Draw Ends 10th Game Of Match

BAGUIO CITY, Philippines (AP) — Champion Anatoly Karpov of the Soviet Union and challenger Viktor Korchnoi battled to a draw today in the 10th game of the world chess championship and Korchnoi's chief aide announced the players were no longer on speaking terms.

In apparent compliance with Korchnoi's wish to sever "all friendly communication," Karpov offered the draw through deputy arbiter Miroslav Filip of Czechoslovakia after the champion's 44th move — a rook to bishop 4.

The 47-year-old challenger paused for a few seconds and then accepted the offer.

It was the ninth draw in 10 games. Karpov has won one game. Under tournament rules, draws count nothing in the scoring. The first player to win six games is the champion and takes home \$350,000 in prize money. The loser will get \$200,000. Experts say it may be two or three months before one of the two wins six games.

Shortly after the 27-year-old champion opened the game with a Ruy Lopez pawn to king 4, Petra Leeuwerick, head of Korchnoi's delegation, read a prepared statement accusing Karpov of violating an agreement by refusing to shake the challenger's hand at the start of last week's eighth game.

"So far as the handshaking is concerned, Viktor Korchnoi declares that the reason he emigrated from the Soviet Union was precisely because he wanted to be liberated from the distasteful task of clapping hands with such people as Karpov and his crew," Mrs. Leeuwerick said.

She then announced that Korchnoi, who defected during a match in Holland in 1976, has decided "to cut off all friendly communication" with Karpov and that henceforth the challenger no longer will offer draws directly to the champion but through the chief arbiter.

The Soviet delegation had no immediate reaction to the statement.

Traffic Safety Plans Hampered By Lack Of Data

A lack of information concerning the busing of Lubbock Independent School District students this fall hampered members of the Citizens Traffic Commission today as they tried to plan a traffic safety campaign for the beginning of the new school year.

City public information officer Vaughn Hendrie told members of the commission today that the city was publishing an eight-page tabloid on traffic safety in an upcoming edition of Update³ this month. He added that Phil Price Advertising was creating some radio and television spot announcements to be used in a traffic safety campaign throughout the year.

Funds for the tabloid and radio and television spot announcements were provided in a \$5,000 grant for the traffic safety campaign.

Hendrie said the city also was considering a motivational class for persons who had received their third traffic ticket in a year's time. The motivational class, designed to change the attitudes of some drivers, would be in addition to a defensive driving class currently sponsored by the city.

Commission members voted to table proposed guidelines for parking controls in the vicinity of schools until their October meeting because they want to see what impact the students' busing will have on parking.

Commission Vice Chairman Lindl Graves asked city staff members if they had considered any of the new traffic situations which busing might bring about.

Mrs. Graves expressed concern about the school flashing lights' timing, bus parking zones, and publicity making drivers aware of traffic hazards.

Lt. Sid Smallwood of the Lubbock Police Department said that he and the school's safety officer had worked out bus parking zones at all schools which will be served by buses.

He added that each driver of each bus will have a roster containing the names of all students assigned to that bus, the students' home addresses, home telephone numbers, and the telephone numbers where their parents can be reached in an emergency.

Smallwood said the students being bused would be picked up at their respective home schools early, bused to their transfer schools, and dismissed early in the afternoon to be bused back to their respective home schools.

Bill McDaniel, head of the city's traffic engineering department which is in charge of the school flashing lights, said he was unaware of what kind of pick up schedule the school buses would have

and, therefore, did not know how to plan the timing devices on the lights.

He added that, according to his information, the city still had no word from the school district whether the school system will pay for the school crossing guards.

The commission also voted to send a letter to the school board requesting construction of a traffic safety fence

around O. L. Sison Junior High School. The commission noted that a signal light was installed for safety purposes at 23rd Street and Avenue Q near the school, conditionally upon the construction of a fence around the school property several years ago.

The commission approved the construction of stop signs on Louisville Avenue at the intersection with 90th Street.

SWC Pays Tribute To King

"Football '78," the official Southwest Conference roster and record book, has been dedicated to Texas Tech's retiring athletic director, J.T. King.

The publication is now being distributed, and copies are available at \$4 each by contacting the Southwest Conference, Box 7185, Dallas, 75209.

King will be retiring Aug. 31 after almost two decades of association with Tech.

"J.T. King and the Southwest Conference first crossed paths 44 years ago, before either was 20 years old," the opening statement in the 250-page book states.

"They've been inseparable ever since, from 'Jake' King's freshman football season at the University of Texas in 1934 through his retirement as Texas Tech athletic director in August 1978.

"He was an assistant coach at Texas A&M and Texas, head coach at Texas Tech for nine years and athletic director for eight years. Those who coached with and against J.T. King, and those who worked with him in the Southwest Conference and throughout the nation, dedicate this publication to him as one small token of their appreciation and esteem."

Hall Of Fame Inducts Three Baseball Giants

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (AP) — Being elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame made Eddie Mathews nervous, nostalgic and, most of all, grateful.

"Baseball has been so good to me. It's given me everything I've got," said the newest inductee into the game's most elite group. "I've tried to give it all I had."

"If I'd been this nervous when I played, I wouldn't be here. I'm getting more nervous by the minute," he added in his thank-you speech.

Mathews, the greatest slugging third baseman of all time, was inducted into the Hall Monday along with Veterans' Committee choices Larry McPhail and Addie Joss. Mathews retired in 1968 after a record-setting career with the Boston-Milwaukee-Atlanta Braves, Houston Astros and Detroit Tigers. He holds the major league mark for career homers by a third baseman (481) and National League records for most games played at the position (2,154), most homers in a season by a third baseman (47 in 1953) and most consecutive seasons with 30 or more homers (nine, 1953-61).

"I'm proud of all these things but I remember best the homer I hit in the 1957 World Series to beat the Yankees," said

Mathews of his fourth-game blast for the only Braves championship team he played with. In his final playing season, Mathews was with the Tigers team that won the World Series.

"This is my greatest honor," he said. "It will take a week to 10 days for it to sink in. I don't know if there are words to explain it."

"I'm just a small part of a wonderful game that is a tremendous part of American today."

The game got to be that way in part thanks to McPhail, the innovative executive who, according to Commissioner Bowie Kuhn, "revitalized every team he touched and brought enormous excitement to them."

McPhail, who left baseball in 1947 after turning the Cincinnati Reds, Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees into money-makers, was responsible for night games, Old Timers Day, a pension plan for ballplayers and office personnel, regular airplane travel by major league teams and expanded broadcasting of their games.

"My father was most proud of building pennant winners in Brooklyn and New

York, especially Brooklyn," said Leo McPhail, president of the American League, who accepted the honor along with his brother Bill, a broadcasting executive. "When the Dodgers clinched the pennant in Boston in 1940, my father was so proud that he went to 125th St. to meet their train, which was going to Grand Central Station where hundreds of fans were waiting. But Leo Durocher, who he'd brought in to manage the Dodgers, convinced the conductor to skip 125th St. and head right in."

"Of course when Dad saw Leo he threatened to fire him."

"He was aggressive, flamboyant, garrulous and loud, but also a promotional genius and visionary. He loved baseball and anything he tried to do was for the good of baseball."

Joss was called the "best pitcher in the first quarter-century of the American League" by baseball historian Fred Leid, quite a compliment since Joss was a contemporary of Cy Young and Walter Johnson. He died of spinal meningitis two days before the 1911 season opener after a phenomenal nine-year career.

Big Salary Means Big Revenues

Q. O. J. Simpson gets more than \$700,000 a year for playing football. I want to know the 49ers' corporate attitude in justifying this huge salary. In what way is this smart business, as great a runner as he is?

—Ken Fairchild, Chicago.

A. It's impossible to put a dollar figure on the upturn in public relations resulting from the 49ers' trade for Simpson. However, season ticket sales are a definite barometer. The club has sold 8,000 season tickets since the trade was announced. At \$100-per, that's an \$800,000 gross, which should go far in covering the halfback's paycheck.

Q. Each year they make a big to-do about who wins the pole position at the Indianapolis 500. I'd like to know exactly how important that is. Of the winners of the 500, how many started from the pole position? In a race of this distance, I just don't believe that the starting positions are that important. Right or wrong?

—Stanley Thomas, North Palm Beach, Fla.

A. Nine times the man on the pole has won the race, the last being Johnny Rutherford in 1976. It is odds-on that the winner will come from the first two rows (cars in positions one through six). The record for coming from far back is from the 28th position, which has been done twice, the last time by Louis Meyer in 1936.

Of course, we are indebted for all of the above details to the grand master of all things "500," Mr. Don Davidson of the U.S. Auto Club in Indianapolis.

Q. Last year at this time few people gave Denver a chance to win the AFC and reach the Super Bowl. I am wondering what team this season, at this point, could be considered a similar long shot?

—Eddie Quinton, Kansas City, Mo.

A. There are some surprises in the opening NFL odds out of Harrah's Racebook. Dallas and Oakland are the favorites (2-to-1 and 3½-to-1) in the two conferences. But San Francisco is a startling third choice in the NFC (behind the Rams) and only 6-to-1. In the AFC, Miami is second favorite at 4½-to-1. A long shot similar to Denver of a year ago may be the '78 Houston Oilers, listed at 8-to-1. Denver was 15-to-1 at this time '77.

Q. When Jack Nicklaus won the British Open, the announcers said it was his 17th major victory. I read elsewhere, for example in The Sporting News, that it was his 15th major tournament victory. What is the discrepancy here and what is the true total?

—G. J. Friedrichs, Mobile, Ala.

A. It depends whether you count the two U.S. Amateur titles Nicklaus won before he turned pro. The goal of major titles had always been Bobby Jones' 13. In Jones' day, the Big Four titles were the U.S. and British Opens, and the U.S. and British Amateur championships.

Either way you count them for Nicklaus, it defies the imagination to conceive of a golfer who would someday surpass his achievements.

Bird Benched For Season

DETROIT (AP) — Mark "The Bird" Fidrych, the Detroit Tigers' colorful but ailing young righthander, is through for the season, the club said today.

The announcement by Tiger general manager Jim Campbell followed receipt of medical reports from Ford Hospital indicating that Fidrych should be rested for the balance of this year.

Campbell said Fidrych is being placed on the 60-day emergency disabled list which will extend beyond the regular baseball season.

He said Fidrych will not play winter ball, a decision that puts off his return to the mound until spring training next February.

Fidrych had been scheduled to pitch Wednesday night against the Texas Rangers.

On Saturday, Fidrych pitched only one inning for the Tigers' farm team in Lakeland, Fla. Lakeland manager Jim Leyland pulled him from the contest after Fidrych threw just eight pitches and complained that his shoulder was stiff.

Fidrych was 2-0 this season before his shoulder problem of a year ago — offi-

cially diagnosed as tendinitis — flared up again.

Fidrych returned to Detroit on Sunday and was examined Monday by Dr. Edwin Guise at Henry Ford Hospital.

It all seemed so familiar. Bits and pieces of the past, gathered and glued together—a souvenir package wrapped in memories.

There was Gene Garber pitching to Pete Rose, as he had a week earlier when Rose's record 44-game hitting streak came to an end.

The Padres managed only singles off the 35-year-old John, but bunched three of them in the ninth inning to score their run, with Jerry Turner's single delivering Don Reynolds.

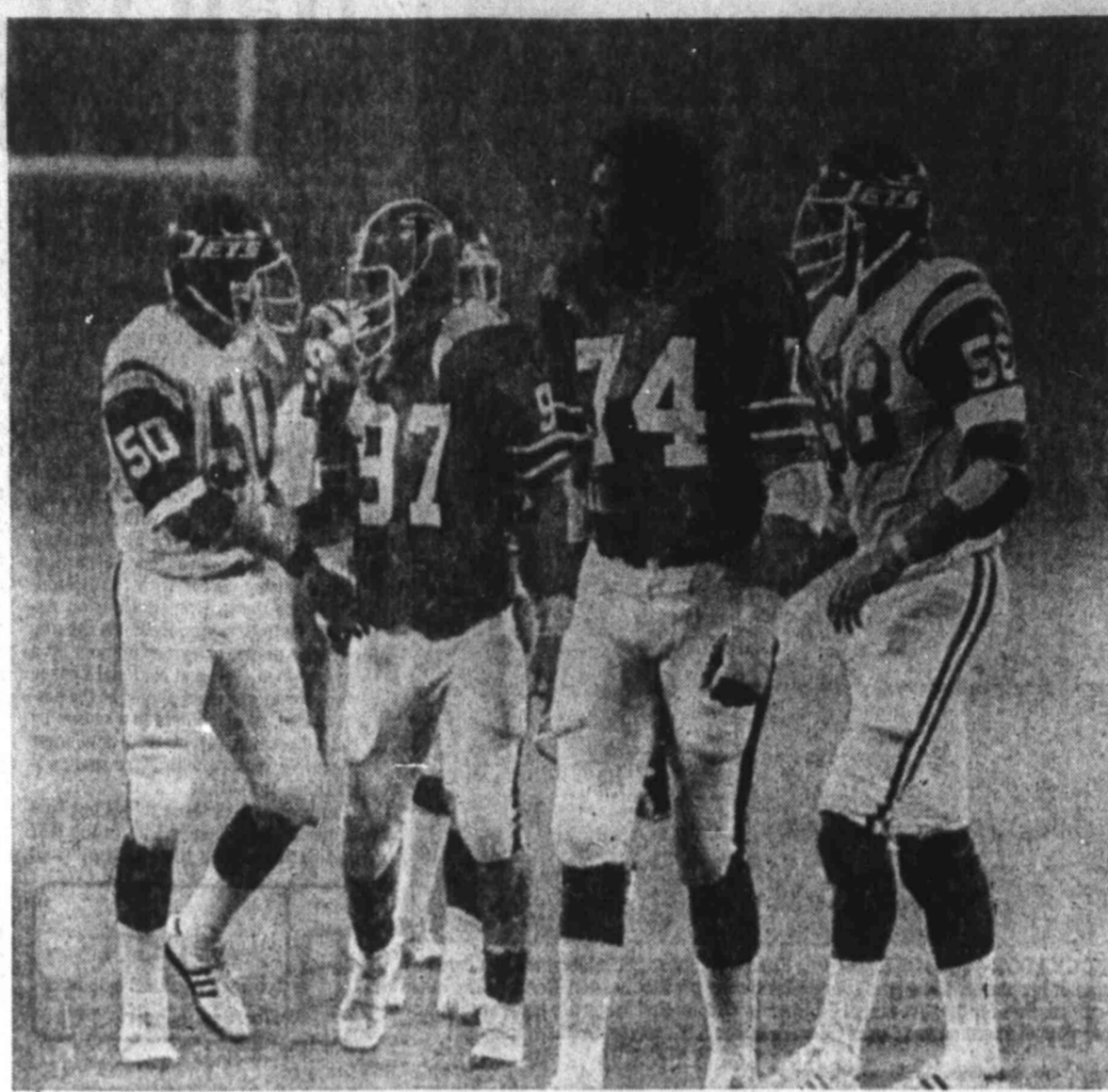

Walton Enjoys Chat With Knicks

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—A laughing, joking Bill Walton joined equally animated New York Knicks Coach Willis Reed and General Manager Eddie Donovan for dinner in Portland Monday night.

The topic of conversation was the basketball center's intention to leave the Portland Trail Blazers and join another National Basketball Association team.

Reed has been quoted as saying that Walton is the leader the Knicks lack. "A guy like Walton makes the players around him unselfish and productive," Reed was quoted as saying before leaving for Portland.

Dressed casually in faded levis and a Grateful Dead T-shirt, Walton sat down to dinner at a Jantzen Beach restaurant with Reed, Donovan, Walton's friend and agent, Jack Scott, and Walton's attorney, John Bassett.

As the four left the restaurant after more than two hours, a smiling Walton, walking with the aid of crutches because of the broken foot that led to his decision to leave Portland, thanked several persons who stopped to wish him well.

Representatives of the Knicks say they are using caution in their talks with the NBA's 1978 most valuable player.

Mike Burke, president of the Knicks, reportedly said Monday that Walton must produce convincing medical evidence that he will fully recover from a foot injury before they would accept him.

Burke said that any contract between the Knicks and Walton would be contingent on an examination by team physician Dr. James Nicholas.

He said the medical problems would be one of several hurdles in acquiring Walton, another being what the Knicks would give up in a deal with Portland. He said he had already spoken with Trail Blazers officials including President Larry Weinberg and Executive Vice President Harry Gleckman. Nothing concrete had come out of their talks, he said.

The Knicks might be able to come up with an acceptable deal, notably free agent Marvin Webster, Burke said.

Burke and Sonny Werblin, president of the Madison Square Garden Corp., were due in Portland today.

Scott said Walton also has talks lined up with Golden State Warriors Coach Al Attles and General Manager Scotty Sterling. Walton met for four hours Sunday with Gene Shue, new coach of the unnamed San Diego franchise.

Scott said the Philadelphia 76ers have also expressed interest in Walton.

The Boston Celtics head man, Red Auerbach, also has expressed interest in the big redhead.

Meanwhile, the Trail Blazers offered refunds Monday to season-ticket holders disappointed by Walton's plans to leave the team.

"We think it's only fair that a refund be offered to those who wanted to see the games because Walton was playing here," said Blazer spokesman John White.

However, White said he didn't expect the team would have to cash in many tickets. "If there were going to be any mad rush, it would have started already — and it hasn't," he said.

Giants Open With Victory Over Cleveland

CLEVELAND (AP)—For Willie Spencer of Massillon, Ohio, it was like coming home when he took the field for the New York Giants at Cleveland against the Browns Monday night.

The Massillon High School Tiger Swing Band, which performed before the game and at halftime, was in the stands as Spencer scored the only touchdown of the second quarter.

That 3-yard score started the Giants on the way to a 21-7 victory over the Browns in the first National Football League preseason game for both teams.

Then in the fourth quarter, Spencer found a big hole in the line and galloped 55 yards to set up the second New York touchdown.

"I'm just glad I could prove to the home people what I could do," said the 6-foot-4, 235-pound running back. "The last two years were just downhill for me." Spencer, who was with the Minnesota Vikings the last two years, hopes things will get better with the Giants.

Spencer was sick before the game and almost didn't play. But with Larry Conka out, "we had to use more backs than I thought we would," said Head Coach John McVay.

For the Browns' new head coach, Sam Rutigliano, it was a disappointing debut.

Rutigliano was unhappy over mistakes and penalties. The Browns committed 15 infractions and were penalized 113 yards compared to eight penalties for 62 yards for the Giants.

"No way is there an excuse for the penalties or mistakes we made out there," the coach said. There were so many penalties, he said, that "if we played hockey, we would not have had enough players to finish the game."

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP)—Lightning struck twice for the Atlanta Falcons Monday night and it paid off in a 20-17 victory over the New York Jets in a National Football League exhibition game.

First, it was rookie wide receiver Alford Jackson, breaking loose to make three clutch catches on passes from substitute quarterback June Jones, including a 31-yarder for the winning touchdown.

"The players began to flinch and it seemed as if the stuff was right there in the ball park with us," said McCarter. "and that, to me, signified unsafe playing conditions. It was the lightning, not the rain. We can all swim and we work week in and week out in this kind of weather."

Even internationalists can miss the obvious at times. Both declarers failed to find the winning line on this hand from the Open Team championship. North could have passed South's three spade rebid, but he felt that his three trumps to the ten and club holding warranted a raise to game.

West led the top of his heart sequence and continued the suit, ruffed by declarer. Both declarers led a club to the jack and king, and ruffed the heart return with a high trump. Another club was led, West rose with the ace and continued hearts. East discarded a club and declarer ruffed for the third time.

Declarer drew trumps in three rounds, cashed the king of diamonds, and then crossed to the queen of clubs. Now he knew the complete distribution of the hands—East had shown up with one spade, three hearts and four clubs, and therefore had to have started with five diamonds. The fate of the contract hinged on not losing a diamond trick, and both declarers reasoned that, since

East had started with long diamonds, the odds favored his holding the queen. Therefore, they took the diamond finesse and both went down when West won the last two tricks with his queen of diamonds and long hearts.

Mathematically the odds were 5-2 for the diamond finesse, but not if the hand was considered in the whole. East was a passed hand, and he had already shown up with the ace and king of hearts, the king of clubs and a singleton. Had he started with a five-card diamond suit headed by the queen, he would certainly have opened the bidding. Therefore, West had to have the queen of diamonds, so declarer's only chance was to cash the ace and king. When that succeeds in dropping the queen, the contract would be made.

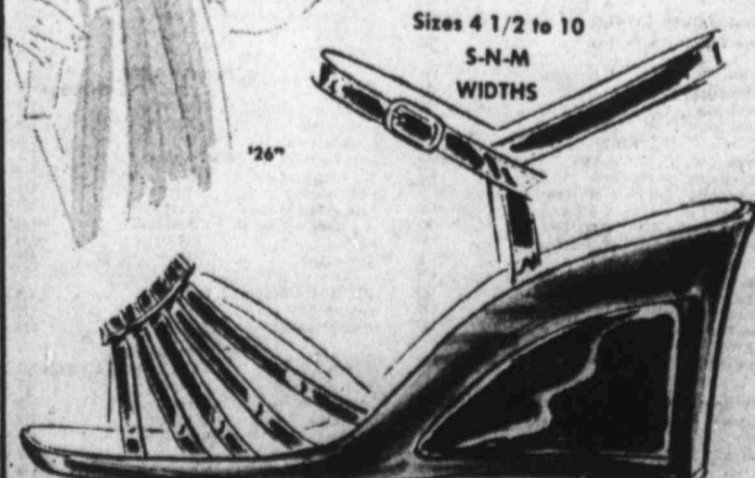

Expert Offers Hints On Home Canning

YAKIMA, Wash. (Special) — One of the most popular uses of purple prune plums is for home canning of luscious sauces, preserves and relishes, capturing their tangy-sweet flavor for enjoyment long after their brief season has passed. Freestone and non-darkening qualities make them one of the easiest fruits to preserve.

Delicious and unusual Pickled Plums are a great idea for meat accompaniments and relish trays. Put them up now for holiday and special occasion dinners during the winter months. Whole purple prune plums are packed in a vinegar and sugar syrup with mixed pickling spice. Pricking the tender skins keeps them whole during cooking and processing, so the fruit has an attractive appearance when served.

Purple prune plums are in season from early August through September. Enjoy them often for nutritious snacks, and for fresh fruit salads and desserts. Delectable baked goods are another specialty of these silver-frosted plums. Sweetness combined with just enough tang produces exciting fruit flavor in breads, pies, cakes and other oven desserts. Their golden flesh turns an appealing deep crimson color when cooked.

Purple prune plums are low in calories, yet offer quick energy from their easily-digested natural sugars. In addition, they provide substantial amounts of Vitamin A, B-vitamins, and minerals, including iron, phosphorus and calcium.

PICKLED PLUMS

- 4 lbs. purple prune plums
- 2 1/2 cups red wine vinegar
- 4 cups sugar
- 2 tbsps. mixed pickling spice

Wash plums and prick skins with needle in several places. Combine vinegar, sugar and pickling spice, heat to boiling. Add plums and return to boiling. Immediately remove plums and pack in clean jars. Bring liquid to boil again and pour into jars, leaving 1/4-inch head space. Seal according to manufacturer's directions. Process 10 minutes in boiling water bath. Makes 5 pints.

CANNING PURPLE PRUNE PLUMS

Select firm, ripe purple prune plums. Wash and leave whole or cut in halves and pit. Prick skin of whole prune plums to prevent bursting. Use boiling water bath.

Cold Pack: Fill jars to 1/2-inch of top. Cover with hot syrup (1 cup sugar to 2 cups water) to 1 1/4-inch of top. Seal and process pints for 20 minutes, quarts for 25 minutes.

Hot Pack: Heat fruit to boiling in syrup (1 cup sugar to 2 cups water). Pack in jars to 1/2 inch of top. Cover with boiling syrup to 1 1/4 inch of top. Seal and process pints 20 minutes, quarts 25 minutes.

FREEZING PURPLE PRUNE PLUMS

Select fully ripe purple prune plums. Wash and leave whole or cut in halves and pit.

Dry Pack: Pack prune plums in freezer containers, leaving 1/2 inch head space. Seal and freeze. Use later for jams and preserves. Or, add sugar to sweeten if desired.

Syrup Pack: Pack cut fruit in freezer containers. Cover with 40% syrup (1 cup sugar to 2 cups water). Leave head space of 1/2 inch. Place a piece of crumpled freezer paper on top to hold fruit below level of syrup. Seal and freeze. Ascorbic acid (1/2 teaspoon per quart) may be added to syrup to prevent discoloration of fruit on thawing.

Nonpolitical Vermin Plague Washington

WASHINGTON (WNS) — Rats are a way of life in Georgetown, and mice infestations are legendary at the White House and on Capitol Hill. Now raccoons are invading Embassy Row and making nightly raids on the large estates bordering on Rock Creek Park.

During the recent devastating thunderstorms which shut down power in Washington for more than 50,000 area residents, raccoons were out in force.

Next door to the Lebanese Embassy, a raccoon sat on a second-floor window sill while the storm raged around him. Firemen rushed to put out flames caused by wires falling on a house to find a family of raccoons calmly ransacking the garbage cans of the burning house. Up the street on Woodland Drive, Sen. Howard Baker and his wife Joy keep dishes of cat food placed outside on their lawn to keep the raccoons away from the house.

While working on sound stages and studying his craft, Jerry met his wife, Diane, whom he married seven years ago after "a long relationship as buddies." Looking back, it's proven to be an asset that it wasn't love at first sight. We knew each other's faults and had learned how to cope with them even before we became lovers," remembers Mark.

The actor has performed in dozens of nighttime series and specials, including "Marcus Welby, M.D.," "The Rookies," "Owen Marshall," and "In the Matter of Karen Ann Quinlan."

"But Jerry," claims Mark, "is a pleasant departure from all the crazies I've played. Jerry's straight forward, comes right out and says what he thinks. He's socially naive and has a few rough edges. Spare Time Becomes Enemy In Retirement

The handshakes Mel Grigg received at his retirement party didn't console him when he faced minutes and hours each day to fill with activity.

Six months ago, after a year and a half of retirement, Grigg returned to the work force in a new occupation. Grigg spent 38 years teaching in junior and senior high schools. The crackle of student laughter, the thump of notebooks being opened, the shuffle of feet in the hallways between classes and the blast of the bell signifying the end of each class period contrasted sharply with the silent hours of retirement.

He was 63 when he received a key ring and a jacket at his retirement party June 1, 1976.

Four months later his wife died and with her died his dream of retiring early to spend time together.

"I goofed around for a while and moved to the mountains in New Mexico," Grigg said. "But I couldn't stand doing nothing."

He returned to Lubbock and in 1977 married a fellow teacher whom he had known for 18 years and who lived



only a half-block away. Spouses of both had died of heart attacks.

They traveled. They visited their children and went on a tour of Israel.

Still, there was time to fill each day. "Retirement?" Grigg says. "It's wonderful if you have something to do — a hobby or travel or something."

The something that interested Grigg was when he heard about an opening for a bailiff at the court house. "I like my job," he said. His duties include passing out information forms to prospective jurors called each Monday morning, turning on the lights and air conditioning in the courtroom each morning, answering the telephone and accompanying the jury in and out of the courtroom.

Grigg laughed at his own description of his job, "I'm an errand boy for the judge."

Meeting people is his favorite part of the job, whether they be jurors, judges, attorneys or defendants.

One Monday morning in the central jury room Grigg saw a familiar face among those called for jury duty. "I met an old boy I hadn't seen in 40 years," he said.

He described his job as fun, and that is an important ingredient for Grigg. It's one of the reasons he chose early retirement from teaching. "Well, I liked teaching a lot," he said and laughed. "My idea is, when you get too old to laugh with the kids you should quit. The last year I taught I had a lot of fun. I got out before I lost my sense of humor."

It was his son, a former Lubbock assistant district attorney, who suggested being a bailiff might be fun.

"It's not hard work, you don't have to beat your brains out and it's interesting," Grigg said.

For others over 65 seeking a different occupation, a visit to the Texas Employment Commission may provide

the answer.

Sam Harper, a TEC employment counselor, said some employers prefer older workers and that preference for an older worker is legitimate because "it's not contrary to civil rights. The under-40 are not in a protected group."

Those ages 40 to 65 are covered by the Age Discrimination in Employment Act which prohibits discrimination in age in hiring or in advertising for employment implying an age preference.

Even though age discrimination is illegal, it is practiced, Harper said.

"There are no reasons for it," Harper said of the illegal discrimination. "Just excuses."

The TEC is not an enforcement agency. Complaints are handled by either the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission or the Texas Department of Labor and Standards.

Women ages 40 to 65 also are covered by Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Displaced Homemaker Bill passed in the last session of the Texas Legislature.

Bureau of Labor statistics show that approximately three million persons over 65 are employed in full or part-time work.

Among the occupations Harper said are preferential to older workers are those of security guard, custodian, companion to the sick or elderly, operator of self-serve gasoline stations and service dispatcher handling radio and telephone calls in the delivery departments of department stores.

Department stores also hire older workers as sales clerks.

When Margaret Donley retired from Hemphill-Well after 23 years as a sales clerk, her boss kissed her cheek

and whispered in her ear, "You'll be hearing from me."

That was in 1974, when Mrs. Donley was 62. Since then her boss has called her to "help out," as she says, for inventories, sales and to fill in for vacationing employees.

At age 66, she works two days a week in the children's wear department in the downtown store.

"I've watched little girls grow up and come back here with their babies," she said.

Although she enjoys her work, she is an enthusiastic supporter of retirement.

"I do believe in retirement," she said as she nodded in agreement. "It's a time to enjoy life for yourself, go fishing with your husband and have time to see your grandchildren."

More and more older women are expected to join the employment force. It is estimated that in 1990, only 12 years from now, 58.3 percent of the women between the ages of 45 and 64 will work outside the home.

They will be helping to break the rocking chair stereotype of older persons being portrayed as unproductive.

Only after having attained the status of "aged" did some individuals make their lasting contributions to the world. Among them were Grandma Moses, Robert Frost, Martha Graham, Charles DeGaulle, Agatha Christie, Leonardo DaVinci, Madame Curie, Pope John XXIII and Duke Ellington — none of whom ever attended his or her own retirement party.

Locally, bailiff Mel Grigg is doing his own job of breaking the stereotype of retired senior citizens and for him it is more than a way to earn money and meet people.

"When you get in that rocking chair," Grigg says, "it's not far 'till you get to the great divide."

HRC Proposes New Ordinance

The Human Relations Commission voted Monday night to send a proposed anti-discrimination ordinance to the city attorney for recommendations before taking the proposed ordinance to the City Council in September.

The proposed draft of the ordinance requires any place of public accommodation that offers food, beverages, overnight accommodations or entertainment, to obtain a license from the Human Relations Commission (HRC). The license would verify that the establishment was not violating any human rights or discriminating on the basis of race, ethnic background, national origin, religion or sex.

Business establishments would have 120 days from the date the ordinance goes into effect to apply for a license. A commission member would investigate the applicant, and the commission as a whole would vote on whether to grant the establishment a license.

Businesses would be required to post the license and establishments not complying with the ordinance would be investigated by the Human Relations Commission. If found in violation of the ordinance, the business could lose its license and be required to close for as many as six months.

Enforcing the proposed ordinance, commission members said, would not be a burden because proper enforcement

would be in the commission's best interest.

"Hopefully, we would have people on the commission who would want the ordinance enforced, people with a direct interest in its enforcement," said Therese Cole, HRC chairman.

The proposed ordinance was drafted following allegations that local night clubs were discriminating against minority group members by enforcing a dress code and other house rules at random.

"Everyone knows the discrimination is going on," Cole said. "The City Council is the only group we have to prove it to."

Complaints against the night clubs

have diminished during the summer months, Human Relations Director Luciano Perez said. But he added that these complaints usually come in cycles.

"During the spring and in the fall when the Tech students return we always have more calls about the night clubs," said Perez.

New Mexico Man Joins Balloon Crew

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI) — Larry Newman says flying a balloon across the Atlantic Ocean is one of the last unaccomplished adventures in the world.

"Too many people have already climbed Mt. Everest; too many people have already gone to the moon," Newman said. "This is one of the last big trips left. I'm lucky I get to go."

Newman, 30, the president of a firm that manufactures hang gliders, gets to go because two men who tried and failed in a trans-Atlantic balloon flight last year decided to add a third crew member to increase their chance for success.

Ben Abruzzo, 47, and Maxie Anderson, 43, left Albuquerque Monday for Presque Isle, Maine, the launch site for their second attempt to cross the ocean in a balloon. Newman will join them for the take-off Thursday.

The three men plan to be ready to take off in the Double Eagle II, an 85-foot-tall, 101,000-cubic-foot balloon filled with helium, any time beginning Thursday evening, depending upon the weather. They have no specific landing area — anywhere on the other side of the Atlantic will do.

Abruzzo and Anderson, whose attempt to fly the Atlantic last September failed when bad weather forced them to abandon

the trip off the coast of Iceland, are confident of success this time because of the addition of Newman and the experience they gained last year.

"The main problem during the flight is the fatigue of pilots," Anderson said. "You have to prepare for the hardest part of the flight, which is the last two days."

"With three pilots, you ought to be able to get a good six hours of sleep each per day," Abruzzo said. "With that much sleep, we ought to be in good shape to make good decisions."

The two balloonists said fatigue apparently contributed to the failure of Christopher Davey and Donald Cameron to complete the trans-Atlantic flight last month. The two Englishmen came down about 110 miles short of the coast of France.

"They said the flight failed because of their very poor decisions at the end of the journey because of the exhaustion," Abruzzo said.

Newman is an experienced aircraft pilot and a hang gliding expert — he plans to end the journey by soaring from the gondola to the landing spot in a hang glider — but the trip will be only his second balloon flight.

Lettuce

By BRIAN B. KING WASHINGTON (AP) — Prices for lettuce this year have bounced around like a ping-pong ball gone wild, but it remains to be seen how much growers will benefit now that moderate prices and stability are expected into the fall. The even greater gyrations than normal for the 1970s were mainly caused by weather damage to the California crops. So, if a farmer couldn't plant or harvest, high prices wouldn't help. In addition, an Agriculture Department study of lettuce prices from 1967 through 1977 found that the retail price in Chicago and New York rose an average of 2.29 cents a head each year. The return to growers rose an average of only 0.63 cent a year, but in their best year — 1973 — they got about 20 percent

of what the consumer paid. The average share was not quite 16 percent. The average increase disguises sharp ups and downs for both farmers and consumers in any given year, an experience others along the food pipeline didn't share, says economist Stephen Raleigh in the current Vegetable Situation. Wholesaler and retailer costs and profits accounted for an average of 1.29 cents a year more, higher rail freight costs took about 0.42 cent and harvesting and packing costs 0.63 cent. Returns to wholesalers and retailers dropped only twice. Elsewhere in that departmental magazine, market watchers reported that harvest-time rains in one California area and planting-time rains in another caused major gaps in supply lines in April, May and early June.

The result was the most unusual behavior of prices ever," they said. The price for a 24-head carton loaded in California was a record \$18 on May 1, \$3.25 in late May, \$13 on June 1, \$6 on June 8, \$2.75 on June 29 and \$4.75 on July 19. "The more rigid buying practices" of firms not in the market five or 10 years ago just made it worse, they said. Those customers included fast-food firms with salad bars. Growing conditions for the summer crop in California have been ideal and moderate prices and a steady, but slightly smaller supply are expected for the rest of the season, they said. Raleigh said that, since 1975, lettuce has become the most valuable fresh-vegetable crop in the nation after potatoes. With consumption of other com-

mercially grown vegetables declining, it "is easily the most popular" today, he said. Production was up 31 percent in 1977 over 1976, the retail price nationally was up 75 percent and Americans were eating 24.5 pounds each, a 14.5 percent increase. Raleigh found that, for growers, returns rose an average of 9 cents a carton a year until last year when their average price dropped 77 cents to \$1.67. That brought the decade average down to an increase of 1.5 cents a carton a year. The retail price, however, dropped only 19 cents a carton, from 52.3 cents a head in 1976 to 51.4 cents in 1977. It's been as high as \$1.39 a head this year in New York. The low point of farmers' prices was 99 cents in 1968; the high, \$2.14 in 1972.

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market continued to move lower today amidst uncertainties over the dollar and the general economic outlook.

At noon, the Dow Jones index of 30 industrials was off 2.60 at 882.45. Volume on the New York Stock Exchange totaled 14.1 million shares in the first two hours of trading, down from 14.2 million by noon Monday, and declines just outnumbered advances among Big Board-listed issues.

After the large gains of the week before, the market is "taking a logical pause," and is "in a digestion process," said Newton D. Zinder at E. F. Hutton & Co.

In the day's economic news, the dollar dropped to a new low against the West German mark. In addition, numerous analysts continued to believe the second quarter corporate profit boom won't be carried over into the rest of the year, while short-term interest rates may begin to climb again from their current plateau.

"The flow of business statistics continues to give off ambiguous readings," said an analyst at Morgan Guaranty Trust Co. "The numbers do not yet indicate what growth path economic activity will follow later this year."

Ramada Inns, which has said in a prospectus it may enter the gambling casino business directly, led the NYSE most-active list, up 1/4 at 9.

Occidental Petroleum was unchanged at 21 1/2. A 286,700-share block changed hands at 21 1/2. Texaco also was among actively-traded issues, dropping 1/4 to 34 1/2. Boeing, which reported a 27 percent second-quarter earnings gain, was up 2 1/4 at 72 1/2, while McDonnell Douglas gained 1/4 to 37 1/2.
