West Plains Hospital Will Re-Open November 10

Volunteers Clean; Repair Entire Hospital Facilities

West Plains Medical Center, the only hospital in Muleshoe, was closed, and the doors locked on November 13, 1986. After less than two years of operation of the hospital, Westworld Community Healthcare,

Inc., home-based in California, and now undergoing bankruptcy procedures, closed down the hospitals they operated in Texas and other states.

For the next seven months, members of the original Board of Directors of West Plains Medical Center, Inc. worked to regain control of the hospital from Westworld.

This was accomplished after much legal hassle early in June of this year.

The Board of Directors then started checking into methods of re-opening the hospital, and obtaining financing for the hospital under local control.

Coming upon a deadline, it has been determined to open the hospital on November 10, if possible.

The Board of Directors has issued the following statement, through their president, Jim Burgess.

'The Board of Directors of West Plains Medical Center, Inc., have as their goal the opening and continued operation of our local hospital for the benefit of and use by residents of the Muleshoe area.

'The Hospital was closed by Westworld, November 13, 1986. The facility is licensed by the State of Texas with that license expiring one year from the date of closure. If the Hospital is still closed as of November 12, 1987, the facility will require substantial capital improvements in order to be reopened, including, but not limited to, the installation of a sprinkler system throughout.

'The expiration of the one year grace period would, in essence, place the Hospital, from a licensing perspective, in the position of a brand new, rather than existing facility. Changes in state-mandated construction requirements that have occurred in the 10 years since the hospital was opened in June of 1977, would have to be complied with prior to relicensing.

In an attempt to reduce the cost of reopening the facility by taking advantage of the one year grace period in the state license, the West Plains Medical Center Board of Directors

Area Towns Coordinate Disaster Drill Monday

Area residents should be pleased, and rest better, knowing that super efficient emergency personnel appear to be well-prepared to handle an emergency, or disaster, in this area.

This was proven late Monday afternoon, following a simulated plane and two car collision at the Muleshoe Airport, with the first report going in at 6:45 p.m.

The drill ultimately involved all local police, ambulance personnel, and the Muleshoe Fire Department. Included in actively participating in the drill were the Sudan Fire Department and ambulance service; hospitals at Amherst and Littlefield; the Flight For Life Air Ambulance from St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock and the Texas Department of Public Health, as well as Dr. Bruce Purdy, and various news media.

The initial call went in to the Muleshoe Police Department from a local citizen, who called the emergency in on his pickup telephone. The dispatcher on duty, Martina Valdez, immediately notified the Bailey County Ambulance Service and the local officers.

This was followed by a call for the Muleshoe Fire Department to respond with the 'Jaws of Life' and calls went out to Sudan for help from their Fire Department and an additional

take on the awesome Littlefield Wildcats. At this point in the season, with seven games behind, the Wildcats are undefeated and untied; while the Mules have had three losses, and are 4-3 for the season and 0-2 in district play.

Last year, when the Mules and Wildcats tangled on the field, the 'Cats downed the Mules, 28-6.

With quarterback Jeff Hicks out for the season; as well as Sergio Gonzalez, the Mules are relying on QB Johnny Garcia, along with some possible relief, such as Ronnie Perez. Garcia had a pre-season injury that has kept him out of the starting line-up, for the most part, since the season began.

To date, the Mules have accumulated 181 points in their four wins, while holding their opponents to a total of 81 points, with most of these coming in the last two games.

The Mules have 307 rushes for 1,510 yards to their opponents' 268 rushes for 745 total yards.

In passing, the Mules have completed 32-110 for 385 yards and their opposition has completed 30-92 for 375 yards.

In punts, the Mules have punted 28 times for 855 yards and their opponents have punted 39 times for 1,168 yards.

The Mules lead decisively in the first down department, with a total of 96. They break down to 76 rushing, 15 passing and five through penalties. Their opponents have a total of 69 first downs; 53 rushing, 10 passing and six through penalties.

MYTHS ABOUT MENTAL HEALTH AND AGING--Old age isn't a mental illness. Yet, if you believe many of the common myths about aging, it would certainly appear to be so. "It's true that if you count the number of adults who are mentally ill and grow old, the rates of mental disorders will rise steadily and peak in the oldest age group," notes Warren. "However, when the one-

year rates of new episodes of mental illness are counted, the rates are lowest after age 65."

AUSTIN—Chief Justice John Hill stunned a Capitol press conference last week by announcing he will quit the Texas Supreme Court to return to private practice and crusade for an appointed court.

While the move kindled speculation that Hill is preparing to run for governor in 1990, it also paves the way for Gov. Bill Clements to appoint the first Republican to that post in modern times.

But Hill denied he would ever seek office again. With half of his six-year term over, he is the lone voice on the court for the appointment system, which has put him at odds with the other justices at least on that issue.

The name which immediately surfaced as a possible successor is Roy Barrera Jr., the San Antonio judge who ran as a Republican in '86 and almost upset Attorney General Jim Mattox. A name offered by Mexican-American Democrats is Brownsville Sen. Hector Uribe.

Mattox, Bishops Agree

Mattox was busy last week hammering out the final details of an agreement with the panel of bishops which investigated the SMU football scandal.

They announced the court-approved agreement will allow Mattox's team to examine the bishops' records of their probe with the information to be kept secret unless it is disclosed in the court of resultant judicial proceedings.

Mattox is looking at whether any charitable trust funds were mishandled.

Texans Listed

The federal task force examining the Texas savings and loan industry for insolvency added more than 100 names to its subpoena list, including State Savings and Loan Commissioner L. Linton Bowman, former Gov. John Connally and former Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes.

The Barnes and Connally partnership had multimillion dollar loans from two failed thrifts in Dallas. Barnes praised the probe.

Commissioner Bowman said he has no lending or financial ties to any state chartered S&L, but has a real estate partnership with a former officer of a failed thrift.

State Borrowing

Texas Treasurer Ann Richards last week arranged for state government to borrow \$1.25 billion from private investors through cash management notes.

The borrowing, which will cost tax payers about \$65 million in finance charges, will get the state through a short-fall without

interruption of services.

Richards, who with Land Commissioner Garry Mauro was catapulted to the top of "possibles" when popular San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros dropped out of the 1990 gubernatorial race, said she hasn't decided whether she will make that race.

Mauro, meanwhile, told critics the award of an \$18 million contract for veteran loans in 1984 to a top Democratic fundraiser was also supported by the Republican member of the Veterans Land Board, Jack Rains, now Secretary of State.

Shortly after Mauro surfaced as a gubernatorial possibility, he drew heat for giving the contract to administer the veterans housing loan program to a company which later lent him money for real estate transactions.

Mauro denied any impropriety, and said the company was the only bidder, although the contract was put out for competitive bid three times.

Texas Oyster Bays

Texas oyster bays were closed last week and could stay idle for up to a year to replenish oyster populations.

Texas Parks & Wildlife commissioners approved the ban following evidence that some oyster beds may have dropped off by as much as 80 percent in productivity because of unusually heavy rains and last summer's red tide, a rust-colored microorganism.

Some predict oyster prices will rise substantially because of poor harvests in other states.

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
