Cracker Barrel Grocery To Have Grand Opening This Weekend

One of Coke County's "good ole boys" has come home. Edwin "Butch" Davis has recently moved his family back to Robert Lee from San Angelo and has opened a new business here.

His Cracker Barrel Grocery Store is now open at the corner of 9th St. and Highway 158 with a complete line of staple groceries, fresh vegetables, dairy products, and frozen foods. The store also features a deli department starring barbecue brisket, red beans, German sausage, pizza, etc. A self-service island, out front dealing in Gulf gas and products rounds out his services.

The business is located in a

new 2,000 ft. steel building, constructed by Robert Reese, local contractor, aided by Roy Tinkler. Ample parking surrounds the store.

This type of operation is not entirely new to Davis. He has been involved in retail and wholesale businesses for 25 years, 15 of these self-employed. He stated that "he has future plans for development and expansion."

Davis, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. "Doo-Dad" Davis, is a 1957 graduate of RLHS and attended San Angelo Junior College. His wife, Carolyn graduated from ASU in San Angelo and is employed as a teacher in the Grape Creek School system. The couple has three children, Mrs. Terry (Donna Kaye) Poehls of Wingate, who is also a teacher; Barry Kyle, a student at ASU, and Carrie, a third grader in the local elementary school.

The Cracker Barrel is a family operated business, as son Barry and Mrs. Davis help out as time permits.

Their hours are 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 Sunday through Thursday and open 7:00 a.m. until 11:00 p.m. on Friday and Saturday for customer convenience.

Deer Season To Open Saturday

Camp trailers, jeeps, and stands in pickup beds are common sights this week as hunters gear up for the opening day of deer season on Saturday, Nov. 13.

Prospects of increased numbers of deer seem good, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. A good spring encouraged a better than usual fawn crop, but range conditions have deteriorated as the drought continues. It is feared body weight of deer and antler development will be below par for this early in the season.

Hunters may take three deer of either sex, limit of two bucks, in Coke County. Turkey hunting coincides with deer season here, Nov. 13 through Jan. 2; and two turkeys, either sex, may be bagged.

Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

In addition to the pleasures of hunting game, it's big business in Texas. Hunting leases, equipment, food, gas, and related expenses have an economic impact on many areas, Coke County included.

The coach remarked "the win was a good way to end the season and it was all a good team effort."

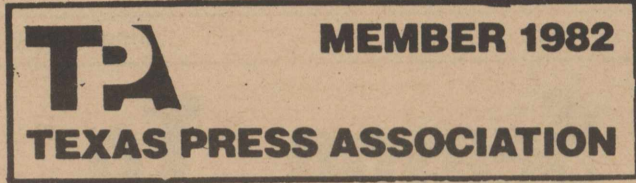

Jerry Lackey's Country Folk

In the aftermath of last week's election, it is certainly too early to analyze what changes we can expect in the state and national direction concerning the many problems we the people all share.

Many are saying the voters have sent a message to Washington that President Reagan's economic course is wrong. This columnist does not interpret the voters' message that way at all. It appears to me the sum of the majority of citizens feel that the President's program has perhaps moved too fast and a more moderate approach may be a better solution.

The average American defined in layman's terms is basically not an ultra conservative or an ultra liberal. Let's face it, we are fence straddlers. We may label ourselves Democrats or Republicans but when we are alone in the voting booth with our conscience, we are mainly driven to vote a split ticket. We are all boll weevils!

It is too early, of course, to tell how agri-business fared in all this. My personal observation is that overall we are going to be in good shape in West Texas. With the re-election of Republican Tom Loeffler and Democrat Charlie Stenholm, both farmers and ranchers, the Congress will continue to have a voice from agriculture.

With Bill Sims winning the 25th Texas senate race, agriculture will have an even stronger voice in the state legislature. Permit me to dwell on this race for a minute.

Sims ran on the Democratic ticket, but I know he cannot be labeled or called a Democrat. He is really an independent, a man who speaks his own mind, and doesn't liberate with many adjectives to express that fact. I know because I used to edit his columns.

For 17 years I have addressed him as "Mr. Secretary" and it will take time but pride to say "Mr. Senator"! Bill has served the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association as executive secretary. I was there 10 years as editor of The Ranch Magazine.

This columnist has worked in newspaper and magazine journalism for 28 years and has not practiced the philosophy of publicly endorsing a particular candidate. I feel that a journalist's purpose is to interpret the candidate's (in all parties) position on issues. I must add here that the 1982 campaigns were filled with more mudslinging and little address to the issues except in the 25th Texas senate race.

Also, I might add, my philosophy on politics has little room for encouraging folks to vote a straight ticket. A former Texas governor has flittered around the state delivering the message that we need to vote DEMOCRATIC. Many times the candidate doesn't address our down-home thinking. In the case of the 21st Congressional District, the Democratic candidate didn't!

I grew up listening to Gov. Coke Stevenson and Congressman O.C. Fisher. They were both Democrats but supported quite a few Republicans over the years. Fisher served GOP's Loeffler as campaign chairman this year, for example.

Another thought that occurs following this election is the abundance of money spent by

candidates. It seems to me that some kind of ceiling should be considered in these races. Although Gov. Clements' race proved an office can't be bought, nonetheless, it shouldn't have to be. However, before Mark White's term is over, the majority of Texans may rest heavily on an hindsight wish that Clements could have bought another term!

Nationally, the Reaganomics issue will continue to be an issue. However, to solve the unemployment, the economic conditions and the many other problems, it appears to me that the course we are on makes 'horse sense'. The Kennedys, Mondales and O'Neils have not come up with a better solution. As a matter of fact, if the Great Society had not been so great, had the Georgian not muddied up the waters, we might not have been in the shape we are today.

But two years have turned the tide. A recovery from the recession is on the horizon, and the package was put together by a coalition of legislators from both sides of the isle. Thanks to our forefathers, this system has worked for more than 200 years, and it works for all the people!

Deer Hunting Safety Urged

Deer season is scheduled to start this weekend, Saturday, Nov. 13. A lot of people will take to the hills with high-powered rifles. Safety and caution in handling rifles or any gun should be a prerequisite in this situation.

Accidents with firearms don't just happen. They are caused by ignorance, carelessness or disregard for safety rules.

Abide by the following "Ten Commandments of Firearm Safety" each time you handle a firearm.

Don't let a needless hunting tragedy mar your hunting pleasure.

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.
2. Watch that muzzle! Be able to control the direction of the muzzle even if you should stumble.
3. Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying.
4. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know identifying features of the game you hunt.
5. Unload guns when not in use. Take down or have actions open; guns should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay with a firearm.
7. Never climb a fence or tree or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

8. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water; at target practice be sure your backstop is adequate.

9. Store guns and ammunition separately beyond the reach of children and careless adults.

10. Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during shooting.

Tech Student Teaching Here

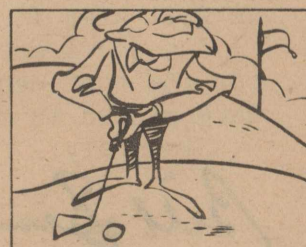

CANCER ANSWER LINE

Question: Does the tissue of a woman's breast change from time to time?

ANSWERline: Breast tissue is often nodular, and its consistency varies from woman to woman. The breast may feel less lumpy after the menstrual period when hormonal levels are lower. Normally the skin of the breast is smooth, but weight loss or advancing age may cause wrinkles.

Question: If a woman's mother had breast cancer, is she liable to have it also?

ANSWERline: If a woman has a familial history of breast cancer (mother or sister) or never had children, or her first child after the age of 30, she is at higher risk for the disease.

Question: Does coloring your hair involve any risk of cancer?

ANSWERline: Prior to 1978 many hair dyes contained 4MMPD, a chemical that National Cancer Institute studies had found to cause cancer in animals. After much publicity, the Food and Drug Administration ordered that, as of April 6, 1978, hair dyes containing MMPD should carry a warning label, and that beauty shops inform customers of the label's warning.

Shortly thereafter, major hair dye manufacturers agreed to remove MMPD and other controversial ingredients from their products. In 1980 the FDA suspended its regulation requiring a warning label on hair dyes containing MMPD. In a February, 1978 statement, the American Cancer Society declared, "while available information does not prove or disprove that hair dyes cause cancer in human beings, the American Cancer Society advises caution in the use of the substance under question until more definitive evidence is developed."

Question: Has laetrile been found to be beneficial or worthless in treating cancer?

ANSWERline: A clinical trial of laetrile conducted by the National Cancer Institute found that the substance not only is worthless against cancer, but is toxic. The results were widely published and were carried by the *New England Journal of Medicine* in its issue of January 28, 1982.
