## Disaster Program Checks Add 'Shot In Arm' To Economy

Trudi Lewis, aide to Congressman Larry Combest, in Washington, D.C., notified The Journal by telephone Tuesday morning of the approval of HB1157, concerning the disaster

payments currently being mailed to farmers and ranchers.

Ms. Lewis said the Disaster Program has been allowed \$400 million to pay for weather related disasters with crops, but over \$400 million in claims were submitted, resulting in a shortfall. Initial payments were less than \$1 for each \$1 of loss, with early predictions being as little as \$.04 on \$1.

However, 73.9 percent of the loss was approved, and farmers were approved for payment by their county ASC offices. The payments were already being made, when Congressman Combest asked for 100 percent payment, and made the proposal a part of HB1157.

With the approval of the 100 percent payment, farmers will be receiving an additional payment of 26.1 percent in the near future.

Danny Noble, executive di-

rector of the Bailey County ASC office, said his clerks were in the process of sending out \$3,347,705.25 of the slightly more than \$6 million in claims initially filed. These payments

## Texas Tech Recruiter At Rotary

Dr. Jack McNeill introduced Taylor McNeil, recruiting coordinator for Texas Tech University's Athletic Department, as speaker for the Muleshoe Rotary Tuesday at noon.

McNeill gave highlights of Tech's athletic programs, and specially discussed the new indoor sport facility on the University campus.

"We are very proud of our new indoor facility," said McNeill. A track meeting was held in the facility last weekend and McNeill said up to the TT meet, only three relay teams had qualified for national competition; however, four relay teams qualified on Tech's new indoor track last weekend, some setting new school records.

Included in the facility are a driving range for golf; a batting practice set-up; weight room; four full size tennis courts and a basketball court.

McNeill explained the recruiting program at Texas Tech and how it was determined what players needed to contract, and offer scholarships. This past

## Bailey County History Book Has Started

"We WANT the history of your family-whether you have lived in Muleshoe five months or fifty years," say the Jennyslippers, coordinators of the Bailey County History book that is underway here.

They are seeking family stories to be included in the book, along with stories about schools, businesses, churches and organizations.

All the Jennyslippers ask is that you keep your family story to 500 words, or include 10 cents for each word over the 500-word limit. You may include one family photograph, personal or family. For more pictures, there is a \$20 charge for additional pictures.

The Jennyslippers ask that you type your story, if possible, and if not, they will type it for you. Typed stories are asked to be double-spaced, with an inch margin around the page. You are also asked to submit two copies.

Now - to purchasing a book. They are available at \$55 each, plus \$3 if the book is to be mailed to you or for you to someone else. This can be paid at one time, or can be paid in three installments. You can make a down payment of \$20 per book, an additional payment of \$20 per book in three months, and the balance on check payable to Bailey County History Book, and mail it to Muleshoe Public Library, 322 West Second St., Muleshoe, Tx 79347.

## Crop Insurance Tied To Future FmHa Loans

Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHa) for 1987 losses will have crop insurance if it is available, FmHa State Director, J. Lynn Futch said this week.

"All family-size farmers should be aware that a newly-effective provision of the 1985 farm bill prohibits our making emergency loans for crop losses that could have been insured under the multiple-peril crop insurance programs as sponsored by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC)," said Futch.

"Therefore, I urge every family-size farmer in the State of Texas to seriously take into account this new relationship between insurance coverage and emergency-loan eligibility."

Federally-subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is now available for all wheat, corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, upland cotton and rice, plus an additional 25 specialty crops in most growing areas. The government subsidy reduces the program cost by about 50 percent, Futch said, making crop insurance a worthwhile option to consider regardless of the newly-required tie-in with emergency loan eligibility.

If a farmer obtains the insurance required, and if the value of the crop loss is still 30 percent or more after the insurance payment, the operation will be eligible for consideration for an emergency loan.

Effective in January, the new requirement will affect crops planted in 1987, and thus will not affect winter wheat or other winter-seeded crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987. Insurance must be multiple-peril, covering most farms of disaster, rather than hail only.

Closing date for insurance sales on spring-planted crops in the State of Texas are varied. Closing date for insurance sales

in the coastal and South Texas areas was February 15; East Texas and Blackland areas is March 31st; and the Rolling Plains and High Plains areas is April 15. Because of these dates

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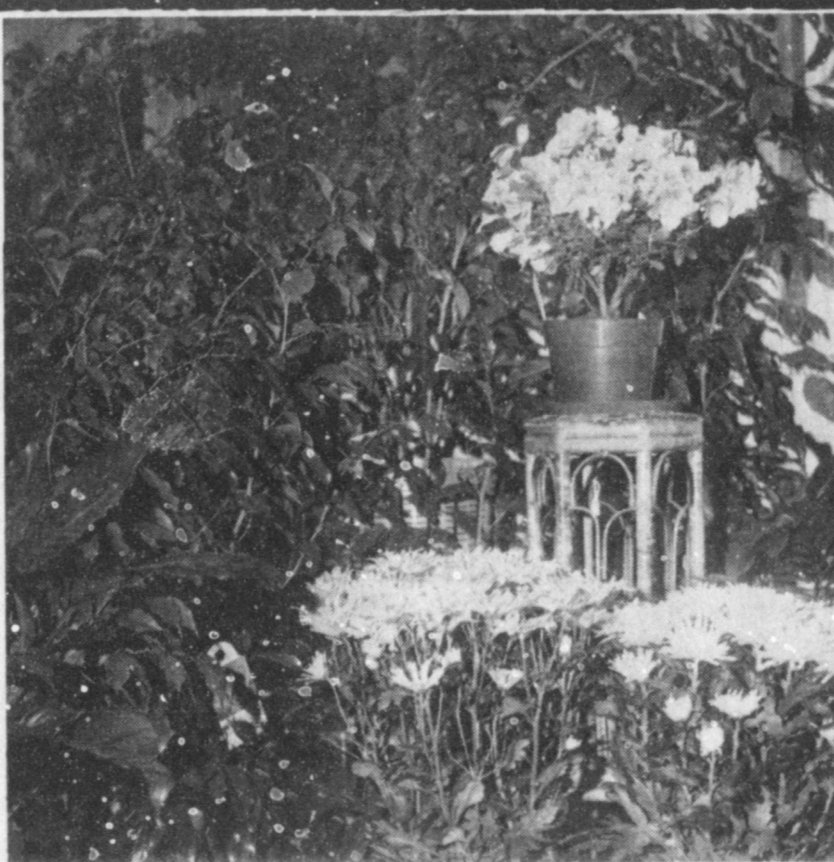

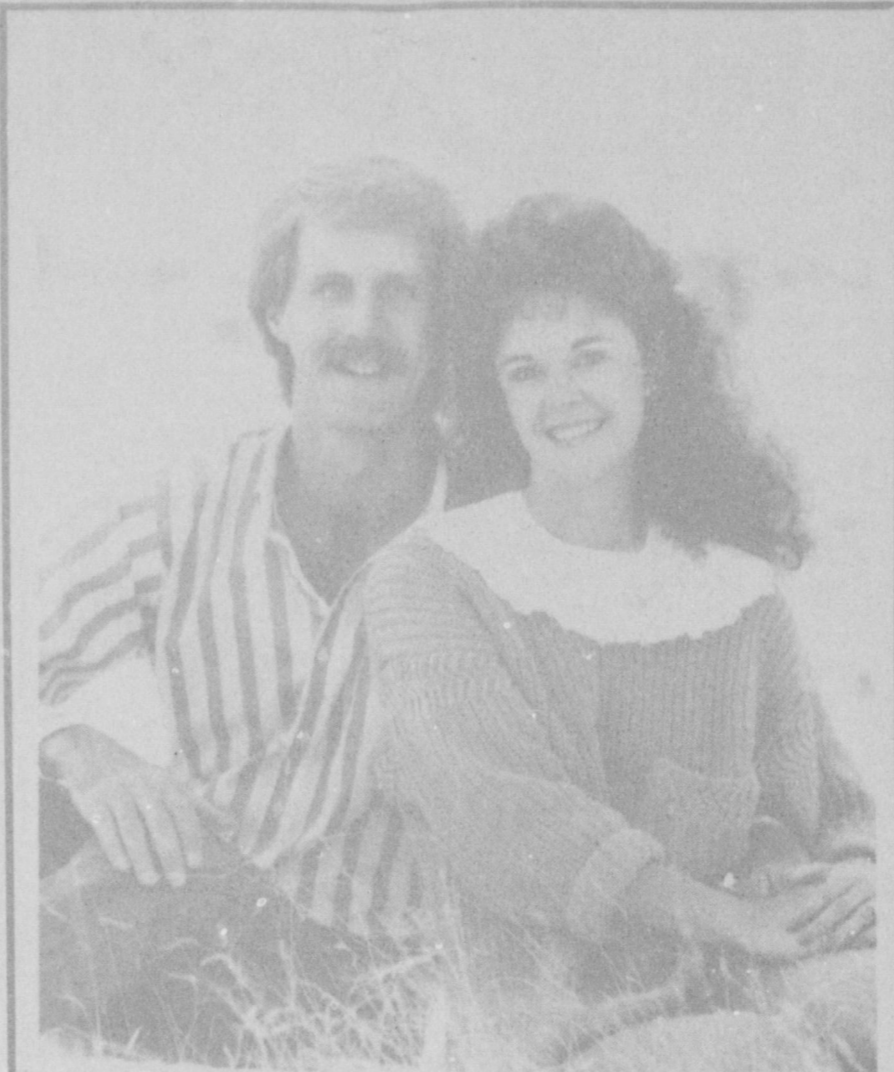
At the airport gusts were officially recorded of up to 68 miles per hour during the day, with minor damage at the airport.

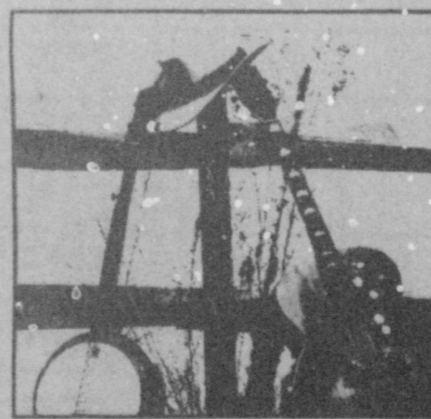

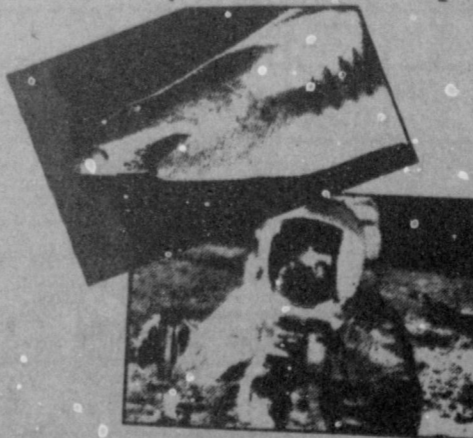

Information on glass etching, cooking with brown rice and using convenience foods with pasta will be presented on Creative Living on Tuesday, March 3 at 12 noon and repeated on Saturday, March 7 at 2:00 pm on KENW-TV. All times are mountain.

Betty Neal, a homemaker from Arch, NM will demonstrate how easy it is to do glass etching. She will show how to make some beautiful glass pieces even prettier by making etchings on them.

Brown rice is the whole grain rice from which only the inedible hulls have been removed. It is not polished, and therefore, it retains a natural coating of bran. Amy Lloyd, home economist with the Rice Council in Houston, TX will demonstrate the versatility of brown rice by preparing a very different dish--vegetable pancakes, and it's a good way to incorporate a meatless meal in your menu.

Convenience foods can make meal preparation much more fun and really cut down on the time involved. Convenience favors everyone when pasta is concerned. Mari Lou Callahan is a home economist with the Hershey Foods Corp., and she will demonstrate three different foods that all come from ingredients that are in the pantry or in the refrigerator. Ms. Callahan is from Hershey, PA.

On Tuesday, March 3 at 9:30 pm, Creative Living will feature information from Deborah Durham, spokesperson for Bold-3, on tips for zipping through laundry and caring for clothes. As the cost of clothing continues to soar, prolonging the life of a wardrobe takes on added significance. Deborah is from New York.

Konnie Moyers, Marketing Home Economist with Southwestern Public Service Co., in Clovis will demonstrate some ideal candy recipes for use in the microwave oven.

we can make baby's feasts from family meals by using the blender.

Microwave "Fried" Fish

- 1/4 cup cornflake crumbs
- 1 Tbsp. chopped fresh parsley

Microwave on HIGH power 2 to 3 minutes more or until fish turns opaque and just begins to flake when a fork is inserted in thickest part. Serves 4.

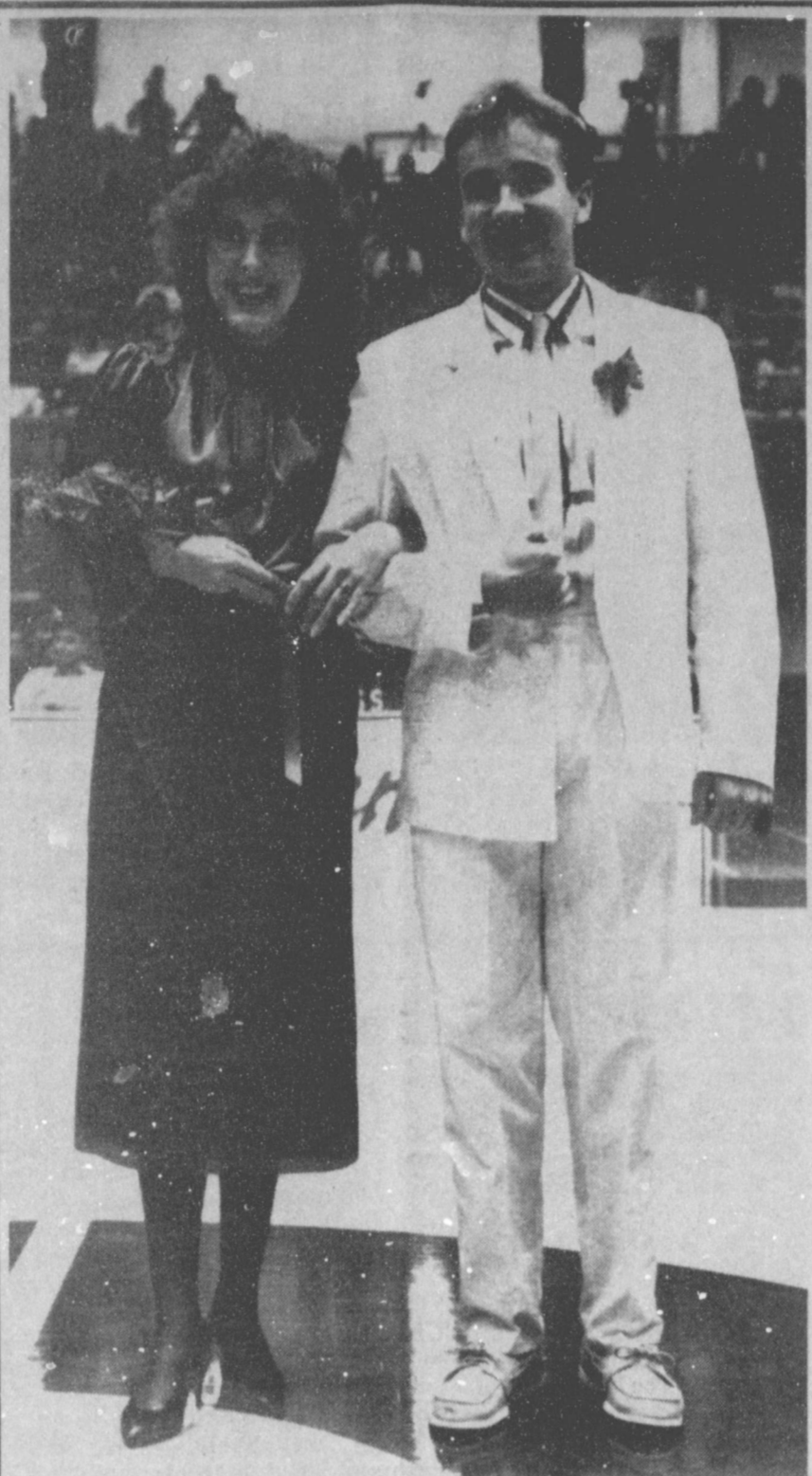

are going to 1164 Bailey County farmers and ranchers.

In Parmer County, Martin Chandler, ASC executive director, said they are in the process of distributing \$2,443,000 to 939 producers, which he says comprises one-third of that county's farmers.

Lamb County's ASC executive director, Jim McGehee, said they applied for a little more than \$6 million in disaster payments for 1500 farmers, and were approved for some \$4,400,000.

Each of the ASC directors contacted said they were 'pleasantly surprised' at the 73.9 percent payments as they had expected less than 10 cents on the dollar. They also said the several million being pumped into this area is a definite 'shot in the arm' for area economy.

They were unanimous in saying the payments are making a lot of difference in whether or not many, many farmers would be operating this year.

Payments from Bailey County have been going out in the mail since last Thursday, and many farmers have already received their payment. However, this is not over, as they should be receiving additional payments, with approval of HB1157.

McGehee said Lamb County did not bid all their eligible land for the Conservation Reserve Program, lacking some 40-50,000 acres. He did expect additional acreage to be bid into the CRP program in future bids.

In Parmer County, Chandler said they still had 100,000 acres eligible to be bid into CRP, and the latest sign-up only produced

some 30,000 acres bid. Chandler said a few thousand more acres may be bid in sign-ups during this year.

Bailey County exceeded their total 100,000 acres, and although the bids were sent to Washington, D.C. on Monday, local businesses had turned down a bid to add more acres. Results from Washington, and acceptance of bids will not be known for several days, says Noble.

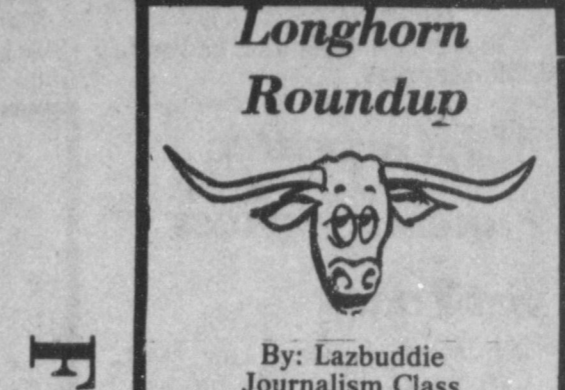

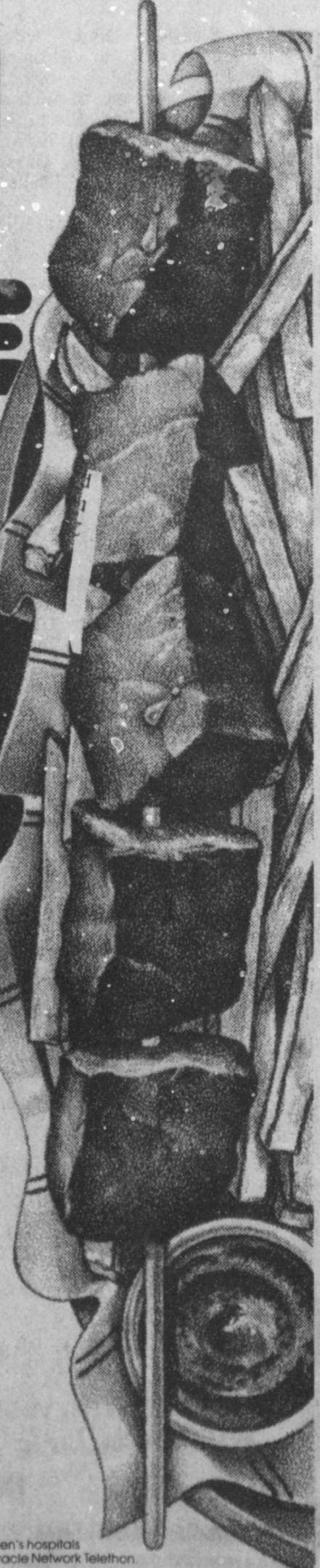
