New Law 'Erases' Proposed School Tax Rate Cut

THE LUBBOCK Independent School District's proposed 20-cent tax-rate cut is really no cut at all - after property revaluations are taken into account

That is what the city-school tax office said Wednesday in a report required under the state's new "truth in taxation"

School trustees tentatively have set the district's new tax rate at \$1.38 per \$100 valuation, down from last year's \$1.58. In effect, the rate was reduced 13 percent.

But according to the tax department's computations, the school board's action simply amounted to returning to taxpayers the windfall revenues that would have been collected due to property reappraisals.

Under the "truth in taxation" calculations, any rate higher than \$1.38 actually would represent a school tax increase, the department said.

City-school officials also released up-

fiscal year. They indicated the true rolls will total substantially more than the estimates used in the city and school budg-

its new budget on a projected \$1.3 billion tax roll. However, the actual roll, according to Wednesday's information, will be about \$24.8 million higher.

At the present temporary rate set by the school board, the higher-than-expected tax roll would generate \$330,000 more tax money than is required to meet the school district's budget needs for the 1978-79 year.

Hence, school trustees have two op-tions: they could collect this excess revenue and put it in the district's "carryover balance" (a contingency fund); or they could decide not to collect it at all, by trimming the district's tax rate an additional two cents

In the same way, city officials said they had based their original budget for the new year on a net assessed valuation of \$1.25 billion. But they said the figure coming out of the tax office now is \$1.3 billion — \$50 million above the city's projected tax roll.

Consequently, at the \$1.12 rate tentatively set by the city council, the city would wind up collecting an extra \$540,000 in revenues — enough to cut the city's tax rate as much as four cents more.

The tax rolls of the city and school district are not the same, because they encompass slightly different jurisdictions and because the city is offering a higher

Tech Near Old Record Enrollment

Avalanche-Journal Staff MORE THAN 22,000 students have registered for classes at Texas Tech so far, and university officials are cautiously optimistic the school may be headed for a record fall enrollment.

Although the Coordinating Board predicted in July that Tech's autumn enrollment would reach 23,000, even the most inflated estimates now place this fall's student body at 300 to 400 under that.

1975 Figure Approached The registrar's office reports that 22,-019 students signed up for classes in two days of registration last week. Late registration, which runs through Tuesday, may add 500 or more students, which

would put the enrollment close to the

high point of 22,580, established in 1975. University registrar Don Wickard said the number of students who registered last week at the Coliseum "was a little higher than we had anticipated." Last year's total for Coliseum registration was 21,865, with 540 more students signing up during late registration.

Dorm Space Leased There are other factors pointing to a

higher fall enrollment this year. Housing officials say a record 7,485 students have moved into the dorms, including 300 women who have been housed in a leased wing of a private

apartment complex near campus. Even with the almost five percent rate hike in dorm fees last year, an increasing number of sophomores, juniors and seniors have applied to live in the resid-

Applications Early By April 10, the assistant director of housing already had received 7,200 dorm

applications, with 500 applicants as-

signed to waiting lists. As the summer wore on, housing officials became concerned there would be a shortage of dorm space for new students in September.

But by early August there had been enough cancellations that housing officials at least "felt comfortable about getting all the women accommodations," said Cliff Yoder, assistant vice president for auxiliary services.

Women Under Guard To meet the demand for dorm space. the housing office leased a wing of the College Inn. a privately operated multistory apartment building at 10th Street and University Avenue, across from

campus. An extra 300 women now are living in the wing, where a 24-hour guard and other security measures insure the women "will be as safe as they would be at an on-campus dorm," a housing official

FARMERVILLE, La. (AP) - An old airliner loaded with 20,000 pounds of marijuana vauled by authorities at \$4 million crashed in flames Wednesday, killing one man.

Three persons, muddy and bloody, were picked up as they tried to hitchhike away from the area, police said. Taken to a hospital, they were treated for cuts

The identity of the dead man was not known. Officers said the marijuana apparently was flown from Colombia. They said the destination was unknown.

The DC-7, a four-engine propeller plane, ripped a path 100 feet wide as it slashed through pine trees three miles south of Farmerville at about 3 a.m. Most of the illicit cargo burned.

mid-January. Historians at the Library of Congress said it also marked the first time an American president had met with the chiefs of state of Israel and Egypt at the same time to try to settle the decades-old dispute between Arabs and Jews in the Middle East.

After the meeting. President and Mrs.Carter took a hike around Camp David with Prime Minister and Mrs. Begin. The Israeli leader's wife arrived during the afternoon after attending a relative's wedding in Toronto.

German Police Slay Suspected Terrorist

DUESSELDORF, West Germany (AP) Police acting on a telephone tip shot and killed Willy Peter Stoll, one of West Germany's most sought-after suspected terrorists, in a Chinese restaurant Wednesday night, the chief federal prose-

cutor's office announced. The 28-year-old Stoll, described as a top figure in the Red Army Faction that grew out of the notorious Baader-Meinhof gang, was sought in the slayings last year of chief federal prosecutor Siegfried Buback, banker Juergen Ponto and industrialist Hanns-Martin Schleyer.

His death was a major victory for West German authorities in their search for RAF terrorists after months of embar-

rassment and disappointment. Two of the nearly 40 persons sought in last year's string of violence were arrested in the Netherlands, and others in France and Yugoslavia, but none had been caught in West Germany.

Schleyer, president of the national trade and employers associations, was found shot to death about six weeks later after the West German government refused the kidnappers' demands to release jailed terrorists. The Federal Criminal Office, which co-

ordinates the search for terrorists, believes Stoll rented the apartment in a Cologne suburb where Schleyer's abduction was planned. Police believe Stoll had been a member

of the Red Army Faction, or Baader-

Meinhof gang, since 1972.

Theft Ring Tie Suspected

According to the criminal office, Stoll was suspected of involvement in a theft ring that illegally obtained weapons for terrorist attacks

The ring was thought to include Knut Folkerts, also sought in the Buback killing. Folkerts is serving a 20-year sentence in the Netherlands for shooting a police-

Officials said Stoll dropped out of sight in March 1977 after working in the office of Stuttgart attorney Klaus Croissant, who represented terrorist suspects.

Buback was slain on a Karlsruhe street a month later while he was driving to work. Stoll was believed to have fled to See TERRORIST Page 12

Texas Auto Insurors Granted Limited Increase In Premiums

AUSTIN (AP) - Texans' two-year reprieve from automobile insurance rate hikes ended Wednesday with approval by the State Insurance Board of a 3.2 percent average increase in personal car premiums.

The new rates take effect Nov. 1.

The insurance industry had asked for an 8.9 percent increase in personal car premiums, but an industry spokesman expressed satisfaction with the board's

I'm very, very pleased that for the first time in two years we do have a rate adjustment," said David Irons, a spokesman for the Texas Automobile Insurance Service Office.

"Certainly I feel it's in the public interest that we do have an adjustment, while it's somewhat less than our actuaries felt would be fully adequate," he added.

Board members Ned Price and Durwood Manford adopted rates proposed by the board staff. The board lacks a chairman following the refusal of the

The industry had asked for a \$125 million annual hike in private and commercial coverage.

Actual premiums will vary across the state, ranging from a \$17 increase for a typical driver in Jefferson County to a \$15 cut in Kaufman County. The "typical driver is over 25, owns a Ford. Chevrolet or Plymouth, and drives it to work, but does not use it in business.

The typical driver coverage consists of cent. \$50 deductible comprehensive: \$200 deductible collision: no-fault Personal Injury Protection, with basic liability of \$10. 000 per person and \$20,000 per accident for injuries and \$5,000 for property dam-

Young drivers, those with bad driving records and drivers who use their cars in

businiess will have higher rates than those listed for the "typical driver."

Texans' last increase in automobile insurance rates was October 1976, when a 7.1 percent increase took effect after a 15.5 percent jump the previous January.

At the annual auto rate hearing in 1977, the industry requested a 17.4 percent increase. Then-board chairman Joe Christie called off the rate hearing, saying the 1976 rate increases were adequate.

GSA Net Full Of 'Big Fish'?

PRESIDENT Carter and other members of his administration are taking pains to "get out in front" of what appears to be possibly the biggest fraud and corruption scandal of all time.

Government officials themselves are using words to that effect in describing what investigations into the General Services Administration are turning up.

The GSA is the \$5 billion-a-year agency that provides other federal departments and bureaucracies with their facilities and sup-

The President himself took time on Labor Day to meet with Deputy Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti and GSA Administrator Jay Solomon for a briefing on the mushrooming scandal.

SUCH PERSONAL interest from the President can be taken as a sure sign that "big fish" are being caught up in the net of allegations about bribery, fraud and corruption.

In fact, the deputy attorney general himself took pains after the White House meeting to say that "no one is exempt from the investigation at all-either inside or outside of the government."

That last phrase "outside of the government," in the context of a post-White House meeting, led to possibly premature speculation that heavy contributors to the Carter candidacy might possibly turn up as alleged participants in the scandal

'We wanted just to apprise him of everything that was going on," Solomon said of the meeting with Carter. "... No specifics, just generalities so he would feel comfortable that we were pursuing the investiga-

Solomon added: "I think it's very important to have the backing of the White House. I've had it all the time.

AS MANY AS 50 people might be involved in wrongdoing, the GSA chief had said ear-

The figure of \$60 million was mentioned as an amount that might be involved in alleged over-charging of the government and kickbacks from private contractors to government personnel in exchange for favored treatment

Deputy Atty. Gen. Civiletti, asked about Robert Griffin, a friend of House Speaker Tip O'Neill's who Solomon fired recently. replied that he wouldn't discuss individuals but added mysteriously that "we wouldn't be afraid to pursue Mr. Griffin or anyone else involved in activities that we thought we had grounds to investigate."

An unnamed official was quoted as saying 'this thing is getting to the point where some high officials are involved.

As if to emphasize that point, President Carter took time to be briefed on the scandal just 90 minutes before leaving for Camp David for a summit meeting on mideast

'Exchangers' In The Right

CONTINUED TRADE and detente with the Soviet Union need to be encouraged because this undynamic duo, despite doubts on both sides, ultimately will serve the longrange policy interests of the West.

Inasmuch as the problems of pollution and dwindling natural resources are worldwide, they require global solutions.

"Enlightened self-interest...dictates that the Western nations take the lead in shaping collaborative solutions" to global solutions. according to a Boston University political science professor.

WALTER CLEMENS Jr. fears that contacts with the West threaten Communist orthodoxy at home, but concludes in an American Enterprise Institute study that Soviet leaders are increasingly aware that trade and technology exchange are essential to their economy's survival.

Western countries also have had reservations about increased cooperation with the Soviet Union, particularly on the grounds that technology transfer may strengthen the already powerful Soviet military apparatus and on the moral issues involved in dealing with countries that violate human rights.

Despite these difficulties, Clemens predicts a growing trend toward global coopera-

"To the degree that these are indeed solutions to the problems of the West and the Third World, he writes, "these areas will be less susceptible to Soviet manipulation. On the contrary, if global cooperation appears to succeed, the Kremlin may be persuaded to join rather than spike them or stand aloof.

THERE STILL remains the moral issue of how far to push for liberalization of human rights if this undermines Soviet commitment to detente, trade and, ultimately, to global cooperation.

"Perhaps the Kremlin will eventually be persuaded that its best interests would not be unduly threatened and might even prosper through liberalization in Eastern Europe and at home

Before Moscow accepts this view, however," muses Clemens, "shrimps may learn to

In the final analysis, international cooperation must proceed with at least limited participation by the Soviet Union.

Time, toleration and the thermonuclear terror have given both sides the opportunity to shift their relationship from cold war to a structure of peace rooted in a sense of strategic, economic and technological interde-

Tax Billions Pouring Into CETA Rat Hole

WASHINGTON-One of the thornier problems confronting Congress as it returns to work for the pre-election period is the scandal-ridden program, known as CETA.

CETA stands for the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act, adopted in 1973 as a supposed method of helping the disadvantaged.

It has become an \$11 billion-a-year boondoggle apped by exposes of waste, outrageous patronage giveaways and disregard for the well being of the

Before retiring for the Labor Day recess, the senate voted to keep CETA in business by a tidy nargin of 66-10.

TRUE, THIS vote was preceded by some mendments allegedly tightening up the stand-

But with a couple of exceptions, the amendments left the essence of the program more or ess intact

How urgently reform is needed is demonstrated by Ralph Kinney Bennett in a recent issue of teaders Digest.

Bennett has assembled a galaxy of horror stoties about the widespread abuse of CETA funds, suggesting that "the program has degenerated in-to an unfortunate joke on the genuinely disadvan-

Among the details unearthed:

-IN CITY AFTER city, CETA money has been used to fund the activities of exotics, ripoff artists and boondogglers.

Examples include paying \$750 a month to meone in Chicago to teach inner-city youth to ap their bodies as "human drums";

Building a steel-reinforced concrete rock in Oron to be used for practice by rock climbers, ind paying for a "nude sculpting workershop" in which naked men and women run their hands er one another's bodies.

-Even worse in some respects, CETA money been used to finance counterculture enthusisms, radical political activism and attempts to

inflate the already bloated coffers of the welfare

Examples: funding of something called "Gay Community Services" in Los Angeles, to the tune of \$640,000, to provide information concerning 'gay lifestyles";

Paying 22 "outreach workers" in Florida to go door to door to put more people on the food

-MOST COMMON OF all, billions of CETA funds have been used to underwrite the payrolls of local governments-financing existing government jobs rather than creating new employment.

Unsurprisingly, numerous instances have been discovered of CETA dollars going to patronage and political workers, friends and relatives of local officials and others who by no stretch of the imagination qualify as the intended beneficiaries of the legislation.

(This last-named point has become a major scandal in the city government of Washington. D.C., where 56 of 126 employes of the city coun-

cil have been receiving CETA money (It develops that 44 of these CETA employes draw between \$10,000 and \$20,000 a year, and at least one makes more than \$20,000 a year.

(The Washington Star reports one council member as noting that "no one in authority raised any objections when council members began recommending friends, volunteers and former campaign workers for CETA council jobs.")





tween management and labor. George Meany can be counted on to call a cat a dog and the nation's laws a joke. Ever since negotiations were resumed between

the government and postal workers, the AFL-CIO czar has been going around claiming that the new discussions are "in the true tradition of collective bargaining and trade unionism. But Postmaster General William Bolger in fact

had no choice but to agree, in effect, to violate the true tradition of collective bargaining.

He didn't like it, but in one last attempt to avoid an illegal strike he properly took it upon himself to swallow the public's pride.

THE POSTAL Service had negotiated a new contract with the postal workers' unions, calling wage increases, including cost-of-living benefits, totaling 19.5 per cent over three years, and

retention of the infamous no-layoffs clause. Three major unions promptly rejected the agreement and voted to strike if the Postal Service didn't return to negotiations within five days of the vote, or if the talks failed to produce a new

contract within five days. So what was the point of those previous negotiations? The new contract was accepted by the unions' elected representatives, who figured the no-layoff clause was more important than a bigger wage increase.

BUT THE rank-and-file were going to strike anyway under official-and illegal-union strike mandates aimed at avoiding a contract handed down by neutral and binding arbitration.

And that's where politics made its entrance. Both Joseph Vacca, president of the National Association of Letter Carriers, and American Postal Workers Union President Emmet Andrews vigorously supported the contract. They wanted that no-layoff clause.

After all, nearly 200,000 postal workers struck for eight days in 1970, and nobody went to jail or paid a fine

Meanwhile, you can ask whatever happened to President Carter's and Congress' promise to reorganize and reform the Postal Service. The answer is nothing.

I APPLAUD Postmaster General Bolger for sparing us a strike-at least temporarily. But the system he heads just doesn't work because it's too independent.

The Postmaster General now is appointed by the Service's board of governors and confirmed by the Senate. But this most recent brawl between the taxpay-

ers' government and public employes shows that the time has come to go whole hog by abolishing the independent Postal Service and returning the job of delivering the mail to the government. A federal bureaucracy may be unwieldy and time-serving, but it can be made to straighten up

and fly right by public pressure exerted through Congress and the White House. And, as The New York Times remarked editorially, a beleaguered public "does not owe its em-

ployes the privilege of striking."

THAT FEAR underlines the shift by the Democratic governors away from open season on Jimmy Carter toward a more benign mood of tolera-

Whether the new mood lasts will depend on the President's response, and some of the evidence here is that Carter has gotten the message.

A case in point was the White House reversal of a tentative decision to gut the federal-state Regional Development Commissions so dear to the hearts of the governors.

The plan, first outlined three weeks ago to 12 Western governors in Vail, Colo., by low-level administration aides would have centralized authority over these commissions in Washington. drastically reduced the power of the governors and choked off budgetary support.

ANGRY WESTERN governors led by Montana's Thomas L. Judge were prepared for a counerattack against the White House that would have spilled political blood here.

But top-level White House aides, headed by Anne Wexler and Jack Watson, persuaded Carter to retreat and announced the decision on Mon-

There never has been much love between the Democratic governors and their former colleague from Plains, Ga.

Not a single Democrat among the 17 who were elected for the first time in 1970 along with Jimmy Carter supported his pre-convention bid for

President. They perceived him as distant, selfish and a loner, never one of them. Most of the 38 present Democratic governors feel the same way today, but their need for Oval Office support in coping with what Brown calls the "tidal wave" of the taxpavers' revolt and the awesome new veto power of special interest groups makes union with the White House indis-

IN ADDITION, there was the first faint murmur of something like sympathy for the troubled presidency of Jimmy Carter and the man him-

Gov. Joseph P. Teasdale of Missouri called it the swing of the pendulum.

We have begun to rally around Carter," he told us. "Whether you call it sympathy, there is an important mutual interest we have with the President-preventing the dangerous failure of government in this nation."

But so low has the estate of the President fallen that the single act of recording formal support for him by the Democratic governors here was an acute embarrassment.

THE RESOLUTION of support was sponta neously popped out by West Virginia's Gov. Jay Rockefeller at a closed-door breakfast during which national Democratic chairman John White appealed to the governors to back Carter and take command of their state political parties for the 1980 presidential campaign

When Rockefeller offered his pro-Carter resolution, New Jersey Gov. Brendan Byrne said out loud what many others were thinking: finding it necessary to go on record supporting a new President only 19 months in office is leading from weakness and reminding the country how low he has sunk.

ONCE OFFERED the resolution could not be withdrawn without even greater embarrassment to Carter. It was unanimously adopted.

Rockefeller's resolution is no promise of better times for Jimmy Carter. There was not a solitary Democratic governor here willing to tie his own future to the President's star, and few who did not recount their own horror stories of White House snubs and stupidities in which the governors have sometimes been treated lower than sewer inspectors.

That period may be ending. More important is the underlying fear of whether government can be made to work. The governors know that without an alliance of necessity with Carter the answer must be no, and that prospect fills them with genuine terror.

Days...



THE GENERAL election campaign is cooking

on all four burners these days. In most races, they are tossing everything into the pot but the proverbial kitchen sink. And that may come along later.

The Lubbock area is getting its share of attention. With the region's voting power, it can now decide a close race. As a result, all of the major candidates are "including us in." It means long days for most of them.

As one accustomed to 5 a.m. to midnight schedules when traveling abroad, we can understand a couple of weeks or so of such pressure living. But, to cram in 18- and 20-hour days over a six-to eight-month period must be mental and physical torture indeed.

Rep. Bob Krueger, among others, is working just such a schedule in his quest to unseat GOP Sen. John Tower. The New Braunfels solon is concentrating a lot of that time in Lubbock and

KRUEGER WAS in Lubbock Sunday, his umpteenth appearance in the city and nearby environs since starting his drive.

We spent about an hour with him, discussing among other things some of the issues and his votes on the more controversial legislation which came up in this session of Congress.

While running on the Demo slate, Krueger, like many of his colleagues, seeks to emphasize that he is an "Independent" Democrat. And while making recent appearances with Vice President Mondale in South Texas and First Lady Rosalynn Carter in San Antonio, he is careful not to go all out in endorsing administration policies.

At the same time. Krueger has come under heavy criticism from Sen. Tower and many Texans for his votes in favor of extending ERA, for the labor reform bill and statehood for Washing-

KRUEGER SAYS he found all three among the most difficult decisions he had to face. He may be having second thoughts on one or two of

Obviously, he doesn't see his votes in the same light as others. For instance, on the labor reform measure. Krueger says he still supports State Right-to-Work laws and would vote to maintain

He says he "voted for extension of ERA because a poll we took showed a majority of Texans in favor of such a move... The people still have an opportunity to say no if they don't want it," he

He told us if ERA should get past the Senate. where it faces heavy opposition if not a filibuster. and later came up for a formal ratification, as a Senator he would "honor those states who thus far have voted for the measure, then voted to reseind their action.

He takes a similar stance on Washington statehood. "If the people don't want it," he says, "all they have to do is defeat it in their respective legislatures... That's Democracy in action.

WHILE DEFENDING his own position. Krueger zeroes in on what he claims is Tower's "record of unconcern for Texans until election

He says Tower has "compiled the worst voting record on agricultural issues of any Texas senator since Texas joined the union," and accuses his opponent of being all but inaccessible to the aver-

age Texan We asked him if he had thought what he might do "if you lose this one?" Smiling, he said: "The thought has never occurred to me, not for a mo-

ment. I know I am going to win ... He says he thinks he is running extremely close to Tower and cites a poll claiming Tower's edge is only 43 percent to his 42 percent, with the rest undecided. "We faced much greater odds than that in our first race for Congress." he says.

WHILE SERVING in the House, Krueger has built a reputation as one of its hardest workers.

Seemingly tireless, he is known to wear out younger staff members. He more often can be found in his office than on Washington's party circuit at night. friends say.

Under no illusions as to the task he faces, he nevertheless has mounted a greater challenge to the veteran Tower than some observers anticipat-

In the process, he has support from a goodly segment of the state's newspapers, although many are yet to be heard from, not only in this race but in some of the other biggies. His best assets are his enthusiasm, willingness

to work, his intelligence and a good grasp of state, national and world problems. His biggest drawback is a stance which some view as too liberal, including those three toughies mentioned

"DR. KRUEGER," who comes by the academic title honestly by virtue of a Ph.D. from Oxford in England, is recognized as one of the "brains' of Congress. Born 41 years ago in New Braunfels, he gradu-

ated from high school there, got a degree in economics at SMU, with a view to going into the stock brokerage business.

Instead, he studied at Oxford for his doctorate. then became Vice-Provost and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Duke. the youngest in the University's history.

After his father died, he took over the family business and is actively involved in the Krueger Brangus Ranch in East Texas. He was first elected to Congress in 1974, and was overwhelmingly reelected in 1976. At the end of his first term, he was voted the

most effective" of the 75 first-term Democrats. Tall, handsome, he is regarded as one of Washington's more eligible bachelors. Whether he can pull off his "possible dream."







Police said the bottles, with identical messages handwritten on white gift cards, appeared at the doorsteps of National Party leaders Carlos Pereyra, Luis Lacalle de Herrera and Mario Heber Usher on Aug. 29 and 30.

"On Thursday the 31st at midday let us toast the fatherland in its new era," said the message, which bore the signature "M.D.N."

Uruguay's civilian parties have been barred from political activity since the 1973 military takeover. The moderately conservative Nationals, one of Uruguay's two major parties, have repeatedly called for a return to democracy.

There were reports at the time that ailing President Aparicio Mendez, 73year-old figurehead of the military regime, would soon resign. Officials have since denied the reports. Police said none of the three men





macaws, worth \$15,000 as a producing set. Along with five other parrots worth another \$9,000, they were taken Tuesday from the parrot store of Steve Kates in Bayside, Queens.

The valuable birds, five of them Kates' personal pets, allegedly were used by a disgruntled former employee in what Kates called a \$10,000 extortion attempt.

The ex-employee, Nikolaj Vissokovsky, claimed he was only trying to get back money that Kates owed him, according to Detective Alvin Simon. Simon arrested Vissokovsky outside the store Tuesday night when he showed up to meet Kates, presumably to deal back the birds.

Vissokovsky, 23, of College Point, was held for arraignment on charges of robbery, grand larceny and possession of stolen property.

An acquaintance who accompanied him to the meeting, Roger Horan, 32, was arrested also and accused of menacing and conspiracy, Simon said.

The birds were recovered unharmed from Vissokovsy's apartment whre they were wildly happy to see Kates.

Besides the prized breeders, the recovered birds included a blue and gold macaw, named Candy, which Simon called "a real beauty." Kates described Candy as a show bird which has performed for Princess Grace of Monaco, and made pizza commercials for televi-

Also taken was Frosty, a cockatoo; Baby, a hyacinth macaw, and two non-pets, unnamed yellow nape Amazons that were part of the store's stock.

Kates, 26, of Queens, said he fired Vissokovsky's last month when the employee returned from a purchasing trip to Honduras that resulted in a loss of several thousand dollars. But Vissokovsky said Kates still owed him money for expenses incurred on the trip and for back salary.

Kates said Vissokovsky took the birds then demanded \$10,000 for their safe return. In the ensuing dickering Kates said Vissokovsky first asked for Kates' foreign



No Rainfall Seen For South Plains

If beauty is in the eyes of the beholder, some South Plains residents may be disappointed today: skies again should be clear to partly cloudy and temperatures are expected to be warm.

That may be beautiful weather to you and me, but for rain buffs and homeowners imploring the clouds for a little moisture, it's got to be disappointing

Nonetheless, there's no mention of rain in the forecast today, and the weatherman says as much as .30 of an inch of moisture could evaporate under

sunny skies today.
Temperatures today are expected to range from an early-morning low near 62 to a mid-afternoon high around 85 de-

Winds are expected to be southerly, shifting occasionally to the southeast at 10 to 15 mph.

Despite a dry, local forecast, the weatherman says pockets of rain may be scattered throughout the state today, with the exception of north central and northeast Texas.

Texas held its first state-financed presidential primary in 1976, with Jimmy Carter taking 92 of the state's 98 delegates. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, captured the other six.

In the Republican primary, Ronald Reagan swamped Gerald Ford by nearly 150,000 votes and won all 96 delegates.

The state law setting up the primary expired after it was over. Barnhart, a Reagan supporter, said the

state GOP "has every intention" of amending its rules in convention Saturday to provide for a 1980 presidential pri-

"I hope the Legislature - though dominated by another party - will not be so crass as to deny a large segment of the population their constitutional right of choice," added Barnhart, a former state representative from Pasadena.

"I feel very strongly that one political party should not dictate terms to another political party," Barnhart said.

Asked if the GOP would attempt to hold a primary even if the Legislature failed to enact a primary law, Barnhart replied:

We shall . . . despite any jackleg decision by a clerk in the secretary of state's office which says we cannot.'

Mrs. Patman said Texas Democratic leaders would prefer "fair-share representation" to the "winner-take-all" procedure that would result if new national Democratic primary rules are followed.

Asked if she would oppose a Democratic primary even if the Republicans hold one, Mrs. Patman said she would.

"I'm moving away from the idea that primaries are so great," she said.

Liquor Vote Challenges Long Drouth

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) - North Carolina voters get a chance this week to approve liquor-by-the-drink sales in their communities after 70 years of statewide

Charlotte and surrounding Mecklenburg County will vote Friday in the first test of the state's new local option law for mixed drinks. Within a week, three smaller locales will hold their own refer-

While neighoring states have adopted liquor by the drink in recent years, North Carolina has held out, with only beer and wine sales and "brown-bagging" with liquor bought at state-owned stores permissible.

The mixed-drink issue has been debated for years. Until the state General Assembly passed the local-option bill in June, North Carolina stood with Oklahoma as the only states without some form of mixed-drink legislation.

In Charlotte, both sides are highly organized, drawing thousands of dollars in contributions and producing slick cam-

Issues have ranged from whether mixed drinks will help draw tourists and conventions to whether supporters of liquor by the drink are risking the wrath

"You watch whoever's involved in the campaign (for mixed drinks) and see what happens to them," warns Henderson Belk, a leader of the drys and a member of a wealthy family that operates department stores in the Southeast. Jerry Green, a local political strategist running the wet campaign, contends that

selling mixed drinks allows better control of consumption than brown bagging. And wets stand behind mixed drinks as a way to draw tourists and conventions to the business-oriented city of Charlotte.

"Basically we have tried to ignore that (Belk's) kind of emotionalism and stick with the facts," Green says.

That draws a quick reply from the Rev. Coy Privette, a Baptist minister who is Belk's ally in the dry campaign.

"To say this is not a moral issue is not reality. The very fact that you have to control liquor makes it an emotional issue. You don't control things that are good," says Privette.

Mecklenburg County voters have twice approved mixed-drink legislation, in 1971 and 1973. But the 1971 measure was declared unconstitutional before the first drink could be poured, and the 1973 vote was in a statewide referendum which was defeated by more than 2-to-1.

Referendums have also been scheduled in Southern Pines, a golf resort town, Orange County, the county of Chapel Hill and the University of North Carolina, and the mountain resort town of Black Mountain.

series' producer, Alfred Kelman, is "to portray the high drama of medicine in action, with doctors and patients facing life and death.

Kelman has the credentials for the difficult assignment: he was instrumental in production of "The Body Human" series of medical specials. And the choice for the "star" of the first show in the series, to be broadcast Thursday evening, could hardly have been a better one

Dr. Judson Randolph, surgeon-in-chief at the Children's Hospital of the National Medical Center in Washington, is a slender, soft-spoken man whose concern for his young patients is an unspoken theme of the program's premiere.

"We hear so much about the shortcomings of the health care system in this country, and there are some real shortcomings, that it was my hope that the consumer would see in the program that there are many, many in the profession doing their best, with the patients' best interests in mind," he said.

Randolph said he was skeptical when first approached by the program's producers, but was assured by Kelman's background and expertise and the reputation of one of the show's co-producers, Dr. Robert E. Fuisz.

He said the cameraman, soundman and their assistants who accommpanied him on his rounds were "professional and un-

"I was surprised," Randolph said, "that after the first day or so, everything was so natural.

Randolph is followed as he treats an infant in immediate need of sophisticated

surgery, a 15-year-old boy with severe abdominal pain, a 9-year-old girl thought to have a growth in her lung.

"Whenever something inappropriate to film came up. or an emotional situation, the film people were very considerate and privacy was respected," the doctor

He said his routine was filmed "pretty much as it is. We didn't wait for 'good' days, when something dramatic was hap-

"There was a lot of concern for one of the babies on whom I operated, and in fact that concern was toned down a bit.

'Nothing was spared as far as the baby's care was concerned. I had grave fears for his survival, and a little of that came through, and I guess that is dramatic. But my middle of the night distress is

The "personal" aspect of "Lifeline" includes scenes of Randolph strumming the guitar and singing with his family and playing poker with non-doctor friends. For the TV viewer, the "personal" scenes do little more than break the hospital tension.

Randolph said he anticipates criticism from some in the medical profession for his role in "Lifeline." but believes "There has of the program outweighs any adverse reaction.

There has always been, through no fault of anyone, mystery surrounding the practice of medicine," he said. "And in this day of the informed consumer, there are more and more attempts to lift those shrouds. I think this is another good way.

"I hope that people who view this series, and they will see some goods and some bads, see that doctors really do



In the next room, several young boys went through the paces of a traditional dance of the Plains Indians, while another group put the finishing touches on an 18-foot teepee.

The Harford County schoolchildren, who were preparing for a Saturday night pow-wow, were finishing three weeks of a summertime project designed to teach them Indian culture.

But unlike many other youngsters who study the subject, these students have a special interest. Like several thousand others in Maryland's public schools, they are Indians.

Across the state there are Cherokee, Piscataway, Cree, Choptank, Wicomico, Rappahanock, Sioux, Lumbee, Choctaw, Mohawk, Nanticoke, Delaware and Passamoquoddy Indians.

Some tribes are native to the area, while members of other tribes emigrated to the region, like Lumbees who came to Baltimore to take factory jobs during World War II.

Five subdivisions in the state - Baltimore. Harford. Montgomery and Prince Georges counties, as well as Baltimore City - have developed programs aimed at meeting the special needs of these stu-

BEL AIR, Md. (AP) — Cathy Tom-baugh knelt intently in front of the Nava-al Indian Education Act of 1969. Maryland's participation began in 1972, when state education officials identified the In-

dian populations in a number of areas. Lloyd Elm of the Office of Indian Education in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare said the programs are designed "to meet the special educational needs of the Indian children because they are Indian.

Elm, who supervises the Indian education programs in states east of the Mississippi, said the emphasis has changed in the past few years.

There has been a movement away from concern with academic achievement," he said, "and now there is more concern with teaching the kids how to cope with some of the pressures related to being Indian, and being in public school.

"We need to get away from the stereotyping of the Indian as the 'noble savage,' and give them a more positive self-imsaid Elm, an Onondaga Indian from Syracuse, N.Y.

"These kids have greater cultural needs than kids on the reservation," he continued, "because they aren't getting the constant reinforcement of being with their own people."

The five Maryland programs use several approaches in trying to help Indian students. Some are developing educational materials to supplement those in the

The significant thing about each of the programs, however, is that the children's parents determine how and where the money is spent. A project coordinator works with the parent committee and federal officials to draw up a program ac-

ceptable to all parties.

In Montgomery County, for example, a cultural center has been established to accomodate about 235 students representing 40 tribes.

Marcie DeVine, the project coordina-tor, said the students learn about the lifestyles and customs of various tribes and study arts and crafts such as Pueblo pottery. Sioux beadwork and Navajo rug-

Some of the high school students prefer not to be set apart as Indians, she said, but most of the younger children are receptive to the program.

In Baltimore, the emphasis is divided between academic achievement and cultural enrichment. Coordinator Tonya Bundari said more than 1.100 pupils are enrolled in the program, which operates both a tutorial project and a cultural cen-

The main focus of the Harford County project, which serves about 95 students, is the summer workshop. This year, project coordinator Edna Goshorn brought







'Nothing really spectacular is happening and we don't expect anything much to happen for awhile," said one source close to the talks between the Postal Service and three unions representing 516,000 workers.

The talks are being held amid renewed threats by local union leaders to stage a mail strike if a satisfactory agreement is not produced.

Strike Action Unlikely

But some national union officials recently have been calling the strike threats exaggerated, contending privately that few of the nation's postal workers would actually participate in a walkout, which is barred by federal law.

A proposed settlement reached July 21 was rejected by union members last month, forcing union leaders to call a nationwide walkout that was averted when the Postal Service agreed to a unique 15-day round of bargaining with a special mediator.

The bargaining officially began last Friday, but bargainers spent the Labor Day weekend meeting separately with the mediator, Harvard labor relations professor James Healy, and did not begin face-to-face negotiations until Tues-

According to sources, the unions spent the past two days building a statistical case for a larger pay raise.





'No Money Problems,' Hill Declares

AUSTIN (AP) — Attorney General John Hill said Wednesday he has "no money problems" and is in good shape for the general election, in which he is the Democratic gubernatorial nominee.

Hill commented at a news conference called to announce his support by a new organization of elected county officials throughout the state.

The announcement was part of a full day of campaign activities before a \$50per-person fund-raising reception. Hill said about 2.500 persons were expected to attend and about 6,000 tickets had been sold.

"They tell me we have about \$725,000 committed for the affair," Hill said. "If this is true, we have no money problems for this campaign. We will be able to carry out our planned \$1.1 million campaign for the general election. We will stage a

very competitive campaign during these last six weeks."

McLennan County Judge Bob L. Thomas said that "for the first time in the history of Texas politics, county officials across Texas have joined together to form a political committee to support a gubernatorial candidate. The political committee, known as "CHOOSE Hill," has been organized to harness the broad support of county officials for the election of John Hill as governor.'

Thomas said that many of the county officials who will act as coordinators in the organization are presidents of statewide associations of county officials. However, he stressed that "each one is acting as an individual - not as a representative of their association. No attempt is being made to politicize these statewide associations.

The vice chairman of the organization

is Ann Richards. Travis County commissioner. Garza County Judge Giles Dalby was made coordinator of non-urban counties, and Harris County Commissioner Tom Bass was named coordinator for urban counties.

Hill told the county officials present that "if we are going to meet the challenge of Proposition 13 of competency in government we are going to have to work

together in every layer of government."

He promised the county officials two things. First, that he would not allow programs to be motivated by the legislature that would increase the cost of government at the local level without providing financing." Second, that "you will always have input with me before a decision is made concerning local govern-

Money Traders Indicted

CHICAGO (AP) - A federal grand jury accused two commodity traders Wednesday of conspiracy, tax fraud and making illegal transactions to benefit a client's tax status.

Joseph Siegel and Alvin Winograd, officers of the Siegel Trading Co., Inc., engaged in a series of "prearranged, fixed, rigged, non-competitive and risk-free commodity futures trades" in 1974 and 1975 on behalf of Harold Brady, now deceased, the indictment said.

Most of the transactions involved Mexican peso futures on the International Monetary Market, a division of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Some involved Swiss franc futures.

Through the trades. Brady realized 'purportedly tax-deductible 'losses' of about \$448,450 for 1974 and \$1,327,050 for 1975," said a statement from the U.S. attorney's office.

The alleged scheme operated similarly to a commodity trading technique known as the "tax saddle" or tax spreading, said Stephen Senderowitz, assistant U.S. attorney. 

New Jersey Eyes Casino Taxes

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — Gambling fever among high rollers in Atlantic City has generated almost \$5 million in jus more than three months to aid New Jersey's elderly and handicapped, but the state still hasn't decided how to spend it.

State officials say they've been waiting to see how much money would be generated by the eight percent state tax imposed on a casino's "win" - the amount gamblers lose.

No one wanted to write anything specific in the Casino Control Act without knowing what specific money would be there." says Ben Borowky, spokesman for the state Casino Control Commission.

The nearly \$5 million collected since late May when Resorts International Inc. opened the United States' first - and so far only - legal gambling casino outside Nevada already exceeds the \$3.5 million expected annually by the state. But there

were no specific plans to spend even that

Casino Control Commission Chairman Joseph Lordi says the state share easily could reach more than \$12 million by the

Resorts International has shown steadily increasing average daily wins — \$438.-504 for May. \$534,627 for June. \$666,209 for July and \$759,208 for August.
Legislation was introduced last week to

create a state casino revenues study commission. which is to propose ways to spend the money. The commission would be composed of three state senators and three assemblymen.

I'm concerned that nothing's been done." said the bill's sponsor. Sen. John Skevin, a Democrat from Bergen County. "I anticipate holding public hearings throughout the state and having a legislative proposal by the end of the year. Buyers Not Being Told Of Total Credit Costs

charge expensive purchases on credit cards are not receiving full disclosure of credit costs under federal truth-in-lend-ing laws, the Federal Trade Commission

said Wednesday.
"An increasing number of consumers are not being given the most important credit cost information when they make major credit purchases." FTC Chairman Michael Pertschuk said in testimony before a congressional panel.

The reason is the increasing use of credit cards in the decade since the Truth-in-Lending Act has been on the books, he said. That law was written to assure that

consumers who borrow money for major purchases get full information on what lending charges they will pay.
The law was written with traditional installment loan buying in mind. Pertschuk said. In such so-called "closed-end" pur-

chases, the buyer makes regular payments until the loan and any finance charges are repaid. However, credit cards use "open-end" credit that allows new purchases before old purchases are paid, and these accounts are not subject to all of the re-

quirements of the installment loan plans. 'A consumer using a credit card to purchase goods costing several thousand dollars will receive disclosure of only the annual percentage rate and minimum monthly payment." Pertschuk said.

"He or she will not be told the total cost of credit (the finance charge), the number of payments to be made, the to-

Q. Along with many other people, I be-lieve that a severe recession could occur in the next few years. To protect against this possibility. I plan to sell the stock I own in the company from which I recent-ly retired and put the money in bonds paying high interest.

If I am right common stock prices will collapse, along with interest rates. And bonds will increase in value. If I am wrong, collecting high interest won't be all that bad. Is there anything wrong with my thinking?

A. No. your thinking would be reasonably correct - if we have a depression. And I'm as concerned about that as you are. There are some storm clouds on the economic horizon. But a major recession remains a mighty big IF.

When the national economy goes into a recession, stock prices fall. And interest rates usually dip. Because bonds pay interest at a fixed rate, the market values of bonds already issued and in the hands of the investing public rise.

In my adult lifetime, stock prices have recovered after every recession and most have usually gone to new highs. And in-terest rates, after dipping during reces-sions, have also climbed again. I hope you don't expect to see interest rates back where they were 30, 20 or even 10 vears ago.

If you can call the turns of economic recession and boom, you'll do very well in the securities market. But I have to tell you that very few people have been successful in doing that.

More important, as a retired person, ou should have most of your assets in high-income-producing investments. So. shift out of common stocks into highyielding bonds is a logical move for you no matter how you feel about the

Q. You have mentioned "no-load" mutual funds a number of times. Where can I get a list of such funds? I asked a couple

of brokers and got no help. A. Naturally, because brokers don't sell them. That's what makes the no-load funds different from other mutual funds.

You can get the list you're looking for by writing to the No-Load Mutual Fund Association. Valley Forge. Pa. 19481. The association will send you a booklet with names, addresses and other information about no-load funds.

Q. You favor "dollar averaging" — put-ting the same amount of money into the same security at fixed intervals. Yesterday, talking about a stock I own, my bro-ker suggested I "average down." Is that the same thing?

A. No. Averaging down is buying more of the same stock you already own at a lower price than you originally paid. Let's say you bought 100 shares of XYZ. at \$20 a share, and that XYZ's market price has since dropped to \$16. If you buy

more XYZ. you'll average down. Your first 100 shares cost \$2,000. Another 100 shares, at \$10. will cost you \$1,-000. That will make your cost of 200 shares \$3,000 — an average cost of \$15 a

XYZ would then have to rise only \$5 a share for you to get even.

Q. I plan to sell the mutual fund shares I own and put the money in a savings cer-tificate for more income. Do I need a

A. No. Actually you don't "sell" mutual fund shares. You "redeem" them by turning them back to the fund. The redemption procedures vary. from one fund to another. So, contact your fund and find out exactly how to do it. You'll find the fund's address in the last annual semi-annual or quarterly report you re-

The no-loads sell their shares directly to Stabilized Dollar Declared Possible

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal Reserve Chairman G. William Miller said Wednesday the dollar can be stabilized if the government acts decisively against inflation and adopts a national energy poli-

'It is within our choice within the next 60 days," Miller told the Senate Finance

The decline of the dollar over the last year will increase U.S. inflation by 1 percent, he said, "and that is a very large tax

for Americans to pay."

The first step in stabilizing the dollar, he indicated, is for Congress to approve a compromise bill setting natural gas prices. If the much-disputed legislation fails, Miller said, "it will have adverse consequences for the dollar."

Miller went before the committee to outline his recommendations on tax policy. But a great deal of his time was consumed answering questions about the dollar's slide abroad and the natural-gas

Senators who represent gas-producing states are joining forces with those from other states in an effort to defeat the gas bill, which has been endorsed by President Carter.

Noting that the bill is opposed by major consumer organizations as well as most gas producers, Miller said, "It's an acceptable compromise to get where we

need to go." Foreigners are looking at the gas bill as the indicator of whether Congress and the Carter administration have the will to

attack the energy problem, he said.
"What is the effect going to be when
our friends abroad find out that this is all just conversation - that the bill will not increase production?" asked Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., chairman of the committee and representative of a major gas-

"The dollar will be influenced if the bill is passed, whether rightly or wrongly,"

He urged Congress to enact the gas bill and then consider it as a "base line" from which further improvements in the

nation's energy picture can be made.

Miller agreed with Long that there is no prospect Congress this year will approve Carter's proposed crude-oil tax, which is aimed at forcing conservation by raising the price of U.S.-produced oil to world levels.

But Miller acid forcing leaders a

But, Miller said, foreign leaders al-ready have concluded that the tax will not be enacted this year, and that fact al-ready has had its impact on the dollar. The second action needed to stabilize the dollar, he added, is to reduce inflation by cutting federal spending

taining inflationary pressures, it is imper-ative that the budget deficit be reduced substantially below the \$50 billion level projected for the current fiscal year." he

FDA Recalls **Drug For** Mislabeling

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Food and Drug Administration reports that an anti-depressant drug distributed to a Florida drugstore chain is being recalled because the dosage may have been stronger than labeled.

An overdose of the drug, amitriptyline hydrochloride, potentially could be fatal, the FDA said, but it knew of no injuries.

The manufacturer, Biocraft Laboratories, Inc., of Elmwood Park, N.J., is recalling five dozen 100-tablet bottles of the drug in 75 mg, tablets from Gray Drug Stores Inc. of Florida. All the bottles recalled were in lot No. 6008.

The same drug also is being recalled by another manufacturer, Barr Labora-tories of Northvale, N.J., because some bottles were mislabeled.

The FDA said 80 of 262 bottles of what are supposed to be the 75 mg. anti-de-pressant tablets actually contain 50 mg. dimenhydrinate tablets. That drug is an ingredient in the anti-motion sickness

Barr distributed those bottles under its Goldline brand nationwide in lots no. 7J21105 and 7L05701.

In its weekly recall list, the FDA also said that 66 injectable drugs and vitamins made by Gotham Pharmaceutical Co. of Brooklyn, N.Y., are being recalled because they may not be sterile. Also, some Champion Fat Fighter Honey and Protein Tablets are being recalled as misbranded because Pure Foods Manufacturing Co. of Phoenix, Ariz., used brown sugar instead of honey in making them, the FDA said.

Pure Foods began recalling 190 cases

Pure Foods began recalling 190 cases of the weight-control tablets on May 5 from stores in Arizona, California, Colorado and New Jersey. They bear the code Nos. 077701 through 037801.

Findings Fail To Prove Laetrile Effectiveness

BOSTON (AP) — A federal search of medical records for examples of Laetrile curing cancer turned up six cases in which people got better after taking the controversial substance. But researchers said the findings do not prove that Laetrile is effective in treating cancer.

The results of the review, released Wednesday, will be used by the National Cancer Institute in deciding whether to

begin human testing of Laetrile, the trademark for a substance derived from the chemical amygdalin, found naturally in the pits of apricots and peaches and in bitter almonds.

Although at least 70,000 patients have been treated with Laetrile in the United States over the past two decades, researchers said only 93 cases were submit-

The researchers emphasized that no conclusions about the benefits of Laetrile can be drawn from the study. Even in the six positive cases, they said, the patients' improvement could have been caused by other factors, such as their diet or "the unmeasurable ingredient of hope."

"We were hoping to get many more cases so that we would have a better feel," said Dr. Neil M. Ellison, who directed the study for the National Cancer

Institute. "This certainly wasn't any overwhelming testimony to the suppos-edly hundreds of cases out there that responded to Laetrile. The federal research was published in

Thursday's issue of the New England Journal of Medicine. The cancer institute's Decision Net-work Committee will meet Sept. 25 to de-cide whether to recommend human test-

ing of Laetrile.

The 29-member committee's proposal will be sent to institute director Arthur Upton, who will make the final decision. Advocates of Laetrile say thousands have been cured of cancer by the substance and urge that its use be legalized in the United States.

The Food and Drug Administration says Laetrile has not been proved safe and effective and prohibits its interstate shipment. However, on July 10, the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver ruled that terminally ill cancer patients can legally receive Laetrile injections. In addition, 17 states have legalized its use.

FDA Commissioner Donald Kennedy said the new study does not provide any proof that Laetrile works.

"It is significant that so few people

proof that Laetrile works.

"It is significant that so few people came forward with case histories of successes from Laetrile therapy in view of the claim that thousands of cancer victims have benefited from the use of this substance." Kennedy said. "The case review does not establish that any patient has benefited from Laetrile."

The cancer institute sent 455,000 letters.

The cancer institute sent 455,000 letters to doctors and other health professionals requesting case records of patients who

were helped by Laetrile. From this, the agency received infor-mation on 93 patients, all of whom were reported to have responded well to Laetrile treatment.

"It's impossible to draw any definite conclusions about Laetrile's efficacy or even to draw any conclusions about the six cases that responded," Ellison said in

an interview.

The researchers said there was no way to determine whether it was the Laetrile that made the patients better.

They wrote, "The patients treated with Laetrile were almost always given concomitant metabolic therapy, including substances that might be regarded as immune stimulants, as well as general supportive care measures such as improved portive care measures such as implicit, psychologic support and the usurable ingredient of hope."

Local Governments Blamed For Burgeoning Tax Revolt

Because they failed to act on tax cuts for their constituents, local governments must shoulder much responsibility for the taxpayer revolt brewing nationwide

This observation is made by George Break, professor of economics. University of California, Berkeley, and national coordinator of Courses by Newspaper's fall series "Taxation: Myths and Realities." The first article in this 15part series will appear Sunday in The Avalanche-Journal.

"As increased assessments generated greater property tax revenues, local governments chose to initiate new programs rather than reduce the tax rate." Break points out.

"Failing to recognize voter discontent with the size of government, they expanded government and became the tar-

gets of taxpayer anger." he observes. It appears that government, as well as property taxes, is the target of taxpayer discontent, Break notes.

"Opinion polls show people want both their tax bills and government to get a lot smaller." Break explains. However, some people naively believe taxes can be cut without a reduction in government services.

As taxpayers take the initiative to set property tax ceilings, Break believes, local governments will turn increasingly to user charges, fees, and local income taxes.

User charges, based on benefits received, are generally viewed by tax experts as a fair levy," he points out 'However, many taxpayers may be surprised at the amount of this charge for such services as libraries and trash collec-

While local governments attempt to implement reduced budgets, they can expect little aid from the federal government unless cutbacks hurt low income persons, according to

'The message to reduce government has been heard by Washington," he says. "They likely will act only to moderate the impact of reduced services to the poor and the elderly. Federal assistance, made available only after a sizable

number of states are forced to reduce spending, will take the

form of direct payments to affected individuals or direct payments to local governments, Break adds.

Tax experts and public officials authored the articles for Courses by Newspaper under the direction of Break, an authority on intergovernmental fiscal relations.

World's Diabetics May Benefit From 'Human Insulin Factories' DUARTE, Calif. (AP) - Scientists said create bacterial factories that could pro-

Wednesday they have used manmade genes to change bacteria into living factories that produce human insulin - an achievement that could greatly benefit the world's 100 million diabetics

The dramatic accomplishment fulfills a hope held out since the early days of recombinant DNA research: a controversial field that deals with the genetic messages, or heredity, of living things.

This would be the first really useful product that has resulted from the re-search." said Dr. Arthur D. Riggs of the City of Hope National Medical Center

Riggs said the tiny factories hold the promise of better and probably cheaper insulin for diabetics, whose lives depend on daily injections of the hormone. But he said more refinements and testing are publicly available. It has not been tested on humans, although researchers are

confident it will work City of Hope researchers collaborated with scientists from Genentech Inc., a private South San Francisco laboratory that funded the project. A spokesman said Genentech has applied for patents on the process, which includes several scientific advances and shortcuts.

The insulin work was built on a foundation laid late last year when City of Hope and the University of California-San Francisco announced they had built an artificial gene that ordered bacteria to produce a much simpler, less valuable, human hormone called somatostatin.

duce virtually any human hormone and many other medically important substances, said Dr. Keiichi Itakura, a molecular biologist at City of Hope

Insulin, a vital hormone that governs the rate at which carbohydrates are burned to supply energy, is normally produced in the pancreas. The world's estimated 100 million diabetics don't produce enough natural insulin and many need regular supplements of insulin, now taken from the pancreas of cattle and

Interviewed before a news conference, the scientists said they created artificial genes that carry the chemical blueprint for human insulin. The genes were inserted into a type of common bacteria called E. coli. a well-studied organism and a favorite of researchers working with DNA. When chemical on-off switches were added to the genes and switched on, the bacteria assembled the components of in-

sulin from their own supply of chemicals. The product, when extracted and purified, is chemically identical to the insulin produced by the human pancreas.

Riggs said the bacterial factories may prove a cheaper source of insulin "but we can't guarantee that. What we can guarantee is that it is a source of human insulin and human insulin has never been available before.

Genentech's David Goeddel said the researchers have billions of the insulin-producing E. coli bacteria suspended in two gallons of solution and they are producing insulin in small quantities.

Before the tiny pharmaceutical factories are actually producing usable quantities of insulin, he said, a large-scale technology must be developed and "it may s to get that designed and

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What can you tell me about photophobia? Is this the same as photosensitivity? I've had eye trouble for a couple of years now and can't get at the cause. My eyes seem extremely sensitive to light. The pain gets almost unbearable and I can't enjoy the sunshine or even daylight anymore. - Mrs. P.S.

Photosensitivity and photophobia are unrelated. Photosensitivity is extreme reaction of the skin to sunlight. Photophobia is sensitivity of the eyes to any kind of light. You have the latter.

Light-skinned people are more prone to the photophobia. It is usually not significant and is corrected by using tinted spectacles or sunglasses when needed. However, unexplained, sudden photophobia such as yours should be investigated. It may represent an internal eye disorder

One thinks of inflammation of the iris (iritis). The iris is the colored portion of the eye that controls the amount of light entering. Bright light constricts the pupil and stretches the iris. If the iris is inflamed, there can be great pain. Inflammation of the cornea may produce similar symptoms. Another possibility: unexplained eye pain of the kind you report

might indicate a budding glaucoma. Otherwise, if you have been examined by a specialist (as you tell me you have) and if these possibilities have been ruled out, you can lay your discomfort to extra sensitivity which can come with age as the eyes require more light to see. Some photophobia can follow cataract remov-

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I'm 62 years old. I'd like to know why I have problems if I don't douche every other day. I have an odor. I have a complete checkup every year. - Mrs. M.S.

It's possible you are overdoing the douching. The natural processes usually are sufficient to cleanse the area without aids. I suggest you at least give them a chance. For other leads see my booklet. or iron) must be pinpointed. If it is an iron-deficiency anemia, then obviously foods rich in iron would be helpful; if of folic acid, then foods rich in that or supplements help. It's important to know if the anemia is caused by inadequate diet or by bleeding (as with women who may have heavy menstrual flow) or because of an error in the way the body utilizes the important blood-forming substances in the diet. Sometimes a woman may appear from tests to be a little anemic just after her period, and be normal the rest of the month

So it's up to you to ask your doctor how serious he considers the test findings and what he recommends in your case.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am 29 years old and have boils, eczema, ringworm, and now acne and blackheads. I do know that tomatoes seem to make the condition worse. I'm hoping you can help me. -

I've never encountered all of these conditions existing side by side, although it is possible. I think you are using terms about which you are not entirely sure. Acne is difficult to treat, but the other conditions you mention can be treated effectively with medicines to attack the specific organisms that cause them. I think you need to consult a skin specialist to find out just which of those terms you are using are appropriate. Tomatoes are a frequent cause of some allergic reactions, so perhaps you should avoid them.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can hair and its strength be improved by using a protein shampoo or rinse? Or can diet alone affect the physical make-up of a person's

To the first question, no. To the sec-

ond, yes, dietary protein can help hair

I went to a stainless steel pots and pans party. The food cooked in the stainless steel was delicious, but I found it hard to

believe everything the salesman said. He told us cooking with aluminum utensils was dangerous - could actually poison you - and he made cast-iron pots sound absolutely horrible.

What I want to know is: If this be true. why are these types of cookware allowed on the market? - Mrs. W. Wold

Sounds to me as if the salesman was handing you a line of hogwash!

While stainless steel pots and pans are fantastic to prepare food in, so are many other types of utensils.

According to the Food and Drug Administration, cookware made of aluminum is perfectly safe. The grayish substance sometimes seen on pots and pans is

In fact, aluminum compounds are even used in food ingredients with no ill effects at all!

Cast-iron pots and pans have been around for generations and I'm told the iron absorbed into foods while cooking is actually beneficial.

Of course, the cast iron needs to be kept seasoned, otherwise some foods may turn dark and unappealing-looking when cooked in them, but it's not going to hurt you.

And while we're on the subject of utensil safety, let's talk about some other





Witness In Davis Case Receives New Identity

DALLAS (AP) - The state's key witness in the Cullen Davis murder-for-hire case has been given a new identity and he and his family were relocated as part of the Federal Witness Protection Program.

Charles David McCrory. his wife and two children were moved to "parts unknown." said U.S. Marshal Clint Peoples.

McCrory is Davis' chief accuser, claiming the millionaire industrialist paid him to find someone to kill the judge in the Davis divorce case as well as several oth-

McCrory instead contacted the FBI. which tape-recorded and videotaped meetings between McCrory and Davis.

Davis, charged by the state with solicitation of capital murder and possession of a prohibited weapon, is being held without bond in the Tarrant County jail at Fort Worth following a lengthy bond hearing concluded last week.

Davis was acquitted in November 1977 in the state's longest murder trial.

He was accused of killing his stepdaughter. Andrea Wilborn, at his palatial Fort Worth mansion in August 1976. His estranged wife. Priscilla. was wounded.

and her lover. Stan Farr, was killed. Peoples said McCrory asked the U.S. attorney's office in Fort Worth for the protection, and the request was approved by the Justice Department.

One of Davis' defense lawyers. Steve Sumner, said he believes federal officials were "conned" by McCrory

"I hate to blast the federal government too severely." Sumner said. "The fact that the federal government is taking him at his word and extending the taxpaver's dollars on the unsubstantiated testimony of this witness is incredible to me.

Under the program, a witness in a federal or state case can be given an new identity, relocated and given federal assistance in finding a new home and job.

He remains under protection by the U.S. marshal's service until it can be determined he no longer needs protection.

Census Inaccuracy Costing Hispanics?

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Hispanics must Hispanic neighborhood and be correctly counted in the 1980 census or the population. they'll lose millions of federal dollars, just as they have since being undercounted in 1970, the head of the nation's largest Hispanic job training agency said Wednesday.

"The 1970 census undercounted the Hispanic community by at least 3 million people." said Ricardo Zazueta, national director of Service. Employment Redevelopment Jobs For Progress Inc. That figure, he said, was an estimate reached after national studies.

"As we rapidly approach the 1980 census. it is absolutely essential that we be accurately and systematically counted." he told national directors of the agency

Hog Hotels' Aid Mart Stability

WASHINGTON (AP) - The market impact of huge "hog hotels" built in recent years may explain some of the confusion in pork-industry forecasting this year, a new Agriculture Department analysis indicates.

It suggests that mass production may be bringing unheralded stability to the industry, with small changes in the market replacing the more drastic ones of the past.

The department's forecasters have not had one of their best years in predicting the rise and fall of pork supplies and prices, the main counterweight to cattle and beef market activity at any given

Judging from recent articles in their magazines, their analyst partners are digging in to find out why the usual signs related to weather, seasons, markets for other meats and feed prices - might no longer be a solid basis for good forecasts.

The current Livestock and Meat Situation report, for example, says that the increasing number of hogs produced in "total confinement facilities" makes the market more rigid.

Larger operations cannot respond as quickly to changing economic conditions, the analysis said.

As many as one-third of all the hogs moving to slaughter in the United States may come from the total-confinement sheds, enterprises that generally turn out more than 5,000 hogs a year, the department said.

The most recent detailed data on farming is four years old but it already showed that operations with sales of 1,000 hogs or more accounted for 2 percent of all hog farms but 25 percent of the hogs.

In 1964, such enterprises accounted for 0.5 percent of the 8 percent of the hogs and pigs. The number of hog operations

"As new and-or larger operations go into business, facilities are almost always of the confinement type," the article said.

Since the animals aren't exposed to the weather, losses from it cannot be a factor. As weather becomes less important as a forecasting tool, so do the seasons, the analysts said:

For example, combination grain and livestock farms traditionally have hogs in the pasture in spring and fall to comple-

Farrowing also has been traditionally tied to the seasons, with almost 50 percent of the sow farrowings in 1950 occurring in the March-May quarter of the year. Last year, 25 percent came in that period, the article said.

Public Opinion Shifts On Defense Balance

Against a background of heightened tensions between the United States and the Soviet Union, a 61-31 percent majority of Americans continues to feel that this country's military defense system is as strong or stronger than that of the Russians. Back in 1976, a slightly higher 64-27 percent felt this way.

There is evidence, however, that the number of people who think it is necessary for America to have a stronger military defense system than the Russians has declined in the last few years. In 1976, 48 percent felt it was necessary for U.S. forces to be more powerful. Now, 43 percent hold this view. During the same period, there has been a rise in the number who opt for military parity with the Russians, up from 42 to 45 percent.

Of course, there are sharp differences among various groups as to how strong our-defenses should be:

-On a regional basis, both the South and the East tend to feel that we must make our defense system stronger than that of the Russians. The Midwest and

West reject this idea, clearly preferring that we achieve a standoff.

Older people feel quite strongly that we should have superiority over the Soviets, while young people feel that military parity between the world's superpowers will suffice

-Those with less education tend to want a stronger U.S. defense system, while the college educated clearly feel that parity will do.

-Conservatives firmly opt for U.S. military superiority over the Russians, while middle-of-the-roaders and liberals prefer to see the United States on an

These findings from a recent Harris Survey of 1,500 adults natioinwide help. explain why the public is overwhelmingly in favor of the SALT talks, hoping for an agreement on arms limitation. People seem to feel that military parity will foster stable relations between the United States and Russia, whereas superiority on the part of one side or the other will lead to an environment in which peace will be more difficult to maintain. They also sense that both the United

States and the Soviet Union are now capable of wiping each other out with the

arms they have.

Despite these reservations about the necessity for U.S. military superiority over the Russians, there has been a perceptible movement of public opinion against cutting funds for defense. Back in 1971, while we were still involved in Vietnam: 44 percent of the public wanted to decrease defense spending, while only 10 percent wanted to increase it. However, this now has been reverse with only 18 percent who want defense expenditures cut, while 36 percent wanted in increased. The largest group, 41 percent, wants to keep defense spending at the same levels as before.

one of the problems the defense establishment has in justifying any sharp rise in spending is that 62 percent of the public is convinced that there is a lot of waste in U.S. defense spending. Nonetheless, the public fears that inadequate funding might put us behind the Russians.

Not wanting to run that risk, they vote against a cut in defense spending.

The Soviet Union scoffed at the Camp David Mideast summit Wednesday, calling it "the Camp David trick."

The official news agency Tass accused the United States of trying "to throw all of its weight" into bringing about a Middle East settlement that only would be advantageous to itself.

The talks at Camp David in the Maryland mountains bring together President Carter, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem

Tass charged that the United States with pursuing "selfish interests of a military character ensuring a strengthening of U.S. control over the Middle East and its oil arteries."

Tass also charged that the summit would be used by the Israeli leadership as a cover to joining the NATO military alliance. The 13-member alliance, of which the United States is a member, is the Western equivalent of the Soviet-dominated Warsaw Pact.

Syrian President Hafez Assad said in Beirut that the summit might produce an agreement to end the war between Egypt and Israel, but it would have to be an agreement that met with Syrian approv-

In a speech to Syrian troops on the Golan Heights, Assad warned that Syria, Isreal's militant neighbor, could "undermine any line of Middle Eastern policy it does not approve ... although it might not be capable at this stage of imposing its own policy line."

A Syrian government source in Damascus said the government is trying to convene a summit of hardline Arab leaders on Sept. 20 after the summit talks are

The source said Damascus is still awaiting word of acceptance from Libya and South Yemen, two of four states aligned With the Paiestine Liberation Organization and Algeria to counter Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's peace initiative.

A senior Syrian official and a top PLO official both said the U.S.-sponsored talks can not succeed in obtaining justice for the Arabs and therefore were being rejected in advance.
