by almost two to one. The AP drew up a random list of 15 commonly
purchased food and nonfood items, checked the price at one supermarket in each of 13 cities on March 1 , succeeding month. One item, chocolate chip cach es, was dropped from the list at the end of Novem-
ber 1977 because the manufacturer discontinued the package size used in the survey.
