Last Rites Wednesday For J. W. Elliott

Last rites were conducted at the Methodist Church Wednesday afternoon for J. W. Elliott by Rev. H. A. Nichols. Mr. Elliott passed away Tuesday morning in an ambulance while being rushed to a hospital following a tragic traffic accident near Ashtola, Texas.

Mrs. Elliott is in a Groom, Texas hospital where her condition is reported to be improving.

Mr. and Mrs. Elliott, both in ill health, were on their way to Mineral Wells, Texas where they planned to spend part of the winter to rest and escape from the cold weather expected in the plains section.

The Elliott car skidded into a snow plow as it ran on to an ice coated section of the highway. Mrs. Elliott was thrown about 30 feet from the wreckage while Mr. Elliott was pinned beneath the car.

Mr. Elliott is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. J. E. Crabtree, Conlen, and two brothers of Altus, Oklahoma.

J. W. Elliott was born in Denton County, Texas August 22, 1875. Later he lived in Wellington and Quanah before moving to the high plains where he became the cashier of the old State Bank at Texhoma. As a school teacher he took up the study of law and was admitted to the bar in 1910. He continued the practice of law until the time of his passing, having served the county two terms as a County Judge and five terms as a County Attorney.

A resident of Sherman County for the last fifty years, Mr. Elliott established himself as an attorney to whom his friends looked with confidence in seeking legal advice. He was sincere, conscientious, and a man of firm convictions. He lived his life and conducted his business in a manner which he hoped would at the time of his passing, cause his friends to say, "here lies an honest man."

At the age of 73 years, 4 months and 26 days, "Judge Elliott" passed on into eternity. Young and old friends gathered Wednesday afternoon to pay their last tribute of respect. The compliment he had desired was on the lips of those present.

Interment was made in the Stratford cemetery under the supervision of Wilson Funeral Directors.

County Crop Yield Survey Completed

According to figures on file in the Sherman County A.C.A. office there were 4,284,000 bushels of wheat harvested on 280,000 acres of land in Sherman County during the year 1948, giving a yield of 15.3 bushels per acre.

332 warehouse loans covering 1,024,968 bushels of wheat and 10 farm stored loans covering 19,670 bushels of wheat were made during the 1948 loan season. An amount of \$2,104,469.51 was disbursed on these loans.

87 purchase agreements were issued in Sherman County for 976,205 bushels of wheat, making a total of 2,020,843 bushels protected by Commodity Credit Corporation.

Sherman County raised a bumper grain sorghum crop in 1948. To date 49 loans have been completed for 60,373 cwt. of sorghums totaling \$154,678.27.

The loan rate in Sherman for wheat is \$1.91 and \$2.22 for grain sorghums. Closing date for making a wheat loan was December 31, 1948, and the date for making a grain sorghum loan has been extended to February 28, 1949.

Stratford Elks won the final game of the Stratford annual invitation basketball tournament Saturday night from the Gruver boys in one of the most thrilling games played on the local court this year. The Elks took an early lead which Gruver overcame at the half. During the third quarter Gruver took over the command of the high score and the two teams scored goal for goal with Gruver usually maintaining a two point lead until the last few minutes of play.

Marian Brannan scored the winning goal for Stratford only seconds before the close of the game, to win the game for the Elks with a score of 34 to 32. The Gruver team played one of its best games of the season. Composed mostly of Sophomores the Gruver team is expected to be one of the most powerful teams in the district next year.

Tragic Death Brings Sadness To McQueen Home

The tragic death of Earl Pruet, one of Oklahoma City's most talented attorneys, Tuesday of last week, brought sadness to the home of his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. E. B. McQueen. Mr. Pruet was a guest in their home last summer.

According to available information, Mr. Pruet was shot in the back as he turned to walk to his private office from the reception room by a client who pretended to seek legal assistance in securing a divorce.

Roy Frank Godbey, sentenced to prison 17 years ago, was taken into custody in El Paso, Texas Wednesday and has reportedly confessed the crime.

Pruet was the prosecuting attorney at the time Godbey was sentenced to prison. The judge who passed sentence, and others whose lives were threatened, have declined to discuss the case. Heavy guards had been placed about the judge, jurors, and the water supply of Waurika, Oklahoma.

Godbey was paroled November 15 of last year after serving 17 years of a 25-year sentence.

Girl Injured Fatally In Plains Sunday

Valera Mae Willmon, 8-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Willmon, succumbed to fatal traffic accident injuries in a Brownfield, Texas hospital Sunday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Willmon and their four children were returning to their home in a truck after attending church services in Plains, Texas when the accident occurred. Mr. Willmon drove slowly to a street intersection and seeing no other traffic approaching on either side continued driving. Hardly had the truck reached the center of the street when a car driven at high speed smashed into the driver's side of the truck. All occupants of the truck except Mr. Willmon and one small son were thrown from the cab by the impact. Valera Mae was pinned beneath the bed of the overturned truck. Two children were thrown clear of the wreckage, Mrs. Willmon's clothing was partially pinned under the cab, and the small son with one hand caught in the crushed cab door waited patiently for his father to climb from the truck and get aid to raise the weight sufficiently to release his hand and remove his mother and sister pinned beneath the truck bed.

Funeral services were conducted at 3:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon at Hale Center where burial was made.

Red Stripe Parkers To Be Fined

Stratford's safety program in traffic regulations and fire prevention is gradually being placed into operation.

This week the council and the fire department issue a warning that those who park on red curbs in the city are subject to fines.

The red curbs placed at fire hydrants and in front of the theatre are for the purpose of reserving space as law prescribes to allow firemen access to fire plugs and provides for the evacuation of buildings in event of fire.

Most local residents have complied with the fire markers at every request but gradually grow neglectful as time passes on. At present the fire hydrant on the corner at the post office building is being blocked off by parked cars. This corner is one which will be watched as it has the fire plug which provides protection for most of the frame buildings in the city's business section.

Complaints of reckless driving have been made and plans are being formulated to curb all practices which may endanger life and property.

Conservation Program Open To All Farmers

The 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program is open to every farmer in Sherman County. Farmers who have a conservation problem on their farms are urged to participate in the program. Full information is available at the County Agricultural Conservation office in Stratford.

R. C. Buckles, Chairman of the County Agricultural Conservation Committee, advises that within the limits of funds available, assistance is available to all farmers who participate in the program. Conservation practices carried out must meet the requirements for such practices.

It should be understood, says Mr. Buckles, that the funds which this county receives for conservation work represents the National interest in conserving soil and water in this county. The county committee is charged with the responsibility of seeing that the funds are used to get maximum conservation for each dollar spent.

The conservation practices which have been approved for national use in conserving soil and water have been drawn up by the county committee, State PMA Committees, State Technical Committees and the Agricultural Conservation Programs Branch in Washington, D. C. County practices have been selected and adapted by community and county committeemen.

Assistance under the program is intended to encourage additional conservation and not to help farmers with customary operations, Mr. Buckles states.

Appeal For March Of Dimes Contributions

Jim Taylor, chairman of the March of Dimes drive in Sherman County and H. M. Flores, county treasurer, are making an appeal to the people of Stratford and Sherman County for liberal donations to the March of Dimes drive which is currently being carried on in the county.

Stratford Lions club members, school boys and girls, and boy scouts of Stratford will make a canvass of Stratford Tuesday, January 25, to accept donations for the March of Dimes campaign.

Taylor states that he hopes to raise at least \$2,000.00 in the current drive as all funds which accumulated in the Sherman County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis were expended last year in caring for cases of infantile paralysis in the county.

Checks made payable to the "March of Dimes" are legal income tax deductions.

One-half of the funds raised in the drive remain in Sherman County. One-fourth goes to the National Foundation for treatment of cases and one-fourth is used by the National Foundation for medical research for the treatment and prevention of infantile paralysis. Money which is sent to the National Foundation may be borrowed by the county in times of emergency when funds are not available from other sources.

Contribution containers in Stratford and Texhoma, Texas have supplied the main source of revenue for the "March of Dimes" in recent campaigns.

If \$2,000.00 is raised in the current drive, Sherman County will have sufficient money on hand to care for one case or make partial payment for treatment of two cases in event the dread disease strikes again as it did last year.

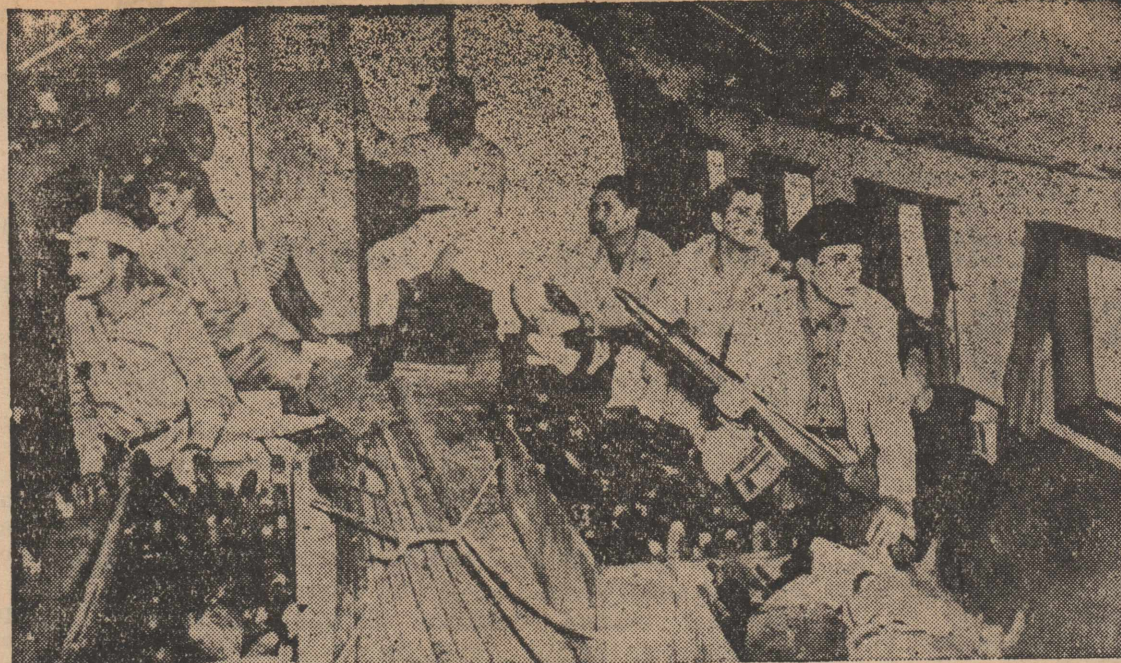

teen-agers, and this is to come to a sudden stop according to my informant. Everyone is familiar with the rules for driving in town, or should be, and they will be expected to abide by them, or pay the consequences. It is planned to designate certain streets as through streets sometime in the near future, and stop signs be placed on the cross streets. This is all well and good, but the first time someone mentions parking meters, I am leaving town. Maybe that would be an easy way to get rid of me.

The March of Dimes isn't marching very fast here, and we should try to pep it up. With the cases of polio we had here last summer we should realize the urgent need for these funds. Half the funds stay in the local fund, and half goes to the national fund to be used where needed. Due to the epidemic we had last summer the funds of the local, state, and national organizations are about gone. It is imperative that this fund be replenished at once. It is estimated that about double last year's budget will be required this year, making this county's quota about seventy-five cents per person on the basis of last year's contribution. You can buy no cheaper insurance. Regardless of who you are, you can receive free treatment or assistance so long as the funds are available. Also a part of the money will go for research into the prevention and treatment of the dread disease. Don't let our

committee down on this, it's for your own protection.

The county fire truck is not a dead issue, we are still plugging for it, and I think eventually we will get it, but the more people we can get to plugging for it, the sooner we will get it. By far the greater part of the fire calls answered by the Stratford Fire Department are rural fires, and we have no business outside the city limits with the truck. The County Commissioners think it will take an election to get one, but I still don't think that is absolutely necessary. But if it is, let's get up a little more interest and have a fire truck to fight our fires. Texhoma, Texas is fighting it, but let them fight, that can work both ways. Or better yet, get two of them and station one at Texhoma. But everyone knows how easily a field of ripe wheat or a hay stack, or a dry pasture can burn, and one good fire would more than pay for the truck. Enough grass has been burned in the county in the past year to buy one truck, but enough more would have burned to have bought half a dozen trucks had not the local fire department responded to their calls. A second truck stationed at Texhoma would be a big saving to the county, because one truck could not cover the whole county, especially with our lack of rural telephones. The city government at Texhoma might be interested in paying part on a truck to be stationed there. The cost per taxpayer would be almost nothing, but the protection would be

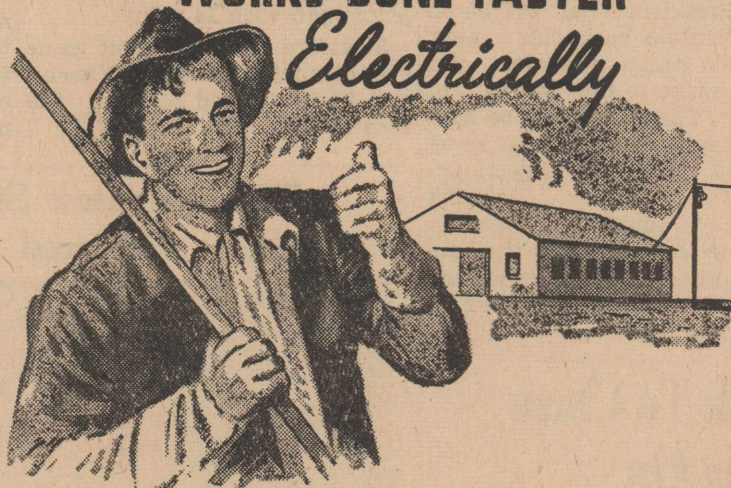

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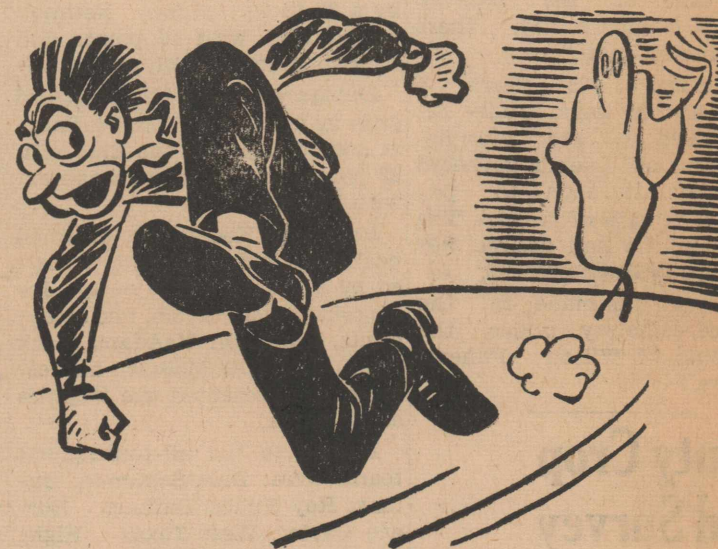

Self-Styled World Saver Ends 'Death' Fast of Four Days

CHICAGO.—John A. Bender, 59, gulped a digitalis pill for breakfast, complained of a stomach ache and then announced that he was ending his fast "unto death" which he started in hopes of saving the world.

Bender, who began his fast to teach the world the "value of virtue" and save it from destruction, said a religious caller visited him to dissuade him from starving himself to death. He said the caller was Frederick Kettner, head of the Institute for Advancement of Cultural and Spiritual Values.

"He said he could use a man like me, and he wants me to give up the fast and join him," Bender said.

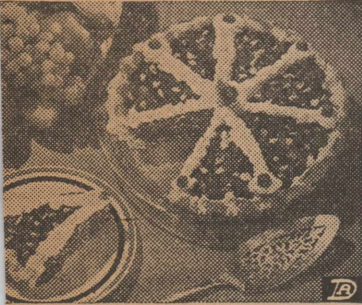

Cook over medium heat about 20 minutes, stirring constantly to prevent sticking. Cool. Pour mixture into baked pie shell and garnish top with hard sauce. Bakes one 10-inch pie.

Hard Sauce Topping... Combine 1 package cream cheese, 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar, 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind, 1 teaspoon desired flavoring. Beat smooth. Chill. Force through pastry comb to decorate top of pie.

LEPROSY BATTLE

Doctor Goes To Marianas

HONOLULU.—A modest 26-year-old navy doctor has set out for Tinian island in the Marianas, to start the first leprosy control effort in the Pacific trust territory. Lieutenant (j. g.) Jack W. Millar, of Palo Alto, Calif., volunteered for the assignment on tiny Tinian island, where the navy is completing construction of a temporary leprosy hospital with facilities for treating 100 patients, natives of the Marianas, Marshalls, Carolines, Palaus and Yap.

Until now about their only treatment was to be segregated as outcasts by their neighbors.

In preparation for his new job, the young doctor spent a month and a half on Molokai island, in Hawaii, working with Dr. Norman R. Sloan, director of the famed Kapaulapa leprosy settlement.

Dr. Millar believes the islands of the trust territory provide a fertile field in the treatment of leprosy.

"I don't know how many lepers there are in the islands," he said, "but I think the number will exceed 500 and may possibly be as high as 1,000."

No Diagnoses Made

Extensive clinical diagnosis of cases on the 150 populated islands has not been made, he said, but there are 60 known cases on Yap, another nine on Guam and some on Saipan.

In all, there are 50,000 natives on the Pacific islands, which cover an area of about two million square miles.

The most heavily populated island is Truk, former Japanese naval stronghold. It has more than 10,000 inhabitants; Saipan and Ponape each have about 5,000.

Tinian has no native population. It was a B-29 base during the war and is now occupied by only a small naval force.

With two naval medical corpsmen working with him, Dr. Millar said, "We shall study all types of leprosy in all stages; our work will be both experimental and practical."

Has No Fear

Dr. Millar has no fear of contracting the disease.

"Leprosy is not easily transmitted," he explained. "Medical science has learned that it is a disease of childhood and can be contracted only after a long period of contact. Transmission even by actual inoculation has not been exten-

sive." He is eager to get started in his new assignment, which will extend over two years.

"Once a case has been arrested, the patient will be returned to his home island," he said. "Then at frequent intervals he will undergo a check to see that the disease does not recur."

These checks will be made, in most cases, by native medical practitioners, who are to be trained for their work.

Leprosy, the doctor said, is of the same family as tuberculosis. Under a microscope the bacilli of the two diseases look almost identical.

Death among lepers is usually caused by tuberculosis or by an obstruction in breathing—not by leprosy itself—he said.

Doctor's Heart Massage Revives Woman From Death

CHICAGO.—A woman, who doctors believed had died on an operating table, was revived by a surgeon who made a quick incision and massaged her heart with his fingers.

A spokesman for Dr. Max Thorek, chief surgeon at American hospital, said Mrs. Julian Brittan's heart stopped beating while she was being given an anesthetic for an appendicitis operation.

Dr. Thorek not only revived the woman but a few minutes later performed a successful appendectomy on the 23-year-old woman, the spokesman said.

Dr. Thorek was summoned immediately when the woman's heart stopped. He made an incision over the heart. He made two other incisions in swift succession — one which pierced the diaphragm and another to cut through the pericardium which surrounds the heart.

Slowly, he began massaging the heart with the rhythm of a normal pulse. Seconds later the heart was beating feebly. He continued. The heart beat gradually became stronger.

Canine Mental Troubles Stem From Human Beings

ATLANTA, GA. — Dogs become mentally ill from associating with people, Dr. L. C. Moss of Fort Collins, Colo., reported in an address to the national convention of the American Animal Hospital association.

"Exploration of human behavior has led to the inevitable conclusion that mental and environmental influences play a major role in shaping lives of pets and other domestic animals," he declared. Abuse or pampering by humans can produce psychotic dogs, Dr. Moss noted.

The association of dogs with other dogs, he declared, can produce mental illnesses, too. The veterinarian said dogs are influenced by fear, pain, jealousy, suspicion, frustration and dominance of stronger members. In brief, what people call a dog's life has considerable foundation in fact. Even the dogs don't like it.

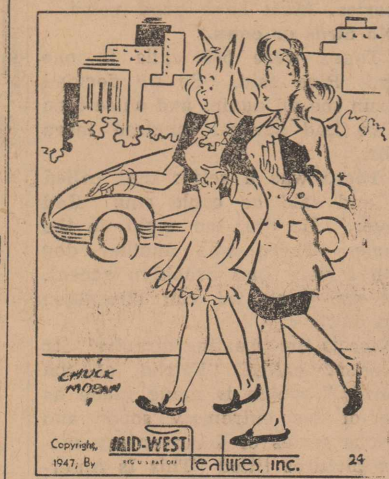
Traveling Showman Digs Own Grave, Then Lies in It

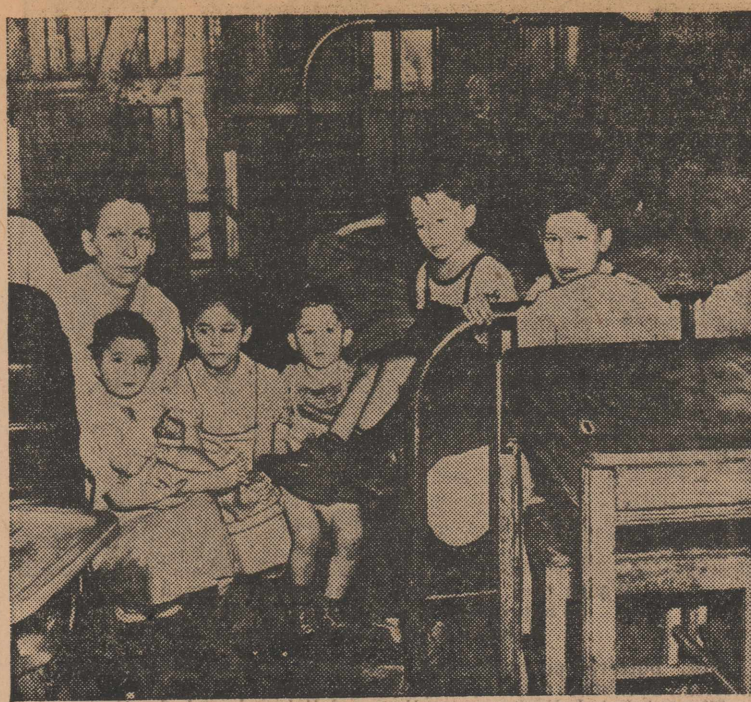

While decorative glass is one of man's oldest means of beautifying buildings, experiments are still being carried on to improve techniques. Here at the studio the processes of design are carried through from creation to execution in plate glass. As demonstrated above, designs are etched into the glass by sandblasting through a stencil which leaves only the design bare. After sandblasting the glass may be beautifully tinted or gilded, or left plain to suit the individual taste. The hood protects the operator's face and eyes from flying sand and glass, and also prevents him from inhaling the tiny particles. A separate oxygen supply reaches him through the small hose at the rear.

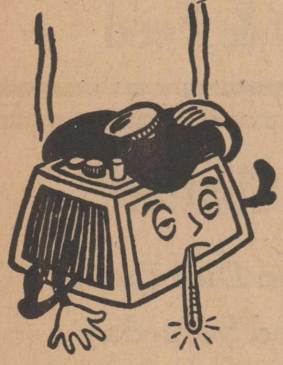

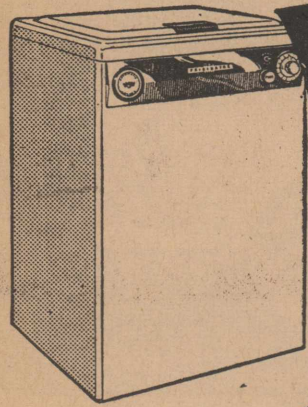

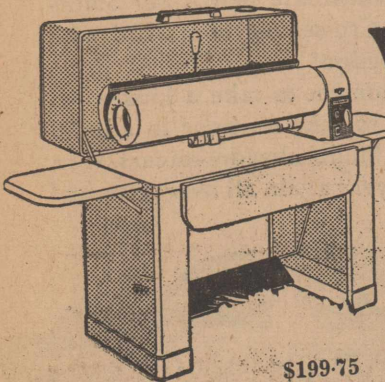

"Pop" Go the Popovers



Watch eyes pop wide open at Sunday brunch as hot, crusty brown popovers move straight from oven to table.

Hot, buttered-popovers are wonderful eating. Though not an American breakfast custom, they deserve to be.

These crisp shells are more than a delicious bread, for they make excellent containers for creamed foods. Cut the tops of the popovers almost off with a sharp knife, and fill the split cases with creamed turkey, chicken, scrambled eggs, creamed ham, or chipped beef.

Because popovers are a quick bread, you can get them into the oven in about fifteen minutes. Taking a few precautions will help make sure they "pop."

Precaution No. 1: beat the batter with a rotary egg beater until shiny smooth and no lumps show.

Precaution No. 2: heat either greased iron pans or glass custard or pottery cups sizzling hot. Take them from the oven and pour in the cold batter. This contrast in temperature helps popovers go high-hat. Set individual cups on a tray so they will be easy to take out of the oven. There are also wire racks that come with some kinds of custard cups. If your oven has sliding shelves, pour the cold batter into the hot cups as they sit on the oven shelf. This saves fingers and spills.

Precaution No. 3: bake popovers first at a high temperature . . . pop them, then at a low temperature to dry them out and finish to a golden brown.

As soon as you take popovers from the oven, make a small slit in the side of each to let steam escape. Serve at once with butter, jam, and coffee, and your family will take over from there.

POPOVERS

1 cup sifted enriched flour 2 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 to 1 cup milk
1 tablespoon melted shortening

Sift together flour and salt. Beat eggs and add milk. Add to flour mixture and beat to a smooth batter. Add shortening. Beat three minutes. Fill hot greased iron muffin cups or greased glass

custard cups two-thirds full and bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) about 25 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees F.) and bake 15 minutes longer. Serve at once. Makes eight large popovers.

Stones Swiss Building

Dutweiler strode out of the chamber, gathered two stones the size of his fists, re-entered the building and threw them through two windows of the sergeant-at-arms' office.

"That's my answer when they won't listen to me," he said as the glass tinkled. His motion concerned the storing of raw stuffs and food to prevent future shortages.

Air Force Finds Parachutists Are Airborne Spiders

SAN FRANCISCO.—No, ma'am. Those weren't men in parachutes you saw drifting down toward the thundering surf north of the Golden Gate. They weren't flying disks, either. Take the word of the United States air force and assorted professors—they were spiders. Parachuting spiders, that is.

They created quite a stir at that. Mrs. Wilma E. Huff of Stinson Beach telephoned the sheriff, who called Hamilton field. Air force search planes and a helicopter were rushed into action to seek the "parachutes" she reported. The coast guard sent three more planes and a cutter. Civilian and service authorities formed ground parties.

An air force searcher came up with the answer. He found the filmy, wind-borne web of what he called "a parachute spider."

These tiny spiders sail around simply because of the housing shortage, professors of entomology explained. Many kinds of spiders break up their family groups in autumn. Sometimes as many as a thousand go forth from each home to seek housing of their own.

They depart by climbing a weed stalk and spinning a spiderweb scarf. When the scarf is big enough, the wind carries it away, with the little spider hanging on. Sometimes, with weather conditions just right, the air-borne spiders rise to altitude of 2,500 feet, says Prof. Edward O. Essig of the University of California. Sometimes their webbed scarfs are as much as four feet long, and can look remarkably like a full sized parachute at a distance.

Ad for Talking Dog Brings Hundreds of Telephone Calls

NEW YORK.—Edward Rice said that he was bearing up as well as could be expected.

Talking dogs have been calling him up all week, Rice said. Also talking horses and bears.

Rice asked for it. He put an ad in the paper which read:

"Wanted—Talking dog, bear or horse to narrate animal film for well known documentary series. Must have good voice. No birds or cows."

"There were 500 calls in one day," Rice said. "So we decided to run the ad again, and since then we've had several hundred more calls."

"There was a setter that called up and said he could sing 'Red Rover.' He did, too, right on the phone. There was another dog with a very bad Brooklyn accent, but we think we can straighten him out."

Rice is the "casting director" for a short called "Friend of the Family," which is being made as one of the extremely sober and serious series of documentary motion pictures titled "This Is America."

First Postwar Shipments of Mineral Water Reach N. Y.

NEW YORK.—Solution of a strange, war-born international tangle over the famous Apollinaris mineral springs in Germany's Ahr valley came to light with disclosure that the first postwar shipments of the famous mineral water have arrived in New York.

It took a series of diplomatic pourparlers and the combined efforts of three nations—Great Britain, France and the United States—to deliver this first shipment of 500 cases.

The Apollinaris springs are in the French occupied zone of Germany. According to the Potsdam agreement, France has the right to control the marketing of all natural resources from this region.

Flying Hawk Tears Hole In Wing of P-51 Mustang

HELENA, MONT.—A hawk ripped a one-foot hole through the wing of a Montana National Guard fighter plane and the pilot made a safe landing, the Guard commander reports.

Brig. Gen. S. H. Mitchell said the hawk hit a P-51 Mustang piloted by Lt. Elmo Trudeau over a Great Falls airport recently. The general said Trudeau was flying 375 miles an hour and 500 feet above the field in a pursuit plane formation.

Trudeau left the formation and landed to discover a large hole just below a gun mount.

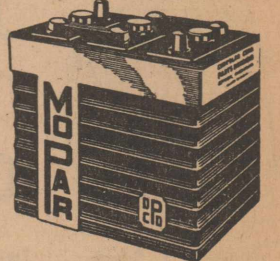

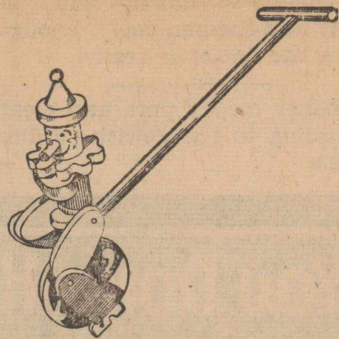

Truman Proposes Keeping Pledges In State of Nation Congress Talk; Mercy Killing Has Public Support

CONGRESS: Big Order

In calm, unhurried manner, President Truman outlined to the 81st congress his legislative proposals. To the surprise of no one he asked legislators to enact virtually every recommendation he made during his election campaign. He called for more taxes, authority to restore economic controls, a broad program of social legislation.

ALONG WITH corporations, individuals in the middle and higher-income brackets would share in the task of providing the four billion dollars more annual revenue which Mr. Truman says the government must have.

These are the major recommendations made by the President in his "state of the union" message:

INFLATION—Widen government control over bank and consumer credit, exports and transportation allocations; extend and strengthen rent control. Grant authority to regulate commodity speculation, allocate scarce key materials, control certain wages and prices, if necessary.

TAXES—Raise four billion dollars additional revenue for the government, mainly by taxing corporations, but also by boosting estate and gift taxes; consider increasing income taxes for the middle and upper pay brackets.

LABOR—Repeal the Taft-Hartley law and re-enact old Wagner act—but with bans against jurisdictional strikes and secondary boycotts and some provision for avoiding strikes in general industry. Boost minimum wage from 40 to 75 cents an hour.

BUSINESS—Strengthen anti-trust laws by closing loopholes that permit monopolistic mergers and consolidations.

FARM—Use price supports to keep farmers at a fair economic level.

OTHERS—Extend social security; set up system of pre-paid medical insurance. Aid state educational systems. Pass same civil rights proposals made to 80th congress. Push power, flood control and navigation projects on the rivers. Maintain armed forces "sufficient to deter aggression." Pass universal training legislation.

MERCY KILLING: Advocates

Euthanasia, a euphemism for "mercy killing", gained important support in New York state where hundreds of Protestant and Jewish religious leaders petitioned for legislation legalizing the practice.

THE QUESTION has agitated humanitarians and sociologists for centuries and there are many cases on record where mercy killings have been committed. Despite legal barriers and penalties, the record in such cases, for the most part, shows that juries are inclined to look with some leniency on the person who kills another to put him or her "out of his misery."

On an appeal to the emotions alone, much convincing argument for euthanasia may be presented. But, considered from all other angles with individual rights, possibility of criminal intent and other factors involved, the practice could become highly dangerous.

The New York group advocating the measure included 379 Protestant and Jewish ministers of the Empire state, the largest group ever publicly to advocate euthanasia. The practice is now punishable as murder in all the 48 states. The petition was sent to every member of the New York legislature.

NEED SHERLOCK HOLMES

Thief Makes off With Pound Notes

British authorities would be very happy had the renowned Sherlock Holmes been real and available, since the country was facing two aggravating and puzzling problems. Someone had stolen seven sheets of one-pound sterling notes, amounting to approximately \$50, from the extraordinarily guarded bank of England printing works.

As an added poser, someone had been going around smashing stained glass windows in the Wolverhampton area of the Midlands. Circumpect, well-behaved Britons couldn't understand how anyone could do either of these reprehensible "things of one-pound hard-to-catch" money. An idea of how hard-to-catch can be the pound-note thief is provided in the fact that the money, stole last summer, had only begun to circulate recently.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
By DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 3; Luke 3:1-23; 7:18-35; John 1:19-34
DEVOTIONAL READING: Luke 1:59-67, 76-80.

No Greater Prophet

Lesson for January 23, 1949

"OF ALL the characters in history, which one do you admire most?" We know how Jesus answered that interesting question.

He had a great array of personages from whom to make his selection. But he took as the Great Man of all time, up to his own generation, no heroic figure from the past, no king, general, scholar or prophet. The greatest man, for Jesus

—or at least one so great that he could think of none greater—was one of his own contemporaries, a cousin of his who was in jail at the time when Jesus said of him, "Among those born of women none is greater than John." Known to us as John the Baptist, that is, John the Baptizer, we seldom realize either his greatness or the close connection between his life and that of Jesus.

John of the Jordan
WE DO NOT know how much Jesus himself owed to John. We do know that John was the man who first called the public's attention to Jesus. John it was who gave some of Jesus' most important disciples their first training; John who introduced to Jesus, and turned over to him, some of his own followers. It may be significant too that Jesus' first preaching was identical with that of John (compare Matthew 3:2 and 4:17).

Some Christian scholars have gone so far as to propose that it was John's preaching that stirred the young carpenter from Nazareth to leave his shop and begin his great work as teacher.

Whether this is so or not, we do know that it was the baptizing by John which led to the baptism of Jesus, and that Jesus' baptism was the turning-point between Jesus' private life and his short and stormy public career. It is quite clear that if there had been no John the Baptizer, the story of Jesus would have been very different from what it actually was.

Only a Voice

JOHN'S own picture of himself is not a picture at all. When they asked him to say what he was, and half-expected him to declare that he was the Messiah, the long-looked for King, John said only, "I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness."

John, so far as we know, never accepted dinner invitations, he was never under the roof of any friend, and he had no roof of his own. People even called him demon-possessed, he was so far removed from ordinary life.

CASTE SYSTEM: Officers Adamant

The superiority which many army officers feel and affect over the G. I. came graphically to light in Berlin. There, in the biggest American club in the city, U. S. enlisted men were barred—but German frauleins were admitted.

Repentance: Seed and Fruit

NEVERTHELESS the Voice spoke truth. John must have been a powerful preacher, for his meetings were held miles from the nearest town, so that to reach him from Jerusalem one would have to travel through wild country infested with bandits. Few modern preachers, without benefit of advertising, music or choir, without even a tent, would dare to start a revival meeting 15 rough miles out of town. But John did—and the people came in crowds. We do not have the full report of his preaching, but we do know that he broke the hard crust of his listeners' conscience.

He made them see how unfit they were for the Kingdom of God for which they prayed; he broke down their pride till they went down to the Jordan and were baptized under the open sky, in public confession of their sins.

When men asked him, What shall we do? John did not have the fuller, higher message that Jesus later had. But he did make plain two things about the good life, the life that pleases God: it cannot ever begin without repentance and confession of sin, but it does not end there. Repentance is not a simple granite milestone on life's way; it is a seed which if it is real will bear fruit.

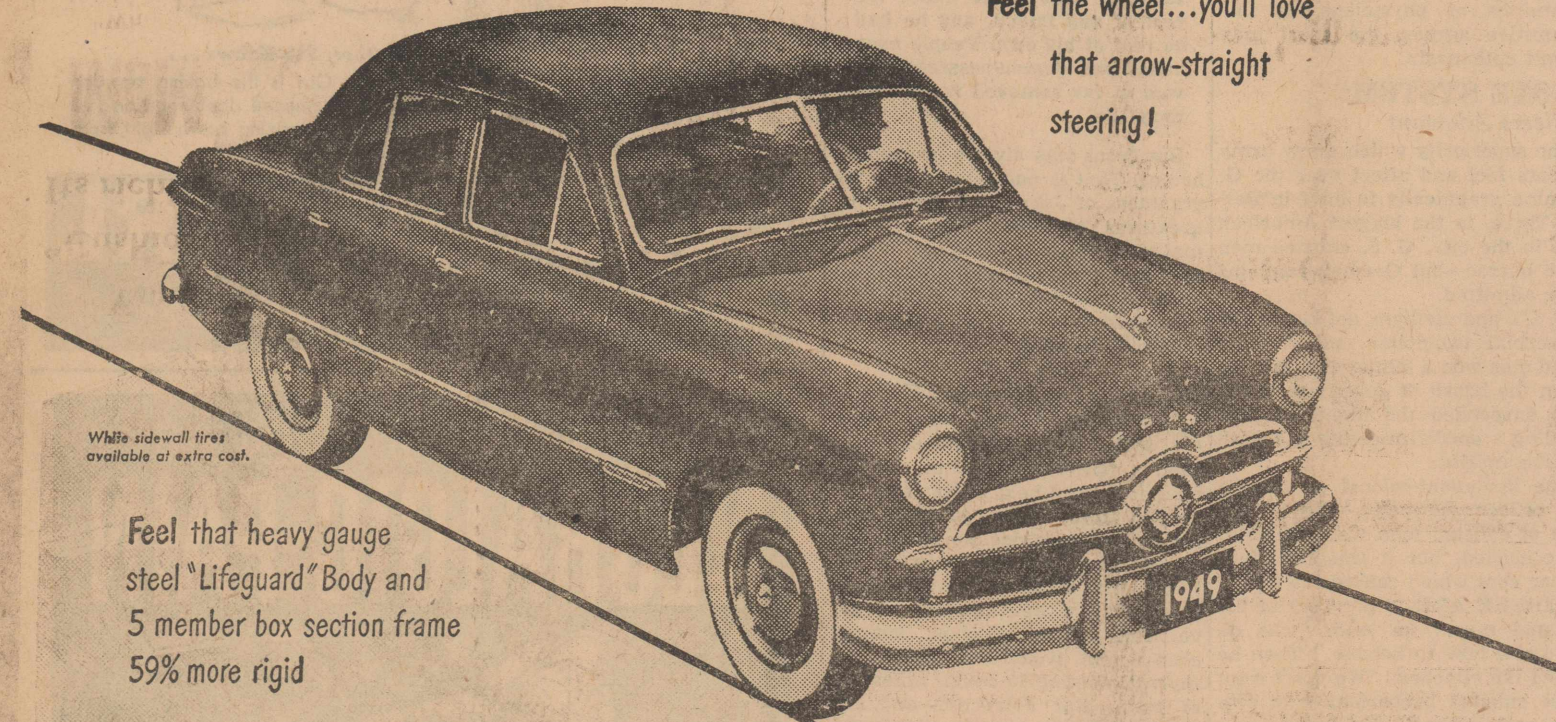
