

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter will meet with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin at Camp David on Sept. 5 in hopes of resuming direct Middle East peace talks.

White House press secretary Jody Powell said the three leaders will meet "to seek a framework for peace in the Middle East

The official, who spoke to reporters on condition that he not be named, said the three-way summit is being called "not because prospects for peace are so good but because the risks have in fact risen.

"We have no illusion that the meeting in Camp David will itself produce a settlement," the official said. "But it will help a great deal" in focusing attention on remaining differences,

Cranston said the meeting will last more than one day, that the leaders will be "secluded and isolated," and that the United States will act as mediator and has no peace plan or formula to put forward.

There is simply a hope that by sitting around the fireplace, eating together and talking together they may be able to make progress for peace," Cranston said.

1 dead, 7 hurt in shootout

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Gunfire erupted today and one policeman was killed after authorities using a bulldozer and a cherry-picker began demolishing the headquarters of the radical group MOVE. Officials said at least seven persons were injured.

Three police officers, two firemen and two MOVE members were injured after helmeted police stormed the ramshackle three-story house to remove those holed up inside, author-

A trail of blood a half-block long smeared the street outside the house. about five blocks from the University of Pennsylvania campus.

At least six members of the group called MOVE, a name with no known significance, were arrested.

"I heard a lot of gunfire and what sounded like a bomb going off," said Paul Lazorko, who lives nearby. "I saw a police officer lying in the street. They put him in a van. Police were running around telling everybody to get off the streets."

Earlier, a bulldozer smashed a stockade-like fence around the house in about 10 minutes and began plowing into the porch. Officers shouted for the MOVE members to "come out with your hands above your head."

Some of the group members emerged from the house and removed a dog buried in the debris, then returned inside

Twenty-eight hand-picked officers, wearing riot helmets and flak jackets. marched to the front of the house as firemen trained a water cannon at the old structure. When the MOVE members refused to come out, 14 officers stormed the house.

Gunfire broke out about one hour later after officers began snouting "throw out the gun, throw out the

A woman holding a baby ran from the house sobbing and collapsed on the sidewalk. She and the baby were whisked away in a police paddy wagon.

Police had a court order to remove 21 persons from the house, but officers estimated that only five persons were inside today when the wrecking began. MOVE members have occupied the house for several years, claiming to be devoted to a simple life in which they shun modern laws and technology.

Following many unsuccessful attempts to check the house for safety and health violations, police instituted 24-hour surveillance in the spring of 1977 and a 50-day blockade this year at a cost to the city of about \$2 million.

Last May 3, MOVE and the city struck a fragile truce, under which MOVE was to vacate its headquarters within 90 days. When the deadline passed Aug. 1, a city judge issued arrest warrants for 22 members.

The more than 100 police on the scene refused to discuss the situation. MOVE members in the house took turns cursing over a loudspeaker at Mayor Frank Rizzo, Police Commissioner Joseph O'Neill and Common Pleas Court Judge G. Fred DiBona as police set up what appeared to be the final blockade of the West Philadel phia house.

'The door is open," shouted a male member of the anarchist group. "After you spill the blood of MOVE men, women and children, you're going to have to keep on spilling the blood of MOVE supporters all over the country!

said Yuma County sheriff's Capt. Cecil Crowe. "We're hoping that we find her unharmed.

Crowe said the Lyonses apparently were shot repeatedly as they huddled in the rear seat of a 1969 Lincoln Continental, with Christopher standing between his mother's legs. Investigators found 18 spent 16-gauge and 20-gauge shotgun shells near the car, whose rear window had been blown out by the blasts.

"This is the worst and most grisly murder I've ever seen," said Crowe, a veteran of 27 years with the sheriff's

Gov. Bruce Babbitt agreed. He said the state will offer a \$10,000 reward for information leading to apprehension of the escapees.

Gary Tison, 43, of Casa Grande,

Ariz., and Randy Greenawalt, 28, of Thornton, Colo., both serving life terms for murder, fled the Florence prison July 30, when Tison's three sons allegedly pulled sawed-off shotguns from an ice chest they had brought to the prison, and then locked eight guards in a closet.

"A Lincoln Continental similar to the one they found the bodies in was in possession of one of the Tison boys prior to the escape," said Sgt. Alan Schmidt of the Arizona Department of Public Safety.

The Lincoln had a badly damaged tire, leading Crowe to speculate that Lyon stopped to help the fugitives before the family was killed.

The bodies were discovered Sunday by a game warden, who spotted the Lincoln about a mile from U.S. 95, some 140 miles west of Phoenix. Au-

Ector DA refuses comment on bond forfeitures

EDITOR'S NOTE: Allegations about questionable bonding procedures, which may have been responsible for keeping Larry Ortega Lozano in the Ector County Jail, surfaced during a recent federal grand jury investigation into circumstances surrounding the inmate's death. Today in one of several articles. The Reporter-Telegram continues to explore bonding practices in the Permian Basin.

and JIM PARKER ODESSA-Ector County District Attorney John Green Monday refused comment on his office procedures in collecting

bond forfeitures. Green, questioned by newsmen in his courthouse office, also refused to allow inspection of the files of 16 judgements nisi, some of them dating to 1972. which have gone uncollected by the district attorney's office, according to District Clerk Wanda McMann.

The nisis represent initial civil actions to claim money pledged by bonding companies as surety that their clients would appear in district court.

Green and Mrs. McMann both declined to be interviewed Monday, the latter claiming to have been misquoted in an article in Sunday's Reporter-Telegram.

Green, who recently described some newsmen as "dumbasses," told reporters that he was "too busy" to be bothered with questions.

Green then added, however. that the media "might as well go ahead and print what you want...you're going to do it any-

Green went on to repeat and embellish on his "dumb-ass" remarks by adding that reporters "are full of BS and they only make \$50 a month, drink beer. get drunk and listen to the wrong sources.

"The trouble with you guys is you read 'All The President's Men' too much. This might surprise you but there are some honest people in county government; we're not all a bunch of crooks."

Green was vacationing in California last week and was unavailable for comment when the original article detailing uncollected bond forfeitures in Ector and Midland Counties was prepared.

Green maintained that his office was pursuing bond forfeitures vigorously. When asked why there were cases dating back to 1972, Green answered, "So what?" "All you people are trying to

do is stir up a bunch of trouble," he said.

... Mrs. McMann added that in the older cases the defendant had been found and returned to the court. Asked why the cases remained on the books she responded, "I have nothing else to

In an apparent reference to recent federal grand jury proceedings in Midland, Green told reporters to go talk to their


grand jury sources. He then launched an attack on the media handling of the jury probe of inmate Larry Lozano's death Jan. 22 in the Ector County

"You guys made it all up. You never asked me if I were going to testify. Nobody ever asked me if I were going to be indicted. Why bother to ask me anything now?" Green said.

Bonding companies in Ector and Midland Counties have several hundred thousand dollars pending in uncollected, forfeitures. The total for the Midland District and County Courts exceeds \$250,000.

Rain possible, forecast says

Temperatures continued to stay under 90 in the Permian Basin Monday, as the weatherman was forecasting more cool weather with a possibility of some rain.

The forecast for Midland calls for partly cloudy weather through Wednesday, with a 20 per cent chance of mainly afternoon and evening showers and thunderstorms.

The high Wednesday is expected to be in the middle 80s with the low tonight in the middle 60s.

Southeasterly winds are forecast at 10 to 15 mph, becoming light south-

easterly tonight.

Monday's temperature hit a high of 87 at 6 p.m. The record high for Aug. 7 is 104 degrees set in 1964. The overnight low was 64 degrees, considerably warmer than the low of 57

degrees i'or Aug. 8 set back in 1939. Flood weary Texans kept a wary eye southward today as Tropical Storm Bess moved near the Mexican coast between Tampico and Vera

At the National Hurricane Center, forecasters said Bess vould likely go inland around Tuxpan, but warned interests along the northern coast of Mexico to be alert for the possibility of the storm remaining ove, water and intensifying.

Gulfport, Miss. Twelve crew members were rescued.

The other vessel, the 65-foot Jamie Jim, was tied at an oil rig near the mouth of the Mississippi River when it sank in heavy seas about 7 a.m. with two men aboard. One man was rescued and the other was missing.

First reports had indicated 12 were aboard the Haney Jr., but the Coast Guard said a full accounting of those aboard raised the figure to 15.

A Coast Guard spokesman said a passing fishing boat, the Georgia Baby, pulled seven men from the water, and the body of one man was picked up by a cutter.

The vessel operated out of Moss Point, Miss., and had been fishing since Sunday night for menhaden, a small fish commonly called pogey

and used in cat food The Coast Guard said some of the rescued men suffered mild exposure after floating in 6- to 7-foot seas about eight hours. All reportedly had lifejackets and were clinging to debris when they were found in the water, a

Coast Guard spokesman said. He said none required medical

treatment In the oil rig incident, a spokesman for Shell Oil Co. said the two men were standing by for assignment at a drilling rig in the South Pass area,

The boat was under contract to Shell but owned by Blue Dolphin Marine, operating out of Morgan City,

Gene Coble, representing the owners, said Donald Fontenot of Eunice was rescued after he swam to an oil platform. His brother, Darrell, was still missing. Both were in their

He said workmen on a rig had watched the boat go down, but the cause of the sinking was not known.

Albany aid drive begun

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) - Tons of food, clothing, bedding and cleanup supplies are being airlifted from New York to Texas in an Albany-to-Albany aid drive for flood victims.

Disc jockeys, reporters and Explorer Scouts worked Monday night at local radio station WOKO to pack the emergency supplies for the people of Albany, Texas, where five people have died in floods. The overall death toll in the floods is 28.

Sometime today, a U.S. Air Force C-130 will fly the boxes from state Air National Guard facilities at nearby Schenectady County airport to Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene, Texas. The effort began last Friday when

WOKO news director Bryan Jackson read how Hubbard Creek surged through the Texas town, killing residents and sweeping away homes. Jackson enlisted the aid of the local Price Chopper supermarket chain,

which set up collection boxes at its nine Albany County stores. Volunteers from WOKO and scouts from Explorer Posts 1460 and 711

manned the boxes as residents re-

sponded to the campaign. U.S. Rep. Samuel Stratton, D-N.Y. contacted Defense Secretary Harold Brown, who approved use of the C-l30 for the aid-lift.

House claims support by Briscoe

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The chairman of House conferees on a constitutional amendment easing property taxes said today Gov. Dolph Briscoe promised to lobby senators to accept House proposals.

The House meanwhile planned a final vote today on a bill (HB39) calling for a non-binding referendum in November on whether Texans favor a one-cent increase in the state sales tax, dedicated to reducing school property taxes

Rep. Tim Von Dohlen, D-Goliad, said Briscoe favored a state spending limit that House conferees are holding out for, but which their Senate counterparts have steadfastly reject-

"The spending limit is critical. Without it, we probably won't have a conference report," Von Dohlen said after a 30-minute bargaining session The House-Senate negotiators

Temple later explained the point of order would have killed the entire referendum bill, which was brought up too late under House rules governing close-of-session business.

The House passed, 110-8, and sent the governor a bill forcing common school districts and rural high school districts to become indepen tricts unless they vote the taxes to pay for county administration.

A law passed in 1975 eliminates state aid for most county superintendents' offices, which provide administration for common and rural high

Pressmen's strike likely tonight

By ANNE ZUSY

NEW YORK (AP) - Last-ditch efforts to avoid a shutdown of the city's three biggest daily newspapers were scheduled for today. But both sides predicted no progress and a pressmen's strike tonight.

Negotiations recessed Monday night with members of the Publishers Association of New York City and Printing Pressmen's Union No. 2 saying they had not reached agreement despite participation by federal me-

The publishers of The New York Times, the Daily News, and the New York Post still threatened to post a list of new working conditions for the city's 1,550 pressmen if there were no contract to replace one that expired in

The pressmen's union in turn said it would strike 'the moment' any newly posted, unilateral regulations

"We have made no progress; there has been no change," said William Kennedy Jr., head of the pressmen's union. "The chances that we will walk out are 50-50.

"No progress, nothing's changed," echoed H.J. Kracke, executive director of the Publishers Association, as talks recessed Monday shortly before 10 p.m. at a mid-Manhattan hotel. The chances for avoiding a strike

don't look good," added Marvin Fischbein, assistant to Post publisher Rupert Murdoch.

Kennedy said the Newspaper Guild, the Deliverymen's Union, "and from everyone but the typographers," had promised his union support. "So if we

choose to strike I think we'll successfully shut down the papers," Kennedy

Monday's talks were guided by four mediators - John C. Zancanaro, a national representative of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service; James Williams, from the Washington office; Wayne L. Horvitz, the agency's national director; and Hezekiah Brown, who is with the service's regional office here.

Today's talks were scheduled to resume at the service's offices here. If the talks fail, the call to strike was expected late tonight

The pressmen's contract dispute centers on "manning agreements" developed over many years. The three newspapers say economic conditions require that they halve the number of pressmen.

Publishers propose that the cutbacks be made gradually, through attrition The union counters that conditions

caused by newspaper automation have created a need for more rather than less pressmen

The pressroom job cut plan would be part of the unilateral set of working conditions publishers said they would post today if there were no

The new conditions also would give pressmen wage increases of \$23 a week in each of the first two years of a three-year contract, with a \$22-aweek raise in the third year.

Under the contract that expired March 31, journeyman pressmen earn \$350.18 a week on the day shift and \$361.41 on nights.





West or South Texas prison to wait for 1979

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Location of a prison in West or South Texas will have to wait for the 1979 Legislature following action by a single senator.

Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, used a Senate practice of "tagging" a bill Monday to kill it for the special session. The legislation would have allowed use of sale proceeds from the Blue Ridge Prison Farm in Fort Bend County for purchase of a site more than 75 miles from Huntsville.

By tagging a bill, a senator can require a 48-hour written notice before any committee action on it. Time will run out since the special session will adjourn no later than midnight tonight

"I think it would be a very unwise expenditure of state funds," Doggett said. "It could run up to \$60 million in construction and a new prison may not be needed.

A community-based prison should

be considered, Doggett said. "I don't think we need another new unit constructed at this time until we've studied the needs of the system

more than we have," he added. The bill's sponsor, Sen. Bill Moore, D-Bryan, could ask for a two-thirds vote to suspend the 48-hour rule, but he did not do so Monday.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe added the prison matter as a session agenda item on

Moore's bill would have amended a 1955 law that requires farm sale proceeds to be used toward purchase of land within 75 miles of the state penitentiary at Huntsville.

The Texas Board of Corrections discussed selling the prison farm in April in connection with purchase of a controversial \$8 million site in Hidal-

Attorney General John Hill, however, said in a legal opinion that the Hidalgo site would violate the 75-mile rule. The corrections board based selection of the site on a 1977 appropriations bill rider that ordered any new prison site be in West Texas

Comparative justice

The United States has complained to the Soviet Union about the way it treats American newsmen trying to do their jobs in Moscow, but one wonders if the shoe belongs on a different foot.

The penalties facing a New York Times reporter and his colleague in a Soviet court are mild compared to the unwarranted, abusive penalties assessed by an American court against another Times reporter in his own country.

Superior Court Judge Theodore W. Trautwein of New Jersey is trying to get reporter Myron Farber to violate the confidentiality of his notes and sources for stories about a murder case presently on trial. The judge has ordered Mr. Farber to jail until he produces the confidential information. The reporter spent his first night in jail Friday. He doesn't intend to violate the trust placed in him, stating, "If I can't take it in a jail over an issue like this, then I don't deserve to be a reporter for The New York Times." His present jail term is to be followed by a sixmonths' additional jail term. A \$2,000 fine also has been assessed.

The judge also has fined The New York Times Co. \$100,000 plus \$5,000 a day as long as Farber resists. The newspaper is backing Farber all-the-way.

Yes, Israel has strong case, but what if?

Many Americans who have been ardent supporters of Israel for many years are troubled by Jerusalem's unyielding and intransigent attitude regarding compromise in the name of peace in the Middle East.

This uneasiness is damaging the Israeli cause in the land of its strongest friends and it is growing growing despite almost endless facts and events that may justify much of Israel's suspicions and fears for its national security. It is becoming a case of "Yes, you have reason to be wary, but ..." and "Yes, you are victims of terrorism and unjustified attacks, however ..." and, most important, "Yes, we understand the risks, but what if ...?'

That "what if" concerns an urgent need for Israel to do something dramatic, meaningful, straightforward and unilateral in surrendering territory in the interests of peace. Such a move is urgent despite these facts that give some support to the stubborn and intractable attitude of Prime Minister Menachem Begin:

1. United Nations Resolution 242, often quoted as requiring Israel to return all territories won in the June 1967 war, does not in fact include such a demand. On the subject of 242, Alfred L. Atherton Jr., U.S. assistant secretary of state for Middle Eastern affairs, says: "Resolution 242 does not define secure and recognized

boundaries. It does not call for withdrawal from 'all' occupied territories. It does not require Israel to give up every inch of occupied territory. Atherton's words conflict with those of President Carter, but the diplomat appears better qualified in interpreting the resolution.

2. Israel is a victim of a global Third World and Communist propaganda machine that is so unfair it is ridiculous. The evidence is clear. When 256 passengers, mostly Israelis, were kidnapped in a Palestinian air piracy attack on June 27, 1976, little was said in the United Nations. However, when an Israeli rescue mission saved most of the passengers in a daring mission to Entebbe, Uganda, on July 4, Israel was summoned before the Security Council, accused of violating tyrant Idi Amin's

3. On June 2, 1978, seven Israelis were killed and 50 injured in a Palestine Liberation Organization bombing of a bus. There was not a peep from the "peace-loving" U.N. However, when on June 8, Israel conducted retaliatory raids against PLO military bases, the Israelis were condemned. Chaim Herzog, Israeli ambassador to the U.N., documents many such contradictions of right and wrong in his book, "Who Stands Accused?" (Random House). "Indeed," he says, "the paranoic obsession of the world organization with Israel has reached such heights of absurdity that something like 50 percent of the time of each General Assembly session is devoted to condemnations of this one small Jewish democracy, as though there were no other problems in the world today.'

There are many other examples of the one-sidedness rampant in judging terrorism and Israeli defense against it. There is diminishing understanding everywhere, including among Americans, of Israel's valid need for secure borders (five wars

These facts notwithstanding, Begin's unrealistic stubbornness has damaged Israel with its friends. Thus we come to the "but," the "however' and the "what if."

Israel has far more captured territory than, it needs for security, particularly in these days of the conciliatory mood of Egypt's President Anwar Sadat. Israel may have certain suspicions regarding Sadat, but a dramatic Begin concession is necessary. With this truth in mind, what if Israel should announce unilaterally that it was evacuating 75 percent of the Sinai Peninsula and the Gaza Strip?

The Golan Heights is a different matter, Jerusalem is a different matter and the West Bank really is not as vital an issue to Jordan as some Arabs and U.N. Third Worlders make it out to be.

But Gaza no longer is vital to Israel, and it could be sealed off easily by Israeli forces, eliminated as a source of danger. Most of the Sinai is worthless other than as a tank no-man'sland, and with Egypt now possessing modern missiles, Tel Aviv is well within Cairo's range, anyway.

The unilateral surrender of Sinai territory to Egypt, however, would be a dramatic gesture of peace to Sadat. The ceding of Gaza to Jordan, Egypt or a combination of both, would prove to the world for the first time that Israel has a genuine interest in peace. This, in turn, would regain for Israel many of its vital American friends.

Hamilton Jordan's expletives

WASHINGTON - Despite the lesson of Richard Nixon's Watergate transcripts, there have been some recent expletives that should have been deleted from White House communications.

As a born-again Baptist, Jimmy Carter eschews naughty words. But his free-wheeling honcho, Hamilton Jordan is less pharisaical. Within the White House, the irrepressible Jordan doesn't conceal his distaste for Rep. John Moss, D-Calif.

The veteran Moss, a power in the House, has offended Jordan by taking independent stands. Not long ago, Moss asked the White House for information about human rights practices in the Middle East. The

request came across Jordan's desk. He scrawled a Nixon-vintage "expletive deleted" on a memo. The quick-triggered aide now tells us he doesn't recall using this vulgar term to characterize Moss. "I can't believe I called him that," said Jordan. "It's

more likely that I called him a jerk." Moss told our associate Gary Cohn that he had not heard of the memo but that Jordan's offensive language didn't bother him. "If I really respect someone and he doesn't respect me back, it would bother me," the congressman explained. "If I have no particular respect for the person, it

has no effect whatsoever.' The powerful Moss, citing previous dealings with Jordan, said the reported Jordanism didn't strike him as "too much out of character." The congressman said that earlier in the Carter administration, he had tried to

reach Jordan but "never got a call

Snorted Moss: "His position is so exalted he hasn't time to contact a member of the House.'

Looking back on more than a quarter-century in Congress, Moss told us no president has ever had worse relations with the Hill than Jimmy Carter. This is "primarily because of his staff," said the congressman from California.

He added that Jordan isn't the only senior member of the Administration who fails to return phone calls. Moss said he had also tried in vain to reach Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus. He grumped that he no longer wastes time in futile attempts to reach Carter officials who ignore congressional

dread disease that took the life of former baseball star Lou Gehrig.

Four years ago, James Bishop, a self-employed Los Angeles marketing consultant, was informed that his wife, Mary Frances, was stricken with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), which afflicts 10,000 Americans every year. "The disease is incurable," the doctors told Bishop. "There's no cure. There's nothing we can do. Take her home. Make her comfortable. She has three years at the outside.

Bishop refused to accept their grim verdict. He all but abandoned his professional career to nurse his ill wife, with the help of their three daughters and two sons. Today, four years after the diagnosis, Mrs. Bishop remains alive at her home although almost totally paralyzed. "We have never discussed the

eventuality of death with Mary Frances, never mentioned it in her presence," the 63-year-old Bishop told us. "Most ALS patients are told by their doctors that all they can do is go home and die. And, of course, that's what they do. We have proved that it doesn't have to be. ALS can do nothing more to my wife. She has the worst possible case. But she's still alive.

Moreover, Bishop is now dedicating his life to the cause of other ALS sufferers on a national scale. At the time his wife's illness was diagnosed, Bishop discovered to his consternation that only \$400,000 a year was being spent on ALS research despite the fact it had caused the deaths of Gehrig, former heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles and ex-Vice President Henry Wallace among thousands of others. Most of the research was concentrated in far-off Guam where there is a high incidence of the killer disease.

He also discovered there was no national ALS society, similar to the high-powered groups which have created public support to combat heart disease and cancer. Only a handful of scattered local outfits existed. There was no coordinated fund-raising and, astonishingly, not even statistics on the number suffering from ALS in the United States.

At a 1974 Thanksgiving dinner, he and his family decided to organize the ALS Society of America. They solicited \$20,000 from friends, and Bishop spent \$22,000 of his own savings on a kick-off project which brought 34 prominent officials from this country and abroad to a discussion panel in California.

Today the money spent on ALS research amounts to \$5 million a year.

Sadat-U.S. side in the current peace games because of his huge Palestinian population. Still worse, Hussein was dealt out of any role in attempting to negotiate a West Bank settlement when the Arab summit conference in Rabat, shortly after the 1973 war, designated the PLO as "sole representative" of the Palestinian West Bankers.

The king of Jordan is compelled to play his few cards with great discrimnation. If he backed a U.S.-Egyptian-Israeli deal on the West Bank, he would be charged with selling out the Palestinians and the PLO. It was made clear to us in Amman that nobody here can accurately predict what Jordan's massive Palestinian population really wants on the West Bank: an independent state or a semi-independent "entity" linked to

Referring to Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin, one of Hussein's top advisers told us: "Mr. Begin has left us no room for maneuver. We are not in the present bargaining game and there is no way for us to get in.'

Accordingly, Hussein is quietly stepping up his contacts with a strange assortment of militant Arab states in hopes of enlarging his maneuver area as insurance against the unpredictable future. Honduran president accused in cocaine smuggling, ousted

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) - The commanders of Honduras armed forces ousted President Juan Alberto Melgar Castro after accusations of government involvement in cocaine smuggling to the United States and appointed themselves a three-man ruling junta.

A communique issued by the junta Monday night said Melgar Castro, a 47-year-old brigadier general, had resigned. It said Gen. Policarpio Paz Garcia, the head of the armed forces and commanding general of the army, would head the junta as chief of state, and the other members were Lt. Col. Domingo Alvarez, chief of the air force, and Lt. Col. Amilcar Zelaya Rodriguez, chief of public security.

The junta pledged to respect previous international commitments.

No disturbances were reported Lopez Arellano had come to power as a colonel in a military coup in 1963,

It was the second military housecleaning in three years due to charges of corruption. Opposition parties have been accusing the military regime of widespread corruption within among government officials and senior military







Midland-area residents wishing to donate funds and clothing to the victims of the weekend flooding which took place in the Texas Hill Country and in the Albany area of north central Texas may mail or bring the items to the American Red Cross Midland County Chapter office at 2306 Elizabeth Ave., ac-

cording to Maurice Cole, manager.

He said those wishing to ask the Red Cross about such donations may call 684-6161, 24-hours, seven days per week.

He said the most pressing need was for financial assistance.

"Also, we are now trying to set up a transportation system to deliver canned goods and household items to people in the affected areas such as Kerrville and Albany," Cole explained.

He said that a number of calls and many offers of assistance have come from the Midland area since the flooding.

Cole said he helped establish a disaster canteen van last Thursday. It was dispatched from Midland to the Kerrville area. This facility set up a place for volunteers, authorities and flood victims to eat in the midst of the affected portion of Texas, said Cole.

Mr. and Mrs. Lon Cole Friday volunteered their services to feed others trying to repair washed out bridges west of Kerrville, the manager said. Mr. and Mrs. Cole and other volunteers estalished another meal station in Comfort. He said there were

at least two others established in the same area. Cole singled out the Southern Baptist Convention Disaster Service, Salvation Army and the Seventh Day Adventist Church for their cooperation with the Red Cross in aiding flood victims. Another Midland group also helped out during the height of this

The Midland Amateur Radio Operators Club spent more than 60 hours helping Midland-area citizens learn the status of relatives and friends who were caught in the flooded areas, according to spokesman George Parker.

Spearheading this effort were Parker, Dr. Norman Gould,-Troy D. Lesley, and president Dewey Bau-

"We located an estimated 45 people, but it took us many hours to find them. I worked 10 hours at my radio during one stretch before I turned it over to another club member," said Parker.

Midland-area residents seeking the whereabouts of relatives and friends used the service, as did the

'We were actually called out by the American Red Cross and we helped locate people in both the Albany and Kerrville areas. I credit the Abilene Amateur Radio Operators Club for actually going to the scene of the flooding. They stayed in constant communication with us, and we helped locate people together before relaying the information back to the American Red Cross," noted Parker. Parker said the practice and experience club

members gained during a June 23-24 Field Day in Midland was helpful over the weekend.

Fighting between Lebanese, Syrians subsiding today

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Fighting between Syrian forces and right-wing Christian militias in Beirut simmered down to sporadic exchanges of artillery and sniper fire today after two days of heavy firing.

The police said 12 more Christians were killed and 21 wounded in the past 24 hours, bringing the toll for the past three nights of Syrian attacks to 44 killed and 88 wounded. Christian military commanders claimed 75 were killed and more than 220 were wounded.

There was no information available on Syrian casualties.

One of the Christian military leaders, former President Camille Chamoun's elder son Dory, said in a statement the only solution to the Syrian-Christian confrontation was to "escalate the situation into a head-on collision."

Bolts on Six Flags ride show corrosion

CLAYTON, Mo. (AP) - Two bolts on the Six Flags Over Mid-America Sky Way ride that apparently failed last month showed signs of corrosion, says St. Louis County Public Works Director Robert Hagel.

The bolts also apparently were original parts of the eight-year-old ride, from which four persons fell in a gondola car when a support arm collapsed, Hagel said Monday. Three of the passengers died and the fourth was seriously injured in the mishap. The county's public works and police departments

are conducting official investigations into the accident because the amusement park is in an unincorporated part of the county. Hagel said the Sky Way ride probably will be

closed for the remainder of the season, since he estimated investigators may take two or three months to determine why the accident occurred. The two bolts are to undergo laboratory analysis

this week under the auspices of the Illinois Institute of Technology to determine why they apparently failed, Hagel said. Hagel also said it is possible that an inspector erroneously reported that the bolts had been replaced after an inspection last year. "This has not yet been substantiated," he said.

Tia Maria pushed down the fence of her pen at the Kerr home late Sunday night or early Monday and sparked a search by authorities fearful that she might attack people:

Two calves were attacked in the area after the beast escaped, and officials speculated Tia Maria may have been responsible. The head of one calf was

Kerr said Tia Maria is a tame pet, but feared she might attack if provoked.

Kerr speculated the lioness escaped because it was the season for her to be in heat. Washington County deputy sheriffs and Bartles-

ville police blocked off an area of several square miles and warned the public to stay away while the search for the lioness was in progress.

But it's a no-win position. Industry spokesmen such as Charles J. DiBona, head of the

American Petroleum Institute, argue that unregulated prices fully matching the world market are needed to pay for future oil development. Consumer spokesmen such as James Flug of Energy Action say the regulated prices are too high.

In defense of the administration's tight-rope act, Bush said, "If crude oil prices were deregulated, it would only result in people paying the companies about \$15 billion more per year for what they are already doing.
"Nobody likes regulation," Bush

added. "I don't get my kicks from regulating prices — but we're trying to rationalize a situation which has been subject to a yo-yo effect over the last several years.

In yet another role, the federal government is the target of conflicting arguments - about offshore and onshore oil leases. The government owns the coastal areas where much of the nation's undiscovered oil might

That responsibility has been shared since last October by the departments of Energy and Interior, but offshore leasing proceeds under timetables established by Interior.

Industry sometimes complains that the leasing schedule is too slow, although it regularly bids for leases on only a fraction of the tracts offered and has encountered shortages of drilling rigs to develop existing off-

On the other hand, environmentalists fear that mishaps on offshore drilling platforms might spill oil into the sea, resulting in widespread damage to fish and other wildlife.

The first petroleum exploration drilling off the mid-Atlantic coast began this year and the two holes so far have found no commercial quantities of oil or gas, to the disappoint ment of the companies and the government.

Thus, Reid thinks government efforts to increase the nation's oil and gas supply stand the best chance when directed at developing new, unconventional sources which are not yet widely commercial.

"I think research and development is one thing where the government has been fairly successful," he said.

"We have sponsored the enhanced oil recovery program in which the government shares about 40 percent of the cost of actual field experiments with a company."

Enhanced recovery means using extraordinary efforts to get more oil out of a field where natural flow is running out, such as injecting steam or chemicals to make the oil flow more readily.

The Energy Department has also participated in efforts to increase natural gas production by pumping liquids into the ground at high pressure and fracturing the rocks or tight sands in which the gas is trapped.

Reid said information gathered from various government cost-shared programs is available to everyone, so the programs help spread new techniques or experimental data through the industry more rapidly than would be possible if each company had to repeat the experiment for itself.

Only disappointments hit in Canyon drilling

TULSA, Okla.—Frontier areas of the U.S. Outer Continental Shelf, long considered the nation's best hope for major additions to petroleum reserves, have produced little more than big disappointments so far.

But the oil industry isn't ready to turn away from OCS frontier exploration, despite high risks, soaring costs and difficulties in acquiring leases, the Oil & Gas Journal reports.

In its Aug. 7 issue, the weekly business magazine points out that explorationists drilled more than 50 dry holes during five years before discovering oil and gas in the North Seanow one of the world's major producing areas.

Most oil industry exploration executives agree it is too early to write off the potential of the U.S. OCS frontier. But their mood has changed from nearly euphoric to cautiously opti-

"It is obvious to me that if we haven't condemned the OCS frontier we have at least lessened the enthusiasm," one executive told the Jour-

Frontier exploration-especially off Alaska-is expensive. Industry sources estimate it coasts \$1 million per thousand feet of hole to drill in Alaskan waters, and about one-third to one-half that off the East Coast.

Those costs come after the so-called front-end costs of leases. Since 1973, oil firms have spent \$4.116 billion on leases in U.S. OCS frontier areas.

Many industry representatives critize U.S. government policies, especially those incorporating alternative bidding systems that increase the sums companies must pay before they are allowed to drill.

Still, oil firms want to continue the search for hydrocarbons on the OCS.

Mathews inducted into Hall of Fame

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (AP) — Being elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame made Eddie Mathews nervous, nostalgic and, most of all, grateful.

"Baseball has been so good to me. It's given me everything I've got," said the newest inductee into the game's most elite group. "I've tried to give it all I had.

'If I'd been this nervous when I played, I wouldn't be here. I'm getting more nervous by the minute," he added in his thank-you speech.

Mathews, the greatest slugging third baseman of all time, was in-ducted into the Hall Monday along with Veterans' Committee choices Larry McPhail and Addie Joss. Mathews retired in 1968 after a record-setting career with the Boston-Milwaukee-Atlanta Braves, Houston Astros and Detroit Tigers. He holds the major league mark for career homers by a third baseman (481) and National League records for most games played at the position (2,154), most homers in a season by a third baseman (47 in 1953) and most consecutive seasons with 30 or more homers (nine, 1953-61).

"I'm proud of all these things but I remember best the homer I hit in the 1957 World Series to beat the Yankees," said Mathews of his fourthgame blast for the only Braves championship team he played with. In his final playing season, Mathews was World Series. "This is my greatest honor," he said. "It will take a week to 10 days

for it to sink in. I don't know if there

are words to explain it. "I'm just a small part of a wonderful game that is a tremendous part of

American today.' THE GAME GOT to be that way in part thanks to McPhail, the innovative executive who, according to Com-

missioner Bowie Kuhn, "revitalized every team he touched and brought enormous excitement to them." McPhail, who left baseball in 1947 after turning the Cincinnati Reds, Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees into moneymakers, was responsible for night games, Old

Timers Day, a pension plan for ball-players and office personnel, regular airplane travel by major league teams and expanded broadcasting of their games.

"My father was most proud of building pennant winners in Brooklyn and New York, especially Brooklyn," said Lee McPhail, president of the American League, who accepted the honor along with his brother Bill, a broadcasting executive. "When the Dodgers clinched the pennant in Boston in 1940, my father was so proud that he went to 125th St. to meet their train, which was going to Grand Cen-

tral Station where hundreds of fans

were waiting. But Leo Durocher, who he'd brought in to manage the Dodgers, convinced the conductor to skip 125th St. and head right in.

Of course when Dad saw Leo he threatened to fire him. "HE WAS AGRESSIVE, flamboy-

ant, garrulous and loud, but also a promotional genius and visionary. He loved baseball and anything he tried to do was for the good of baseball."
Joss was called the "best pitcher in

the first quarter-century of the American League" by baseball histo-rian Fred Leid, quite a compliment since Joss was a contemporary of Cy Young and Walter Johnson. He died of spinal mennengitis two days before the 1911 season opener after a phenomenal nine-year career. JOSS HURLED a perfect game,

another no-hitter, seven one-hitters and had a 1.88 career ERA for Cleveland. The Veterans' Committee waived the 10 years in the majors rule to induct Joss, who was represented by Dr. William Schwartz, a relative.

Also receiving awards were Mel Allen and Red Barber, the first recipients of the Ford C. Frick Award for broadcasting excellence and sportswriters Edgar Munzel and the late Gordon Cobbledick, each getting the J.G. Taylor Spink Award for distinguished service as a baseball writer. Allen may have given the sport a 'new motto," as Kuhn claimed, when the "Voice of the Yankees" spoke of

his own studies in law. "Like Commissioner Kuhn, I got my LLB degree in law," said Allen. "It wasn't until now that I realized that the LLB stood for something other than in law. It stands for 'Long Live Baseball.'

Nolan Ryan is frustrated pitcher

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) - Nolan Ryan, who has a 5-10 record and a 4.15 earned run average, admits this has been his most frustrating season, but he hasn't given up the year as a lost

And, as he puts it, "Although I'm disappointed with the year I'm having, I'm content to be playing for the California Angels."

Ryan, who came to the Angels from the New York Mets prior to the 1972 season, won 112 games in his six seasons for California prior to the current campaign. In addition, he firmly established himself as one of the outstanding strikeout artists of all time and one of the greatest pitchers ever at holding a lead in the late

BUT SO far, 1978 has been forgettable, to say the least, except perhaps for the beard that he began growing some three weeks ago.

"It's been one thing after another," said the fireballing right-hander Mon-day night. "I pitched real well the first month but we didn't score any runs. Then I didn't throw well for a month. And then I injured my leg.

"But I feel fine now. I've thrown well since the All-Star break with one exception and my main goal right now is to help this club win the

American League West title."

Ryan, the eighth leading strikeout pitcher in baseball history although only 31 years old, had different

thoughts less than two months ago. "I told Mr. Bavasi (General Manager Buzzie Bavasi) that if they felt like they could help their ballclub by trading me to Texas, I'd approve the deal," said Ryan. "I've thought about playing closer to home for quite a while, my family has a home in Texas and we spend the winters there.

"I was frustrated at the time over the way I was throwing and the way things were going," he continued. "The only places I (would like to play are here or somewhere in Texas."

RYAN, WHO is scheduled to make his next start Sunday against the Minnesota Twins, has 2,590 lifetime strikeouts. Only two pitchers have totaled more than 3,000 strikeouts — Walter Johnson, with 3,508, and Bob Gibson, with 3,117.

Ryan not only holds the major league single-season record with 383 strikeouts in 1973, but with 367, 341, 329 and 327 strikeouts in four other seasons, he has five of the eight highest one-year totals ever. He has fanned 10 batters in a game a record 112 times overall, far ahead of runner-

up Sandy Koufax's total of 97. His ability to hold a lead in the late innings is staggering. During his career, he has entered the eighth inning with a lead on 95 occasions. His record is 90-2 with three no-decisions and he has finished 78 of those 95 games.

AND HE has pitched four no-hit-

"I don't put a whole lot of value on statistics until I get close to them," he said. "I would like to get 3,000 strikeouts, pitch my fifth no-hitter and win 20 games again, but right now, I'm just thinking about the rest of this

The frustrations he's experienced this season would have weighed much heavier on his mind, he said, had they

occurred earlier in his career. While I would imagine overall it has been my most frustrating year. the older you get the better prepared you are to handle situations like this," he said. "It would have been a lot different, I'm sure, five years ago."

As far as his valuable right arm is concerned, he said, "It feels pretty good. It doesn't feel like it did eight or 10 years ago, there's a certain amount of wear and tear on it, but I feel like if I don't sustain an injury I should be able to pitch three or four more years!"

Graham Smith wins four gold medals

EDMONTON, Alberta (A.P.) - Graham Smith laid his head wearily on the soft shoulder of a woman official and closed his eyes for a brief moment.

The 20-year-old Canadian swimming star was just letting everyone know how much winning four Commonwealth Games gold medals in four days can take out of a person.

Smith, who swims during the school year for the University of California, splashed to victory Monday in the 200-meter individual medley, then came back in the night session to slip past England's Duncan Goodhew in the last 25 meters for a gold medal in the 200-meter breaststroke.

The wide-shouldered Smith had a right to be tired after calling on his diminishing reserves to become only the fourth male swimmer to win four gold medals in a single games. The others were Australians Murray Rose (1962), Peter Reynolds (1966) and Mike Wenden (1970).

"I was really tired on the third lap (of the four-lap race) and I know Duncan is a very strong finisher as well. But I just went after it," Smith said.

Smith planned to get plenty of rest today before continuing his assault on the games' record book Wednesday in his final two events -- the 100 breaststroke and 400 medley relay.

Getting very nearly as much attention Monday as' Smith were track and field stars Don Quarrie, Henry Rono and Daley Thompson.

Quarrie, a 27-year-old Jamaican, captured his third games' 100-meter sprint title in nine years, nipping Scotland's Allan Wells and Hasely Crawford of Trinidad-Tobago with a games' record of 10.03

Rono, the Kenyan wonder who holds four world distance-running records, won easily in Monday's 3,000-meter steeplechase, but disappointed the stadium crowd of about 35,000 by running more than 21

seconds slower than his world record of 8:05.4. But many in the crowd were expected back today to watch the masterful Kenyan run a heat in the 5,000 meters, another event in which he owns the world

Disappointed as the crowd was in Rono's somewhat dull performance in wind-buffeted Commonwealth Stadium, it watched excitedly as Thompson, a relatively unheralded 20-year-old Englishman, exploded through the first five events of the decath-

The muscular youngster may well fall short of American Bruce Jenner's world decathlon record in the final five events today - because they include his weakest events, the javelin and discus — but he stunned the crowd and the rest of the competitors by accumulating 4,550 points in the 100-meter dash, the long jump, the shot put, the high jump and the

That surpassed the previous all-time best of 4,499 points for the first five events, set in the 1968 Olympics at Mexico City by American Bill Toomey. Jenner's record of 8,618'was set in the 1976 Olympics at Montreal.

England's women picked up three gold medals Monday, while Canada got one in track and field

Sonia Lannaman won the 100-meter dash, Donna Hartley the 400 and Paula Fudge the 3,000 for England, while Romanian defector Carmen Ionese set a Games discus record for the Canadians.

Richard Mitchell of Australia won the men's 400, while Berwyn Price of Wales grabbed the gold in the 110-meter hurdles.

Back in the swimming pool, Australia moved closer to Canada's leading total of nine gold medals by picking up three more.



Memphis team will be sold

(AP) - A meeting between Commissioner Phil Woosnam, Memphis Rogues officials and businessman William B. Tanner was set for today on Tanner's offer to buy the North American Soc-

cer League franchise. The NASL's top officer and Tanner, president of the advertising firm named for him, were to confer with Rogues' President Bill Marcum

at the Tanner Building. Tanner offered Sunday to buy the Rogues if 12,-000 season ticket pledges were collected by the

team. Woosnam said Monday that if the pledges were gathered, "That would convince a lot of people

of a lot of things. "I've got every faith in Memphis, and I think it's a place where soccer is going to really go big."

As of 6 p.m Monday, the Rogues had collected 5,250 pledges, which Rogues officials said are open to auditing.

Tanner's bid came as Harry Mangurian, principal owner of the Rogues, and officials of Gulf and Western Industries, a New York conglomerate, conducted negotiations. Reports

MEMPHIS, Tenn. have said Gulf and Western intends to buy the team and move it to New York City

Mangurian responded to Tanner's offer by saying he is committed to selling the team to Gulf and Western.

"The sale hasn't been completed, but everything has been agreed upon," Mangurian said. He has been negotiating with Sonny Werblin, president of Madison Square Garden Inc., owned by Gulf and West-

"As far as I*am concerned, he owns the team," Mangurian said. However, the NASL owners and Woosnam will make the final decision on the Rogues. Three-fourths of the leagues owners-18 of

Baseball is a funny game. One day a player can be a regular news item, visible to the fan in the stands and as much taken for granted as the favorite TV show, or the cup of coffee with the daily newspaper.

Then, Presto, it's as though the next door neighbor was list-

ed as missing in action. The guy who was so much a part of the every day fan's life is gone.

In the spring, it might be a pitcher like Dan England, who at 23 is told he is too old and lacks a big league fastball. Or just a few weeks ago, an old favorite like Aaron Randall, dispatched in mid-season as a play er with too much mileage and too little progress.

It's sad, but today's hero, all at once becomes yesterday's memory.

UNLIKE OLD soldiers, old ball players don't necessarily fade away. Some stay in Midland and find jobs, like Don Schroeder or Mark Thomas, Cubs of an earlier year, and Mike Umfleet of more recent

"In this sport you get to meet a lot of new people. And it's such an individual sport. There's nobody else to blame but yourself. I like the idea of doing something that's all on my shoulders.

If Mike were to seriously consider turning pro, it would mean a lot of practice. "I used to bowl once a week with a bunch of kids in a league when I was about 14. I bowled until I was 16, then I quit because I started high school and was playing ball then. If you put all my bowling years together, you have maybe three and that's about it."

However, Mike's baseball ambitions linger. "I had some offers to play AA ball, but it was hard to go back to \$1,000 a month in AA ball when I could have been making pretty good money

MIKE HAS AN agent. Joe Tubiolo, and he has the contacts that could get Umfleet a trial next spring.

Red fans boo Garber but Atlanta wins, 5-3

It all seemed so familiar. Bits and pieces of the past, gathered and glued together — a souvenir package wrapped in memories.

There was Gene Garber pitching to Pete Rose, as he had a week earlier when Rose's record 44-game hitting streak came to an end.

There was a scout in a broadcast booth, directing outfielders and trying to steal signals. The same tactic provoked protests from the Reds in 1976 when the New York Yankees tried it during the World Series.

And there, the bitterest memory of all, was Tom Seaver pitching badly the way he had in the beginning of this strange season.

"I did everything wrong I possibly could, said the puzzled veteran after the Atlanta Braves scored 5-3 victory Monday night and handed Seaver his seventh loss in the nine decisions since he no-hit the St. Louis Cardinals on June 16.

Meanwhile, Los Angeles beat San Diego 3-1, St. Louis downed Philadelphia 6-3 and Chicago trimmed Pitts-

burgh 5-4. The Rose-Garber matchup provoked an emotional response from the 33,215 Riverfront Stadium fans who remembered Garber's strikeout of Rose in the ninth inning last week; the one that nailed the coffin shut on the third baseman's streak.

Rose had bitter words for Garber after the streak ended; he said Garber pitched as though it was the seventh game of the World Series. The fans washed the field in boos as Garber replaced Mickey Mahler in the seventh with a runner on third and Rose at the plate.

Garber pitched outside, as he had in striking Rose out. But this time, one pitch went too far outside and a run scored.

The booing, said Garber, "Didn't bother me. All I was thinking was, 'Get him out '

That he did, ultimately nailing Rose on a fly ball to center.

As for Rose's angry statements. Garber demurred. "It was an emotional thing for him," he said. "Lots of times you say things you don't mean. It didn't sound like Pete Rose

"I feel the same way about him I always felt. Nothing's changed," continued Garber. "He's great for the game and still piling up records. I'm sure, in his mind, that thing is behind

Dobler says his mean days over MIAMI (AP) - Conrad Dobler says

his "mean man" days are over and that he'll prove his playing ability as a New Orleans Saint this season. But Miami Dolphins' linebacker Steve Towle remembers the old Dobler too well, and says he's ready for their

Dobler's rough tactics triggered a memorable brawl when the Dolphins mauled the St. Louis Cardinals 55-14 last Thanksgiving Day. Several players drew fines for the fight, including Dobler, who was assessed \$1,000.

The Dolphins meet Dobler again this Saturday in a National Football League exhibition game at New Orleans. The offensive lineman was traded from the Cardinals to the Saints during the offseason.

Towle, a starting linebacker, charged Monday that Dobler's reputed punching, kicking and biting methods on the offensive line are bad for the game's image.

"Evidently, because of his following, a large portion of the people watch the game for the violence aspect. I don't think it should take on that much importance.

"Football's violent enough without someone purposely trying to hurt another player," said Towle, who suffered knee and rib injuries in the St. Louis game. He played only sparingly the rest of the season.

He said Dobler took a "cheap shot" at defensive end A.J. Duhe, who responded by taunting Dobler.

"It was about the third quarter that Conrad became more concerned with getting A.J. than with anything else. Finally, A.J. stuck his head up out of a pile like a little gopher, and Conrad got A.J. right in the side of the head with his helmet," Towle said.

"If you know someone like that in your personal life, your reaction is to just avoid him," the fourth-year pro added. "But when he's lined up against you on a football field, you can't avoid him.

'The only way to fight fire is with fire," Towle warned in a Miami Her-

ald interview. But Dobler said at the Saints' Vero Beach training camp that he's ready to show the NFL he is one of its

premier linemen, not its meanest. "The reputation has never mattered as far as I was concerned," he

told the Palm Beach Post. "For years, (center Tom) Banks and I and (guard Dan) Dierdorf always felt like one of us had to be carrying the other two because the three of us couldn't be that good. I knew it had to me," he said.

It's just that while sailboats are cayorting on the picturesque lake just a few hundred yards from Toronto's Exhibition Stadium, the Orioles usually find rough sailing against the hometown Blue Jays.

Monday was no exception. Jim Clancy fired a four-hitter and Alan Ashby's single past a diving Lee May at first base scored John Mayberry with the winning run in the seventh inning as the Blue Jays defeated the Orioles 2-1.

SMU has strong aerial circus

DALLAS (AP) - Southern Methodist University had one of the best recruiting campaigns of any collegiate football team in the country last winter. The only problem is the Mustangs have to do it again to compete for the Southwest Conference title.

"We got some quality, no doubt about that," said SMU Coach Ron Meyer. "We'll get some immediate help at the skill positions. That's where a freshman can help you the most. But it takes a kid just out of high school time to learn the offensive and defensive lines.'

STILL, SMU will have more depth at any time since Meyer's

arrival three years ago. SMU was 4-7 last season but had one of the deadliest pass-

and-catch combinations in the country. Quarterback Mike Ford will be a sophomore this year and Emanuel Tolbert will be a junior so the Mustangs again will be something to fear overhead.

"WE IMPROVED in 1977 and that's what we are seeking every year," said Meyer, who came to SMU from Nevada-Las Vegas two years ago. "Our highlight was the upset win over Houston. I don't know of any team in the country that had a younger team. Of our top 60 travel squad, 29 were fresh-

Meyer predicted last year that either Arkansas or Texas would win the title.

"This year, I still have to go with Arkansas because of all the folks they return," he said. "You can't count out Texas or Texas A&M, either. Houston could repeat what they did in 1976 and Baylor could be

MEYER SAID Ford and Tolbert give the Mustangs a good foundation to build on.

"Our biggest plus is the attitude and spirit of our players," said Meyer. "We certainly need optimism because we have a tough schedule against six bowl

Besides the usual conference toughies, the Mustangs play Florida, Penn State and Ohio State in a killer intersectional schedule.

"The overall depth and offensive and defensive line play is a big concern," said Meyer. "We have excellent talent at the skill positions. We are going to have to depend on a lot of our incoming players for line help."

Ford, only a sophomore, completed 153 of 301 passes for 2,064 yards and 11 touchdowns last year. Only Chuck Hixson had a better year.

THE 6-foot-3, 220-pound Ford was 11th in the nation in passing despite a sore arm most of the

Tolbert, a junior, is the top returning collegiate receiver. He had 64 catches for 996 yards, second best marks in Southwest Conference history.

Senior linebacker Putt Choate, who had a high game of 27 tackles against Texas A&M last year, anchors a thin Mustang defense.

Calvin Hill will retire

CARLISLE, Pa. (AP) — Washington Redskins running back Calvin Hill, indicating he had lost some of his enthusiasm for the game, said he had decided to retire from pro football, a team spokesman announced Mon-

Redskins spokesman Charlie Taylor, said that Hill announced his decision at training camp Monday afternoon. Hill said he had simply decided after nine years of pro football that it was time to step down.

The 31-year-old running back, who is 16th on the all-time National Football League rushing list, has complained about his lack of playing time under former coach George Allen. Jack Pardee is the new coach.

The 6-foot-4, 227-pound Hill spent eight years in the NFL and one year

in the World Football League. During his career, Hill rushed for 5,567 yards, caught 164 passes for 1,613 yards and scored 47 touch-

The NFL's Rookie of the Year in 1969 with Dallas, Hill played with the Cowboys until 1975 when he jumped to Hawaii in the now-defunct WFL. He joined the Redskins the next year for

Will was under contract for the coming season and could have played out his option if he had wished to do so, the spokesman said.

"I am sorry Calvin decided to retire," Pardee said Monday when informed of Hill's announcement. "He is a great football player and a fine leader. As a person, he was a tribute to the Redskins and to the National Football League. I sincerely hope that he will reconsider."

College grid Hall of Fame opening soon

KINGS MILLS, Ohio (AP) - At times, the soon-to-be opened College Football Hall of Fame can be as traditional as the "three yards and a cloud of dust" offense.

More often, it is as subtle as a Dallas Cowboys' cheerleader in its methods of honoring the game's great players and coaches and serving as a chronicle for college football.

The College Hall of Fame really is a multi-media production — dedicated to invoking the "magic" that happens each fall on college campuses around the country.

VISITORS WHO tour the museum once it opens officially Thursday will find the footballs, cleats, and other memorabilia enshrined alongside pictures of the greats of college foot-

But while other sports museums might stop at displays, the College Football Hall of Fame is piping in what officials call "antiseptic smells" of balm and linament into one exhi-

That is the coaches' corner where visitors can watch Knute Rockne give his famous "Gipper" speech.

"We started out with educational goals and determined that the most effective way to achieve it was through entertainment," said Jack Wyant, general manager of the hall of

"What we've done is a significant extention of the concept which is already prevalent in schools; an increasing recognition that educational goals can be achieved through entertainment."

ENTERTAINMENT is one of the names of the game at the College Football Hall of Fame. It's no accident that the museum is located next to the King's Island Amusement

Park. Taft Broadcasting Co., which built the amusement park has also teamed with the National Football Founda-

tion, to open the hall of fame. Wyant and a design team from Taft spent a year traveling to about 40 halls of fame - from the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. to the Canadian Football Hall of Fame

in Hamilton, Ont. "One of the most important things we learned was the appealing nature of participatory activities and audiovisual presentations," Wyant said.

Weight loss lowers high blood pressure

Dear Dr. Solomon: Just how important is it to lose weight if your blood pressure is too high? The doctor says have what he calls "mild" hypertension, and that it would help if I could lose about twenty pounds. The doctor had also said I should cut down on salt .- Ruth Ann Y.

Dear Ruth Ann: Getting rid of excess pounds is a very important part of treating hypertension. I make a point of stressing this with my pa-tients who have similar problems.

Perhaps the results of an Israeli study recently reported in the New England Journal of Medicine will give you a little extra motivation. Eightyone patients with hypertension—some with a mild form, and not taking any drugs, and some with excessively high blood pressure even though taking drugs-lost an average of about 20 pounds in two months.

There was a very real drop in their blood pressure-in fact, most of them ended up in the normal range. And one particularly interesting thing is that, for the purposes of the study. their diet was not salt-restricted. In other words, it was simply the weight loss that accounted for the drop in blood pressure.

Now, of course, this doesn't mean you should forget about your low-salt regimen. Cutting down on salt helps bring down your blood pressure. But the study does show how important it is to get rid of excess weight when your blood pressure is too high.

Dear Dr. Solomon: My mother always talks about how brittle her bones are getting-I think the term doctors use is osteoporosis-and she keeps having trouble with her left hip (which she broke almost a year ago). One of her cronies has told her that if she eats a lot of protein, she won't have any more trouble. Is there anything to this? - Doris T.

Dear Doris: There used to be a theory along those lines. But more recent studies indicate that high protein consumption can make the body lose calcium-which of course is vital to

We would certainly like to know how to prevent or treat osteoporosis, which is such a problem among older women-millions are affected in this country alone. Unfortunately, our understanding of the problem is still very incomplete. But a well-balanced diet, including a good amount of milk or milk products, will give one all the protein and calcium one needs at your mother's age.



29 Vietnamese with U.S. ties brought to Bangkok

BANGKOK, Thailand - A chartered airliner Monday brought 29 Vietnamese women and children to Bangkok - an apparent gesture from Hanoi to show its eagerness for diplomatic relations with the United States.

The Vietnamese all have family ties in the United States and were left behind during the 1975 American evacuation. There are at least 200 more such cases in Vietnam and the Hanoi authorities have promised that they too will soon be allowed to de-







Mourners gather at papal retreat

VATICAN CITY (AP) - A line of mourners standing 10 abreast and stretching for more than 100 yards waited to pass by the body of Pope Paul VI today at the summer papal residence at Castel Gandolfo as the Vatican made preparations for his burial Saturday and the election of his

Pope Paul's closest aides and other prelates knelt and prayed in silence around his body through the night:

Sources at Castel Gandolfo estimated that more than 50,000 persons had passed through the Renaissance palace in the Alban Hills south of Rome to pay homage to the 262nd Roman Catholic pontiff who died there Sunday night after a heart attack.

THE POPE'S BODY LAY on a catafalque, dressed in the red robes that he usually wore for funeral rites. Alongside was a crucifix on a long shaft, his favorite religious object. A tall candle burned as a symbol of eternal life.

The pope's brother, Ludovico Montini, 83, a former Christian Democrat senator, attended a mass in the 16th century San Tommaso da Villa Nuovo Church near the summer residence. The local population rushed to him to offer condolences, shaking his hand and patting him on the shoulder.

"No, no, don't worry," Montini told the parish priest, the Rev. Angelo Pozzi, and others nearby. "Let's be certain that we eventually meet him in paradise.

THOUSANDS MORE WERE EX-PECTED to make the pilgrimage to Castel Gandolfo Tuesday and Wednesday. Bigger crowds will flock to St. Peter's Basilica after the body is transferred there Wednesday night, to lie in state until the 6 p.m. (noon EDT) funeral Saturday attended by religious and political leaders from many countries. Burial will be in the crypt beneath St. Peter's.

The Rev. Gianfranco Pastore, a Vatican spokesman, said the coffin will be sealed at Castel Gandolfo about 6 p.m. Wednesday (noon EDT) and carried to Rome where it will remain closed.

A NINE-DAY MOURNING-PERI-OD will follow the funeral, with a cardinal or other high-ranking prelate saying a special Mass in St.

CARDINALS STARTED ARRIV-ING IN ROME from abroad for the funeral and the conclave at which they will elect the 263rd pontiff. The Italian government, because of terrorist groups that have been plaguing the nation with kidnappings, murders and bombings, ordered the police to be specially alert.

Under a revision of procedure decreed by Pope Paul three years ago, the conclave is to start during the week of Aug. 20, betweeen 15 and 20 days after the pope's death. The date and other details will be arranged by the cardinals at the daily meetings they are required to hold until the church gets a new sovereign.

One of each cardinal's first duties on reaching the Vatican is to take an oath swearing to keep secret forever "anything that in any way is connected with the election of the Roman

French Cardinal Jean Villot, the papal chamberlain who is acting head of the church, ordered special Vatican coins and stamps produced in-scribed "sede vacante" — see vacant - and with no papal insignia on them. A rush from collectors was expect-

Villot was among the foreign cardinals mentioned as "papabili," possible choices of the conclave. But the winner was expected to be an Italian, as it has been for the past 445 years. The front-runners in the speculation were Giovanni Benelli, Pope Paul's closest aide until he named him archbishop of Florence last year, and Sergio Pignedoli and Sebastiano Baggio of the Vatican Curia, the central church administration.

Giancarlo Zizola, an Italian who has written several books on the papacy, said he believes "a great uncertainty" prevails among the cardi-

"I believe this time no cardinal is more popeable than another," he said. "Everybody is counting on the early ballots to show them what are

Conflicts noted in reign of Pope

Born Giovanni Battista Montini Sept. 26, 1897 Elected pope June 21, 1963.

VATICAN CITY (AP) - The pontifical reign of Paul VI, who died Sunday after suffering a heart attack, was marked by dramatic conflicts over his condemnation of birth control and his insistence on priestly celibacy.

The widespread challenge to papal authority on these two issues moved him to tears, the pontiff said. In his final years, the pope also spoke out repeatedly against abortion.

The pope also found himself faced with rebellion among conservatives in later years, with French Archbishop Marcel Lefebvre as titular head of a traditionalist movement that threatened to create a schism or breakaway from the Roman Catholic

THE POPE USED HIS OFFICE to try to bring peace to Vietnam, the Middle East and the world's other trouble spots and to improve church relations with the Communist East bloc. He urged an international status for Jerusalem and its holy places and spoke out frequently against violence, pornography and "the spiritual col-

He himself fell victim to violence in November 1970, narrowly escaping injury when a Bolivian painter, Benjamin Mendoza y Amor, lunged at him with a knife shortly after he landed at Manila international airport in the Philippines on an Asian

It was the first assassination attempt against a pope in five cen-

POPE PAUL'S HEALTH, POOR in his youth, was troubled in his later years by arthrosis, an arthritic disease of the joints that afflicted him in one knee and made walking painful.

In 1967, the pontiff underwent surgery to remove an inflamed prostate gland. In 1974 he cut back his busy Easter schedule on medical advice after two attacks of influenza. But his general health remained good, although strained by the numerous activities of Holy Year in 1975.

There had been widespread speculation that Pope Paul would step down at 75, an age at which he had asked other Roman Catholic prelates to go into retirement, and again at 80, the age he decreed that cardinals would no longer be eligible to vote for a new pope. But he stayed on, and was quoted as saying: "Kings can abdicate; popes cannot."

During Pope Paul's reign, Catholic dissidents often called into question the way he used his authority and urged him to share power with his bishops. A historic bishops' synod in 1969 approved a 13-point program to introduce the concept of collegiality "or sharing by bishops" in decisionmaking.

BUT POPE PAUL ALWAYS RE-TAINED a decisive voice on all questions and never relaxed his controversial ban on contraception, despite continued pressure from theologians

and bishops. Disregarding the advice of his own study group, the pope issued a strict ban on contraception in July 1968 in an encyclical entitled "Humanae Vitae" - Latin for "On Human

The encyclical, a reflection of firm opposition to artificial contraception dating back to Pope Pius XI, all but overwhelmed the worldwide applause Pope Paul had won by steering the Vatican Ecumenical Council to a successful conclusion in 1965 and damaged his progressive image in the eyes of a large sector of world opin-

Pope Paul was history's first flying pope, by his own description "an apostle on the move" and made unprecedented journeys to the Holy Land, India, the United States, Portugal, Turkey, Switzerland, Uganda, the Far East and the Pacific.

He sought detente with Communist countries including China, exchanged ambassadors with Communist Yugoslavia and won a degree of freedom for Catholics in other Eastern European countries. He encouraged dialogue with Marxists but never modified the church's rejection of Marxist philosophy.

POPE PAUL WAS ELECTED to the papacy on June 21, 1963, Catholicism's 262nd supreme pontiff. He was an anxious, complicated personality quite unlike the extrovert Pope John XXIII whom he succeeded. Paul combined John's pastoral experience with the administrative experience of Pius XII, John's predecessor. He had spent 30 years in the Vatican Curia, the central church administration, and then eight years in Milan, Italy's biggest diocese, as archbishop.

Paul's time in Milan, until his election as pope, was marked by an infusion of religious vigor in the big industrial city, tinged even then with a strong Communist influence. He worked day and night, building new parishes, revitalizing old ones and nelping the unemployed find work. He visited miners in their pits, workers in their factories and families in their

As pope, his first care was to re-

sume the Ecumenical Council which had been suspended on John's death. Guided through three sessions under his hand, the council was hailed as the greatest of all the 21 general councils in the history of the church.

A quiet, behind-the-scenes conciliator under Pope John, Paul worked tirelessly as pontiff. By the council's closure in December 1965, the new pope and more than 2,000 prelates had issued 16 decrees aimed at revitalizing Roman Catholicism, forging new ties of friendship with the world around it and advancing the cause of Christian unity.

They modernized the Mass, reorganized church government, consecrated the right of religious freedom and proclaimed the Jews free of any collective guilt over Christ's crucifix-

Pope Paul's policy of quiet diplo-macy with the Soviet bloc stirred controversy but won general approval from his church. His aim was to negotiate individual liberties for Roman Catholics in Communist lands and ultimately to increase the freedom of all citizens in each country.

THE PONTIFF SAW POSITIVE RESULTS in Poland and Hungary, the two East European countries with the greatest number of Roman Catho-

One of the most controversial moves in this drive was his dismissal in February 1974 of Cardinal Joszef Mindszenty as primate of Hungary. The cardinal's firm anti-communist stand had long stood in the way of the Vatican's overtures to the East.

In his own backyard, however, the pope failed to stem a rising tide of priestly defections that he once described as the major disappointment of his papacy, his "crown of thorns." But he made no concessions to hold dissident ministers, and in February 1970 sternly rebuked Dutch bishops for backing a recommendation that his ruling on priestly celibacy be re-

Against this background, Pope Paul took "renewal and reconciliation" as the theme of his Holy Year, which saw a record seven million pilgrims journey to Rome.

At the end of the Holy Year, Pope Paul warned that man had come near to the abyss of a fatal ruin, but said they had "successfully endeavored," through the Holy Year, to relink their lives to God.

"The civilization of love will prevail over the anxiety of implacable social struggles," the pontiff said in an unusually optimistic address during a Christmas Eve Mass, "and will give to the world the longed-for transition of humanity that is, at last, Chris-

POPE PAUL PROVED IM-MENSELY popular wherever he went on trips, with the exception of Geneva, hometown of Calvin, where his reception was cool. He did not hold himself apart: he liked to distribute communion personally "whether in an Italian parish or at an Australian racetrack" and was willing to rub shoulders in the thickest of crowds, with Rome's garbage collectors, Moslems in a Jerusalem street and Africans in a Ugandan slum.

In a historic three-day pilgrimage to the Holy Land in January 1964, Pope Paul embraced the Orthodox religion's chief patriarch, Athenagoras of Istanbul, in the first such encounter in four centuries.

In December 1964, the pontiff flew to India for a Catholic congress in Bombay and went on foot among the poor. He wept at what he saw, and appealed to world nations to divert money from arms to feed the poor.

In October 1965 he flew to New York to address the U.N. General Assembly, making history as the first pope to set foot in the Americas. In May 1967 he flew to Portugal for a day trip to the Fatima shrine, and two months later he was off to Turkey for a second meeting with Athenagoras.

In Bogota, Colombia, in August 1968, Pope Paul pleaded for an end to guerrilla warfare in Latin America and told peasants he would use his office to fight social injustice.

He met with Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, secretary general of the World Council of Churches, in Geneva in June 1969 while attending the 50th anniversary of the International Labor Organization. Six weeks later, he flew to Kampala, Uganda's capi tal, in the African heartland and dedicated a shrine to 22 Ugandan martyrs, while at the same time making an impassioned bid for an end to the Biafran civil war that was raging at

IN NOVEMBER 1970, THE POPE MADE a 25,000-mile, 10-day trip to the Philippines - "Asia's only predominantly Catholic country" - and Australia, with stops in Iran, Pakistan, Samoa, Indonesia, Hong Kong and Sri Lanka, formerly Ceylon. It was the longest journey in the history of the

While in Sydney, Pope Paul suffered a bitter defeat at home as the Italian Parliament passed a bill legallzing divorce. The pontiff, who had strenously opposed the bill, expressed "profound suffering" at the change.




