R-Lee Escapes Violent Weather; Gets Good Rain

Robert Lee again "dodged the bullet" during a stormy weekend of area thunderstorms. After a hot, steamy afternoon on Friday, black boiling thunderclouds formed north and west of the county about sundown. Area residents watched the dark clouds approach and many made their way toward storm cellars and places

of safety. The main cloud struck around 9:15 p.m. with blowing dust and whirling debris. Severe winds and lightning accompanied the band of storms and several city residents suffered the loss of large trees and storage buildings.

Robert Lee did not have the large hail reported by other neighboring towns whose losses are said to run into millions of dollars. We appeared to be on the south edge of the storm

center as Colorado City reported hardly a house completely spared while some public buildings there lost as many as 76 windows. As the storm moved to the east, up to 9 inches of rain was reported west of Blackwell and the Oak Creek area received unbelievable hail damage. Hailstones as large as softballs went through trailer and house roofs and on through ceilings. Wilmeth and Winters later received great damage from the same band of storms.

Other clouds returned to the area about 2:30 a.m., then again around day break on Saturday. At that time several funnels touched down east of Coke County, near Ballinger.

More storms occurred on Saturday and Sunday nights around the area, again with no severe local damage. Total rainfall for the weekend ranged around 2.3 to 3 inches in Robert Lee.

Volunteer firemen were called on Friday night, at the height of the storm, to extinguish a grass fire near the water treatment plant at the City Lake, apparently caused by lightning.

Lightning was also the cause of an oil storage tank fire on Saturday morning 5 miles south of Robert Lee, on the Bert Blaylock Ranch, which burned most of the day, under control.

Ben Oglesby, Newspaper Owner, Dies; Services Set for Today

Funeral services for George Benjamin (Ben) Oglesby Jr., 59, will be held today (Friday) June 25, at 2:30 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church in Bronte. Burial will follow in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Shaffer Funeral Home.

Conducting the services will be Rev. Howard Johnson, pastor.

He died Wednesday night, June 23, at 12:03 in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. He died after a short illness due to cancer.

Oglesby was born August 27, 1922 in Gordonville, the son of the late George Benjamin Oglesby and Lula Gordon Oglesby. He was a graduate of Sudan High School and attended University of Texas Tech in Lubbock. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II, earning the rank of lieutenant junior grade, in the South Pacific Theatre.

He married Elizabeth Young on January 19, 1943 in Lubbock. She died in 1972. He married Pat Luckett Bryan August 3, 1973 in Bronte.

He purchased the Bronte Enterprise in July 1948 and later bought the Robert Lee Observer in 1965.

Oglesby was a member of Bronte Lions, a longtime member of the Texas Press Association and First United Methodist Church, served on the Bronte City Council and was a member of the first Housing Authority in Bronte.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. David (Bennie

Also, three grandchildren, Heather and Casey Easterling of Mt. Zion, Ill. and Christina DiMaria of Anchorage, Alaska.

Jubilant is the mood all over Southwest Texas following good rains into mid-June. With all the good, however, there is always some bad to cause anxiety as well.

In ranching country when moisture has graced the land in any abundance, the infestations hide in the tall weed and grass. I'm not speaking of rattlesnakes. This is prime time for stomach worms, screwworms and the like.

If stockmen have not drenched their sheep and goats recently, they may want to do so. I have heard of several lambs found dead in Concho and Menard counties, victims of stomach worms. It happens fast. They appear fleshy and healthy one day and two days later be found under a bush.

The screwworm problem is the same thing. Although the eradication program has been successfully extended into Mexico and Central America, sterile flies are still here to haunt the livestock industry when abnormally wet times come around.

Agriculturists are reminded now to perform surgical procedures on livestock now and to keep a watchful eye out for possible infections. As I recall, animals with possible screwworm problems will either run a great deal or will try to hide in a cave or under bushes.

Along with the good moisture, there always exists the fear of damaging hail or high winds that will spoil in five minutes what a farmer has worked for seven months. Such a close call visited several farms in Rowena last week. Wheat just about ready for harvest was whipped down by high wind.

For dry land farmers, yield is expected to be good this season. Early wheat samplings in the

Miles area at 15 bushels per acre are projected to go as high as 30 to even 40 bushels per acre.

Coffee shop talk indicates some of the irrigated crops in the Veribest area might reach 90 bushels per acre. A combination of good rains and irrigation in that area of the Concho Valley certainly paid off this year.

So, the good and bad of spring weather is being experienced again in the Southwest of 1982.

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News From The County Agent

It seems that people have names for every pecan on their trees this year and when they lose a few, it's tough to handle. Well, we've got to understand that we can't prevent the loss of some pecans. There are so many factors influencing pecan drop, it would be a full-time job covering them all.

Dropping pecans now are due mainly to poor pollination, high winds, lack of food stored in the tree, insufficient water or insect damage.

Some pecans failed to get pollinated due to their flowering pattern this year and the unusual spring weather. Recent winds have knocked off some nutlets.

Another reason for pecan drop is a lack of stored plant food in the tree system. If past years did not include regular fertilizations, this may be partially responsible. Never fail to fertilize nut trees a minimum of once in the late winter. A second application during early June will help tree growth and nut production.

Perhaps the most important factor affecting nut drop is water.

Thorough applications of water are necessary to mature a quality crop. Water now influences size of pecans. A slow soaking of yard trees is the best way to apply water. It has been researched and written that a large tree when carrying a crop of nuts can require 240 gallons of water a day in August when conditions such as a low humidity and high temperature prevail. That's a lot of water.

During a period of stress due to the lack of food or water, the tree's self defense mechanism engages. This results in nut drop. Trees are smarter than we give them credit for. If there is inadequate food or water to both sustain life and produce a crop, the tree saves its life by aborting pecans. This should tell you something about your management of the tree.

In some cases, it is an advantage to lose pecans in June and early July. For instance, if a tree is heavily loaded with nutlets, they may be only partially filled to if their large numbers and limited food supply. Therefore, if nuts drop from a heavily loaded tree, the remaining pecans will be larger and better filled. Due to the alternate bearing nature of pecan trees, this dropping may improve your nut set the following year.

Insects such as pecan nut casebearer and stinkbugs do cause nut drop. Monitor your trees as often as possible in order to observe the first sign of destructive insects.

Plenty of water, food, good insect control and a little help from nature should produce a good crop of pecans this year for many producers both commercial and home orchardists.

HOW TO ELIMINATE A POTATO BUG

Cut yourself two small blocks of equal size--2x4x3 inches long. Mark clearly "A" on one block and "B" on the other. Catch potato bug and place on block "A".

Take block "B" and press firmly until potato bug is exterminated. If the bug is of the Texas or Okla. variety, it may require a hammer to do the job.

EXTENSION EXTRAS

The tasty flavor of 'Mom's' home-canned fruits and vegetables could be spoiled by improper storing and preparation techniques. Recommended storage time for home-canned vegetables is up to one year in a cool, dry storage area. Areas with extreme heat such as garages or attics should be avoided.

Never taste or eat canned foods that have evidence of spoilage. Prior to using canned foods, check lids to see that they are concave and that no bulges are present. In addition, if any off odors or colors are evident, throw the product out.

As an extra safety precaution, the USDA recommends that all home-canned low-acid products (vegetables except tomatoes) be boiled for 10 to 15 minutes over an electric or gas stove-top burner before serving. A product such as green beans containing liquid wouldn't need to boil as

long as thicker food like cream style or creamed corn. For example, boil green beans 10 minutes and the creamed corn 15 minutes.

Foods most often involved in botulism poisoning (often called food poisoning) are corn, spinach, green beans, peppers and asparagus. Heat, during boiling will destroy the clostridium botulinum toxin which may have formed if canning failed. Vegetables should be able to withstand this heat treatment without the loss of quality.

Take advantage of care labels attached to clothing--they've been required by law since July, 1972, and following them will add to the life and beauty of garments, says Ann Vanderpoorten, a clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for interexchange private line and foreign exchange (FX) service. 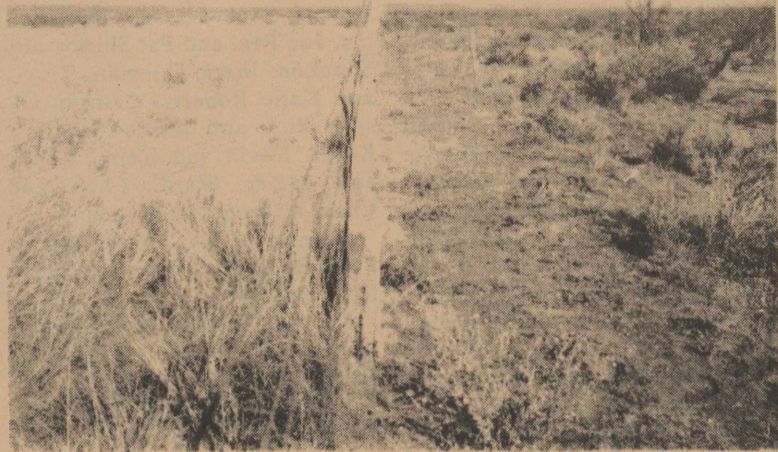

Planned Grazing Systems Pay

Ranchers are discovering that more intensive grazing management systems are becoming increasingly essential to economic survival. Although the systems may vary a good deal, they all have as their goal making the most efficient and proper use of the grazing resources. Ranchers and stockfarmers alike, are looking toward a sustained yield, a high level output, combined with soil protection and multiple use considerations.

A well designed grazing system should permit range improvement while increasing livestock production. Generally, livestock are the primary harvesters of the forage produced and are therefore the main source of income for the average ranch. So it is quite easy to see that as more

quality forage is produced on the ranch, the more economical the cost of the livestock production becomes. A grazing system consists of two or more pastures which are alternately grazed and deferred in a planned sequence over a period of years. Many ranches in this area also utilize cropland planted to temporary summer and winter forage crops in their grazing system. Summer pastures especially, such as forage sorghums or sudan, can be very beneficial to range improvement and increased stocking rates. Their stocking rates are usually quite high and their use allows for valuable summer and fall deferral of native ranges which is very beneficial to range condition improvement. Winter grazing is usually less detrimental to rangeland than summer grazing, so ranchers should plan to utilize their lowest condition ranges during the dormant winter months which will hasten

those pasture's improvement.

A number of factors must be taken into consideration when planning a grazing system and the first step is to take a "forage inventory" of the ranching operation. The physical characteristics of the ranch need to be carefully considered, such as topography, water locations, corrals and pasture carrying capacities. Vegetational characteristics of the ranch or farm also need to be considered, such as type of forage produced (cool or warm season); the presence of poisonous plants and time of highest danger; and the production of wool or mohair damaging plants, etc. A systematic grazing of the pastures allows for stocking that will provide for close use of the available forage during the growing season. This means 60 or 70 percent use. This is higher than the recommended 50% utilization normally suggested for continuous range use. Heavy use can be tolerated under a good grazing system because it is not sustained for long periods, but is instead interrupted by rest periods.

A good grazing system allows range plants to recover from close grazing, regain vigor, and build up food reserves. Therefore, greater forage production can be obtained from most desirable range plants by properly grazing them, rather than allowing complete rest. Livestock are naturally a very important consideration of any system and schedules for breeding; lambing, kidding or calving must be plan-

ned. Also, shearing, marking, drenching and other livestock operations need to be considered in planning a successful grazing system.

Be flexible in your system and keep it simple. Keep your base breeding herd at a "below normal" rainfall year level and supplement livestock numbers during good years with stocker animals to maintain the flexibility desirable in any ranching operation.

Finally, in order to measure the effectiveness of your grazing system, maintain accurate records of all important animal and pasture performance and cost indicators. Soil Conservation Service personnel will be happy to assist any land owner or operator in analyzing their present range conditions and to help to design your new grazing system if desired.

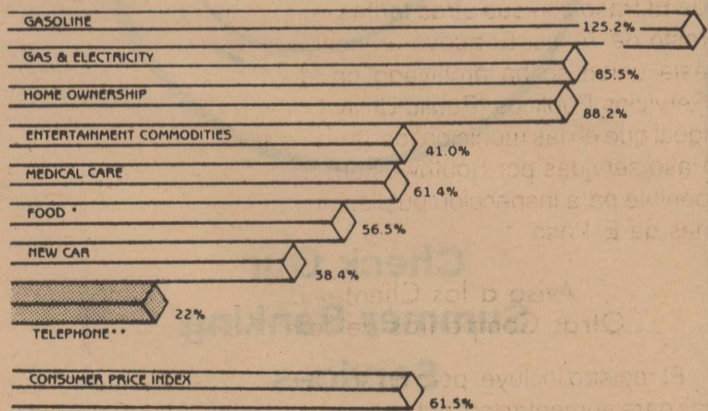

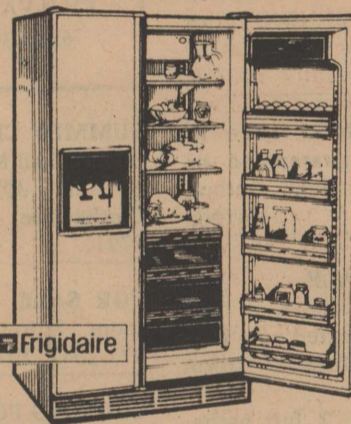

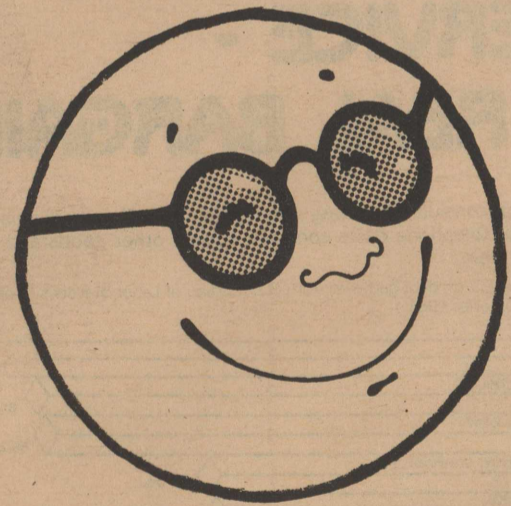

Social Security News Items

Medicare Hospital (Part A) and Supplemental Medical Insurance (Part B) premium rates will be increased effective July 1, 1982.

The basic premium for medical insurance-the amount most people pay-will go up by \$1.20 a month for the 12 month period beginning July 1, 1982. The new rate will be \$12.20 a month, up from the current \$11.00. The new premium will be deducted from the Social Security check in July.

By law, the premium increase is limited to 11.2 percent-the percentage by which Social Security benefits were increased in 1981. Without this limitation rising costs of the medical insurance program would have required a much higher premium than the \$12.20. The government pays more than two-thirds of the medical insurance premium cost from general revenues of the federal government.

Persons who have worked under covered employment and who are insured for Social Security benefits will automatically be entitled to premium-free hospital insurance (Part A). However, for those not eligible for premium-free part A, the monthly premium for hospital insurance will be increased from \$89.00 to \$113.00 effective July 1, 1982.

All who may be eligible are encouraged to apply for medicare 3 months before they are 65, even if they do not plan to retire. Some people pay more than the basic premium because there was a period when they could have had medical insurance, but did not apply. If they missed their initial enrollment period, there is a general enrollment period the first 3 months of every year, with coverage effective the following July, at an increased premium rate of ten percent per each 12-month period that has elapsed.

Veteran's To Get Pay Hike

More than 600,000 veterans and their survivors will be getting larger Veterans Administration pension checks on July 1--the result of a 7.4 percent increase in the government's cost of living index.

Some 1.9 million VA pensioners are affected in some way by the cost of living index.

Pensions are paid to veterans totally and permanently disabled from circumstances unrelated to their military service. They are paid also to survivors of veterans who are in need. Unlike compensation paid to those disabled because of military service, pensions are affected by income from other sources.

The 600,000 who will get increases in June (payable July 1) are those who are receiving benefits under the "Improved" VA pension plan inaugurated by

Congress in 1979. The plan links VA pension rates to adjustments in social security payments. Before the change, an individual's pension was subject to reduction each time social security increased.

Pensions for veterans and survivors under the "old plan" remain fixed and payable at the rates in effect in 1978. But those rates are protected against reduction that would otherwise result from cost of living increases in their income from other sources.

"Old plan" recipients may request transfer to the "improved" plan at any time, VA officials point out. The agency will carefully review each application to advise applicants to choose the plan which works to their personal advantage.

With the June increase (payable in July 1 checks), a veteran with one dependent and no other income will receive \$6,980. For each additional dependent, the added amount is \$903 per year.
