## Phillips Strikes New Deep Oil Showing in County

A well that promises to be a rich deep oil, gas and distillate field in Sherman County came in Monday 24 miles southeast of Stratford. The Phillips No. 1 Kathryn is located in section 8 Block 3-B. in the southeast part of the county. It is in the western part of the Anadarko Basin.

The new Phillips well, on a drill stem test at 5,312 to 5,350 feet, with the pool open an hour and 15 minutes showed a gas flow estimated at 10 million feet, with an undetermined amount of distillate, extremely high grade oil, in the bottom of the hole.

The well found the production in the Pennsylvania formation at about the same depth and the same formation as Sinclair Prairie found gas and distillate in the No. 1 Lipps well 40 miles east and 10 miles south in north Roberts County.

The No. 1 Kathryn was drilled to 7,739 feet and being in the west end of the Anadarko Basin hit the granite high.

Testing back up the hole then started, and at 6,050 to 6,140 a drill stem test recovered 128,000 feet of gas in the Mississippi lime. Coming back up the hole with the testing tool open one hour and 15 minutes, there was a flow conservatively estimated at 10 million feet through a 2-inch valve.

## Sgt. Simpson To Be Buried In Stratford

Sgt. Henry J. Simpson, lost in action while serving with the Observation Corps of the 3rd Army at Luxemburg, Belgium January 24, 1945, will be buried in Stratford with military honors.

Sgt. Simpson was the son of Mrs. Emma Simpson. His remains have been removed from the cemetery at Bastogne, Belgium and are enroute to the states, his mother has been informed.

## County 4-H Boys Did Well At Stock Show

Sherman County 4-H club boys were well pleased with the showing they made with the five calves they entered at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show.

Edwin Lee Weatherford placed 25th in both Junior and Senior divisions with his entries.

Claude Ray Harland won 33rd place with a heavy weight calf and Jimmie Weatherford placed 36th with a heavy weight calf.

Although Sherman County bidders were present it was not necessary for them to support the prices the boys received for their calves. It was the first time Sherman County men have not purchased the calves shown by Sherman County boys.

The Shamrock Oil Company bought two calves, paying 38 cents a pound for the calf of Edwin Lee Weatherford and 40 cents a pound for the calf offered by Vincent Myers.

The Amarillo Production Credit Corporation purchased the calf of Monte Jo Gist for 40 cents a pound.

Furr Food bought the calf belonging to Claude Ray Harland for 40 cents a pound.

## Keyes Men Seriously Injured

Roger Owen Conner, 31, and Buster Earl Eickleberger, 27, of Keyes, Oklahoma, are in serious conditions in Loretto Hospital as the result of injuries sustained Sunday night when the car in which they were riding turned over about three times one mile northwest of Stratford on U. S. 287.

Conner's fractured ribs were driven through one lung and he is expected to live but a short time. He was driving the car at the time of the accident.

Buster Eickleberger regained consciousness for the first time Wednesday evening. Physicians state it is possible that he may recover from injuries but gave his relatives very little hopes.

The men were apparently on their way home to Keyes at the time of the accident. Conner apparently lost control of the car while driving at high speed. The car careened to the right side of the road and turned over three times before coming to a stop in a wheat field adjoining the highway right of way.

Should Conner recover he will face charges of aggravated assault with a motor vehicle while driving in a negligent manner. The charge was filed by highway patrolmen investigating the accident in which no other car was involved.

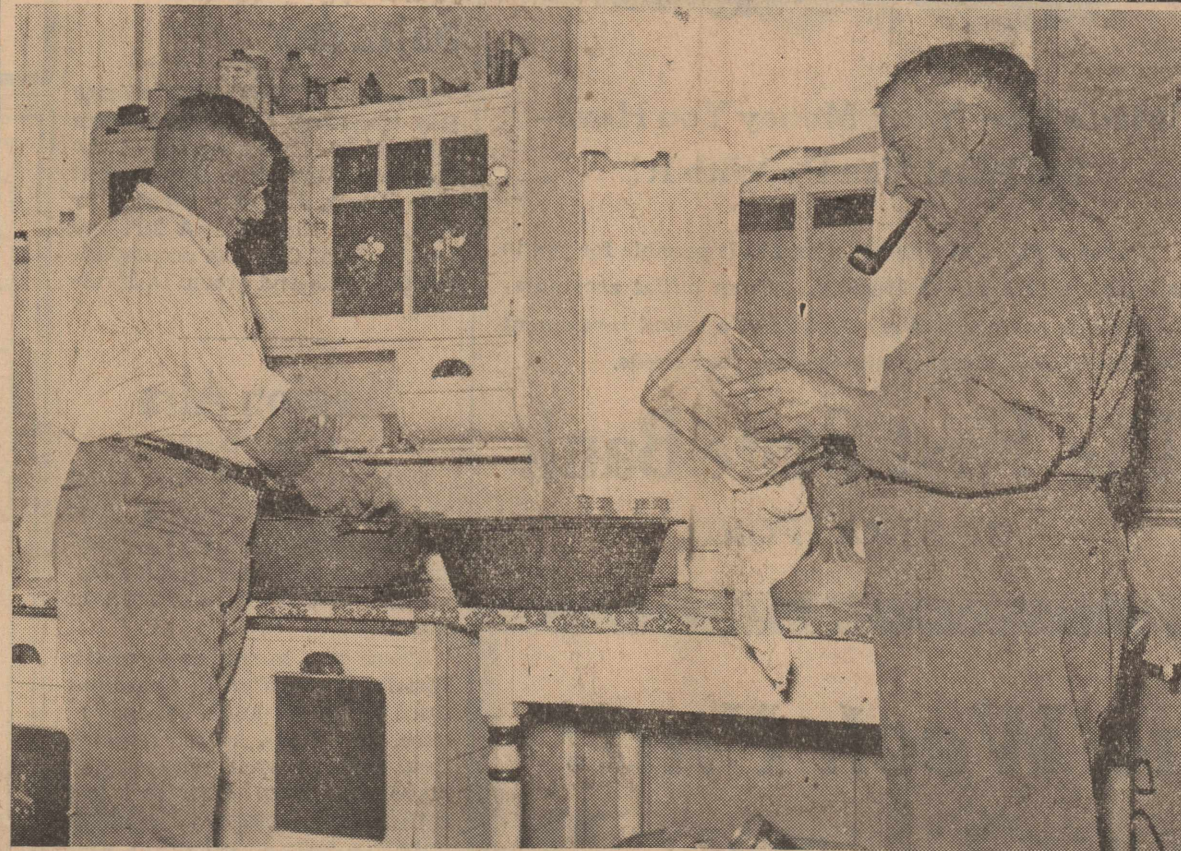
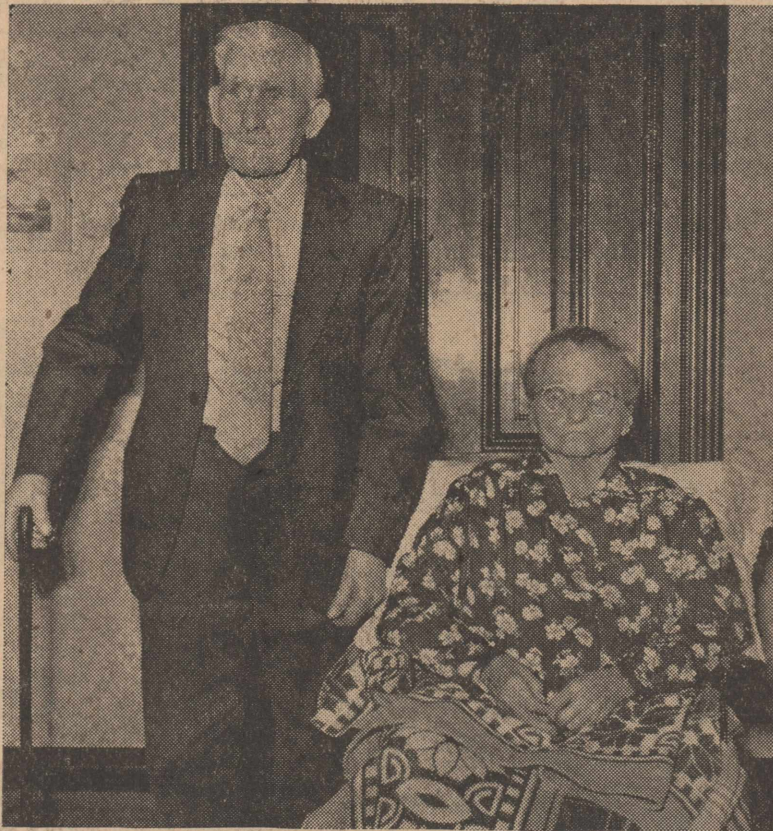
## Observe 67th Wedding Anniversary

Shipment of Gold Pieces Causes Excitement at Bank

KANSAS CITY, MO.—When the usually quiet routine of the Traders Gate City National bank here was disturbed, bank officers learned that more than half the members of the staff never had seen a gold coin. They were clustered around a deposit of \$2,475—all in tarnished gold pieces.

The coins were made a curiosity even in banks by the gold act of 1833 which forbids the holding of gold. Minted mostly between 1871 and 1890, they were in denominations of \$5, \$10 and \$20.

A telephone call to the correspondent bank that sent the money disclosed that the coins came from an 80-year-old patron who had had them buried for many years.

Youngsters Jam Parking Lot To See Hospital Patient

DALLAS, TEX.—The parking situation around Parkland hospital has improved, along with Grandpa Peel.

Noticing many youngsters sleeping in automobiles around the hospital, Supt. Tom Norton sent a guard to investigate.

The youngsters—there were 73 of them—said they wanted to be sure grandpa was all right. They were grandchildren and great-grandchildren of Jesse Peel, 84, then critically ill with pneumonia. Grandma Peel, his mate for 59 years, would come out each night with bedside reports.

Grandpa Peel was "doing fine" a hospital attendant said. He expected to go home soon.

Crack Passenger Trains Wait For Cows to Cross Tracks

GREEN BAY, WIS.—A bovine bottleneck halted two North Western road passenger trains at a bridge over the Little Suamico river near here.

Five bossies interested in green grass on the other side of the river had caught their forelegs between the ties on the bridge.

Passengers were getting ready to hoof it when a near-by garage produced an automobile wrecker which lifted the cows—one by one—to firmer ground.

The infant was found there with his sweater and legs daubed with green paint. Painters nearby said a can of green paint they had left on the ground had been tampered with.

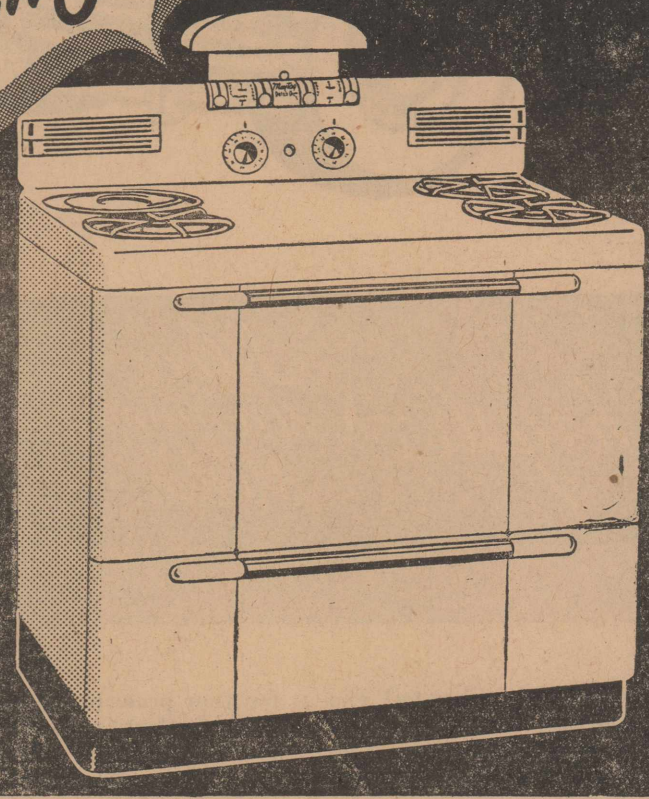

**Brain Vs. Brawn**

Is it better to be bigger or be smarter?  
 Is it better to have brawn or carry brains?  
 Would you rather be a wrestler or be Einstein?  
 (Who draws the bigger money for his pains?)  
 Would you rather be a Plato or a fighter?  
 Which quality will help you best to thrive?  
 Would you rather be a muscle or a thinker?  
 Well, I'm satisfied to be almost alive.

Can it be that brain at last has supplanted brawn in sport? That while the race is to the swift, the battle is no longer to the strong?

In checking over midwinter disbursements of the laurel and the olive, the awards of crowns and coronets by various clubs, boards, associations, chambers of commerce etc. we discovered the startling fact that weight, power, strength, and displacement had been rather rudely shoved aside.

Brain at last returned to its ruling place in the eyrie and the big hulk is stranded on the beach.

For example, we might as well start with football. Who drew the big bulk of the awards? The answer is quite simple—Doak Walker, Charley Justice and Frankie Albert. Walker, of S.M.U., weighs 167 pounds. Justice of North Carolina weighs the same. Albert of the San Francisco 49'ers is around 160.

This is on the light side of a game that has been taking on weight year after year.

We read now about lines that average 225 pounds from tackle to tackle—or 223 pounds from end to end. We read of backfields that average 187 or 191 pounds.

But most of the post-season glory was awarded to athletes below 170. This meant they had to be intelligent and mentally alert. I've seen more than a few 220 or 230-pound guards and tackles who were fast, but not overburdened with any mental weight. Some of them were swell linemen just the same.

It was an amazing thing for Frankie Albert, a volvereine among the mastodons and mammoths, to get so many votes. In addition to his smartness and his skill, Albert has always had, from his Stanford days, another qualification so often missing. This is stamina. You can also add ruggedness.

**In Other Fields, Too**

Football isn't the only game that enters this consideration of brawn versus brain. Baseball hands most of its laurels to Lou Boudreau, another 165-pound entry.

In the past we've had Cobb—185 pounds; Wagner—200 pounds; Babe Ruth—225 pounds; Lajoie—200 pounds; Hornsby—190 pounds, and Joe DiMaggio—195 pounds. Stan Musial, running close to Boudreau, is in at 170 pounds and Cat Brecheen won't pass 155.

Track follows the same ideas. Two highly-crowned and laurel-embossed trackmen last year were Harrison Dillard and Mel Patton. Dillard is on the smaller side. Patton is slender. Neither goes in for surplus weight. Young Bob Mathias, a well-built kid, is one of the few brawny ones to make the grade.

What about boxing. Last year not one heavyweight got within ten kilometers of having a purple toga thrown across his shoulders. Louis? Walcott? Charles? Nothing doing. Most of the awards went to Ike Williams, a lightweight, Sandy Sadler, a featherweight, and Marcel Cerdan, a middleweight.

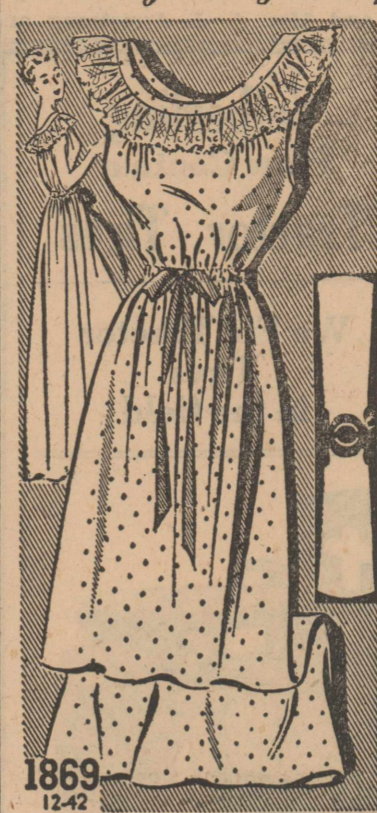
Cerdan, the Frenchman, led the pack and drew most of the decorations for stopping Tony Zale, a tough guy to stop.

Nothing above a middleweight was even mentioned—no light heavyweights—no heavyweights. And in the latter division, it may be several years before anyone comes along to act as a standout.

What about golf? Prior to his automobile accident, 137-pound Ben Hogan was the acknowledged champ—one of the best that ever played. Mangrum, who has been close and still is, is another light weight in the 142-pound class. Hagen weighed 185 pounds, Bobby Jones and Gene Sarazen were short, but powerfully built, in the 170-pound bracket. Nelson is a 180-pounder and Snead is close to this mark. Jimmy Derraret is solidly built. But Hogan and Mangrum are two rare exceptions. They take you back to the days of Bill Johnson in tennis—a remarkable competitor at 118 pounds.

**Block That Divorce**

Save Your Marriage if you can. Partly because marriage is the very root and basis of our civilization, but partly, too, because there is no companionship or happiness in the world like that of a man and woman who have achieved a successful marriage.

Don't think of your relationship with your husband as a fact accomplished, finished, settled, never to change. Think of it as being constantly in a state of development, up or down, for better or worse. Either your marriage is a more perfect thing today than it was a year ago or it is a less perfect one. Which is it?

Don't let it get into an unimagined rut, a daily pounding along at distasteful drudgery. And don't let its only bright moment be escape—the radio, the movies, parties, murder stories. Make it in itself the core of your happiness, the center from which all these amusements and activities spring. Easier said than done? Of course! But marriage, like anything else worth while, is a slow, hard, demanding job. And its success or failure is far more in the hands of the woman than the man.

**Money Is The Root**

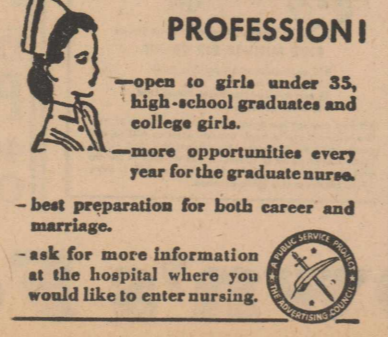

**God's Signature**

Lesson for March 13, 1949

**IN A STRANGE** city you may suddenly need to be identified. Some suspicious clerk wants to know if your signature is genuine. It is a fair challenge, for too many liars are in circulation. Jesus himself had to furnish identification. No less a person than his old friend John the Baptist had grown uneasy. Are you the One we are looking for," he inquired, "or shall we look for some one else?" Jesus' answer to John was not to discuss the theology of the Incarnation, or anything of that sort. He just went about his usual day's work.

In the course of that day he cured a good many sick people, and preached to some very poor people. "Now go back," he said, "go back and tell John what you have seen and heard." What those men saw that day was what Jesus at another time called the "finger of God," the genuine divine signature.

Jesus wrote no book, no letters even; he wrote in action, and his acts were the handwriting of God. It is important to see where Jesus underscored that writing. It is true, his healings were what we call miracles. But Jesus did not even mention that feature.

What he asked John to notice was simply this: the blind see, the lame walk; lepers are cured, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and (as a climax!) the poor hear good news. The signature of God, in short, is not sheer power; it is using what power one has, to help people in trouble. That was the sort of person Jesus was.

**Not By Bread Alone** **THE EXPRESSION,** "needy people," nowadays suggests people who haven't enough to eat or wear. Jesus helped such persons; but he knew well that men's needs go beyond well-cared-for bodies. There was the poor man from the graveyard, for example,—he was happy enough. He didn't want clothes, and he was strong enough to steal all the food he could eat. All he wanted, in fact, was to be let alone. But Jesus knew that what he needed above all was a sane mind, a mind no longer run over and trampled by a regiment of devils.

When Jesus got through with him he was clothed, but that was not the best part of it. He was in his right mind. So God's signature is not only written in a sound body, it is in the sound mind. Again, at Jericho when Jesus invited himself to dinner with that pint-sized tycoon, Zacchaeus, Jesus did not go just for the meal. He went because he knew that Zacchaeus needed something.

We do know that after dinner Zacchaeus was a changed man. He was going to give back every dishonest penny, with interest; and since he could not locate every one he had cheated, he was going to give away half of his holdings for the benefit of the poor.

What Jericho needed was a new administration, an honest one; they needed slum clearance; and Zacchaeus was going to give it to them. But first of all Zacchaeus had needed a new heart—and Jesus gave him that. Again it was the genuine signature of God.

**We Too** **ALL AROUND** us is a troubled world. Some men, seeing it, infer there is no God. Others conclude that if there is one, he must be bad or weak. The truth is that the signature of God is not to be found in the evil and the confusion of the world. It is to be seen wherever freedom is standing against slavery, wherever truth is pushing back ignorance, where diseased bodies are being healed, where sanity replaces madness.

More people would believe in God if they could see more of the handwriting of God. Do you want to help?

We cannot always do things as simply as Jesus did. Curing the diseased is not for us a simple matter of saying, Be well. A Christian woman, distressed by what she had learned of the plight of the insane in her backward state, was asking the head of the state hospital (himself a church officer), "What can we Christians do?" 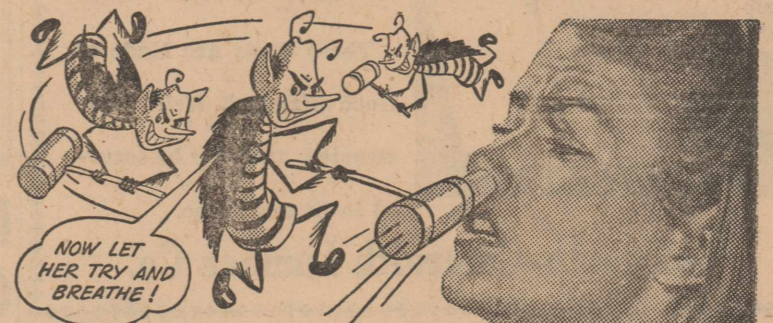

### Discourage Childhood Diseases

With the present incidence of chickenpox almost twice as high as records indicate for a seven year median, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, issued a statement declaring, "It is a great mistake to treat even light cases of childhood diseases such as chickenpox, measles, mumps, scarlet fever or whooping cough as though they did not amount to much. That sort of treatment make it possible for these diseases to spread and cause serious outbreaks among children and the resulting lowered resistance makes them easy victims to other forms of infection."

"Some of the most serious epidemics of chickenpox which we have had, have been traced to mild cases, that is, to cases so light that a doctor was not called. In some instances the children have continued to go to school and to associate and play

with other children. In others, after they have been kept at home for a few days, they have returned to school and have scattered these germs around among their schoolmates. Eventually a group of cases, sometimes very serious ones, have developed from the carelessly handled mild case. The result was another epidemic that could have been prevented."

The State Health Officer said that the family doctor is the best judge of the seriousness of such childhood disease, and suffering and anxiety will be avoided if the child showing symptoms of illness is put to bed and a doctor's advice sought and followed.

### Neighbors Object, So Couple Builds House Around Trailer

PISMO BEACH, CALIF. — The neighbors objected to their trailer, so Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Daniels built a house around it.

When Daniels, 73, and his wife, moved here with their jeep drawn trailer from Syracuse, N. Y., they bought a lot in an exclusive neighborhood and set up housekeeping in the trailer.

Their efforts to beat the housing shortage, brought protests from neighbors. So they built the little house. It contains only a hallway and kitchen, but it completely conceals the trailer, which holds the bedroom and living room.

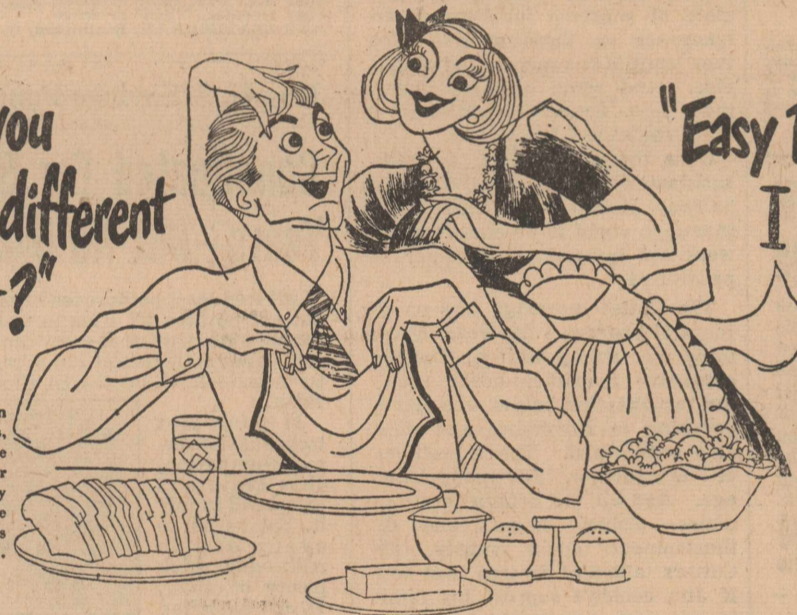

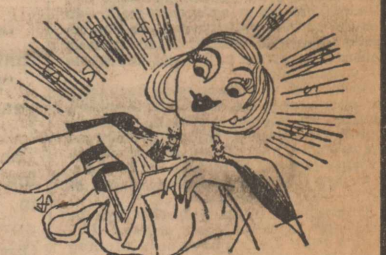
