### Steers Deadlock

Ties are described many different ways, but this game was more indescribable than any tie that the Steers have ever played. Clifton Elijah Calder died of cardiac pulmonary arrest at 8:05 p.m. Monday, October 10, following an early morning traffic accident. Mr. Calder was being treated at West Coke County Hospital for minor lacerations and bruises received in the accident.

The accident occurred 4.1 miles east of Robert Lee at the intersection of Highway 158 and the Hayrick county road. Mr. Calder, traveling east, attempted a left turn and was struck by the westbound vehicle of Mrs. Ettie

Texas Highway Patrolman Roy Blair said Calder's pickup truck turned over about 8:25 a.m. He quoted medical officials as saying Calder died of a pre-existing illness rather than as a result of the accident.

Mrs. Ettie Hubbard of Bronte was treated and released for cuts and lacerations to her face and head at the West Coke County Hospital.

The Steers should be fired up for a win tonight.





With the lack of available pasture and projected high feed cost this winter, producers with a supply of hay might consider hay ammoniation. This process has been tested in this area and is gaining in popularity.

Ammoniation of hay breaks down the fibrous cellular wall and makes the hay more readily digestible plus increasing the nitrogen protein content. In several tests conducted in this area, protein has been increased from 4-6% up to as much as 10-12%. Ammoniation works extremely well on older hay stacks that have lost a lot of their original protein.

General guidelines for ammoniation are:

1. Do not stack bales very high or wide so ammonia can penetrate the stack.

2. Cover with 6 milliliters plastic and seal edges by covering with soil. Duct tape all seams and openings.

3. Inject ammonia under the plastic. Add a total of 2% of the

Instead of reaching for the salt shaker, consumers are being urged to reach for their wallets to buy costlier salt substitutes. Salt substitutes may cost up to \$17 a pound, compared to 27 cents a pound for table salt, says Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist with Texas A&M's Agricultural Extension Service. Most salt substitutes are simply potassium chloride, with added ingredients to improve its flavor, provide shelf stability, control acidity and perform other functions.' "In the long run, it may be less expensive and safer for most people to cut down on salt without developing a need for salt substitutes," says the nutritionist. Simply putting the salt shaker away can cut the average person's salt consumption by 25 to 30 percent. Lemon juice, herbs and spices contain virtually no salt and also add flavor to food, notes the specialist.


