Coke County Commissioners Hold Regular Monthly Meeting

The Coke County Commissioners Court met Monday, Nov. 7, in a regular meeting. The meeting was called to order by County Judge Aubrey Denman and was opened with a prayer by Stover Taylor. The minutes of the last meeting were approved as read.

Item I on the agenda was a decision on the filling of county butane tanks. As of January 1, 1983 Butane Sales will service county tanks in Robert Lee and Thompson Butane will service county tanks in Bronte. Each year county service areas for each company will alternate. Commissioner Newby motioned to accept this decision and the motion was

seconded by Commissioner Tidwell.

Item II - Judge Denman brought to the attention of the commissioners the Coke County History Book. After discussion the decision was not to have an ad in the book.

Item III - Commissioner Newby motioned to accept the bid of \$1200.00 by Ira Coppedge to finish painting the Coke County Museum. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Luckett. The money will be taken from the Farm to Market Fund with \$300.00 coming from each precinct.

Item IV - Ron Exum, Effie Corley and Leta Caston of the Coke County Senior Citizen's Advisory Board met with the Commissioners to discuss liability insurance on county board members and the appointment of a fifth member to the Advisory Board. No decisions were made at this time.

Item V - The County Commissioners cast their 2005 votes allotted them in the election of members to the Appraisal Board. The motion was made by Commissioner Tidwell and seconded by Commissioner Millican.

Item VI - No action was taken on the request to use the witness room for painting classes.

Item VII - Permission was granted to GTE to bury cable along the county right-of-way. The motion was made by Commissioner Tidwell and seconded by Commissioner Newby.

Item VIII - At the request of the Commissioners, the County Attorney, Bill Helwig, discussed Airport Liability insurance. No decisions were made at this time.

Item IX - Judge Denman and County Attorney Bill Helwig discussed their plans to attend a seminar on DWI November 17-18.

Plans were made for attending the 1984 Judge and Commissioners Seminar February 28, 29 and March 1, 1984.

Item X - Judge Denman was appointed as County Safety Officer. The motion was made by Commissioner Luckett and seconded by Commissioner Tidwell.

Item XI - The Extension Agents reports were approved and by order of the court the county bills were approved for payment.

Commissioner Newby motioned to adjourn the meeting and Commissioner Tidwell seconded the motion.

Veteran's Day To Be Observed

Friday, November 11, is Veteran's Day. It is the day set aside by law during which the nation honors the sacrifice and service of its 29 million living veterans and millions of other veterans who have served and died in military uniform. Originally designated on November 11th to commemorate the end of World War I in 1918 and the signing of the Armistice on the "11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month", Armistice Day was re-designated Veteran's Day after World War II to honor U.S. veterans of all wars. In 1968, the federal observance of Veteran's Day was changed to the fourth Monday in October. In 1978, it was returned by Congress to the traditional date of November 11th.

Statewide, it appears all amendments are passing except No. 8 and No. 10, with No. 10 losing narrowly.

Deer Season Opens Saturday

Even if someone swiped the calendars, we could still pinpoint the coming weekend as the opening of the 1983 deer and turkey season. As evidenced by the string of pickups, jeeps, and campers streaming through town since Wednesday, the season will open Saturday, Nov. 12, one-half hour before sunrise. Strangers and locals are dressed in the standard hunter's uniform; flannel shirts, jeans, hunting boots, and caps. They're buying camp fare of beans, onions, potatoes, bacon, eggs, summer sausage, and cheese, along with extra gas, ice, and ice chests.

The hunting industry has finally found West Texas and really changed in the past five years. Many wage earners save their vacations for fall in order to hunt; wives often hunt also or just tag along to enjoy the Indian Summer weather outdoors.

Although hunting in Coke County does not enjoy the 'big business' image of Mason or Llano Counties, leases are no longer plentiful in the area. A few years ago if a rancher even allowed hunting on his land, it was generally for a few friends and relatives who came out a couple of weekends during the fall. Farmers and ranchers are now finding hunting a boon to their sagging agricultural income. Although many who have leased for hunting have had some bitter experiences, with damage of all kinds, drinking, mounds of trash, and gates torn down or left open, in general it has been a satisfactory market.

Coke County businessmen are reaping the hunting harvest, too, as hunters converge every week from now till New Year's.

Deer and turkey season will open Sat., Nov. 12, and continue through Sun., Jan. 1, 1984. Legal shooting hours are 1/2 hour before sunrise to 1/2 hour after sunset. In Coke County, hunters may take 3 deer, either sex, limit 2 bucks, and 2 turkey, either sex.

Quail season has been open in Coke County since October 29 and will run until Jan. 29, 1984, with a bag limit of 20 birds.

If you plan to hunt in another county or you are in doubt about regulations, check with local game warden Sparks Burdett or consult the 1983-84 Texas Hunting Guide. They are free for the asking wherever license are sold.

Services were held on Saturday, Nov. 5, at 2 p.m. in the Robert Lee Baptist Church. Burial followed in the Sanco Cemetery under the direction of Shaffer Funeral Home.

Mr. Campbell was born to the late Will and Louvenia Campbell on March 25, 1906 in Sanco. He was married to Effie Lord on January 3, 1933. 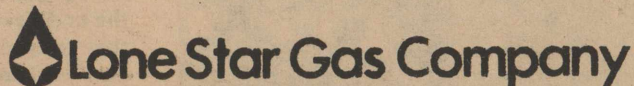

FIRST QUARTER

Bob Krueger Visits County

Robert (Bob) Krueger, Democratic Candidate for the U.S. Senate was at the New Recreation Hall in Robert Lee Wednesday, November 2, for a barbecue dinner and a chance to meet with old friends and seek new ones. More than 50 people were waiting to talk with the candidate.

The former Congressman stated that when he represented this district before Coke County supported him 80% and he would again appreciate the privilege of representing us as our U.S. Senator.

Reviewing current issues, Krueger said he agreed with Reagan's actions in Grenada, "because where there is a genuine threat to our country we should take action".

"The government takes in \$3.00 for every \$4.00 they spend, "our future is being mortgaged." He also spoke on our governments trade policies. He felt the same rules should apply to all countries in trade.

He said he believes "by developing the potential of the young people and using the potential of all people, both men and women, America will remain a world leader."

Krueger concluded his speech by saying, "we who have grown up in small towns have the traditional values, a good sense of who we are, that give us the opportunities to find the best there is in us."
