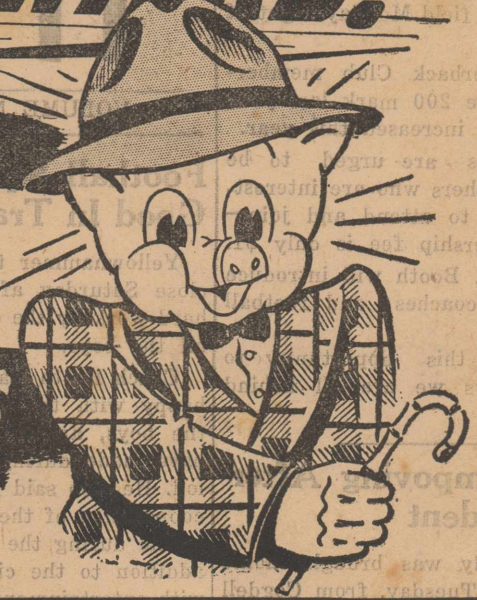

Martin Ranch Tour Shows Blue Panic Grass

"That is really fine grass," was the comment from dozens of those who saw the blue panic grass on the Travis Martin ranch. Martin has in over 400 acres of Blue Panic grass. "You saved the desert till last," one said as he looked over a 74 acre field that had not been grazed. Grass in this field was 5 to 6 feet tall. About 60 men and women toured the Martin ranch Friday morning, August 12, to look over his blue panic. Several fields were observed. Some had been grazed, some being grazed, some never had been grazed.

"My cattle chose blue panic grass over my native grass," Travis Martin said. "They are in good shape after grazing on blue panic." Martin explained to the group

his method of planting, the equipment he used, and time of planting. "Early planting is best, and plant shallow." "Good land preparation is most important," Martin said. "Then plant about 2 pounds per acre of good clean seed." Ranchers, farmers and businessmen were on the tour. Soil Conservation District Supervisors made the tour, along with ASC committeemen and FHA Committeemen. Everyone showed great interest in the grass. They recognized its potential as a good crop in the district.

"I planted a patch of blue panic grass in 1948, and plowed it up last year," said Arthur Marth, of Roscoe. "I figured it had been there long enough." Ernest Martin explained his increase in cotton yield following blue panic.

R. E. Gracey of Roscoe explained to the group that Blue Panic was high in protein and that it made good hay.

Martin explained to the group how blue panic fits into a range conservation program. "You can graze blue panic and rest your native pasture when it needs rest most. You won't have any soil erosion either with a good stand of

blue panic in the ground," Martin said.

Martin is a cooperater with Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District. Soil Conservation Service technicians from the Rotan Work Unit assisted him to get started planting blue panic grass in the spring. Prior to planting his grass, Martin was favorably impressed with the second years growth of blue panic on the Wayne Nowlin and the Dr. Jenkins places near Rotan.

"Don't get impatient with this grass," Martin explained, "we have a field where seed from one planting came up after three different rains. Don't be too anxious to plow it up and plant over."

Martin was pleased to have this group tour his ranch. He is proud of his blue panic grass. He hopes to put more land into blue panic in future years as part of his conservation plan.
