New theories as to why and how metals break, which have a bearing on a longer life for cut flowers and the height of giant California redwoods, have been advanced. Investigations by scientists of the General Electric research laboratory show that the fracture of metals begins with extremely small cracks, nuclei which grow into a large spill is applied. Prior to this investigation, it was usually assumed that the break in the metal occurred instantaneously throughout the sample, the scientists explained. The metals study was begun with research into how a column of fluid breaks. It soon became apparent that bubbles, which break a water column, have much in common with cracks in metal, it was pointed out. If a pull is applied to a column of fluid or a bar of metal, the column or bar will hold together if the tension is not great enough to do the work of making the nuclei (bubbles or cracks) grow into a break. For every tension there is a critical bubble or crack size. If, when a certain tension is applied, there are nuclei of the critical size or larger, they will grow rapidly, causing the sample to break.
