Action In Last Friday Night's Steer-Lorraine Clash

R-LEE STEERS COLLAR LORAIN BULLDOGS

The Steers overran the Loraine Bulldogs Friday night to the tune of 164 yards rushing and 187 yards passing which totals to a nice 351 yards. The passing attack which did not produce any points kept the Bulldog defense loose enough to let the running game do all the scoring. The Steers were very evident, the superior team, as they nearly tripled the Bulldogs in total offense and continued a speedy offense that showed they could score from anywhere.

FIRST QUARTER

The Steers took the opening kickoff and returned it to the S. 30 yard line. The Steers then fumbled at the 38, and Loraine, in possession made a quick 1st down to the S. 28. But then Larry Palmer intercepts a pass at the goal line and gets it out to the 5 yard line. The Steers then put on a time consuming, non-stop drive, making five 1st downs, where Greg Grim scores from the 3 yard line.

Gary Naico kicked the extra point and it is 7 to 0. The Steers kickoff and Loraine returns it to the L. 45. They can't move this time and they punt to the S. 25 with a return to the 50 yard line. The Steers start another drive, making three 1st downs to the L. 26 as the quarter ends.

SECOND QUARTER

The Steers are then penalized back to the 39, where Loraine then stops them and the Steers punt out of bounds at the 19. Loraine then starts their drive of the night making three 1st downs to the S. 37. But the defense then causes a fumble and Bobby Boone recovers at the S. 47. The Steers make a 1st at the L. 20 on a pass and on the 1st play Grim sweeps the left side behind good blocking and scores standing up.

Naico kicks the extra points and it is now 14 to 0. The Steers kickoff to Loraine with a return to the L. 41. The Steers hold and Loraine punts to the Steer 36. The Steers makes a big 1st down then to the Loraine 10 yd. line on a 50 yd. pass and run play by Larry Palmer, who nearly broke it. Then from the 5 yd. line, Grim scores again. The extras fail this time and the score is 20 to 0. The Steers kickoff to the Bulldogs and they return to the L. 40. Then Eddie Hood intercepts a pass and gets it to the S. 42. Loraine holds on downs at the S. 46 and they get to run one play as the first half ends.

THIRD QUARTER

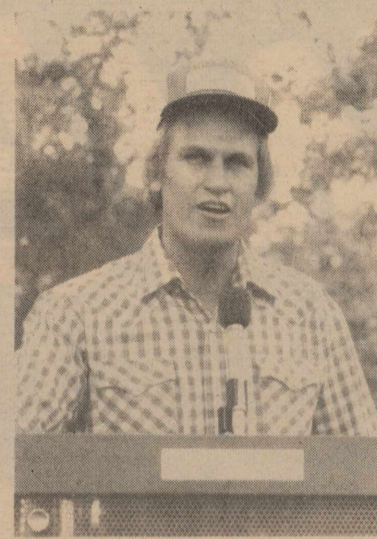
Not to be rude, but we will skip the 3rd quarter as it consumed 47 minutes of playing time, had 95 yards of penalties called, had a total of 22 yds of offense by both clubs, together! Does that answer that?

FOURTH QUARTER

In the 4th quarter start, the Steers had the ball and they make two 1st downs to the L. 28, but they then have to punt and the punt is into the endzone, where Loraine gets the ball at the 20. Loraine made a 1st down to their 38, but they then fumble and Grim recovers at the L. 26. The Steers made a 1st down to the L. 10 and then from the 4, Grim scores again. Naico kicks the extra point and the score is now 27 to 0. Loraine then receives and takes the kickoff to the L. 36. Loraine then gets on the scoreboard with a 40 yard pass carrying them to the 1 yd. line. They then score, but they miss their extra point with 43 seconds left in the ballgame and the score is 27 to 6.

The Steers take the kickoff and then proceed to run out the clock.

Congressman Charlie Stenholm was in Robert Lee Wednesday, September 7, for a town hall meeting at the Coke County Courthouse. Stenholm is a firm believer in these meetings. He feels this is the best way to gauge the feelings of his constituents.

His time was spent here explaining his thoughts, listening to and asking for suggestions and responding to complaints.

RL City Council Has Meeting

The Robert Lee City Council met Tuesday night, September 12. Items on the agenda were:

Item I - Insurance program for the City was discussed, and the Council agreed to proceed with investigation of the municipal insurance program with the Texas Municipal League.

Item II - Considered a request for the opening of Third Street between Commerce and Austin Streets, and Austin Street between Third and Fourth, and agreed to open as requested.

Item III - Decision made to build an extension on the back of City Hall to protect the back of the building and to house some of the city equipment.

Item IV - Agreed to accept the Texas Department of Health recommendation that the Texas Fluoridation Project be incorporated with the present modification of the water plant. This project is a statewide drinking water fluoridation program for communities with a population of 1,000 or more, and has been adopted by most major cities in Texas. Other towns in our area adopting this plan are Winters and Ballinger. The Health Department will provide financial and technical assistance covering the costs of equipment, supplies and installation.

Item V - Council examined the Engineering Report from Hunter Associates, Inc. This report was a study and recommendation of outlet flow water supply from Lake Spence. The Council decided to check with their engineer before making a decision.

Members present were: Mayor Robert Vaughan; Councilmembers, Alice Beaty, F.W. Prentice, Wilson Bryan, J.A. Dunklin and City Secretary, Edna Havins.

He started this speech with his feelings on the Russian attack on the South Korean jetliner and then went neatly into his views on the National Defense Program and foreign aid. He believes in a strong defense program, but not a blank check system. He stated, that everyone is pointing to enormous government over-spending, and it's true. "Congress is doing a lousy job," he said, "but they are trying to do better". He reminded us that the United States is no longer "The" #1 nation in the world. We are still #1, but the Soviet Union is close behind militarily and Japan is threatening economically. He asked us to keep in mind that the Soviet Union is everywhere, Central America, Lebanon etc. "When we pull out our foreign aid, whether it be economic or military aid, the Soviet Union will move in. If we think Central America is not our problem, bear in mind that as we sit here in the Coke County Courthouse, we are closer to El Salvador than to Washington D.C."

Congressman Stenholm not only has strong feelings about the National Defense Program, but also about the farm program. He pointed out that the P.I.K. program, comes under a lot of criticism. The cost of the program is high and being mismanaged and the direction of the program needs to be changed to cut cost. He feels the farm program is feeding America because a bushel of wheat has not been sold in the last five years above the cost of production. He feels that the individual farmer cannot compete in the World Market without governmental assistance. He also feels public assistance should not be granted to someone not in need, help should only be given to those who can't help themselves.

Stenholm's visit to Robert Lee and other area towns was to become better acquainted in the areas that were added to the 17th Congressional District January 1, 1983.

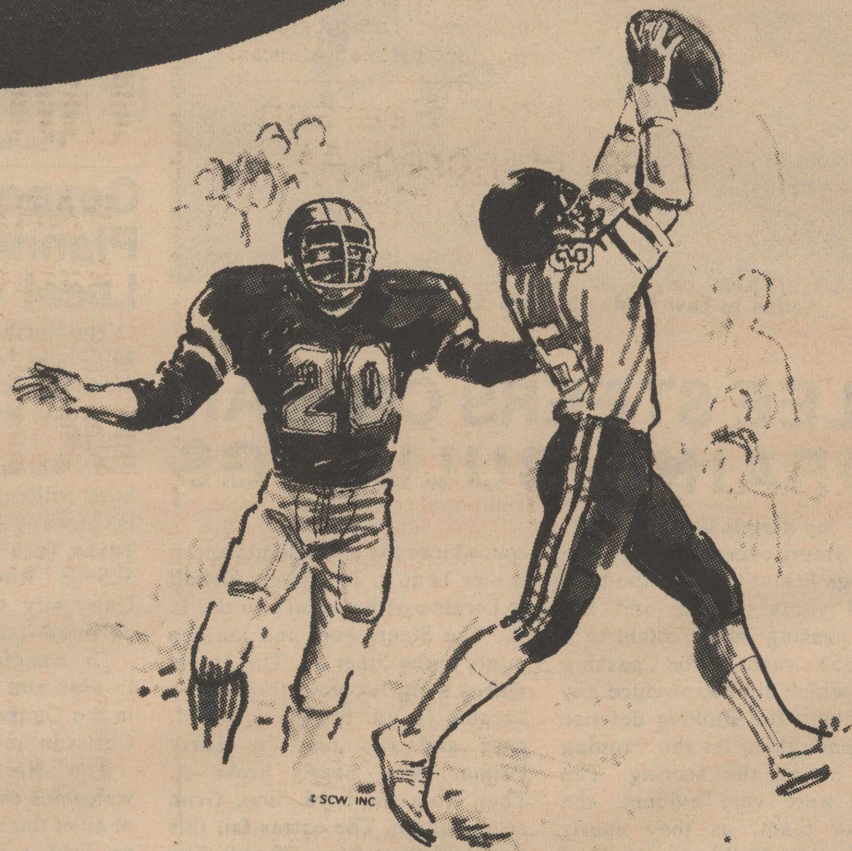

Farm Safety Week Set For Sept. 18-24

Protecting rural children and teaching them safety measures is the emphasis of National Farm Safety Week September 18-24, according to George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President of the Texas Safety Association.

The 40th annual observance of rural safety has been proclaimed by President Ronald Reagan and is being sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Farm safety is a particular concern in Texas, where 100 persons lost their lives in farm accidents last year, according to Gustafson. The statistics are tabulated by the Texas Farm Bureau, based on data furnished by the Texas State Health Department. These records show that of the 100 deaths, most were related to tractors, firearms, drowning, electric current, and

machinery, he said.

Safety leaders estimate that the incidence of these rural-type accidents is actually much greater than those numbers reported, he said.

Although farm fatalities are a major concern, farmers and ranchers should also be aware that up to 20,000 disabling injuries and up to 250,000 serious injuries requiring medical attention occur

to Texas farmers and ranchers each year, according to Dr. Gary S. Nelson, Extension Specialist Safety Engineering, Texas A&M University and Texas Safety Association Vice President for Agriculture.

According to Nelson, "If you are a farmer or a rancher, the probability of experiencing a serious injury this year is 1 in 5."

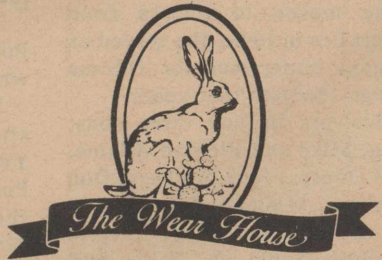

VA News Items

Editor's Note: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

Q-- I was a prisoner of war during World War II and would like to know if I am entitled to dental benefits from the VA?

A-- Veterans who were POWs for six months or more are eligible for dental benefits and may apply at any VA office or medical center.

Q-- My husband was on active duty in the Marine Corps and was killed in Vietnam. Am I eligible for a GI loan to buy a home?

A-- Unmarried spouses of service personnel who died on active duty and of veterans who died of service-connected disabilities are eligible for GI loans to acquire a home.

Q-- As a veteran with a service-connected disability, where may I obtain my priority hospital identification card?

A-- Veterans should contact the nearest VA medical center for issuance of their identification card.

Q-- Who may claim reimbursement for the veteran's burial expenses?

A-- The funeral director, if the burial expenses are unpaid, or the person who bore the veteran's burial expenses.

Q-- I am not a veteran; however, I would like to purchase a repossessed VA home in my neighborhood. Is this possible?

A-- Repossessed VA homes are available for public purchase. Listings are maintained by local regional offices.

Q-- My GI Bill education assistance does not cover all my education expenses. Does the VA offer other financial assistance?

A-- Yes, you should ask about the Work Study Program. This source off additional income is available for some veterans enrolled in school on a full-time basis.

Savings Bonds Sales Up 38%

During the first half of 1983, sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in Texas amounted to \$137,573,100, an increase of 38.2% over the same period a year ago, John W. Dixon, Chairman of the Board & CEO of E-Systems, Inc. in Dallas and Volunteer State Chairman for Texas, announced today. These sales represent 61.2% of the state's 1983 assigned dollar goal of \$224,700,000.

Sales of Series EE Bonds were \$25,817.00 during June, 1983, for a total of \$36,507.00 for the first six months of 1983 in Coke County, C.C. Allen Volunteer County Chairman, said. These sales represent 126% of the County's 1983 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, June 1983 sales of Series EE Savings Bonds amounted to \$332 million, up 33% over June 1982, making a January-June 1983 total of \$2.11 billion, an increase of 37%.

According to County Chairman C.C. Allen, the new competitive interest rate that EE Bonds now pay is the primary reason for sales being up and redemptions down. The new market-based rate for Bonds held five years or more was effective November 1, 1982. The rate is adjusted each six months, i.e., May 1 and November 1, and is 85 percent of the rate paid on 5-year Treasury marketable securities. The rate on EE Bonds for the first six months ending April 30, 1983 was 11.09 percent. For the second six-months period ending October 31, 1983 the rate is 8.64 percent for a first year average rate of 9.87 percent.

Blood Tests, Physicals No Longer Needed

We've all heard how things do change. Well here's one to prove it. As of August 29, blood test and physicals are no longer required before obtaining a marriage license in Texas.

All a couple must do to get a marriage license is pay the \$7.50 fee, show their drivers license or birth certificates and social security card, and fill out an application.

Anyone under 18 must also have their parent's consent. The person who performs the ceremony (minister, justice of the peace, or county judge) signs the certificate and returns it to the county clerk's office, where it is filed.

The original law was intended to control venereal disease. Now instead of a premarital blood test, a woman will take a blood test when she becomes pregnant. Syphilis is particularly dangerous during pregnancy because it can be transmitted to the unborn child. This often results in spontaneous abortion or stillbirth. If the infant is born alive, he may be generally weak and sickly. Children with congenital syphilis are often born deformed and may become blind, deaf of paralyzed and still face the possibility of death.

The law requiring the blood test and physical before marriage has been in effect since 1949 in Texas. About 318,000 couples

marry in Texas each year, at a cost of about \$12 million for doctor and lab fees.

Forty states still require the blood test. Texas joins Maine, Washington, Minnesota, Nevada, Virgin Islands, and South

Carolina in repealing the law this year.

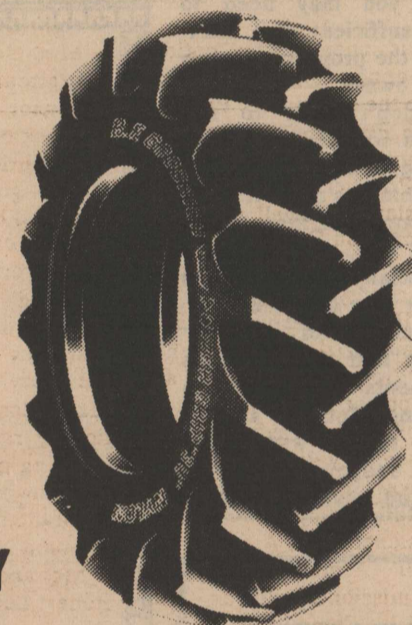

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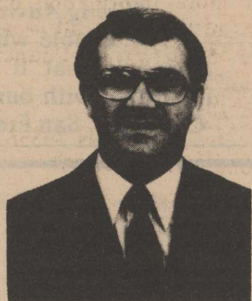

The Consumer Alert

If you are one of the 12.5 million American over the age of 65 who owns a house, chances are that it is your largest asset. After putting time and money into a house over the years, you could be in a financial situation where it would be helpful to get some of that investment back.

There are financing methods currently available that allow older homeowners to unlock the value, or "equity," in their homes without having to move or repay loans right away. One method of financing allows you to sell your house but still stay in it. It is an arrangement called sale/leaseback. With this plan you sell your house and receive a lump sum payment or a monthly income. The important point is that as part of the contract, you are allowed to live in the house for the rest of your life by paying a monthly rent. The only difference is that now you have the extra cash to improve your standard of living or to pay for fixtures, such as ramps or handrails, that you may need to remain self-sufficient. And, after your death, the property is taken over by the owner.

If you don't want to sell because you want to keep your house in the family, sale/leaseback arrangements make it possible for a family member to be buyer. That way, you are taken care of financially and your house is secure for your dependents.

One advantage of a sales/leaseback is that all the terms and agreements are specified in the beginning. You are able to plan your future with more certainty by budgeting for major expenses and saving for those

unexpected ones.

There are two types of loans for older homeowners who want to cash in on the equity of their home and still retain property ownership. One, called the deferred payment loan, allows the borrower to receive a lump sum of money, but to hold off on repayment of all interest and principal until a specified future date or until the house is sold.

The second type of loan is called a reverse annuity mortgage. It is like a conventional mortgage loan but in reverse. Homeowners receive monthly payments based on the value of the house. At a specified future date, the loan must be repaid. Usually the homeowners plan to repay reverse annuity mortgages when they sell their home. The loans can be used in any way. For example, they can convert extra space into a rental room. Or, the added income can also be used to supplement monthly living ex-

penses.

There are a variety of methods available to older homeowners for turning home equity into cash. These are not for everyone. There are both risks and costs involved. Before deciding to participate in any of these plans, it is important to seek legal and financial advice. The Attorney General's office is here to answer your questions. 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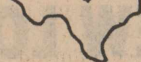

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1983

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolishment of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justice of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for continuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation, an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the advancement of food and fiber production and marketing in this state through research, education, and promotion financed by the producers of agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

ity of the members present.

The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to provide for additional remedies to enforce court-ordered child support payments."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

costs of administering the fund and issuing the bonds. The amendment provides, further, that if there is not money in either the Veterans' Land Fund or the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund available for payment of principal and interest on the general obligation bonds issued pursuant to the amendment, then money coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year is appropriated in an amount sufficient for payment of principal and interest due in that fiscal year.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment for financial assistance to veterans and to authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds of the state to finance the Veterans' Land Program and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Program."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes political subdivisions to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the veterans' organizations be chartered by the United States Congress, be composed of members or former members of the United States Armed Forces, and be organized for patriotic and public service purposes. The amendment provides, further, that political subdivisions may exempt fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the fraternal organizations be organized to perform and be primarily engaged in charitable or benevolent functions. The Legislature would be authorized to enact laws that prescribe eligibility requirements for fraternal organizations to benefit from the exemption and to pass legislation limiting the types or amount of property owned by a fraternal organization which may be exempted from ad valorem taxation.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize taxing units to exempt from taxation property of certain veterans' and fraternal organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 70 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide, by local or general law, a method by which judges of statutory courts with probate jurisdiction may be assigned to any other statutory court with probate jurisdiction and to any constitutional county court in any county in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for assignment of judges of statutory probate courts to other statutory county courts with probate

jurisdiction and to county courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact laws which would allow a city or town to expend public funds to relocate or replace sanitation sewage laterals on private property if done in conjunction with the replacement or relocation of sanitation sewer mains serving the property. The amendment requires that the law authorize the city or town to affix a lien on the private property, with the consent of the owner, to cover the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the property. The lien may not be enforced until five years have expired since the date the lien was affixed. The amendment provides, further, that the law require that the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the private property be assessed against the property with repayment to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years and at an interest rate provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a city or town to expend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of sanitation sewer laterals on private property."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and would eliminate the Governor's power to revoke paroles. The Legislature would be authorized to establish the Board of Pardons and Paroles and to require it to maintain records of its actions and the reasons for its actions. The amendment would empower the Legislature to enact parole laws. Constitutional language specifying the qualifications and terms of office for members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles is eliminated. The constitutional language governing the composition of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the manner of filling vacancies on the Board is eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."

Last Friday night, there was a player from Loraine injured during the football game. There was apparently some confusion among the bystanders as to the way the ambulance responded. First of all, the ambulance volunteers cannot go on to the football field until they are asked to do so. There are many times we would like to assist, but unless school officials feel we are needed we may not go on to the field. Secondly, there was some yelling at one of the volunteers feeling that he had not moved fast enough. At this time, there were already three volunteer ambulance people on the field checking the young man out. There was no rush to get the scoop stretcher to the scene. It was available before we were ready for it. Please remember that we have trained to handle these situations and believe us when we say that running 60-70 yards is not necessary most of the time. The big hand given the young man as he left the field was very sportsman-like and he did appreciate it. Another problem encountered during this incident was that the on-call crew standing by the ambulance was not able to hear the announcement made on the P.A. A solution to this problem has already been found and it will be implemented at the next home game. Our thanks to the coaches, referees and members of the player's family for their cooperation and assistance.

The ambulance service (and E.M.S. Board) also want to thank the West Coke County Hospital District for the room they have made available to us for storage of equipment and maintenance of the necessary records, files and magazines for the group. This will allow us to centralize our equipment and supplies and eliminate having to go several places to re-stock or to locate needed information. Thanks for helping us, help

everyone.



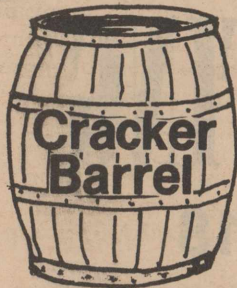
