

Israelis Blast Guerrilla Boat

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - An Israeli gunboat in the Gulf of Aqaba intercepted and sank a Palestinian guerrilla boat as it was speeding north to blast the Israeli port of Eilat with a barrage of rockets, the military said Sunday.

Goals Crumble When Police Raid Hijacker

HELSINKI, Finland (AP) - After 24 hours and 3,000 miles, a bizarre air hijacking came to an unlikely end Sunday when police let the pistol-armed skyjacker go home to cool off before his arrest. then apparently lost their patience with him, stormed his house and overpowered him.

The arrest of weary-looking businessman Aarno Lamminporras in Oulu, 350 miles north of here, climaxed a strange odyssey in which the hijacker commandeered a Finnair jetliner, spent 16 hours taking it back and forth between Oulu and Helsinki and at one point to Holland, collected \$206,000 ransom, then finally released his hostages and the plane when authorities granted his final demand - that he be allowed to go home with his wife on the assurance he would surrender Monday morning.

'We intend to honor his last wish as well," Finnish Air Traffic Minister Veikko Saarto said as the hijacking came to a peaceful end at Oulu's airport.

There was no explanation why police decided seven hours later to burst into See FINNISH Page 14

The seaborne clash occurred Saturday afternoon as Eilat, Israel's southernmost town, filled up with tens of thousands of people on holiday for the long Jewish New Year weekend. Hotels were booked solid and the beaches were crowded with

Later Sunday in Beirut, Yasser Arafat's Al Fatah wing of the Palestine Liberation Organization confirmed the attack but said the boat had succeeded in its mission, hitting Israeli positions with rockets and inflicted "heavy losses in materials

Ships Claimed Destroyed "At the same time," a PLO statement said,"the ship, loaded with huge quantities of explosives, was automatically set on a sailing course toward Eilat port. It exploded in the area where enemy ships dock, destroying and damaging several of

The Israeli report said the boat was sunk before rockets were fired. The PLO statement said seven of its guerrillas were captured, three of them wounded, and two "martyrs" were killed. It did not

say where the boat was launched. The military report confirmed the crew of the Israeli navy boat captured seven guerrillas, three of them wounded. There was no report of any Israeli casualties.

According to the military account: The boat was spotted south of Dahab beach, 80 miles south of Eilat and 50 miles north of Sharm el-Sheikh, the southern tip of the Sinai Peninsula.

Warning Shots Fired The Israeli patrol boat tried to intercept it and its crew began maneuvering in an effort to escape. Warning shots were fired but the boat sped on and "the navy boat was forced to fire at the boat in order to damage it. Cannonade fire from the navy boat hit one of the explosive charges on the boat and it began to sink."

Before the ship sank, Israeli sailors boarded it and counted 42 122-mm rockets and a "huge quantity of explosive material." Six of those aboard the boat were captured in the water and one was grabbed on the deck of the boat.

Thousands Pay Respects To 'Smiling Pope'

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Hundreds of thousands of mourners braving a driving rain Sunday filed solemnly through St. Peter's Square to view the body of Pope John Paul I in a massive outpouring of affection for the "smiling pontiff."

Cardinals arriving from around the world for Wednesday's funeral and the conclave to elect a new pope made clear they will be seeking a man with the same pastoral background and down-toearth traits that endeared Pope John Paul to millions even though he reigned a mere 34 days.

"Everyone wants a pastoral pope like the one who just passed away, who speaks a language everyone under-

Mideast Treaty Talks Scheduled

CAIRO, Egypt, (AP) — Egyptian government sources confirmed Sunday that Egyptian, American and Israeli negotiators will meet in Washington Oct. 12 to begin talks leading to the signing of an Egyptian-Iraeli peace treaty.

The sources, who would not be identified, said the location was changed from the Suez Canal city of Ismailia to Washington so participating American officials would be more available.

The talks are the next step outlined by the Camp David agreements signed by President Jimmy Carter, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin last month. They hope the accords will end 30 years of Mideast warfare.

The Egyptian sources said the talks would be held in a place flying the U.N. flag as stipulated by the agreements. The Egyptian delegation will include War Minister Gen. Mohamed Abdel Ghany Gamassy, acting Foreign Minster Butros G. Ghali and others, the sources said.

Sadat Addressing Parliament There was no official comment on the date and location of the peace talks. Sadat is scheduled to address Parliament to-

The negotiators will try to work out a timetable for a two-phased Israeli troop withdrwal from Sinai Peninsula. They also will seek ways to replace the Israeli military rule on the West Bank of the Jordan River and in the Gaza Strip with a local Palestinian administration.

In Jeruslaem, almost 100 West Bank leaders gathered in an unusual political meeting Sunday and issued a statement asking their Palestinian followers to boycott elections for an administrative council and thereby undermine the Camp David agreements.

In Israel, Begin was quoted as saying his country would not tolerate any declaration of an independent Palestinian state by such a council. Begin, who was admitted to a hospital Friday after complaining of feeling weak, went home Sun-

The West Bank Palestinians, normally forbidden by Israel to meet in a political assembly, said they "absolutely and cometely reject the peace accords, The Palestinians said Israeli officials were informed of the meeting and made no attempt to prevent the conference.

'We want these agreements to fail," said Mayor Mohammed Milham of Halhoul. "Autonomy will lead us nowhere." The agreements call for the establishment of a administrative council, but do not specify the final status of the area.

Jordan Representatives Absent The participants claimed to represent a wide majority of the 1.1 million Palestinians living under Israeli rule, but moderates, independents and supporters of King Hussein of Jordan were conspicuously absent. All those who attended and could be identified were supporters of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

It what might be a signal of an easing of some Arab opposition to the accords, Newsweek magazine reported Sunday that top Saudi Arabian officials have reassessed the agreements and now consider them a "major step forward."

Newsweek said the Saudis have been told Israel's foreign minister, Moshe Dayan, holds out some hope for the eventual restoration of Arab sovereignty over East Jerusalem. The future of Jerusalem is a major issue for the Saudis.

Begin was said to be feeling "very well" after his release from the hospital. The prime minister apparently had become fatigued following a 17-hour parliamentary debate Wednesday in which the Knesset ratified the Camp David agree-

newspaper Maariv, Begin said, "We didn't agree to autonomy so that a Palestinian state would be created, meaning the danger of death for the wellbeing of the Jewish state." He said the accords would be violated by a declara-tion of an independent Palestinian state.

Begin said that even if the arrangements for Arab autonomy in the West Bank and Gaza are not completed within three months, "there is no reason Egypt shouldn't sign a peace treaty with us." The interview was conducted Thursday.

eral bureaucracy is made up of almost 2.9 million career employees, carrying out the programs established by Congress and the presi-

These workers together boast more than 1,000 different job skills: professional administrators and messengers, scientists and secretaries, astronauts and carpen-

ters, to name a few. You certainly don't have to live near the nation's capital to take advantage of government services. In

fact, only 12 percent of all federal employees work in the Washington D.C. area. Most of the rest are employed in regional, district and lo-cal office throughout the 50 states.

But to which of those 2.9 million employees should you direct your call for help? New Federal Information Centers (FICs) are working to make that question less mind-bogging than it first appears to be.

Each of the 38 information centers scattered across the nation is a clearing house for government information. Specialists at the centers will field your questions and refer you to the approriate federal

Don't hesitate to ask your Federal Information Center specialist about state and local programs, as well. More often than not, he or she can also direct you to the right agencies at those levels of govern-

Information centers are located in most major cities, from Boston to Honolulu. Persons living in outlying areas can often telephone

Carter Hails Start Of New Space Era

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) -President Carter toured the Kennedy Space Flight Center on Sunday and decorated six astronauts with the first congressional space medals of honor ever awarded.

The president viewed launch facilities for the Space Shuttle, which he said will carry America into the second phase of the space age by making trips into space routine.

"The age of space can now be said to have reached the threshhold of its maturity." the president said.

"The first great era of the space age is over. The second is about to begin. It will

center flashed a multicolored picture of a birthday cake and the words, "Happy Birthday," on a computer screen that Carter was watching. Sunday was the president's 54th birthday. The president's trip marked the 20th

anniversary of the nation's space agency, and he used the occasion to honor six astronaut heroes with congressional med-

The six include Neil Armstrong, the first man on the moon; John Glenn, the first man to orbit the earth and now a senator from Ohio; and Alan B. Shepard Jr., the first American in space.

Also Charles Conrad, Jr., who commanded the first manned Skylab mission in 1973; Frank Borman, commander of the Apollo 8 mission that was the first to escape earth's gravity; and Virgil I. Grissom, the second American in space, decorated posthumously.

Grissom and two other astronauts died in a flash fire that seared a grounded Apollo capsule in January 1967.

The medals to the six astronauts were authorized by Congress almost a decade ago, in 1969, but until now none have

INTERNATIONALLY-KNOWN geologist Dr. Franklin Alton Wade, 75, renowned for his geological surveys of Antarctica and a member of two historic Antarctica expeditions with Adm. Byrd, died early Sunday in Methodist Hospital following a brief illness.

Services for the longtime Lubbock resident will be at 3 p.m. today at St. Paul's Episcopal Church with the Rev. J.M. Washington, pastor, officiating.


Burial will be in Resthaven Memorial Park under the direction of Henderson Funeral Home.

Wade, of 5203 16th St., was a native of Akron, Ohio. He married Sarah Jane Richards in 1938 and moved to Lubbock in 1954 as head of the Texas Tech University department of geology, a position he held until 1964.

He was respected as one of the world's leading authorities on Antarctica. He was chief scientist of Adm. Byrd's 1939-40 expedition to Antarctica and previously had en a member of Byrd's 1933 expedition to the continent at the South Pole.

He holds two special Congressional medals for his work with Byrd.

He served as a major with the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II and

was base commander of the Greenland Ice Cap Detachment from 1943-44. Wade also was chief of the Operations Analysis Office with the Far East Air Forces in 1950-51 and was conferred with the Meritorious Civilian Service Award in 1952. Wade is best known here for his out-

standing work in strengthening the graduate program in geology at Texas Tech. He was a Horn Professor of Geosciences from 1954-73 and had been a research associate at the Museum of Texas Tech since 1973. He also was president of the American

Polar Society and a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church where he was vestry-He received his master's degree in

chemistry from Kenyon College in 1926 and a doctorate in geology in 1937 from Johns Hopkins University. He is survived by his wife. Pallbearers will be Dr. Grover E. Mur-

ray, Dr. Richard Mattox, Bob Smith, Robert E. Smith, Carl Cathey and Dr. John Brand.

More Sunny, Dry Weather Forecast For City

other picture-perfect day today, with temperatures reaching the mid-80s this fternnon, dropping to the mid 50s to-

Nothing but sunshine, up to 10 hours of it today, and mild days are expected over

the South Plains through Thursday. Winds will be south to southwesterly, 10 to 20 mph and gusty this afternoon, diminishing to 5 to 10 mph tonight.

Not all the state, however, is enjoying sunny, dry weather. The Rio Grande crested near Presidio early Saturday, with flood waters hitting 12 feet above the designated flood stage. This was the second largest flood on record.

Some 1,800 acres of low-lying croplands were flooded from the U.S. levee project to about one mile outside Presidio. But about 70 percent of the U.S. lands remained undamaged because of levees and sand bags provided by the U.S. floodfighting force.

While no levees on the American side were broken, the Mexican side suffered a najor break near the mouth of the Contho River. The Mexican levee from the International Bridge to the International Railroad Bridge was almost completely vashed away during the night.

Flood levels are expected to decrease today. The crest should now move down the Rio Grande toward the mouth of the Pecos and Lake Armistad, causing major lowland flooding throughout the river

Persons along the Rio Grande from Presidio downstream to near Lake Armistad were advised to keep up with river forecasts in the event of more flood-

In what should come as no surprise to South Plains residents, the National Weather Service reported in its September weather summary that Lubbock received a higher than normal amount of precipitation during the past month.

Total rainfall in September reached 3.31 inches, or 1.12 inches above the norm. But total precipitation for the year still is only at 11.35 inches, or 3.91 inches below normal.

The greatest amount of rain in a 24hour period in September was 1.83 inches on Sept. 19-20, the NWS reported. The average maximum temperature

during September was 81.7 degrees, while the average minimum temperature was 62.2. The average monthly temperature was 72.0, which was one degree above normal. The higher amount of rain brought a

corresponding drop in the amount of sunshine that warmed the Hub City. The weather service reported 193.6 hours of sunshine during September out of a possible 371.3 hours.

Except for the Southwest Texas rains, . the heaviest rains in the nation fell on ry in 1900.

North Carolina and Maryland. It was sunny throughout the rest of the nation except for the northern Rockies, where there were cloudy skies.

A cold front extended from southeastern Quebec down the Eastern Seaboard to northwestern Florida. Another cold front extended from western Manitoba through North Dakota and Wyoming into southern Nevada.

Sunny weather is expected to dominate the nation today, with showers confined to Florida and northern New England.

Inflation, Social Security Hike

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress apparently will not vote enough income tax year. cuts this year to offset tax increases caused by inflation and the higher Social Security withholding that takes effect in January

The bill approved by the House in August would leave virtually every class of individual taxpayer turning over a greater proportion of income to the federal government in 1979 than in 1978.

The version to be debated by the Senate this week would do better for all taxpayers. But generally, only single persons around the \$15,000-a-year income level and families of four or more earning un-

der \$20,000 would pay less taxes next

The \$23 billion tax bill is the biggest item left for the Senate to consider this year. Debate is likely to begin Thursday. Senators also plan to debate a bill extending until June 30, 1982, the deadline for states to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution. A Senate vote on the House-passed extension is

scheduled for Friday. The House plans action on numerous bills this week in an effort to clear its agenda for adjournment on Oct. 14, including a measure creating a department of education. Other bills would affect bank regulation, water resource development and imported meat.

No matter what the shape of the tax cut compromise that emerges from Congress, about 68 million couples or individuals would pay less income taxes next year than they would otherwise. About 1.2 million would pay more.

Barring the completely unexpected, most probably won't get enough reduc-tion in income taxes to offset higher Social Security taxes and the tax squeeze caused by inflation.

That will not be entirely unintentional. Despite Republican demands for automatic tax cuts in future years, there is

hanouk, former Cambodian head of state, made his first public appearance in three years when he and his wife were guests of honor at a banquet in Phnom Penh, China's official Hsinhua news agency reported Sunday. Hsinhua, quoting Radio Democratic

Cambodia, said the Thursday banquet was hosted by Khieu Samphan, president of the State Presidium of Cambodia, to mark the 18th anniversary of the founding of Cambodia's Communist Party. Hsinhua said the radio described the royal couple as the "prominent pa-

Speaking at the banquet, Hsinhua quoted Samphan as saying that "after liberation our party set the line for continuing the socialist revolution and socialist construction with a view to building the country with greatest rapidly. This is the guarantee for resisting the 'Indochina Federation' stretegy of our enemy Vietnam.

"Our Cambodian nation and people can certainly defeat the aggressive, expansionist and land-grabbing Vietnam and resolutely defend democtratic Cambodia," Samphan said.

Vietnam and Cambodia are ancient enemies and are involved in a border war. Sihanouk's last public appearance was in October 1975 when he made a speech to the U.N. General Assembly in New

Sihanouk, 55, was overthrown in 1970, went into exile in China and returned to Cambodia in 1975 after the Communist takeover. Cambodia says he is in retirement on a pension. He has spoken from time to time over state radio, but has not been seen in public.



SOMETHING VERY interesting has happened on the way to the governor's mansion.

After numerous reports that there was no love lost between Gov. Dolph Briscoe's family and State Atty. John Hill, Janey Briscoe, the governor's wife has said it out loud.

In an interview this past weekend, Mrs. Briscoe dropped what amounted to a bombshell in the heated contest between Hill and Clements.

What Janey said was that she felt Republican nominee Clements would make a better governor than Democratic nominee Hill. However, she added, she still will vote for the man who defeated her husband, but only because she is faithful to the Democratic party.

The next day, Gov. Briscoe added his thoughts to the whole thing, by noting that his children who have endorsed Clements "are independnet thinkers and free to make that choice." But, he added, he too will vote a straight Democratic

ALL OF THIS points up some pertinent facts about politics in general and those in Texas in

Before going further, we want to emphasize that our comments are not to be construed as an endorsement for either Hill or Clements. We make them in the interest of what we see as what's right and what's wrong about how we go about choosing those who hold public office.

While we applaud Mrs. Briscoe for her candor, and the Governor's family members for "doing their own thing." we question the business of blind party loyalty.

It is understandable that in the context of the two-party system that those who seek office under its blessing should then support those candidates who emerge winners in the primaries.

Anything less could lead to the fractured political setup which has been the ruin of Italy and to a point France. And, to be frank about it, it would sound like certain segments of the GOP Old Guard, which too often has sat one out if its favorite didn't come through.

BUT. SUCH loyalty should not in the final analysis transcend taking a stand on what one thinks is best for the state or nation. To make the system work, voters have to make choices.

There are those who will argue that Mrs. Briscoe was "getting even" with Hill for his "no holds barred" attack on her husband during the recent primary. Others will say it is just sour grapes at losing.

This is the way Mrs. Briscoe put it: "Party loyalty aside. I do feel he (Clements) would make a better governor than Hill."

The governor's wife then went on to say that she harbored no personal bitterness against Hill, but attributed to the attorney general comments "about me and Dolph that were deliberate lies. and he knew it ... I just don't want to talk about it." she said when asked to elaborate. "I don't want to start an ugly thing. I don't want to start a feud with Hill.

THE GOVERNOR would not say whether his philosophy was closer to that of Hill or Clements. But, he added: "The proper way to put it would be that I am a Democrat. I have been dedicated to the Democratic party for all the years that I have been old enough to vote and I will

As we noted earlier, we can understand the basic thinking behind such an attitude. However, we believe that Texas and the nation would be much better served if there were more "independent thinkers," such as Gov. Briscoe's child-

It may not have occured to those dyed in the wool, "voter 'er straight down the line" Democrats, or Republicans for that matter, that because they do, they are in effect "captives."

AND THEREIN lies the fault in "the system"

they Democrat or Republican-know they have certain blocs "locked in."

Because this is so, they can engage in certain excesses, promises and trade-outs which benefit, or ignore, those who have no place else to go. Actually, today, it is the growing Independent vote

Another point many ignore, especially those lifelong Democrats who blame the GOP for everything from "Hoover's Depression" to athlete's foot, is that the Democrat and Republican parties as now constituted are no more like the originals. or those of 40 years ago, than a Ubangi and a debutante.

Party loyalty, perhaps at the candidate level, may have merit. But, among the rank and file it is the chain by which far too many voters "sell their political souls" and march in lock-step to a distant drummer who has his own tune to play.

China Leader Sees Technology Needs

HONG KONG (UPI) - The People's Chinese who assembled in the capital Republic of China heralded the beginning of its 30th year Sunday with a call to its people to borrow from any source to accelerate technological advances in preparation for a great war it said "in the end is inevitable.

The Chinese Communist party theoretical journal Red Flag reiterated in an anniversary editorial Chairman Hua Kuofeng's directive calling for "more emancipation of the mind," saying:

'We must know how to absorb anything good from foreign countries."

Hua's speech at a reception Friday celebrating the scaled down 29th national birthday and the editorial were broadcast by the official New China News Agency and monitored in Hong Kong.

"Contention between the two superpowers, the Soviet Union and the United States, is growing fiercer and the danger of war has noticeably increased," the broadcast said.

The Red Flag editorial said although experience and history indicate that a 'new world war can be postponed, it is in the end inevitable."

It emphasized Hua's anniversary call for "more emancipation of the mind" and said it means more revolutionary Marxist-Leninist thought and taking 'bigger strides forward" in adapting foreign technology and other knowledge.

In keeping with Hua's declaration that the celebrations would be less elaborate than in the past, only red round lanterns hung from Tien An Men gate in the heart of the capital, occasional streamers praising the accomplishments of Communist Party leaders and a stage show in Peking's National Stadium marked the anniversary.

The NCNA reported that 18,000 people attended the stage show which included songs, dances and acrobatic performances. In addition to Hua, the show was watched by Vice Premier Teng Hsiaoping. China's No. 2 man, the prime minister of Nepal and deputy prime minister of Papua New Guinea and "more than 1.-000 guests from various countries and foreign diplomats."

In past years, the Oct. 1 anniversary of the 1949 Communist victory in China has been marked by massive parades and costly public shows throughout the coun-

try.
The government observed the traditional halt during holidays to the shelling of Nationalist Chinese offshore islands in the Taiwan Straits although officials called for the "liberation" of Taiwan.

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Asbestos Dangers Known To Doctors Years

(EDITOR'S NOTE — The health hazards of as-bestes were discovered years age, but only recently has the alarm been clearly sounded. For many vic-tims it came too late.)

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LOS ANGELES (AP) - If Marcos Vela had to get by on the same air the rest of us breathe, he wouldn't last long. After 35 years of working with asbestos, his lungs are shot and he has to breathe pure oxygen 16 hours a day.

Vela, 60, spent his working life at the Johns Manville asbestos products plant about 15 miles east of Oakland, Calif. It was no surprise to him when the federal government warned in April that millions may die from working with asbestos over the past 30 years.

Vela knows there's a good chance he is going to be one of those millions. He knows that many of the men who worked with him at the plant are already dead.

About half the people who worked with asbestos in the 1940s are expected to die of asbestos disease. Many are just now showing symptoms because asbestos diseases usually take 20 to 30 years to

Things have gotten better since the 1940s, but many scientists believe that today's workers are still breathing too much asbestos.

Asbestos causes three major diseases. One is asbestosis, a non-cancerous scarring of the lungs that gradually makes it harder and harder to breathe. The other two are cancers - lung cancer and mesothelioma, a cancer of the lining of the stomach or the lung.

Mesothelioma is hardly ever seen in

er cancers also turn up more frequently less the ceilings or tiles are heavily worn. in asbestos workers.

There is no cure for asbestosis. Lung cancer is generally fatal and mesothelioma victims rarely live more than a

few months after diagnosis. Asbestos is a general term for several fibrous minerals made from crushing certain kinds of rock into a white dust. Asbestos won't burn, won't conduct heat and is used in more than 3,000 commercial products, including fireproof materials and insulation.

Asbestos is everywhere you look. It's in acoustical ceilings, brake linings, fireproof roofing shingles, floor tiles, pipe insulation. It's in virtually every house and building.

World production of asbestos has risen from 50 tons per year in 1870 to 4 million tons per year now. Substitutes such as fiberglass have been found for insulation but there is yet no good substitute for some other asbestos uses, such as in brake drums.

Asbestos fibers escape into the air when a motorist applies the brakes, but there are no known cases of disease from

Nobody knows how much asbestos is enough to kill. There are many cases of asbestos cancer in people who worked around the mineral for only one summer. A Santa Barbara, Calif., man developed mesothelioma two years after his only exposure - one day of tearing down a building insulated with asbestos.

Vela has asbestosis with such severe scarring of his lungs that any effort leaves him gasping for breath. "I even have to take a bath slowly." he says.

Vela has a big oxygen tank in his house in Antioch, Calif., and he spends most of the day hooked up to it. That tank holds enough oxygen for four days and Vela also has a one-hour tank he keeps in his car and a four-hour tank he takes along when he goes out for a while.

"If I go to a ballgame to watch my son Asbestos is such a common material play." Vela says, "I take it along with me in case I get a little excited and start out even realizing it. Children and wives breathing hard. Then I'd have to have the

Joseph Califano, secretary of health, education and welfare, warned in April that about half of the 8 million to 11 million peope who have worked with asbestos during the past 35 years may die because of asbestos exposure.

Meanwhile HEW has launched a campaign alerting older and retired asbestos workers especially. The message: Get medical checkups. Stop smoking. Acquaint yourself with asbestos hazards.

One public service message for broadcast was filmes on an old Liberty ship and warns, "You could be a casualty of World War II and not know it." The campaign concentrates on shipyard sites and other high risk areas.

One might think the dangers of asbestos suddenly swooped down on an unsus-pecting world earlier this year. Actually the first case of asbestosis was reported in 1907; asbestos lung cancer was first noted in 1935; mesothelioma was reported in 1946. In 1930, a British researcher found 81 percent of workers with 30 years in asbestos work had asbestosis.

The Department of Labor estimates about 2 million workers are now regularly exposed to asbestos, perhaps too

It's known that there was too much asbestos in the air at many jobs in the 1940s and 1950s because the diseases are now showing up. Norbert Mehan, 69, worked in San Francisco Bay shipyards during the 1940s and he recalls the asbestos was so thick "it looked like it was

snowing all day long."
In the 1960s things were still pretty bad, says Roger Hamilton, business manager of Asbestos Workers Union Local 5 in Los Angeles. "We had no fear of the stuff. We'd raise all kinds of dust so the boss would think we were working

The Labor Department's Occupational Safety and Health Administration in 1970 set a standard on just how much airborne asbestos would be allowed in the workplace. In each cubic centimeter of air, there can be no more than two as-

bestos fibers longer than five microns.

That doesn't sound like much asbestos until you figure that there are a million cubic centimeters in a cubic meter and a man working eight hours generally breathes about 10 cubic meters. So a worker could breathe 20 million asbestos fibers a day under the current OSHA

Many scientists believe that standard is much too lenient. The National Institute for Occupational Health and Safety has recommended tightening the stand-ard to .1 fiber per cubic centimeter, one twentieth of what it is now.

Dr. Selikoff said the current standard was developed to prevent asbestosis and

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that a much tighter standard is needed to prevent asbestos cancer.

The standard proposed by NIOSH is so much lower than the current OSHA standard that hardly an asbestos busi-ness in the nation could meet it without making changes. Most of those but es feel their workplace is safe of

John A. McKinney, president of Johns Manville, said, "We're opposed to the lowering (tightening) of the standard because we don't think it's necessary." He said the newer Johns Manville plants, at Stockton, Calif., for instance, have had very little asbestos disease.

Nearly half of the American who had

Nearly half of the Americans who have had heavy exposure to asbestos during the past 40 years were working in ship-

Most of that shipyard work took place during World War II when the Navy built thousands of ships with asbestos insulation. Only in the past couple of years has the Navy stopped using asbestos for insulation in ships insulation in ships.

But almost every Navy ship still has asbestos insulation, and part of that insulation has to be ripped out when ships are brought in for overhaul. The Navy has asbestos regulations, but a Navy inspection team found numerous viola tions at the Long Beach shipyard this

One thing many asbestos victims want is compensation. They are suffering and they figure somebody ought to pay for it. Vela won a \$350,000 malpractice suit against a Johns Manville doctor.

All across the country lawsuits are being filed against the manufacturers of asbestos by workers who say those companies were aware asbestos was hazardous 30 years ago but didn't bother to tell people working with it.

Johns Manville president McKinney said he thinks the victims should be compensated but not through lawsuits against his company. "We don't feel we're any more at fault than the medical profession or the tobacco industry or the government."

McKinney suggested compensation be funded by a "tax on asbestos products and a tax on tobacco, and government paying its fair share."

Hill Denies Refusal To Investigate

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Attorney General John Hill denied a published report Sunday that he declined to investigate reports of corruption in Webb County of South Texas because he feared loss of political support.

Hill is the Democratic candidate for governor.

A copyright story in Sunday editions of the Dallas Morning News attributed the accusation to Joe M. Guerra of Laredo, who was fired Nov. 25, 1975, as head of when he complained of widespread irregularities.

Guerra was quoted in the newspaper story as saying the scandal involved an estimated \$900,000 in unaccounted

funds. Guerra said District Attorney Charles Borchers and Hill refused to pursue the investigation even after he showed them an independent audit documenting the

alleged abuses, the newspaper reported. Guerra, in a sworn affidavit, said he and a small delegation from Laredo finally met with Hill to discuss the situation after two earlier meetings at which they were able to meet only with his executive assistant.

According to Guerra's statement, Hill said "something like 'How do you expect me to investigate when I have a lot of friends in Laredo?" " the article said. Another sworn statement by Webb County Commissioner Cruz Cabello con-


curs with Guerra's recollections. "To my knowledge," Cabello's statement says, "there was never any adequate or complete investigation ... of the corruption in Webb County," the News reported.

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Crisis Leaves Economy In Shambles

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) - The bloody political crisis that rocked Nicaragua has left its economy in serious trouble, businessmen and economists say.

Merchants and other businessmen are strapped for cash because of a national strike that began Aug. 25 and was followed by fighting between President Anastasio Somoza's national guard and rebels led by Sandinista guerrillas. Many businesses in the capital reopened last week but businessmen complain there are few customers and they are unable to pay employees or taxes.

All of this apparently also has hurt the Somoza family financially, but experts cannot determine how much they have lost. The Somozas' wealth is estimated to be more than \$500 million. Their interests include the Nicaraguan airline Lanica, a steamship company, hotels, a newspaper, farms and plantations. They also have interests in most of the nation's major businesses, say economists who asked anonymity.

Insurance Program Disclosed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., unveiled Sunday his proposal for a national health insurance plan in which employers would pay the major share of the cost for employces and the government would pay for the poor and unemployed

Employers could pass on varying percentages of the cost, up to a quarter for highly paid workers, to the employee. But contracts could be written requiring the employer to bear the full cost.

Kennedy, who has assailed President Carter's health insurance program as inadequate, said the health subcommittee he heads would hold hearings in Washington and elsewhere on the proposal beginning next week.

"The current non-system of medical care is a failure," Kennedy said. "If left unchecked, that falure will become a disaster.

He said 26 million Americans have no insurance coverage and 19 million more have "totally inadequate" coverage.

When the Carter administration unveiled its own health insurance plan in July, Carter said it should be phased in gradually, with the introduction of each new phase dependent on the general economic climate.

Kennedy told the National Governors Association in Boston in September that it is "wrong to tie the pledge and commitment of a right to the American people on some predictions that may or may not happen.

Kennedy said the program he was announcing was prepared by the Committee for National Health Insurance, a Washington-based private organization,

He said it would "provide for everyone in the country to be covered for comprehensive service benefits, including preventive health care services and catastrophic costs of illness."

"Preliminary calculations indicate that the net impact on the federal budget will be tolerable," he said.

A bipartisan federal authority appointed by the president, subject to Senate confirmation, would oversee the program. At least half of its members would be consumer representatives.

The authority would certify insurance companies or groups of companies - or of health service plans or health maintenance organizations - to provide the coverage.

Similar state authorities would be created and would negotiate with hospitals and physicians about budgets and fees.

Premiums would be based on employers' total payrolls, with a company hiring lower-paid employees paying less than a company with the same number of employees at higher wages or sala-

Kennedy said care of the poor and unemployed, plus upgrading the present Medicare program, would cost the taxpayers \$14.1 billion in 1978, rising to \$21.7 billion in 1983.

Subsidies to small employers and employees in low-waged industries would cost another \$5 billion or so, he said.

He said providing drugs for the elderly would add \$2.6 billion to the cost of the plan in 1978, \$3.5 billion in 1981 and \$4.1 billion in 1983.

Cat Litter Makers Must Take Training In Mine Safety

It seems that Southern Clay owns three mines that provide clay for plants making the cat litter.

Boyd said if his employees, who package about 200,000 tons of litter a year, have to take the training, the cost of cat litter "could go higher than the hair on a cat's back.

Egypt and Israel are committed to negotiating a peace treaty within three months under the "framework for peace" signed with President Carter by .Sadat and Begin after the Camp David

have parallel responsibilities. The report also indicated:

-Existing legislation demonstrates a greater governmental concern for identifying and prohibiting various consumer fraud practices than in devising effective enforcement mechanisms.

Iraq Offers Syria Aid On Heights

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) - Iraq offered Sunday to send troops to Syria's Golan Heights front with Israel, but there was no immediate reaction from the Syrians, whose relations with the Iraqi government have been badly strained in recent

An official statement said President Ahmed Hassan el Bakr's government decided to offer its military aid to Syria to "ensure the existence of Arab power capable of confronting the enemy." The statement did not spell out the size of the forces Iraq was willing to commit.

Iraq also proposed establishment of a \$5 billion fund, to be financed mostly by conservative Arab oil states, to lure Egypt out of the Camp David Mideast peace accords it reached last month with

Syria was officially silent on the proposals. The factions of the socialist Baath Party that rule each of the two countries are bitterly hostile to each other. When Syria accepted the cease-fire that ended the 1973 Middle East War, the outraged Iraqis angrily pulled back an 18,000-man force and 400 tanks that had been readied for use in the war.

Sunday's proposals appeared to represent an Iraqi initiative to supersede the plans made at a recent summit of the Syrian-led "Steadfastness and Confrontawhich Raghds to join. The Front, consisting of Syria, Algeria, Libya, South Yemen and the Palestine Liberation Organization, is opposed to the Egyptian peace initiative with Israel.

The Iraqis have taken an even tougher line than these "rejectionists" in the Arab-Israeli stand-off. It has given support to Palestinian radicals who refuse to consider negotiations with Israel and insist that only war can help the Arabs.

The Iraqi proposals called for a collective fund with a \$9 billion annual budget to help finance the Arab war effort against Israel for the next 10 years, allowing \$5 billion for Egypt to help it cope with the economic burdens that would result from its withdrawal from the U.S-backed peace initiative.

Iraq's proposal came one week after the Steadfastness Front agreed to form a political and military command of their own with a reported fund of \$1 billion to try to undermine the Camp David peace

Irish Death Acknowledged

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) -The British army admitted Sunday that soldiers killed an innocent member of a hunting party but said the troops believed themselves threatened by terror-

An army statement extended sypmpathy to the family of surveyor James Taylor, 23, and said: "It now appears that the civilians had been wildfowling, were carrying firearms and were not engaged in any criminal activity." Taylor was killed Saturday.

But Taylor's uncle, Given Shuter, who was present at the incident near Coagh, 25 miles west of Belfast, said the shooting followed an argument between Taylor and two companions and the sol-

He said the hunters found the tires of their car deflated, walked to his house to borrow a pump and rode with him to their car. They were followed by two cars carrying strangers who were not in uniform, Shuter said.

The hunters accused the strangers of letting the air out of their tires, an argument developed, and Taylor was shot, he said. Taylor brings the known death toll in the British province to 1,864 in the nine-year sectarian war. Most of the victims have been civilians.

The British troops are in Northern Ireland to control the outlawed, heavily Catholic Irish Republican Army, which is conducting a guerrilla war aimed at freeing Northern Ireland from British rule and annexing it to the Catholic, in-dependent Irish Republic to the south.

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Fourth Time May Be Cardinal's Charm

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Will the next time be the right time for Cardinal Giuseppe Siri, the eternal second-runner in papal elections?

The powerful 72-year-old archbishop of Genoa, who correctly predicted a very short conclave after the death of Pope Paul VI, says the next one, starting Oct. 14, will last two or three days.

Siri should know. He is one of only three cardinals to have attended four

Soothsayers **Give Papal Predictions**

VATICAN CITY (AP) - The unexpected death and short reign of Pope John Paul I sent many Romans thumbing through the writings of ancient soothsayers who, interpreted in retrospect, appear to have predicted a brief pontificate for a "barefoot pope" at this point in history.

When John Paul was elected Aug. 26, interpreters of the two best-known prognosticators - l6th-century French doctor-astronomer Nostradamus and 12thcentury Irish archbishop St. Malachy seem not have found signs of a reign lasting only 34 days.

But prophecy specialists now say Nostradamus predicted that following the death of a pope of a 15-year reign, there would be a "two-year period of short pontificates." During that time, the church is supposed to undergo a period of grave crisis and even schism. Pope Paul VI reigned 15 years before his death Aug. 6.

Nostradamus wrote cryptically, however, and his works are open to various interpretations. The proliferation of books on his writings are always in great demand in Italy, particularly in times of

Nostradamus predicted events that will supposedly lead up to the end of the world in the year 2000. He mentioned in "The Prophecies of Pope John" a "barefoot pope" whose reign would last "no more than two months" and who would be succeeded by "the last two popes."

According to the "Prophecy of St. Malachy," attributed to Malachy, archbishop of Armagh, there will be only three more popes.

Just 35 days ago, believers in St. Malachy's sayings pointed out that the "de mediatate lunae" ("of the middle of the moon") assigned to John Paul I referred to the half-moon shape of the lagoon city of Venice, where he had served as patriarch, and that Venice had contact with the Moslem world, whose symbol is the

Now, they say, the epithet might really refer to the length of his reign - a lunar cycle of about 28 days starting from Sept. 3, the day of his formal installation as pope, and ending with his death Sept. 28. The day of the full moon, Sept. 16, fell exactly in the middle of his pontifi-

Who will be the next pope, according to the soothsayers?

Nostradamus describes him as "floram pater" reigning in a period of "divided faith." If the enigmatic word "floram" is the result of a printer's error in writing "florum," this would mean "father of flowers," perhaps meaning a good

According to Malachy, the next pope will be "de labore solis," "of the fatigue of the sun." That could be a reference to the sunny homeland of Cardinal Salvatore Pappalardo, archbishop of Palermo, or Corrado Ursi, archbishop of Naples, both mentioned as papal candi-

In his book "Centuries and Presages of Nostradamus," published in 1972, Italian soothsayer specialist Renucio Boscolo has Nostradamus touting a Frenchman whose name begins with the letter "V."

'After the tragic death of the pontiff, a French cardinal will be elected, and this prelate's name will begin with 'V' as in victory." Does this portend French Cardinal Jean Villot?

Villot, the Vatican secretary of state, has become papal chamberlain, or interim administrator, for the second time in

But in the meantime, the soothsayers and their interpreters are sure to have many readers until white smoke again rises over the Vatican, announcing the election of a new pontiff.

Passenger Trains Return To Normal

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Amtrak's passenger service returned to normal operations Sunday and freight that piled up during a four-day rail strike rolled on other lines in most areas of the nation.

"There are no glitches," said Amtrak spokesman Joe Vranich. "Things are actually great, marvelous, wonderful."

Vranich said short passenger service to 40 states resumed Saturday and long haul service was in operation Sunday.

"Once we get into the evening departure out of Chicago, we will have everthing rolling with service beginning to be resumed on every run," the Amtrak

spokesman said. A spokesman for the Brotherhood of Railway, Airlines and Steamship Clerks said pickets who disrupted the operations of more than 130 railroads nationwide had been completely withdrawn. "Everything is now normal," said

spokesman Henry Fleisher. He said it was up to the individual railroads "to call the men back."

The strike against the Virginia-based Norfolk & Western Railway Co. over job protection began July 10 but spread nationwide Tuesday.

"This is a good thing, so we can have more time to reflect," Siri said in an interview with the Genoa newspaper Il La-

According to most inside accounts, the shifting of Siri's votes to the then-Cardinal Giovanni Montini gave the required two-thirds vote to elect Pope Paul VI. Even before then, he was considered to be a favorite of Pope Pius XII, but considered too young at 52.

The latest account of the conclave that elected Pope John Paul I on Aug. 26 indicates Siri garnered 25 votes, compared with 23 for the future pope, Cardinal Albino Luciani, on the first ballot.

According to the news magazine Veja of Brazil, the world's largest Catholic country, Siri and Luciani were followed by Cardinals Sergio Pignedoli, with 18 votes, Sebastiano Baggio, 9 votes, Austria's Franz Koenig, 8, Paolo Bertoli, 5, and Eduardo Pironio of Argentina, 4. The remaining votes reportedly were

scattered among various cardinals.

After the first ballot, according to the magazine, which has good sources in the Brazilian clergy, Siri's conservative supporters decided to shift over to Luciani, who got 56 votes - 19 fewer than required. On the third ballot, Luciani is reported to have received 90 votes.

Siri is frequently depicted as an archconservative who consistently blocked reforms during the Vatican II Council in 1962-1965 and sided with the the conservative Curia in its opposition to Pope John XXIII's proposals for change. But Siri rejects both the conservative

"If I had to describe myself," he told Il Lavoro, "I would describe myself as an independent, as a man who walks alone and is not a member of any group.

and the progressive labels.

"The greatest progressives are the orst conservatives and vice versa." Asked about the major problems facing the church today, Siri replied:

"The church must be moved in the face of the immense changes of today's world. Pillars which have been immobile for thousands of years are being moved. The church, without touching things which are unthouchable, must update itself."

Born in Genoa, Siri was ordained a priest 50 years ago. After his appointment in 1930 as professor of dogmatic theology in a Genoa seminary, he quickly became a renowned theologian and an expert in church law.

In 1944, Pope Pius XII named him auxiliary bishop of Genoa, and he took over as one of Italy's youngest archbishops at the end of World War II.

It was Siri who engineered the 1944 surrender of the Nazis in Genoa, and tried to make the port city into a key center for Italy's postwar economic recovery. Today he maintains cool, but working, relations with the Socialist-Communist alliance that governs Genoa.

A cardinal for the past 25 years, Siri's

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personality is generally described as stiff, though he is easily accessible.

Many of his supporters say, however, that he is more "himself" with people he

"It is not rare for him to wash the dishes after a dinner with friends," one of his aides said. "But outside this circle, he is different."

Gary MacEoin, author of "The Inner Elite," a book published in the United States earlier this year on likely papal candidates, describes Siri as "a powerful leader of the most reactionary elements in a conclave."

But Siri obviously enjoys wider support than many predicted two months ago, and his contacts accumulated during four conclaves and work on Vatican commissions are sure to weigh heavily again.

In addition, he does meet two of the requirements outlined by cardinals before. the last conclave - pastoral experience and no connection with the central

church bureaucracy. For those who view his age as a handicap. Siri has allowed some of his medical history to surface. His blood pressure is 135, his heartbeats are 65 a minute and his only problem has been ear ailments.

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


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VATICAN CITY (AP) - "Thou art Peter and upon this rock I will build my church," Jesus Christ told his apostle Peter, making him the first pope and the shepherd of his flock.

Over the next 2,000 years, the role of the popes continually evolved, shaped by the 263 men who have served as the vicar of Christ on Earth.

In the church's infancy, St. Peter was the leader of an obscure sect harassed by the might of the Roman Empire. His most recent successor, John Paul I, who died Thursday, headed a church that now

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The pope's influence outside his church today is largely limited to his moral force as an interpreter of Christ's teachings. His battles now center on such thorny issues as birth control, abortion and the modernization of the church's centuriesold liturgy.

But the popes were once powerful lay princes, and their ownership of the Papal States set the stage for the stormy struggle between church and state that was a hallmark of the Middle Ages. Kings and popes fought wars, the papacy was bought and sold, false popes appeared and some were even held in captivity by

The popes themselves were sometimes less than saintly men as they became more temporal than spiritual leaders, involved in money-making schemes, nepotism and sensuality. And their role as feudal lords with vast landholdings and fabu-

lous wealth was hardly in keeping with the church's humble beginnings. Schisms scarred and divided the church.

Pope Gregory IX launched the Inquisition in the 13th century to root out heretics, sometimes spawning witch-hunting, book-burning and torture. But during the Middle Ages the papacy was a strong sup-porter of universities and a protector of

At the height of the papacy's power the pope was in a position to command kings and princes to discipline heretics, allot territories after wars and depose rulers and replace them with others.

In 1493, when Spain and Portugal were at loggerheads over newly discovered lands in the New World and along the coast of Africa, Pope Alexander VI was called upon to delineate spheres of influence between the two superpowers of the

The result was the Papal Line of Demarcation running north-south and slic-

Lands west of the line were to be colonized by the Spanish and those east by the Portuguese. Spain and Portugal moved the line about 10 degrees west in the Treaty of Tordesillas of 1494 and the great colonial expansion in subsequent decades was conducted with remarkably

For many centuries the popes held temporal sway over a territory stretching across the midsection of Italy, comprising some 17,000 square miles and with a population of up to 3 million.

Rome under the Renaissance popes became a focal point of the arts and sciences and many of the great works of art by such masters as Michelangelo, Titian and Bellini — were commissioned by the popes to adorn the city's churches.

The Papal States, including all of Rome, were incorporated into the Italian Kingdom in 1870. Today the pope's temporal power is confined to the 109 acres

ing through the eastern tip of Brazil. of Vatican City, a result of the 1929 Lateran Concordat. Between 1870 and 1929, the popes restricted themselves to the Apostolic Palace and St. Peter's Basilica

- self-styled "prisoners of the Vatican."

Pope John Paul To Be Buried In Sarcophagus

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Pope John Paul I will be buried in a stone sarco-phagus opposite the simple tomb of his predecessor, Pope Paul VI, in the grot-toes of St. Peter's Basilica, Vatican offi-

cials said Sunday.

But while Pope Paul, who died Aug. 6
after a reign of 15 years, had given detailed instructions on how he wanted to be buried, Pope John Paul in his 34-day pontificate apparently drew up no such directives.

The decision thus fell on the Vatican. The Vatican has decided to bury him opposite Pope Paul and not far from Pope John XXIII.

The decision by the Vatican was inspired by John Paul's devotion to the teaching of his two immediate predecessors, whose names he chose for his own.

"The three tombs will almost form an ideal triangle, symbol of that spiritual unity, which also in the names links the three last popes," said Archbishop Lino Zanini, director of the Vatican work-

According to Zanini, Pope John Paul's body will be placed in a rectangular sarcophagus, decorated at its four corners by small pillars.

On the front, two angels sculpted in the 15th-century will point upward to the Chrismon, the Greek monogram for

By being buried in a sarcophagus, Pope John Paul differs from Paul VI, who left instructions to be buried "in

the simple earth."

Workmen had to dig six feet through the rocks beneath the crypt before they could fulfill Paul's wish.

Pope John also is buried in a stone sarcophagus into which his name and Christ's monogram are chiseled. He picked the spot himself. After visiting the Vatican grottoes one

day, he took a postcard depicting the site, circled an area and wrote on the back of the card, "Hic locum depositions meae," Latin for "Here is the place of my burial." By coincidence the tomb of Pope John

Paul, who died suddenly of a heart attack last Thursday night, will be opposite that of another pontiff who had an even shorter reign, Marcellus II, a 16thcentury pope who died after 22 days on the throne of St. Peter.

Senatorial Influence Seen In GSA Probe

WASHINGTON (UPI) - An administrator of the General Services Administration ordered the government agency to rent an 18-story building in Philadelphia for \$52 million from a friend and former law partner of former Pennsylvania Sen. Hugh Scott's, even though there were lower bidders, the Washington Post reported Sunday.

The Post said a 900-page summary of an FBI investigation contains a letter written by Scott to Robert L. Kunzig. GSA administrator from 1969 to 1972, giving Scott's "strongest recommendation" that the office building be rented from Herbert A. Fogel, Scott's former law partner, and Fogel's uncle, Mathew B. Weinstein.

Kunzig and an assistant, Arthur F. Sampson, who also recommended the rental deal and was later appointed to the top GSA post, were both social and political friends of Fogel and Weinstein the FBI summary said. Both Kunzig and Sampson stayed at Fogel's home during the lease negotiations.

Kunzig, who is now a U.S. Court of Claims judge in Washington, was an administrative assistant to Scott and was appointed to the GSA post by former President Richard Nixon on Scott's recommendation. Kunzig brought Sampson to Washington with him from Pennsyl-

When the FBI interviewed Scott, the report showed, he said he "believed" Fogel had asked him to write a letter in support of the GSA leasing Philadelphia's Gateway Center, but added that he did not know Fogel and Weinstein had built the structure.

The Post said the Justice Deparment, on the basis of the FBI report, concluded in 1976 that Fogel and Weinstein had made false statements to the government by backdating letters and contracts to make it appear they had been written before the deadline set for bidding by

Kunzig and Sampson "orchestrated support for the award," the Post said. and hired a lawyer to help landlords, like the Gateway Center developers, meet GSA lease conditions.

Although it is a criminal offense to intentionally make false statements to the government, the Justice Department decided to not indict anyone because the false statements were not "material."





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ouse Readies For Vote On Censure

WASHINGTON (AP) - The last time the House censured one of its members, it did so only because it could not find enough votes to expel him.

Now, more than 50 years later, it finds itself on the verge of a vote of censure for only the second time in the 20th century.

The House ethics committee recommended last Wednesday that the full House censure Rep. Edward R. Roybal, D-Calif., for his part in the South Korean influence buying scandal. The vote probably will be this week.

The committee found that there was sufficient evidence that Roybal failed to report a \$1,000 campaign contribution from South Korean rice dealer Tongsun Park, that he diverted the funds to his

own use and that he lied in originally saying he received nothing from Park.

The committee also recommended that Rep. Charles H. Wilson, D-Calif., be reprimanded for his part in the affair. It found that he lied to the committee when he originally denied that he received about \$1,000 from Park after Wilson married a South Korean woman.

Charges against two other members still are pending before the committee. Recommendations on those two are expected this week.

A reprimand is the weakest punishment the House can impose upon a member and consists basically of the House voting that the member violated its rules. A censure is more serious - expulsion from membership is the ultimate punishweight on its own.

The basic difference between the two is that a member to be censured normally is led to the front of the chamber and forced to stand while the charges against him are read. A member does not have to be present during the reading of a repri-

However, by recent precedent, both charges can result in further punishment by House members. Rep. Robert L. F. Sikes, D-Fla., was reprinanded for financial misconduct in 1976 — the last House member to be so chastized. But the House Democratic Caucus later moved on its own to strip him of his seniority, an action that removed him as chairman of a powerful subcommittee.

line a member, the House voted in 1967 to exclude the late Democratic Rep. Adam Clayton Powell of New York for misuse of public funds. Powell was reinstated in 1969 and the Supreme Court ruled the exclusion had been unconstitutional.

There have been only 17 members of Congress and one delegate censured by the House and 13 of those occurred during the 11-year period from 1864 to 1875.

The last occurred in 1921 when Rep. Thomas L. Blanton, D-Tex., was censured for inserting "obscene language" into the Congressional Record. That censure occurred after a motion to expel him

Many offenses with which the members were charged would barely raise

eyebrows today. New York Rep. Fernando Wood, for example, was censured in 1868 for calling a bill "a monstrosity, a measure the most infamous of the many infamous acts of this infamous Con-

And Rep. John Young Brown of Kentucky was censured in 1875 for - in a burst of oratoric hyperbole - describing an opponent as "one outlawed in his own home from respectable society ... who is such a prodigy of vice and meanness that to describe him would sicken imagination and exhaust invective."

Seven censures involved the use of unparliamentary language, two involved assault and conspiracy to assault another member, two involved utterance of treasonable language, two involved the use of

Navy Officer **Gives Details** Of Spy Actions

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI) - In a case reminiscent of a spy thriller, a Navy officer says he turned over American defense secrets after receiving instructions at public phone booths from a man with a heavy foreign accent.

Lt. Commander Arthur E. Lindberg, the government's star witness, testified Saturday in the espionage trial of Valdik A. Enger, 39, and Rudolf P. Chernayayev. 43, both Russian citizens working at the United Nations. The two men, who are free without

bail in the custody of the Soviet ambassador, are charged with allegedly paying Lindberg more than \$20,000 for American defense secrets. The trial was expected to resume on

Tuesday before U.S. District Judge Frederick B. Lacey in Newark, N.J. Lindberg said he accepted an undercover assignment from the FBI to flush out a network of spies believed using the

Soviet merchant marine as a cover. For nine months in late 1977 and early this year. Lindberg said he received shopping lists of documents requested from his contacts and exchanged documents for cash at drops along New Jer-

sey's two major toll roads. He received instructions at public telephones on the New Jersey Turnpike and the Garden State Parkway.

In one typewritten instruction, Lindberg was told that if anything went wrong they would meet in Helsinki, Finland, on the last Sunday in June.

And George S. Graham, R-Pa., defended Blanton by saying he was so intensely anti-labor that it was "his zeal that makes him a bigot."

Blanton defended himself by saying he inserted the letter only to point up "the awful conditions existing in the printing office." He added that if he had the money, he would have reprinted the letter himself and mailed it to every man in the nation.

He said, however, that he would accept Congress' vote: "I am a man who never squawks when my adversaries' cold steel pierces my vitals. I shall take my medicine when you act today.'

IN MEMORY

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The decision to censure Blanton was a compromise. An earlier attempt to expel him failed for lack of a two-thirds majority. The censure motion, passed by a 293 to 0, had little effect on Blanton's career. He served from 1917 to 1929 before failing in a bid for the Senate and he came back in 1930 for six more years as a House member.

If you're interested in what the letter actually contained, don't bother looking. The House expunged it from the Record and no copies exist in House files.

'GATORS DOING BETTER

WASHINGTON (AP) - The American alligator is rallying, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The agency, a division of the Interior Department, credited strict federal and state protection laws for giving alligators a new lease on life. They once had been in danger of extinction in the United States. Now, the Fish and Wildlife Service reported Saturday, the alligator population is estimated to total approximately 800,000. In 1977, it added, about 75 percent of the alligators in this country were reclassified from the endangered species list to the threatened list — a less serious predicament.

Soldier Killed By Deputies **Near Burnet**

BURNET (AP) - Sheriff's deputies shot and killed a soldier stationed at nearby Fort Hood early Sunday after he led authorities on a high-speed chase and forth across two Central Texas counties in a stolen Department of Public Safety squad car.

The soldier was killed when Burnet County deputies opened fire on him as he crashed through a roadblock about 12 miles east of Burnet on Texas 21, according to Sheriff Roy Hilliard.

High-Speed Chase Before he was shot, the soldier drove the squad car across fences and over pastures, rammed a deputy's car, ran a sheriff off the road and wore the rubber

off all four tires, authorities said. The dead soldier was identified as Spec. 4 David Samuel Fullington, 21, of Illinois, Officials at Fort Hood declined

to give his hometown pending notification of his relatives. "He was stopped by gunfire from county officers," said Hilliard. "He had

tried to run over two of my deputies and me. Then he ran this roadblock. Fullington was deceased by gunfire." Investigation Under Way

However, a DPS spokesman said officers opened fire only after Fullington raised one hand holding what officers mistook for a gun. Hilliard declined to comment on details of the shooting. "It's under investigation," he said.

An autopsy was ordered, and Fullington's body was taken to Austin. Three companions were jailed in Burnet on charges of public intoxication.

The incident began shortly after 2 a.m. when DPS officer Ray Priest of Burnet tried to stop a speeding vehicle on Highway 29.

"The officer pursued the car at speeds over 110 miles an hour, called for local assistance and finally pulled the car over," said DPS spokesman Richard Grimmett. He said the driver of the car, Fullington, was apparently drunk. Stolen DPS Squad Car

"Priest handcuffed the driver with his hands behind his back and placed him in the right front seat of the patrol car. While Priest was searching three other men in the car, Fullington managed to slip out of the handcuffs. He drove east on State 29 in Priest's squad car," Grimmett said. He said Fullington drove through a fence, across a pasture, and back onto the road.

"He then ran Sheriff Hilliard off the road and rammed another Burnet County deputy's car," the DPS spokesman

Fullington next headed east into Williamson County, but made a quick uturn when he encountered officers from that county, Grimmett said. Shortly after that he was stopped at the roadblock set up near the Williamson-Burnet county line by Hilliard and his deputies.

"He had a hand raised. They saw metal which they thought to be a handgun," and opened fire, Grimmett said.

The sheriff said the DPS car was heavily damaged, and the tires were worn off. "It was down to the rims," Hilliard said. "He really banged it around. Two or three times he made very erratic

Marketbasket Tab Edges Up Again

Supermarket prices edged back up again during September, with increases ranging across the shelves from the meat

Press marketbasket survey shows. Last month's increase practically wiped out an August decline in grocery

The AP drew up a random list of 15 commonly purchased food and nonfood items, checked the price at one supermarket in each of 13 cities on March 1, 1973 and has rechecked on or about the start of each succeeding month. One item, chocolate chip cookies, was dropped from the list at the end of November 1977 because the manufacturer discontinued the package size used in the

Rises In Nine Cities

The latest survey showed that the marketbasket bill increased during September at the checklist store in nine cities, rising an average of 2.7 percent. The bill decreased in four cities, down an average of 2.5 percent. On an overall basis, the marketbasket bill at the checklist store was 1.1 percent higher at the start of October than it was a month earlier.

During August, in contrast, the marketbasket bill declined at the checklist store in eight cities and rose in five. Overall, the average bill dropped 1.2 percent.

In a few cases, the higher marketbasket bill at the beginning of October reflected a return to regular prices after Labor Day sales. At the checklist store in Providence, R.I., for example, coffee was on sale for \$2.19 a pound at the start of September. Today, the same coffee at the same store is back to its regular price of

Frankfurters, which dropped at the checklist store in eight cities during August, rose in seven cities last month. Eggs increased in the checklist store in eight cities and butter went up in five cities.

Non-Food Items Up The September price increases affected non-food items as well as foods. Paper towels rose in price at the checklist store in three cities; detergent was more expensive in four cities

Comparing prices today with those at the start of the year, the AP found that the marketbasket bill had increased at the checklist store in every city, rising an average of 6 percent. The boost would have been even worse if coffee prices had not dropped sharply since the start of the

Coffee prices are expected to keep dropping, although not quite so sharply, despite a cold front which moved through Brazil in August, touching off a temporary surge in the price of green, unroasted beans. Howard Hjort, director of economics, policy analysis and budget for the USDA, told a Senate subcommittee on Sept. 19 that supplies "are well in line with consumption estimates. Green coffee prices and retail prices will likely continue to decline in coming months at a more moderate rate."

Hjort also predicted that grocery store food prices for 1978 would average about 10 percent above those of 1977. Higher prices paid to U.S. farmers will account for about half the rise, he said. The rest of the 10 percent hike will be due to higher marketing charges and rising prices for fish and imported foods.

No attempt was made to weight the AP survey results according to population density or in terms of what percent of a family's actual grocery outlay each item represents.

Many directories simplify matters, with boxes of 'Frequently Called Numbers" at the top of their U.S. government sections. There, you can expect to find listings for such important services as Social Security, veterans benefits, federal information and the weatherd bureau

Often, a general information agency some miles from your home, you may not have to incur long distance charges. Many offices, like the information centers, now provide toll-free tie lines between neighboring areas.

Some agencies have also established nationwide hot lines to help citizens take care of pressing business. Do you want quick information on road conditions in another state? Did the brakes on your new car give out for no apparent rea-

All these matters, and many more, can be taken up with the appropriate federal agency via these toll-free hot lines. So, before making a long-distance call, check with the (800) 555-1212 - to see if the agency you want to contact has a hot line. (NEXT: Making contact)

Since the papal apartments are sealed and put under watch by the Swiss Guards immediately upon the death of a pope, the existence of any such testament may not be known until a new pope is elected.

Most widely mentioned "papabili," or possible popes, are those with the basic characteristics that brought an overwhelming vote to Cardinal Albino Luciani of Venice in his election as Pope John Paul - that is, Italian and "pastoral," meaning a prelate with no connection to the Vatican's central administra-

These include Cardinals Corrado Ursi, 70. of Naples, Salvatore Pappalardo, 60, of Palermo, and Giuseppe Siri, 72, of Genoa.

Longer Election Predicted

Siri, the only cardinal who will have attended four conclaves, predicted the conclave will last two or three days, as opposed to the one day it took to elect John Paul. "This is a good thing, so we have more time to reflect," he said in a newspaper interview.

Cardinal Giovanni Benelli, 57, the influential Florence archbishop who is considered a pope-maker if not a candidate himself, called the need for a pastoral pope "the priority of priorities."

It was Siri who engineered the 1944 surrender of the Nazis in Genoa, and tried to make the port city into a key center for Italy's postwar economic recovery. Today he maintains cool, but working relations with the Socialist-Communist alliance that governs Genoa.

Book Gags Publicize New Titles

NEW YORK (AP) - If you're a book reviewer, books are what you expect publishers to send you. But a box of animal crackers? A sea shell? A tiny robot? A packet of weeds? A domino?

All this comes from publishing houses these days, and more: A set of darts; a miniature fire hat; a jigsaw puzzle; a British copper penny tinted gold; a card certifying that the bearer is a "genuine Horatio Alger hero.'

Why this esoteric eruption? The aim of publishers who mail these things - not all do - is to draw attention to a book that otherwise might have been passed over. As Olivia Blumer, a Doubleday publicist, puts it: "When the book industry is churning out over 40,000 books a year, sales promotion gimmicks are a good, often inexpensive, way to make a book stand out from the crowd."

She's seconded by Norma E. Douglas of St. Martin's Press: "With a 300-titleper-year list being mailed ... we naturally worry about the impact any individual arrival might have. We don't put gimmicks in with just any book ... Obviously, the gimmick doesn't have much of a long-lasting effect if the book it's backing is ordinary fare. There's also little need if the author is well-known enough to create his or her own excitement. This narrows down the prospects to good books that deserve backing and might be passed under ordinary circumstances.

Items St. Martin's has mailed include a sand dollar, an obvious play on the title of a novel called "Sand Dollars," and an English penny sprayed gold to announce a mystery called "Copper Gold." Miss Douglas comments: "The face value of a penny, especially one coated with spray paint, seems unlikely to bring on accusations of bribery and we hope it will make the book stand out from the mystery pile.

To publicize a book titled "Sargasso," Doubleday sent little packages of sargashad his children gather from Gulf of

Mrs. Blumer also wryly recalls the time she and her husband spent the weekend wrapping up an herb that was "supposed to protect your home from invaders." The promotion was for a book that dealt with herbal magic in the Caribbean. Savs the firm's Carol Duffy, "Everytime we send out something unusual ... we are demonstrating our conviction that we have something pretty special to offer to the book reviewer. And it works. The end result of course, is to get the public interested enough in a book to go out and buy it, and the more reviews on a book, the higher the public awareness of it."

A miniature fire hat accompanied the Random House novel "The Secret of Fire Five," while New American Library came up with a cigarette lighter that said "The Final Fire" - the title of a novel - on its side. An NAL spokesman adds, "We also did matches but later found out we couldn't send them in

Darts - but no dart board - were used by Random House for its "The Complete Book of Darts," while NAL mailed a jigsaw puzzle - with the center piece missing - for "The Domino Principle.'

The Horatio Alger card - for Arco's "Horatio Alger or the American Hero Era" - observes that the bearer can, "like every Alger hero, stop a team of runaway horses (and) whip the neighborhood bully."

As for the robot - for Harcourt Brace Jovanovich's "The Robot Book" - it's a tiny thing. Wind it up, see it walk, then see it fall down when it collides with the other gimmicks.

On-Site Investigation Of Crash Nearing End

SAN DIEGO (UPI) - Dog-tired federal investigators, now trying to piece together bits of debris the "size of corn flakes," Sunday were expected to complete their on-site investigation into the nation's biggest aviation disaster by Wednesday and return to Washington, D.C.

Rudy Kapustin, chief investigator for the National Transportation Safety Board, gave many of the investigators the day off Sunday to rest after putting in 18-hour work days the previous four days.

Kapustin said it may be as long as sixto-eight months before the investigation is completed and the board issues its formal conclusions on the causes of the

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
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
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Worshippers Mark Jewish Holy Period

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — The Jewish new year of 5739 began at sunset Sunday and Israelis inaugurated the 10-day high holiday period with picnics and prayers for life and peace.

Synagogues across the country were crowded with worshippers for services marking Rosh Hashanah, the new year. Holiday spots were jammed with Israelis taking advantage of the long weekend.

Many Israelis gathered at Judaism's holiest shrine, the Western Wall in Jerusalem's old city, to welcome the year 5739. According to Jewish tradition, the Hebrew lunar calendar dates from the creation of the world.

About an hour after sundown, a bomb went off in dewntown Jerusalem, shattering shop windows but causing no injuries, Israel radio said.

The Palestine Liberation Organization claimed responsibility for the blast, claiming it killed or wounded several per-

A few hours before Rosh Hashanah began, the army announced it had averted a potential holiday disaster by sinking a Palestinian terrorist ship whose crew intended to fire rockets at the southern port city of Eilat, then blow up the ship

The incident occurred Saturday afternoon in the Gulf of Aqaba, 80 miles south of Eilat. All seven guerrillas were captured, including three who were wounded, the army said. No Israeli casualties were reported.



Americans Subsist On European Alms

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) - Under the glare of neon signs on a narrow, cobbled street in Brussels, a young American named Dave Chun sings 10-year-old rock songs with his guitar case propped open for donations.

Just up the street, Anatol, another U.S. traveler, makes money by hawking tiny paper ducklings to tourists.

Bruce Glazer, from Tujunga, Calif., showed up on a recent night, too, singing for money he hoped would get him to Amsterdam, Netherlands.

"If I can just get a little more by singing. I'll be able to pay for the gas," he said. "I'll play in the streets in Amster-

In Brussels and Amsterdam, on the touristy Ponte Vecchio in Florence, Italy, in the street and squares of West Germany and Spain, hundreds of Americans every year blend into Europe's jostling crowds of young street singers, artists

and salesmen. Many intended to work their way around Europe on the streets; others thought they had enough money for their trips, but found themselves forced by high European prices and the slipping dollar to make money any way they

A U.S. tourist who wanders through a European city and contributes to a wandering minstrel or souvenir seller may

woman is also from America.

Making money on the street is a job like any other, says Chun, 26, from Honolulu, Hawaii. He said he has learned "all the hustles" by now and can make 1,500 Belgian francs - about \$47 - from an average seven-hour stint of singing on Rue des Bouchers, a crowded tourist and restaurant street near Brussels' medieval downtown Grand Place.

Chun, who has curly, shoulder-length black hair and performs in jeans and a black corduroy coat, says his record take is \$90 for an evening.

"When it comes to putting in the money, the Americans are the worst," says

Pension Woes Taxing Europeans "Many are caught in a dilemma, for an

(EDITOR'S NOTE — U.S. Social Security taxes were recently raised to forestall long-term financial problems. It may be of little comfort to American taxpayers, but similar problems exist throughout

LONDON (AP) - Until he retired a couple of years ago, Piet Meinema used to complain about the hefty social security deductions that took 16.4 percent out of his pay packet.

"Like most people, I thought I was paying too much for too little in return, but now I can say it was worthwhile."

As a married man, age 66, he gets \$1,-005 a month in pensions: \$590 from the compulsory Netherlands state pension plan and \$415 from the Dutch national airline KLM, for which he worked 20 years. Taxes cut this to \$670 a month, but, "together with a little bit of my savings it enables me to do most things I want to do." Meinema says.

Retired workers in Europe generally agree with him that it pays to be in pension and other social security schemes, especially if employers operate plans in addition to those of the state, an Asso-

ciated Press survey shows. But inflation and mounting bills are forcing European governments to take a hard second look at social security. One after the other, they are having to subsidize the programs and often bail them

The costs are astronomical, since social security in Europe extends far be-

Years ago it was dubbed "womb to tomb" security. Now it's even pre-womb and post-tomb. It can include free or subsidized contraceptive pills, unemployment and sickness benefits, funeral costs, and pensions for widows and orphans as well as the retired.

In Britain, the publicly funded National Health Service will foot the bill (amount undisclosed, but sure to be big) for the sophisticated technology and medical care that led to a test tube pregnancy for Mrs. Lesley Brown in a hospital at Oldham.

And British social security shells out \$250 a week to finance "Big John Knight," 42, a jobless man who goes on fathering children although there are already 21 in the two homes he keeps for his legal wife and for another woman in

In Denmark, 40 percent of the state budget goes to social benefits, and less than 10 percent for defense. Of the half million state employees, 200,000 work in the social and health services. But Denmark's heavy taxes on in-

comes, liquor and tobacco keeps the social security system going smoothly. Some 811,000 of Denmark's 5.2 million people get state pensions' averaging \$200 a month, plus payments from widespread private pension funds.

In Britain, just over 10 percent of the nation's income is devoted to social security. That works out to some \$16.5 billion, which goes for medical expenses, death benefits, child allowances, and

The average worker pays about 5.75 percent of his earnings into the funds and the employer 8.75 percent. When a man retires at 65, he and his wife get a pension of \$45.33 a week. This can be supplemented in various ways, such as with allowances to help meet electricity charges or local taxes, and by cheap or free travel.

The government has been trying to cut back, but frequently runs into furious

"As a result of persisting economic problems, most European governments have lost their appetite for bigger and better social programs," says Donald F. Poden, director of William M. Mercer Benefits Ltd. and an expert on Europe-

The costs would be even higher if everyone claimed everything to which he is entitled. It's estimated that 900,000 people in Britain don't claim all they could — a total of \$555 million.

Italy's economy is far from strong, yet of an estimated 57 million Italians, 16.5 million are receiving state retirement pensions worth \$25 billion a year. The state's pension funds yield \$11 billion a year less than that, so the state has to take good the deficit by loans and subsi-

On top of this, the number of pensions paid to Italians who claim they are unfit for work soared from 1 million in 1959 to 5 million in 1976. And of 2.3 million Italian farmers enrolled in the National Institute of Social Security, all but 90,000 get some sort of pension. As a result, for every \$100 farmers pay into the institute, farmers draw out \$1,575.

"The terrific national illness of cunning has infected all social classes," says Leonardo Vanente, an Italian social security specialist.

An Italian worker pays 7.15 percent of his wages and his employer 16.46 percent to social security. The government is considering plans to shoulder part of the employers' contributions on top of the \$11 billion annual deficit the govern-

Unlike other European nations, Switzerland, one of the world's richest countries, has no trouble providing retirement pensions of between \$404 and \$808 a month, financed by contributions of 5 percent each from employees and em-

West Germany's social security system is also relatively stable, although poorer economic conditions of late have led some opposition Conservatives to predict a deficit of \$16 billion a year in the next decade. To forestall that, the government has restricted increases in pen-

sion payments for the next several years. An official of the Ministry of Labor says \$610 a month was paid on average in 1977 to people who retired after 40 to

45 years work. In contrast to West Germany's 50-50 contributions from employers and workers, the French employer must pay into social security an average of 35.5 percent of wages and workers must pay 11.6 per-

In 1976, the French system piled up a relatively modest deficit of \$195 million. Economies have now brought a surplus

of \$600 million. The average Frenchman can count on a pension of half his final salary when he retires at 65, up to a maximum of \$435 a month. Women and some manual workers get the same deal at 60.

In Spain, which as had an inflation rate of more than 20 percent for the past three years, social security is a chronic

Spanish employers contribute between 61.6 and 73.5 percent of each worker's salary, and each worker has to pay 10.7 to 17.3 percent of salary - yet the social security system is always in the red.

Iranian Dissidents To Receive Amnesty

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - The Iranian government, in another apparent effort to quiet anti-government rioting, declared amnesty Sunday for all Iranians involved in "anti-state" activities. The amnesty included dissident Shiite Mus-

lim leader Ayatullah Khomaini. The amnesty will enable thousands of Iranian university graduates in Europe and the United States to return home without fearing arrest by the SAVAK, Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi's secret police, said a government official.

Minister of State Manuchehr Azemon said Khomaini, who is said to direct an anti-shah campaign from exile in Iraq, can also return home. Khomaini has said he will not return unless the monarchy is abolished.

About 1,000 Iranians have died this year in clashes between anti-goverment demonstrators and police.

The opposition includes traditionalist Shiite Moslems upset with the shah's redistribution of church lands and his granting of rights to women, plus students, intellectuals and a rising middle class who oppose the shah's autocratic

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Housewife sells 'glass plate' for \$40; worth \$1,700

MORTON GROVE, III.-The story of a small fortune, lost because a housewife had no idea her glass plate was a collector's item, recently came to light.

In a letter to J.R. MacArthur, chairman of The Bradford Exchange, world's largest trading center in collector's plates, a Madison, Wisc., woman wrote: "I had a Lalique 1965 plate...which I sold to a friend for \$40. I had not heard of you at that time."

The plate she sold is actually valued at more than \$1,700. Although MacArthur points out that this price is exceptionally high, he said, "I'm afraid others may be losing hundreds or thousands of dollars by not knowing what their plates are worth."

To aid in identifying valuable plates, the Exchange issues a report that includes current prices on more than 900 plates, guidelines on what to look for and when to buy, and the plate evaluation check-list used by the Ex-

DR. GEORGE C. THOSTESON.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am a man in my late 60s. My problem is sleeplessness. I can get to sleep, but awaken about 3 or 4 a.m. and can't get back to sleep. I am using sleeping pills, but they only make me drowsy the next day. I try drinking wine, but it doesn't work. Please discuss insomnia. - J.J.

There's a whole grab bag of causes of sleeplessness. Your letter offers a few

First, your age. Sleep needs tend to lessen with years. A man your age might expect to awaken at 3 a.m. or 4 a.m. if you retire at 9 p.m. after an inactive day.

I assume the pills are barbiturates. These come in many varieties and strengths. They are useful in certain situations, but can easily be overused or abused

There are two basic kinds of insomniacs. Some can get to sleep, but awaken later. Others cannot fall asleep to begin with. The pills can be tailored to individual needs. Shorter-acting ones may help those who cannot fall asleep to begin with. Longer-acting ones may help those, like yourself, who awaken in the early morning hours. The latter often cause daytime drowsiness.

Wine alone can be sleep inducing. It should NOT be used with barbiturates, which in conjunction with alcohol can dangerously multiply depressive effects and add to daytime drowsiness.

You don't mention your mental state. Depression and anxiety can cause insomnia, and sleeping pills can worsen this situation. If this shoe fits, put it on. Try to resolve any personal problems in the daytime. You can't settle much in the predawn hours.

Nor do you mention when you last had a good physical examination. A distended bladder from prostate enlargement, leg cramps, even nervous bowel can cause early awakening and sleeplessness.

Your pills aren't helping and they can be addictive, so little would be lost in weaning yourself from them. Avoid smoking or drinking excessive liquids at bedtime. A protein snack (cheese, meat, etc.) can ward off a late night blood sugar drop that causes awakening. Have a radio or some reading material on hand. You may be surprised how having something to do can help, as opposed to lying in restless silence. Make your room comfortable - not too hot, not too cold.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: As a regular reader of your column I note that some people seem to sleep poorly because of 'jitter leg." In any case, I have found the problem is minimized greatly by avoiding beverages containing either caffeine or alcohol. On the occasions when the problem does occur, I take about 12 milligrams of vitamin B-1. In a few minutes the jitters disappear as if by magic. -

The cause of jitter leg is obscure, but stimulants can aggravate the problem. It is hard to believe that a casual dose of vitamin B-1 would have such a magic effect, but there is certainly no objection to using it if it works this way for you.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Just what do the so-called fertility pills contain and how do they help a woman get pregnant? -

The pills contain substances that stimulate the pituitary gland. That is the mas-ter control gland of the body. Among its duties is control of other glands, including the ovaries. There it promotes ovulation - the production of ova (eggs).

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can you send me any written material on chronic black stool? - H.C.

You don't need written material. You do need an examination promptly. This is a sign of internal bleeding. Most chronic rectal bleeding is due to diverticulosis.



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

-By ERMA BOMBECK All the child psychology books I've ever read take you down the yellow brick road past puberty, serious petting, into mature relationships and leave you.

But parenting isn't like that. There are 30 million parents out there with kids be tween the ages of 18-55 who drift in and

out of their lives like a revolving door. The empty nest syndrome is overrated. I have heard of some parents who

moved during the night to another city (and left no forwarding 'address'). Others have installed pay showers. Still another parent I know waited until her son got up one night to use the bathroom, then painted his room pink and rented it to a pocket computer salesman.

No parent likes to change locks, but the situation is definitely getting out of hand. Children simply aren't leaving the home after school anymore as they did in the '60s. When they do, they multiply and come back tenfold.

So how do you displace an aging teenager? It isn't easy. When our son's bedroom began to take on the appeal of a roadside zoo (complete with sawdust on the floor), we took action.

First, we set the table for two. This made him aware that he was not expected for dinner. Second, we intercepted his mail, wrote

"No such person at this address" and had it returned to the post office for forwarding. We posted signs in the hallway reading, "OCCUPANCY BY MORE THAN

TWO IN THIS HOUSE IS A FIRE HAZ-ARD. We were considering telling him he would have to share his room with the family pet (and buying a wolf) when we

came up with a daring but cruel idea. We stopped stocking the refrigerator. I'll never forget the look of fear in that child's eyes standing in front of the re-

frigerator door (the hairs in his nose becoming frosted) saying, "Is that all there is?" if I live to be a hundred. We never saw him again.

You hear a lot of dialogue on the death of the American family. Families aren't dying. They're merging into big conglomerates. Daughters and sons who are between roommates (legal and lethal) drift in and approach the desk like they're in a hotel asking, "Is my old room still available?" Cribs and strollers appear with babies. Cars and special menus are requested.

A .- Bid three hearts. Now that partner has shown a spark of life by raising clubs, you should make an effort to get to game. We feel that three hearts gives your side the most options. By patterning out your hand, part-ner will be positioned to show belated spade support, bid three no trump with diamond values, or sign off in clubs if he feels his hand is unsuited for game. You might even locate a 5-3 heart fit! (Your hearts can't be a real suit - you would have bid them before clubs.)

Q.5-As South, vulnerable,

you hold: ♦ K854 ♥1072 ♦ KQ95 ♦ K2 The bidding has proceeded: North East South West 1 ♦ Pass 1 ♦ Pass 2 4 Pass ?

What action do you take? A .- Your hand merits one forward-going move. Since part-ner had the chance to bid one spade but did not, you can assume that he does not have four spades. He almost certainly has six clubs, so your choice is between a raise to three clubs and a bid of two no trump. Despite the fact that you have no heart stopper, we prefer two no trump because it describes both the strength and shape of your hand most accurately.

Q.6-Neither vulnerable, as South you hold: **♦ K96** ♥ K4 ♦ A1062 **♦** Q1073

The bidding has proceeded: North East South West Pass 1 0 Pass 2 0 Pass 4 4 Pass Pass 4 7 Pass 5 4 Pass

What do you bid now? A.-There's no question that you have the values for slam-but which slam should you bid? The auction has made it clear that your partner doesn't have the ace of spades—he bypassed the chance to cue-bid it. Thus, if you bid six clubs, a lead through the king of spades might earn the defenders the first two tricks. We would guard against this possibility by taking our chances in six no trump.

Q.7-Both vulnerable, as South you hold: ◆A1095 ♥AKJ72 ♦5 ◆KQ8 The bidding has proceeded: West North East South 1 Pass 2 7

What action do you take? A. - There is nothing you can do! The opponents have bid and raised your best suit and part-ner, despite the fact that he is probably void in hearts, could not enter the auction. Your best bet is to defend quietly and col-lect 100 points apiece for each unubled undertrick.

Q.8-As South, vulnerable, you hold:

♦ A872 ♥ A952 ♦ A73 ♦ Q10 The bidding has proceeded: East South West North Pass 2 7 Pass Pass

What action do you take? A. — As in question 2, we are not inclined to let the opponents buy the hand at two hearts when we know that partner has some values. This time, however, we would compete with a balancing double. True, a three club response might prove awkward, but we do have two good clubs and partner should be able to score a few tricks in his hand with heart ruffs. Add a couple of tricks with some high cards, and we won't be too badly off.

Dear Mort: The police officer made a mistake all right. He should not have said, "Sorry," and left. According to the Municipal Code of Chicago on Public Morals, .192, Section 7, committing an in-

decent act in a public place is illegal. An automobile is considered a public place. So is a park or any area where you might be observed by passers-by. It makes no difference how old you are or if you are single or married.

People of good taste and mature judgment are circumspect about where they make love. If they like the outdoors, they select a truly secluded spot in the wilder-

If you think this law interferes with your rights, let me remind you that other people have rights too, which include the right not to be confronted suddenly by a couple "doing what comes naturally.

Dear Ann Landers: A while back you printed a column about a woman who was married to a chain smoker. She wanted to know if it was possible for a non-smoker to be affected by "secondhand smoke." You said, "Yes."

I read that letter at work and applauded your reply because I suspected for a long time that second-hand smoke was indeed harmful. Some people I work with said you were crazy.

I read today in the newspaper where a cardiologist at the university of California did a study at the Long Beach Veterans hospital which proved that secondhand smoke DOES have a damaging effect on non-smokers - especially people who have heart conditions. Thought you'd like to know. - Long-Time Reader

Dear L.T.R.: Thanks for writing. And now I'd like to add a P.S.: Cigarette, cigar or pipe smoke can be very harmful to anyone who suffers from asthma, emphysema, allergies or hay fever. I urge those of you who cannot tolerate smoke to speak up when someone lights up in your presence. The air is just as much yours as it is his (or hers). No one has the right to pollute it.



Free Universities Sprout Nationwide

sel ne lenger means traditional classreems, tra-onal courses and the bether of grades and tests

IDANA, Kan. (AP) - Three wooden pews were his classroom, a piano bench his lectern. The bare light bulbs flickered as a summer storm threatened.

But to the 13 inquisitive minds assembled in the tiny church basement in north central Kansas, there was no setting anywhere more fertile for learning. Because beekeeping was the subject, and John Schweitzer, a wiry 73-year-old in green work clothes, the teacher.

And from the two young women in the front to the middle-aged men in the back, his audience listened, questioned, shared and learned.

In church basements and living rooms and even on backyard patios across the country, a few people are talking and a lot of others are learning - without grades, homework or pressure.

Nowhere is free education sprouting as in the Sunflower State, where the number of communities with some form of free university has jumped from four to 22 in less than four years.

That growth has its roots in people like Schweitzer, a service station operator by trade, and in places like Idana, where it's a half-minute walk from the center of town to acres and acres of Kansas wheat.

For his recent teaching debut, Schweitzer offered baby food jars of honey - "just enough for a flapjack;"gave advice to a farmer with an ornery swarm of bees on his land; and recommended that beekeepers keep their swarms away from the honeysuckle - "it'll make your honey smell like dirty socks."

Then there was that down-home smile and an embarrassed gesture. "When a bee man gets to talking - why, he sometimes says too many things."

Free universities have made a full turn. Known variously as open education exchanges, communiversities and experimental colleges, they have moved from the activist and often underground university of the 1960s to the adult education wave of the 1970s.

In 1968, they offered an atmosphere in which students could spout their views on the Vietnam war, racial unrest and universities of the day. In 1978, they coordinate classes for all ages on sock-darning, biofeedback, Frisbee-throwing and homosexual lifestyles.

And it hasn't stopped there! There's a class on fantasy, "Dungeons and Dragons," for those with active imaginations. "How-to" classes on canoeing, climbing, skiing and bicycling as well as house wiring, stereo installing, refinishing and auto repair are offered in many cities. Or you can learn to make-beef jerky, build sundials or play war-

In the self-help field, there is a course to help a divorcee cope with the problems of being single again.

About 300,000 persons attended classes last year at 175 free universities in the United States. Class length ranged from one meeting to weekly meetings for a year or longer.

These free universities are coordinated nationally by the Free University Network, which has adopted the acronym. FUN. It is based near Kansas State University in Manhattan in a former scholarty, University for Man.

Bill Draves, 29, who is on the paid staff of University for Man, coordinates the national organization in his spare time. A part-time secretary handles the paper-

Actually, FUN is little more than a telephone number, a mailing address and an annual convention - none of which bothers Draves.

"We don't want to be a big national organization that lobbies on the Hill and sells life insurance," Draves says. "We're an information clearing house and we'll always be promoting things at the local

Since 1974, FUN has published brochures for communities wanting to set up free universities. The educational concept born in Berkeley, Calif., during a free speech movement in 1964 has spread from college towns to other communi-

In Kansas, a program run by University for Man and supported by federal funds shows towns how to recruit teachers and set up classes.

The beekeeping class in Idana, for ex-

County Education Program, which was started by VISTA volunteers three years ago. The class was advertised in the county newspaper and a newsletter. Prospective participants were asked to sign up, but registration wasn't required. There was no fee, and there would be no grade or homework.

Clay County and most of the small communities of Kansas were once believed too tiny to support free universities. Draves remembers the doomsaying of one of his advisers, who said: "If you can get a Free U going in Clay County it'll be a miracle."

But today, population centers much smaller than Clay County's 10,000 support free universities.

"We used to think we'd have to hustle and promote these universities," Draves says. "But it's starting to snowball and I don't see any problems starting one anywhere in the country.

The idea for a free university is usually born in the community. Draves and his colleagues are called in to provide some pointers at an organizational meeting, and the rest is left up to town residents.

Korchnoi Wins Game Despite Time Pressure

BAGUIO CITY, Philippines (AP) - Soviet defector Viktor Korchnoi shook off the pressure of time trouble Sunday, made some fast, risky moves and won the 28th game of the world chess championship, keeping his hopes alive.

Korchnoi forced defending champion Anatoly Karpov to resign after 61 moves, but the 47-year-old challenger still trails five games to three. The first to win six games is champion and collects \$350,000. The loser takes \$200,000.

Jubilant over his victory, Korchnoi was asked if he could overcome Karpov's commanding lead. He paused momentarily and with a serious roaring voice, said:

Karpov, 27, played cautiously and passively in a game resumed Sunday after it was begun and adjourned Saturday.

Korchnoi agreed with most experts that his sealed 42nd move - a pawn to queen bishop four - was not the strongest. "It's not exactly a very good sealed move," Korchnoi said. "But Karpov played horribly.

With only 23 minutes left in his first one-hour time control period, Korchnoi played quickly and gambled. Karpov appeared to have gained a slight positional advantage as a result and began pressing. But Korchnoi engineered a complicated strategy and mobilized one of his

rooks to thwart Karpov's attack. On the 53rd move, the Soviet champion launched a rook assault with a series of checks on Korchnoi's black king. But by this time. Korchnoi had regained his composure and thwarted further at-

tempts by the champion. It was a classic victory for the stateless challenger and marked the first

seven years he had won over Karpov while playing the black pieces. "Korchnoi played sharp in this game,"

said British grandmaster Michael Stean. one of Korchnoi's seconds. "With the white pieces. Karpov is almost invincible. But tonight it was different.

Utility Tax Break Keyed To Bill Date

AUSTIN (AP) - Comptroller Bob Bullocks says all homeowners and renters should not expect their October gas and electricity bills to show the repeal of the state utilities sales tax.

"Under the law, the utility companies will continue adding the tax on their October bills if their billing cycle begins before Oct. 1." Bullock said in a weekend statement.

This means, he said, a customer whose billing cycle is Sept. 25 through Oct. 25 will continue to pay the sales tax through Oct. 25. A customer whose billing period is Oct. 3 through Nov. 3 will get advantage of the tax break as of Oct.

The recent special session of the Legislature repealed the four percent state sales tax on residential gas and electric bills, effective Oct. 1, for an annual tax savings of \$150 million. In addition, about 125 Texas cities also have eliminated the local option, one percent city sales tax on those bills.

member some of our more risque or radical offerings," Draves says.

Sue Maes, one of the founders of Manhattan's free university in 1968, is a nationally recognized leader in this method of learning. When an article on her antiwar views appeared in The New Yorker 10 years ago, Miss Maes' father was fired from his job at an American Legion post.

Those anti-war views, held by many other off-campus universities, "didn't put our programs in a particularly favora-ble light," she acknowledges now. "And it's taken us more than seven years to gain their trust."

The intent of those early free universities - to teach people what they weren't learning elsewhere - hasn't changed. "We're still the creative edge of knowledge," Draves says. "And if colleges really watched us closely they would know what they should be developing for the future.

ODESSA (AP) - A Humane Society official says he will seek criminal action against sponsors and participants in the World Championship Jackrabbit Roping Contest if the event takes place as planned Sunday at the Permian Basin Fair and Exposition in Odessa.

Institute Studies Strategy Problem

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By LOUIS NEVIN

LONDON (AP) - In the heart of London, two dozen people from a dozen countries are running a military information service in the belief that taxpayers have the right to know how their money is spent on defense.

Most represent NATO countries but the Soviet bloc is also represented. And the project to assess the facts of global armaments and strategy is backed by an array of public figures.

The International Institute for Strategic Studies says it is "concerned with strategic questions - not just with the military aspects of security but with the social and economic sources and political and moral implications of the use and existence of armed forces; in other words, with basic problems of peace." It has gotten high marks for ability and impartiality in a 20-year existence.

Its annual publications, The Military

around the world and are required reading for military men, diplomats and journalists.

Among the institute's recent findings: - In Sept. 1976, an analysis of the East-West balance of power showed that while the United States outranked the Soviet Union by more than two to one in the number of deliverable nuclear warheads, the Soviet Union lead by nearly the same margin the destructive force of the warheads.

In April 1977, it found that Soviet military modernization seemed to be ahead of western military updating in intensity and scope.

- This May, it reported on the Soviet Union's efforts, using Cuban troops, to expand its influence in Africa. It also reported "significant strains" in the western alliance over security relations, missile technology and concerns over the Soviet ability to launch nuclear strikes against western Europe.

The publications cover military hard-Its annual publications, The Military ware and manpower country by country, and the strategic implications of the de-

ng and efforts at disarmament.

Christoph Bertram, the Institute's West German director says preparation of the reports involves reporter-like digging by staff members, and a journalist's ability to present facts in a readable manner. He says it is no accident that the first two IISS directors, Alastair Buchan and Francois Duchene, were journalists.

Bertram's first essay amounted to a departure from long-standing practice in West Germany. In 1970, Helmut Schmidt, then Minister of Defense, called him in to write West Germany's first public policy document on defense aims and spending.

"You can't ask people to support the huge expenses involved in defense without telling them what it's for and how the money is spent," Bertram says.

Of medium height with tousled, longish brown hair and bright blue eyes, the 41-year-old Bertram is a dynamo of nervous energy. If a pipe puffer can be called a chain smoker, he fits the bill.

The 2,000 members come from 60 countries, including a handful from

Yugoslavia. There are none from the Soviet Union. Bertram says he does not know why.

Members have been invited to join because they "can make an expert or informed contribution" to the study of defense and security questions.

Among the American members is Henry A. Kissinger who frequently called on the Institute for studies while he was Secretary of State. Other western governments have also been said to have consulted IISS although staff members decline to confirm this.

In addition to its Military Balance, published in September, and the Strategic Survey published in the spring, IISS puts out eight to 10 are special studies commissioned by the Institute each year. IISS also publishes a bi-monthly magazine entitled Survival.

The Institute's 24 regular employees and another dozen temporary research associates are jammed into two floors of an early Victorian building belonging to the Royal Society of Arts at the Corner of Adam and John Adam Streets 100 vards from the River Thames.

UT Readies Gutenberg Display

as' Gutenberg Bible that viewers will see this fall inside a custom-built case once graced a monastery dining room, where monks held it in veiled contempt.

"Evidently, the monks felt a printed version wasn't the 'real' Bible," said Eric Poole, one of only a few persons who has seen the 15th Century book since it arrived on the University of Texas campus

"The monks got somebody to go through and compare Gutenberg's version with a manuscript Bible," said Poole, a visiting law professor from the University of Canterbury, England.

"Gutenberg apparently left out long draising organization.

AUSTIN (AP) - The University of Tex- passages, and his version made better sense in some instances. But the monks went and put all that back in, by hand. They even put in mistakes that entered the text through handwriting errors," Poole said.

The monks left other clues about the \$2.4 million Bible which Poole and others slowly are uncovering in advance of the books' public display.

UT joined an elite literary circle when university regents approved purchase of the leather-bound, twin volumes in June. The university will use \$1 million from its coffers. The rest will come from the 650member Chancellor's Council, a funties Research Center, the copy of the world's first printed book remains heavily guarded inside the UT police station at Memorial Stadium.

Other copies in the United States are at the Library of Congress, the Pierpoint Morgan Library in New York, the Yale University Library and the Houghton Library at Harvard University. The UT copy will be the only one west and south of Washington, D.C.

Only 20 complete copies survive from the historic 1450-1453 printing in Mainz, Germany. Another 28 incomplete volumes remain from what scholars believe was a 200-copy printing run.

Gutenberg sold the copies unbound and without decoration. Buyers choose bndings and added illumination.

GOP Making Slight Dr. William Todd, English professor and rare book specialist, inspected three Gutenberg's on the market before recom-**Gains In House Race** Your

In the race for the House of Representatives this fall, the Republicans continue to gain ground, although the Democrats still hold a substantial 51-37 percent lead. Back in 1974, at a comparable period, the Democrats were ahead by a wider 51-32

The pattern of these latest results, obtained in a special Harris-ABC News Poll of 1.500 likely voters, is as significant as the overall outcome:

-The strongest showing by the GOP this year will be in the Midwest, where the Republicans now hold a narrow 44-43 percent lead in the contests for the House seats. By contrast, the Democrats are well ahead by 53-36 percent in the East and by 57-31 percent in the South. In the West, the 51-36 percent Democratic lead is close to the national average.

-When party strength is analyzed by type of community, the biggest surprise is the relatively strong showing by the Democrats in the suburbs of the country, where they are running ahead by a substantial 53-36 percent. Back in 1976, the Republicans took the suburbs by a 55-44 percent margin, larger than in any other type of community. In modern politics, the suburbs have become the essential base for the Republican Party. Thus, these latest results from the suburbs indicate that the most important effort by the Republicans from now until Election Day ought to be made in the suburbs if they hope to score real gains in the congressiona; races.

The Republicans are running well in the small towns of the country, where they are even with the Democrats at 46-46 percent. In the rural areas, the Democrats hold only a slight 44-42 percent lead. The heart of Democratic strength, of course, can be found in the big cities, where Democrats are ahead by a substantial 59-28 percent, better than 2 to 1. The cities are where the Democrats must roll up their big majorities.

-Among black voters, the Democrats show a lopsided majority, leading in the race for House seats by a 79-9 percent margin. The Republicans have put more stress on courting the vote of the blacks this year than in the past, but it now seems unlikely that they will be able to make significant inroads into this traditionally solid Democratic group. Republican hopes for cutting into Democratic majorities among blacks were heightened when their candidates in some of the special elections scored effectively, especially in the South. There is now little sign of a carry-over of this success in the general election.

-The Republicans have also made special efforts to make inroads into the Democratic strongholds among Jewish and Catholic voters. However, Catholics express an intention to vote Democratic by a 53-34 percent margin and Jewish voters are going Democratic by an overwhelming 75-18 percent. Any doubts that Jewish voters might still harbor about President Carter are unlikely to affect the fortunes of Democratic candidates for congressional seats in areas where Jews are an important part of the consti-

-Among union voters, the Democrats have moved out to a wide 62-28 percent lead in the contests for House seats. Despite the reservations which leaders such as George Meany of the AFL-CIO might have expressed about the Carter White House, the rank-and-file of union members appear ready to return normal Democratic majorities in districts where these members are concentrated.

-The vote by political philosophy is interesting. The Republicans are winning

49-42 percent margin, despite the fact that in the South a sizable number of Democratic candidates will run as conservatives and will receive the conservative vote. Among liberals, the Democrats hold a commanding 72-20 percent lead.

When analyzed by ideology, the real difference in the vote rests with middleof-the-road voters, who at the moment are inclined toward the Democrats by a 50-37 percent margin. Until the GOP is able to convince more moderate voters to cast their ballots for them in the races for the House, the Republicans are likely to remain behind in these important elections this year.

-A real battleground can be found among the 30 percent of the entire electorate who say they are neither Republicans nor Democrats, but are now independents. This vote is obviously up for grabs, with the Democrats holding only a slight 42-40 percent edge. As is usual in off-year elections, the independents are likely to wait until the close of the campaigning to make up their minds. They could make a real difference in the outcome if they were to break decisively for

Basically, the Democrats are ahead because they have been able to hold onto the "gut" vote among the lower income groups, ethnic and racia; minorities, trade union members and Southern residents. They have also made some significant inroads into Republican territory in the suburbs. The Republicans are gaining in the Midwest, in small towns and in rural areas. But until they are able to score better gains in the suburbs and among moderate-minded, more independent voters, they are likely to end up the minority in the House by not too different a division than exists now. However, what makes the 1978 race interesting is that the GOP has a real chance to register gains and can even gain the momentum in this election - if they do not paint themselves into a corner where they are viewed as being essentially conservative or right wing in their outlook.

Brain Map Pinpoints Language Area

(EDITOR'S NOTE — Special experiments during brain surgery, with the patient wide awake through-out, are removing some of the mysteries of how the brain deats with language.)

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) - Harry Whitaker is exploring the small, mysterious sphere inside the human cranium, mapping the sites of language in the

In a series of remarkable experiments, the University of Rochester neuropsychologist and neurolinguist has found that a much wider area of the brain than previously suspected is involved in language - more than half of the left hemisphere in 90 percent of all people.

Language function is located in the left hemisphere. The right hemisphere is devoted to visual and spacial functions.

Whitaker has also found that different languages occupy different parts of the left hemisphere in a person who speaks more than one.

Moreover, "our brain is as unique as our face," Whitaker says. Brains differ from person to person, something "we suspected, but this is the first direct physiological evidence."

"It gives us an opportunity to explore the brain that you can't do any other way," Whitaker says.

The open brain operation has been standard clinical practice for three or four decades in the treatment of epileptics who don't respond to drug treatment. Only about three to four percent of epileptics require the surgery. (Epilepsy traces to a brain malfunction characterized by "electrical storms," uncontrolled electrical discharge from the affected brain cells.)

The patient can be kept awake and alert during the operation because the brain itself is not sensitive to pain, Whitaker says. While the brain sends pain signals to the rest of the body, it has no pain sensors of its own. So it's possible for the neurosurgeon to open the scalp, using a local anesthetic, and proceed to test for "good brain or bad brain."

To test the cells, the surgeon uses a pair of electrodes, tiny silver balls five millimeters apart.

The electrodes constitute a probe to explore the brain cells. A very weak electrical current, of the same intensity as the normal electrical activity of the brain, is sent through the probe. The current, however, is converted to a different pattern so it deliberately interferes with the brain's normal functioning at that precise

To find the "bad brain" sections of the epileptic, the neurosurgeon performs what amounts to a direct EEG, electro-

encephalogram. The electrodes are connected to a recording machine with a graph. When they come in contact with damaged brain cells the chart will display characteristic epileptic activity, jagged lines on the paper. The surgeon then has to decide how much tissue can safely be removed.

Under these circumstances, then, Whitaker had the opportunity to map the brain for the precise location of language function in "good brain." The technique is to evoke errors in the epileptic's brain function. Another person in the operating room will show the patient some familiar object, say a picture of a ship, or ask the patient is doing this, the neurosurgeon moves the electrodes around the surface of the brain cells.

When the brain section involved in this language activity is touched with the electrodes, that brain function is suddenly interrupted — so quickly that the brain lacks time to compensate or reorganize itself - and the patient cannot complete the language task. That pinpoints the lo--cations of language.

"You find out that way what that piece of brain is doing," Whitaker explains. He says the systematic mapping adds only a few minutes to an operation that can last

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The Rochester scientist emphasizes his finding that a surprisingly large amount of the left hemisphere is devoted to language, especially when you consider the enormous range of motor and physiological functions the brain performs. The mapping of language sites also has implications for the neurosurgeon who is operating on epileptics - he then knows precisely which portions of the brain are for language and will be careful not to remove so much tissue that the patient's ability to think and speak is impaired.

It is a drama played out elsewhere in India these days.

Thousands of high caste students filled the streets and clashed with police to protest a law that would reserve 26 percent of government jobs for "backward" classes - Untouchables and other minorities - over and above the 24 percent previously earmarked for them. Similar demonstrations flared in

neighboring Uttar Pradesh State at the same time. Hundreds were injured in the two states. Violent protests against new plans to

alleviate the plight of India's 95 million Untouchables come on top of atrocities that were familiar in Gandhi's day, and long before. Almost daily, newspapers report cases

of Untouchables beaten or even burned alive for having drawn water from the village well or prayed at a local temple. Madhya Pradesh State in central India reported that 105 Untouchable; were murdered during a nine-month period This summer higher caste students

rampaged for 11 days in the western state of Maharashtra in protest of a recommendation to name a university after an Untouchable leader. Eleven persons were killed and scores

Jats hurled rocks at Untouchables and broke down their doors after last December's village council election in which land was the major issue, Singh He said Untouchables have been sub-

jected to a social and economic boycott for months, "We have to travel six miles to shop because storekeepers here refuse to serve us." Many Untouchables have removed their children from the local school because of harassment, he ad-

Tensions heightened this summer. An Untouchable's hut was burned down in July. A month later, Jats ran several hundred head of cattle through the Untouchables' fields, trampling 35 acres of newly planted corn. Fighting ensued and seven Untouchables, including two women, were beaten. In late July the Jats attracted 5,000 fel-

low caste members, many travelling from neighboring villages in tractor and camel-pulled carts, for a meeting on the land issue. "The fact is that a minority, given un-

due administrative and political shelter, is being placated for political reasons," a Jat speaker told the rally. "We are being tormented by a minority.' In mid-August, after the prime minis-

Latin American Workers Still Poor

wage for all employed Chileans. Still, because of Chile's relatively good overall living standards, compared to the rest of Latin America, many unionized workers here continue to hang onto basic middle-class amenities such as refrigerators, TV sets and new clothes.

ARGENTINA: Unions, which once were the most prosperous in Latin America during Juan D. Peron's first presidency in the 1950s, now are succumbing to the effects of a tough military regime and triple-digit inflation.

Unions now have no say in determining wages, working conditions or company policies, as they once had.

Union political dealings, union threats of violence and paralyzing nationwide general strikes also have passed into Argentine history.

Still, because of Argentina's relative prosperity, in Latin American terms, union workers here live reasonabley well. They eat steak several times a week. They often have cars, and they frequently own their own homes.

HEARTLINE: I am going to be 62 An unskilled Peruvian factory worker early next year. I work in private business so I am covered by Social Security. I am not quite sure what to do about my retirement. I can retire from my companv at age 62 or I can stay until age 65. I realize that if I retire at age 62 I must take reduced Social Security benefits. Would you suggest doing this or should I wait until age 65 to draw my full benetary-run government feels like giving

fits? - J.M. This is one of the hardest questions you can ask yourself, but you are the only one who can answer it. There is not only the financial question, but the question of what you are going to do with yourself. Here are some factors to consi-

1. If you start drawing Social Security at age 62, you are receiving three additional years of income from it, but this income would be 20 percent less yearly

than if you wait until age 65.

2. If you wait until age 65 to draw, you would receive full Social Security benefits, but the money you lost during the three years (from 62 to 65) you did not draw Social Security benefits will take 12 years of drawing to regain. This is based strictly on income from Social Seourity.

3. You must decide if a reduced Social Security benefit will be sufficient to meet your present and future monetary needs or if the full benefit will be neces-

We also feel that there are other factors you must consider: the amount of money you would lose by leaving your present job: your present health; your desire to continue working; and the effect of early retirement on your private pension plan, if you have one. Since everyone's situation is different, there will probably be additional questions only you can answer. Weigh these questions carefully in your own mind and make the decision as to when to retire only when you have ansswered them.

ternity home in this Bavarian village in that time were the offspring of Adolf Hitler's experiments, which did not involve laboratory conception as in Britain but rather a strict and sometimes forced selection of prospective parents with the aim of expanding "Aryan" (Caucasian)

Britain's "test tube" baby, Louise Brown, was born of a married couple who could not have children because of a blockage of the wife's Fallopian tubes. An egg was surgically removed from Mrs. Lesley Brown, fertilized in a laboratory with her husband's sperm and then implanted in the mother's womb. The girl was born July 25 in what was described as a breakthrough for women who cannot bear children because of Fallopian block-

The offspring of the Nazi's selective breeding experiments were known as the "fuehrer kinder" because they were born and reared within a specially chosen SS (Elite Guard) society called "Lebensborn," which means wellspring

The progeny of "racially pure" SS officers and pedigreed women were destined sten's memoirs quote Himmler as saying.

STEINHOERING, West Germany to become the second generation of rulers of Hitler's empire. There have been no comprehensive studies on how they have fared since 1945.

While some were the children of SS officers and their wives, birth certificates show 90 percent of those born in the clinic here were illegitimate, many of them products of liaisons in an SS bordello 20 miles to the west in Munich.

SS chief Heinrich Himmler established Lebensborn to propagate the Germanic race and encourage SS members to increase their families. He was distressed by Germany's low birthrate because, with a war looming, Nazi German expansion depended on a large population to conquer territory and colonize it.

Himmler wanted to breed the SS into a biological elite. He believed that not only physical attributes but also character traits such as loyalty and courage could be biologically transmitted.

"Privately I let it be known that any unmarried woman who was alone in the world and longed for a child might turn to Lebensborn with perfect confidence,' Himmler is quoted as telling his physician, Felix Kersten, in 1943.

"I've given such women the opportunity to have a child. The woman receives assistance, has the happy experience of being a mother ... while the state receives a valuable addition to the nation," Ker-

"You can imagine we only employ valuable and racially pure men as 'conception assistants."

Most of the mothers were Germans. Other women with appropriate features and ancestry were recruited from Nazioccupied Western Europe, Scandinavia and the Balkans. Fifteen maternity homes were scattered over the Nazi Reich, including France, Norway, Poland and Austria.

"The women were sent to the Lebensborn clinic here three months after becoming pregnant, and they got the best possible medical care," Steinhoering's mayor, Karl Stabernak, 53, said in an interview with The Associated Press.

"After giving birth, they stayed on for three months and then went away. Only a few took their babies with them after the war," he added. "Most were afraid to go back home with a Lebensborn baby.' Most Lebensborn children were raised

by SS foster families.

More than 200 abandoned children, ranging from infants to 4-year-olds, and a few mothers and pregnant women were found in the home by U.S. troops who arrived in May 6, 1945. Most of the mothers and officials had fled.

"The U.S. Army took care of these babies, and many were later adopted by Americans," Stabernak said.

Lebensborn officials testified at the

Nuremberg war crimes trials that altogether 12,000 children were born at the clinics, half of them illegitimate.

It has been difficult to trace the Lebensborn children because many records were lost or destroyed and foster parents often concealed their adopted children's

At Steinhoering clinic, which had its own registry office separate from the village's, the records of the births between 1934 and 1945 were kept in seven bound

The child's family name invariably was given as that of the mother, and the mother's home usually was listed as the street address of a former SS officers club in Munich.

'Thank God we got these records before they were destroyed at the end of the war," Mayor Stabernak said. "We have to deal with lots of inquiries from persons born at that clinic."

One birth certificate at Steinhoering records a girl born Jan. 10, 1940, at 6:25 p.m. The child's name was Helga Elisabeth. The mother was named but not the father. A later entry showed Helga Elisabeth was married in Duesseldorf Dec. 11,

"Everything was the best at the clinic - doctors, nurses and facilities," Stabernak said.

"The women here came from all occu-

peaches, partly caused by weather prob-

pations - teachers, students, maids, saleswomen, secretaries, cooks and astresses," he said, leafing through the birth registry, which lists the mothers' vocations and family names.

Stabernak said the Nazis took over the gray stone building on the edge of the vil-lage in 1934 and added a three-story annex in 1938.

After the war the buildings became a Roman Catholic home for retarded youth.

"Terrible the way they bred those children," said an elderly nun in a gray habit, showing a reporter through the buildings. "Those babies were disciplined like little soldiers. They were taught to keep their eyes straight ahead."

The former delivery room, tiled in grey and green, now serves as a workshop for manufacturing electrical circuits.

Himmler required all high-ranking SS officers to join Lebensborn, where their wives could get maternity care and large families were promised financial assist-

Steinhoering was the first Lebensborn clinic. Racial requirements initially were so stringent that by 1938 only 653 mothers were accepted at the growing system of clinics — only 40 percent of the appli-

Although Himmler foresaw the real task of Lebensborn coming after Nazi Germany had won the war, as early as May 8, 1942, he ordered the Lebensborn chief, SS Col. Max Sollmann, to expand the headquarters in Munich "in view the fact that about 400,000 women won't be able to get a man because of the war and its dead."

In 1943 Himmler ordered that wome made pregnant by German troops were to be seized and examined by SS doctors to determine racial makeup. If both the soldier and the foreign woman received racial certification, the woman was forcibly sent to Lebensborn homes to have the children, after which the baby was taken away and placed in an SS foster home.

Another aspect of the Nazi scheme involved the bringing of biologically valuable children from eastern and southeastern Europe and placement in SS foster families in Germany. After the war, Lebensborn officials connected with the

scheme were charged with kidnapping.
As many as 200,000 Polish children are believed to have been brought to Germany in this way, with their backgrounds so obscured that only 30,000 to 40,000 were identified after the war, Polish authorities say.

Lebensborn chiefs testified at the Nuremberg war crimes trials that the system was a welfare program to care for war orphans. The prosecution was unable to link them to kidnapping and they were convicted of a lesser charge of belonging to a criminal organization.

U.S. Peach Consumption Down

Patterns/Needlework

HUGHSON, Calif. (AP) - When Keith Monroe took over his dad's 60-acre cling peach ranch here two years ago, he bulldozed every peach tree out of the ground.

Monroe thus joined a growing number of farmers who have abandoned peaches, once California's most glamorous crop. This state is the nation's only producer of cling peaches, used for canning, and the principal grower of freestone peaches, which are sold fresh, frozen or dried.

Those in the peach industry believe that the American propensity for fast food and for restaurant meals has made this country less interested in peaches and some other fruits, especially when canned. Fresh peaches seem to be buck-

ing the trend. Almost all the nation's cling peaches are grown in the central part of the state. Since the fruit sticks to the pit in this type of peach, making it harder to eat than the freestone variety, the only commercial use of clings is for canning.

"It's one of the highest-risk crops around, especially considering the market situation where you might get through the natural risks and not have a market," says Monroe. "Peaches (any variety) are a high-expense crop to bring to harvest. Looking at that in comparison to other crops, the return on your investment is a lot better with almonds or some other crops."

The Monroe ranch already had some cherry and walnut trees intermingled with the clings, and Monroe planted more cherries plus almonds. Harvesting is mechanized in almonds and walnuts Cherries are handpicked but "come off quick." Monroe says.

By contrast, peaches grow slowly from flower to bud to golden red fruit, and are hand-harvested from mid-July to early September. Peaches require costly thinning and pruning, while nuts and cherries need little pruning and no thinning.

More acres of cling peach trees have been pulled than have been planted in nine of the past 10 years, California Canning Peach Association statistics show.

"The industry has not been very profitable the last few years for growers and canners alike," said the association's Dennis Icardi. "This is the basic reason for the pullouts to begin with. Alternative crops have been more attractive."

Sales of top-grade clings have slipped steadily from a high of 775,000 tons in 1969. Production may be less than 540,000 tons this year, the lowest in two decades, Icardi said. The production of freestone peaches also is declining. The 1978 Cali-

Consumers' Pessimism Taking Hold

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) - Consumers are more pessimistic about the economy than at any time since the last recession, and are growing more savingsconscious and less buying-minded, a leading consumer survey reported on Sunday

On the average, consumers expect prices to increase 9.8 percent during the next 12 months, compared to a 7.2 percent rise they predicted a year ago, the University of Michigan's Survey Research Center reported in its quarterly report on consumer attitudes.

The results reflect "heightened fears of inflation and declining confidence in government economic policies," said survey director Richard T. Curtin and survey founder George Katona.

Fifty-one percent of the 1,200 people polled in August expect bad economic times, and 33 percent predict good times. "This represents a significant deterioration from a year ago when the proportion expecting good times outnumbered those expecting bad times by 45 percent to 30 percent," the survey au-

The survey reports that: · Fifty percent of those surveyed believe it a good time to buy homes compared to 56 percent a year ago. Nearly one in five, twice the proportion of a year ago, cite high interest rates and

tight credit as reasons not to buy now. • For the first time since the 1974-75 recession, more respondents consider it a bad time to purchase a car than a good



Stella Begins Gulf Stream Swim Attempt

ABOARD THE IDLE DAY (AP) -Stella Taylor, twice conquerer of the English Channel, waded into the Gulf Stream on Sunday to try again to be the first person to swim from the Bahamas to the United States.

Dressed in a one-piece bathing suit and wearing goggles and a red swim cap, Miss Taylor, 46, began her planned 140mile swim at 9:40 a.m. CDT.

It was her second attempt to cross the Gulf Stream from the Bahama Islands to Florida. She was pulled from the sea only a dozen miles from her destination when she first tried the feat six weeks

Her latest attempt was scheduled to get under way Saturday but was delayed by bad weather. Winds were light and waves were less than 3 feet at the start of the swim Sunday

"I'm going to do it this time," she had said Friday, before the one-day delay.

On Sunday, Miss Taylor started from Orange Cay, 48 miles south of the Bimini Islands, closest of the Bahamas to the United States. Last time, she started from Gun Cay, about a dozen miles south of the main Bimini group.

As on her first attempt, Miss Taylor was not using a shark cage, which she said she couldn't afford anyway. For safety she was depending on assistants paddling large surfboards to either side.

The assistants were to chase away sharks or any other danger rising from the sea, but they would be unable to stop jellyfish floating on the surface. Miss Taylor's arms still bear the scars of Portuguese men-of-war that wrapped their stinging tentacles around her during her first tr

Miss Taylor came to the United States in the early 1960s and lived in Buffalo, N.Y. before moving to near Fort Lauderdale in Florida.

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Aussies Make Film On Vietnam

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) - The Australians have joined the Vietnam War movie sweepstakes with a biting comedy about a group of Australia's toughest soldiers who fought beside the Americans in the jungles of Phuoc Tuy and the bars of

"The Odd Angry Shot" is the first non-American movie about Vietnam and views the war through the eyes of friendly but sometimes competitive allies.

Many Americans may have forgotten that Australia was one of the few countries to send combat troops to Vietnam - 47,000 over seven years - but the Aussies haven't forgotten. In fact, Australia's involvement in the war became almost as much an issue here as the American involvement did in the United States.

Graham Kennedy, one of Australia's leading television personalities, who stars in the movie, said in an interview that the producers felt "enough time has passed now to bring the subject up

The Americans have apparently made the same assessment, because a half-dozen Vietnam movies have been or are about to be released after more than a decade when producers considered the war an untouchable subject. The new American crop includes "Who'll Stop the Rain?," "Coming Home," "The Boys in Company C," "Heroes" and "Tell it to the Spartage "

"The Odd Angry Shot," scheduled to be released early next year, follows the six-man "21 Patrol" of the Australian ar-

my's Special Air Service during a year's tour of duty in Vietnam in the late '60s.

The little-known but highly trained SAS, somewhat comparable to the American Ranger units, specialized in longrange reconnaissance behind enemy lines and lived by the motto "Who Dares Wins." There were about 100 SAS troops in Vietnam at all times from 1966 until 1972, based in Phuoc Tuy Province south-

During the war, the Australians lost 415 men but only four were from the SAS. Kennedy noted that the casualty figure in the movie in which two members of the patrol are killed is unrealistically high for an actual SAS operation.

The film traces the frustrations and petty pleasures of life in the base camp,

mixing the boisterous enjoyment of cards, booze and women with the harsh reality of mortar attacks and booby trapped mines. One scene shows a fight between the SAS' pet giant spider and the pet scorpion of a group of American artillerymen.

"It has some dramatic moments but the director tells us it's a comedy," said Kennedy. "We don't quite go as far as wrecking Saigon, but we do some stupid things. When it's time to let off steam, we really let off steam."

Kennedy, who plays battle-scarred Cmdr. Harry, said: "Hopefully it will just be enjoyable. It doesn't have a strong message. If it has any message, it's just don't go to war."

Part of the movie was shot in and around the Australian army's land warfare center at Canungra, about 450 miles north of here.



Rhodesia's Smith Makes Appeal To Whites To Slow Emigration

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP) - Appearing almost plaintive, Prime Minister Ian Smith recently exhorted fellow whites to wait "just a few more months" before deciding whether to leave Rhode-

From the man who once pledged the white minority - now outnumbered 26 to 1 by blacks - would rule this country for 1,000 years, the plea sounded much like an admission of defeat.

Over the past few months, as guerrillas have noticeably loosened the administration's control over vast tracts of this Montana-sized land, Smith's three moderate black colleagues in the transition government also have been urging whites

The soothing appeals from the black leaders - that whites are wanted and needed in the black-ruled nation to be renamed Zimbabwe, that property will not be seized and pensions will be paid are partly a sign of expressed willingness to forget past bitterness.

There is also a sense of pragmatism that, with no sign of a cease-fire or international recognition, whites are needed if the transition administration and any guerrilla-opposed black government which succeeds it are to survive.

However, every month about 1,000 more whites pack up and go, despite tight exchange control regulations which allow each family to take out only \$1,400 and limited personal belongings.

to official statistics. This meant the white al trade sanctions and the stepped up population now probably is below 255,000 in contrast to 277,000 in January 1976.

At a recent military briefing, an official suggested only 230,000 whites remain allowing for people who simply leave as vacationers and never return and families who send sons out of the country for schooling to avoid military call-up.

Officials announced last month that three state-run white schools will close in December because of dwindling enrollments. The number of children at the state's segregated white, Asian and mixed-race schools dropped by nearly 2,-000 to 56,620 between 1976 and 1977.

At its peak some 10 years ago, the white population nudged 280,000. In contrast, the black population, with one of the world's three highest birth rates, has shot up from some 4 million 15 years ago to nearly 7 million, and is increasing rapid-

Last month Breen bought himself out of his \$700-a-month, three-year contract as a police instructor in counter-insurgency methods, sold his farm and, with his Rhodesian bride Patricia, went home.

Q. We are a middle-class couple and own no stocks, bonds or any other investment. We have six months' salary in a savings account. Our only other asset is our home worth approximately \$80,000, on which there is a \$20,000 mortgage.

Our problem is that our daughter will enter college in four years and we will be faced with education costs. We can invest \$200 a month between now and the time she enters college. How can we invest

A. There are many ways open to you. But, because four years is such a relatively short time, you should slam the door shut on anything that even hints of risk.

Considering the amount of money you have available for that education fund, about the only thing you can start with that offers safety in fixed numbers of dollars is a savings account. After you have fattened up the education fund, you can start buying insured savings certificates.

You should transfer some of the money you now have in the savings account into savings certificates, because certificates pay higher interest than savings accounts. Three months' salary is the generally-recommended amount to have tucked away in a savings account. Most people don't even accomplish that.

The lesson here, of course, is that parents should begin putting money aside for college expenses long before kids enter high school. A. There's no one central source for information about companies "going publ-

ic" - by offering stock to the investing public. Large offerings must be registered with the U.S. Securities & Exchange Commissions. Smaller offerings are often just filed with state regulatory agencies. A number of financial publications print lists of new offerings but they often miss some of the smaller ones.

I suggest you contact that company and find out what brokerage firm is acting as its investment banker. A chief function of an investment banker is to handle the initial sale of a company's stock.

Then, go to the brokerage firm, open an account and explain that you want to buy some of that company's stock when and if it is put up for sale.

Q. I am 65. My husband is 73. We own our home and car and have no debts. We receive \$552 a month from Social Seourity and \$1,500 a year from dividends on stocks we own. We have \$126,000 in 71/2 percent savings certificates and \$3,000 in Series E U.S. Savings Bonds.

A. My calculator shows that your family income is \$17,214 a year. This means your present standard of living is 'invading your capital" by almost \$4,000

Every actuarial table I have ever seen indicates you both will "make it." I come from a line of long-lived Irishmen and certainly don't plan to die broke. But I also hold to the theory that retired people should "live a little" on what they accumulated during their working years. If your capital shrinks too far, cut back on your gifts to the children.

Heart Attack Ends Long Career Of Ventriloquist Edgar Bergen

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Edgar Bergen, who over six decades became America's favorite ventriloquist playing straight man to an irreverant dummy named Charlie McCarthy, is dead at age 75.

Bergen died in his sleep of an apparent heart attack Saturday, less than two weeks after announcing his planned retirement. His body was being flown here

The night before his death, Bergen appeared at Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas in the second performance of what was to be his farewell nightclub run.

He told the audience, "Every act has a beginning and an end and now it's time for me to pack up my jokes and my friends." He received a four-minute standing ovation and packed his wooden family into a trunk.

Bergen, who disclosed a heart condition in a recent interview, announced on Sept. 21 that he was leaving show business. His sidekick was puzzled.

"How can you retire," Charlie asked, 'when you haven't worked since you met-

Bergen said then he would donate Charlie to the Smithsonian Institution.

'He and his sidekick, Charlie McCarthy, were my earliest inspirations," said Rickles. "It was Bergen, through Charlie,

who developed to perfection the art of insult comedy that so many of us employ

Bergen was born in Chicago on Feb. 16, 1903, the son of Swedish parents, John and Nellie Bergren, who ran a retail dairy business. His family lived at different times near Decatur, Mich., Sweden and Chicago The idea for McCarthy, Bergen once

explained, came from a cocky Irish newsboy who sold papers in his neighborhood. Bergen took his sketches of the newsboy to a carpenter, who carved the dummy's head from a \$35 block of white pine. "In my senior year in high school in

Chicago, my English teacher told me that I shouldn't count on graduating," Bergen said. After his teacher saw the duo perform, "she said the world needs laughter more than another history teacher.'

Early in his career, Bergen worked nightclubs and vaudeville and first attained national fame with the Chase and Sanborn Coffee radio show, which went on the air May 9, 1937. For years, the show was rated No. 1.

Bergen received a special Academy Award for many appearances in motion

He appeared in about 20 short films and several million-dollar musicals, including "Goldwyn Follies" in 1938. He later performed with W.C. Fields in movies like "You Can't Cheat an Honest Man" and " Song of the Open Road" in

McCarthy's feud with Fields was legendary. "Are you eating a tomato, or is that your nose?" McCarthy often asked

the famous comedian. Fields would reply, "Why, you block-head! I'm going to feed you into a pencil

But since nothing seems to come easy to this year's Fighting Irish, they had to come from behind in the third period on Jerome Heavens' 26-yard touchdown run and a 27-yard field goal by Joe Unis to defeat Purdue 10-6 and keep from becoming the first Notre Dame team to wear an 0-3 stigma.

"We won 10 in a row and then lost two in a row," Coach Dan Devine said, comparing the 1977 national championship stretch drive to this year's start. "Believe me, 10 in a row is better."

Meanwhile, the top nine teams in The Associated Press ratings posted victories but 10th-ranked Florida State stumbled and lost to Houston 27-21.

Top-rated Oklahoma rolled to a 28-0 lead and whipped 14th-ranked Missouri 45-23. The Sooners rushed for 484 yards, with Billy Sims carrying 14 times for 166 and four touchdowns-he had a 78-yarder called back by a penalty-and David Overstreet adding 153 on 10 carries, including a 64-yard scoring dash.
