outweigh the others. One is an entrenched and hugely jealous civil service which starts its protection at the top instead of at the bottom. "It is almost impossible to remove a policy-forming official, but he putz-frau, or scrubwoman, can be tossed to the political wolves any time," he says.



Check Storage Bins Often

To Prevent Insect Damage With one of the biggest grain crops in history now in storage it will pay farmers to check storage bins periodically for insect damage, suggests Gordon Mickle, entomologist for the Colorado A & M

If weevils or other granary insects are destroying your grain, you can still prevent further damage by fumigation. Although grain fumigation is most effective at air temperatures of 65 to 70 degrees, many weevils are killed at lower temperatures. Carbon disulfide is the most effective material, but since it is highly inflammable, it should not be used if it creates a fire hazard. Commercially prepared fumigants are available which are less of a fire hazard than carbon disulfide.

When fumigating Mickle says the following points should be kept | bags went flying out the car winin mind: (1) Make the bin as air dow. The man grabbed them, tight as possible. (2) If carbon di- rushed to his parked car and essulfide is used, keep all fires away. caped. A spark from turning on an electric light may ignite the fumigant. (3) Bury burlap sacks about half way and pour on fumigant, then cover with a tarpaulin to confine the fumes. (4) Use carbon disulfide at the rate of one pound for each 25 bushels of grain. Dead Animals for Meat Use

PHILADELPHIA.-The son of a Lancaster county corporation lawyer and the operators of a Fort Washington kennel supply firm have been fined a total of \$1550 at hearcharges of selling meat processed from dead animals for use by pets and other domestic animals.

The prosecutions, made by the Pennsylvania department of agriculture, were the first resulting from a statewide investigation into violation of pure food laws.



Profit Grows When Water Flows



No longer a luxury item on modern, progressive farms, an electric water system makes possible better health, less backbreaking labor, more convenience, and more profit.

The best a man can do with good hand-pump equipment is 100 gallons per hour at a labor cost of at least 30 cents. A one-third horse-power electric motor will pump this water for about one cent.

With ample water it has been proved that milk production can be increased by at least tan per cent. This gain is milk production with increased by at least ten per cent. This gain in milk production with

cow giving 6,000 pounds of milk annually amounts to 600 pounds. At per hundred, this means an annual income increase of \$18 per cow. Thirty cows will produce enough additional milk to pay for the installation of an adequate electric water system for all purposes during the first year alone. Tests have proved that egg production has been stepped up 19

per cent by running water at the correct temperature. Suppose a farmer has 500 hens with 60 per cent laying, and a 10 per cent increase for winter months. This means 300 dozen more eggs which amounts to big return on a very small investment plus the substantial saving in time and labor. The average farm family should plan on an electric water system

which pumps about 500 gallons an hour, piped to every point where running water is needed. To help farmers become acquainted with the benefits of running water under pressure, manufacturers and dealers are cooperating with electric utilities to sponsor a National Water Systems Month in May. Theme is "Profit Grows When Water Flows."

Hard water makes cooking and dishwashing difficult, clogs plumbing and costs the average family in hard water districts a very substantial sum each year. The best way to avoid the expense and inconvenience of hard water is by the installation of a water conditioner. Such a unit, installed in the basement, utility room or kitchen, guarantees the softness of every drop used in the house. By washing, bathing, cleaning, and cooking with completely conditioned water, there is a very definite saving—enough to pay for the unit in a comparatively short time.

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Care of Floors

Question: A few months ago 1 had all the floors sanded, filled and varnished. I would like to wash them but have been advised not to use water, as it discolors floors. Please advise.

Answer: The manufacturers of hardwood flooring do not, as a rule, approve of using water on such flooring. As your floors have been so recently varnished, it should be fairly easy to clean them with some of the special cleaning preparations intended for this purpose. Or you can clean them by wiping with cloths damp with turpentine. Consult your hardware dealer. First take up the loose dust in the usual way.


