1949 Wheat Supports To Be At 90%

Government support prices for the 1949 crop of wheat will be at 90 percent of parity, as required by law, B. F. Vance, chairman of the State Production and Marketing administration committee, states.

In general, the 1949 wheat support program will be similar to those of the past 2 years, Mr. Vance explained, except that the supports will be available a month longer, from time of harvest through January 31, 1950. Methods of support will include (1) farm and warehouse storage loans, (2) purchase agreements, and (3) direct purchases of wheat in Georgia and South Carolina, where wheat cannot be stored safely for extended periods.

Eligible wheat will be wheat produced in the continental U. S. in 1949, grading U. S. No. 3 or better, or grading U. S. No. 4 or No. 5 solely on the factor of test weight.

Vance pointed out that the price support program looks out for the interests of consumers as well as of producers, since it is designed to provide adequate supplies of wheat and to establish a farm floor price. Loans will make funds immediately available to producers who place wheat in storage for marketing later; purchase agreements assure producers who are not in need of immediate cash that they may sell their wheat at the price support level at a later date.

Wheat price-support programs have been operated by the Department of Agriculture for the past 11 years and have covered, through loans and purchase agreements, a total of more than 2 billion bushels of wheat. The highest amount of wheat ever placed under loan was around 408 million bushels in 1942. In 1948, approximately 251 million bushels of wheat were placed under loan and 113 million bushels under purchase agreements, a total of 364 million bushels.

Weekly News Letter

AUSTIN — The House of Representatives concluded their fourth day of argument on Senate Bill 115 on Thursday, April 7, and still no final action on this key of the Gilmer-Aikin Bills has been taken. Virtually no progress was made this week as proponents of the bill saw numerous proposed amendments stack up yet to be discussed.

S. S. 115 is the reorganization plan of the Gilmer-Aikin proposals. It would set up an elective State Board of Education, composed of 21 members selected from the congressional district, who in turn would appoint a commissioner of education. This plan abolishes the present elective job of State Superintendent of Public Schools and takes it out of politics making it an administrative job just as your superintendent of local schools is an administrative job. This bill also reorganizes our present setup and brings control of all school agencies under the State Board of Education.

One amendment was added to the bill Thursday, an amendment switching the election date for board members from the first Saturday in April to the same day as the democratic primaries. Other attempts to change the bill were killed.

When S. B. 115 came to the floor on Wednesday, April 6, an attempt was made to recommit the bill to the House as a committee of the whole. The House refused to put off consideration of the bill, however, with a vote of 85 to 54. If this vote had carried in the House, the whole proposed new program of education would probably have been defeated.

Further debate on the Gilmer-Aikin Bills will not come up until next Wednesday, April 13, when the House is regularly scheduled to consider Senate Bills.

House Bill 59, proposing a tax on natural gas, a bill that many Panhandle folks have expressed an interest in, came before the House for its second reading last Monday, April 4. This measure proposes a tax of one cent per 1,000 cubic feet of production of natural gas. This is the first major tax bill that has been considered by the 51st Legislature. An amendment was added by the House cutting down the suggested rate from one cent to three-fourths of one cent per 1,000 cubic feet of gas produced. This bill will probably be argued again next Monday.

The underground water law, H. B. 162, is out of committee in both the House and the Senate and is reported to be agreeable to the underground water people in all sections of the state in its present form. As it now stands, the application of the bill would be applied purely by local option. Nothing would be done until the people of a certain area voted on the matter. The city vote would have no bearing upon the rural people. In the same way, the rural vote would not affect the people living in the city. Either area can stay out, or both areas can go under the bill. The best part of the bill, as I see it, is that it states that the owner of the land owns the water under the ground.

The Senate and the House have both passed Senate Bill 190 by Senator Hazlewood, which was a companion bill to the one I introduced in the House, authorizing junior college districts to refund their bonds in the same manner that other public agencies can now refund their bonds.

The bill regulating the use of 2-4-D has been amended to permit the Commissioner of Agriculture to exclude those areas from the control features of the bill when it is shown that there is no necessity for control. This bill was designed primarily for the rice producing areas, and in its amended form would be applied to the rice areas.

As many of you have written me concerning H. B. 322, which would appropriate \$200,000 to be spent on libraries throughout the state, you might be interested in a speech made by Dr. Luther H. Evans in the House on Thursday. Dr. Evans is head of the

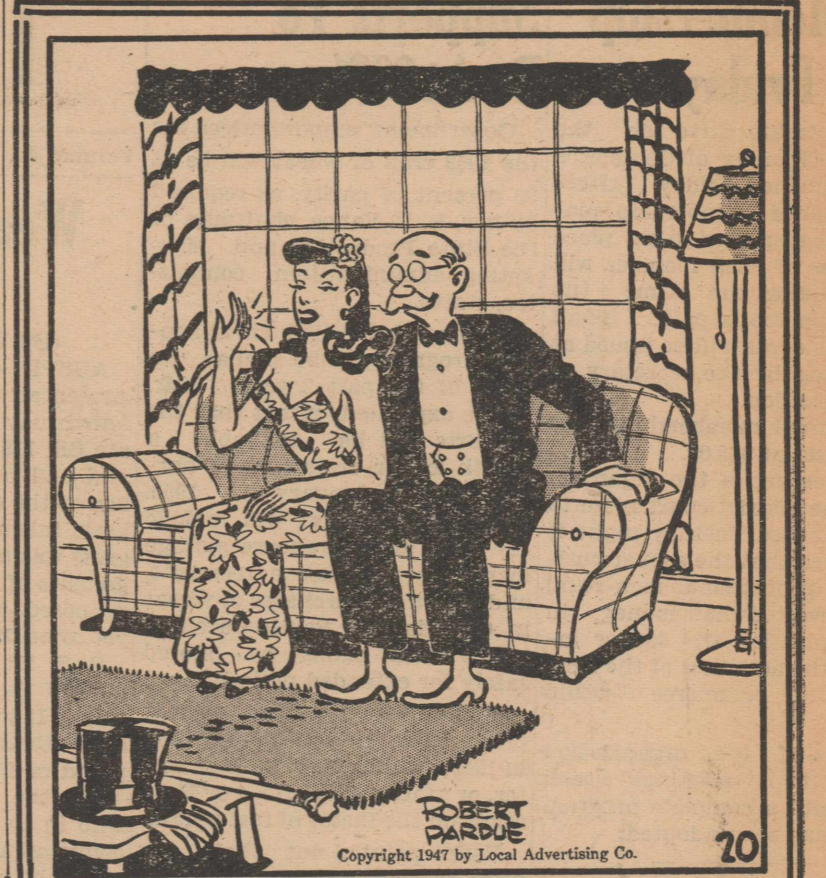

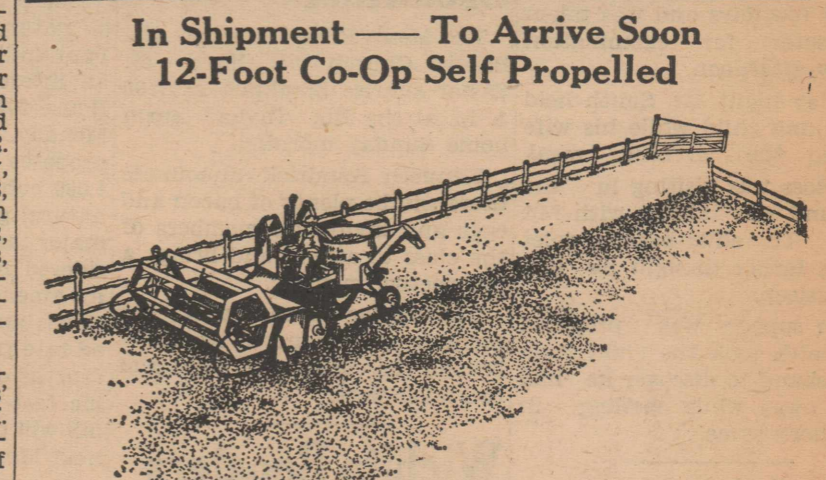



talk almost glibly of the possibility of a third world war, it is wise to assess the cost of the last conflict. Nothing resembling an exact accounting can be made, there are too many imponderables and intangibles, which permit of only an informed guess. One of the most thoughtful efforts to arrive at the cost of World War II appears in Harper's Magazine for April. It is written by C. Hartley Grattan, who has long been a student of the economic implications of war.

Mr. Grattan concludes that about 10,000,000 members of armed forces lost their lives. The last war was unique in that civilians suffered a heavier mortality than did men in uniform. The casualties from bombing; the planned extermination of whole categories of civilians; the terrible death rate among slave laborers; the losses in underground movements, these and other causes probably were responsible for 30,000,000 deaths. Thus, the total human cost of the war was 40,000,000.

To total the material cost brings the analyst to extremely difficult ground. The most obvious and easily unearthed cost is the money actually spent for military purposes by victor and vanquished. This is recorded in national budgets. It came to more than a trillion dollars. Next we must arrive at the cost of the physical damage which was done during the long course of the conflict. Factories, power plants, transportation systems and whole industrial regions were razed on a wholesale scale. Both sides concentrated on attacking dwelling areas, people who have no place to live especially in severe weather, are of small value as workers. Mr. Grattan arrives at the figure of \$2,234,000,000,000 (over 2 trillion) to cover the cost of direct destruction.

But this is not all. There is another economic cost, which is the most difficult yet to estimate. That cost is found in the depletion of natural resources, the disorganization of economic systems, the value of labor and material seized and carted off by invaders, and so on. Mr. Grattan places this cost at \$650,000,000,000. Adding all the costs up,

we have a final, incredible figure of four trillion dollars. And this, as he says, leaves out the moral cost of war, which is beyond statistics.

World War II was seven times as destructive as World War I. If World War III should come with the atom bomb there is every reason to believe that the costs would be beyond calculation and civilization wiped out.

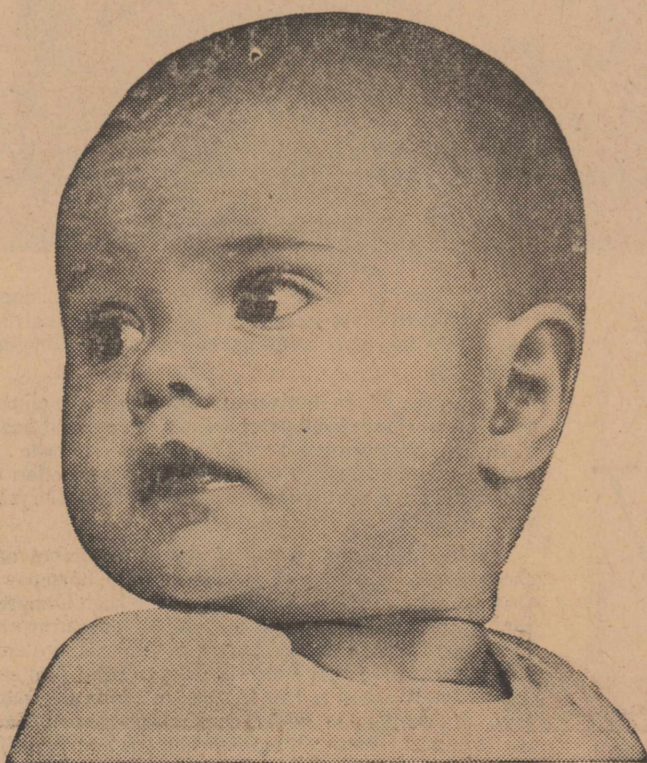

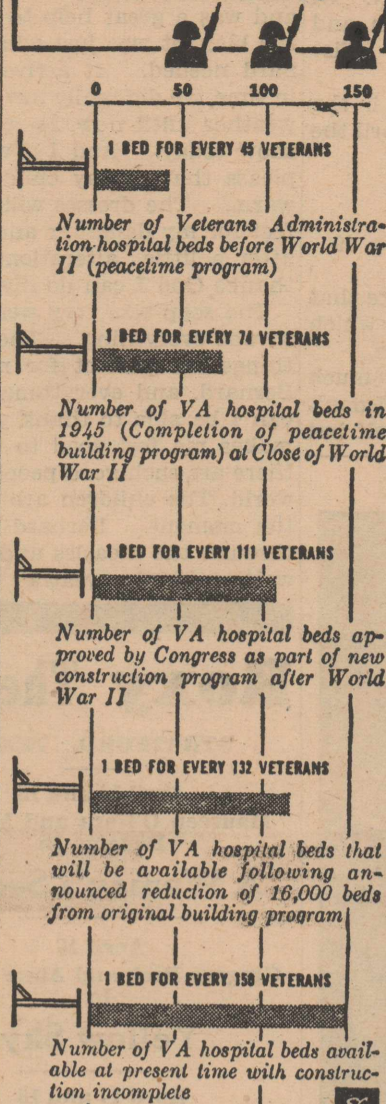

Strawberry Parfait Cake

It looks like a shortcake—it's really a cake, with a strawberry meringue for the filling and topping, and a final garnish of bright berries.

Strawberry parfait cake is a variation on the shortcake theme, and an elegant springtime dessert. Instead of biscuit or scone base, there's fluffy cake, and strawberries are folded into a frothy meringue for a topping that is beautifully pink and luscious tasting.

The parfait "frosting" makes the most of strawberry flavor, so that a little more than a cup of berries will make a strawberry cake serving eight to ten people generously.

No need to hunt for a four-leaf clover to expect good luck with this cake. Follow accurately this basic, tested recipe for a two-egg cake, using best ingredients, correct utensils, and temperature given. Bake the cake in two greased eight-inch layer pans, dividing batter evenly between the pans. For layer cakes, it is often well worth the time to cut a sheet of plain paper to fit the bottom of pans so that the cake will come out perfectly.

This cake requires only standard ingredients almost always on hand. Use enriched flour to make it for family service because of its extra B-vitamins and iron. The cake is one you'll want to serve throughout the year, with a variety of fillings and toppings.

Batter

2 cups sifted enriched flour	1 cup sugar
3 teaspoons baking powder	2 eggs, beaten

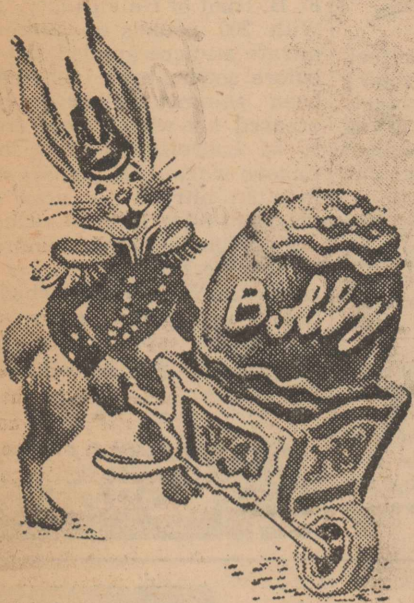

Contract 177 More Miles Of Gas Pipe Line

Vaughn and Taylor Construction Co. has been awarded the contract to lay 177 miles of pipe line for the Phillips Petroleum Company in Sherman and Hansford counties, Texas and in Texas County, Oklahoma.

Vaughn and Taylor crews have been stationed in Texhoma since last summer and the firm submitted the lowest of ten bids for the contract.

Jesse Moore, partner with Dillard Vaughn in the firm, said the contract called for completion of a major part of the work before July 1.

He said Vaughn & Taylor would have to increase their working force to about 150 men, and would need some additional equipment, principally trucks and tractors.

The bulk of this new work will be in Sherman County between Texhoma and Sunray. The pipe to be laid will range from 3 1/2 inch extensions to 24-inch trunk lines.

One of the trunks will extend westward beyond the Stratford-Amarillo highway almost to the Dallam county line. The Vaughn & Taylor crews will work eastward as far as Hitchland.

This contract will complete a \$10,000,000 expansion program of Phillips in this field, a program which has included the construction of the Hansford gasoline plant and an extensive gathering system. So far Vaughn & Taylor have laid about 125 miles of pipe in Sherman County and Texas County for Phillips and the Brody Construction Co. about 70 miles.

This program is called by Phillips its A.F.E. Project.

A 24-inch trunk runs southwest for 14 miles to the Corey farm in Sherman county southeast of Texhoma. There outlets have been laid for a booster station to be built at some future date.

Continuing southwest from the Corey farm the 24-inch trunk runs another 15 miles. At this point there is a junction. One 24-inch line, yet to be laid, will extend westward to a point southwest of Stratford. The other 24-inch line of the junction continues in a southwestward direction for some 15 miles, then turns directly south toward Sunray. A booster station at the junction of the two big lines is a possibility.

The area around Texhoma is serviced by a 14-inch line running directly west from the Hansford plant, then turning northwestward.

In addition to these main lines there are numerous laterals and feeders.

Moore said the present job for Phillips would occupy Vaughn & Taylor for another four months, according to the Texhoma Times.

Irrigation, Fertilizer Equal Bigger Crops

Fertilizer pays under irrigation in the Panhandle, according to F. B. Hunt of Hale county, Texas. With 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate an acre applied in the fall before summer-overflowed, he increased his wheat yield from 45 to 55 bushels; on land in continuous wheat, 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre raised the yield from 15 to 30 bushels.

Mr. Hunt is one of hundreds of Panhandle farmers using well irrigation. With water, which permits the growing of legumes, they are starting crop-rotation systems to hold the soil at high-production levels.

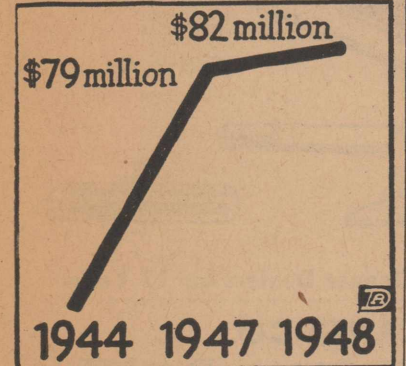

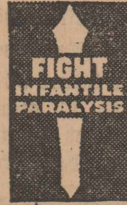

FIVE POLIO PRECAUTIONS ARE LISTED FOR PARENTS

Warning that the 1949 polio season is "just around the corner," the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today issued a list of precautionary measures to be observed by those in charge of children during the epidemic danger period which usually runs from May through October, reaching its peak during the hot, mid-summer months. The five easy-to-follow health rules for children are:

1. Avoid crowds and places where close contact with other persons is likely.
2. Avoid over-fatigue caused by too active play or exercise, or irregular hours.
3. Avoid swimming in polluted water. Use only beaches or public pools declared safe by local health authorities.
4. Avoid sudden chilling. Remove wet shoes and clothing at once and keep extra blankets and heavier clothing handy for sudden weather changes.
5. Observe the golden rule of personal cleanliness. Keep food



tightly covered and safe from flies or other insects. Garbage should be tightly covered and, if other disposal facilities are lacking, it should be buried or burned. The National Foundation also listed the following symptoms of infantile paralysis: headache, nausea or upset stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness, and unexplained fever. Should polio strike in your family, call a doctor immediately. Early diagnosis and prompt treatment by qualified medical personnel often prevent serious crippling, the National Foundation pointed out. The organization emphasized that fear and anxiety should be held to a minimum. A calm, confident attitude is conducive to health and recovery. Parents, it said, should remember that of all those stricken, 50 per cent or more recover completely, while another 25 per cent are left with only slight after effects. If polio is actually diagnosed, contact the chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis serving your community. The chapter will pay that part of the cost of care and treatment which patient or family cannot meet.

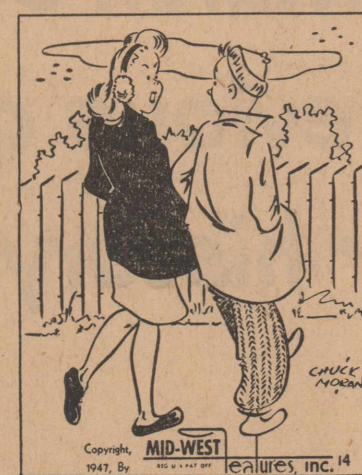

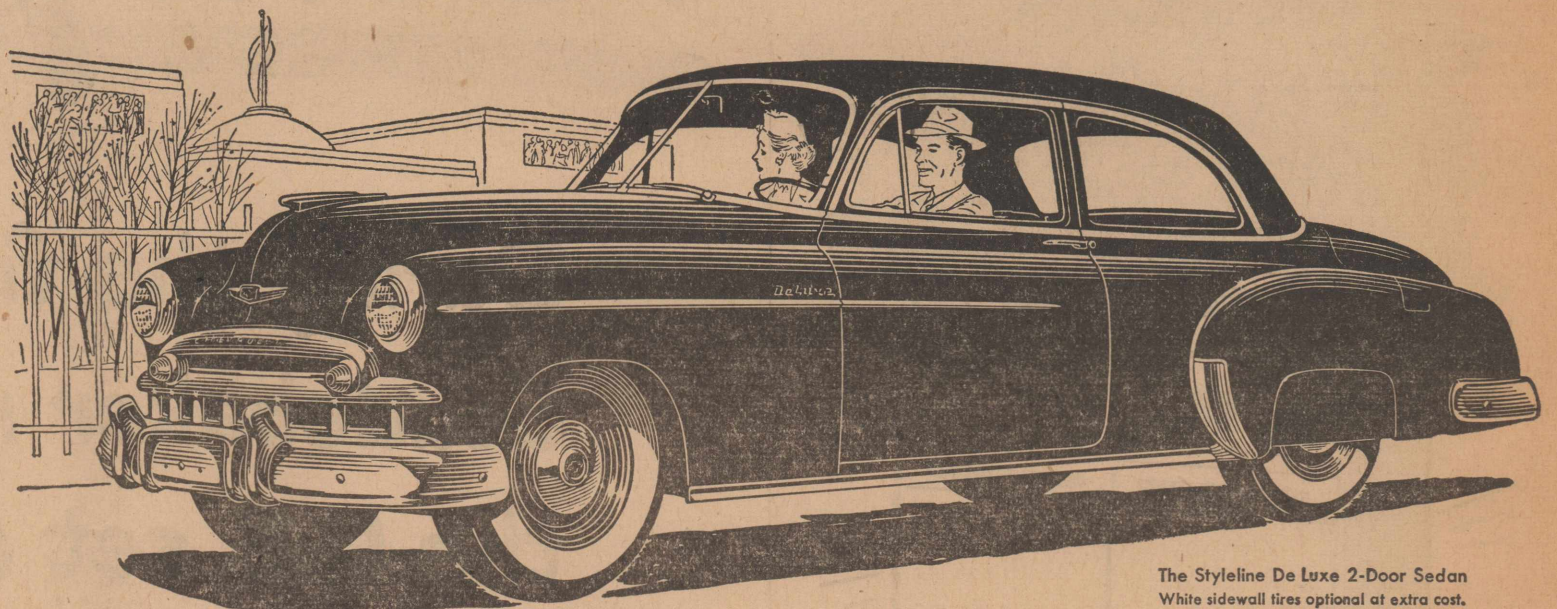

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Price Reductions Clip Inflation: Rent Control Law Gives Authority To State Governors, Legislatures

PRICE DROP: Hits Inflation

American consumers were asking themselves: What does it mean? Why were prices being slashed, the dollar stretching a little further? Was it simply that inflation was being clipped, or was it true, as some have said, that the country is in the midst of a mild recession?

THOSE QUESTIONS were well-founded. For, in the latest economic development, prices of automobiles, accessories, radios, refrigerators and ranges had been reduced.

Continued reductions in such basic commodities as lead, zinc, copper and steel indicated there might be further cuts in manufactured goods in the wind.

One automobile manufacturer announced cuts ranging from \$198 to \$333 in the price of his cars. The mid-season catalogue of the nation's biggest mail-order house announced "many price reductions in all lines." Even ice cream was down—off three cents a quart in Philadelphia.

Radios showed the biggest drop. One nationally-known manufacturer announced price cuts of 20 to 50 per cent on nine home model sets. Auto batteries were lower in cost. A refrigerator manufacturer knocked off \$20 from some of its models. Steel was down and scrap metal was at the lowest price in almost two years.

WHATEVER ELSE entered into the picture, it was conceded that buyer resistance was one of the main items in the price reductions.

The consumer had become more conscious of prices. There had been more hand-to-mouth buying. There was a tendency to "wait and see" whether prices would come down a bit.

Businessmen and industrialists agreed that the "bloom is off the boom"—that a healthy readjustment is underway.

SPEED PILOT: A New Record?

Joe De Bona, by his own admission was a "scared boy."

And he had every reason to be. He had taken off from Burbank, Calif., in actor Jimmy Stewart's nine-year old plane—a souped-up F-51—at 9:20:50 one morning, and exactly five hours later he was zooming into the airstrip at New York's La Guardia Field.

THE PLANE had a cracked cockpit canopy, dangerously low oil pressure, no oxygen, and gasoline for only seven more minutes of flying when De Bona whistled into the airport at 600 miles per hour. "I'll never try a record flight again," he said. "This was too nerve wracking."

Fred H. Wilkerson, official timer of the National Aeronautical association, said the NAA would have to decide whether De Bona set a new cross-country record. He said the plane carried no barograph, a locked instrument which shows elapsed time, and that the gasoline tanks were not sealed.

THE OFFICIAL coast-to-coast record for a single reciprocating plane such as De Bona flew is six hours, seven minutes and five seconds, set by Paul Mantz on February 28, 1947, in a flight averaging 401.076 miles per hour.

DEFENSE CHIEF: Has Big Job

Louis Johnson of West Virginia had taken on one of the biggest jobs in the world, and had added to the magnitude of the task when he declared the armed services of the United States would be "united as one."

WELL, JOHNSON, in taking over as secretary of defense, was the man whose job it would be to unify the armed services, but his predecessor, James V. Forrestal, retiring to private life as a banker, hadn't been able to do it.

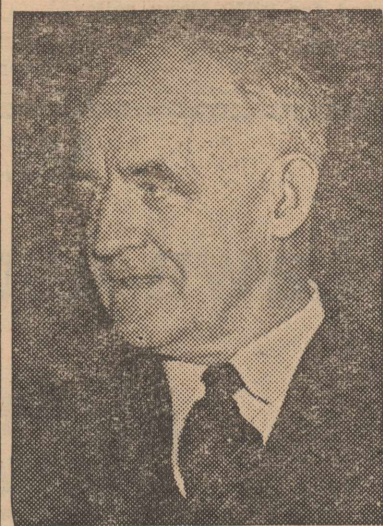
The fact was that jealousy between the services made it practically impossible to implement a congressional act unifying the army, navy and air corps. However, it was said Johnson would come closer to it than anyone else probably could. It was reported he was ready to adopt a "tough" policy to brass hats in all the services and that if unification were possible, he'd bring it about.

FORRESTAL: Medal From Harry

James V. Forrestal, retiring secretary of defense, received a surprise when he called at the White House to say goodbye to President Harry S. Truman. Mr. Truman pinned the Distinguished Service Medal on Forrestal's coat.

The citation read that Forrestal had "materially advanced the security of the nation." Forrestal said it was "beyond me" how he merited it.

New Senator



One of the nation's foremost educators, Dr. Frank P. Graham, has been appointed U.S. senator from North Carolina to succeed the late Sen. J. Melville Broughton. Dr. Graham was president of the University of North Carolina.

RENT BILL: Buck Was Passed

The rent control question was red hot. Congress knew it. The people knew it. But something had to be done before controls expired March 31. Congress had to do something. It did. It passed the buck.

A rent control bill was drafted by the 81st congress, but it laid in the laps of state governors and legislatures the real power and responsibility for rent controls.

EVERYTHING congress wrote into the present bill can be nullified by a governor or a legislature, if they see fit.

The bill continues rent controls for 15 months, or to June 30, 1950. It sets up a "home rule" process for decontrol of states, cities, or other local areas. Legislatures could remove controls throughout a state, or in parts of a state. A city government, or ruling body of other communities, could pass a resolution calling for de-control and, if the state governor approved it, then the federal government would be forced to abolish controls in that community.

The bill requires the housing expediter to fix rents so as to insure landlords a "fair net operating income . . . as far as practicable." However, it restores old O.P.A. powers for the rent expediter to control evictions. This, some congressmen said, would prevent any mass evictions by landlords.

UNDER THE MEASURE, the housing expediter is authorized to sue a landlord for three times the amount of any charge made against a tenant above the legal rent ceiling. Under old law, the tenant had that power, but seldom used it.

The new act does not authorize further 15 per cent "voluntary" increases in rents, and recontrols any dwellings decontrolled under such voluntary leases, at the rent figure contained in such leases.

Veterans' priority for first chance to rent or buy a new property are continued in the bill.

STOCK MARKET: Curbs Are Relaxed

The federal reserve board had taken an action that should make the "ribbon clerks" very happy.

"Ribbon clerks" is a name applied by stock market operators to amateurs who seek to engage in the fascinating business of trying to make several bucks grow where only one grew originally.

THE FEDERAL reserve board ruling was that the down payment on purchase of stocks would be reduced from 75 per cent to 50 per cent.

The board had been pressured for several months by the New York stock exchange, its president, Emil Schramm, and securities dealers generally. They had complained that the previous restrictions had thrown markets into the doldrums and that trading had remained at an unusually low level for months.

THIS WAS CONSIDERED as strong indication the board believed inflation had ceased to dominate the economic situation.

Earlier, the board had relaxed restrictions on installment-buying credit, giving a longer term for installments on purchases of automobiles, furniture, refrigerators, washing machines.

Open Season

In Kentucky, a wife may swear out legally a search warrant against her husband, according to an opinion given by Assistant Attorney General Squire N. Williams. Whether this extends to hubby's pockets was not mentioned in the ruling.

Heaven Is Real

Easter Lesson for April 17, 1949

HEAVEN IS just as real as Chicago. More so, because Chicago will in time cease to be, while heaven lasts forever. A few atomic bombs, a whiff of some new plague, can make Chicago vanish; but no atomic bomb can touch heaven. The pity is, so few Christians really believe this. We can get mail from Chicago, but who ever heard of mail from heaven?

Wait, though . . . there is mail from heaven, and you have it there in your Bible. If you accept it for what it is, the Word of God, then it is the Word from heaven. To be sure, it does not tell us much about heaven. If you were actually traveling to Chicago, you would not begin by studying a street-map of that city. What you would need is a map of the roads between.

So the Bible is not a guidebook to the "City Four-square;" it is more of a road-map to help us find the way between here and there. Nevertheless, the Bible does assure us that heaven is real.

Christians have many reasons for believing in the reality of the future life, and some of these may not be in the Bible; but the best reasons are there.

Jesus Believed It

WINIFRED KIRKLAND has truly said that Jesus did not simply believe in immortality; he lived it. Jesus would never have called this world or this life trifling or unimportant. But all around, under and over and through this visible world, Jesus was aware of another. He lived and acted as a citizen of both worlds. He talked of life after death—or for that matter, of his own life before his birth—as calmly and naturally as you would speak of next week or next summer.

Christ Is Risen

MANY PEOPLE feel it would be easier to believe in the future life is someone who had been across the line of death would return across that line to bring a message from the beyond. So they attend seances and go through all manner of weird performances in order to get a word or two from someone who has passed on.

But all the time we do have a record of a Return. Indeed it is The Return. We call it the Resurrection. The message of Easter is not summed up in songs about some "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere;" it is in these three words: "Christ is risen!"

He did not return in darkness, he was not under the control of any "medium," he did not make himself known by ghostly hauntings. He was seen at supper-tables, he spoke to his friends on a mountainside, he came to fishermen on a spring morning by a lake shore. The earliest Christians doubted some things; but few doubted that the Lord was risen indeed.

Heaven Begins With God

THE CURE for the troubled heart, Jesus said, is faith in God. One of the strongest reasons for believing that the future life is real, is the nature and character of God himself. Jesus said as much once, in an argument with men who did not believe in immortality: "God is not the God of the dead, but of the living." If we were God's paper dolls or toy soldiers, he might weary of us as a child wearies of its toys, and sweep us all into destruction without a moment's thought. But if we are truly his children, then when life's evening comes, he will call his tired children home.

Eternal Life has two sides, the heaven-side and the earth-side. The church has never believed that simple immortality is the same thing as the heavenly life.

A Judas, when he dies, goes (as Peter sadly said) "to his own place." A Judas carries out his own hell with him. But a man like Paul, or any Christian who has been at home with God here on this earth, when at last death comes, will, as Whittier said:

"Find himself by hands familiar beckoned Unto his fitting place."

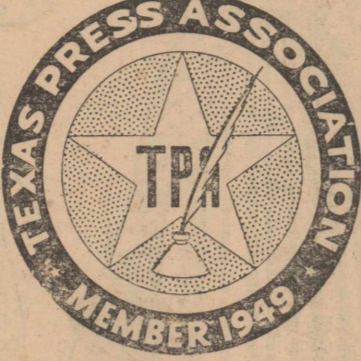

Study in Metals Reveals How and Why They Break

New theories as to why and how metals break, which have a bearing on a longer life for cut flowers and the height of giant California redwoods, have been advanced.

Investigations by scientists of the General Electric research laboratory show that the fracture of metals begins with extremely small cracks, nuclei which grow into a large split when enough tension is applied. Prior to this investigation, it was usually assumed that the break in the metal occurred instantaneously throughout the sample, the scientists explained.

The metals study was begun with research into how a column of fluid breaks. It soon became apparent that bubbles, which break a water column, have much in common with cracks in metal, it was pointed out.

If a pull is applied to a column of fluid or a bar of metal, the column or bar will hold together if the tension is not great enough to do the work of making the nuclei (bubbles or cracks) grow into a break. For every tension there is a critical bubble or crack size. If, when a certain tension is applied, there are nuclei of the critical size or larger, they will grow rapidly, causing the sample to break.

Fire Extinguishers Needed

It is desirable for every home to have at least one dependable fire extinguisher. The familiar water pail is probably the oldest type of "fire extinguisher." Water pails are handy for so many uses and so often used for other things, even when set aside for fire use, that "extinguishers" were invented which, not being useful for anything else, are more likely to be available when wanted for the emergency of a fire. Always seek the advice of your fire chief before purchasing fire extinguishers. These devices are not uniform in effectiveness. Some are designed for special situations only and for certain classes of fires.

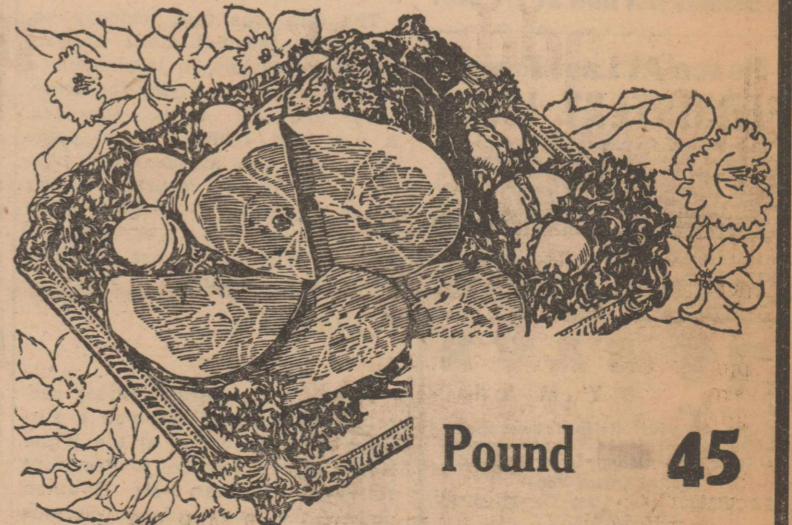
