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

Six Men Drafted By Local Board

The state draft quota for October calls for 847 men, compared to 609 for Spetember, Colonel Morris S, Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesdav

Local Board No. 4, Muleshoe, has a call for 15 for preinduction physical and six for induction October 1.

State draft calls, on the rise since August, when 552 men were requested, were much lower earlier in the year. The state quotas in July and June were 349 and 187, respectively.

The state quota of 847 for October is the Texas share of a national call for 17,000 men, all for the Army.

Nearly 3,000 men over the state will be called up for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in October, also, the state director of Selective Service said. Local board quotas for the Octber call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards

The October quota will be filled with men who are at least **OLD GRAY MULE-You don't** 22 years old by October 1, except volunteers and those legally termed delinquent, who may be younger.

Colonel Schwartz said he expected monthly quotas to be higher than usual the remainder of the year.
