The bulletin summarizes some of the advantages of a baby sitting career by saying, "Besides giving the community a service, earning money and observing many practical skills in child care training, you become aware of the many tasks of the successful homemaker.

Flies' Resistance to DDT Tested by Entomologists

In many localities of California, house flies have developed such a resistance to DDT that 50 times the normal amount is required to kill 95 per cent of them. That was indicated by experiments carried out by the University of California college of agriculture in a search for an explanation as to why DDT no longer gives satisfactory control over flies.

Dr. James R. Douglas of the division of entomology and parasitology, compared DDT's effectiveness on a strain of flies from a DDT treated dairy near Fresno with a strain of flies which for two and a half years had been reared in the laboratory. The laboratory insects alone died quickly when tested, proving that the fault does not lie with the chemical, but simply that the other insects developed a resistance, as had been observed previously with other insects.

Dr. Douglas is now studying the use of other chemicals for control of flies. Because of possible variations in resistance to these chemicals it is not yet possible to say which of them will give best control in a particular locality.

Yankee Meat Square



Lagging spring appetites will perk up at the sight of Yankee meat square with creamed vegetables, buttered asparagus, and spiced crabapples.

Add another tempting casserole dish to your spring menus by serving this Yankee meat square. It combines cooked cubed meat, en-riched bread cubes, eggs, and meat broth or milk in a nourishing main course. This is not a fluffy mixture, but has more the consistency of bread pudding.

Yankee meat square makes a simple company dish, for the mix-ture may be pressed into a nine-inch ring mold. After baking, unmold and fill center with creamed vegetables. Buttered asparagus may be the green vegetable on the menu. with a needed spicy accent supplied

by pickled crabapples. Cubes of meat scattered through the square give "bite" and meat flavor to it, while the enriched bread supplements the food value with

B-vitamins, iron, and food energy. The bread cubes used in making this dish may be made from day old bread, but they should not be dry and hard. The meat square or ring is easy to unmold if pans are lined with waxed paper.

YANKEE MEAT SQUARE

4 cups enriched bread cubes 2 cups conked meat, cubed 2 eggs 2 cups meat broth or milk, or liquid from canned vegetables 1½ teaspoons salt ¼ teaspoon pepper

Mix bread cubes and meat. Beat eggs, add broth or milk, salt and pepper. Pour over bread mixture. Mix well. Pour into greased eight-inch square pan. (Lining the bot-tom of pan or ring mold with Press firmly into pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 45 minutes. Unmold, cut into squares, and serve with creamed vegetables or tomato sauce. 
