

Farm Bureau Rural Fire Truck Arrived Tuesday

The Sherman County Farm Bureau has scored again in its efforts to accomplish beneficial advantages for the rural sections of the county. The new rural fire truck designed for fighting fires in the agricultural section arrived Tuesday.

The new truck is built on a 1 1/2 ton Ford chassis. It has a 500 gallon water tank with hose and pump connections fitted for refilling from water tanks. The truck is designed for wiping out flames in wheat fields and pastures while driving at high speed.

Built by the Boardman Co. of Oklahoma City, the tank on the truck may be refilled in 2 1/2 minutes.

The finance committee still lacks \$1,400 of having sufficient funds to pay for the fire protection equipment.

Ask Farmers Aid To Enforce New Truck Law

A new law requiring out of state truckers in Texas to purchase a license for 60 days is required this year. The trucks will register at the County Tax Collector's Office and purchase a sticker that will be placed on the windshield. The highway patrols and traffic officials are required by the law to stop anyone violating the law. It is to the farmers interest to help the officials enforce this law. If a truck is hired by the farmer to haul his wheat, and the truck does not have this license he may be arrested by the traffic officials and result in considerable loss of time to the farmer in getting his wheat hauled. Local farmers can help the out of state truckers as well as himself by explaining this requirement at the time of hiring or making a trade. If they notice that the truck has no sticker on the windshield it will pay him well to require the trucker to secure this sticker before he employs him.

This is not an unreasonable law on out of state truckers using the highways. Many other states have similar laws.

Spraying Will Control Insects And Weeds

Chlordane, Texaphene, or Chlorphehe may be added to solution at the time of spraying weeds with 2-4-D for control of such insects as grasshoppers. In mixing this material, 1/2 pound or 3/4 pound of pure 2-4-D acid has been very effective in killing or controlling the growth of most of the broad leaf weeds in this area.

The weeds should be treated when they are in the state of vigorous growth. To kill the grasshopper, one might add chlordane or texaphene to spraying material. Chlordane, Texaphene, or chlorphehe should be added at the rate of 1 quart of 45% emulsion or 2 pounds of 50% wettable powder for 50 or 100 gallons of water per acre. Texaphene should be applied at the rate of 1 quart of 55% emulsion or 2 1/2 pounds of 40% wettable powder per 50 or 100 gallons of water per acre. As the grasshopper grows larger the amount of these chemicals should be increased.

If these new insecticides are to be effective they must be applied at the right time and in the right places. Farmers should watch for build up of infestation of young grasshoppers in fence rows, in bar ditches, pasture or waste lands and in your crops and gardens. Spray these infested areas as soon as hatching is completed. Generally speaking this will be about 7 to 10 days after the first grasshopper appeared.

Precaution: Do not feed forage treated with these new insecticides to dairy cattle or to animals being finished for slaughter. The same applies to treated pastures. If you use the amount recommended there is no immediate danger to the animals being fed on grass or pastures, but these insecticides may accumulate in the fatty tissues of the animal and be given off in the milk or butter fat. Animals fed for long periods on treated forage may accumulate enough of these chemicals to make meat and dairy products unfit for human food.

EMERGENCY STORAGE PROGRAM

A telegram from the Administrator's office relative to emergency action being taken to assure producers of an opportunity to take advantage of the Loan and Price Support Program is reproduced below:

"After signing of CCC charter revisions today Secretary Brannan announced provisions of program to aid farmers in storing on farms 1949 wheat and other storable grains. Distress loans at 75 percent of full support level will be made to farmers on approval of PMA committees where wheat must be temporarily stored on ground providing suitable storage space is acquired in 90 days. Balance of loan when grain is in suitable storage. Distress loans applicable also in areas where climatic conditions do not permit open storage, with CCC undertaking to find suitable emergency storage in such cases. With approval of PMA Committees CCC will loan farmers 85 percent of cost for purchasing and constructing farm storage at 4 percent interest to be repaid in five annual installments."

Since Sherman County is in an area where climatic conditions will permit open storage it is not expected that emergency building loans will be applicable.

Dial Telephone System Placed In Operation

Stratford's dial telephone system was placed in operation Friday morning with Mayor Van B. Boston making the first official long distance call over the new equipment.

When Mayor Boston informed the mayor of Dalhart that he was using the new dial system just installed for making the first call, he was immediately informed by Mayor Schuhart that Dalhart wanted a dial system also.

F. L. Yates, president of the Chamber of Commerce, Earl Bond, H. F. McIntosh, Charles Wisdom, and Brown Ross witnessed the switch-over to the new dial system.

Telephone company officials here for the event were J. N. Gott, equipment supervisor of Dallas; T. M. Rogers, district manager of Guymon, Oklahoma; W. E. Lyon, Texas-New Mexico sales representative, Brownwood, Texas, and E. L. Langley, Texhoma, who assisted with installation of the new system.

J. W. Pringle, chief installer, and D. S. Wright, installer, of Rochester, New York, who have been in Stratford for several weeks, represented the Stromberg-Carlson Company at the switch-over ceremonies.

Placing in operation of the dial telephone system in Stratford represents a struggle of the residents of the city for a period of approximately 20 years to secure a serviceable telephone system.

Interim Wheat Loan Rates Announced

The three terminals where interim rates apply are Kansas City, Mo., and Los Angeles, California, with a rate of \$2.16 a bushel; and Galveston, Texas, with an interim rate of \$2.26.

Sherman County interim wheat loan rate is \$1.83. The final loan rates on wheat will be determined on the basis of the parity price of June 15, 1949, to reflect 90% of parity.

Weekly News Letter

 AUSTIN — Senate Bill 92 which authorizes the commissioners to raise the pay of county officials was signed by the Governor. It is a permissive law that gives permission to the County Commissioners Court to increase salaries of the precinct, county and district officers in an amount not to exceed twenty-five percent of their salary for 1948, whether paid on a fee or a salary basis if the county can afford it. The Commissioners Court may also increase the salary of the deputies, assistants and clerks of any district, county or precinct officer in an amount not to exceed thirty-five percent of the sum allowed for the year of 1948.

Meanwhile, final adjournment of the Legislature was being hastened by continued work by joint Senate-House conference committees on the important bills providing funds for operating the state's business the next two years. The big pro-

lem still, remains the trimming of the appropriation bills in order to prevent a new tax bill.

Congress Has Economical Thoughts

"Historians may write that some sort of political awakening has happened to the American people in this era of grace," says Washington correspondent Holmes Alexander. "So many evidences of it cannot be put down to coincidence. The present revolt in Congress against spendthrift financing and government waste has spread like a loose rumor."

There has always been an economy block in Congress. Probably its best known member is Senator Byrd of Virginia, a conservative Democrat. Mr. Byrd fought hard against what he considered the waste of President Roosevelt's New Deal, and he is doing the same thing in the case of President Truman's Fair Deal. His support, which has been largely made up of Southern Democrats and some Northern Republicans, has not been sufficiently large to make any particular impression in the field of legislation.

Now, however, as Mr. Alexander points out, the feeling that something must be done to curtail unnecessary Federal spending is spreading. One of the most interesting examples is provided by Senator Douglas, the new senator from Illinois. Mr. Douglas was formerly a college professor and had a distinguished war record. He is a pro-Truman Democrat. His legislative views can be fairly described as left of center. He favors many of the welfare state ideas. However, he recently went firmly on record against financial waste, saying, "To be a liberal one does not have to be a wastrel." Again, he said, "Our first job is to try the extra fat out of our departments and agencies."

It doesn't require any deep analysis to see why this attitude is gaining more adherents. Whether or not Mr. Truman's extremely costly legislative program, with its heavy emphasis on cradle-to-the-grave social security, goes through, this country is committed to enormous budgets far into the future. The cost of maintaining our growing military establishment, ERP, the North Atlantic Pact in which we are the dominant member, these and other established policies will require tens of billions of dollars. So any possible cuts in expenditures, even though they may be individually small, have assumed an increasing importance.

In the past, one difficulty in the way of economy was that no one knew how to go about it. No one had ever made a complete analytical study of sprawling government.

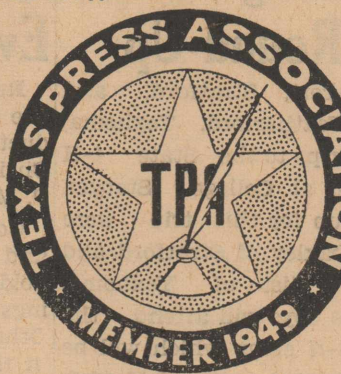
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Wheat Harvest Will Start As Fields Dry

eliminated when care is used, Guthrie said. If the phosphor or fluorescent powder on the inside of the lamps gets into a cut there may be slow healing and inflammation. If any cut is not properly treated there will be the same results. Such cuts are as easily avoided in the handling of fluorescent lamps as they are by the careful handling of any substance capable of scratching the skin. There is no truth to reports that a general sickness or spreading of wounds on the body results from cuts caused by broken fluorescent lamps, he added. Guthrie said the study of the Medical Advisory Committee on Beryllium had shown there is no record of anyone suffering injury from breathing dust from the occasional breakage of a lamp, despite the millions of such lights in use. Precautions should be taken against breathing this dust, however. Home owners or small retail establishments using fluorescent lights who have only a limited number of occasions on which to dispose of them were urged to break the lights out of doors in a waste area or in a waste container. The person breaking them should avoid breathing the dust or vapor that arrives. The only possibility of danger existing in the disposal of fluorescent bulbs arises when a large number are to be broken and the process will cover a considerable period of time. Under these conditions, the following procedure is recommended: A. Break lamps out of doors in a waste disposal area or in a ventilated hood. To avoid unnecessary dust, the breakage is best done within the waste container. B. The operator should be supplied with, and required to wear, a respirator approved by the United States Bureau of Mines for toxic dusts. C. Ultimate disposal of the broken lamps should be such that the public and others will not be unduly exposed to the powders. In situations where it is necessary to break the lamps within buildings, it should be done in an isolated room and in a hood so as to minimize escape of dusts. Sufficient exhaust ventilation should be supplied to the hood to provide an air intake of 125 linear feet per minute at the breathing level.

Fluorescent Scare Is A Myth

"Use care and avoid scare reports" was the advice today of Chetser Guthrie in the Stratford office of the Southwestern Public Service Company, in reply to the flood of scare stories now sweeping the nation about the use and disposal of fluorescent lamps.

Fluorescent lamps are not killers or maimers sensation seekers to the contrary, but are as harmless as any other form of illumination if handled properly, Guthrie said.

The first false report on fluorescent lamps is the one that implies that they are dangerous when intact, Guthrie added. A three year study by the Medical Advisory Committee on Beryllium has placed a "false" tag on this rumor. The beryllium group studied this matter as Beryllium is contained in the inner coating of fluorescent lamps.

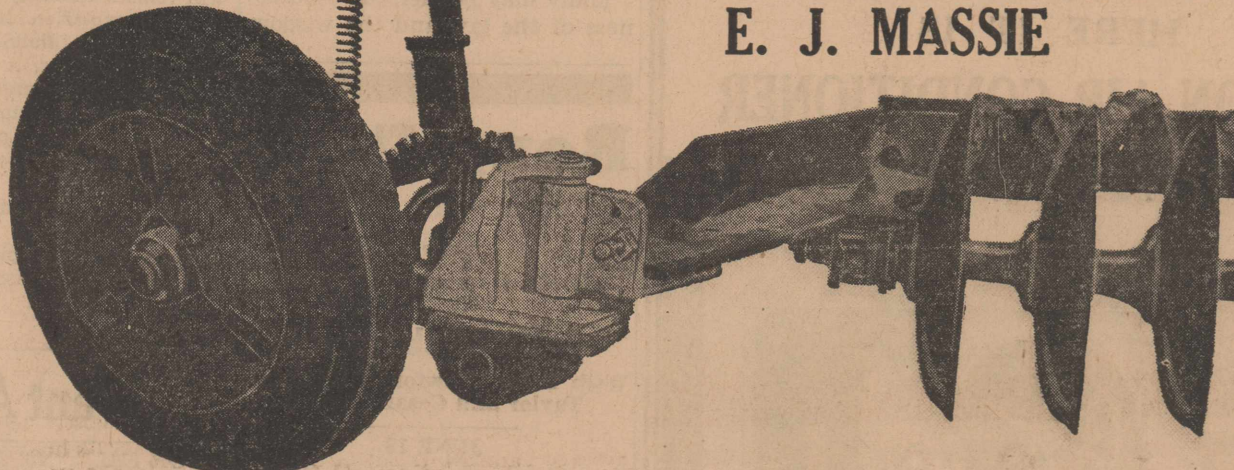

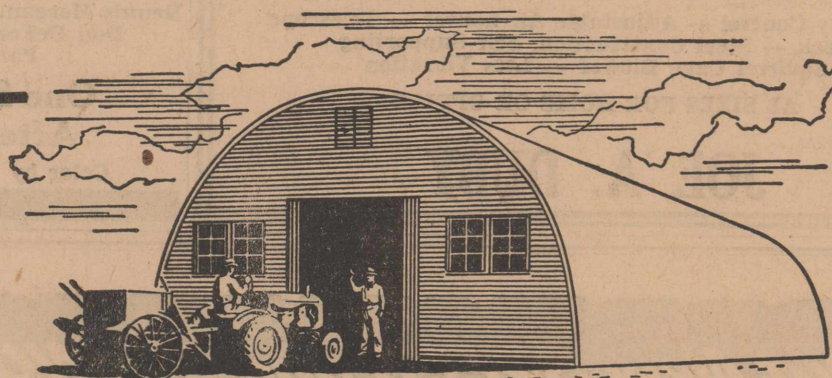

Chambers Sees Dangers In Pipelines

(By Rep. W. R. Chambers)
In the newspapers recently, there appeared a story stating the Coastal Pipeline Company was going to file an application before the Federal Power Commission to build a 30-inch pipe-

line 1,000 miles long from Texas to Virginia. The same story mentioned the Piedmont Pipeline Company that also is applying for a certificate to build a big-inch pipeline to North Carolina.

Texas may be sure that both of them will be built, as the Texas Railroad Commission never opposes these applications. A few weeks earlier I noticed that the Gulf Coast Northern Pipeline Company was going to build the

biggest big-inch, a 34-inch line to Chicago. Last month the Federal Power Commission granted permits to the Texas Gas Transmission Company to build a 28-inch pipeline to the North-East, and another to the Trunkline Gas Company to build a line of the same size to Iowa.

The Tennessee Gas Transmission Company is going to double its capacity and increase its take to more than a billion feet a day, and so is the Texas Eastern Gas Transmission Company and the El Paso Natural Gas Company.

The Transcontinental, not yet complete, is planning to increase its capacity by a couple of hundred million feet per day.

The total capacity of these new lines and of the increase in existing systems will be nearly four billion feet a day.

The gas that goes to the new pipelines will come from wells and fields 'dedicated' to them by contract, and they 'dedicate' enough gas to last the pipeline for at least 20 years.

There is great significance to Texas in the dedication of our state's gas reserves. Recently, in the Supreme Court, in the oral argument of the Federal Power Commission vs. Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Co., the question came up as to who would get gas, which in this case was Kansas gas, when there wasn't enough for both Kansas and the out-of-state users. The answer was that the gas 'dedicated' to the interstate pipeline, being in interstate commerce, would get preference. This caused Justice Jackson to observe that the gas producing state might be worse off than the state which gets its gas from a distant state whose reserves are dedicated to the interstate pipelines.

Many may ponder the soundness of the law and the wisdom

of the authors of the Tenth Amendment. There is little doubt as to who will get the last gas from Texas. It will be the pipelines that we permitted to secure the dedication while we sat idly by.

Texas industries will be burning wood while people in Philadelphia and Detroit are frying eggs or warming their feet with Texas gas.

The problem is serious, but it can be solved. The Senate of the State of Texas has before it a resolution, HCR-18, that I introduced, directing the Texas Railroad Commission to appear before the Federal Power Commission and oppose the granting of these permits. If this resolution is passed, we can expect to see these permits denied instead of approved, and we can look forward to Texas future with less fear of lying cities and decaying industries.

If this Resolution is not adopted this session, we may expect Texas to become an industrial wilderness. For when we have to buy our gas from the coal produced gas of Pennsylvania, we won't be able to compete with industry in the coal-rich states of the North-East.

If enough people will write asking their Senators to support the House Concurrent Resolution 18, it will pass at this session, which will conclude its labors in a week or two.

Atom Age Structures

Modern buildings can be constructed to "resist" atomic bombs but human beings must go "underground" to be safe, a Yale faculty member declares. "It is true that structures can be designed which will remain standing after an atomic bomb explosion. No matter how carefully such buildings are constructed, however, it would not be safe for the occupants to remain in them during an attack," according to Charles T. G. Looney. Loss of life, Mr. Looney asserted, could be "greatly lessened" by well-constructed underground shelters, well placed for efficient access. "It is obvious that well-planned civilian defense in all its aspects would be essential," he said.

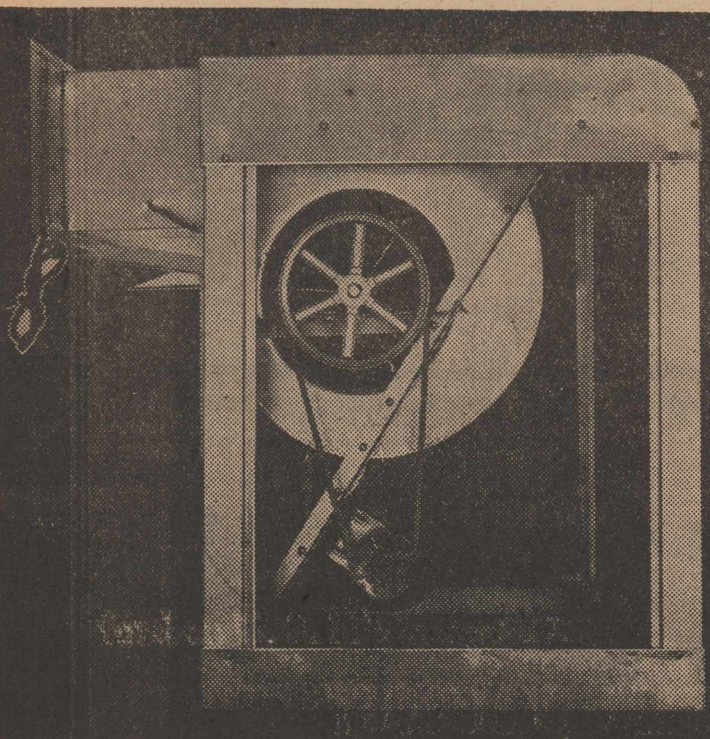

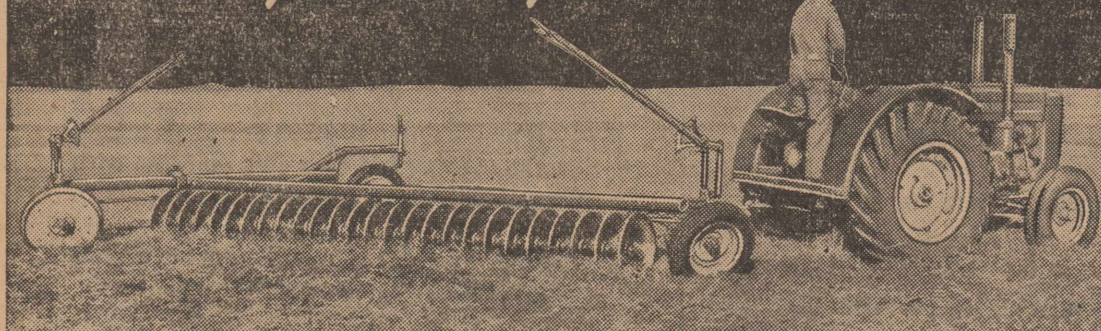

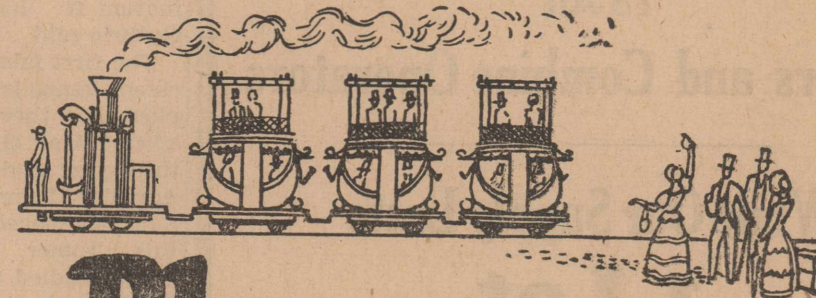

THE STATE OF TEXAS: COUNTY OF SHERMAN: TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF ROAD DISTRICT NO. 1 OF SHERMAN COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID DISTRICT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Road District No. 1 of Sherman County, Texas, on the 29th day of June, 1949, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the election order passed by the Commissioners' Court on the 28th day of May, 1949, which is as follows:

"AN ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE PROPOSITION OF ISSUING ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND (\$100,000.00) DOLLARS OF BONDS OF ROAD DISTRICT NO. 1 OF SHERMAN COUNTY, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Court the petition of C. L. Roach and more than fifty other persons, representing themselves to be resident, qualified electors of Sherman County Road District No. 1, who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation praying that this Court order an election in Road District No. 1 of Sherman County, Texas, to determine:

"Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 1 of Sherman County, Texas, shall be issued in an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Three and three-fourths (3-3/4%) per cent per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed Thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Road District No. 1 of Sherman County, Texas; and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said Road District sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

2. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the Thirty-Ninth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors of this State and of this County who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

3. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

4. The said election shall be held at Texas Side School House Texhoma, Texas, within Road District No. 1 of Sherman County, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election:

RENTIE HAMILTON, Presiding Judge.
CARL CRAIG, Judge.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of this State regulating general elections when not in conflict with the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature, hereinabove cited.

6. Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper having general circulation in Sherman County Road District No. 1 for three successive weeks before the date of said election. And in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said District, and one at the Courthouse door of the County for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

AROUND THE HOUSE

The quickest way to determine if a plant needs water is by touching the soil surface—if it is moist, water the plant.

Save your orange peels in the spring and fall, and when they have dried toss them into the fireplace on coolish nights: they kindle quickly and burn with a pleasant aroma.

To avoid stirring up dust when sweeping a rug, sprinkle rug with bits of dampened newspapers: papers will absorb the dust preventing it from flying around the room.

If lower part of a window shade is soiled, shade can be reversed to bring clean part into prominence: untack shade from roller; reverse; cut off any damaged edges near the pull-cord and tack back onto roller. Then stitch a new hem, slip stick through this hem and reinsert the pull-cord.

Dust pictures thoroughly, front, back, and frame, at least once a month; dust the wall behind them, too, to prevent black outlines from forming on the wall.

Fasten that left-over piece of linoleum to the floor of the trunk of your car: wax it liberally, and see how easily grips and trunks slide in and out.

If woolen socks get sopping while on a camping trip, fill the toes with small pebbles before hanging them up to dry: this helps keep them from shrinking.

Most of Nation's Farms Now Boast Electric Power

Rural America moved further and faster into the electric power age during 1948 than in any previous year, according to the 1949 Britannica Book of the Year.

"Nearly three-fourths of the farms of the U. S. had been electrified, and in an increasing number of instances the power was used as a means of agricultural production as well as for better rural living," the book declares.

Soil conservation measures also proceeded apace during fiscal 1948. Soil conservation measures and land-use adjustments were completed under official auspices on more than 21,500,000 acres of farm and range land in soil conservation districts, an increase of 7 per cent as compared with the previous year.

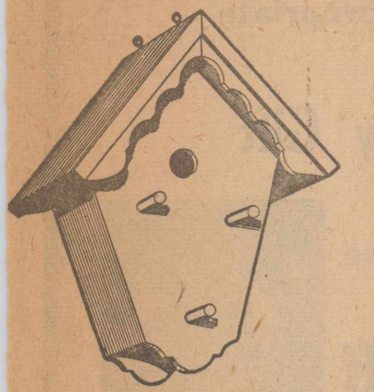

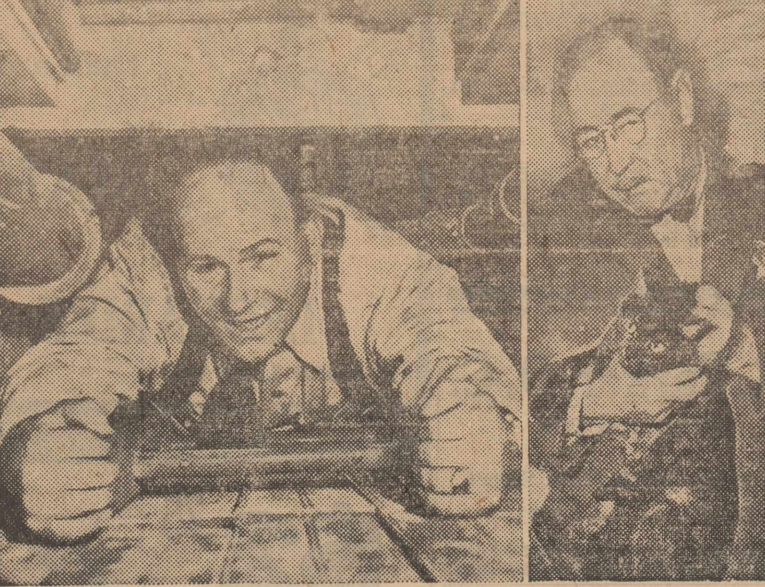

Administration Asks Vast Powers
In New Agriculture Support Plan;
Labor Legislation Gets Priority

FARM PLAN:
More Curbs Asked

Critics and supporters alike of Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan's 1949 farm support program were surprised when Brannan asked sweeping new powers to control the nation's agricultural production.

THE latest Brannan proposals were contained in the full draft of the administration's farm program which was laid before congress. In that program, the powers requested would mark the first time in the history of the nation—not excepting wartime—when farmers and their activities would be so completely under federal control.

For example, Brannan asked that rigid marketing quotas, now usable on only six major crops, be applied on the great bulk of farm products, including meat animals, milk, poultry, eggs, fruits and vegetables.

It was a bold stroke on the part of the administration and one that will over the nation.

For it was quickly discernible that, if enacted, this program would put the American farmer under federal control from the moment he arose to feed the chickens and other stock in the morning, until he tended his vegetables and worked his crops, milked the cows and fed the stock again in the evening.

The big question was: Would the farmers stand for that, even if congress did enact the law? Farmers would be given a choice because under the Brannan proposal, they would have to vote adoption of the program by a two-thirds vote of all producers.

Brannan envisions a condition where prices would be allowed to move freely in the market with farmers getting a payment covering the difference if and when market prices fell below a predetermined "fair" return.

LABOR LAW:
Gets Priority

With domestic issues having been given the green light over foreign affairs, the U. S. senate was committed to wrestle to a new labor law—or repeal Taft-Hartley—before adjournment.

The importance of the labor question to the administration was indicated in the senate's shelving discussion of the North Atlantic security pact until the troublesome labor issue has been disposed of.

THE reason was rather obvious. Organized labor, worried by an apparent disinclination of congress to go along with the President in repealing Taft-Hartley and fearing further delay, was pushing the administration to get going. There was constant reminder behind the scenes of the President's campaign pledges to scrap the present over-all labor law and labor wanted action. The 1950 congressional races weren't too far off and the administration evidently felt it had better deliver or face labor's antagonism at the polls next year.

MAJORITY LEADER Scott Lucas declared that if all major legislation were not disposed of by July 31, "we shall extend the length of the session until we have dealt with the most urgent proposals."

SHANGHAI POPULACE SWINGS TO COMMUNISTS

It was mostly beer and skittles for the Communists in Shanghai. The city and its millions had swung into the Communist camp, not by degrees, but with what appeared to be an enthusiastic rush. Along long lines of avenues, Red flags flew from every shop. Newspapers reversed their policy overnight and began to sell the populace on communism.

Students danced and sang Communist songs. All traces of any nationalism or opposition to communism appeared to be gone. In the customs house work appeared to be stopped. Instead, clerks assembled in the halls learning Communist songs. Chinese radio stations spent much time giving singing lessons. The words were read over slowly, then music was played.

Baldness "Cure"

Buried on inside pages of most newspapers was a story which, if true, would have rated banner headlines in the eyes of those it concerned.

FOR, from Een, Holland, there came a claim that Meinheer J. Van Rooyen, a bewildered little barber, could cure baldness—no fooling.

The news leaked out, and the little barber shop was thronged with visitors. Letters poured in by the thousands.

The meinheer started it all himself by trying to stop his own thinning hair from growing thinner, experimenting with various lotions and use of infra-red rays.

ACCORDING to reports, he finally hit upon a "combination" that made his hair grow. Tried on others, it succeeded. Now he is treating 100 people, working 13 hours a day.

U. S. JOBS:
Could Be Cut

A contention that the government cut its civilian employe rolls by 10 per cent and "accomplish exactly the same purposes" was made in Washington by former President Herbert Hoover. Declaring that this could be done if the government were organized properly, Mr. Hoover said the savings to the taxpayers might reach four or five billion dollars a year.

MR. HOOVER'S statement must have carried some weight, but there were only an optimistic few who believed anything might be done along the lines he pointed out.

The former President was speaking with authority because a commission of which he had been named the head—a fact-finding body to uncover just such things as he had uncovered—had exhaustively studied government functions and processes and had reported its findings.

A 200,000 cut in federal personnel would require no wholesale firings, he said. He added it could be accomplished through normal turnover, which now runs about 500,000 a year.

BERLIN:
New Issues

The meeting of the big four council of foreign ministers had developed one fact—discussion of German unity under current conditions was futile. So, it appeared attention would be turned to Berlin where some major problems yet remained unsolved.

Berlin presented concrete issues which many hoped could be resolved or, at least, discussed more profitably. The western powers were understood as ready to insist upon written agreements concerning rights in Berlin to replace oral understandings that alone have given them any rights in the immediate past.

It was also believed they would urge a single elected city council and retention of occupation status for their zone. It was believed inevitable that the question of four-power authority—which led to a deadlock over the veto right when the whole of Germany was discussed—will arise again in relation to a Berlin regime.

International Union Sunday School Lessons
By DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

DEVOTIONAL READING: Luke 24:21-32

Conquest of Death
Lesson for June 19, 1949

DOCTORS TALK about conquering death, but they never do. All they can manage is to put it off a little. In all the long sad story of mankind there is only one absolute conquest of death. It happened on the first Easter morning, and it was a turning point in the history of the world. The few lines about the Resurrection, in our New Testament, would not cover the front page of this newspaper. We do not know all we want to know. But those few lines Dr. Foreman tell us enough to set us singing, they are a solid foundation for a soaring faith.

The Mighty Act of God

WE shall be disappointed if we expect the Gospels to "explain" the Resurrection. If there is anything the stories show clearly, it is that the first persons who knew of the Resurrection were confused and shaken by it. The disciples had not expected anything like this, and they may not fully have understood what was going on.

What they were sure of, what they could not deny, was first of all that Christ rose from the dead, and also that it was God who raised him from the dead. God had beaten the one unbeatable power—death. Death, the universal conqueror, turned out for once to be the conquered.

It is only those who can believe in an all-powerful God who can fully believe in the Resurrection.

It Is The Lord

WHAT MANNER of person was Jesus, after that first Easter morning? There were some differences hard to describe, and in fact not described, only hinted at. You notice that at times it was not easy to recognize him at first. Paul refers to Christ's "glorious body" and surely there must be a glory in a person who has actually proved too strong for death to hold—a glory such as even Christ, before Calvary, had not shown. And yet—and yet, it was the same Jesus they had always known.

No Ghost

BY NIGHT, in many a "seance," mediums profess to get in touch with the spirits of the dead. If you could believe the spiritists, Shakespeare and Queen Victoria and innumerable other famous people, have come back and talked from beyond the grave. But the thing that makes the Christian church more than doubtful about such performances, is that somehow the dead-and-come-back genius is never a genius any more. Neither Shakespeare nor any other famous person has said anything worth saying through a "medium." And even these feeble ghosts cannot endure the daylight. They have to come at night.

How different were the comings of Jesus! There was nothing weird or uncanny about him. Around the supper table, or on an afternoon walk, or out on the lake shore under the morning sun . . . never the poor mumbling ghost of a seance, never any stupid trifles from his lips, but words of truth and comfort which the church cherishes as among the best from our Lord's mind. Jesus' resurrection is not the story of the survival of a ghost, still less the mere return of a revived and walking corpse.

It is the story of a Divine Person who conquered death, and who came back from that conquest in power and majesty, yet with all the tenderness, love and brilliance he had ever shown.

Our Hope in Him

PAUL (in I Cor. 15) makes it clear that our hope of life-beyond-death grows right out of Christ's resurrection. The enemies of Christ would have given their right eyes to stop the mouths of the men who told that story, and to prove it a lie.

But they could never do it. You cannot well stop people from believing what they have seen with their own eyes. So our hope of eternal life is not just a hope.

As Paul says, if that were all, we should be miserable men.

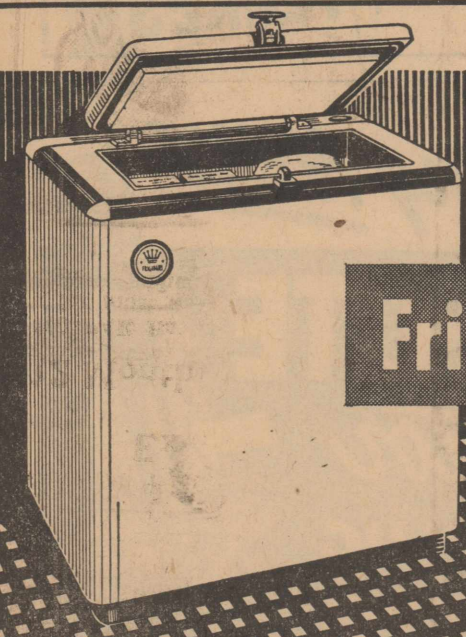

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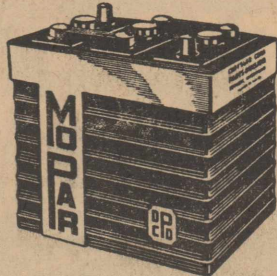

Stress Need Of Intersection Safety Measures

The month of June has been named by the National Safety Council as the month for campaigning to more fully inform the public of the significance of various traffic signs and signals, and signs marking railroad crossings at grades will be featured.

The Rock Island management is very anxious to cooperate in this program and gives the below tabulation of statistics which may interest most civic minded citizens.

There were 3,964 accidents involving trains last year in which 1,612 were killed and 4,266 were injured.

259 pedestrians were struck by trains which killed 76 and injured 185.

1,734 passenger cars were struck by trains killing 813 and injuring 1,893. 20 motor buses were struck by trains, killing 2 and injuring 71. 735 motor trucks were struck by trains, killing 266 and injuring 643.

Motorcycles were struck by trains in 15 accidents, killing 7 and injuring 10. 16 bicycles were struck by trains, killing 9 and injuring 8.

In 4 trolley car and train accidents 14 were injured.

In 35 varied accidents in which people were struck by trains 23 were killed and 23 injured.

25 pedestrians ran into the side of trains, killing 5 and injuring 20. 883 passenger cars ran into the side of trains, killing 229 and injuring 1,222. 3 motor buses ran into the side of trains injuring 16. 168 motor trucks ran into the side of trains, killing 45 and injuring 209.

34 motorcycles ran into the side of trains, injuring 28 and killing 17. 6 bicycles ran into the side of trains, killing 1 and injuring 5.

In 16 other grade crossing accidents 9 were injured and 7 killed.

The above figures were compiled by the Interstate Commerce Commission and released by A. B. Harrison, superintendent of the Rock Island Railroad.

Fly Control Program Spreads Over Texas

AUSTIN — During the last several summers, considerable enthusiasm was shown by various local organizations such as Chambers of Commerce, many Civic Organizations, and others in the arranging of a fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that for taking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended.

However, without year-around community sanitation the ultimate result, which is so important has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant.

"The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year," Dr. Cox said. "For example, why spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed. Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered. I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overcome B. O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit, preferably with one or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is covered with grease, dirt or soot.

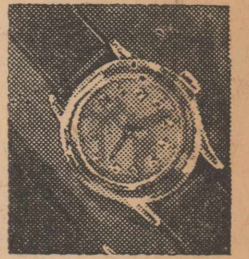

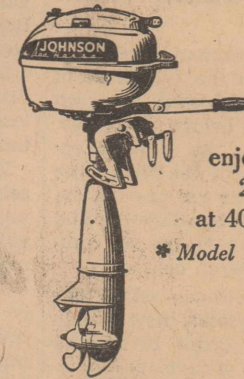
