

This was proven late Monday afternoon, following a simulated plane and two car collision at the Muleshoe Airport, with the first report going in at 6:45 p.m.

The drill ulitmately involved all local police, ambulance personnel, and the Muleshoe Fire Department. Included in actively participating in the drill were the Sudan Fire Department and ambulance service; hospitals at Amherst and Littlefield; the Flight For Life Air Ambulance from St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock and the Texas Department of Public Health, as well as Dr. Bruce Purdy, and various news media.

The initial call went in to the Muleshoe Police Department from a local citizen, who called the emergency in on his pickup telephone. The dispatcher on duty, Martina Valdez, mediately notified the Bailey County Ambulance Service and the local officers.

This was followed by a call for the Muleshoe Fire Department to respond with the 'Jaws of Life' and calls went out to Sudan for help from their Fire Department and an additional



### Area Still Recovering From Economics 'Slump'

State Comptroller Bob Bullock last last week sent checks totaling \$55.3 million in local sales tax to 904 cities levying the one-percent city tax. According to Bullock, this year's payments are down by 5.5 percent overall compared to payments made by October last

Muleshoe is still showing a decline in sales tax revenues, down by 7.05 for the latest report, when compared to receipts at the same time a year ago. They received \$15,448.40, compared to the \$16,838.46 received a year ago. Yearly total to date is \$154,221.10 and was \$165,924.73 for October last

In Cochran County, Morton shows a decline of 9.05 percent for the year, with current yearly total of \$39,314.09, \$43,225.46 for the same period a year ago. Their current payment was \$4,241.92, compared to \$3,175.47 a year ago.

Littlefield is down by only 2.05 percent for the year, with a current payment of \$17,084.51, compared to \$15,499.72 at this time a year ago. Their current total for the year is \$198,127.63, and was \$202,264.27 through October last year.

Friona is showing the best figures of the area, being only 1.03 percent down from sales tax receipts a year ago. Their current total is \$86,026.65, and was \$86,919.15 at this time last year. Their most recent payment was \$7,408.46, up from the \$6,511.52 in October, 1986.

Houston's check was the largest -- \$8.6 million -bringing total payments in 1987 to \$108.6 million, down 6.9 percent from last year. Dallas' payment was \$6.1 million for a 1987 total of \$80.4 million, a seven percent decrease from

San Antonio's payment of, \$3.3 million pushed payments for 1987 to \$43.3 million, down six percent. Austin's check for \$2.4 million brought total payments this year to \$31 million, a

9.6 percent decrease from 1986. Fort Worth received \$2 million for a total of \$26.1 million in 1987, down 7.8 percent. El Paso's payment is \$1.5 million brought its 1987 total to \$18.4

### **HPWD Says** To Plug **Old Wells**

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 maintains an open hole program to plug abandoned wells in an attempt to avoid accidents like the one in Midland where 18-month-old Jessica McClure fell 20 feet into an uncovered water well.

While Midland is not in the High Plains Water District's service area, there have been two such accidents reported in the Water District since 1951. Luckily, both children involved emerged unharmed.

HPWD strongly urged anyone who may have an abandoned well on their property to make sure it is properly covered. In many cases uncovered or improperly covered wells may have been abandoned for some time or forgotten.

Open well holes pose a danger to humans and animals alike. Open holes can also provide a district route for pollution to enter the Ogallala Aquifer, which supplies domestic, municipal, industrial and irrigation water to much of the High Plains.

Both state law and High Plains Water District rules require abandoned wells to be properly covered at all times.



When making a candy for the first time, check the mixture after the minimum time or even before minimum if you are not sure. It is easy to add more time, but impossible to subtract from burned.

FAST FUDGE

% cup evaporated milk, 1% cups sugar, 2 cups miniature marshmallows, 2 cups semisweet chocolate chips, 1 teaspoon vanilla and ½ cup nuts, chopped

Grease 9x9-inch square pan. Mix milk and sugar in 2-quart glass batter bowl. Microwave 3 minutes on medium-high; stir. Microwave 3 more minutes on medium-high or until it boils for 1 minute. Stir in marshmallows, chocolate chips, vanilla and nuts until melted. Pour into pan. Refrigerate until firm.

VELVEETA CHEESE FUDGE
1 box (8 ozs.) Velveet

1 box (8 ozs.) Velveeta cheese, 1 cup butter, 2 pounds powdered sugar, ½ cup cocoa, 2 teaspoons vanilla and 1 cup nuts, chopped


Melt cheese and butter in a large bowl in the microwave for 1½ minutes on high power. Gradually add powdered sugar and cocoa and mix well. Mix in vanilla and nuts. Pat into a greased 13x9x2-inch pan and chill.

### MICRO-BRITTLE

1 cup raw peanuts, 1 cup sugar, ½ cup white corn syrup, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon baking soda and 1 teaspoon vanilla

Stir together nuts, sugar, syrup, and salt in a 11/2-quart casserole or 4-cup glass measure. Place in microwave oven and cook 7 to 8 minutes on high, stirring well after 4 minutes. Add butter and blend well. Return to oven and cook approximately 2 to 3 minutes more on high or until nuts are golden brown. Add baking soda and vanilla and gently stir until light and foamy. Pour onto greased cookie sheet and let cool. When cool, break into pieces and store in airtight

NOTE: If using nuts other than raw peanuts, stir nuts in after first 4 minutes of cooking.



trances to the airport to everyone except emergency personnel, who arrived in vehicle after vehicle with lights flashing and sirens screaming

Paramedics and EMT's started checking the 11 victims, working first on those who exhibited the most serious injuries. The realistic injuries, including one young victim whose right arm was severed, had been 'made-up' to play their parts prior to the simulated accident.

They found the 'pilot' of the plane, a little away from the two vehicles, a smashed station wagon and an overturned car. The pilot was partially under the plane, and victims were trapped in the overturned car and smashed station wagon.

Firemen arrived and set up hoses as other firemen got the Jaws of Life ready to cut the victims from the vehicles.

At one point, five ambulances were backed up, doors open, waiting to transport the victims to hospitals at Amherst and Littlfield.

Observing the drill were Roger Mitchell, Lubbock, who is area supervisor for the Texas Department of Health, who oversees emergency personnel; and Dr. Bruce Purdy, who observed the entire operation, and was to be addressing a joint meeting of the Bailey County Ambulance Service and Muleshoe Fire Department on Wednesday night.

The Flight For Life helicopter was summoned from Lubbock and responded in 24 minutes. They landed on a portion of runway which was lighted from four vehicles in a 'plus' shape, forming a landing pad for the helicopter in the darkness.

Ironically enough, the drill, which was to have been conducted at 6:15 p.m. was delayed for 30 minutes as the Flight For Life was on a real call -- responding to pick up the victim of an airplane crash near

Lockney, from the hospital at Floydada. The drill was delayed until the 'real' call could be completed. In reality, the 'victim' transported by the Flight for Life was Bill Holland, chief flight nurse on the emergency helicopter.

of the crashed plane. Some of the victims were actually transported to hospitals, with some going to South Plains Hospital at Amherst and the others being taken to the hospital at Littlefield.

He played the part of the pilot

Within one hour, all the victims had been cut from the vehicles, received emergency treatment at the scene, lined up on tarps waiting for transfer, and loaded into ambulances and removed from the accident scene.

Mitchell, who critiques emergency drills, said he was highly impressed with the entire operation, and was very complimentary of all the actions of the Bailey County Ambulance Service and said the Muleshoe Fire Department was one of the best he had ever watched in opera-

One ambulance was not used in the drill, it was held back in case of a 'real' emergency before the other ambulances could be returned from the out of town hospitals; and one ambulance was held in Sudan for the same purpose. The fire department van was loaded with two 'victims' who were transported to the hospital in Amherst.

After the drill was completed, and debris, such as wrappings from bandages, lose emergency equipment and other items were picked up, the emergency personnel who had stayed behind went to the ambulance building

to view the videos made of the drill and some discussion of the

Richelle Watkins, director of the Bailey County Ambulance Service, said she was pleased with the overall success of the drill, and said she wished to thank all the emergency personnel who participated.

### Senator Duo Visit Tuesday At Depot

Cars break down, but so do planes. Two Texas Senators due in Muleshoe at 1 p.m. Tuesday, found themselves delayed -because their plane wouldn't start -- at Littlefield.

So. Sen. Bill Sarpalius, Amarillo: and Sen. Chet Edwards, Duncanville, borrowed a car and drove to Muleshoe.

Co-sponsors of Proposition 19, concerning the Super Collider, the duo are 'stumping' around the district, attempting to stir up support for the Amendment which will be on the November 3 ballot. They are advocating that a strong turnout to vote positively for the ballot could help bring the SSC to Texas.

They say this will mean 14,500 new jobs; with 4,500 being involved in the construction of the massive project; and 2,500 permanent employees.

An additional \$1 billion would be added to the state's economy they added; saying it would mean, if it comes to the Panhandle, in the Dimmitt/Happy area, it would mean that both West Texas State University, Canyon and Texas Tech University, Lubbock, would become High Tech universities.

Each and every college and university in the state would benefit, they said.

According to the two senators, some 500-1000 of the leading scientists in the world would be at the SSC conducting experiments.

Some of the things that could be created, they added, were a new, high tech x-ray for the medical profession; a razor blade that could shave 100 times without replacing; a battery the size of a flashlight battery operating cars; batteries operating buildings, homes and irrigation wells.

Other benefits, say the Senators, would be various support industries that would move to the location of the SSC, or in the area, and they say that could include the Muleshoe area, especially if the SSC is constructed in the Panhandle.

"This is a once in a lifetime opportunity," said Sen. Sarpalius. "If we miss out on this one, we will never have the opportunity to obtain something this

big again."

They both emphasized that for every dollar spent, Texas will get back \$12 in federal funds. "And, we won't have to spend a dime unless we get the project," reminded Sen. Sarpalius. "I believe we need to be looking at other areas in Texas than agriculture. And, this is a perfect opportunity for us."

Sen. Edwards said Texas is one of the three to five states being considered for the SSC, and a location in the Dimmitt area, along with an area in the Waxahachie vicinity, are the only two locations where the SSC may be constructed in Texas.

The level Plains area is definitely a positive factor when authorities start looking for a location, added Sen. Edwards.

He said this is the largest

project, other than NASA, to ever be undertaken by the federal government.

He also said Texas is 50th out of the 50 states receiving back dollars sent to Washington.

It is estimated that the vote will only bring out approximately 12 percent of the registered voters statewide, as no major candidates will be on the ballots, and in some places, the amendments and referendums will be the only items on the ballots.

"Just a handful of voters can make a difference," said Sen. Edwards. "We hope you will get out, spread the word, and help us pass this major project. Larry Meyers, a Muleshoe native, has worked very hard from Washington to help Texas be selected as the site for the SSC. The voters here can help, by getting out and voting."

know, is located in Worcester, Massachusetts, and Northern Michigan University is in Marquette, Michigan. They may be a few miles apart, but they have one thing in common - outstanding football teams. Holy Cross is in Division 1-AA which is just a shade below Division 1-A, and Northern Michigan is in Division II. However, both teams have been consistently beating up on all opposition. Holy Cross whipped Army at the start of the season 34-24, and has gone on to annihilate Lafayette (40-11), Leigh (63-6), Colgate (49-7) and Dartmouth (62-23). The wildcats from Northern Michigan have roared by Michigan Tech, powerhouse North Dakota State, Hillsdale, Northeast Missouri, Ferris, and Northwood. They will be favored this Saturday over Saginaw Valley, and the Holy Cross Crusaders will storm by Brown. football teams.

With the passage of House Bill 72, three graduation plans were established by the state for high school graduation. The first plan is known as the "General Plan" or referred to as the "High School Program." The second is called the "Advanced High School Program," and the third is the "Advanced High School Honors Program."

The general or regular high school plan calls for 21 credits. It requires any three years of math, any two years of science, four years of English, 3 years of selected social studies courses, one-half unit of health, one and one half units of physical education, and the other courses are electives. All electives taken to make the required 21 credits must be state approved courses. (Only 2 units of physical education may count toward the minimum of 21 credits.) This plan is basically for students who do not plan to go to college.

The general plan, however, has some merits even for the college-bound student. At the present time it is accepted by most Texas colleges although this is not expected to be true forever. Should a student select to take this plan, the student still may take all the advanced or honors courses he wishes to take. There is no restriction on selection of courses.

The Advanced Plan calls for three credits in math that must be Algebra I and above courses. Courses taught that are below Algebra I level are Pre-Algebra, Informal Geometry, Consumer Math, and Fundamentals of Math. All other math courses are considered to be Algebra I and above. This plan calls for 2 years of foreign language, 3 years of science, 4 years of English, 1 year of fine arts courses (Speech, Theatre, Art or Band), 1 year of computer science, and the same health

The co-editors of the Mule's and physical education requirements as the general plan. It requires 22 credits for graduation and only allows 4-5 electives; all other credits are required courses.

> Students should keep in mind, however, that 7 periods of class per day for four years results in 28 credits--6 to 7 credits more earned than any plan requires. Therefore, generally speaking, a student will have a choice of 8 to 10 elective credits with any plan.

The High School Advanced Plan with Honors is exactly like the Advanced Plan except that any 5 required courses on the plan must be designated as State Honors Courses. Muleshoe High School offers 4 honors courses at the freshmen level, 4 honors courses at the sophomore level, 1 courses at the junior level, and 2 courses a the senior level; this makes a total of 9 honors courses offered at Muleshoe High.

In addition to honors courses which count a grade point more than regular courses in class ranking, Muleshoe High offers several courses that are considered "Advanced Courses." These ARE NOT honors courses. They are courses that are more demanding than the average course, and they are given extra grade points (Same as honors courses) when figuring class ranking. Some of these include Chemistry, Advanced Science courses, Trigonometry, Academic English IV, Vocabulary (Local Course), and others. Students must remember that they get extra grade points for these courses, but THEY ARE NOT HONORS COURSES! They do not count as required honors courses for the state diploma that requires

honors courses. Many students have been misled concerning "graduating from high school with honors." For many years, Muleshoe High School has honored graduates at graduation each year who have grade point average of 3.5 or higher. This means that a student must have at least as many A's as B's for a four year average, or a numerical average of approximately 90 for four years. ANY STUDENT who has a four-year average of 3.5 or better will receive the honor of "Graduating as an honor graduate." It does not matter which plan the student selects for the four-year program. All students and parents should be aware, however, that a 3.5 average on the general plan will be more difficult to obtain without advanced courses or honors courses which count more points. Although advanced courses and honors courses require more of the student, they do carry extra grade points for averaging grade points. Some students select to take the general high school plan then add advanced courses or honors courses in areas in which they are most interested.

Students should make a tentative four-year plan during the 9th grade year if at all possible. This plan can certainly be altered or changed, but it will give the student some idea

Some students and parents have been somewhat confused concerning what plans students should follow concerning college entrance requirements. Most colleges are raising their entrance requirements at the present time and do require more than in the past. Some require 2 years of foreign language. The most important item for a student's entrance into a college is his SAT or ACT college entrance scores. To prepare to make the highest scores possible on these tests, students should be aware that the more advanced courses taken will result in their acquiring skills and knowledge to make higher scores on college entrance examinations. Most colleges are now revising minimum entrance standards and in most cases this is a

Perhaps this article will explain some of the questions that students and parents have concerning the plans, the advanced courses, the honors courses, and the graduating with honors. Wayland Ethridge, high school principal made the following statement: "One important thing that all students and parents need to understand is that to graduate as an 'honor graduate' only requires that a student have a four-year average of 3.5, regardless of the graduation plan selected by the student."

The meeting time was scheduled as the fourth Monday in every month. The meetings will be held at a local restaurant where supper will be eaten while the meeting is taking



AUSTIN-Chief Justice John Hill stunned a Capitol press conference last week by announcing he will quit the Texas Supreme Court to return to private practice and crusade for an appointed court.

While the move kindled speculation that Hill is preparing to run for governor in 1990, it also paves the way for Gov. Bill Clements to appoint the first Republican to that post in modern times.

But Hill denied he would ever seek office again. With half of his six-year term over, he is the lone voice on the court for the appointment system, which has put him at odds with the other justices at least on that issue.

The name which immediately surfaced as a possible successor is Roy Barrera Jr., the San Antonio judge who ran as a Republican in '86 and almost upset Attorney General Jim Mattox. A name offered by Mexican-American Democrats is Brownsville Sen. Hector Uribe.

Mattox, Bishops Agree

Mattox was busy last week hammering out the final details of an agreement with the panel of bishops which investigated the SMU football scandal.

They announced the courtapproved agreement will allow Mattox's team to examine the bishops' records of their probe with the information to be kept secret unless it is disclosed in the court of resultant judicial proceedings.

Mattox is looking at whether any charitable trust funds were mishandled.

#### Texans Listed

The federal task force examining the Texas savings and loan industry for insolvency added more than 100 names to its subpoena list, including State Savings and Loan Commissioner L. Linton Bowman, former Gov. John Connally and former Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes.

The Barnes and Connally partnership had multimillion dollar loans from two failed thrifts in Dallas. Barnes praised the probe.

Commissioner Bowman said he has no lending or financial ties to any state chartered S&L, but has a real estate partnership with a former officer of a failed thrift.

#### State Borrowing

Texas Treasurer Ann Richards last week arranged for state government to borrow \$1.25 billion from private investors through cash management notes.

The borrowing, which will cost tax payers about \$65 million in finance charges, will get the state through a short-fall without

interruption of services.

Richards, who with Land Commissioner Garry Mauro was catapulted to the top of "possibles" when popular San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisparos drapped out of the

apulted to the top of "possibles" when popular San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros dropped out of the 1990 gubernatorial race, said she hasn't decided whether she will make that race.

Mauro, meanwhile, told critics

the award of an \$18 million

contract for veteran loans in 1984 to a top Democratic fundraiser was also supported by the Republican member of the Veterans Land Board, Jack Rains, now Secretary of State.

Shortly after Mauro surfaced as a gubernatorial possibility, he

as a gubernatorial possibility, he drew heat for giving the contract to administer the veterans housing loan program to a company which later lent him money for real estate transactions.

Mauro denied any impropriety, and said the company was the only bidder, although the contract was put out for competitive bid three times.


#### **Texas Oyster Bays**

Texas oyster bays were closed last week and could stay idle for up to a year to replenish oyster populations.

Texas Parks & Wildlife commissioners approved the ban following evidence that some oyster beds may have dropped off by as much as 80 percent in productivity because of unusually heavy rains and last summer's red tide, a rust-colored microorganism.

Some predict oyster prices will rise substantially because of poor harvests in other states.


