While he conceded that a weak economy migh serve as a partial corrective for recent excesses，his
analysis isn＇t likely to inspire much enthusiasm for the administration＇s economic management．
Klein＇s views were made in conjunction with the release oday or the quarterly projections of Wharton
Econometric Forecasting Associates，an organiza－ tion owned by the University of Pennsslvania．
In it，Klein and his associates，F．Gerard Adams
and Richard M．Young，describe a future economy of 7 percent to 8 percent infiation，with some rise
in the jobless rate beginning in the second half of
1979． Faced with a drab economy，previous administra－
tions have attempted to quicken the pace of activity before election time，even at the risk of creating
maladjustments that would bave to be dealt with
later． The Wharton Associates comment that the Carter
