Brake Accidents Lead

An ICC analysis of mechanical defect accidents of motor carriers during 1947 revealed that as in previous years brake defects were responsible for more accidents than any other type. Tire failures are second in number and result in the most property damage. It showed also that mechanical defect accidents are continually increasing in number but are decreasing as a percentage of all motor carrier accidents.

Moisture in Ash Tray What causes the moisture that appears in an ash tray, particularly a metal one, as a cigarette burns in it? All burning of paper, gas, wood, and similar materials, containing a considerable proportion of hydrogen, produces water, formed by a combination of the hydrogen with oxygen from the air. Ordinarily this escapes from the cigarette as in-visible vapor, but if the ash tray is cool, it condenses to form visible moisture.





Southern Governors Plan **Full-Time Capital Bureau**

SAVANNAH, GA.-Southern Governors planned today to set up permaent shop in Washington to help wage war against Federal civil rights proposals and carry the South's banner on other issues. Several Dixie executives said a southern governors' bureau in the capital was likely to spring from a resolution approved last night by the Southern governors' conference. The resolution deplored "hostlity" toward the South in the rest of the country and declared this unfavorable attitude was "created and perpetuated by untruths and halftruths."

A southern foundation was estab lished to "correct" the picture and give the rest of the nation the South's story.

The governor's conference, which ended last night formally noted that "many economic indicators" show more progress in the South than in the nation as a whole. The South still retans materal wealth, highly attractive to industry, which hardly has been touched yet, the governors declared.



PRESIDENCY: 'Say It Isn't So'

Was President Truman emulating the ostrich with the old

"head in the sand" technique, or was he naive enough to believe what he was saying?

This seemed a fair question when Mr. Truman, despite multiple setbacks in congress for his legislative program, declared he and the congress were cooperating and that only "troublemakers" talked of bad feeling between them.

MR. TRUMAN had suffered three major setbacks in attempting to have his campaign pledges enacted into law. He had been blocked on rent controls, appointment of Mon C. Walgren as a key figure in the national defense setup, and civil rights proposals.

But, the President shook off these reverses by ignoring them in a speech to the United States conference of mayors in Washington. Instead, he told the mayors:

"Of course I differ with the congress on some points and where these differences are important I shall continue to urge the course I think is right.

"BUT, BASICALLY, the congress and the President are working together and will continue to work together for the good of the whole country. We are going to agree on a lot more things than we disagree on."

Many observers took the view that the President's remarks indicated adoption of new strategy in dealing with congress—that an attitude of "soft words" might be held more advisable than angry denunciations of the lawmakers.

PENSIONS:

Who Pays?

It was beginning to appear that a veteran's pension bill in some form would be enacted by the 81st congress. Prodded by Rep. John Rankin (D., Miss.), of the house veteran's affairs committee, the measure under consideration would give veterans of World Wars I and II automatic pensions of \$90 a month at age 65. Budget bureau experts contend this would cost the nation upwards of 125 billion dol-

lars over the next 50 years. WHO WOULD PAY the cost of the pensions? American taxpapers, of course, and among these would be all the veterans who might some day receive the bonus. As one young war veteran put it, "By the time I reached 65, I would have gone broke trying to pay taxes to grant me a pension.'



Question: My new plastic tablecloth has made the ends of the breakfast table sticky. How can this be removed from a varnished birch finish and not ruin the finish?

Answer: Try wiping the sticky places very lightly with benzine, being careful not to press hard on the finish. Be careful of fire, and close the door leading to the kitchen. If the table is in the kitchen, do not work there. If the benzine dulls the finish, apply a thin coat of paste wax, let it dry and then polish with a soft cloth.

Question: Can anything be done to stop the radio interference caused by our oil furnace? Some say to ground the furnace. Our furnace is on the main floor as we have no basement.

Answer: Radio interference from oil burners, motors and other electrical equipment can be eliminated ed, but this calls for the service of an expert electrician or radio serviceman. The manufacturer of your oil burner might be able to take care of the nuisance.

SOME OPPONENTS of the pension measure favored restricting pensions only to veterans of World War I, but it was obvious no such proposal as this would be enacted. There were too many World War II veterans who would oppose that simply on the principle of discrimination, no matter how they might feel basically about the pension proposal.

On the first test of the measure, it was almost lost, but swift parliamentary maneuvering saved it from being returned to committee where it might have died a natural death.

DRAFT: **Easing Off**

Military draft eligibles could relax — Maj. Gen. John E. Dahlquist, army personnel chief, said no more men will be inducted into the army before July, 1950; and that's when the present peacetime draft act expires.

SO, IT SEEMED that the peacetime draft was virtually over, except for the possibility of enactment of a new act or extension by congress of the present law.

However, the national defense establishment hastened to state that General Dahlquist was giving only his opinion - that no draft policy has been laid down, and that no one

knows what the future holds. IT WAS REGARDED as significant that there have been no inductions under the present law since the end of January because voluntary enlistments have filled quotas, and army officials have said that budget reductions forced them to cut their proposed strength.
