of the Muleshoe area. of the Muleshoe area. "The Hospital was closed by The facility is licensed by the State of Texas with that license expiring one year from the date of closure. If the Hospital is still closed as of November 12, 1987 ,
the facility will require substantial capital improvements in order to be reopened, including, but not limited to, the installa-
tion of a sprinkler system tion of a sprinkler system
throughout. "The expiration of the one year grace period would, in
essence, place the Hospital, from a licensing perspective, in the position of a brand new, rather than existing facility. struction requirements that have occurred in the 10 years since the hospital was opened in June
of 1977, would have to be of 1977, would have to be
complied with prior to relicencompli
sing.
