Odessa Youth Drowns Apr. 7 At Lake Spence

An 18 year old Odessa man was drowned about 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 7, in Lake Spence.

John Turner and two companions were swimming across a creek near Wildcat Fish-A-Rama when the mishap occurred. One of the swimmers evidently decided he couldn't make it to safety and turned back, another made it safely across the creek, but Turner went down before he could reach the other side.

Deputy Sheriff John Paul McGuire said officers required about two hours to recover the body. Helping with the recovery of the body were personnel from the Colorado River Municipal Water District, the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department and the Coke County Sheriff's Department.

Turner's body was taken to Shaffer Funeral Home in Robert Lee and later transferred to Odessa.

Let's Play A Fair Game

This applies to all elections--local, precinct, county, districts, state and national.

We certainly don't want to place any restraint on what one candidate says about another in his ads. The only thing we do propose to do is not to allow one candidate to malign another in the last issue of our newspapers before an election--thus keeping the attacked candidate from having an opportunity to answer charges which are made against him.

To put it down on a home basis: We have papers in which will be out on April 23 and April 30 before the May 1 Primary. If a candidate wants to attack his opponent, he'd better do it in the April 23 issue. That will give the supposed victim a chance to reply

Mrs. Winnie Waldrop has submitted her resignation as county and district clerk for Coke County. The resignation will become effective April 30, it was announced at Monday's meeting of the Coke County Commissioners' Court.

Judge Earl Smith has appointed Mrs. Ettie Hubbard to succeed Mrs. Waldrop. Mrs. Hubbard is running unopposed for the office on the Democratic

ticket. She will take over her new duties May 1.

When Mrs. Waldrop's resignation becomes effective April 30, she will have worked in the clerk's office for 29 years and four months. She was chief deputy before running for the clerk's position.

Mrs. Waldrop and her husband, Barton, live on their ranch in the Hayrick community.

In other business the commissioners:

- * Accepted a bid from Glenn Insurance Co. for \$3,730 to pay the premium on liability insurance on county-owned and operated vehicles. This is the first time the county has carried this type insurance.

- * Granted a request from Mrs. Golda Smith, executive director of Robert Lee Housing Authority, for a waiver on county taxes on public housing owned by the authority.

- * Observed an order of Judge Smith setting Coke County's part of the 51st District Court reporters salary at \$1402.80 per year of \$116.90 per month.

- * Approved bills for payment.

The Coke County Appraisal District board of directors met in regular session Tuesday, April 6, with Chairman Truman Hines, Secretary James B. Pentecost, Charlie Boecking, and Wayne McCabe present. The following actions were taken by the Board:

- * Read and approved minutes from the previous meeting.
- * Considered the purchase or lease of a copier.

- * Placed County Attorney Bill Helwig on a monthly retainer.

- * Appointed Fred McCabe Jr. and Jack Cervenka for two-year terms and Ed Cumbie for a one-year term to the Appraisal Review Board.

- * Approved the requirement that a property must have an increase in value of \$1,000 before a Notice of Re-Appraisal must be sent to the owner.

- * Was advised of the schedule for the mineral hearing with the Appraisal Review Board on June 23, 1982.

- * Authorized the Chief Appraiser to utilize the proposal from Thos. Y. Pickett & Co., Inc. to set up an appraisal district file of properties.

- * Approved bills for payment.

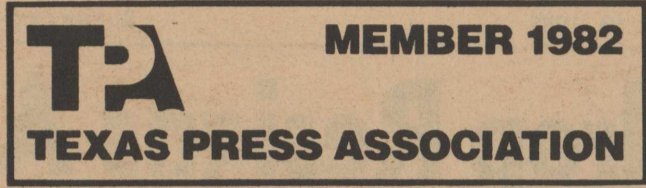

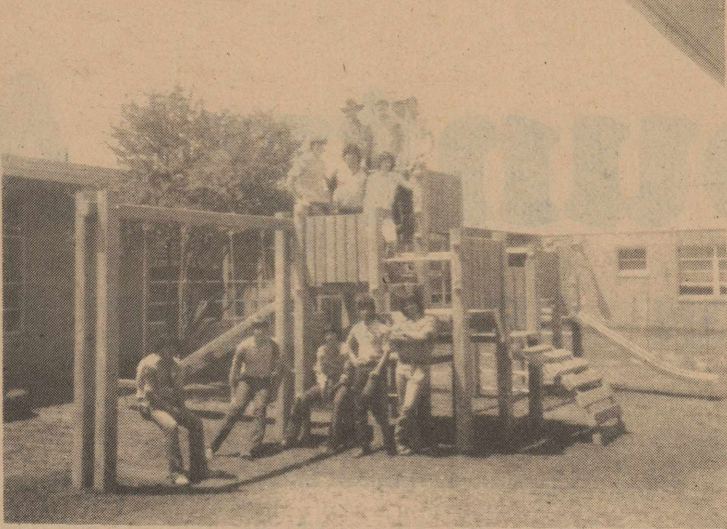

The theme for the next meeting will be "Born Thirsty So A Dam on the Colorado", and it will be on Tuesday afternoon, April 27, at 2:30-3:30. The business meeting of the Commission follows at 3:30-4:30.

The story of water from the first dream to the dedication of the Robert Lee Dam, June 14, 1969, will be presented by one who wrote it for the newspapers in the thirties and in the sixties.

The third of this continuing series will be the story of the Arrott family as it has been kept by Mrs. Clarence (Marie) Arrott and Mrs. James (Virgie) Arrott, including a look at the beautiful book published on the family story and such other family mementos as they may bring.

The first of the series was presented at a meeting in March by the former Pauline Reed, now Barron, who as Mrs. Frank Coalson was a long-time teacher in Robert Lee and later in Alaska. Mrs. Barron told the story of her family, the Reeds, early settlers in the Pecan-Edith Country.

Waiting in the Wings is the story, or stories of "Uncle Johnny" Vestal and family, the town's and the county's first blacksmith.

Mrs. Zola Hatley has preserved this. She is "Uncle Johnny's" granddaughter.

A number who would like to attend these seminar sessions cannot attend during daytime work hours. An evening work group on the same plan is in the works for them.

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Spring Turkey Season to Open

Coke County will be one of a number of Texas counties included in the spring turkey season set to open on Saturday, April 17. The 16 day season will run through Sunday, May 2. Hunters may bag 1 gobbler only during daylight shooting hours, 30 minutes before sunrise and 30 minutes past sunset.

Sex identification is less difficult with careful note of the turkey's breast coloration. Gobblers have much darker coloring, with even bearded hens having white-tipped breast feathers.

Hunting in the spring season is most successful and will provide more thrill if the hunter is able to call up gobblers from a stand with either a commercial or home-made turkey call. Many successful callers have recalled stories of gobblers rushing toward the call, fluffed twice their size, charging to do battle or preening for a hen's favor, making an awesome sight.

Texas Parks & Wildlife Department game program leader Don Wilson predicted record kills for this year's season as Texas recorded one of the best turkey hatches ever last summer.

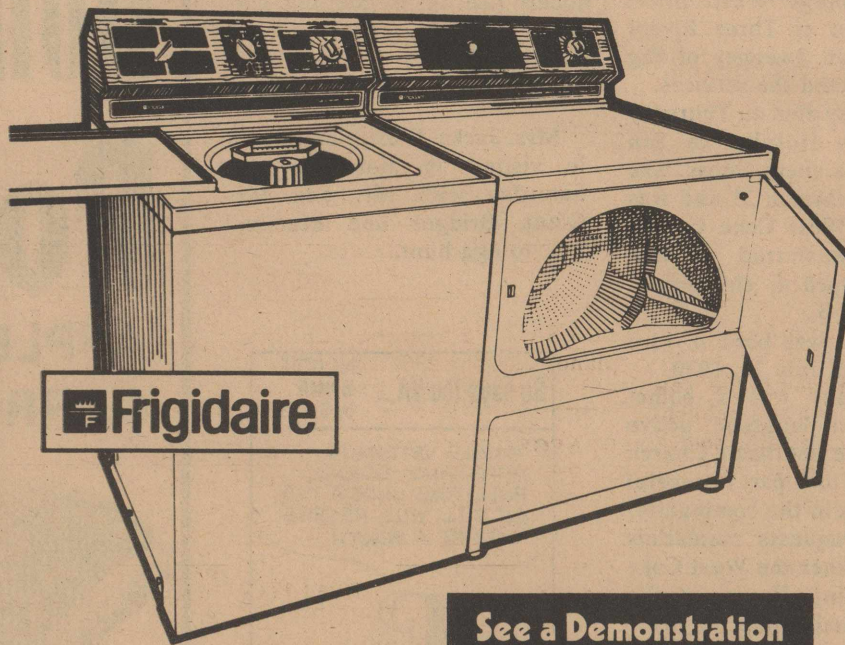

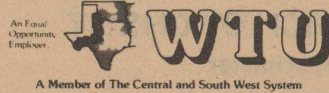

Nephews served as pallbearers.


