In a repeat performance of last winter's protest against low farm prices, American Agriculture leaders say at least 1,000 tractors will roll toward the nation's capitol as soon as the December harvest has

"The purpose of the tractorcade is to inform Congress that the situation is worse," said Gerald McCathern, American Agriculture leader from Hereford.

"Our cotton crop is not near as good as last year's, the corn crop is only a little better, and inflation and higher prices have destroyed about 30 percent of our purchasing power.

"We are at about the same level below parity as last year, about 63 percent below," he said.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Statuesque Dolly Parton, whose "Here You Come Again" was a million-seller, was named country music's entertainer of the year Monday night.

At the 12th annual Country Music Association awards show at the Grand Ole Opry House, Miss Parton topped Crystal Gayle, Ronnie Milsap, Kenny Rogers and Mel Tillis for the top award.

"Heaven's Just A Sin Away" by the Kendalls was named single of the year, displacing the Statler Brothers, who had won the honor six straight years. The Oak Ridge Boys' band was picked instrumental group of the year.

Top Duo Selected Kenny Rogers and Dottie West were chosen vocal duo of the year. "It Was Almost Like A Song" by Ronnie Milsap was album of the year and Richard Leigh won song of the year for "Don't It

Make My Brown Eyes Blue." Grandpa Jones became the 31st member of the Country Music Hall of Fame. Miss Parton also was a front-runner for CMA awards a year ago, but won nothing. Asked recently if she felt there was resentment against her, she said: "I hope not. I like to think I am representing country music the best way I know bow. I always intend to. I wouldn't want an award unless they felt I deserved it."

Singing Style Altered In the past several months, she has altered her singing style to appeal to pop music audiences as well as country audi-

"It proved to be a smart move," she said. "It's been a good year, and I expect next year to be a good year too."

The winners were selected by the 5,000 musicians, singers, songwriters and music industry executives, who are members of the CMA.

In Peace Talks Opene WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter will personally open the Mideast peace talks beginning here Thursday between the defense and foreign ministers of Egypt and Israel, a White House offi-

cial said Monday. Carter, whose popularity rose dramati-cally after the Camp David accords were announced Sept. 17, will participate in the opening of the conference "to under-line the importance that we place on it and our continuing role in it," said the of-

The official, who declined to be identified, also left open the possibility that the president would meet at the White House with members of the Israeli and Egyptian delegations before the start of the

"Lots Of Detail" Waiting Israeli Defense Minister Ezer Weizman said Monday that Israel and Egypt have "lots of detail" to negotiate before they sign a peace treaty.

"Both sides are very experienced in war, but this is the first time we are dealing in peace treaties," Weizman told reporters in Tel Aviv as he prepared to leave for the Washington conference.
"We have lots of detail ... a lot on the essence of good neighborliness."

Although some members of the Israeli and Egyptian delegations have said they expect the peace talks to last two or three weeks, the White House official said, 'That is not something we can control."

Frameworks for the peace treaty were anounced Sept. 17 by Carter, Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat after 13 days of intense negotiations at Camp David, Md.

At the time, Begin and Sadat both praised Carter's extensive role in winning the accords, and the president's ratings

soared in public opinion polls.

Vance Heads U.S. Group
Secretary of State Cyrus Vance is heading the U.S. delegation to the talks beginning Thursday, but is scheduled to leave Saturday on missions to South Africa and Moscow. A State Department spokesroman said, however, that senior U.S. officials would be involved at all times.

Meanwhile, Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan, who is heading the Israeli delegation, urged other Arab nations on Monday to join the peace process. But he defended Israeli control of all Jerusalem and Jewish settlement of the West Bank.

Cartel Threatens Oil Supply Cuts

VIENNA. Austria (AP) - The OPEC "Denver, Amarillo, and Dallas are othoil cartel threatened Monday to begin cutting back crude oil supplies to indus-trialized nations if they don't make it easier for OPEC to get into the "downstream" end of the business - produc-ing and selling gasoline and other finished petroleum products.

"We can no longer afford to play the role of mere ... suppliers of raw material." said Ali Jaidah, secretary-general of the 13-nation Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries. His comments came at an OPEC seminar on downstream operations and were echoed by the oil minister of Kuwait, Ali Khalifa al-Sabah.

Sabah, the seminar chairman, said the first way industrialized countries discourage OPEC nations from making and selling finished products is by imposing high license fees on the transfer of technological know-how the oil countries need to build refineries and other plants. Then, Sabah said, when OPEC countries try to market the products back in industrialized nations, those governments impose quotas and prohibitively high tariffs on them.

In a speech to the U.N. General Assembly, Dayan said Jerusalem "is the one and only eternal capital of Israel" and added, "We have resolved never again to compromise the unity of Jerusalem. ..."

Dayan said Israeli settlements in the Gaza district and in Judea and Samaria

"are there as of right.... It is inconceivable to us that Jews should be prohibited from settling and living in Judea

and Samaria."
Egyptian Defense Minister Kamal Hassan All, who with Acting Foreign Minis-

ter Boutros Ghali heads the Egyptian delegation, said in Cairo that he is carrying a draft treaty to the Washington conference. He said he expects the negotiations here to last two to three weeks.

The accords drafted by Sadat, Begin and Carter at Camp David would end hostilities between Israel and Egypt, establish diplomatic relations and give Israel security guarantees in exchange for Israel's withdrawal from the occupied Sinaf Peninsula.

its Arab foes, but the other Arab gover

The talks beginning Thursday will focus on the timetable for withdrawal of Israeli forces in the Sinar and the demarcation zones in which Israeli, Egyptian and United Nations troops will be stationed at each stage of the withdrawal.

Negotiators also will work on details of the autonomous Arab government that will administer the West Bank and the Gaza Strip for the next five years.

JP Threatens To Turn Away **Check Cases**

JUSTICE of the Peace Charles Smith said Monday he will begin turning away certain requests for prosecution of hot check cases because county commissioners have refused to provide him with an additional secretary.

After the commissioners' decision Monday. Smith said he and JP Wayne LeCroy of Precinct 6 have been overburdened for about three years and that even the total of five secretarie asked commissioners for would barely be adequate.

He said two or three persons per day likely will be turned away. Most will be owners of small businesses, clients "that we have never heard of or seen before," Handles 35 To 50 Daily

Smith said he handles 35 to 50 persons with hot-check complaints daily and most of those individuals bring five to 10 checks at a time. He said that figure did not include large clients like grocery store chains.

The Precinct 1, Place 2 JP said his office has collected about \$300,000 in restitution, mostly for hot checks, this year. He said his comments were "to draw attention" to what he termed the commissioners' failure to provide him with the necessary help.

"I don't have anything to lose, really,"

Smith had told the court he needed a full-time secretary to replace the CETA or federally financed one he lost recently, and Commissioner Alton Brazell said he would not approve a fifth secretary because the county could not afford it.

"All right, I've got a question, and I'll put it to you, Mr. Brazell," Smith said, leaning forward with his arms on the ta-

Garza Judge Denies **Clements Endorsed**

A GARZA County judge told The Avalanche-Journal Monday he was "set up" by gubernatorial candidate Bill Clements and his campaign workers into having his picture taken as a Clements supporter.

Judge Giles W. Dalby of Post said his photograph recently appeared in a Clements campaign publication identifying him as a Clements supporter even though the judge is campaigning for John Hill.
Dalby, a Democrat, said late Monday

he "never at any time" said he would support Clements. "In fact," he added, "I told Omar Harvey (a Clements campaign manager) that I definitely could not support Mr. Clements, that I had to stay true to my own party."
Part Of Duties

Dalby said he was photographed when he welcomed Clements to Garza County as part of his duty as county judge.

A Clements campaign spokesman said, however, that Dalby signed a release giv-ing his consent to the Clements for governor campaign committee "to use my name, photograph, and/or statements in advertising materials both printed and broadcast on radio and television, to help elect Bill Clements governor of Texas.'

"I think the release speaks for itself," said Clements press director Mark Heckmann late Monday. "We don't want to imply anybody is supporting Bill Clements unless they are — the fact that he signed the release indicates that at that time he was supporting Bill Clements.
"We certainly respect the right of any

body to change their minds in the gover-nor's race, but we don't think it's fair then to try and accuse us of a wrongdoin that was never committed," Heckman

But Dalby contended that he never re-alized he was signing such a release.

'They moved in on me like gangbus-

ters. This little girl was handing me a paper to sign, someone was taking my picture... I didn't realize it was a release. It was on a clipboard and I thought it was a registration form," Dalby said.

The judge said the Clements campaign sent him a \$1 modeling fee for the picture, but he returned the money with a letter saying, "I cannot accept the check as I do not wish to act as a model for ews releases."

"It never dawned on me that Clements thought I was supporting him, or I dang sure would have put (a statement saying I would not support him) in the let Dalby said.

Dalby noted he has given financial sup-port to Hill, and is coordinator of a com-mittee of county officials supporting

Hill's campaign. "I very much regret the erroneous statements from Clements' headquarters of my support for him," Dalby said in a telegram to Hill. "My support lies with John Hill."

Meanwhile a spokesman for the Hill campaign called the publication in which Dalby's photograph appeared "a scandal

Teaming up with the jazz-rock class will be the 12-member Panjammers, Dunbar's widely acclaimed singing

Stage bands at local high schools have

long performed some jazz and rock mu-sic. But the Dunbar-Struggs course is the first in which such music has been made a formal part of the high school curricu-

Besides performing, students in the class have an opportunity to develop skills in writing and arranging for jazzrock groups.

"This is new territory," said Mike Cantwell, Dunbar-Struggs' new band director and jazz-rock instructor. "It's more an intimate group," he said, allowing students to adapt the music - both standards and modern songs - to their own styles.

The Dunbar-Struggs course is offered to sophomores, juniors and seniors throughout the school system. Students may commute to Dunbar-Struggs on a part-time basis (transportation is provided by the school district), or they may schedule all their classes at Dunbar-Struggs.

What have I ever done to them? What ould I do to them if I found out who it stions, along with countless



NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - FBI agents on Monday linked two espionage suspects to a series of meetings that were allegedly part of a suspected Soviet spy oper-

FBI special agent Cheryl Disque testified in federal court that she watched a meeting between Soviet U.N. employees Valdik Aleksandrovich Enger, Rudolf Chernyayev and Vladimir Petrovich Zinyakin on March 26.

Enger. 39. and Chernyayev, 43, are being tried on charges they conspired to obtain anti-submarine warfare secrets from U.S. Navy Lt. Cmdr. Arthur Lindberg, who was acting as a double agent.

Zinyakin, a former third secretary of the Soviet mission to the United Nations, had diplomatic immunity when the three were arrested May 20, and has left the country.

Miss Disque said she recognized Enger and Zinyakin from photographs when she saw them in a Garden State Parkway service area. She said she did not get a full view of the third man, but she 'described him in my report as looking like a little boy

A car belonging to the diminutive Chernyayev was used for the meeting,

Miss Disque said she and Zinyakin almost bumped into each other as he walked through the service area's res-

The testimony came as the government's case, presented by U.S. Attorney Robert J. Del Tufo, neared its end.

AN EDITORIAL:

Loose Knot In Ties That Bind

WHEN THE dust settles less than a month from now, it's entirely possible Republicans will occupy not only both U.S. Senate seats but the governorship in the land of the late Hubert H. Humphrey.

Besides being possible, it's downright probable...as of this writing, at any rate. Which in itself speaks volumes about the current condition of the "house that Hubert built," i.e., the remarkable Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party of Minnesota.

The DLF, at the ripe old age of 34, is going through a classic mid-life crisis. And it's not so much external pressures, e.g., the GOP and tax revolt, that threaten its well-being as various internal stresses that erupted with embarrassing ferocity in last month's prima-

IT'S DIFFICULT for outsiders to comprehend the panic that swept through much of the DFL when businessman Robert Short narrowly defeated liberal Rep. Don Fraser, the party's anointed candidate for Humphrey's old Senate seat.

That's because outsiders never have understood how fragile the alliance is that Humphrey welded a generation ago between the radical Farmer-Labor party and the urban

Democratic Party of the New Deal. For 30-plus years, Humphrey not only held the uneasy marriage together, but managed to keep the DFL identified with a coherent

philosophy of activism. Yet for those same 30-odd years, Bob

Short, whose political roots are essentially in the old Farmer-Labor wing of the party, also was a major factor in the DFL.

Despite his generous contributions to Humphrey and other liberals, Short regularly warred against many of those who dominated the party. And now he has defeated another in a series of DFL-endorsed liberals, i.e., Don Fraser, for the very seat Humphrey held so long.

"BOB SHORT is like the Mongols against whom the Chinese built the great wall," said DLF treasurer David Lebedoff, in a news services interview. "Every 10 years or so, he comes along to pillage the city and ravish the maidens.

This year, the DFL was torn apart by controversies over abortion, ERA, gun control and use of motor boats and snowmobiles in the wild Boundary Waters Canoe Area.

Short and his opponent split on all of them, of course, with Short tossing in some virulent anti-government, tax-cutting rhetoric for good measure.

Republicans are happily exploiting the disarray within the DFL. But DFL leaders vigorously keep insisting the party will survive. "You don't wipe out 30 years of progressive tradition in one election," opined top Mondale aide Richard Moe, a former DLF chair-

Maybe not. And maybe voters don't recognize the difference between 30 years of tradition and 30 years of stagnation.

The Not So Fresh-Man Class

BACK TO school is acquiring new meaning nowadays. No longer is it primarily a matter of millions of students in the traditional elementary to college-level ages picking up studies in the fall where they left off in the

Increasing numbers of older citizens also are returning to classrooms.

Currently, something like 23 percent of college and university students are on the mature side of 30. In very round numbers, that works out to some 2 1/2 million.

The trend, furthermore, has been underway for several years. Federal Office of Education figures covering 1972-77 show an enrollment increase of 80 percent for the 30-34 age group and 69.7 percent for 35 and older.

For the same period, the 18- and 19-yearolds, the traditional new men-and women -on campus, registered only a 9 percent in-

THE MATURE students are going back to school for a variety of reasons. Some are improving job skills or making midlife career changes and developing new skills for new iobs.

Some are resuming studies interrupted vears before, others finally beginning longpostponed educations.

Whatever the individual motivations, they collectively are an increasingly important factor on the higher education scene for a number of reasons.

Continuing education has been around for a long time, but the current development involves much more than courses in potterymaking, clerical and other semi-skilled func-

While educators generally welcome the older-student trend, the two-year schools are particularly enthusiastic. It has enabled many to broaden curricula to the advantage of younger students as well.

THERE IS also the financial angle. The 4NDREW TULLY: older students are arriving in increasing numbers just as the wave of students generated by the postwar baby booms is departing the campuses.


In the very long term, the trend if it continues could have what most education professionals regard as a highly constructive effect on the restructuring of the education system.

The focus of higher education would not be almost exclusively on a single and limited age group. It would instead be broadened to take in a much larger portion of the popu-Therefore, the result could be the eventual

realization of what informed educators and non-educators all along have believed to be formal education's ultimate function, i.e., to make available a system conducive to "lifelong learning."

Lawyer Takes Exception To Public Pressure On Judges Editor, Avalanche-Journal:

As an attorney, I must respond to the recently published letter of Mrs. Frances Dorsey, who implies that a judge is not discharging his oath faithfully unless he interprets or applies a law as

some segment of society wishes. There are, in my opinion, two shortcuts to the destruction of our system of justice and the consequential loss of personal freedom. One is internal erosion caused by judges themselves; the other is legislative or executive change from

without the judicial system. I know and respect our area judges and firmly believe that none will purposely do anything to jeopardize our legal system. These judges, however, are human and usually are elected to office. Quite naturally, they are conscious of public scrutiny and criticism, though they try not to be influenced by it. The dissatisfaction implied in Mrs. Dorsey's letter will not cause the judges I know to begin rendering decisions to please and ap pease certain segments of society. These fine individuals know all too well that they must be independent to follow and apply the law fairly, having respect for all who appear in their court-

The tone of Mrs. Dorsey's letter, however, does reflect her loss of confidence in our judges and judicial institutions. Such loss of confidence can lead to legislation and executive changes in the judicial system and promote safer streets at the cost of basic freedoms and liberties. Our judges are powerless to prevent such loss of confidence when a citizen reads or hears only what action a judge takes, without mention of what the law requires or the reasons behind a decision.

Therefore, I request that all your readers go to their county courthouse to meet our many fine judges and watch them in action. Talk to these individuals to understand what a law says and the reasons behind it. Then, at least, the citizen can make informed suggestions and criticisms which ultimately may strengthen our legal system and not act on raw emotion.

GIBRALTAR-I find Spain's negotiations with Britain still continuing about Gibraltar—the only place on the entire European continent to which the British ever came and stayed.

Attempting to freeze out Britain, Spain closed the frontier at La Linea nine years ago. This made "The Rock" an isolated peninsula. And the Spain-Britain deadlock arises chiefly from the Gibraltarians' own refusal-by official referendum of 99 percent-to accept Spain's rule.

This problem did not exist until 1969. I was here with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower when Gibraltar was his North African invasion headquarters. I saw about 2,000 tunnelers, many especially recruited from our Colorado mining districts, bore some 30 miles of tunnels.

But this time I found it not easy to get to here.

THE LA LINEA frontier being closed, I had to go first to Algeciras, Spain. Then I had to cross by seagoing ferry the Gibraltar Strait. This put me in Tangier, Morocco. Then I flew to Gibraltar, returning the same way.

Once here again, I saw once more that the

Prudential's Rock of Gibraltar trade-mark is a se-

lected perspective of "The Rock." Actually, it is a rectangular limestone range of two and a quarter square miles-three miles long, three-quarters of a mile wide. It has five peaks, each more than 1,300 feet high.

Gibraltar's population is now about 29,000 and the Gibraltarians have their own elected government; a 15-man House of Assembly. Men and women can vote. Inside, you find 33 miles of tunnels and three interrelated gun systems; one defending the sea

approaches, another looking toward Spain across

Algeciras' broad bay, a third facing the La Linea

THE TUNNELS ARE splendidly lighted. Track switches, turntables, inclined passages and verticle elevators take you to the three levels of hid-

den gun emplacements. Round ventilating shafts, pinpoints to the sky, make the temperature mild and pleasant. There is a 500-bed hospital and city-block-long storerooms. All 29,000 Gibraltarians could live indefi-

You find no seepage; "The Rock" is very dry. Immense white concrete slabs on the outside, like a filed tooth, catch drinking water in 13 tanks holding 16 million gallons. The roads total 35. A cable car takes you to see

nitely in this labyrinth.

In 711, Tariq ibn Ziyad, invading across the Gibraltar Strait from what is now Tangier, conquered the Pillars. He named it for himself: Gibraltar is a corruption of Mount of Tariq.

THEN IN THE 14th century, Spain captured "The Rock" from the Moors-temporarily. In the 16th century Spain captured it once again.

Spain finally employed great German engineer Daniel Speckle to fortify it. Gibraltar was Speckle's masterpiece; for about 200 years it stood off Spain's enemies In July 1704, after only a three-day siege, Gi-

braltar fell to British Adm. Sir George Rooke. But you had the Great Siege, lasting nearly four years; July 1779 to February 1783. In 1782 the attacking Spanish and French trenches were so close that Gibraltar's batteries could not fire down on them. Governor General

Farber Given Another Chance

HACKENSACK, N.J. (AP) - New York Times reporter Myron A. Farber is to be given another chance today to turn over his files on a New Jersey murder

case or return to jail. Times attorney Eugene R. Scheiman said Farber, who has spent 27 days in the Bergen County Jail, remained firm in his decision to go to jail rather than release

his confidential files. The hearing today was to be conducted by Superior Court Judge Theodore W. Trautwein, the judge who found Farber and the Times in contempt and sentenced the reporter to an indefinite jail

The U.S. Supreme Court, while not acting on the appeals of the contempt cita-tions, ruled Friday by a 7-1 vote that Farber must be returned to jail and the fines against the Times continue pending fur-

ther action. The court set aside an order by Justice Potter Stewart, which temporarily spared the reporter from jail and suspended the fines against the Times while

the appeal was pending.

Farber and the Times were found in contempt last July for continuing to withhold their files on Dr. Mario Jascalevich, the defendant in the 7-month-old murder

Jascalevich's trial was recessed last week to await the Supreme Court's ac-

tion. The trial was to resume today.

Jascalevich is accused of murdering three patients at Riverdell Hospital in Oradell in 1965 and 1966 by injecting lethal doses of the muscle relaxant curare. He has been acquitted of two related murder





Operations teams at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration research center report that the 6,400 commands sent to the Orbiter and 3,600 commands sent to the Multiprobe show all systems are working well. Commands were designed to test thermal, orientation, command, communications, data return and power systems, and the crucial separation system.

The separation system will launch probes to carefully-selected atmosphere entry points on Venus where they will begin gathering information.

On Oct. 6, the Orbiter was 21.4 million miles from Earth moving at 4,700 mph and the Multiprobe was 8.4 million miles from Earth, moving at 6,600 mph.

One major point about which all ex-perts have so far agreed is that the man suffered the same wounds and death attributed to Christ in the New Testament. The well-defined imprinting of the image was instead the major scientific con-

troversy. The Roman Catholic Church, which has never taken an official position on the origin of the relic, allowed the rare tests under condition they were not detrimental to the linen, belonging to the Savoy fami-ly of the former kings of Italy.

For this reason religious authorities did not agree on carbon-14 method for ageing objects demanded by Harry E. Gove, a U.S. scientist from the University of Rochester.







Cardinals **Set Voting** For Sunday

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Roman Catholic cardinals will cast their first ballot for a new pope next Sunday, the Vatican announced Monday. The dean of the College of Cardinals, reflecting widespread sentiment, was quoted as predict-ing the election will be brief and easy.

The congregation of cardinals, running the church in the period between popes, decided that the 111 cardinal-electors will precede the secret conclave Saturday by jointly celebrating a Mass in St. Peter's Basilica at 10 a.m.-4 a. m. CDT -, calling on the Holy Spirit to help them elect a pope. At 4:30 p.m.-10:30 a. m. CDT- the

princes of the church will form a procession and file into the Renaissance splendor of the Sistine Chapel, the door lock-ing behind them. They begin balloting

the following morning.

The conclave procedure will largely be a re-run of the one in August that elected Albino Luciani, the humble son of a bricklayer from the Dolomite Alps of northeastern Italy. Pope John Paul I, the 263rd pope and leader of the world's 700 million Catholics, died of a heart attack Sept. 28 after a reign of only 34

Four Sunday Votes On Sunday morning, the cardinals will

celebrate Mass in the three chapels in the conclave area. Two rounds of voting are scheduled later that morning, followed by two more in the afternoon. Election of a pope requires a vote of twothirds plus one.

The statement by Cardinal Carlo Confalonieri, in an interview with the Rome newspaper Il Tempo, appeared to indi-cate that the cardinal-electors have developed a consensus of sorts on the kind of pope they are seeking. Cardinal Leo Suenens of Belgium has also been quoted as saying that he expects the voting

to end in two days. The cardinals have had ample time to get to know each other since the death of Pope Paul VI on Aug. 6. The only first-time voter this time will be Cardinal John Wright, the only American member of the Curia, the church's central government. He missed the last pa-pal election because of cataract surgery

in the United States.

Influential cardinals stressed over the weekend that consideration of age and health will be major factors in the choice of the next pope.

parliamentarian's ruling that, because of other tax reductions already added, there was no room in the budget resolution for the fuel credit. It would cost up to \$1.2 billion a year.

Before the tax bill can be passed, senators must find a way to trim the measure. which now totals nearly \$30 billion, to fit the budget ceiling set by Congress. And some of the most controversial items, such as taxes on capital gains, have yet to be considered.

Once the bill is passed by the Senate, it will go to a conference committee with the House which will reconcile differences between the \$30 billion Senate measure and the \$16.3 billion tax cut voted by the House

Seek "Safe" Bills

With adjournment of Congress near, senators are looking for safe bills to which to attach such measures as the Humphrey-Hawkins full employment bill, legislation to control rising hospital costs and a measure that would require periodic review - and possibly repeal of most federal programs and such "tax expenditures" as interest deductions and child care credits.

Sponsors reason that if their favorite projects can be added to the politically popular tax bill, they have a good chance of getting them into law.

"We can't permit this tax bill to be held hostage for every idea that somebody hopes can get a majority vote in the Senate," Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and floor manager of the tax measure, said in arguing successfully for ruling out non-tax proposals.

"It makes one suspect that those who are doing it (pressing non-tax amendments) aren't interest in passing the tax cut bill," he added.

Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine, sponsor of the "sunset" measure that would require periodic review of federal programs and tax breaks, said he has 'tried the nice-guy route" of not tying his bill to something else.

farmers already have contacted teachers who will travel with the tractorcade and keep the children caught up in schools. "We'll stay until we find out if Congress is going to act or close its eyes to our problems," Mc Cathern said. Month's Stay Foreseen

Jerome Friemel, an American Ag leader from Hereford, said most farmers would stay in Washington at least a month, maybe two months. One Texas farmer at an American Agri-

culture meeting in Lubbock this past weekend said, "I'll stay for the duration, until something gets done."

Insisting that Congress put enough pressure on the administration and the president and calling for enforcement of the present farm bill (Farm Act of 1977) was one of the primary concerns cited by McCathern.

"The secretary of agriculture has the power to set parity rates at 90 percent un-der the current law, but the president will not let him. The law is being enforced at its minimum, and we want it at

its maximum," he said.

McCathern explained that a new law would not have to be passed, but that a concurrent resolution calling for enforce-

ment of the current bill would be needed. Someone to represent agriculture producers within the Department of Agriculture and legislation calling for identification of all foreign imports are other items supported by the American Agriculture Movement.

"My wife, if she had a choice, would buy goods that said 'Grown in a hothouse in the U.S.' rather than goods that said 'Packaged in Mexico'," McCathern said. The unsanitary packing conditions and use of chemicals outlawed in the U.S. are reasons for the pro-U.S. choice, he said.

On a local level, American Agriculture members plan to have public rallys and "educational meetings." A December tractorcade to Austin, a warm-up for the national demonstration, is a possibility being considered, Friemel said.

"If the president sees fit to do something constructive for agriculture we may not go. But if he continues to take the attitude he has taken since taking office we're going to Washington," McCathern

American Agriculture members have used the tractorcade effectively in the past, most notably when they surrounded the South Plains Mall, blockaded 44 Lubbock businesses, and surrounded a Plainview meat packing firm in December of



LONDON (AP) - Chinese Foreign Minister Huang Hua arrives in Britain Tuesday on the heels of 70 Chinese trade, scientific and other groups that have toured the country in recent weeks. He will meet British officials against a background of shifting strategic, political and economic interests affecting both countries.

In the strategic sector, the Chinese are evaluating a far-reaching package deal for the purchase of an unspecified num-ber of Harrier jump-jets, a sophisticated vertical-takeoff defensive airplane usable along Peking's northern frontiers where airfields are scarce.

Peking's search for new friends was dramatized most recently by Chairman Hua Kuo-feng's 18-day trip through Romania, Yugoslavia and Iran - and before that by establishment of formal relations with the European Common Market.

Hua comes to Britain from Italy, where he met top executives of the Fiat auto-maker in Turin. Reliable sources said the two sides discussed a multi-million-dollar contract providing for construction of two large tractor plants in China. In Bonn, the West German and Chinese

governments signed a long-range pact on scientific and technology cooperation Monday. The signing formalized an agreement for exchanges that began in

Desperately anxious to catch up on Western techniques in all fields, the Chinese recently asked a visiting British minister in Peking if 10,000 Chinese graduates could be absorbed in British uni-

"No!" gasped Education Secretary Shirley Williams, who can hardly find enough places for university-standard Britons. Over the coming 10 years it seems Britain can take only about 1,200 Chinese graduates while sending over a matching number of Britons to China.

British-Chinese trade currently is ris-

ing. In 1977 the volume totaled about \$330 million and in the first half of 1978 about \$200 million. This does not include business conducted through the British island colony of Hong Kong, where Chinese investments are piling up fast.

Huang and British Foreign Secretary
David Owen are expected to sign agree-

ments promoting cooperation in cultural and educational fields and in science and technology. Huang also will be discussing credit possibilities with Chancellor of the Exchequer Denis Healey and Industrial projects with Eric Varley, the trade and industry secretary.



However, Michael's life is not without a male figure to look up to and emulate, thanks to Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Lubbock.

As a United Way agency, Big Brothers and Big Sisters will receive \$47,940 from the United Way's 1979 goal of \$1,682,369.

Four years ago Michael saw an ad for the agency and decided he wanted a big brother. His mother contacted the agency and after a waiting period, Michael had his first big brother. Michael has had several big brothers since then and currently he is matched with Tom Taylor, his big brother of two years. Michael's brother and sister also are in the pro-

The match between Michael and the 23-year-old Texas Tech University student is one made in heaven, according to Mrs. Rhodes.

"It's helped Michael tremendously," she said. "It's given him a strong, responsible image, someone that cares about him and someone he can look up to. Tom is like family, immediate family. I think it's fantastic. My only regret is that I didn't get into it sooner, but then we wouldn't have been matched up the way

"I think its helped Michael to realize the person he is and can be. "It's brought out his positive traits. Tom can do so many things for him, so many things I wouldn't be able to do," she said.

She called a big brother a "special friend" of their little brothers, pointing out that the boys are reassured to know that someone is there to help them with their problems, if needed,

And for Mrs. Rhodes, the program

helps in many other subtle ways.
"With three children and work it's difficult to spend one-to-one time with all of them. This frees me to spend time with the others when one or two of them is with their big brother or sister. Also, I don't feel quite so bad about going out when they are with their big brother or

sister. Sometimes they need a break from

me." she said. Michael echoes the praise his mother has for Big Brothers and Big Sisters. "I think it has helped me because my dad isn't here. I get to go a lot of places and do a lot of things I wouldn't get to do,"

Michael said he would like to be a big brother when he's old enough at age 18. "I like being a little brother and I think being a big broter would be just as good," he said.

Tom said he feels that being a big brother has given him opportunities that he may have missed earlier in life, as well as the pride in helping a young boy realize his potential. "It has helped me do some of the things I never got to do. I didn't have a strong male image in my life. I was the oldest of four children and had all the responsibilities.

He explained that being a big brother gives him a chance to be with children again and also gives him a feeling of having a family in Lubbock. Tom's family lives in Kansas and last year he and Michael drove there to be with Tom's rela-



show a holding that expects to produce nine tricks by itself with spades as trump but is willing to stop there opposite a bust hand.

That three-spade bid makes the way to the slam rather simple. Actually, when North bids six spades he is willing for South to go to seven if South holds the right stuff in diamonds.

Playing at six declarer has some worries about the diamond suit, but since it breaks nicely all plays suc-

South's correct play here is the simple one of leading a diamond to dummy's ace and back toward his own hand. This wins against all 2-2 breaks and all 3-1 breaks except K-J-x in the West hand.

BAKE IN THE HEAT OF YOUR OWN TEMPER — Being screamed at will give a kid that "fresh" quality. It will also make HIM a screamer, which will make him very popular with his peers, teachers. colleagues and bosses,

OMIT GOD - Teach your kid early that sleeping or golf or tennis is more important than church. On special occasions (severe illness or death) you may have to mention God, but don't overdo it. God is to be used only in case of emergency.

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have noticed a bad odor from my nose and mouth. My doctor tells me I have atrophic rhinitis. He said there is no cure and he cannot help me. It was suggested that I use a salt solution in my nose and steam it. This does not help. He also mentioned that it can be a glandular condition. I am desperate. Can you offer any help? - Mrs.

Atrophic rhinitis is a shrinking and drying of the nasal membranes. We're not sure why it occurs, but often bacterial infection is a part of it. There is usually encrustation and disturbance of the nasal pathway. This leads to the foul odor. It is difficult to treat, especially in winter with the indoor dryness adding to the problem. Sinuses may become involved.

Antibiotics in petroleum gel inserted into the nose help reduce the crusting and eliminate the odor. In some, vitamin therapy can help when a deficiency can be established. Sometimes closing off the nostrils with a bit of lamb's wool avoids the drying effect of air passing over the membranes and helps. Estrogens can be tried, both as an application or orally, if glandular problems are suspected. A rhinologist might offer other suggestions.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: When my daughter was 18 years old she had a cyst at the base of her tailbone. Her doctor at the time told her to take hot baths and gave her something for the pain. It soon went away without coming to a head. She is now 22 and is expecting her first baby. She has another cyst on the same area and her doctor has her on hot packs. He had to lance it to remove the pus. He told her the only way to stop it from coming back was to cut it out and leave the wound open to drain and heal. He wants her to have this done as soon as possible after she is back on her feet again after the baby. Should she get another opinion on the surgery? - Mrs. B.H.

The only way to get rid of such cysts is by complete removal, including the cyst wall. Her doctor's advice sounds logical, and I doubt another opinion would change things. This could be what is called a "pilonidal" (hair nest) cyst. In fact, there is a section on this subject in my new booklet on hair-related disorders. Dear Dr. Thosteson: My husband has had lupus erythematosus for years, but we were not aware of any L.E. Society until reading about it in your column. We live in the Imperial Valley of California and would like to know where we could find a local society so we can contact them. We would also like to know if discoid lupus can eventually turn into the systemic kind. Do you have literature on this? - Mrs. J.B.

About 10 percent of cases of discoid lupus (the skin type) may eventually become systemic - that is, involve other parts of the body. I have two addresses for you. One is for the society in Encino, Cal. - 16155 Ventura Blvd. 91316. The other is for the L.E. Foundation at 44 East 23rd St., New York, N.Y. 10010. There, may be a closer one listed in your phone book. My list of 44 medical booklets does not include one on lupus, but one of the societies can provide you with such information, as well as addresses of local chapters.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have arthritis pretty bad and I wanted to know if going to another climate helps it. I have had people tell me both ways, some saying it does and others that it doesn't. - M.S.

The only benefit from a warmer climate is an indirect one. A warmer climate is more pleasant than a hard winter. Best to make a "test" visit before uprooting oneself permanently. The arthritic person might feel more urge to get out and about, which can help immensely. Other than this, climate is not a ctor in arthritis. It is found in areas of severe







WASHINGTON (AP) — Wilmer Good-ice kept going back to the Saginaw, Mich., car dealer to complain about prob-lems with his Buick's transmission and

er 11 return trips to the place where he bought the car, a thoroughly angry Goodloe got rid of the car. "The radiator ran not on me time after time. And sometimes the transmission wouldn't go into high gear," he recalled.

Although General Motors did not tell

him, Goodloe's car was one of 3.3 million 1973 through 1975 GM cars whose transmissions and radiators were covered by a

The giant automaker instructed dealers in 1975 to repair the transmission-radiator problem without charge to owners who complained but did not tell the owners like Goodloe - who too late did find out about the warranty - that free repairs were available.

The warranty that owners were told about when they bought the cars was good for 12,000 miles, but the special warranty established later for the transsion and radiator was for 50,000

The Center for Auto Safety, a Washington consumer group formerly associated with Ralph Nader, estimates that there are about 30 "secret warranties" mainned by automakers to cover their worst factory defects but never communicated to owners of the cars.

These are secrets to the average consumer," said Clarence Ditlow, executive director of the group.

The secrecy surrounding the warranties costs unwary automobile owners millions of dollars in repair costs," Ditlow

Auto manufacturers dispute this. General Motors spokesman Don Postma said owners could get rebates if they paid to repair the transmission-radiator problem and can prove that it was the same one covered by the special warranty. Proof would be a receipt for the work that notes what the problem was, he said.

Asked why General Motors does not inform owners of special warranties, Postma said, "We have found that notification of individual car owners in many cases is not practicable. It can cause hysteria and fear on the part of car owners even when there is nothing at all wrong with their automobiles."

The GM problem involved corrosion of the wall between the transmission and the radiator, allowing transmission fluid to get into the radiator and antifreeze into the transmission, damaging both.

But problems often did not develop until after the 12,000-mile new-car warranty had expired. Many owners are believed to have gone to independent repair shops, paying hundreds of dollars each for a job available without charge if they had demanded it at a dealership.

"After new-car warranties expire, many people take their cars to independent repair shops, where prices usually are lower than at dealerships. Others are not given the warranty work even when they take their cars to dealers because they don't know to ask for it," Ditlow said.

"By only notifying the dealers, many consumers who might benefit are excluded. Only those customers who complain frequently or strenuously to an authorized dealer - and in time - can get recompense," Ditlow said.

The Center for Auto Safety on four occasions has petitioned the Federal Trade Commission to require automakers to make special warranty programs "generally known and available to all the affected vehicle owners."

So far, the FTC has said only that it is studying the matter. It is considered likely that a case the FTC brought in January against Ford Motor Co. will become a test of the agency's authority in the area.

In that case, the FTC's first major auto defect proceeding, it accused Ford of selling 2.7 million cars with potential lubrication problems that could lead to costly engine damage.







Poet, Singer **Jacques Brel** Dead At 49

PARIS — Jacques Bret, the Belgian who wrote and sang melancholy and poetic songs that brought both joy and tears to the French-speaking world for two decades, died early Monday at the Franco-Moslem hospital in suburban Bobigny from blood clotting in the lung. He was

Brel had been fighting cancer for 10 years and doctors said the pulmonary embolism led to the death "along with

his very grave illness,"

Brel was born in Brussels April 8, 1929, the son of a wealthy Flemish industrialist. Performing at first in the small cafes and cabarets of Paris' Left Bank, Brel cut his first records, "The Devil" and "It Can Rain," in 1954 thus earning himself an engagement at the prestigious Paris mu-

In 1966. Brel gave up concerts a turned his attention to the theater a the movies as an actor and director, s ing. "To write a song is a man's work, sing it is the work of an animal and lat I have become too much of an an and too little of a man." His biggest cess in the theater was a French version of "Man of La Mancha."

A long-time friend and admirer of Brel, Paris-based U.S. composer Mort Schu-mann, produced "Jacques Brel is Alive and Well and Living in Paris," based on

his songs, in 1968. Brel's decision to retire at the height of his fame in 1973 came after he learned he was suffering from terminal cancer. He lived in wealthy seclusion in the French-owned Marquesas Islands in the South

He made his home on the island of Hiv a-Oa. 800 miles north of Tahiti, where the French painter Paul Gauguin is buried. Brel called it "my paradise." Like Gauguin, he fell in love with a Polynesian girl. She was with him when he died. In his will, Brel asked that he be buried

Many of his hits, like "If You Go Away," "The Flat Country" and "The North Wind," were love songs filled with his nostalgia for the misty lowlands of his

In one of his best-known songs, "Amsterdam," he described the sadness of the city's vice-filled dockland. He also wrote with biting sarcasm of middle class hypocrisy, which he hated, and of the heavy-handed provincialism of his Flemish-speaking Belgian compatriots. As a result, he was markedly less

popular among the Flemish population than elsewhere in Europe.

Brel remained modest and self-effacing when the meteoric success of his albuand concerts made him a millionaire.

His father at first disapproved of his singing career and threatened to disown him. Brel acted as though he understood "If I really had any talent," he once told a friend, "I wouldn't waste my time making songs."





PAVE PAWS RADAR STATION



PAWS stands for "phased array warning system," and the Pave PAWS at Otis AFB is the first of two to be built. The other, at Beale ABF., Calif.,


Otis AFB is the first of two to be built. The other, at Beale ABF., Calif., will go into operation in April 1980.

The Pave PAWS is technologically very advanced. What it will do is, first, be a warning system against submarine-launched missiles—which it will be able to track within a radius of 3,000 miles; and, second, track satellites. How it will do this will be with a system quite different from conventional radar, where one face takes several minutes to swing around and cover the area it's watching. The Pave PAWS is steered electronically; it has two faces, on two sides of the building, angled to give 240 coverage, across which are thousands of antennas coordinated by two large computers. This radar can change its point of focus in milliseconds, and so can swiftly detect objects traveling at high speeds. The Pave PAWS could give a 20-minute warning of nuclear warheads launched against the U.S.—which is very important as a deterrent factor.

Figueroa Throws Against John In Series Opene

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Los Angeles Dodgers Manager Tommy Lasorda created a mild suprise Monday when he turned to veteran left-hander Tommy John as the starting pitcher for Tuesday night's first game of the World Series against the New York

IT WAS A shot heard round the world, someone said. And the label stuck. Little Bill Mazeroski, a man whose name most people could not spell, much less remember where he played, hit this momentous homer, and, after years of being down there on the level with the furnaces and tornado-emergency kits, the Pittsburgh Pirates were world champions.

There was this team of misfits, castoffs and greenhorns which fell under the gaze of Casey Stengel. They called them the Mets. And they were even worse than the Astros. One of them, Marvelous Marv Throneberry, even gained famed for his

successes at futility. Then one October, while the Atros were still looking up and waiting for the Astrodome roof to fall on them, the Mets danced and shouted and shook New York with a world title.

There was this team made up of a bunch of guys who appeared more interested in starting a lockerroom fight than play baseball. But, like brothers, they fought only among themselves, until an outsider arrived. Then they'd turn the outsider wrongside out, and usually in the World Series.

AND TONIGHT, THE latest edition of that book of sports Americana begins. The Yankees and the Dodgers. Or, the Dodgers and the Yankees. Both teams have been there before, and often.

But, even if it were the Mets against the Blue Jays, no matter. Folks who haven't reached for a radio dial or a sack of roasted peanuts all spring, summer and fall, get wrapped up in the World Series.

It begins every year in February, with pictures of these guys throwing baseballs around, carrying a sack of bats, or just running in the sun of Florida or Arizona, at the time when the rest of us are worrying about the antifreeze holding in minus-

Then in the summer, the managers begin to lose their jobs, a couple of outfielders complain openly about not getting to play enough and blaming it on (1. the manager, (2. the owner, (3. a high-paid rookie, or (4, all three.

Two weeks later, the umpires threaten to go on strike because the hours are too long or their planes are late. And, finally, in August, the catcher gets mad at the second baseman, tries to rearrange his nose, and the manager says it's really no-

Series

Even through all this, some folks pay little attention; these are just the preliminaries.

THE WORLD SERIES is Big-Time. With capital letters. It's right up there with the Kentucky Derby, the Super Bowl. New Year's Day, and the heavyweight championship fight. It's really aboove these. This year, the Derby attracted attention because of the duels between Affirmed and Alvdar.

The Super Bowl, after the first few games when the AFL was really the young kid taking on the Establishment (NF), there was the keen sense of rivalry. But, now that movies and TV shows have been built around it, the SB has become more of a gigantic sports Mardi Gras than a true World Championship.

And, pro basketball. . . Reckon Johnny Wooden can really get fired up about basketball in the middle of June?

The championship fights. Ditto the Super Bowl, with m ore hype than hurrahs.

BUT, THROUGH THE years, the World Series has lost little of its aura. For many years, schoolteachers would sneak a radio into the classrooms - the principal even closed his eyes or drifted out to the wood-working shop to listen to a couple of innings.

Motorists pull into a service station and get the latest scores along with \$2 worth of unleaded. . . TV sets pop up in the most unlikely spots, such as on a burnedout engine in the garage, next to the checkout counter, or in the corner of the coffee shop.

Walk down the street, and if the postman doesn't have a transistor with an earplug, then one can pick up bits of playby-play from a portable perched on a stack of shingles where a new house is under construction.

It's amazing how one can pour Red Sox or Yankee names on citizens and they become instant authorities. Maybe it was Scooter Rizzuto or John Mize or Carl Erskine or Brooks Robinson or Enos Slaughter or Lou Boudreau that they remember the best. But, in the minds of all, there is a World Series hero.

From teen-age days or even younger. memories exist of some special Series. Somehow, this brings out the sportsman in all of us. It's a game for winners, the ultimate baseball winner. And all of us love a winner.

Would you believe the Dodgers in six?

Earlier, Yankees Manager Bob Lemon named right-hander Ed Figueroa, 20-9, as his opening-game starter in the best-of-seven game series. Lemon also disclosed that Reggie Jackson would be the American League champion's designated hitter.

Lasorda had been expected to select Burt Hooton, 19-9, who he had described as his

most consistent pitcher during the regular season. But after a meeting with his coaches and John before a late Monday practice at Dodgers Stadium, Lasorda said the 35year-old John was his first-game pitcher.

The decision apparently was based on scouting reports that the Yankees were more susceptible to a sinkerball-pitching left-hander, which is John's stock and trade.

John won the second game of the National League playoffs against the Philadelphia Phillies, throwing a 4-0 shutout in which there were 23 ground-ball outs. John was 17-10 with a 3.03 earned run average during the regular season. Hooton

was kayoed in less than five innings in the opening game of the playoffs. Lasorda also said that he would use Lee Lacy, Vic Davalillo or Joe Ferguson as his designated hitter. Lacy or Ferguson probably will go against left-handers, with Daval-

illo facing Yankees right-handers. This is the second time in World Series history that the DH is being used in the fall baseball classic. The American League rule first was used in the Series two years ago, when Dan Driessen played the role for the Cincinnati Reds in a four-game sweep over the Yankees, who sent Carlos May and Elliott Maddox up in that spot.

Jackson, who with Lemon, Figueroa, Lasorda and Dodgers first baseman Steve Garvey appeared at a Monday news conference, said about his DH status, "I'm not crazy about it, but Lemon has been doing an outstanding job and whatever he says I'll go along with. After all, winning is the bottom line."

Lasorda left no doubt that he dislikes the DH, complained that it takes away from the strategy of the game, but said he doesn't make the rules, only follows them. "I'm not in favor of the DH," he said. "I don't like it because it takes away from the strategy of the game. A lot of managers like it because they don't have to make as

Tranquility was the theme of the news conference. Figueroa and Jackson praised Lemon for the peace he brought to the previously haggling Yankees. Lasorda and Garvey said the August fisticuffs between Garvey and teammate Don Sutton had served only to make the National League winners a closer unit.

Figueroa, who won 20 games for the first time in his five-year major league career. credited his success to the fatherly-type Lemon.

"We're still searching for the right combination in the backfield," Dockery admitted." And the type of speed that Johnson has exhibited over two seasons is one of the things which could strength-







"People make the rules and I follow them," Lasorda said Monday, "I'm not in favor of the DH. I don't like it because it takes away from the strategy of the game. A lot of managers like it because they don't have to make as many decisions.

This will be the second time in the World Series history that the designated hitter is used in the fall baseball classic. It first was used in 1976, when Dan Driessen played the role for the Cincinnati Reds and Elliott Maddox and Carlos May were the DH's for the Yankees.

Cincinnati Manager Sparky Anderson, like Lasorda, didn't like the DH rule, but in the four games played Drieseen had two singles, two doubles and one home run in 14 at bats, a .357 average. The Reds swept the series in four games.

Ironically, the AL champion Yankees, who lived with the DH all season, got just one hit in 14 at bats from Maddox and May.

Who will the Dodgers use as the desisnated hitter?

"It will be Lee Lacy, Joe Ferguson or Vic Davalillo," Lasorda said, although he admitted that he leaned toward Lacy, who hit .261 with 13 homers and 39 RBI in the regular National League season.

Lacy is a right-handed hitter as is Ferguson, while Davilillo swings from the left side. Lasorda eliminated Manny Mota as a DH because the Dodgers' manager wants to save his best pinch-hitter for key

Ferguson, who came to the Dodgers in mid-season from the Houston Astros, hit .237 with LA with seven homers and 28 RBI. Davalillo was a .312 hitter - in a pinch role - with one homer and 11 RBI.


Lasorda said he would make a descision on the DH after talking with his coaches. "That's the way I've managed. I always get the opinion of my coaches, but I'll make the descision."

Lacy would be a natural for the Dodgers as a DH. He says hitting is what he does best.

"A lot of guys can't come off the bench cold keep a rally going, but I can," said Lacy. "I get loose in a hurry, pick up most bitches well, even at night. If I played every day I'd hit .300. I've always

Lacy hit five pinch homers this season as the Dodgers won the NL pennant.

The Yankees arrived in Los Angeles late Sunday, and both clubs had workouts scheduled for Monday. Ed Figueroa, 20-9 with a 2.99 earned run average, is slated to open the best-of-seven series for New York.

vested acres, an average yield of 424 pounds per acre.

MEANWHILE, DOMESTIC MILL BUYING was more active last week, US-DA reports. Purchases were light to moderate and consisted mainly of 1978crop cotton for November and beyond delivery.

Demand was best for Memphis territory growths of medium qualities. Other purchases included Eastern, Texas and San Joaquin Valley growths. Some mills were buying from gins and having cotton shipped direct, bypassing warehouses. siness continued good. Sales of sheets, towels, print cloths, corduroys, yarns and industrial fabrics were good and plants were operating five to six days

There was some slight improvement in the denim market. Denim plants were operating four and five days per week.

TRADING INCREASED TO A MODERATELY active rate on spot cotton markets. Growers offered more freely. Merchant demand was good and most offerings traded readily.

Some growers, however, continued to hold for higher prices and many delivered current ginnings against forward contracts made earlier in the year. Export trading remained slow. Outstanding export sales on Sept. 24 totaled 2,-945,700 running bales for the 1978-79 marketing year. This includes new sales during the week of 26,600 bales minus buy-backs and cancellations of 7,200

Exports totaled 96,900 bales, bringing total exports for the season to 824,000 bales. Outstanding sales for the 1979-80 marketing year totaled 12,600 bales, an increase of 2,200 bales for the week.

GROWERS HAD FORWARD CONTRACTED more than one-fifth of the 1978 cotton crop by the end of September, according to informal surveys conducted by the USDA.

This was about the same proportion of the crop that had been booked by growers through September last year and compares with almost one-half of the crop contracted two years ago.

Contracting this season was most active in the Mid-South and Far West where growers had booked more than one-third of their 1978 crop by October. This was about the same proportion booked ahead a year earlier in the Far West but was up from about one-fifth in the Mid-South.

Growers in the Southeast had booked more than one-seventh of their crop, up from less than one-tenth a year earlier. Southwestern growers had contracted a little over one-tenth of their 1978 crop, down from almost one-lifth a year ago.

A SMALL ACREAGE WAS SOLD BY TEXAS Plains growers last week at 1,-500 points over 1977 loan rates.

Agency Makes Farm Finance Available

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through the county office of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Ralph E. Griffitts, FmHA county super-

Lubbock County has been designated. for emergency loans by contacting the Farmers Home Administration office at Room 211, Federal Building, 1205 Texas Avenue, Lubbock, 79401.

Application for assistance will be accepted by Farmers Home until June 19 for physical losses and Sept. 24, 1979, for production losses. FmHA loans covering actual physical

and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed,

fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or make major adjustments in a farming or ranching operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Griffitts said.

"Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of 3 percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible, consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan".

The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is 8 1/2 per-cent. Long-term loans are being made at an interest rate of 8 1/2 percent.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.


Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm opera-tions and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.





Sagging Corn Prices Alarming To Experts

WASHINGTON (AP) - Despite a pick- ing the policy to accommodate whatever up in feeding and continued large exports, corn prices at the farm are sagging lower than government experts counted on earlier this summer.

That is because the 1978 corn harvest is substantially larger than requirements appear to be at this time. Consequently, the Agriculture Department says, farmers will get about 10 cents a bushel less for their crop than experts predicted a month ago.

A report Thursday on the supply and demand for grain also showed that a year from now the U.S. corn surplus will be the largest in 15 years. Earlier this week, the department esti-

mated the corn harvest at a record of 6.8 billion bushels, 7 percent more than the 1977 then-record crop and 5 percent above its estimate in August. The new report said that the farm price

of corn in 1978-79 is expected to average between \$1.85 and \$2.05 a bushel. Last month, a similar analysis put the price in a range of \$1.95 to \$2.15 a bushel. In July, the price forecast was \$2.10 to \$2.30 a This season corn prices at the farm are

averaging \$2.03 a bushel. Those are average prices nationally for corn at the farm and are computed over the entire 12-month marketing year that

begins Oct.1. Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland said recently that corn prices could sag to \$1.50 a bushel this fall. But Howard Hjort, his chief economist, said this week that prices as low as \$1.50 probably would be temporary and in areas where farmers might be forced to sell grain at low prices because of tight storage situa-

One reason for the huge crop is that farmers did not sign up as much in this year's acreage set-aside program which was aimed at curbing production. Those who failed to comply will not be eligible for federal price supports on their crop.

Bergland said Thursday that he has not changed his earlier view that no special help will be given to corn farmers who did not sign up.

"They opted out of the program and they're on their own," Bergland told a panel of farm broadcasters in a telephone interview. "I have no intention of chang-

Aimed At Borer

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Texas Department of Agriculture proposes that 15 Panhandle counties be guarantined because of the European corn borer.

Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said the details of the proposed quarantine would be published Oct. 13 but it would not be made final until after public hear-

'Quarantine should eliminate the southward movement of the pest," Brown said. "If we don't enforce a quarantine in this area we can expect states free of the pest to require treatment and certification of all shipments of corn and grain sorghum originating anywhere in

The quarantine lines were drawn up after a 30 - county survey last month showed the corn borer in Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Liscomb, Hartley, Hutchinson, Roberts, Oldman, Potter, Carson, Gray, Deaf Smith and Randall counties. The borer does its damage in the lar-
