

## Arranging For County Road Hearing

James A. Lott, district highway engineer, is arranging with the Texas Highway Commission for a hearing on the proposed paving of rural roads in the County.

County Commissioner E. W. Carter, County Commissioner J. E. Crabtree, County Judge L. P. Hunter, D. G. Cluck, Sam Cluck, E. F. Hudson, E. H. Hudson, and Oma Ellson met with the district engineer in Amarillo Monday to arrange for the hearing.

Plans include 20 miles of paved highway in Precinct 2 in the Spurlock neighborhood which would connect with U. S. Highway 287 13 miles south of Stratford; a six mile extension of the road into Precinct No. 1; paving of the four mile gap in Precinct 3 not on the farm-to-market paving program, and to pave 12 miles of road from the Stratford-Gruver highway along the route of the Texhoma-Gruver mail route to the Oklahoma line two miles East of Texhoma.

If the proposed roads are designated by the state, a bond election will be held in the road districts. Bonds will be issued for completion of the work under the basis of the state paying 25 percent of the cost with the possibility of it taking over the entire amount of the paving bonds. The State Highway Department would maintain the roads.

## City Election Ordered For April 5

A City election for the purpose of electing two aldermen for a term of two years will be held in the City Hall Tuesday, April 5. Arthur Folsom was named judge of the election.

The terms of W. O. Bryant and O. L. McMinn are expiring. Mr. Bryant has expressed his desire to be relieved of the burden of the office which he has held for several terms. He says he has devoted his time in attending over 100 meetings of the council and believes it is time for some one else to assume the responsibilities.

## Large End Up Preserves Eggs

There is a right and wrong end up for keeping an egg in best condition which even farm housewives do not realize, Miss Dorothy Dixon states. The large end of the egg should be up, and packing eggs in this position has been emphasized in all U. S. Department of Agricultural advice on marketing eggs. Even in keeping eggs for any length of time in the home refrigerator, the best position for holding quality is a point worth considering.

The large end of the egg normally contains the air cell which should be on top as the egg stands. If the large end is down, the weight of the egg presses on the cell, causing the air to rise and gradually loosen the membrane. At the same time the yolk, because it is lighter in weight than the white, rises from its normal position in the center of the egg to the top or small end. There it may adhere to the membrane so that it is difficult to remove the egg from its shell without breaking the yolk. Eggs with yolks out of position are of lower grade than eggs with yolks in the center.

As hunters know, many domes-

tic animals occasionally wander from the hands of man, cattle, horses, dogs, turkeys, ducks, geese, all sometimes throw off

the human yoke and take to remote places or join their wild cousins.

It is unfortunate that man's two favorite household pets and helpers should cause the most trouble when they do hear the call of the wild. The cat and dog, turned primitive, destroy those things which are important to us economically, esthetically and recreationally, claims Bill Wolf, author of many hunting and fishing articles.

The killer cat comes in for the

major share of the blame, and is the subject of much argument. Defenders to the contrary, the domestic cat which is allowed to prowl at will in suburban or rural areas, and the homeless cat which turns entirely wild and lives as a beast of prey, destroy wildlife of much more value to man than the contribution they make killing a few mice.

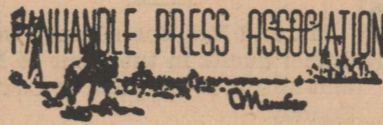
The owner who takes tabby out to the country, to be turned loose, is positive it will head for the nearest farm and find a good home. If they survive the first several grim weeks, they learn how to kill to live. They stay away from the farmhouse, where they are less than welcome. In a little time the wild has reclaimed them entirely. There is nothing cute about them. They are miniature tigers.

When the dear little kittens need food they have a varied choice, young of rabbits, quail pheasants and low-nesting songbirds are easy prey. Furthermore, they can kill the adults of all but the larger animals and birds classed as small game.

If this is condemnation it is not intended for the cats, but rather for their owners who abandon them or who do not properly care for them. They seldom realize how destructive their cats can be when allowed to roam at will. There is no room for killer cats, and the hunter is justified in shooting them as he would any serious predator. The hunter spends his money to put game in the field. The cat owner contributes nothing, not even a license fee.

# HOUSEHOLD HINTS

An open bottle of air freshener placed on a suitcase and allowed to remain therein overnight will rid the case of "that" mildew odor.

If you need to boil an egg that is cracked, wrap it in wax paper and twist the ends before dropping it in boiling water. The paper will prevent the white from running out of the shell.

To prevent seam puckers in sewing sheer fabrics, loosen sewing machine tension and use a longer stitch. Or with regular setting, stitch seams over strips of paper, then pull off paper. Test scraps of fabric before starting on garment.

## Cleanliness Advised By Veterinarians

Cattle brucellosis or Bangs disease will never be conquered while animals are housed in uncleaned buildings and farm yards. Ranchers have been successful in avoiding spread of the disease by maintaining separate calving pastures and rotating all pastures. Much of the dissatisfaction with brucellosis control can be avoided by better management and identification of vaccinated animals.

Calf losses usually can be stopped by veterinarians, but where owners cannot maintain holding pens and yards that are clean and sanitary, their prescribed vaccines and treatments may be of little value; the sooner young calves can be put to pasture on fresh grass, the better.

## Wild Oats Harvest

Lesson for March 6, 1949

ALL RELIGIOUS teachers of Jesus' time used parables. But the great difference between Jesus' parables and those of his contemporaries, as Rabbi Klausner says, is that his were remembered and theirs were not. People will remember a story who cannot take in a lecture. Jesus almost never told "wonder-tales." His parables are not in the least like Grimm's fairy tales or Alice in Wonderland. Mostly they are about simple ordinary happenings, and practically always about living people or things.

If you said "Kingdom of God" to the average religious person of Jesus' time, he would have replied, "Oh, yes, that wonderful time! The time when these Roman soldiers will be blasted off the earth by the terrible breath of God, the time when every grape will yield barrels of wine and a single grain of wheat can be ground into bushels of flour—the Miracle Age!" The Kingdom of God as Jesus proclaimed it—God's Ideal World—was something quite different from that. Jesus illustrated it not with fanciful wild pictures, but with stories from real life, from the field or the farmhouse.

The Kingdom of God is a kingdom of law, not of happen-so or of magic wands. Jesus was fond of comparing God's Kingdom to growing plants. Every plant is a miracle, it is evidence of God's creative power; but plants do not grow overnight, they grow by the laws which the creator made in them.

## Wild Sowing

AS WE SAW last week, the most important feature of the Ideal World, or of any world, is the quality of the people in it. So most of Jesus' parables were about people, one of the most famous being this one of the "prodigal son." ("Prodigal" of course does not mean wicked or repentant, but wasteful, reckless with money or other things.) You could find many faults in that young man. One of them—the fault that nearly killed him—was that if he had a calendar he never looked at it. If you take a good look at a calendar you will always notice that there is another day after this one—another month, another year. But the prodigal never thinks about tomorrow, only about today. He sows his wild oats because he has fun doing it. He can say "So what?" fast enough but he has never asked the question, "and then what?" Childish, isn't it?

Some people even argue that it is a good thing to sow wild oats, on the theory that the prodigal gets it out of his system and is afterwards a better man.

Nonsense! Is it better for your education to spend several years learning things wrong? Is it better for a garden to let it grow up in weeds for the first three weeks? Is it better for a man's health to spend his childhood years on a sickbed? That's no more silly than to say that a man is morally better for having been immoral for a while first.

THE PRODIGAL son in Jesus' story went home—but he had to reap his wild harvest first. The modern prodigal, whether individual or nation, seems to misunderstand Jesus' meaning. If God is thought of at all, he is pictured as a benevolent Being who after all doesn't mind our enjoying our little fling. "He will forgive," said Voltaire, "that's his business." That is a total misunderstanding of God.

## FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

QUESTION: "My bedroom has two doors with opposite faults; when unlatched, one will not stay open, the other will not stay closed. Can this be corrected by adjustment of hinges? Is it something an amateur can do?"

ANSWER: The trouble in both cases is because the pin of the lower hinge is not directly in line with that of the upper hinge. To check on this, use a plumb line—that is, a string with a small weight tied to one end. If you hold the loose end of this at the bottom of the upper hinge pin, the weight will show you which hinge needs resetting. The door originally was set with the hinges in line, and the trouble has come because of settlement that has somewhat distorted the door frame. It may be that moving one hinge will be enough, although possibly a small adjustment of both hinges will be easier.

When you have decided what to do, open the door part way, and jam books or blocks under the outer corner to take the weight. You then can remove the hinge pin of the hinge that is to be shifted, and do whatever is necessary. Take off the hinge plate on the door frame, and pack the screw holes with wood putty. You might find it necessary to place a shim (in the form of a piece of cardboard or a thin piece of wood) under the offending hinge.

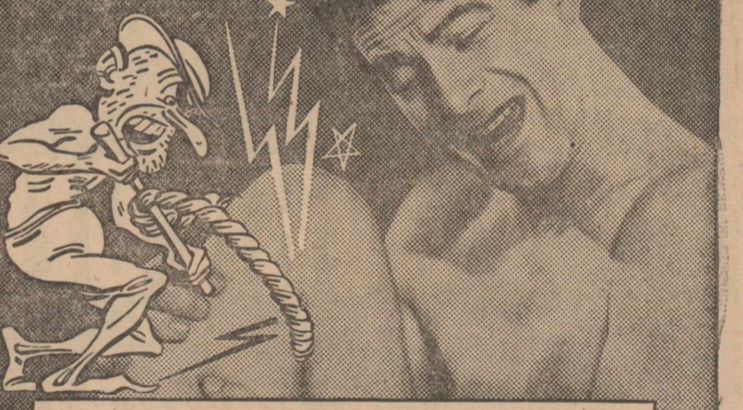

brought inside when the temperatures drop below 40 degrees.

When the plants get to be two or three inches high, it's a good idea to thin them to a spacing of four inches between plants. But don't throw away the ones you thin out. Shift them over to another box, or give them to a neighbor who may have also prepared a tomato box.

After growing in the plant box for six or eight weeks, the seedlings will be about eight inches high. Then they're ready for transplanting into the open garden when all danger of frost is over, and water them good before setting them out, suggests Rosborough.

In order to have tomato seedlings ready to set out in the garden on time, it's a good idea to start the plant box preparation around seven weeks before the usual date of the last killing frost.

Landscaping And The Ladies

Landscaping and the women's home demonstration clubs went a long way last year.

There were over 20,000 women enrolled as demonstrators who improved their own home lawns. Of this number, more than 1,300 gave demonstrations and assisted in conducting training meetings for their clubs. The leaders assisted in making 34 study tours to Experiment Substations, and they opened their own homes and helped conduct 51 Achievement Day Tours to see neighbor's accomplishments.

Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. & M. College, says in her annual report that 65 tours were also made to homes of garden club members. Control of insects and plant diseases were a-

mong the landscaping programs conducted. Other accomplishments for the year included teaching their neighbors how to prune trees and shrubs, build barbecue pits and outdoor living room furniture, and arrange flowers.

The demonstrators say they learned more than the people they taught reports Miss Hatfield. Not only were they benefited materially but here are the figures to show the actual number of yard improvements made. There were nearly 4,500 outdoor living rooms arranged and furnished, over 2,300 drives and 2,700 walks built. And nearly

29,300 shrubs and trees were grown from seeds and cuttings.

Not all of the 20,000 demonstrators who enrolled reached demonstrating status, says Miss Hatfield, but 669 achieved that honor during the year.
